PRESENTATION AND DISCUSSION REGARDING THE ARTS COUNCIL ACTIVITIES
AND BUDGET EXPENDITURES FROM 2014 – Lela Bartholomew

Mayor Hadfield introduced Lela Bartholomew for a report on the Arts.

Ms. Bartholomew thanked the Mayor and Council for this opportunity. She provided the Timpanogos Arts Foundation Final 2013-2014 Grant Report. It is included in these minutes as **ATTACHMENT 1**. They received \$41,400. The amount allocated was \$48,000.

With regard to Highland City Ms. Bartholomew reported that they provided \$2,500. Highland City participated with their theater group. For the 2014-2015 year Highland City has opted not to participate with them on the theater.

Mayor Hadfield responded that the City would keep that in mind when they came to use the amphitheater.

Ms. Bartholomew noted that space for productions was extremely limited and they even had to use Pleasant Grove High School this past year. She reported that they had gotten into the Valentine Theater on the campus of the Utah State Developmental Center for a performance at a cost of \$1,500. The theater has been renovated with new paint, new carpet, and new drapes on the stage. They applied for a spring 2015 performance and were informed that the cost would be

\$4,500. Alpine Theater also uses it quite frequently. She thanked the City Councilmembers for being there to introduce their performances.

Ms. Bartholomew explained that as the students reach age 18 they had the opportunity to continue to play their instruments with the Symphony and the Wasatch Winds.

Mayor Hadfield stated that American Fork City was unique in as much as our band was so strong and they had students from all over the state enroll in American Fork High School to participate in the marching band. The music program puts out many more scholarships to universities all over the United States than did any of the athletic programs. The City has a complete arts package.

Ms. Bartholomew noted that when they were at the amphitheater the residents with their supervisors were invited to come and enjoy the performances.

Ms. Bartholomew continued that last year they applied for and received a Local Arts Agency Grant for this fiscal year. Since that time the Utah Division of Arts and Museums has asked Ms. Bartholomew to serve on their Selection Committee for this upcoming year.

Mayor Hadfield complimented Ms. Bartholomew on the programs that were being run. Last year \$48,000 was asked for and \$41,400 was provided. The City withdrew from the Arts Council the Monday Concerts in the Park and the Steel Days Art Show and that money was provided there. That was the difference in funds. He added that she should be ready to write some grants for use of PARC Tax funds.

Ms. Bartholomew had heard of the possibility of the Monday Concerts in the Park coming back under the Arts Council.

Audra Sorensen responded that there was still some discussion needed.

Mayor Hadfield stated that if they had a better handle on who was performing and when, it could go back under the Arts Council.

Councilman Shelton felt that the strength of the Arts Council came from the number of volunteer hours.

PRESENTATION AND DISCUSSION ON A REQUEST BY TIMPANOGOS SPECIAL SERVICE DISTRICT (TSSD) REGARDING A FORTHCOMING REPLACEMENT SEWER LINE NEAR 900 WEST/700 NORTH – Dale Goodman

Dale Goodman introduced

- Jon Adams, TSSD Manager
- David Barlow, TSSD Engineer
- Brandon Wyatt, Project Manager Bowen Collins & Associates

Brandon Wyatt explained that the area they were looking at was the area of the IFA Subdivision on 900 West. In 1997-1998 the TSSD constructed a line that started at the treatment plant and went through this area up to Alpine and Highland. (See **ATTACHMENT 2** that included a memo and maps) At the time of the line's construction, the subdivision was envisioned but did not exist. The line has now reached its capacity due to a couple of flat spots in the line. The 24-inch line capacity was about 4 million gallons a day and it was seeing that flow.

Mr. Wyatt explained that 700 North Street was a very narrow corridor and was full of utilities. One of those was a 12-inch high-pressure gas line that Questar just recently laid. In looking at all of the constraints an alternative alignment was looked at through the IFA Subdivision. Discussions had been held with property owners and staff. Permits were ready to be submitted through the wetlands. The length was shorter. The pipe would be a 30-inch and a 36-inch PVC pipe and it would have a greater slope. There was the Ute Ladies'-Tresses, an Orchid Class Flower that was in the area and on the Endangered Species List.

Mayor Hadfield noted that those flowers had been marked with a white pipe in the wetlands area.

Mr. Wyatt reported that they had monitored those flowers for the past three years.

Councilman Shelton asked how far out the capacity was planned for.

Mr. Wyatt answered that it was to build-out.

Mayor Hadfield asked if IFA was going to allow it.

Mr. Wyatt responded that IFA was friendly to the project. Bio-Life's response has been positive. There would be a 30-foot easement. They hoped to be bidding the end of February with construction beginning in April and be done in October. There was another constraint and that was the June Sucker in the area of the wetlands and they could not do construction there until after the spawning period ended which was August 1. Permission would be needed from the City for construction on their open space property. They would jack and bore under the railroad tracks and State Street. He added that as they visited with Andy Spencer there was a segment of the City's pressurized irrigation line that was missing and they might be able to do some cooperative things to get that taken care of also.

