Council Member Christensen asked if the Planning Commission had any concerns. Duncan said that they realize they will need to look at the proposed site plan, but they had no concerns with the zone change.

**MOTION:** Council Member Lewis made a motion to approve Ordinance 14-B to approve the zoning map amendment to change the proposed residential portion of Parcel 02-037-0048 to R1/3, with the reversion clause that the zoning will revert back to "C" Commercial if a plat is not recorded within 12 months. Council Member Montgomery seconded the motion.

# ITEM 6: FINANCIAL, PUBLIC UTILITIES, AND TECHNOLOGY ISSUES A. FINANCIAL APPEAL SCOTT VINCENT, 260 WEST 2000 SOUTH RE: CULINARY WATER OVERAGE

Mayor Cronin reported that this financial appeal has to do with a homeowner that has a water leak, from the meter to the house. She explained that any leaks that are from the meter to the house are the homeowner's responsibility. She said that they know that they have a leak, but because it is winter and difficult to fix at this time, they are asking if the City can help with the water overages. Mayor Cronin said she talked with the Paul Nelson (Public Works Director) and asked what his thoughts are on this request and also went back and looked at precedents. She said that in the past, the City has credited the 1<sup>st</sup> month's overage fee. She said that Paul Nelson suggested maybe looking at a 50/50 split for the first 200,000 gallons of water, stating that anything over this amount should probably be fixed immediately. Council Member Christensen asked about the amount of the current overage. Mayor Cronin said the overage is 73,000 gallons so far. She said that splitting 200,000 gallons would equal a credit of around \$95. She explained that the Council has the discretion to address this how they see fit, but they want to be careful because this will set a precedent. Council Member Lewis stated that he did speak with Mr. Vincent on the phone. He said that he was very understanding and requested that he tell the Council that he would be grateful if they could help him, but if they could not, he would pay for all overages. Mayor Cronin stated that Mr. Vincent could be not be at the meeting due to other obligations. Duncan Murray advised that the fee for an overage is \$0.95 per 1,000 gallons. He said that 100,000 gallons would equal \$95. He said staff can only credit up to \$50 and the Council can approve up to \$100 without the person being present; anything over this amount would require the petitioner to be present. Mayor Cronin said that she wants to be fair without costing the City money. She said that Paul had indicated that assisting with a leak of 200,000 gallons or less should not be too impactful for the City. Council Member Montgomery asked if the 73,000 gallons of overage was per month or total. Mayor Cronin said total. Council Member Lewis said it seems like there is already a precedent. Council Member Christensen agreed that in the past they have credited the first month. He said there was a leak last winter that the City assisted with because the homeowner could not get to the leak during the winter month. Council Member Montgomery said that she was present at that meeting and that particular resident had done quite a bit to try and find the leak. Mayor Cronin said that issue had other mitigating facts that put that particular leak in its own class. She said this leak is more standard and we need to decide if we want to credit just the first month or do we want to make further accommodation considering it being during the winter months; this will set a precedent for similar leaks that occur in the winter, so that we have a standard to follow in the future. Council Member Lewis stated he likes the \$50 credit option, so that staff can address these issues and it doesn't require action by the Council. Mayor Cronin said that Paul's thought was that \$95.00 was fair, considering this is the winter months. Council Member Christensen said there is a benefit to the City if they wait, because exposing the line during the winter can cause further damage. He agreed that capping it at \$95.00 made sense.

**MOTION:** Council Member Montgomery made a motion authorizing the City to assist these utility customers with a water leak during winter months, by issuing a credit of 50%, up to a maximum of

\$95.00, of water overages. This action is due to the fact that the water overage is being caused by a water leak, which is difficult to repair during the winter months (once the ground thaws, the utility customer will be responsible to fix the water leak, and will be responsible for 100% of the overage fees until the repair is made). Council Member Christensen seconded the motion.

### **B. APPROVAL OF WARRANTS**

MOTION: Council Member Christensen made a motion to approve the warrants. Council Member Lewis seconded the motion.

