Mayor Hadfield welcomed those in attendance noting that this special session was in lieu of the normally scheduled meeting next Tuesday. The City needed to meet tonight anyway to certify the election results. He led the audience in the Pledge of Allegiance and Derric Rykert offered a prayer.

# TWENTY-MINUTE PUBLIC COMMENT PERIOD – LIMITED TO TWO MINUTES PER PERSON

Tyler Rogers thanked Mayor Hadfield and the Council for their service. He commented on the City's intended plans for 980 North. He lived on 980 North for seven years and had been an American Fork Resident for over 15 years. His family loved American Fork. He was deeply concerned for plans for the bridge in front of his house. He believed that many residents would agree that it would be far more prudent to care for the infrastructure over which we already had stewardship. Frequently he had visitors from out of state and other towns within the state who made the constant remark regarding the disrepair of the roads. In driving on Center Street, Pacific Street and Merchant Street it was a source of embarrassment where it should be a model. He was deeply concerned with plans to move forward with the awarding of a contract for the

building of the bridge without notice to residents that would be immediately affected. The Council had an obligation to notify the residents of such development and to his knowledge there had been no outreach. He understood that the Council agreed to first address the street widening on 980 North prior to any talk about building the bridge. It appeared that the cart was going before the horse and it would present a danger to him and his family. If it was the City's intent to widen 980 North and to take away from his neighborhood that which had been a charming road, it was only right that the residents should be consulted regarding its construction and particularly the beautification plan and most importantly the safety, he would happily support plans to build the bridge after these considerations had been adequately taken into account.

Councilman Shelton appreciated the comments. He and Councilman Taylor had met with the residents in that area at the fire station.

Mr. Rogers reported that his wife was at that meeting.

Councilman Shelton continued that tonight the contract was not to award the building of it but to award the engineering of it which was the study to say what needed to happen. Part of that was the commitment made to look at 980 North widening and that was going to be part of this engineering study. When they had more concrete information they would get back with the residents.

Mr. Rogers responded that was helpful.

Mayor Hadfield added that part of the contract would be to do the necessary door to door visitations with those that had concerns and issues. There were many things that were currently unknown including cost. Certain funds had been set aside for engineering and the study. He explained that the Transportation Plan for 980 North has shown that as a collector class road since the late 1970's and they have had the Art Dye Complex on the Master Plan since the late 1970's as well. Two years ago the City acquired eight acres for recreation from the Goodsell family when they chose to sell and subdivide. It was amazing how many kids were in organized soccer in the City and surrounding communities. Every piece of grass big enough to put a soccer field on was being used. The comments were appreciated. This was the first of many steps.

<u>Scott Roudabush</u> expressed that he was glad that the PARC Tax passed. He saw the underbelly of politics and what was good about politics during this process. They stuck to an honest, straightforward campaign with honest information. They dealt with small print, fine print, innuendo, signs being stolen from lawns and all sorts of things that he did not think was a part of American Fork politics, but unfortunately it was, especially when it came to this issue.

Mr. Roudabush continued that he was glad that he saw Councilman Bowen's editorial where he admitted it was a ten percent revenue increase and not a ten percent tax increase. It would have been nice to have him show that the ten percent increase was from a one-tenth sales tax increase that would be spread conservatively among about half the residents of American Fork and half outside of American Fork.

Mr. Roudabush did not think he would ever run for City Council when things get that dirty. He was thrilled that the PARC tax passed.

#### CITY ADMINISTRATOR'S REPORT

Mr. Whitehead had nothing to report at this time.

#### COUNCIL REPORTS CONCERNING COMMITTEE ASSIGNMENTS

<u>Councilman Bowen</u> had nothing to report but clarified for the record that an increase in City revenue was an increase in the City's sales tax as that was the only place where the City got revenue. A ten percent increase in the City's revenue was a 10 percent increase in the City's portion of the sales tax.

Mayor Hadfield clarified that the City did not only get revenue from sales tax but also from property tax with which the City got a portion. It was based on a mill levy that was adjusted every year based on property values as determined by the County Assessor with the largest part of property tax going to the Alpine School District.

Councilman Bowen did not mean to imply that sales tax was the only tax. He thanked the Mayor for the correction. He acknowledged that there were multiple revenue sources. He clarified that an increase in City revenue from the City's portion of sales tax was an increase in the City's sales tax rate.

