The Town Council of Hideout, Wasatch County, Utah met in Regular Meeting and Work Session on July 13, 2023 at 5:00 PM electronically via Zoom Conference Call due to the ongoing COVID-19 health concerns.

**Regular Meeting and Work Session**

**Work Session - 5:00 p.m.**

**I. Call to Order**

Mayor Pro Tempore Baier called the Work Session to order at 5:04 p.m. and reminded participants there was no physical anchor site for the meeting due to ongoing COVID-19 health concerns. Mayor Rubin was present on the call; however, he noted he had limited cell service and could not view the visual presentations needed for the meeting. Therefore, Council Member Baier would fill in as Mayor Pro Tempore.

**III. Agenda Items**

**1. Presentation to Hideout Town Council and discussion of the re-zone for the Bloom in Hideout Development**

Town Attorney Polly McLean noted that the applicants for the Bloom in Hideout Development had withdrawn their application. Therefore, there was no discussion.

1       **2. Presentation from the Economic Development Committee regarding the potential impacts of**  
2       **the Bloom at Hideout Development**

3       Because the Bloom applicants withdrew their application, the discussion revolved around  
4       introduction of the Economic Development Committee (EDC) members and the mission statement  
5       of the EDC. Recognizing the need to adjourn the Work Session promptly at 6:00 p.m., Mayor Pro  
6       Tempore Baier inquired about the third agenda item, regarding Short-Term Rental Overlay Zones  
7       and residential casitas, and asked if the item would need to be discussed. Ms. McLean stated that  
8       the discussion would be brought to the Hideout Planning Commission in August, and since it was  
9       tied in with the Bloom Development, there was no need for the discussion during this meeting.

10       Craig Dupper from the EDC presented the Committee's mission, which was to ensure Hideout was  
11       business-friendly; encouraged responsible commercial development; enhanced economic diversity;  
12       and provided desirable amenities for residents.

13       Mr. Dupper outlined the Committee's focus on providing feedback to the Town Council on  
14       economic and development issues. The discussion revolved around evaluating additional  
15       development projects to align with resident preferences and contribute to the Town's revenue  
16       stream.

17       Members of the EDC, including Scott Davis and Craig Dupper, shared their backgrounds and  
18       involvement in the Committee. Mr. Davis proposed an idea to utilize ten (10) acres near the Ross  
19       Creek entrance for a food truck park with themed nights, acoustic music, and a Hideout cantina. He  
20       suggested this low-cost initiative could generate revenue and test the viability of attracting visitors  
21       without significant development. He offered to support the park by contributing ten thousand  
22       dollars (\$10,000) of his own funds.

23       Mayor Pro Tempore Baier raised concerns about the execution details, such as the need to research  
24       the success of food trucks in similar locations and the complexities of obtaining a liquor license in  
25       Utah. She also emphasized the importance of investigating the expenses involved in leveling the  
26       land for the food trucks and parking.

27       Mr. Davis addressed these concerns, mentioning his connections to a food truck owner and  
28       expressing willingness to cover the ten-thousand-dollar (\$10,000) liquor license cost. He  
29       highlighted the potential benefits of the project, including creating viability for future development  
30       and leveraging town resources.

31       Council Member Severini emphasized the importance of gathering better data, including pictures  
32       of the plot of land, to attract potential restaurateurs. He acknowledged the obstacles but suggested  
33       exploring the potential investment, the speed of implementation, and the use of benchmark data for  
34       marketing.

35       Mr. Davis responded by proposing the idea of seeking bids and exploring costs, possibly bringing  
36       in a venture capitalist (VC) to invest in making the land usable for attracting business. He mentioned  
37       the demand from the Tuhaye community for a place to eat and emphasized the need to start with a  
38       simple dirt lot to gauge success before making further investments.

39       In response to Council Member Severini's suggestion about involving Hideout developers to grade  
40       the land, Mr. Davis mentioned the possibility of trading with Nate Brockbank, who wanted nightly  
41       rentals in the area, and who could potentially provide assistance with grading and water shares.

1 Mayor Rubin expressed his interest in the concept and emphasized that the EDC was seeking  
2 feedback on whether the idea was worth exploring further. He mentioned discussions with outdoor  
3 vendors interested in setting up at the Ross Creek entrance, such as a coffee shop, E-bike shop, and  
4 SUP (Stand-Up Paddleboarding) shop. Mayor Rubin suggested allowing the EDC to do more  
5 research and mentioned ongoing work by Engineering Director Timm Dixon's team on power bids.  
6 He encouraged the Council to let the relevant experts handle the technical aspects.

7 Council Member Nadelberg expressed interest in the idea, and Council Member Jacobs saw it as  
8 an excellent opportunity for events. Council Member Severini echoed the sentiment, emphasizing  
9 the need to try new things and gather regular feedback.

10 The conversation touched on zoning considerations, infrastructure needs, collaboration  
11 possibilities, and the potential year-round viability of the proposed commercial space. Mayor Pro  
12 Tempore Baier emphasized the importance of working with the State Park and considering revenue  
13 generation throughout all seasons. Mr. Davis shared his experience in California, working with state  
14 parks, and suggested prototyping with generators before addressing electric infrastructure.

15 Town Planner Thomas Eddington provided an insight into zoning considerations and suggested that  
16 obtaining a special permit might be needed for one-off events. He also discussed the possibility of  
17 rezoning the land to neighborhood mixed-use (NMU) in the future, aligning with the Town's goal  
18 of bringing commercial activity to the area.

19 Overall, the concept was met with positive feedback from Council Members, encouraging further  
20 exploration and expressing willingness to support the idea. The EDC was given the go-ahead to  
21 continue its work and gather more information for future presentations.

### 22 **3. Discussion and presentation of a new zoning designation Residential Casita and Short-Term** 23 **Rental Overlay (SRO) zone**

24 This item was not discussed.

25 At 5:50 p.m., there was a short recess before beginning the Regular Meeting at 6:00 p.m.

**I. Call to Order**

**1. No Anchor Site Determination Letter**

Mayor Rubin called the meeting to order at 6:02 and reminded participants there was no physical anchor site for the meeting.

**III. Update on Golden Eagle Subdivision**

The update on the Golden Eagle subdivision included information on the issuance of building permits and the progress with building permits. Town Attorney Polly McLean noted there were currently ten (10) building permits issued, and mentioned that no certificates of occupancy (CO's) had yet been issued aside from one that was a special circumstance. Council Member Baier inquired how many building permits or CO's could be issued without building a secondary access road. Ms.

1 McLean and Mayor Rubin confirmed there could be thirty (30) building permits issued without the  
2 requirement of a secondary access road.

3 **IV. Public Input - Floor open for any attendee to speak on items not listed on the agenda**

4 Mayor Rubin opened the floor for public input at 6:07 p.m.

5 There being no public input, Mayor Rubin closed public input at 6:08 p.m.

6 **V. Public Hearing: This item will be continued to a date certain of August 10, 2023**

7 **1. Consideration of adopting Resolution 2023-R-XX to amend the Fee and Rate Schedule to**  
8 **include a water rate increase**

9 Mayor Rubin discussed the consideration of adopting Resolution 2023-R-XX to amend the fee and  
10 rate schedule to include a water rate increase. He clarified that the discussion was focused on raising  
11 the base rate for water under the old target of 10,000 gallons due to Jordanelle Special Service  
12 District (JSSD) raising their rates. While a tiered schedule was being worked on by Zions Municipal  
13 Finance, the immediate need was to cover the increased costs from JSSD, and further discussions  
14 on the tiered schedule would follow.

15 Mayor Rubin emphasized the necessity of addressing the direct pass-through of the JSSD cost, and  
16 Council Member Severini suggested distributing the information for a comprehensive analysis well  
17 before the future meeting. Mayor Rubin supported Council Member Severini's suggestion.

18 There being no further questions from Council, Mayor Rubin opened the floor for public input at  
19 6:14 p.m.

20 There were no public comments. Mayor Rubin closed public input at 6:15 p.m. and reminded  
21 participants the resolution and public hearing would be continued to the August 10, 2023 Council  
22 Meeting.

23 **VI. Agenda Items**

24 **1. Discussion and consideration of a petition to annex from Benloch Ranch**

25 Mayor Rubin mentioned that the item was noticed for the meeting, but Benloch Ranch had  
26 withdrawn their petition to annex. Therefore, there was no discussion or consideration for this  
27 agenda item during this meeting.

28 **2. Discussion and possible approval to authorize the Mayor to execute an agreement with Fleet**  
29 **Management to cover damages to the Public Works vehicles in an amount of \$22,002.85**

30 Mayor Rubin acknowledged the challenging winter that resulted in significant damages to the  
31 Town's trucks. The damages were incurred during the first-time use of the state leasing program for  
32 snow removal vehicles.