Mayor Hadfield appreciated the time that had gone into planning this project.

Mr. Wyatt explained that they were on top of the access needs of the residents and the LDS Church house. Once the new line was installed they would turn the existing line over to the City since it had some homes directly connected.

Councilman Bowen asked about the formal easements.

Mayor Hadfield suggested that the easements would be on the February 10, 2015 City Council Agenda for action. He thanked Brandon Wyatt for his presentation.

Mayor Hadfield reported that a Resolution came from Utah League of Cities and Towns encouraging the State of Utah to address comprehensive transportation funding. It would be forwarded to our legislators, the Governor, and others. It talked about the current fuel tax. It talked about the possibility of a ¼ cent sales tax and trails and bike lanes. It would say to the State Elected Officials that American Fork City was interested in looking at other transportation options whether they were mass transit or alternative methods of transportation. Additional B & C Road Funds were needed to maintain what the City already had. With the Council's permission he would amend Tuesday's agenda for action on this item.

Councilman Bowen commented that basically it was asking the City endorse raising the gas tax.

Councilman Shelton noted that it said that the City supported studying transportation funding options. The idea there was studying versus supporting.

Councilman Bowen believed that later in there it talked about supporting an increase. He had not yet read it.

Mayor Hadfield reported that he had read it and there were multiple menus on how they could do it but the City supports studying the transportation options which would allow for a statewide implementation of a ¼ cent sales tax. It should be on a statewide basis or not at all.

Councilman Bowen was okay with not putting it on the agenda.

Councilmembers Shelton and Shorter felt to put it on and it could be discussed then.



Mayor Hadfield would place that on the next work session's agenda. He asked that Cathy Jensen and Craig Whitehead work on that.



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

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

Approximately 90 volunteer musicians practice 2 hours every Saturday at the American Fork Junior High to prepare for these outstanding concerts.



The Wasatch Winds symphonic band presented 4 concerts so far this year. These concert were: "In the Good Ole' Summertime" July 1, 2013, "Fall Sounds" October 21, 2013, Christmas Joy December 9, 2013, and President's Day Salute" February 17, 2014, Spring Concert, and Summer Concert. Approximately 75 volunteer musicians practice 2 hours every Thursday evening at the American Fork High School to prepare for these outstanding concerts.




The American Fork Children's Choir an Olympic Choir Camp and a Ukulele Camp, as well as presenting 2 concerts. These concerts were: "Christmas Presents" at the Christmas in the Rotunda celebration at the American Fork Library, "Lincoln and Liberty", "Frozen" and Summer Camps for Choir and Ukulele. 16 children attend weekly classes directed by M. Ryan Taylor. These are held every Monday at Historic City Hall. Ukulele classes are held Wednesday evenings at Historic City Hall. Both Ukulele and Children's Choir are tuition free.




The Timpanogos Chorale has presented 2 concerts so far this year. They are: "O Night Divine!" and performance at the Assembly Hall on Temple Square, Spring Concert and Summer Concert. 40 adult volunteer choir members rehearse at Historic City Hall every Thursday evening for 2 hours to prepare for their concerts. The choir will be performing at the Kennedy Center in Washington D.C. over Memorial Day Weekend. This tour was entirely funded by the choir members.



The Visual Arts Group sponsored art classes for all ages meeting every week and held in the Historic City Hall and the Arts Annex of the Rec Center. These classes focused on watercolors, drawing and painting, with subjects such as Animal Wildlife, Fantasy, En Plein Air, Elements of Scary and many more. Their annual children's art show was presented as Christmas in the Rotunda held at the American Fork Library. Also, the Visual Arts Group presented the annual Steel Days Art Show displayed in the American Fork Library funded by the Steel Days Committee. Every Tuesday from 10 a.m. to 2 p.m. Table Time is held at the Historic City Hall open to all who want to bring their own supplies and do artwork and socialize. A small fee is collected for each visit. The Edna Birk Memorial Scholarship is awarded to one American Fork High School Senior each year. This scholarship is funded by the Birk Family Foundation.



Dear Mayor Hadfield:

In our efforts to provide valuable and efficient service to the residents of American Fork City and other member entities of northern Utah County, Timpanogos Special Service District has identified a stretch of pipeline within the city limits of American Fork City that is in need of improvement. This section of line begins at the intersection of 900 West and 700 North and proceeds to the west and south, until it crosses State Road near the Discount Tire Store in The Meadows Commercial Center. (See attached "Figure 1 - Existing TSSD Sewer Line". This section of line has a flow capacity of 4 million gallons per day. It is now seeing flows in excess of that 4 million gallons per day on a regular basis. Our sewer master plan has shown that the flows in this section of line will continue to grow with development in the area until they reach a buildout demand of approximately 12 million gallons per day, 3 times the existing capacity.

