- Established in 2015 as an informal planning organization centered around Zion National Park
- Funding partners include: City of Hurricane, City of La Verkin, Town of Virgin, Town of Rockville, Town of Springdale, Zion Forever Project, Iron County, and Washington County

## Background


#### Trails Committee

- In 2022, the ZRC inaugurated a Trail Committee, tasked with using "its resources and knowledge to support trails of all kinds and uses, ensuring the long-term viability of our region's extensive trail network"
- This spring, the Committee generated a list of over 2 dozen projects, spanning planning, construction, user education, maintenance, access preservation, and more
- Guacamole Mesa NEPA and Trailhead Infrastructure was identified as the top priority, amongst all projects listed



### **Guacamole Mesa**

- Popular singletrack mountain bike trail network located on BLM property between the Towns of Virgin and Rockville, abutting Zion National Park
- Network consists of 5 trails, totaling approximately 8 miles, which can be combined into a variety of loops
- Trail network receives over 20,000 annual visitors according to recent BLM data
- Trails were constructed illegally; any further work necessitates NEPA




### **Guacamole Mesa**

### Proposal:

- Initiate a retroactive NEPA process for the illegally constructed trail network and, simultaneously, conduct NEPA for proposed trailhead infrastructure
- Pending NEPA, add restrooms, informational kiosk, and signage to Guacamole Mesa trailhead
- Engage local stakeholders in proactive discussions around the impacts of enhancing infrastructure (eg: increased camping near the Wilderness Boundary of Zion National Park)