33 Mayor Rubin expressed his disappointment in the substantial cost and discussed ongoing efforts to  
34 understand and address the issues contributing to the damages. Town Administrator Jan McCosh  
35 clarified that a claim had been submitted to the Town's insurance, but recovery would not cover the  
36 entire amount. She mentioned a \$500 deductible per incident and explained that damages occurred  
37 in multiple incidents.

1 Council Member Severini suggested exploring the possibility of establishing a captive fund to cover  
 2 first-dollar losses in the future. Mayor Rubin acknowledged the suggestion and mentioned taking  
 3 the discussion offline.

4 Since the total damages exceeded Mayor Rubin's approval limit, he sought approval from the  
 5 Council to proceed with payment.

6 *Voting Yes: Council Member Baier, Council Member Jacobs, Council Member Nadelberg, and*  
 7 *Council Member Severini.*

### 8 **3. Discussion and possible appointment of a member of the Hideout Town Council to serve on** 9 **the Fire and EMS Advisory Commission**

10 Mayor Rubin provided background information on the Wasatch Fire District's steering committee,  
 11 which aimed to gather resident feedback and represent different areas in Wasatch County. The Fire  
 12 District was collaborating with Hideout to establish a fire station within the Town, offering closer  
 13 proximity to fire and emergency services.

14 Mayor Rubin opened the floor for expressions of interest from the Council Members to serve as a  
 15 liaison with the Fire District. Council Member Severini highlighted the potential benefits for  
 16 commercial businesses, particularly in reducing commercial insurance costs. Council Member  
 17 Baier expressed interest but suggested checking with Planning Commissioner Jonathan Gunn, who  
 18 might have relevant experience.

19 Mayor Rubin acknowledged the interest from Council Member Baier and noted the suggestion to  
 20 explore Commissioner Gunn's interest. If needed, Council Member Baier volunteered to serve as  
 21 an alternate representative. The final decision was pending further discussions with potential  
 22 candidates.

### 23 **4. Discussion of fraud risk**

24 The discussion of fraud risk was led by Ms. McCosh and presented by Financial Consultant Katie  
 25 Shepley. The discussion focused on measures taken to mitigate fraud risks and enhance internal  
 26 controls within the Town. The following key points were highlighted:

- 27 1. Separation of Duties: The town achieved 200 out of 200 points for segregation of duties over  
 28 cash, with mitigation controls in place for specific cases.
- 29 2. Ethical Behavior and Conflict of Interest: The Town accommodated the commitment to  
 30 ethical behavior and managed conflicts of interest effectively.
- 31 3. Policies and Written Practices: The Town implemented written policies and practices to  
 32 ensure proper oversight and adherence to legal and accounting requirements.
- 33 4. Training: While the Town lacked certain certifications (CPA, CMA, CIA), members of the  
 34 team possessed at least a bachelor's degree in accounting, earning 10 points.
- 35 5. Training for Governing Board Members: Board members completed entity-specific training.
- 36 6. Internal Audit Function and Audit Committee: Plans were underway to establish an internal  
 37 audit function and an audit committee to oversee financial reviews and ensure adherence to  
 38 policies.



- 1           7. Risk Level: The Town's risk level was at three-hundred thirty (330) points, categorized as  
2           low, with a goal to reach the very low category at three-hundred eighty-five (385) points by  
3           reinforcing policies, auditing procedures, and establishing an internal audit function.

4           The presentation outlined steps taken to improve the Town's financial controls and adhere to State  
5           guidelines, showcasing progress and the commitment to achieving the highest rating. The Council  
6           expressed appreciation for the efforts undertaken to enhance the Town's financial management and  
7           mitigate fraud risks.

8           At 6:50 p.m., Mayor Rubin was excused and assigned Council Member Baier to present as Mayor  
9           Pro Tempore for the remainder of the meeting.

## 10   **VII. Committee Updates**

### 11   **1. Planning Commission - TBD**

12           The Planning Commission update was presented by Mr. Eddington. The key points included:

- 13           1. Hideout Pointe Concept Plan: The Planning Commission discussed a concept plan for a  
14           potential development called Hideout Pointe. The plan involved a mix of uses, including a  
15           brewpub and housing. The concept plan received positive feedback, but there were  
16           considerations regarding density and zoning, which would lead to further discussions.
- 17           2. Benloch Annexation Petition: There was a discussion about the Benloch annexation petition,  
18           but the application had been withdrawn.
- 19           3. Residential Casita Zoning: The Planning Commission discussed residential casita zoning,  
20           focusing on small, detached single-family units. The proposed zoning designation aimed to  
21           provide smaller housing options and may include an overlay for short-term rentals.
- 22           4. Bloom Development: The Bloom Development application had been withdrawn in its current  
23           form, leading to a discussion about its status.

24           Mayor Pro Tempore Baier and Council Member Severini asked Mr. Eddington to define a casita.  
25           Mr. Eddington explained they were small, single-family detached units, which were typically less  
26           than two thousand (2000) square feet. The proposed casitas in Deer Springs included a one-car  
27           garage.

28           Discussion ensued regarding the recognition of the need for a variety of housing types to  
29           accommodate different residents, including those working in the upcoming Mayflower Resort area.  
30           The Council Members discussed the importance of balancing revenue generation with providing  
31           diverse housing options for residents.

### 32   **2. Community Engagement Committee - Council Member Jacobs**

33           Council Member Jacobs provided an update on upcoming events. She stated that two (2) concerts  
34           were scheduled for July 28 and August 11, with plans for a third on September 17. Tickets were  
35           currently being sold, and volunteers were sought for assistance. She mentioned merchandise would  
36           be available at the concerts to generate additional income for the Town.

37           The Committee discussed a community garage sale which was potentially scheduled for the end of  
38           August. They also discussed guided hiking and mountain biking events once the State Park re-  
39           opened.

1 Council Member Jacobs stated she had been approached by Planning Commissioner Rachel Cooper  
 2 and discussed combining one of the concerts with the State Park's opening date and relocating the  
 3 concert to the State Park. She noted an opening date had not been announced yet; however, the  
 4 Committee hoped that a volunteer cleanup day to potentially waive charges for using the facilities  
 5 could be arranged with the Park Manager.

### 6 **3. Parks, Open Space and Trails (POST) Committee - Council Member Baier**

7 Mayor Pro Tempore Baier provided an update on their recent meeting with the Utah Department of  
 8 Transportation (UDOT). The Committee met with the new Region II Planning Manager, Geoff  
 9 Dupaix, as well as Nazee Treweek, the Access Coordinator, and Ivana Vladislavljevic, the Traffic  
 10 Engineer. The Committee discussed economic development projects, the Town's General Plan,  
 11 concerns about increased traffic and safety due to new developments, and the Jordanelle State Park  
 12 day use area. They addressed roadkill issues on State Road 248, emphasizing the need for wildlife  
 13 connectivity through non-motorized trails connecting Park City to Kamas. Ms. McCosh presented  
 14 a UDOT project list, and they touched on the corridor agreement between Hideout and UDOT.  
 15 Ideas for matching grants were discussed, and Mr. Dupaix agreed on the importance of starting with  
 16 an engineering study for the spine trail. Other topics included wildlife fencing responsibilities,  
 17 traffic lights mentioned in the corridor agreement, and plans for realignment in the Ross Creek area.

18 Mayor Pro Tempore Baier mentioned plans for Ms. McCosh and Mr. Eddington to organize the  
 19 next meeting with Mr. Dupaix and other UDOT representatives, along with key stakeholders from  
 20 Summit County, Mountainland Association of Governments (MAG), and Wasatch County. The  
 21 Committee expressed satisfaction with the progress made in establishing contact with UDOT and  
 22 outlined action items for future discussions.

### 23 **4. Transportation Committee - Jan McCosh**

24 Ms. McCosh provided an update on the Transportation Committee's efforts to coordinate with  
 25 UDOT and address challenges arising from the Town being governed by Region II, while Wasatch  
 26 County was governed by Region III. Ms. McCosh emphasized the importance of collaboration with  
 27 UDOT and mentioned upcoming meetings with Mr. Eddington to discuss how Hideout could gain  
 28 traction on projects within its region. The Committee was also engaging with the Regional Planning  
 29 Organization (RPO) and MAG to enhance communication and collaboration. Mayor Pro Tempore  
 30 Baier expressed gratitude for Ms. McCosh's efforts in keeping Hideout connected regionally.

