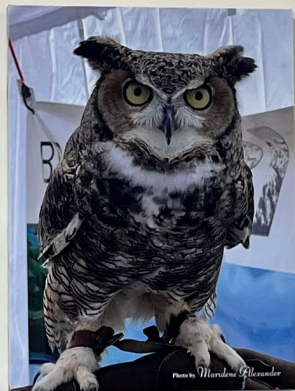

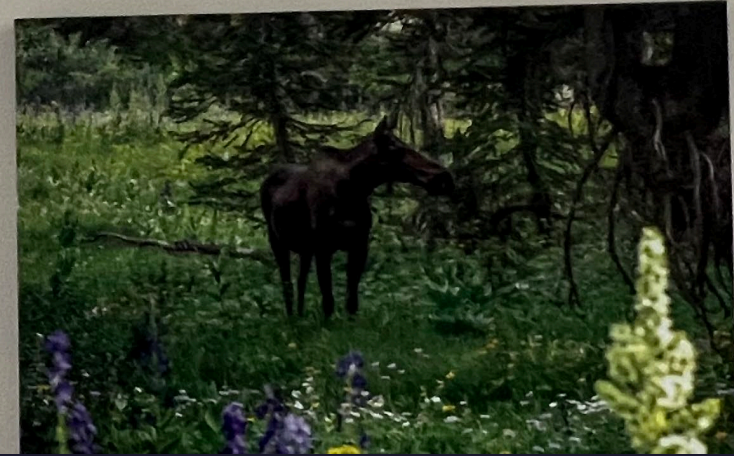

MAYOR'S MESSAGE

Dear Brighton Residents,

The Town of Brighton is surrounded by a beautiful and historic woodland forest. That's why Wildlife Prevention is a priority concern for our Town. We are not powerless in our defense against wildfire. By being proactive and participating in our fuel reduction programs, we can significantly increase our own safety, our community's safety, and the safety of this treasured watershed forest. Thanks to the 107 families who signed up for Chipper Days this year to maintain Defensible Space in the face of wildfire.

When Brighton incorporated, the Town Council decided to add another wildfire program called the Fuel Reduction Project. We contracted with Utah Forests Fire and State Lands (UFFSL) and Unified Fire Authority (UFA) to spend \$20,000 each year for five years (that's \$100,000). As part of the Project, UFA wildfire crews talk with homeowners about the importance of Defensible Space, and then spend two hours helping the homeowner take out ladder fuels, hazard trees, and brush around the home. At the next Town Council meeting, that amount will probably double to \$40,000/year.

Brighton is required to have a Community Wildfire Prevention Plan (CWPP) that indicates risk factors. Check it out at <https://bit.ly/3P8b8nq>. It shows the current risk situation:

- Low Wildfire Risk along the Road Corridor is due to the presence of wetlands and low altitude.
- Moderate Wildfire Risk in the Upper Canyon is due to the glacial-cut wide areas interspersed with wetlands.
- High Risk in the River-cut Lower Canyon area is due to steep slopes, and fire management challenges in federal Wilderness areas.
- There have been 10 wildfires in Big Cottonwood Canyon since 2018. They were small due to quick



own wildfire risk assessment: Utah Wildfire Risk Assessment Portal <https://bit.ly/4Sw6h9c>.

Wildfire mitigation remains a priority for this mountain town. We are lucky that the US Forest Service also supports this effort on public lands, where a push to reduce ground fuels will begin in summer 2024. Most residents already participate in Chipper Days and the Fuels Reduction Project. We deeply appreciate the hard work being done by the wildfire teams at UFFSL, UFA, and the US Forest Service.



UDOT OPTS FOR GONDOLA IN LITTLE COTTONWOOD CANYON

UDOT has identified the Gondola as the preferred alternative to improve transportation in Little Cottonwood Canyon. The first phase, especially, will impact Big Cottonwood Canyon. The project will be implemented in three phases: The First Phase includes increased bus service in both Big and Little Cottonwood Canyons beginning in the late fall of 2024. Remote digital toll gates will be installed at the lower Solitude and Snowbird entries. The tolling rules and prices are TBD. Also, construction will begin on a parking structure at the Big Cottonwood Park 'n' Ride. The Second

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Phase includes the widening of Wasatch Blvd, and avalanche sheds in Little Cottonwood. The Third Phase is the Gondola installation itself plus a base station with 2,500 parking spaces near the La Caille Restaurant. Only the First Phase is funded so far.