Craig Whitehead responded that this PARC Tax was not added to the sales tax which he had explained several times. The City's sales tax was not going from 1 percent to 1.1 percent. It was a separate tax added on to the overall sales tax rate. One could just as well say that this was a 33 percent tax on the County tax. It was the same logic and it did not work. It was not the same. It was calculated differently.

Councilman Bowen expressed that was the first time he heard Mr. Whitehead say that and he appreciated that. This was an additional tax of .1 percent. His point was that it was a 10 percent increase in the revenue and the tax that the City gets from sales tax.

Mr. Whitehead responded that it may generate that amount.

Mayor Hadfield stated that he and Councilman Bowen have had this discussion before. By state law American Fork City garners one-half of one percent based on point of sale. The other one-half of one percent, of which the state takes twelve percent of that for administration costs, that portion that came back to the City was about .78 percent. They had that conversation before and asked that it now be dropped.

Councilman Bowen stated that if it was .78 that was more than ten percent.

Mr. Whitehead explained that they key thing was that it was totally separate. Sales tax went through a formula. The PARC Tax did not.

Councilman Shelton did not think they were doing anything productive.

Mayor Hadfield asked the Council to be concise tonight as they had an appointment at the high school at 7:00 p.m. That was why they started tonight at 5:00 p.m.

<u>Councilman Frost</u> thanked Scott Roudabush, who was the real catalyst, for his efforts and leader for the PARC Tax. He was glad to be associated with good people like Mr. Roudabush who straight up told what it was. There was no fine print. He added that Mr. Roudabush should be able to sleep real well knowing the campaign that was conducted.

Councilman Taylor reported that there had been several questions come to him regarding the Committee that would advise where the PARC Tax dollars should go. Anyone interested in filling one of those seven positions should send a resume to the Mayor or anyone one of the Councilmembers. Councilman Taylor was also appreciative of those that pushed the PARC Tax. He got to work with Mr. Roudabush on the Recreation Committee along with Kelly Smith and some other very hard working people. They took this out of their own spare time outside of the Recreation Committee to push something and to exercise the democratic process and help citizens in the community understand what was at stake and what could possibly be and see through the information that was out there that was incorrect.

<u>Councilman Taylor</u> appreciated anyone, for or against, who could honestly raise a flag and fight that battle and do so honestly. He appreciated Mr. Roudabush and his team for all that they have done.

<u>Councilman Shelton</u> reported that he had a retreat scheduled for this Friday with the Chamber of Commerce for American Fork and was looking forward in putting together a year-long strategy. As part of that he reported that Chamber Director Debbie Lauret had resigned from that position where she had served for over eleven years. He thanked her publicly for her service.

<u>Councilman Shelton</u> reported that he had an opportunity to work with Audra Sorensen on a few economic development issues and found her enthusiastic and she had a "go get it" attitude and she was a breath of fresh air.

<u>Councilman Shelton</u> noted that the 980 North comments regarding safety were taken very seriously. He gave his commitment that there would be public input.

Councilman Shorter had nothing to report at this time.

#### MAYOR'S REPORT

Mayor Hadfield reported that tomorrow he would be attending a workshop on Walkable Communities being held in Provo.

a. Review and action on an Ordinance adopting the revised final plat and site plan of Harrington Hollow Planned Community, consisting of 30 units, located in the vicinity of 620 East 650 South in the PC-Planned Community zone – *Fieldstone Homes* 

Andy Spencer explained that the Council had seen this plan a couple of months ago. The developer had some concerns with some of the improvements on 620 South. They have since met in mediation with them and the State Ombudsman's Office. The result is this plan.

Mayor Hadfield noted that the previous approval needed to be declared null and void and a new Ordinance approved. He asked if there were any questions.

Councilman Shelton asked if the Planning Commission had seen these changes.

Mr. Spencer explained that staff discussed that and determined that the plan did not materially change. The number of lots and configuration remained the same. The ultimate improvements to 620 South stayed the same; it was just a reduction in the amount that the developer would have to construct.

Councilman Bowen wanted to confirm that the satisfaction of the water rights would not change.

Mr. Spencer answered that was correct.