### 31 **5. Design Review Committee (DRC) - Thomas Eddington**

32 Mr. Eddington provided a brief update on the DRC, stating that there was no meeting in the past  
 33 month due to the absence of submitted applications. All ongoing projects had prior approval,  
 34 resulting in a month without any reporting.

## 35 **VIII. Closed Executive Session - Discussion of pending or reasonably imminent litigation,** 36 **personnel matters, and/or sale or acquisition of real property as needed**

37 There was no need for a closed Executive Session.

## 38 **IX. Meeting Adjournment**

39 There being no further business, Mayor Pro Tempore Baier asked for a motion to adjourn.

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***Motion: Council Member Jacobs moved to adjourn the meeting. Council Member Severini made the second. Voting Yes: Council Member Jacobs, Council Member Nadelberg, and Council Member Severini. Absent from Voting: Council Member Haselton. The motion carried.***

Mayor Rubin called the meeting to order at 6:03 pm and explained that this would be a hybrid meeting with some participants at Hideout Town Hall and some participants attending remotely.

**III. Agenda Items**

**1. Certification of the November 21, 2023 Municipal Election Results**

The Hideout Town Council convened to discuss and certify the results of the November 21, 2023, Hideout Municipal Election. Mayor Rubin presented the data, revealing that out of 429 registered voters, 193 cast their ballots, resulting in a 44.99% turnout. The election involved three open seats for the Town Council.

Recorder Alicia Fairbourne clarified that Bob Nadelberg received 114 votes (25.91 percent), Carol Haselton received 111 votes (25.23 percent), Jonathan Gunn received 152 votes (34.55 percent), and Doug Silver received 63 votes (14.32 percent). Consequently, Bob Nadelberg, Carol Haselton, and Jonathan Gunn were elected to fill the three available seats.

1 Mayor Rubin sought clarification on "under votes," which Ms. Fairbourne explained as ballots  
2 where voters chose fewer than the specified three candidates.

3 Council Member Baier briefly mentioned rank choice voting, expressing difficulty understanding  
4 the posted results on the website. Council Member Severini suggested revisiting rank choice  
5 voting, acknowledging its challenges.

6 Mayor Rubin elaborated on the complexity of rank choice voting, involving multiple rounds of  
7 elimination until the desired number of candidates remained. The discussion circled back to the  
8 town's context, emphasizing that rank choice voting might not be practical due to a limited number  
9 of candidates.

10 Returning to the agenda, Mayor Rubin called for a motion to certify the election results.

11 ***Motion: Council Member Baier moved to approve the 2023 Hideout Municipal Election***  
12 ***Results. Council Member Severini made the second. Voting Yes: Council Member Baier,***  
13 ***Council Member Haselton, Council Member Jacobs, Council Member Nadelberg, and***  
14 ***Council Member Severini. There were none opposed. The motion carried.***

15 Town Attorney Polly McLean inquired when the swearing in ceremony would take place. It was  
16 agreed the Oath of Office would be performed prior to the start of the Council Retreat which was  
17 to be held on January 11, 2024 at the Homestead Resort.

#### 18 **IV. Meeting Adjournment**

19 There being no further business, Mayor Rubin asked for a motion to adjourn.

20 ***Motion: Council Member Nadelberg moved to adjourn the meeting. Council Member Jacobs***  
21 ***made the second. Voting Yes: Council Member Baier, Council Member Haselton, Council***  
22 ***Member Jacobs, Council Member Nadelberg, and Council Member Severini. There were none***  
23 ***opposed. The motion carried.***

24 The meeting adjourned at 6:16 p.m.

The Town Council of Hideout, Wasatch County, Utah met in Regular Meeting and Continued Public Hearing on December 14, 2023 at 6:00 pm in the City Council Chambers located at 10860 N. Hideout Trail, Hideout, Utah and electronically via Zoom.

**Regular Meeting and Continued Public Hearings**

**I. Call to Order**

Mayor Rubin called the meeting to order at 6:01 p.m. and reminded participants that this was a hybrid meeting held electronically and in-person.

**II. Roll Call**

**III. Agenda Items**

*(Clerk's note: The agenda was reordered from the original posting to allow for Council Member Jacobs to be present for her presentation.)*



1       **1. Update regarding the fundraising efforts for Hideout Fire Station 56**

2           Mayor Rubin explained the Town was seeking fundraising for Hideout's Fire Station. Chief Eric  
3           Hales from the Wasatch Fire District had approached the Mayor to seek support in establishing a  
4           temporary fire station for 24-hour staffing and equipment by early 2024, which would be at least  
5           three years earlier than when the permanent fire station could be built. Mayor Rubin emphasized  
6           the urgency for the temporary station, highlighting its significant impact on health and safety,  
7           especially in medical emergencies. The temporary station's proximity would enhance efficiency,  
8           potentially lowering insurance rates for residents in the area. The Council expressed willingness  
9           to assist and discussed potential fundraising strategies, which included finding support from  
10          surrounding communities.

11          Mayor Rubin convened with Chief Hales to deliberate the potential placement of a temporary fire  
12          station at the designated location for the future permanent station. Attention was drawn to the  
13          topographical challenges, and Chief Hales noted the Utah Department of Transportation (UDOT)  
14          right-of-way was the flattest terrain. Chief Hales articulated his intention to formally request an  
15          exception from UDOT to authorize the establishment of the temporary fire station in said location.  
16          The current status involved awaiting the decision from UDOT regarding this proposal.

17          At 6:07 p.m., Mayor Rubin acknowledged that Council Member Haselton joined the meeting.

18          Council Member Baier further inquired about fundraising updates and financial details. Mayor  
19          Rubin mentioned potential fundraising from surrounding communities and that two subdivisions  
20          outside Hideout had already expressed interest. He also noted the Fire District had some funds  
21          available to support the temporary station, and discussions were ongoing to determine funding  
22          sources and community support.

23          Mayor Rubin acknowledged the need for more information on costs and funding. Council  
24          Member Baier suggested moving on to the next agenda item for further discussion. Mayor Rubin  
25          agreed, indicating that details were still being worked out regarding funding and expressed the  
26          intention to explore options, including community contributions.

27       **2. Discussion and possible approval to authorize the Mayor to execute an agreement with Steel**  
28       **Master Arch Buildings LLC for a deposit amount of \$11,292 and in an amount not to exceed**  
29       **\$56,460 for the temporary Fire Station at the Hideout Public Works building**

30          Mayor Rubin explained that the proposed structure, intended to house fire equipment, was a  
31          temporary structure and would eventually be purchased by the Fire District. He explained once  
32          the permanent fire station was built, the temporary structure would be dismantled by the Fire  
33          District and moved to future fire station sites within Wasatch County, although a concrete pad  
34          would be left behind. Mayor Rubin explained the necessity of a deposit to secure the building  
35          promptly once funding details were finalized. Council Member Baier sought clarification on the  
36          funding source and reimbursement agreement with the Fire District.

37          Mayor Rubin clarified that Hideout would front the initial deposit and the Fire District would  
38          repay Hideout when the funds could be released. The source of funds from Hideout was discussed,  
39          and Mayor Rubin suggested the deposit come from the General Fund account.

40          Council Member Baier expressed concerns about the lack of specific information and proposed a  
41          Special Meeting once the fundraising details were compiled to keep the Council informed.

1 Council Member Haselton inquired about the location of the concrete pad and questioned why  
 2 fundraising efforts were necessary when Wasatch County had recently increased property taxes.  
 3 She felt the fire station should be funded with the property tax increase. Mayor Rubin  
 4 acknowledged Ballot Proposition 9 had passed, which would allow for a percentage of sales tax  
 5 in Wasatch County to be collected for future fire stations, including the permanent station in  
 6 Hideout. However, the temporary station was an accelerated build, and he expressed the urgency  
 7 of improving health and safety for Hideout residents and residents of surrounding communities.  
 8 He mentioned support from neighboring communities and expressed ongoing discussions with  
 9 interested subdivisions. In regard to where the concrete pad would be located, he explained it  
 10 would either be located near the Ross Creek entrance, or at the future permanent site for the fire  
 11 station between the bottom of the Klaim and Deer Mountain Subdivisions.

12 Council Member Severini emphasized the need to determine the Town's financial liability and  
 13 discussed an approximate cost of insurance premium savings to each homeowner if the station  
 14 were built.

15 Council Member Baier sought information about the parcels' zoning and potential involvement  
 16 of the Planning Commission. Town Attorney Polly McLean mentioned the parcels would need to  
 17 be rezoned. Town Planner Thomas Eddington was working with Chief Hales to bring the rezone  
 18 application to the Planning Commission.

