DISCUSSION OF POLICE CHIEF'S REQUEST FOR ADDITIONAL OFFICER

Police Chief Neal Worsley explained that the addition of an eighteenth officer in the Police Department would allow a minimum of two officers to be on duty for most shifts, and would provide needed time-off for the officers. The Chief introduced Sergeant Alan Ackerson. the officer in charge of scheduling for the Police Department. Sergeant Ackerson explained the current Police Department shift schedule, as well as the proposed schedule including an additional officer. Councilman Wright asked how often the officers respond to calls in the Parrish Gateway retail area. Sergeant Ackerson responded that the volume of calls varies, but the Department frequently receives multiple calls per day from the retail business area. Sundays and Mondays tend to have the lightest call volume. The scheduling goal with the request for an additional officer is to have an additional officer available on weekends. Councilman Wright asked how the Department handles calls during the shifts with only one officer on duty. Sergeant Ackerson responded that the Department relies on help from other agencies. He stated that cooperation between the agencies is good, but it would be ideal to have two Centerville officers able to respond. With an eighteenth officer there would be at least two officers on duty for all shifts, except from 4:00 a.m. to 8:00 a.m. Sergeant Ackerson also mentioned turn-over in the Department and the training time required for new officers. The amount included in the budget for an additional officer includes salary, benefits, uniform, and a firearm for a full year. The Department has a reserve vehicle that can be assigned to the new officer.

Chief Worsley stated there are not many people interested in becoming full-time police officers right now, and he does not know what kind of interest there would be for part-time positions. As part of the interview process for finding a full-time officer the Chief intends to ask candidates if they would be interested in a part-time position or working in a reserve capacity for the Department at some point in the future. Chief Worsley said many of the incentives for becoming an officer have been taken away, and he does not anticipate a lot of interest. Councilman Wright suggested offering upper level part-time pay and pay for training, and expressed a desire to make sure Centerville officers are paid well enough that they do not leave the Department or feel the need to work part-time for other agencies.

Sergeant Zan Robison has been with the Centerville Department for thirteen years. He explained that he has noticed an increase in the time required to close cases. Attorneys and courts are requesting more research and follow-up to ensure successful conviction beyond reasonable doubt in criminal investigations. Retail theft cases often turn into something more as vehicles are searched and backgrounds are investigated. Chief Worsley pointed out that timing has become a big issue in cases considering the amount of time allowed for formal filing has been reduced from seventy-two hours to forty-eight hours. Sergeant Robison stated that no two days are the same in emergency response. Assistant Chief Child explained that in an effort to keep movements random and prevent predictability officers are not assigned specific areas by grid. Councilwoman Fillmore asked if the officers have administrative help with evidence in the office. Sergeant Robison responded that it is important to keep a chain of custody with evidence. Officers maintain custody of evidence until it is entered into an evidence locker.

Sergeant Von Steenblik stated that the biggest change he has noticed in police work is a movement from a lot of property crimes to more fraud and identity theft crimes. He described several common methods of fraud and identity theft, and described information sharing and networking that has developed between agencies to aid in the complex investigations. Councilman Wright asked about the presence of gangs in the city. Sergeant Steenblik responded that he is not aware of gangs residing in the city, but the officers see some gang activity passing through.

Chief Worsley explained that the dispatchers with the Centerville Police Department function as support staff for the Department. The County dispatch receives all 911 calls. Stephanie Lowe described the three City dispatch positions and their duties and responsibilities. The Chief stated that the benefit to keeping dispatch in-house is knowing that the work gets done. Assistant Chief Child added that providing City dispatch is a service to the citizens. City dispatchers type reports for the Department, freeing up officer time for other priorities.

Councilman Wright expressed a desire to increase Police funding to have officers specifically assigned to the retail areas of the city. Mayor Cutler explained that the City has the ability to alter the formula by which the business license fee is determined. Lisa Romney, City Attorney, stated that a study would be required to show that retail businesses have a disproportionate impact on the Police Department. City Manager Thacker added that the formula used now was put in place over ten years ago. Management Assistant Jake Smith will be looking at the previous analysis, and reviewing State law to identify ways to update the business license fee formula. Councilman Averett pointed out the possibility that the revenue increase from altering the formula may be a relatively small amount and may not be worth it. Mayor Cutler recommended staff do some research to see what other cities in the area charge. Councilman Wright stated he feels the City should look at every option before considering a property tax increase, and the potential increased revenue from business license fees could help fund part-time help in the Police Department to support the retail area, apart from the additional officer requested. Mr. Thacker stated that staff will have preliminary discussions of the pros and cons of altering the business license fee formula. Councilwoman Fillmore stated she does not feel the Council should do anything that would discourage retail businesses from calling on the Police Department.

 Councilwoman Ivie said she has spent many hours in ride-alongs with members of the Police Department, and she is impressed with the high quality of officers in Centerville. She said she likes to think of Centerville as a small town, but she has learned that, on a smaller scale, Centerville has the same problems found in other cities. Councilwoman Ivie continued that long-term she believes the Department needs three more officers, and she feels at least one officer should be SWAT trained.

investigation occurs. She pointed out that retail locations also have vehicle accidents, violence, drugs, and other issues. She believes that all officers would need to be fully trained. Chief Worsley said he believes it will be January before a full-time officer is hired and ready to begin the twelve week training period. Training multiple officers at the same time would be difficult. Chief Worsley agreed with Councilwoman Ivie that part-time officers would need to be fully trained. Councilman Higginson said he would not want the Centerville Department to train part-time officers and lose them to full-time positions with other agencies.

A majority of the Council indicated support for hiring the requested additional police officer. Mr. Theorem stated authority to proceed with hiring the additional officer will be included.