ROLL CALL: Council Member Christensen, Yes Council Member Montgomery, Yes Council Member Gerlach, Yes Council Member Lewis, Yes

Motion Approved. 4 Yes, 0 No.

Mayor Cronin said there has been discussion on whether it would be permissible to allow some of the utility bills to be paid prior to Council review. Shanna Johnson explained that in the past the Rocky Mountain Power bill was split up between different uses (wells, streetlights, etc.); now it is combined and this causes the bill to be over the \$2,000 warrant threshold. She said she would like authorization to release this prior to warrant approval in an effort to keep timely payments. She said she would also like to see this be an option for bond payments that are on a set bond schedule, with a standard monthly fee. Council Member Christensen said this would be fine as long as there is not a 15% variance from the normal average billing rate. Duncan Murray advised that this would require an Ordinance. Mayor Cronin asked that an Ordinance be prepared and this be placed on the next Council agenda for action. [Note: the warrant and expenditure rules were previously approved by resolution, so a resolution will be prepared to make amendments.1

### C. MOTION TO APPROVE AN APPOINTMENT FOR CITY ATTORNEY

Mayor Cronin stated that she sent out a memo to all Council Members earlier in the week outlining the process used to make a recommendation of award for "Civil Legal Services". She said that Shanna Johnson and Council Member Lewis worked together with her on the selection committee. Mayor Cronin presented Malone Molgard of Molgard Law offices as her recommendation for appointment as City Attorney. Council Member Christensen asked Malone if his office was in Brigham City. Malone said yes. Council Member Lewis asked what information can be given to the public. Mayor Cronin suggested that the appointment be made first; then if the appointment is approved, more information can be shared, but if the appointment does not go forth, the City does not want to put out a lot of information. Duncan Murray clarified that this is a Mayoral appointment, which is approved by the Council.

**MOTION:** Council Member Lewis made a motion to approve the appointment of Malone Molgard of Molgard Law Office as City Attorney for Perry City. Council Member Gerlach seconded the motion.

Malone Molgard reviewed his experience, stating that he is a partner of Molgard Law Office with his Uncle Jack Molgard. He said that Jack Molgard has been an attorney in Brigham City for 44 Years and Malone became a partner about 5 years ago. He said that he worked for Jack before this as an intern for a few years. Malone stated that his Uncle Jack Molgard has been the City Attorney for Honeyville since 1974 and Malone has worked with him to service Honeyville, so he has experience working with a municipality. He said he was born and raised in Brigham City, and he left for a few years while on a LDS

### PERRY CITY ORDINANCE NO. 15-C

### ADOPTION OF THE MUNICIPAL CODE

AN ORDINANCE OF PERRY CITY, UTAH, ADOPTING THE PERRY MUNICIPAL CODE; MAKING TECHNICAL CHANGES; SEVERABILITY; AND PROVIDING AN EFFECTIVE DATE.

**WHEREAS,** Perry City (hereafter "City") is a municipal corporation, duly organized and existing under the laws of the State of Utah;

**WHEREAS**, *Utah Code Annotated* §§10-8-84 and 10-8-60, 1953, as amended, allows the City to exercise certain police powers and nuisance abatement powers, including but not limited to providing for safety and preservation of health, promotion of prosperity, improve community well-being, peace and good order for the inhabitants of the City;

**WHEREAS,** in accordance with *Utah Code Annotated* §10-3-707, 1953, the City is "empowered to revise, codify and compile from time to time and to publish in book, pamphlet or looseleaf form all ordinances of the municipality of a general and permanent character and to make such changes, alterations, modifications, additions, and substitutions therein as it may deem best to the end that a complete simplified code of the ordinances then enforced shall be presented, but with errors, inconsistencies, repetitions, and ambiguities therein eliminated."