19 The discussion concluded with Mayor Rubin suggesting continuing the agenda item until final  
 20 fundraising plans were in place. He noted the potential for a Special Meeting to keep the council  
 21 updated.

### 22 **3. Update of Hideout Blanket Drive for The Peace House of Park City**

23 Council Member Jacobs provided an update on the Hideout Blanket Drive for The Peace House  
 24 of Park City. The Blanket Drive successfully collected around 120 blankets and received  
 25 monetary donations totaling approximately five hundred to six hundred dollars (\$500-\$600).  
 26 Acknowledging the efforts of her Committee members, Council Member Jacobs expressed  
 27 gratitude for the community's generous response.

28 Mayor Rubin commended Council Member Jacobs and her team for organizing the drive. Council  
 29 Member Jacobs emphasized the ongoing need for support, inviting continued donations beyond  
 30 the Drive's conclusion.

31 Mayor Rubin thanked the community for its participation and reiterated the importance of  
 32 recognizing the continuous need for contributions. Council Member Jacobs concluded by  
 33 expressing openness to organizing similar events or supporting other worthwhile causes in the  
 34 future, welcoming ideas from the community.

### 35 **4. Approval of adopting Resolution 2023-R-XX Honoring Sheri Jacobs**

36 Mayor Rubin presented Resolution 2023-R-12 to honor Sheri Jacobs, who would no longer be  
 37 serving on the Council starting in early January. The Resolution acknowledged Council Member  
 38 Jacobs' service as a Town Council Member since November 2021 and her role as the leader of  
 39 the Hideout Community Engagement Committee.

1 The Resolution highlighted Council Member Jacobs' exceptional service, leadership, respect,  
2 integrity, and outstanding community spirit. It also recognized her dedication, enthusiasm, and  
3 substantial contributions to the betterment of Hideout and its residents.

4 Sheri Jacobs expressed her appreciation, stating that she learned a lot and enjoyed working with  
5 the Council. She stated she was willing to continue contributing to the Community Engagement  
6 Committee and participating in Town initiatives. The Council expressed gratitude and officially  
7 thanked Council Member Jacobs for her outstanding public service.

8 Council Member Jacobs was excused at 6:36 p.m.

9 **5. Discussion and possible approval to authorize the Mayor to execute an agreement with**  
10 **Western Electrical Alliance for an amount not to exceed \$19,802.35 for light poles**

11 The Council discussed the approval of authorizing the Mayor to execute an agreement with  
12 Western Electrical Alliance for an amount not to exceed \$19,802.35 for the purchase of five (5)  
13 light poles. The purpose was to replace two (2) insufficiently lit light poles at Town Hall and  
14 acquire two (2) additional poles for potential use in the fire station or as replacements for other  
15 poles in the future. Mayor Rubin mentioned a developer would cover the cost of the additional  
16 light pole.

17 The bulk order of five (5) light poles was found to be more cost-effective, saving extra shipping  
18 costs compared to buying individually. The Council clarified the cost breakdown and inquired  
19 about the storage of the extra poles. The two (2) additional poles would be stored at the Public  
20 Works building.

21 There being no further questions from Council, Mayor Rubin asked for a motion.

22 *Motion: Council Member Nadelberg moved to approve the authorization of the Mayor to*  
23 *execute an agreement with Western Electrical Alliance for an amount not to exceed*  
24 *\$19,802.35 for the purchase of light poles. Council Member Severini made the second. Voting*  
25 *Yes: Council Member Baier, Council Member Haselton, Council Member Nadelberg, and*  
26 *Council Member Severini. Absent from voting: Council Member Jacobs. The motion carried.*

27 **6. Discussion and consideration of a petition to annex from Benloch Ranch**

28 Mr. Eddington explained that Benloch Ranch had initially submitted a petition for annexation in  
29 May of 2023, but they rescinded it to finalize building permits and concept planning. They  
30 resubmitted in September 2023, but due to ongoing revisions and delays, the recommendation  
31 was to deny the current consideration for annexation. This denial would allow them to resubmit  
32 in the future without changing the substantive aspects of their application. The denial was  
33 recommended to ensure compliance with Utah State statute requirements for public noticing. The  
34 Mayor and legal counsel supported this recommendation.

35 There being no questions from Council, Mayor Rubin asked for a motion.

36 *Motion: Council Member Haselton moved to deny the annexation petition from Benloch*  
37 *Ranch. Council Member Nadelberg made the second. Voting Yes: Council Member Baier,*  
38 *Council Member Haselton, Council Member Nadelberg, and Council Member Severini.*  
39 *Absent from voting: Council Member Jacobs. The motion carried.*

1       **7. Consideration of appointing Alternate Planning Commissioner Joel Pieper as a Regular**  
 2       **Planning Commissioner to fill the remainder of the term from Jonathan Gunn whose term**  
 3       **ends December 31, 2025**

4           *(Clerk's note: Items 7 and 8 were discussed and voted on concurrently.)*

5       **8. Discussion and consideration to re-appoint Planning Commissioners Rachel Cooper and**  
 6       **Donna Turner and Planning Commission Chair Tony Matyszczyk to serve on the Hideout**  
 7       **Planning Commission for an additional four-year term beginning January 1, 2024**

8           Mayor Rubin discussed the need to fill the vacant position on the Planning Commission left by  
 9           Jonathan Gunn, who was recently elected to the Council. He proposed appointing Joel Pieper, an  
 10          alternate Planning Commissioner, to fill the remainder of Jonathan Gunn's term ending on  
 11          December 31, 2025. Additionally, he recommended the renewal of the terms for existing planning  
 12          commissioners Rachel Cooper, Donna Turner, and Planning Commission Chair Tony  
 13          Matyszczyk.

14          Council Member Baier expressed delight at the willingness of Planning Commissioners to  
 15          continue their service and supported making Joel Pieper a regular voting member. Council  
 16          Member Severini expressed similar sentiments. Council Member Haselton expressed her support  
 17          and gratitude to the Planning Commissioners for their service.

18          Discussion ensued regarding the process of recruiting an Alternate Planning Commission  
 19          Member. A notice would be posted on the website and newsletter with a cutoff date, and the  
 20          applicants would be invited to attend a Council Meeting to discuss their background and interest  
 21          before Council would make a selection.

22       **9. Consideration and possible approval of adopting Resolution 2023-R-XX to update the**  
 23       **Hideout Fee and Rate Schedule to include electrical permitting fees, update remodel fees,**  
 24       **and make technical corrections**

25          Mayor Rubin discussed the proposed adjustments to the Hideout Fee and Rate Schedule, focusing  
 26          on electrical permitting fees, remodel fees, and technical corrections. The changes were further  
 27          explained by Financial Consultant Katie Shepley and Town Attorney Polly McLean, emphasizing  
 28          the need for realignment with other Towns' fee structures.

29          Ms. Shepley clarified the adjustments made to plan review fees and provided a breakdown of the  
 30          costs associated with electrical and mechanical permits. The analysis aimed to ensure that the fees  
 31          were in line with comparable cities and towns, and the proposed changes were considered more  
 32          reasonable.

33          Ms. McLean highlighted additional modifications to clarify escrow fees and ensure compliance  
 34          with state code regarding commercial plan review fees, which were set at sixty-five percent  
 35          (65%).

36          There being no questions from Council, Mayor Rubin asked for a motion.

37           ***Motion: Council Member Severini moved to adopt Resolution 2023-R-13 to repeal and replace***  
 38           ***the Hideout Fee and Rate Schedule to include electrical permitting fees, update remodel fees,***  
 39           ***and make technical corrections. Council Member Haselton made the second. Voting Yes:***  
 40           ***Council Member Baier, Council Member Haselton, Council Member Nadelberg, and Council***  
 41           ***Member Severini. Absent from voting: Council Member Jacobs. The motion carried.***

1 **10. Discussion regarding the upcoming Council Retreat to be held on January 11, 2024**

2 The discussion focused on the upcoming Council Retreat scheduled for January 11, 2024. Due to  
3 the retreat's agenda and the need for additional time to hold a Regular Council Meeting, the Mayor  
4 proposed changing the Regular Meeting and any associated public hearings to a different date in  
5 January. The Council members explored alternative dates and considered their availability. The  
6 consensus reached was to move the January Regular Meeting meeting to Monday, January 15,  
7 2024, at 6:00 p.m. Council Members acknowledged the proposed change, and Recorder Alicia  
8 Fairbourne agreed to send out a calendar reminder.