The District has been working with City staff, property owners and utility companies in the area to identify the best manner in which to address this undersized line. Generally speaking, undersized lines are replaced in or near their existing location as the corridor has been established and space is available. However, as we have worked through the preliminary design process, we have found significant challenges to replacing this line in its current alignment.

The line was originally constructed as two projects in 1998 and 1999, prior to significant development in the area. Since that time, subdivisions have been developed around the line, bringing new improvements, utilities and residents to the area, all of which have encroached on the existing sewer. The line is now located in streets and corridors with extremely limited space for excavation and placement of a new sewer line. Examples of the challenges the existing alignment present include depths that now exceed 23 feet near the intersection of 700 North and 680 West, a new 12-inch high pressure gas main that has been installed within 5 feet of the existing sewer line along 700 North, other utilities, including the City's new pressurized irrigation lines that are installed in close proximity to the existing sewer and many homes have occupied the area immediately adjacent to the alignment.

These impacts led District and City staff to explore alternate alignments for the new sewer line that would allow the replacement line to be constructed with minimal impacts to existing City infrastructure including streets, waterlines, storm drains, etc. and most importantly, impacts to the local residents.

Through this collaborative effort a new alignment has been identified that takes advantage of the ongoing improvements taking place as part of the IFA Commercial Subdivision and greatly reduces the conflicts between the project and local residents. The proposed alignment is shown on the attached Figure 2 - "Proposed Sewer Alignment" map. This alignment proceeds south from the intersection of 900 West and 700 North, beneath the existing sidewalk, then moves east and south across the IFA Commercial Subdivision. The sewer line enters the public right-of-way again at 800 West, and proceeds along 800 West and 410 North until it can enter the City property dedicated as public open space between 410 North and State Road. It crosses the City property until it reaches the new State Road crossing at Meadow Lane.

In order to proceed along the proposed alignment, the District requests that the City grant a 30 foot wide sewer easement to the District along the proposed alignment as it crosses the city property dedicated as public open space north of State Road. We understand that the City must weigh any decision it makes based on what is best for the citizens it represents. This core responsibility aligns well with the goals we have sought to minimize the impacts of this project on the local residents. By granting the requested easements, the City will allow this project to take place in a way that will:

- 1) **Significantly reduce impacts and potential conflict with existing City streets and other infrastructure.** Under the proposed alignment, less than 700 feet of existing public streets will be impacted by this work. If the District were to attempt the replacement in the existing alignment more than 3,500 feet of streets and infrastructure could be impacted.
- 2) **Significantly reduce impacts to local residents.** Under the proposed alignment, only 7 homes would be directly impacted by the construction project. Following the existing pipeline route, this number could swell to as many as 41 homes. If indirect impacts such as route changes do to road closures are accounted for, that number could increase to 90 homes or more.
- 3) **Significantly reduce the time construction is in conflict with the community.** The proposed alignment is only within the public right-of-way serving the North Gate neighborhood for a short distance, on an obscure street. This area is easy to cordon off and isolate from the neighborhood, with minimal impacts to their daily comings and goings. The existing pipeline route is on a major entrance to the North Gate neighborhood and crosses the path between the neighborhood and its schools, churches and parks.
- 4) **Provide better sewer service to the City.** With the proposed alignment, a parallel sewer facility will be created allowing greater flexibility in the area for future maintenance of both the new and existing sewer line.
- 5) **Create opportunities for the City to meet other infrastructure needs at reduced costs.** City staff has discussed the need to extend pressurized irrigation service across State Road to service the Meadow Commercial Center and complete vital service loops in the City's system. City participation in the project may open opportunity for a major hurdle of this project to be overcome at significant cost savings to the City compared to trying to complete a crossing at State Road as its own project.

- 6) **Replace a section of existing, 24 inch reinforced concrete pipe sewer that crosses Mitchell Hollow with new, PVC sewer pipe.** Groundwater is high in this area and as such the potential for groundwater infiltration into the existing pipe is high. The new pipeline will have be a better material and have better joints for these conditions, potentially eliminating a source of infiltration into the sewer system.

In order to realize the benefits of the proposed alignment, the District requests the following actions from the City in support of the efforts of City Staff and the District in planning this project:

- 1) Grant a 30-foot wide sewer easement to TSSD across the open space property held by the City at the south end of the North Park Estates neighborhood. Draft easement documents are attached.
- 2) Grant a temporary construction easement on the remaining areas of the open space property for staging equipment and materials for the construction of the project. These temporary easements are also covered in the attached "Draft" easement documents.