**WHEREAS,** the City retained the services of Municipal Code Online, Inc., to provided initial codification services and ongoing online support for the *Perry Municipal Code*;

**WHEREAS,** after publication of the required notice the Planning Commission held its public hearing on February 12, 2015, to take public comment on this proposed Ordinance, after which the Planning Commission gave its recommendation to approve this Ordinance;

**WHEREAS**, the City Council received the recommendation from the Planning Commission and held its public meeting on March 5, 2015;

**WHEREAS**, the City desires to adopt the *Perry Municipal Code* along with the applicable maps and attachments provided herein;

**NOW, THEREFORE,** be it ordained by the City Council of Perry City, Utah, as follows:

- **Section 1: Repealer.** All Ordinances of Perry City, Utah, prior to the date of this Ordinance are hereby repealed, subsumed, and replaced with the *Perry Municipal Code* adopted herein.
- **Section 2:** Adoption. The *Perry Municipal Code* attached hereto as Exhibit "A" along with and including all City Maps and other attached documents is hereby adopted in its entirety as provided in Exhibit "A" and incorporated herein by this reference.

## **Ordinance 15-D**

# An Ordinance Amending Street Name Sign Requirements, and Approval Procedures.

AN ORDINANCE OF PERRY CITY, AMENDING SECTION 10.03. OF THE PERRY MUNICIPAL CODE, WHICH IS ENTITLED "STREET NAMES"; AND PROVIDING AN EFFECTIVE DATE.

**WHEREAS,** Perry City (hereafter sometimes referred to as "City" or "municipality") is a municipal corporation duly incorporated and existing under the laws of Utah; and Title 10, Chapter 9a of the *Utah Code Annotated*, 1953, as amended, authorizes the City to regulate land use and development; and *Utah Code Annotated* §10-8-84 authorizes the City to provide for safety, preserve health, promote prosperity, peace, and good order; and

**WHEREAS,** the City Council agrees there is a need to standardize the Street Name Signs in Perry City; and

**NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED** by the City Council of the City of Perry, Utah, as follows:

**Section 1. Amendment.** *Section 10.03.* of the *Perry City Municipal Code* is amended to read as follows:

### **10.03.010. Street Names**

Unless not deemed to be practicable by the City Council, all City Streets shall have "numbered names," but the City Council may designate a secondary "non-numbered name" for any given street, either on its own motion, or after having received a petition for consideration from a citizen with signatures of all property owners on the street.

### 10.03.020. Street Name Signs

For the benefit of emergency services, all Perry City Street name signs shall contain "numbered names." If a street in Perry City also has a "non-numbered name" then the street name sign may contain both the "numbered name" and the "non-numbered name" with the "numbered name" being on top and larger in size. The Perry City Council may in its discretion and upon its own motion, or after having received a petition for consideration from a citizen with signatures of all property owners on the street, may allow for variances of the requirements set forth herein.

### 10.03.030 City Council Directing Traffic Engineer To Study Special Traffic Control Devices

The City Council, either on its own motion, or after having received a petition for consideration, may direct the Traffic Engineer to study certain traffic control devices and to provide options for the City Council to consider.

### 10.03.040 Legislative And Financial Responsibility

The City Council may periodically update the ordinances regarding vehicles and traffic in the best interest of the public welfare, and shall fund the placement and maintenance of traffic control devices.

## **Resolution 15-1**

A Perry City Resolution Approving the Fee For The Keeping of Residential Chickens.

**WHEREAS,** Perry City (hereafter sometimes referred to as "City" or "municipality") is a municipal corporation duly incorporated and existing under the laws of Utah; and Title 10, Chapter 9a of the *Utah Code Annotated*, 1953, as amended, authorizes the City to regulate land use and development; and *Utah Code Annotated* §10-8-84 authorizes the City to provide for safety, preserve health, promote prosperity, peace, and good order.

**WHEREAS**, the City having adopted an Ordinance allowing the keeping of chickens in residential zones of the City and said ordinance requiring the City Council to set the permit fee for keeping of residential chickens by resolution; and

NOW THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF PERRY AS FOLLOWS:

### Section 1. <u>Permit Fee.</u>

The annual permit fee for the keeping of chickens in residential zones of the City shall be \$8.00. The permit shall be obtained and the fee paid on or before April 30, 2015, and yearly thereafter, for citizens to be in compliance with the Perry City Municipal Code. Citizens with chickens being kept in residential zones of the City who have not obtained a permit on or before April 30, 2015, and yearly thereafter, shall be in violation of ordinance 9.12 of the Perry City Municipal Code and subject to the penalties of 9.12.020.