9 Town Administrator Jan McCosh provided an update on the upcoming Council Retreat. The  
10 Retreat would include the Council, Planning Commission, the Economic Development  
11 Committee, the Town Staff, as well as various individuals from surrounding communities who  
12 had a vested interest in Hideout's future. The focus would be on working toward a strategic plan  
13 that incorporated public input. The Retreat would be facilitated in a workshop format, involving  
14 discussions and idea generation. Ms. McCosh stated the Retreat would kick off with a discussion  
15 on the budget, and the agenda would be finalized and shared soon.

16 **11. Discussion and possible approval of Ordinance 2023-O-XX setting the 2024 Hideout Town**  
17 **Council Regular Meeting Schedule**

18 Mayor Rubin presented Ordinance 2023-O-08, which showed the proposed dates in 2024 for the  
19 Hideout Town Council Regular Meetings. Council Member Severini noted the December meeting  
20 was proposed for the third Thursday and questioned if it was supposed to be on the second  
21 Thursday (December 12). It was determined to be an error and corrected to December 12.  
22 Additionally, as per the previous discussion, the January 11 meeting was moved to January 15  
23 due to the Council Retreat on January 11. The Council discussed and clarified the dates before a  
24 motion was made to approve the Ordinance.

25 *Motion: Council Member Baier moved to approve Ordinance 2023-O-08 with the*  
26 *aforementioned changes. Council Member Haselton made the second. Voting Yes: Council*  
27 *Member Baier, Council Member Haselton, Council Member Nadelberg, and Council Member*  
28 *Severini. Absent from voting: Council Member Jacobs. The motion carried.*

29 Council Member Baier asked when the swearing-in ceremony would be held for the elected  
30 Council Members. Mayor Rubin explained it would be the first item on the agenda at the Retreat.

31 **12. Presentation and recommendation of the traffic study regarding speeds on Shoreline Drive**

32 Mayor Rubin presented the results of a traffic study which was conducted on Shoreline Drive,  
33 addressing concerns about speeding. Mayor Rubin explained that Town Engineer Timm Dixon,  
34 who worked with Epic Engineering on the study was not present during this Meeting to present  
35 and discuss the outcome. Mayor Rubin explained the study suggested measures such as signage  
36 and speed bumps along Shoreline Drive. He highlighted the recommendations, emphasizing a  
37 combination of measures like radar speed signs, speed humps, and narrowing mechanisms.  
38 Council Members discussed the potential cost and effectiveness of these measures, with some  
39 expressing the need for prompt action.

40 Council Member Severini questioned the cost of radar speed signs, and Mayor Rubin explained  
41 the Town already owned two (2) that were to be used for this purpose. There was a discussion

1 about the placement of three-way stops near Ross Creek Drive and additional speed signs. Mayor  
2 Rubin mentioned the challenges of implementing physical measures, such as speed bumps, during  
3 the winter months and explained the consideration of removable options.

4 Council Member Baier raised concerns about the traffic study's recommendations, seeking clarity  
5 on whether multi-way stops were suitable for speed control. Mayor Rubin explained their decision  
6 to use three-way stops in certain locations. Council Member Baier expressed the need for more  
7 information and metrics to prioritize actions.

8 As a courtesy, Mayor Rubin allowed a brief public comment period, in which Lorrinda Lattimore  
9 expressed frustration about the prolonged discussion and emphasized the urgency of addressing  
10 the speeding issue. Council Member Baier reiterated the need for a deeper understanding of the  
11 study and metrics and offered to have a more thorough discussion regarding the challenges the  
12 Town faced in implementing the recommendations with Ms. Lattimore privately.

13 Council Member Nadelberg suggested implementing speed bumps promptly and questioned the  
14 presence of law enforcement on Shoreline Drive. Council Member Severini advocated for a "bias  
15 for action," emphasizing the need for affordable and impactful solutions. Mayor Rubin  
16 acknowledged the urgency and stated he would invite Epic Engineering to present the study and  
17 make recommendations during the January 15, 2024 Council Meeting.

18 The discussion concluded with Mayor Rubin encouraging residents to email their thoughts to  
19 [hideoututah@hideoututah.gov](mailto:hideoututah@hideoututah.gov). The Council acknowledged the need for swift action to address  
20 residents' concerns about speeding on Shoreline Drive.

21 **13. Presentation of an engineering Request for Proposal (RFP) and discussion and possible**  
22 **approval to authorize the Mayor to execute an agreement with the following firms on an as-**  
23 **needed basis in a total amount not to exceed the engineering budget in the annual budget:**

- 24 a) **Ardurra Group**
- 25 b) **Sunrise Engineering**
- 26 c) **Horrocks Engineering**
- 27 d) **Aqua Engineering**

28 *(Clerk's note: Epic Engineering was inadvertently omitted from the original agenda posting.)*

29 Mayor Rubin highlighted the importance of periodically seeking proposals from engineering  
30 companies to avoid complacency and ensure competitive pricing. The goal was to identify three  
31 partners to create a pool for project rotations, allowing for flexibility and a balanced resource  
32 allocation. He noted this approach was common among municipalities to avoid relying solely on  
33 one vendor.

34 Council Member Severini inquired about the contracting model, to which Mayor Rubin explained  
35 that it was a time and material contract with a rate schedule. The discussion also touched on the  
36 specialties of each firm, with Aqua Engineering excelling in water and sewer systems.

37 Council Member Baier raised concerns about coordination and knowledge sharing among the  
38 engineering groups. She felt as though the efforts should be coordinated within one entity. Mayor  
39 Rubin assured her that a detailed plan would be developed to assign specific tasks to each firm,  
40 ensuring efficient project management. The idea was to rotate opportunities among the selected  
41 partners for various projects.

1 Council Member Severini suggested having a summary engineering report for the Town in the  
 2 upcoming retreat meeting, to outline the strategy for 2024 and to address critical issues. Mayor  
 3 Rubin agreed.

4 There being no further questions from Council, Mayor Rubin asked for a motion of support to  
 5 execute agreements with the listed engineering firms, and to include Epic Engineering in the list.

6 ***Motion: Council Member Nadelberg moved to authorize Mayor Rubin to execute agreements***  
 7 ***with Ardurra Group, Sunrise Engineering, Horrocks Engineering, Aqua Engineering, and***  
 8 ***Epic Engineering on an as-needed basis in a total amount not to exceed the engineering***  
 9 ***budget in the annual budget. Council Member Severini made the second. Voting Yes: Council***  
 10 ***Member Haselton, Council Member Nadelberg, and Council Member Severini. Voting Nay:***  
 11 ***Council Member Baier. Absent from voting: Council Member Jacobs. The motion carried***  
 12 ***3-1.***

#### 13 **IV. Public Input - Floor open for any attendee to speak on items not listed on the agenda**

14 Mayor Rubin opened the floor for public comment at 8:05 p.m.

15 *Rachel Cooper* expressed her frustration with not being called on during the speeding discussion  
 16 and mentioned that the residents of Shoreline Phase 1 submitted a petition against speed bumps,  
 17 which included approximately thirty (30) signatures. She emphasized the community's opposition  
 18 to speed bumps and felt unheard. Mayor Rubin responded, stating that he disagreed and  
 19 acknowledged the community's division on the issue. He mentioned receiving petitions both for  
 20 and against speed bumps.

21 Ms. Cooper questioned the specific locations of the proposed speed bumps, but Mayor Rubin  
 22 declined to share that information during this meeting and assured that it would be disclosed when  
 23 the recommendation was presented. He noted that the speed bumps would not be in the same  
 24 location and emphasized the need for community members to drive responsibly.

25 Ms. Cooper suggested placing speed bumps away from homes to minimize noise disruption.  
 26 Mayor Rubin agreed, stating he and Staff would explore ways to implement speed bumps without  
 27 causing excessive noise.

28 *Brian Cooper* shared his positive experience with stop signs and recommended the placement of  
 29 stop signs at Recreation Drive. He recounted an incident while he was snow plowing for the Town  
 30 where a speeding contractor posed a safety hazard due to excessive speeding. He highlighted the  
 31 potential benefits of stop signs in such situations.

32 *Council Member Severini* brought up concerns about the Town's dark sky lighting ordinances,  
 33 citing feedback from residents. Some expressed worries about safety, particularly for those with  
 34 visibility issues due to stringent lighting regulations. Additionally, Severini mentioned requests  
 35 to reconsider the timing of holiday lighting, possibly moving it back to Thanksgiving.

36 Mayor Rubin responded, acknowledging the safety concerns and assuring that safety remained a  
 37 top priority. He explained the dark sky requirements and the need for compliant outdoor lighting,  
 38 emphasizing the dark sky ordinance did not mean homeowners could not have lighting, but should  
 39 ensure it aligned with the dark sky regulations.

