# Population-Based Surveillance of Birth Defects and Data Utilization for Public Health Action - Amy Nance

- This is a continuation application; 3<sup>rd</sup> of a 4 year cycle. No big changes are anticipated for this year.
- The purpose of this funding opportunity is to enhance state birth defect surveillance programs and to use data for public health action.
- The Utah Birth Defect Network (UBDN) is a statewide, population based surveillance system that has identified major structural birth defects in children born in Utah since 1994.
- Grant Activities:
  - Outcome 1: Quality surveillance data will be available for all major birth defects in a timely manner.
  - Outcome 2: Implement key public health prevention and intervention strategies to disseminate information to at-risk populations.
  - Outcome 3: Increase the number of families who are notified of available services for birth defects in Utah.
  - Outcome 4: Enhance the newborn screening surveillance for critical congenital heart defects (CCHD).
- The 2<sup>nd</sup> outcome will most likely have an impact on the Local Health Departments.
- There has not been any word from CDC that this grant won't continue for years to come.

## **Grant Remains Exempt: No Vote Needed**

### State Systems Development Initiative (SSDI) - Shaheen Hossain

- This is a new funding opportunity from HRSA, but is a continuation from a previous grant. The grant cycle has increased from 3 to 5 years. The funding amount is up to \$100,000.
- The purpose of this grant is to develop and expand State Title V Maternal Child Health data capacity to allow for informed decision making and resource allocation that supports effective, efficient and quality programming for women, infants, children and youth, including children with special healthcare needs.

- The Data Resource program offers data support to the Maternal Child Health Program, Special Health Care Needs program, along with the Bureau of Child Development.
- Proposing three goals for this funding opportunity:
  - o Focus on the efforts of the Title V MCH Block Grant activities.
  - o Enhance data linkage capacity in the Maternal Child Health Bureau and UDOH.
  - Program evaluation studies with the performance measures; addressing two national performance measures. These performance measures are dental visits during pregnancy, and the second one is preterm birth.
- Budget:
  - Fund one full time Epidemiologist \$82,000.
  - 10% to indirect cost.
  - o The remaining budget goes to equipment, computers, DTS, building costs. Etc.
- Currently there is no funding for the Local Health Departments.
- The data they will be collecting and analyzing will be offered to the Local Health Departments.

PPHF 2016 Epidemiology and Laboratory Capacity for Infectious Diseases (ELC) – Building and Strengthening Epidemiology, Laboratory and Health Information Systems Capacity in State and Local Health Departments Financed in Part by PPHF – Jerry Nelson & Melissa Dimond

- This grant has previously been approved by Governance. Returning for a budget review/update. This is a continuation grant; 4<sup>th</sup> of a 5 year cycle. The total awarded amount is \$3,741,862.
- The ELC Program started out providing limited funding to a small number of states; the program has since grown to become of the CDC's key nationwide cooperative agreements for supporting capacity for:
  - Cross-cutting and flexible epidemiology, laboratory and health information systems capacity addressing infectious diseases.
  - o Infectious disease-area specific activities (e.g., foodborne diseases, influenza, antimicrobial resistance, etc.).
- The purpose of the ELC grant is to support vital epidemiologic capacity through small, but essential, project areas. Funding provides support for staff at the Utah Department of Health, specifically within the Disease Response, Evaluation, Analysis, and Monitoring (DREAM) Program, as well as contractual, training, and/or supplies support for Local Health Department (LHD) partners in eight different areas including:
  - Cross-cutting epidemiologic capacity
  - Enteric disease outbreak investigation and response
  - Evaluation
  - West Nile virus and other arboviral diseases
  - o Influenza surveillance
  - o Prion disease surveillance
  - Mycotics i.e., coccidioidomycosis
  - Vaccine preventable disease surveillance.
- Funding in these areas provides for coordination of activities on an ongoing bases, as well as capacity to respond to outbreaks as needed.
- Funding is broken out into these major areas:
  - Epidemiology Capacity \$1,099,164
  - Laboratory Capacity \$847,774
  - Health Information Systems Capacity \$721,035
  - o Contracts \$423,821
  - Local Health Departments \$204,437

 MDRO funding went to: Bear River, Davis, Salt Lake, and Weber-Morgan. Southwest to receive all the funding for Mycotics.
