### **Request for Donation of Classroom Space**

Recently, the Pioneer Adult Rehabilitation Center (PARC) of Clearfield was awarded a national grant from Lululemon Athletica, an international fitness apparel company. This grant is a part of Lululemon's "Here To Be" community benefit philosophy and is intended to increase awareness of the myriad of benefits, both physical and mental, of a regular exercise program.

PARC has chosen to use a portion of the grant monies to fund a weekly yoga and meditation class. The two instructors with whom we have worked thus far are certified and lead classes regularly at 'Root To Rise', a fitness studio at Station Park in Farmington. The popularity of these classes has continued to increase over the last three months and our facility is no longer large enough to accommodate the participants that wish to be a part of the classes.

As PARC has already been associated with the Clearfield Aquatic and Fitness Center through the purchase of memberships for employees and clients alike, it was decided that PARC would request the donation of classroom space twice a month to hold an integrated yoga class that would invite any interested members of the community to come and participate in a free yoga class with our clients with disabilities.

In approaching the Facility Director, Donna Russell, PARC learned that this type of donation would require authorization by the City Council before discussions about which dates and times would work best for the Aquatic and Fitness Center to ensure that the request did not interrupt fitness classes that are scheduled to take place at the facility.

We, at PARC, would like to request the donation of classroom space to be used twice each month on days and times that would not interfere with any other regularly scheduled classes at the facility. At these events, we would verbally recognize Clearfield City as a major sponsor of each class as well as recognize the Clearfield City in a pamphlet that will be distributed at the classes as well.

## Beekeeping Discussion: Council Work Session 9/13/2016

### **History/context:**

- Concerns for the ability to have bees on residential lots with in Clearfield City were brought to the attention of the council in June of 2016. Council directed staff to work stake holders to propose a suitable regulation for beekeeping with in the City.

### **Planning Commission:**

- Staff presented a proposed ordinance for Beekeeping at the Planning commission meeting on Wednesday, September 7, 2016.
  - **Public comment/concerns:**
    - Staff proposed that hive be kept only in the rear yard. Public expressed concerns with limiting hives to a rear yard and requested consideration for allowing them in the side and rear yard, but not in a front yard.
    - Staff proposed that the information included on the hive be as follows:
      - *“Each hive shall be conspicuously marked with the owner's name, address, telephone number, and state registration number.”*
    - Concerns about the amount of information required on each hive were voiced by the public; they stated that this requirement was more than is necessary and all that should be required is the registration # required by the State.
  - **Commission discussion**
    - Realized that each lot in the city is different and decided that it did not matter if the hive is in the side or rear year, but that the yard must be fenced.
    - They also agreed that hives should not be placed in a front yard.
      - The commission felt like a fenced yard was appropriate for the protection of the neighborhood and the bees themselves.
    - Commission decided that more information on the hives is better than less, and that it was not an imposition to require this information.
- **Key points:**
  - Location of hives (rear and side)
    - Salt Lake City allows for hives in the side and rear yard. (8.10.030)
    - Layton city requires hives to be in the back or rear yard. (19.06.080)
    - Syracuse requires a conditional use review for any hives on a residential lot. The City does not have a restriction on the location of hives on the lot (side vs. rear), but it does require the hive to be at least 25 feet from a property line. (10.30.100)
    - West Point City does not allow hives in any front or side yard. (17.40.050)
  - Registration information;
    - Salt Lake City requires hive to have all of the information listed on the hives. (8.10.050)
    - Layton City requires registration with the State. (19.06.080)
    - Syracuse does not have a state requirement.
    - West Point City requires registration with the State of Utah.(17.40.050)
- **Planning Commission recommendation:**
  - **Hive may be maintained in any fenced yard, but not in a front yard.**
  - **Registration requirement: more is better than less and it is ok to ask for information as proposed.**

It should be noted that having that information on the side of the hive benefits the beekeeper. It allows neighbors to quickly get in touch with the beekeeper should something happen that could endanger the colony.

The registration number is issued to verify that the beekeeper has a current license with the state. The number corresponds to the beekeeper and their contact information, as well as any other records we have on them. For the purpose of enforcement the beekeepers contact information on the box will allow you to quickly gather that information without needing to go through us. Having this information is especially important when the lot the hives are on does not have a clear owner or when a beekeeper has hives on a property that they do not own.