40 Council Member Severini suggested revisiting the dark sky ordinance in the future and would  
 41 like to seek information on the results of enforcing the lighting regulations and their impact on

1 safety. He also raised questions about the effectiveness of the dark sky requirements and whether  
2 adjustments might be necessary.

3 Mayor Rubin acknowledged the need for balance in addressing the concerns and noted ongoing  
4 efforts to add streetlights in newer developments. The discussion highlighted the challenge of  
5 finding the right balance between dark sky compliance and ensuring sufficient lighting for safety.

6 *Derek Roper* raised the issue of additional lighting at the north entrance into Hideout on State  
7 Road 248, and suggested prioritizing streetlights for safety at that location. Mayor Rubin  
8 acknowledged the valid point and thanked Mr. Roper for the input.

9 There being no further comments, Mayor Rubin closed public input at 8:15 p.m.

10 **V. Continued Public Hearing Items:**

- 11 **1. Discuss and possibly approve an amendment of the Official Town of Hideout Zoning Map to**  
12 **rezone parcels 00-0020-8182 and 00-0020-8184 (the “Bloom in Hideout” Development) from**  
13 **Mountain (M) zone to Neighborhood Mixed Use (NMU), Residential 3 (R3), Residential 6**  
14 **(R6), Mountain Residential (MR), and Natural Preservation (NP)**  
15  
16 **2. Discuss and possibly approve a Master Development Agreement (MDA) for the Bloom in**  
17 **Hideout Development, which would include nightly rentals in zoning districts that do not**  
18 **currently allow for nightly rentals. Additionally, allowances for certain uses or conditional**  
19 **uses and architecture and/or roof designs that are not currently allowed per the Town’s**  
20 **current zoning ordinances may be included.**

21 *(Clerk’s note: Public Hearing Items 1 and 2 were discussed in conjunction with one another.)*

22 Thomas Eddington provided an overview, emphasizing a focus on policy issues related to  
23 commitments, potential partnerships with the Town, and discussions on infrastructure such as  
24 roads and parkland. The discussion primarily revolved around the maintenance and cost of Town  
25 roads that would be part of the Bloom in Hideout Development. He noted the Public Infrastructure  
26 District (PID) required the roads be dedicated to the Town, rather than kept as private,  
27 Homeowners Association (HOA)-maintained roads. Discussions between Town Engineer Timm  
28 Dixon and Ryan Taylor with Ardurra resulted in calculating the cost to the Town to maintain the  
29 roads would be approximately one hundred thousand dollars (\$100,000) per linear mile per year,  
30 with the assumption that the road would last twenty (20) years.

31 Applicant Jenni Hogan presented information comparing the current zoning with the proposed  
32 zoning for the development and noted the proposed zoning had not changed from the discussions  
33 in the November Council Meeting. She highlighted the increase in property tax revenue and  
34 additional benefits such as trails and open spaces in the proposed zoning compared to the potential  
35 property tax the Town would receive if the land was kept zoned as it was.

36 Sam Hartman from D.A. Davidson presented data on historical road maintenance costs in  
37 Hideout, suggesting an average cost of fifteen to sixteen thousand dollars (\$15-\$16,000) per  
38 paved mile based on a five to ten (5-10)-year study. The applicants calculated there would be two  
39 point one (2.1) miles of paved road, resulting in a cost of between thirty to thirty-four thousand  
40 dollars (\$30-34,000) in total annual maintenance costs.



1 Mr. Hartman further noted the financial analysis calculated the total road funds and franchise tax  
2 collected would net approximately eight hundred and fifty thousand dollars (\$850,000) per year  
3 at full build out, exceeding the expense to the Town.

4 Mayor Rubin noted the historical figures from Hideout may not include fuel or maintenance for  
5 the snowplow vehicles or cost of labor. He acknowledged that, once fully developed, the revenue  
6 generated by the Bloom development would almost certainly exceed the cost to the Town. Ms.  
7 Hogan noted they had considered funding the cost of road maintenance for the first few years in  
8 order to offset costs to the Town. Mr. Hartman mentioned the data pulled for the financial analysis  
9 included fuel, maintenance, equipment leases, personnel, et cetera.

10 Council Member Severini expressed concerns about the varying estimates and the need for  
11 accurate information to ensure the Town and Developer would not face adverse financial  
12 situations.

13 Applicant Ryan Sapp mentioned his willingness to contribute to the road maintenance costs, and  
14 there was a proposal to subcommittee discussions on specific details of the Master Development  
15 Agreement (MDA) related to this topic. He noted that commercial spaces within the development  
16 should be accountable for their own snow removal and maintenance.

17 The discussion also touched on the issue of deferred maintenance, taking into consideration the  
18 impact of construction-related traffic on road wear and tear. Mr. Sapp recognized during the  
19 construction period, heavy trucks and equipment would cause increased road damage and he was  
20 prepared to cover the cost of that damage as part of their five (5)-year plan. Ms. Hogan confirmed  
21 they were willing to come to an agreement with the Town on how long they would be responsible  
22 for maintaining the roads in the development.

23 Council Member Severini emphasized the importance of accurate analyses, considering historical  
24 variations and questioned whether the estimates aligned with reality. Further discussions were  
25 planned to address the varying estimates and ensure mutual success for the Town and the  
26 Development.

27 The applicants then discussed and presented some options for contributions to the Town, which  
28 included point four (.4) acres of land for an amphitheater which could be dedicated to the Town  
29 after it was built. The Town could lease the amphitheater back to the developers to hold special  
30 events. There was also discussion of a monetary contribution of a million-dollar valuation to the  
31 Town, which could be gifted after Phase 1 was complete or in the beginning of 2029, whichever  
32 occurred sooner.

33 Council Member Severini explained that a combination of land and cash contributions would be  
34 most desired, since land would provide long-term value to the Town. Discussion ensued regarding  
35 keeping the proposed designated open spaces as that, noting the reason the Golden Eagle lot  
36 owners were satisfied with the proposed development was because it would not obstruct the views  
37 from their lots. Council Member Severini suggested keeping the commercial development for the  
38 Town closer to SR-248.

39 Discussion ensued regarding the monetary contribution and the potential uses for it. Ms. Hogen  
40 noted she would want the money to be used for something that would benefit the development.  
41 Council Member Severini expressed that any monetary contribution received would either  
42 directly or indirectly benefit the development. Ms. McLean confirmed the contribution would  
43 have to be a holistic benefit to the Town. Ms. Hogan emphasized the importance of making a

1 decision quickly on what contribution would benefit the Town most in order to get the MDA  
2 approved.

3 Council Member Haselton stressed the need for an indoor community gathering space or  
4 community center that could be used year-round, based on feedback from past Town surveys. She  
5 noted that, while outdoor amenities would be beneficial, the snow may prevent the use of outdoor  
6 amenities for several months of the year. Council Member Baier expressed her support of Council  
7 Member Haselton's statements.

8 Ms. Hogan mentioned the commercial district planned for Bloom could potentially host some  
9 community events once developed. She shared the exciting news that a local Golden Eagle lot  
10 owner had signed a Letter of Intent (LOI) to open a bakery there, hoping to make it a community  
11 hub.

12 A discussion followed around whether the contributions should focus more on outdoor amenities  
13 or indoor community space. There was general agreement about wanting flexibility in the  
14 language of the development agreement regarding the contributions. Mayor Rubin suggested  
15 reviewing phrasing from the Richardson Flat MDA that allowed flexibility in phasing  
16 contributions over time.

17 There being no further questions from Council, and Mayor Rubin recognizing that agenda items  
18 1 and 2 were noticed as a public hearing, he opened the floor for public input on both matters at  
19 9:15 p.m.

20 There being no comments from the public, Mayor Rubin closed the floor at 9:17 p.m. and asked  
21 Council for a motion to continue the public hearing to the Council Meeting which was to be held  
22 on January 15<sup>th</sup>.

23 ***Motion: Council Member Severini moved to continue the public hearing items to January 15,***  
24 ***2024 at 6:00 p.m. Council member Haselton made the second. Voting Yes: Council Member***  
25 ***Baier, Council Member Haselton, Council Member Nadelberg, and Council Member***  
26 ***Severini. Absent from voting: Council Member Jacobs. The motion carried.***

## 27 **VI. Committee Updates**

### 28 **1. Design Review Committee - Thomas Eddington**

29 Mr. Eddington stated there was nothing new to report from the Design Review Committee and  
30 that the projects that had been approved were moving forward.

### 31 **2. Parks, Open Space and Trails (POST) Committee - Council Member Baier**

32 Council Member Baier reported that the POST Committee met on November 28, with Jason  
33 Whittaker, the Jordanelle State Park manager, and Timm Dixon, the Town Engineer, as guests.