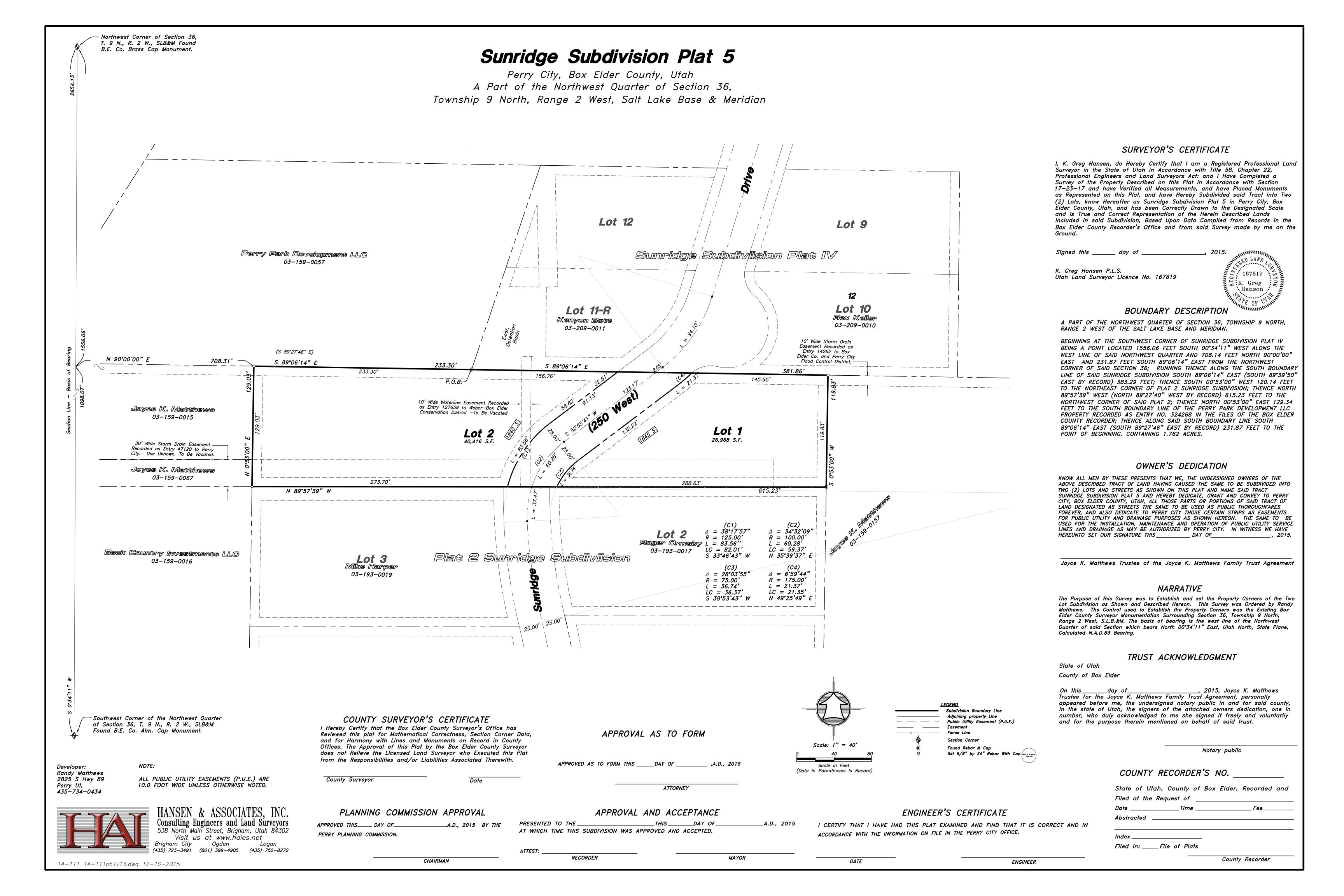

## Ordinance 15-

# An Ordinance Amending Section 40.05 Penalties for Violations of Land Use Ordinances.

# A LAND USE ORDINANCE OF PERRY CITY, AMENDING SECTION 40.05, PENALTIES; SEVERABILITY; AND PROVIDING AN EFFECTIVE DATE.

**WHEREAS,** Perry City (hereafter sometimes referred to as "City" or "municipality") is a municipal corporation duly incorporated and existing under the laws of Utah; and Title 10, Chapter 9a of the *Utah Code Annotated*, 1953, as amended, authorizes the City to regulate land use and development; and *Utah Code Annotated* §10-8-84 authorizes the City to provide for safety, preserve health, promote prosperity, peace, and good order, including the adoption of Excavation Fees; and

**WHEREAS**, the City Council has previously adopted the 2008, 2010, and 2015 Perry Municipal Codes, which include land use ordinances; and

**WHEREAS**, the City Council in order to improve the ability of the City to enforce the ordinances contained in the Perry Municipal Code; and

**NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED** by the City Council of the City of Perry, Utah, as follows:

**Section 1. Enactment.** *Title 15, Chapter 01. Section 040* of the *Perry City Municipal Code* is amended to read as follows:

### 15.01.040. ENFORCEMENT AND PENALTIES

15.01.040.1. Applicability

15.01.040.2. Criminal Penalties.

15.01.040.3. Land Use Penalties.

15.01.040.4. Injunctive and Other Civil Relief.

15.01.040.5. Civil Penalties

### 15.01.040.1. Applicability.

Penalties described in this Chapter shall be applicable for any violation of Titles 40 through 79, the Perry City Land Use Ordinances or Land Use Ordinances and Resolutions.

### 15.01.040.2. Criminal Penalties.

Any person, group, firm or corporation, whether a principal, agent, employee or otherwise, violating, causing, or permitting violations of the provisions of Titles 40 through 79, the Perry City Land Use Ordinances or Land Use Ordinances and Resolutions shall be guilty of misdemeanor Class B, unless otherwise identified. Such person, group, firm or organization shall be deemed to

be guilty of a separate offense of each day during which any portion of any violation of this chapter is permitted or continued by such person, group, firm or corporation.