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MAYOR'S MESSAGE

The Greater Salt Lake Municipal Services District (MSD) serves 85,877 residents residing in five metro townships, one town and unincorporated Salt Lake County.

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To my Emigration Canyon Family,

Spring Flooding. We ended up having a beautiful, green summer after we made it through the spring flooding. Thank you again to all the volunteers who helped during sandbagging, flooding, and cleaning up excess sand bags. We are a tough community, and we help each other during these stressful times in our lives.

As a result of the flooding, we are trying to work on replacing the culverts on Sky Crest and Cederloft Lane. We are hoping FEMA will fund the construction projects, but we don't have any answers on that yet. Temporary work will begin soon to get us through the winter.

Legislative Update House Bill 374. Many of you are aware, House Bill 374 passed in the last legislative session and it has forced us to decide how we will receive law enforcement services going forward. We are currently looking at a restructuring of the police services for Emigration Canyon. We are in the early stages of planning what will be the new type of organization that will police the canyon. We are deciding between a new Unified Police Department 2.0 model or the Salt Lake County Sheriff's Department Canyon Patrol. The bill gives us until July 2025 for this to happen. We expect more legislation on this subject in the coming year. Once we have more information, we will present it to our residents.

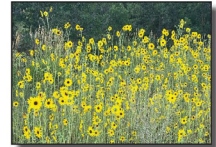
Township to City. The legislature has indicated a preference that metro townships should become cities and towns now that there are few remaining differences between them. The existing townships, such as Emigration Canyon, already perform in every way as a city. The only key differences are metro townships do not impose property taxes directly, but they impose property taxes through the special district. Also, the mayors in metro

townships are not elected directly, they are selected from the council.



After discussion with township attorneys, county legislators, county leadership and state leadership, we decided it was in the best interest for the townships to run legislation in 2024 to change the name from "township" to "city." This change does not affect our current function as we already operate as a city. The only change is that residents will vote for a mayor at large in 2026.

Emigration Canyon Metro Township Dark Sky Ordinance. The new ordinance aligns our community with thousands of others nationwide that are taking action to control light pollution and



reduce its effects on the nighttime environment. This ordinance was unanimously adopted by the Township Council and developed by the Municipal Services District planners who worked closely with the township planning commission. (Municipal Code 19.73.110). Watch for a brochure with more information that will be mailed out to every resident in the canyon.

Slope Stabilization. The slope stabilization project at approx. 5560 East just above the UFA Fire Station and at approx. 5700 East is going out to bid.

Election. We have three seats on the Emigration Metro Township Council. There are four candidates that have applied to run for office:

- Tyler Tippetts
- Jennifer Hawkins
- Catherine Harris
- David Paul Brems

All registered voters will be mailed a ballot on October 31 and are encouraged to return it as soon as possible. The General Election will be held on November 21 for in-person voting.

Margaret Lane. We are happy to announce this project has been completed.

Dumpster for Leaf Collection. Wasatch Front Waste and Recycle will park a trailer at the lower dumpster site at the bottom of Sunnydale Lane for leaf collection. This is only for leaves. We have had a problem with the dumpsters being used by people who aren't supposed to use them and they are putting in things they are not supposed to. The dumpsters are for people who don't have garbage cans.



Archery season has begun, so you will see more hunters in the canyon areas. Be aware.

Election. We have three seats open in Magna to serve on the Metro Township Council. I won't be running this year, and Mickey Sudbury filed to run for the council in District 3. He is running unopposed. We have Audrey Pierce and Steve Propkops running for the other two council seats. They are also running unopposed. This means we will not have an election in Magna this fall.

My Time As Your Mayor. The first time I ran for the council, there were 15 people running against me, and I won by about 8 votes or so. The next time I ran for office, no one ran against me. I have enjoyed serving as your Mayor for the past seven years. I am retiring from public service to enjoy some travel time with my wife and to kick back and start being retired. We just got back from a cruise in Europe, and now we are looking forward to visiting Italy and the South Pole.