Mayor Hadfield explained that the biggest issue with the Ombudsman was the requirement the City had for the improvements on 620 South. The developer felt that was an unrealistic expectation. The Ombudsman agreed. The City and the developer have agreed regarding what the City should pay for and what the developer should pay for.

Councilman Shelton moved to 1) Void Ordinance No. 2014-09-32 and, 2) Approve Ordnance No. 2014-11-42 adopting the final plat and site plan of Harrington Hollow Planned Community, consisting of 30 units, located in the vicinity of 620 East 650 South in the PC-Planned Community zone and to authorize the Mayor and City Council to sign the plat and accept the dedications with instructions to the City Recorder to withhold recording of the plat and publication of the Ordinance subject to all conditions as identified in the August 20, 2014 Planning Commission meeting. Councilman Shorter seconded the motion.

# REVIEW AND ACTION ON THE APPROVAL OF A CONTRACT CHANGE ORDER TO THE 2014 PACIFIC DRIVE OVERLAY AND DRAINAGE PROJECT – Staff

Dale Goodman explained that this had been addressed in a previous meeting. The project was to be an asphalt overlay with some drainage work. The improvements to the project grew as they went along. They ended up doing some water main replacement. They did more storm drain work than was intended. It went into the winter season. There was no way to get done all the underground work that was needed and the paving. It was determined that they would close everything up and put off the remaining waterline improvements and overlay to next spring. This change order was mainly for the additional storm drainage work that was done.

Councilman Frost asked if the project was still going to extend to 200 East or to 300 East.

Mayor Hadfield stated that he would like to stop it before 200 East at the river. That was one of the bridges that was over 50 years old and the City has applied for some federal money. That would be the time to replace the water line.

Councilman Bowen moved to accept Change Order 1 submitted by Morgan Asphalt for the 2014 Pacific Drive Overlay and Drainage Project and to extend project completion date to June 18, 2015, in the amount of \$16,490 for a total of \$427,670. Councilman Taylor seconded the motion.

REVIEW AND ACTION ON AN AWARD OF A CONTRACT TO FORSGREN & ASSOCIATES, INC TO PROVIDE ENGINEERING, DESIGN AND CONSTRUCTION SERVICES OF A ROUNDABOUT AND BOX CULVERT BRIDGE WITH APPURTENANT LANDSCAPE AND ARCHITECTURAL ELEMENTS, AND ALSO ROADWAY IMPROVEMENTS ON 980 NORTH – Staff

Andy Spencer noted that as was discussed earlier in the meeting this was for design services. They received seven bids. The committee reviewed the responses and recommended that the award go to Forsgren & Associates. This was not for construction but would include construction management at the time of construction. They would involve the community.

Mayor Hadfield asked if there were questions of Mr. Spencer.

Councilman Bowen asked if this was the low bid.

Mr. Spencer answered that it was the second low bid. The City did not select professional services on price alone but it was done on a "mixed formula."

Councilman Bowen asked what criteria Forsgren offered that was better than the others.

Mr. Spencer responded that they had a better balanced team to fulfill all the disciplines that were required.

Councilman Frost moved to accept a proposal submitted by FORSGREN & ASSOCIATES, INC for engineering, design and construction services as outlined and identified in the RFP advertised October 27, 2014 in the amount of \$90,000, with a ten percent (10%) contingency allowance of \$9,000 for a total project budget of \$99,000, and authorize staff to proceed with the preparation of contract documents. Councilman Shorter seconded the motion.

## REVIEW AND ACTION TO CERTIFY THE RESULTS OF THE NOVEMBER 4, 2014 ELECTION

Richard Colborn provided copies of the report of the November 4, 2014 Election Canvass conducted by Utah County earlier in the afternoon that dealt with the American Fork PARC Tax. Absentee, Vote by Mail, and Provisional Ballots have all been included. The final vote on the PARC Tax was

3302 In Favor

2606 Against

The City showed a 43.3% turnout of voters. At the Canvass the County announced the winners of all of the races. The duty of this body was to certify that the American Fork PARC Tax question on the November 4, 2014 ballot did pass.

Councilman Bowen stated that he had talked with the Utah County Clerk Bryan Thompson regarding the PARC Tax ballot and that it was separated from the rest of the ballot.

Mr. Colborn explained that only those in American Fork City would be able to vote on this issue. There were American Fork precincts that also had unincorporated areas and a ballot would not be available to them.