34 The focus of the discussion was on drainage issues in the State Park, particularly the flooding and  
35 mud on some trails built a few years ago. Glen Gabler, Developer of Shoreline, along with Mr.  
36 Dixon and Mr. Whittaker, worked on a temporary fix involving pipe installation. However, it was  
37 acknowledged that this might not be a permanent solution, and further evaluation in the Spring  
38 was deemed necessary. Future trail rebuilding and maintenance were anticipated once the  
39 flooding situation was under control.

1 The Committee deliberated on the possibility of a local park pass for Jordanelle State Park but  
 2 reached no conclusive decisions. Council Member Baier mentioned the consideration of a survey  
 3 to gauge residents' support for such a pass. The proposed pass would entail a fee for everyone,  
 4 covering day-use fees even for walkers or bikers. Council Member Baier clarified the nuances of  
 5 the proposed local park pass, emphasizing the direct support it would provide to Jordanelle State  
 6 Park's specific projects and maintenance.

7 Funding for projects was discussed, with a notable interest in establishing a nonprofit. Mr.  
 8 Eddington was assigned to lead the follow-up on this idea. Winter trail grooming was also a topic,  
 9 with Mr. Whittaker highlighting equipment limitations. The Committee offered assistance by  
 10 connecting him with contacts, including Council Member Haselton reaching out to White Pine  
 11 and resident John Hopkins to the Coyote Network. Additionally, a video link about a stand-behind  
 12 groomer was sent to Mr. Whittaker.

13 Mr. Hopkins and Deputy Recorder Kathleen Hopkins volunteered to install trail markers, aiming  
 14 to mark waterway east with one hundred (100) four-foot (4') poles. Although uncertainty  
 15 persisted about grooming the trails, the park manager granted permission to mark them.

16 Council Member Baier noted the next meeting would be held in late January, with the next trail  
 17 report expected in February. Mayor Rubin acknowledged the Committee's efforts.

### 18 **3. Transportation Committee - *Council Member Haselton***

19 Council Member Haselton provided detailed information about the three bus lines running from  
 20 Richardson Flat into Park City. The gray bus served Park City Mountain, the brown bus served  
 21 Deer Valley, and the silver bus operated in the evening. She noted the service was free for  
 22 residents.

23 Addressing the question brought up during the previous Council Meeting of pursuing more  
 24 private transportation options, Council Member Haselton proposed not exploring further private  
 25 companies, considering the ease of driving to Richardson Flat and the availability of three bus  
 26 options. Mayor Rubin agreed, noting that most residents have cars and can drive to Richardson  
 27 Flat.

28 Council Member Baier raised the issue of representing the residents at the Todd Hollow  
 29 apartments, suggesting that their specific needs might not be fully considered. Mayor Rubin  
 30 suggested working with Ms. McCosh to reach out to this group and explore their transportation  
 31 needs, especially for those working late hours. Council Member Baier highlighted potential  
 32 challenges for workers getting home late and suggested addressing the need for transportation  
 33 from Richardson Flat to the apartments.

### 34 **4. Economic Development Committee - *Council Member Severini***

35 Council Member Severini discussed ongoing efforts in collaboration with Council Member Elect  
 36 Jonathan Gunn and Planning Commission Chair Tony Matyszczyk. The focus was on the Request  
 37 for Information (RFI) input and determining the next steps in the development process of the  
 38 town-owned land at the Ross Creek entrance. Several meetings had taken place recently to gather  
 39 diverse input, ranging from consulting proposals to exploring potential collaborations with  
 40 consulting companies for guidance on property use.

1 The Committee grappled with questions about whether the next step should be a Request for  
 2 Proposal (RFP) or a hybrid approach that involved a consulting company. Considerations  
 3 included making the property more dense, potentially establishing a town center, and  
 4 incorporating a richer set of commercial elements. Concerns were raised about the timeline for  
 5 property development, with acknowledgment that it might take several years before actual  
 6 development begins.

7 The uncertainty surrounding the finalization of the Richardson Flat Annexation due to court  
 8 proceedings added complexity to decision-making. Council Member Severini emphasized the  
 9 need to take action based on current information rather than waiting for uncertain future events.

10 The discussion touched on the possibility of a phased approach to development, including a  
 11 temporary phase with basic amenities like power, food trucks, and picnic tables, followed by a  
 12 more comprehensive plan in the future. The urgency of moving forward with development plans  
 13 to utilize the Town's prime space for revenue generation was stressed, given the uncertainty of  
 14 future events.

## 15 **VII. Approval of Council Minutes**

### 16 **1. June 8, 2023 Town Council Meeting Minutes DRAFT**

17 Council Member Baier noted on page three (3), line two (2), Katie Shepley's title should be  
 18 Financial Consultant.

### 19 **2. June 30, 2023 Town Council Meeting Minutes DRAFT**

20 There were no changes.

### 21 **3. November 8, 2023 Town Council Meeting Minutes DRAFT**

22 Council Member Haselton noted two corrections. The first being on page ten (10), lines two (2)  
 23 through six (6). She felt the minutes did not adequately convey what was said, and would like the  
 24 minutes changed to state, "She expressed difficulty in the expectation that Council Members had  
 25 adequate time to read the council packets when they were sent out to Council Members twenty-  
 26 four (24) hours prior to the meeting."

27 The second correction was on page seven (7), line forty (40), the sentence should be changed to,  
 28 "...reduce density and focus on early commercial development...".

29 There were no further changes.

30 *Motion: Council Member Haselton moved to approve the Council Meeting Minutes of June*  
 31 *8, 2023, June 30, 2023, and November 8, 2023 with the aforementioned changes. Council*  
 32 *Member Baier made the second. Voting Yes: Council Member Baier, Council Member*  
 33 *Haselton, Council Member Nadelberg, and Council Member Severini. Absent from voting:*  
 34 *Council Member Jacobs. The motion carried.*

## 35 **VIII. Follow Up Items from Approved Council Minutes**

36 Council Member Severini pointed out that on page eight (8) on the November set of minutes,  
 37 resident Don Blumenthal noted he would provide additional input regarding the electric vehicle  
 38 (EV) charging stations at the Bloom Development. He asked Ms. Fairbourne to follow up with  
 39 Mr. Blumenthal to ensure his comments were received and the consideration was factored in.

1 Mayor Rubin inquired if other municipalities or the state had made changes to accommodate EV  
2 stations in newly developed parking lots. Mr. Eddington stated he had not seen any new  
3 legislation regarding the requirement of EV charging stations. Ms. McLean stated the same,  
4 however she noted that the Town could pass an ordinance to require charging stations. Ms.  
5 McCosh stated the Utah League of Cities and Towns (ULCT) had discussed the topic in a recent  
6 meeting and she would follow up with information from the ULCT. Mr. Eddington noted the  
7 requirement could also be incorporated into the Bloom MDA without having to pass a town  
8 ordinance.

9 **IX. Closed Executive Session - Discussion of pending or reasonably imminent litigation,**  
10 **personnel matters, and/or sale or acquisition of real property as needed**

11 There being no further public business, Mayor Rubin asked for a motion to move into Executive  
12 Session.

13 *Motion: Council Member Severini moved to close the public portion of the Council Meeting*  
14 *and reconvene in a closed Executive Session. Council Member Baier made the second. Voting*  
15 *Yes: Council Member Baier, Council Member Haselton, Council Member Nadelberg, and*  
16 *Council Member Severini. Absent from voting: Council Member Jacobs. The motion carried.*

17 The public meeting adjourned at 9:49 p.m. and reconvened in a closed Executive Session at 9:55  
18 p.m.

October 2023



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## Summary

This report documents a traffic study conducted by Epic Engineering for the town of Hideout, Utah. As a result of a growing population, the Town of Hideout has experienced an increased number of vehicles utilizing city streets. Public safety is an important component when considering a city's population growth. In order to maintain the highest standard of safety for its citizens, the Town of Hideout contracted Epic Engineering to assess vehicle speeds, perform a stop sign warrant study, and present traffic calming recommendations. The following report contains the traffic study results.