During my service as your Mayor, I am most proud we established that Magna can become a city and we have the ability to do it. The toughest realization in government is you can't do anything fast, everything takes time. We have the new storm drain project underway. We were able to acquire 5,000 sq. ft. of land from Kennecott. It has been a pleasure serving and I wish more people would get involved in local government.

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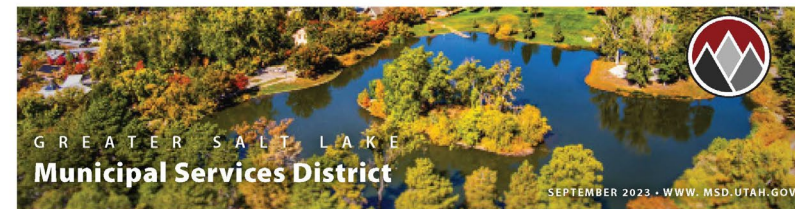

The RSV vaccine is available at most pharmacies and doctor's offices. Medicare Part D and most private health insurance plans will cover the cost.

Safety for Our Kearns Kids. I want to welcome our Kearns kids back to the 2023-2024 school year and wish them a great year and give a shout out to our AMAZING Crossing Guards! Drivers, please pay attention while driving, we have a lot of kids, buses and crosswalks in Kearns. Crossing Guards have the right of way. For the safety of our Kearns kids, do not go through the crosswalk until they are completely out of the sidewalk.

Summer Events. It was great seeing so many of you at the events this summer. The Kearns Parade and the Fire, Water and Ice Festival events were a lot of fun. Thank you to the Kearns Community Council for all of their hard work and support of the Metro Council and Kearns Community. Watch for upcoming events on the Kearns Community Council Facebook page, Kearns Metro township website and neighborhood watch pages.

Law Enforcement Changes. The Kearns Metro Council has been busy. We have a lot going on that will be bringing changes. As many of you are aware, HB 374 passed this last legislative session and forced us to decide how we will receive law enforcement services going forward. The options are to rebuild a shared service model similar to UPD while focusing on allowing more local control or to go with the Sheriff's Department. During several conversations I have had, I emphasized the cost of services and the concern about paying higher costs for less. This is about negotiation. We are working through a UPD 2.0 model that we will be presenting to you for input. Once that is prepared, the proposed plan will be presented at a Kearns Council public meeting. I want to hear from you and answer your questions. So please watch for this.

The existing townships, such as Kearns, already perform in every way as a city. The only key differences are metro townships do not impose property taxes directly, but they impose property taxes through the special district. Also, the mayors in metro townships are not elected directly, they are selected from the council.

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The only change is that residents will vote for a mayor at large in 2026.

Summer Construction. We're coming to the end of asphalt season. You'll be seeing contractors and public works in neighborhoods doing roadwork to get projects completed. 4700 South is scheduled to be completed by November. I want to thank everyone for your patience during the construction of this road. It was a large project that I know tested the patience of everyone. In 2024, Kearns has partnered with West Jordan to do a mill and overlay of 6200 South. This is a much-needed project and we're excited to get it underway.

Speeding. Speeding in our neighborhoods is becoming an increasing concern for the council. Police and your neighbors. Speed bumps and other methods of speed mitigation is a process that must be approved by UDOT, and unfortunately, not all neighborhoods meet the requirements. Many of our neighborhoods with these safety measures installed are still experiencing speeding. We have implemented the UPD motorcycle squad to conduct widespread traffic patrols in Kearns. I have been working with several officers in your neighborhoods patrolling to give feedback to our engineering department to reduce speeding. Even though we have speed bumps, stop signs, and issue tickets, drivers continue to speed through the neighborhoods. Please slow down and pay attention in our neighborhoods. Nothing is more important than another person's life.