### **15.01.040.3.** Land Use Penalties.

A Land Use Authority or Appeal Authority may, if allowed by law, delay or refuse to act on a land use application until action required regarding a prior land use application is completed or may use any other remedies allowed by land use law.

### 15.01.040.4. Injunctive and Other Civil Relief.

Perry City may by action of the Governing Body also institute injunction, mandamus, abatement or any other appropriate action or actions, proceeding or proceedings to prevent, enjoin, abate or remove such unlawful erection, construction, reconstruction, alteration, or maintenance or use.

### 15.01.040.5.

Perry City may in place of or in addition to criminal penalties, land use penalties, and injunctive and other civil relief cite any person in violation of Perry City Land Use Ordinances or Land Use Ordinances and Resolutions with a civil penalty. The civil penalty for a violation shall be Fifty Dollars for the first violation and up to One Thousand Dollars (\$1000.00) for subsequent violations pursuant to Utah Code Ann. 10-3-703. After the first citation is given, each day that the violation remains will be a separate violation. The process to assess a civil penalty is as follows:

- a. Verbal warning or written warning is given to the person and or landowner in violation of Perry City Land Use Ordinances or Land Use Ordinances and Resolutions. Written warnings shall be mailed by USPS certified mail return receipt requested.
- b. A citation is given to the person and or land owner in violation and the citation shall include the ordinance being violated and give warning that each day the violation continues will constitute an additional violation.
- c. Perry City may file for recording with the office of County Recorder a Notice of Non-compliance on the property where the violation occurred and may seek a judgment in for the penalty and costs of recovery and if a judgment is obtained may place a judgment lien upon the property where the violation occurred.
- **Section 2: Severability**. If a court of competent jurisdiction determines that any part of this ordinance is unconstitutional or invalid, then such portion of the ordinance, or specific application of the ordinance, shall be severed from the remainder, which remainder shall continue in full force and effect.
- **Section 3: Effective date.** This Ordinance takes effect immediately after approval and posting.