Councilman Shelton moved to certify the results of the November 4, 2014, election specifically the passing of the PARC Tax. (See ATTACHMENT) Councilman Taylor seconded the motion.

Mayor Hadfield asked if there was any further discussion on the motion.

Councilman Bowen recognized the voice of the people in this matter and intended to certify the vote. He had not had any events brought to him that would indicate that the vote itself was flawed or fraudulent or anything like that. He expressed his continued concern about the City's role in this election. By state law the City was required to remain neutral on a ballot proposition and his personal belief was that clearly American Fork City helped plan, execute, and fund the campaign in favor of the ballot proposition which violated state law.

Councilman Shelton asked Councilman Bowen if he had any proof of that.

Councilman Taylor stated that he would love to know where Councilman Bowen got his story from.

Councilman Bowen responded that he would love to provide several things. Before the Recreation Committee was ever set up going about this, the City paid for a poll on this issue to see if it would be worth supporting.

Councilman Shelton asked Councilman Bowen if he had talked to the Lt. Governor's Office to see if that was legal or not legal.

Mayor Hadfield stated that he would deal with the motion on the floor.

Councilman Bowen stated that he had discussion on the motion.

Councilman Taylor called for the question.

Mr. Colborn acknowledged the work of the many election judges.

Mayor Hadfield stated that the public had spoken. Fifty-six percent of the voters voted in favor of the PARC Tax. It was time that they all pulled in unison to make this successful and to overcome some of these differences and move on. He encouraged that in the future they not keep bringing up the point that I did not vote for something or I voted against something. They were in the harness together and they needed to all pull forward in the same direction.

Councilman Bowen stated that he also wanted to move forward on this. He recognized the right of individuals on the City Council and the Mayor to express their opinion for or against any issue. What he had a problem with was using City resources including City Staff and taxpayer funds to the tune of several thousand dollars on mailers that in his opinion contained entire paragraphs that the only purpose was to persuade people to vote for a particular issue and that was specifically prohibited by state law. His concern was not overturning the voice of the people in this election in any way. His concern was that as they moved forward that they did not continue to have this problem because they saw with the bond issue, which failed by 70%, that the City spent over \$40,000 doing what he would say was promoting that issue. If the City could stop spending money planning and executing plans to influence ballot propositions, he would gladly move forward. The Council was all welcome as he was to advocate whatever they would like politically but don't use City resources to do it.

Councilman Shelton responded that there was a great process in this country called due process and that Councilman Bowen was violating American Fork City's due process rights by going out and saying that the City had illegally performed something. There was a process to go through and if he felt that the City had done anything in error there was a process to go through by reporting it to the Lt. Governor's office and let it be investigated. It did not do them any good to be out there and say that the City had done something illegal making it seem that they had already been convicted when there hadn't been a chance for it to be investigated.

Councilman Bowen expressed that was his belief.

Councilman Shelton did not say it was his belief.

Councilman Bowen responded that he did say it was his belief.

Councilman Shelton felt it was important to note that the City had not been convicted of anything and that due process had not yet taken its course.

Councilman Bowen stated again that it was his belief.

Mayor Hadfield explained that if anyone feels that the City is out of line in any election event that the Chief Judge on elections was the Lt. Governor. Make him aware of your concerns but be prepared to back them up. Hearsay did not go very far with the Lt. Governor.

Councilman Taylor commented that he missed an item during the announcements and that was that the American Fork Football Team would be playing in the State Championship which had not been done since 1962. He urged everyone's support at 2:30 p.m. on Friday. It was a momentous event. This was one more great representation of the youth of American Fork and those people who have volunteered their time to make the American Fork Football Team what they are. Go Cavemen!

Mayor Hadfield stated that the Council started tonight at 5:00 p.m. because the American Fork High School Marching Band was having a sendoff ceremony at the high school at 7:00 p.m. and the Mayor and City Council have been invited to participate. The Mayor would be given two minutes to say something uplifting regarding the City.

Mayor Hadfield added that it has been fun to watch the Football Team because the newspapers did not recognize talent on this side of the mountain. He wished them well. The game would be broadcast live on KJZZ.

#### ADJOURNMENT

Councilman Shelton moved adjournment at 5:48 p.m. Councilman Taylor seconded the motion. All were in favor.