Kearns Baby Shower. I decided to hold a Kearns-wide baby shower at the Kearns Hometown Night. We had an incredible turnout and received donations of diapers, wipes, formula, clothes, blankets, and more to help our Kearns little ones. These donated items help parents all over Kearns who need a helping hand. They have all expressed how

GUIDING TRANSPORTATION PROJECTS FROM CONCEPT TO COMPLETION

Kearns is Selected to Participate in the National Thriving Communities Program

Earlier this year, Kearns received exciting news! It was the only municipality in Utah to be selected for participation in this year's cohort of the U.S. Department of Transportation's Thriving Communities Program. The program offers Kearns two years of technical assistance with planning for and executing large transportation projects. The community is particularly interested in working to address challenges on 5400 S and with the railroad that bisects Kearns.

This summer, Kearns staff and partners began meeting with the technical assistance team, which includes members from Arcadis and The Ray. Arcadis is an international firm specializing in engineering, planning, and urban design. The Ray is a growing U.S. Company looking to re-imagine national transportation systems for greater sustainability and safety. In the next month, Kearns staff will be working with these two firms to finalize a work plan which will be active through June 2025.

There will be opportunities for residents and stakeholders to engage in these efforts as the work gets underway. We look forward to bringing transformative transportation projects to your community. Congratulations to Kearns and the project team (MSD Long Range Planning, Wasatch Front Regional Council, and Kearns Community Council) for this exciting achievement!

It is important to understand our Police service for Metros, Town of Brighton, and the remaining Unincorporated is brought to you via an Independent Service District, much like White City Water District.

Salt Lake Valley Law Enforcement Service Area (known as SLVLESA) Population over 85,000 people. When combined with the three municipalities of Mill Creek, Holliday, and Midvale, as the Unified Police Department, our population exceeds 220,000 people. All our attorneys are in the process of working together to preserve the excellent service.

Unified Police strives to make your community a safe place to live and work. The UPD Officers that serve have extensive law enforcement training

designed specifically to meet the needs of each community. Our diverse group of professionals serve with integrity and respect. White City Metro Township contracts with UPD in partnership with Midvale City, as well as the "South-East Islands" of Salt Lake County. The partnership is unique, even within the Unified Police Department. Each partner supports the other based on call volume (emergency and non-emergency). The partnership provides significant savings based on economy of scale. Unified Police provides outstanding police services with a wide variety of specialty units. These units are built to support all UPD partners in what is called "shared service" units. The costs of these units are shared on an agreed upon formula that is updated annually. Examples of specialty units:

- K9 Unit – Dedicated
- K9 Teams
- SWAT
- Violent Crimes Unit
- Special Victims Unit
- Forensics Unit
- Aerial Drone Unit

Though White City currently contracts for 4.5 UPD Officers, they partner with the 4.5 UPD Officers from the South-East unincorporated, and 46 UPD Officers assigned to Midvale City. This allows policing customized to fit your community, regardless of the request for police services.

Recent legislation passed in the State Session (HB374) requires the Salt Lake County Sheriff to separate from UPD and resume statutory duties. Those duties include all non-incorporated areas. The bill effectively negates substantial economy of scale and will impact UPD and Sheriff's Office budgets. Unified Police is actively amending their service model to continue with shared economy of scale.

New Zoning and Subdivision Ordinances are now in effect for **Copperton, Kearns, Magna, and White City Metro Townships**. You can find these new ordinances by visiting the Municipal Library and searching for your municipality. Completing these ordinance updates was a huge feat for the Metro Townships and our staff. When the Metro Townships incorporated, they inherited Salt Lake County Ordinances. Many of the ordinances were not specific to each unique community. The goals of the ordinance update project were to:

- Maintain consistency with State Code requirements (UDMA)
- Conform with each municipality's General Plan
- Increase ease of use for staff and the public
- Meet the unique needs and preserve the character of each community

With the help of the Planning Commissions, Councils, and Legal Team, MSD staff were able to complete this project in just thirteen months. The new ordinances consist of more than 350 pages of text. A few highlights that staff are most excited about include:

- The creation of new mixed-use zones
- The creation of new parks and open space zones
- Updates to site development standards to improve development quality
- Revised definitions and updated use tables
- A new water-efficient landscaping ordinance
- Reductions in off-street parking requirements

We look forward to seeing how these new ordinances will impact development in the Metro Townships. Staff will continue to keep an eye on development patterns and bring adjustments to the Planning Commissions and Councils as needed. The Town of Brighton is currently in the process of updating its Zoning and Subdivision Ordinances, and Emigration Canyon will be starting its updates in the near future. Congratulations to Copperton, Kearns, Magna, and White City, and to the MSD project team (Brian Tucker, Curtis Woodward, Kayla Mauldin, Erin O'Kelleigh, and Matt Starley).