### ITEM 1: CALL TO ORDER AND OPENING CEREMONIES

Mayor Cronin called the meeting to order.

### ITEM 2: DISCUSS CDBG GRANT PROJECT

Mayor Cronin stated that potential projects were discussed in the last meeting. She said since then Council Member Christensen has visited the project sites and she has worked with Brett to break down the area into 4 possible projects. She said that she prepared a table including details of the each project and sent this to the Council. She advised that the purpose of the meeting tonight is to decide which project will be used to apply for CDBG funding. Mayor Cronin said that Shanna Johnson has been working on the grant application and needs only to place the specific project data into the application to complete this. She reviewed the table below:

If Option 1 or 2 is selected, it is still recommeded that the budget for next year include monies to do the land acquisition needed to do the 900 West north phase

Mayor Cronin explained that option 1 includes the area just shy of Linda Way heading east on 2700 South to just shy of Highway 89.

Mayor Cronin reported that she asked the department heads which project they would like to see completed. She advised that Option 1 was the project the Public Works Director, Paul Nelson was in support of, as this fits well within the street budget, and would allow for some other street maintenance projects to be completed. She said that this is also the project

area that is traveled the most and turned some time over to Police Chief, Dale Weese regarding this. Chief Weese said in his opinion anything that can be done on 2700 South to improve the safety for the school children is a positive thing. He said that the Option 1 project would be his first choice.

Mayor Cronin explained that Option 2 includes the area going South from where the previous grant funded improvements stopped to 2700 South. She said that this includes the most linear feet. She said that the City has already received the grievance from Rocky Mountain Power to move the power poles and no land would need to be acquired in order to complete the project. She stated that this project may enhance the grant proposal as it includes not only street improvements, but also a water line upgrade. She said that per Brian Carver with BRAG (Bear River Association of Government) who is over the CDBG application process, this because this project includes multiple improvements, it would receive higher scoring than other projects. She said that this option was Paul Nelson's second choice.

Mayor Cronin reviewed the 3<sup>rd</sup> option including improvements on 900 West part way north to 2325 South. She said that this included 450 linear feet, costing \$355.56 per linear foot. She advised that this would require some coordination with Rocky Mountain Power to get power poles/lines moved.

Mayor Cronin said the 4<sup>th</sup> option would include improvements along 900 West north to 2250 South. This would cover 1300 linear feet with a budget cost to the City of \$400,000. She said the pro would be to get the bottleneck in the area fixed, but the con would be that it would have a huge impact on budget. She said that the Public Works Director, Paul Nelson, would rather not give up that much money on this project as it takes away from other street projects throughout the city.

Mayor Cronin said that the staff prefers project option 1 and as a second choice Paul Nelson recommends option 2.

Council Member Christensen and Council Member Gerlach expressed interest in option 3. Council Member Gerlach said that he has heard a lot from citizens regarding improvements in this area. Council Member Christensen said there is a new house that was just recently constructed in the area and there are two more houses further north that were built in the last 7 years. He said that he gets a lot of calls from residents in this area.

Council Member Montgomery stated that she would like to pursue the improvements along 2700 South for a couple of reasons. Normally the school buses travel along this road and many parents drop children off on this street for school. She said there is no place for the children to walk as there are no sidewalks. She said that originally when she thought that this began only at 900 West she was not interested in the project, but when she discovered that the project covered the area from just west of 900 West and East nearly to the highway it became more appealing. She said she prefers option 1 due to the safety aspect of the project. She said she is also intrigued with option 3 to address the traffic problems in the area. She also looked at option 2 as it paired with the waterline project already needed in the area. Because option 1 would finish improvements along 2700 South entirely this project made a lot of sense to her. She asked if any water or sewer work would be needed in the area and if there would be any needed land acquisition. Mayor Cronin said when she talked with the Engineer and Paul Nelson they were not aware of any water or sewer improvements needed, and there would not be any land acquisition in the area.