What is the Greater Salt Lake Municipal Services District (MSD)?

HISTORY

In the November 2015 General Election, voters in Copperton, Emigration Canyon, Kearns, Magna, and White City voted to become metro townships served by the MSD. Voters in unincorporated islands voted to remain in unincorporated Salt Lake County and receive services from the MSD. The Town of Brighton incorporated in January 2020 as an MSD member. The total population served by the MSD is approximately 65,677.

The MSD is governed by a Board of Trustees made up of five mayors and two council members from the member communities.

SERVICES

The MSD provides the following Municipal Services:

- 1) **Planning and Zoning** - addressing, building & grading permits and inspections, plan review, land use and zoning, current and long range planning, floodplain permits, stormwater management planning and economic development (contracted with Salt Lake County Office of Regional Development)
- 2) **Animal Control Services** - contracted with Salt Lake County Animal Services
- 3) **Parks Maintenance and Operation** - contracted with Salt Lake County Parks & Recreation and/or a third party
- 4) **Public Works** - construction and maintenance of rights-of-way - contracted with Salt Lake County Public Works Operations and Engineering, including curb & gutter, sidewalks, streets and roads, storm drains, street lighting, traffic signals and safety signals, snow plowing and engineering
- 5) **Business Licensing**
- 6) **Code Enforcement**

The MSD does not provide police, fire protection or sanitation services.

Construction Projects

Completed and Current Projects

6200 South (Kearns) - In 2024, Kearns partnered with West Jordan to do a mill and overlay of 6200 South. This is a much-needed project and we're excited to get it underway.

Vics Road Sidewalk Project (Unincorporated County) - Curb, gutter, and sidewalk have been constructed on the north side of Vics Road (8475 S) from 700 East to 871 East. This fills a gap in the sidewalk network and now provides a safe walking route for the area residents and students walking to East Sandy Elementary School. The project finished in August 2023.

Redhaven Drive Sidewalk Project (White City) - A new ADA-compliant sidewalk and pedestrian ramp have been constructed from 9400 South to connect to the sidewalk to the north. The project finished in August 2023.

White City Canal Trail Lights (White City) - Canal trail lights have been added from 106th South to Carnation Drive. This will increase safety along the canal trail in the twilight hours. The project finished in June 2023.

5615 South Concrete Repairs and Overlay (Kearns) - The project repaired areas of worn concrete gutters and sidewalks and repaved the road from Northwest Avenue to 4015 West. A raised pedestrian school crossing was built at 4430 West. This project finished in early summer 2023.

4700 South Roadway Reconstruction (Kearns) - Roadway reconstruction is underway on 4700 South from 4000 West to 5600 West. The project includes widening in areas, new curb, gutter, and sidewalk, full-depth pavement reconstruction, improved signals at intersections and will include bike lanes. The portion of the project between 4000 West and 5400 West will be complete by around November 2023. Construction on the portion of the road near the rail crossing (5400 West to 5600 West) will take place starting in spring 2024 and go through summer 2024.

Upcoming Projects

Planada Way and Farah Drive (Kearns) - This project will regrade the intersection of Planada Way / Farah Drive, including rebuilding some of the sidewalk and pedestrian ramps at the corner. Some delivery trucks can't get through this intersection without getting high-centered. This work will fix that issue. We expect work to begin mid to late September and be complete by mid-November 2023.

Misty Way Intersection at 6200 South (Kearns) - Waterway removal and intersection regrading of Misty Way and 6200 South. We do not have a set date for this work yet, but we hope it will be late fall 2023 or spring 2024.

Sego Lily Road Improvements (White City) 700 East to 1300 East - The work includes constructing a sidewalk from 700 East to Flint Drive, a raised crosswalk at the White City Canal Trail crossing, several traffic calming features, adding street lights, repaving the road, and restriping the road to include bike lanes. This project is expected to begin in early summer 2024 and be complete by late summer or early fall.