The Mayor and Council reviewed the map showing the 900 West and 2700 South areas and all possible projects.

Council Member Christensen asked if project option 1 (along 2700 South) would include lining up the sidewalk along 2700 South going east to the highway and if there was any land acquisition that would be needed in order to do this. Mayor Cronin said that when she talked with Brett Jones (City Engineer), he did not think there was any land acquisition needed. She said that when she talked with Paul Nelson he was confident that he could budget enough money to take the improvements all the way to the highway.

Council Member Montgomery clarified that the power pole work needed in option 2 has already been negotiated with Rocky Mountain Power. Mayor Cronin confirmed this to be true.

 Council Member Christensen advised as a side note that when he and Brett Jones toured project 2 site area. It was an ideal area for a neighborhood grocer to come in. He said it was a nice flat area and was right along Highway 89. He said this is something for the City to consider when looking at economic development.

Mayor Cronin said that the city has been getting calls from a business that would like to come in and buy the old Moore's restaurant. There is more potential for economic development in the option 2 project area.

Mayor Cronin reported that the county collects \$7.00 from everyone's vehicle registration and they place it in a corridor preservation fund. She said there is currently \$3,000,000 in the fund to be used in the Box Elder County area. She said that we could make application for funding to help with land acquisition in the north phases of the project area. She the funding will be available for application in the April and May timeframe. Council Member Christensen asked if there was a set limit of which can be applied for. Mayor Cronin said no that they evaluate the applications based on priority within the County. She stated another project that we could apply for would be the South end of 1200 West, there is some land acquisition needed in this area in order to connect the street with Willard City. She said that this would create a secondary road that could be used if there was a grid lock on Highway 89. Council Member Christensen asked when the funds would be awarded. The Mayor was unsure of the award date. She said the city could also put aside money each year to complete project options 3 and 4.

Mayor Cronin stated that although the number of residents living in the area of project 1 may not be as high as in 3 and 4, project 1 would have the most usage (vehicle travel) and it would also be a great safety feature. She said project option 2 there may be a few more award points may be given as it covers 3 of the CDBG project activities opposed to the others only covering 2. Shanna Johnson said that another thing that will give a project application more points is the matching dollars provided by the City. She said the more the city contributes the higher the point value. Council Member Montgomery asked if the relocation of power poles would be counted as a CDBG project activity and gives an application more points. The Mayor and Shanna said that this would not qualify for points.

Mayor Cronin said that as a City we should look at safety first. She opened the meeting for any comments from the public. No comments were received. Mayor Cronin asked for any additional comments from the Council. No comments were made.

15	A. PUBLIC SAFETY FACILITIES PLAN AND IMPACT FEE ANALYSIS			
16 17 18 19 20 21 22 23 24 25 26 27	Mayor Cronin announced that the City had a study of the Public Safety Facilities Plan and Impact Fees. She turned some time over to Jeanette Harris for her presentation on this analysis. Jeanette Harris, an analyst from Zions Bank Public Finance, stressed that her company was not recommending that Perry City adopt any particular impact fee. Her objective was to convey the maximum amount that the City can charge for public safety fees, both residential and non-residential. The level of service is important to define. One residential unit means one dwelling. A nonresidential building is measured by the square foot. Jeanette discussed 2 different categories of fire service: the type of service provided and the total number of calls. Calls for fire were 87% for residential and 13% for nonresidential. The calls are classified as calls per square foot and calls per unit. This analysis measured how the City will be able to maintain the current level of service for fire and police coverage in Perry.			
28 29 30 31 32 33 34	Council Member Christensen inquired if the service provided to commercial was more expensive. Jeanette wanted to answer that question later in her presentation. She explained that if the City does not construct a new fire and police training facility in Perry, the level of service will decline for both residential and nonresidential over time. Perry City is proposing a 12,000 square foot training building with total costs of \$243,505.00 to keep the level of service constant with future growth and development. Jeanette described the proportional share of the building to be used by the fire department and percentage of the building to be used by the police department as 50/50. She also projected costs to each			

department over the next 6 years for their share of the building. The fee of the study was