8800 W Storm Drain (Magna) - Storm drain improvements along 8800 West to increase overall system capacity between 2700 South and 3100 South in Magna are progressing, with construction going into Fall 2023.

3100 S Storm Drain (Magna) - Storm drain improvements along 3100 South between 9400 West and Beebe Drive in Magna will start in Winter 2023 with pavement work in Spring 2024. The project will improve system resiliency and stormwater capture along 3100 South.

SR-48-SR-209 Sidewalk (Copperton) - Curb, gutter, and sidewalk construction along the north side of SR-48/SR-209 between 8626 West and 8480 West will be starting in Fall 2023 with an expected duration of one to two months. Improvements will fill sidewalk gaps along the state highway.

Winter Snow Removal Reminders

Salt Lake County: Snow Removal

The Salt Lake County Public Works Operations takes pride in keeping you safe. Their experienced snowplow drivers are ready to move snow from November 1 to April 30, 24 hours a day, seven days a week.



The first pass by a snowplow driver removes the snow from driving lanes. After the storm has passed and all driving lanes are cleared, the drivers push the edges back to widen the road for future snow storage. Pushing the snow back creates a row of snow along the side of the road, which is unfortunately left in front of recently cleared driveways.

Snow Plowing Road Order

There is a priority schedule to determine what roads are plowed first.

Priority #1: High-traffic roads, school zones, hills and arterial and collector roads receive top plowing priority. As long as the snow keeps falling, Salt Lake County prioritizes these roads. Once these streets are clear, crews proceed to the 2nd and 3rd priority streets.

Priority #2: Streets through residential subdivisions, including roads that connect to a collector street.

Priority #3: Cul-de-sacs, circles and dead-end streets. Please note this could take up to 48 hours after a major snowstorm ends. If the snow event is larger, they might do a quick straight pass into a cul-de-sac and come back later after more streets are cleared to clear more from the whole cul-de-sac.

Note: Salt Lake County Public Works Operations Crews do not plow private lanes or streets.

Winter Parking and Clearing Snow

Parked vehicles on streets can prevent snow plows from clearing the roads and parked vehicles are at risk of being hit by the snow plow trucks. We might not be able to plow your street if cars are parked on it for safety reasons.



- Please, no parking a vehicle on streets during a snow event from November-April. Parked vehicles on streets can prevent snowplows from clearing the roads. If a snowplow clears next to parked vehicles, the parked vehicles are at risk of being hit.
- Clear sidewalks adjacent to your property within 12 hours after snow stops falling for the safety of school children, the elderly and the general public.
- When you clear your driveway, do not blow, throw or push snow into the street or gutter. Shoveled snow should be placed onto landscaped areas. The snow blown on roads can refreeze and cause ice build-up on the street.
- Please keep a safe distance from snowplows. Be aware that snowplows may back up at any time. Do not pass snowplows while they are plowing.
- If possible, refrain from driving during snow events. This helps us clear roads more efficiently and safer.

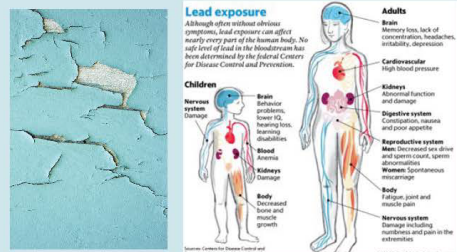


Free Assistance Mitigating Lead Paint in Your Home

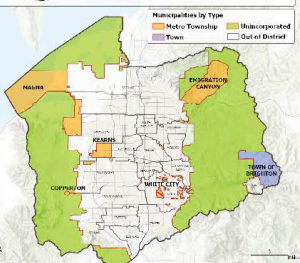

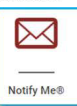

- 1 tsp allspice
- 1/2 tsp baking powder
- 2 tsp baking soda
- Chopped pecans (optional)
- Chocolate chips (optional)

Combine oil, eggs and pumpkin. Mix and add sugar and water. Combine dry ingredients and add to pumpkin mix. Grease 2 large loaf pans or 4 small loaf pans, or use muffin pans with muffin papers.

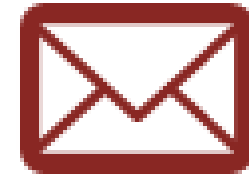