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- also included in her projected costs. Jeanette took into account the \$25,000 Perry City
- 2 already provided for a training building which is split between fire and police. Jeanette
- 3 said that her Geographic Information Systems (GIS) person based the growth rate
- 4 historically over the last 5-10 years. Zoning in the City, Projects, and Future Plans were
- 5 also factors. Based on these factors the maximum proposed Impact Fee for Public Safety
- 6 (Police and Fire combined) is \$243.22. She advised that the projections of growth were
- 7 conservative and costs attributable to current deficiencies are not included in the fee, just
- 8 the current level of service.

### B. CULINARY WATER CAPITAL FACILITIES PLAN AND IMPACT FEE ANALYSIS

- Dean Ayala, an engineer with Jones and Associates, presented the analysis of the Culinary
- Water Capital Facilities Plan and Impact Fees. Dean clarified that the E.R.U., equivalent
- residential unit is 810 gallons per day. This is based on summer peak production. The
- estimates could be much smaller than that because this is looking at peak day maximum
- requirements. When the report looked at culinary water needs, it shows Perry City is at
- 15 19% of built out. The State of Utah requires the study show peak day demand and also the
- average year demand. Source of capacity determines what our springs and wells are
- capable of. When we reach full capacity, Perry needs to obtain more water resources.
- Dean reported that the study of water rights looks at how much volume is used and the
- current water required. Perry City has excess capacity at this time. The City would have to
- 20 double or triple in size before additional water sources would be required. Dean
- 21 recommended the City continues to pursue additional water rights in the event the State
- limits the amount of water Perry can pull out of the ground. Council Member Christensen
- 23 questioned whether Perry City is in the same water basin as Proctor and Gamble and
- 24 Brigham City. Dean said he believes that all three are in the same water basin. The water
- basin is defined by topography, not city or county boundaries. When it is a dry winter, the
- 26 State becomes more conservative. Mayor Cronin inquired if that situation would affect our
- secondary water supply. Dean said that it affects our culinary water, not secondary water.
- Dean reported on water storage. The size of water storage is classified by storage volume,
- 29 fire suppression, and emergency storage. According to the State, Perry City has enough
- water storage until the City doubles in size. He presented a plat map showing the locations
- of City owned wells and springs. Dean displayed likely projects for the 30 year plan, which
- 32 includes additional distribution, and may require securing additional ground, and possible
- 33 preliminary engineering.
- Jeanette Harris presented the Impact Fee and Analysis for Culinary Water. She stressed
- 35 that the numbers shown in the Public Safety report were households, not Equivalent
- Residential Units (E.R.U.'s). E.R.U.'s are not used for public safety. She explained that this
- 37 study included the typical impact of one single family residential unit, which is defined as
- 38 810 gallons per day. She advised the level of service is determined by the Utah State
- 39 Division of Drinking Water for minimum size of water pressure. The report accounts for
- 40 costs attributable to maintain the current level of service with projected growth over 6-10
- 41 years, not costs attributable to deficiencies. The analysis for culinary water has 3 divisions:

water supply, water storage, and water distribution. This study examines the cost of each 1 category. Water storage has excess capacity at this time. There are 2 components of water 2 storage: fire storage and indoor use. The distribution has excess capacity for Perry 3 through 2017-2018 before it starts to decline. Jeanette reported on the costs of the same 4 possible projects Dean discussed for the next 7-10 years. Mayor Cronin summarized that 5 Perry has a good supply of water and can work to improve the City's water distribution. 6 Jeanette advised that the maximum impact fee for culinary water is based on the meter size 7 and begins at \$2,760 for a 3/4 inch (0.75) meter, but increases for larger sized meters, and 8 9 graduates as a current bond for culinary water is retired. The fee will be \$2,877 for a 3/4 inch meter by the year 2020. See table below for full fee details: 10

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Mayor Cronin reported that favorable applications for grant funds are projects that build on each other. One suggested application that fits that model is the improvements on the Three Mile Creek Shooting Range Training Building.