## Introduction

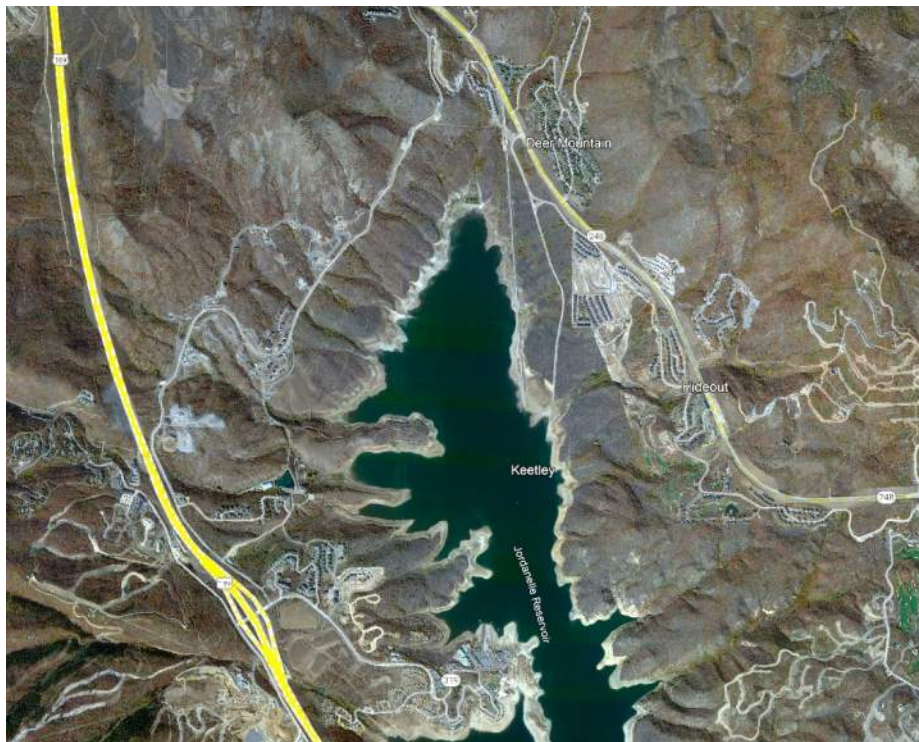


Figure 1. Map of Hideout, Utah.

The town of Hideout covers approximately 2,500 acres of mountainous terrain. The town's location is in the northwestern corner of Wasatch County nestled northeast of the Jordanelle Reservoir and west of US Route 248 (see figure 1). The town was established in 2008 with an original population of 665 residents. Hideout is a growing town boasting a population of 1,152 residents in 2010 and has a projected population of 3,300 by 2040.

During a recent city-wide road upgrade, several speed humps were removed. Speed humps are often placed on residential streets to force motorists to slow down to a safe speed. According to the U.S. Department of Transportation Federal Highway Administration, speed humps can be

effective at reducing speed by nearly 10 mph. The removal of the speed humps generated a concern for maintaining safe vehicular speeds within the community. Concern for public safety prompted the town of Hideout to contract with Epic Engineering to monitor vehicle speeds, perform a stop sign warrant study, and offer recommendations to reduce vehicle speeds.

## Spot Speed Test

A spot speed is the instantaneous speed of a vehicle at any specific location. A spot speed test is conducted by measuring the individual speeds of a sample group of vehicles passing a given spot on a street or highway. Spot speed studies are used to determine the speed distribution of a traffic stream at a specific location. The data gathered in spot speed studies is used to determine vehicle speed percentiles, which are useful in making many speed-related decisions such as speed limits, traffic control devices, roadway design elements, monitoring traffic speed trends, and measuring effectiveness of traffic control devices or programs.

Epic Engineering performed a spot speed study on Tuesday 26, 2023 on N Shoreline Dr near the intersection of N Shoreline Dr and Silver Loop. Traffic volume and speed were recorded in hourly increments for a total of 246 vehicles and an average speed of 25 MPH (See table 1).

Vehicle speed was measured with a Bushnell speed gun. A speed gun transmits radio frequency energy in the form of waves. The radar transmits 24 billion RF cycles of energy per second at the speed of light, which is 186,000 miles per second. The speed gun measures the difference between transmitted and received signals and relays this information to the DSP. The speed accuracy is within +/- 1 MPH. The maximum speed recorded was 40 mph, and the minimum was 13 mph.

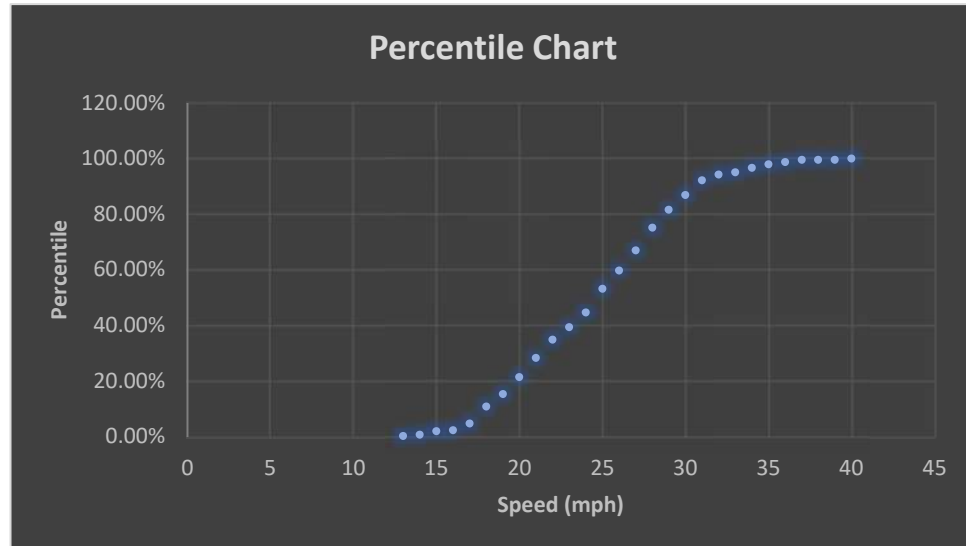
## Spot Speed Test Results

The spot speed frequency distribution table displays speed percentiles (see Table 2). Speed percentiles are tools used to determine effective and adequate speed limits. The 50<sup>th</sup> percentile of speed represents the median speed of the traffic stream. The 85<sup>th</sup> percentile is used in evaluating /recommending posted speed limits based on the assumption that 85% of the drivers are traveling at a speed they perceive to be safe (Homburger et al. 1996). Generally, the 85<sup>th</sup> percentile of speed is assumed to be the highest safe speed for a roadway section. Observed speeds may be slower in rainy or snowy conditions.

The result of the Spot Speed study, as shown in figure 2, illustrates the 50<sup>th</sup> percentile and 85<sup>th</sup> percentile for speed is 24.6 mph and 29.6 mph, respectively.

According to the data collected, the average speed on North Shoreline Dr is 25 MPH. The posted speed for Shoreline Dr is 20 mph. The percentage of vehicles with a speed between 20-27 mph is 52%. Vehicles with a speed of more than 27 MPH is 33% and less than 20 mph is 33%.

A report from the Wasatch County Sheriff’s Department was obtained. In the town of Hideout during 2023, the sheriff’s department reported 57 vehicle stops between the months of Jan and March and 53 vehicle stops between April and June. Two accidents were reported during April and June (See appendix A for the traffic report).

### Stop Sign Benefits

The city of Hideout has proposed adding stop signs to Shoreline Dr intersections as a traffic calming measure. The intersections in question are local streets along Shoreline Dr. All of the intersections are currently single stop intersections with the stop signs being placed on the local streets. Shoreline Dr is a collector street and has no stop signs.

A stop sign is a valuable and effective control device when used in the correct place and under the correct conditions. Appropriately placed stop signs benefit the flow of traffic by assigning the right-of-way at an intersection. Stop signs can also reduce the number of accidents in an intersection, especially accidents involving left turns. However, when stop signs are overused, they can cause motorists to become complacent and disobey the stop sign which can lead to more accidents. Overused stop signs also cause drivers to stop more frequently adding unnecessary delays, often resulting in drivers speeding between stop signs.

The Manual on Uniform Traffic Control Devices (MUTCD) is a set of well-developed, federal and state recognized guidelines to indicate when stop signs would be beneficial. These guidelines take into consideration the probability of vehicles arriving at an intersection at the same time, the length of time traffic must wait to enter, traffic delays, and the availability of safe crossing opportunities. According to MUTCD Section 2B.05 Stop Sign Applications, “stop signs should not be used for speed control. Stop signs should be installed in a manner that minimizes the numbers of vehicles having to stop.”

Epic Engineering used the MUTCD guidelines and standards in considering placing stop signs in intersections along Shoreline Dr. The intersections were evaluated to determine if additional stop signs would help maximize traffic flow and minimize personal risk.

## Stop Sign Installation Standards

Multiway stop control can be useful as a safety measure at intersections if certain traffic conditions exist. Safety concerns associated with multiway stops include pedestrians, bicyclists, and all road users expecting other road users to stop. Multiway stop control is used where the volume of traffic on the intersecting roads is approximately equal. The restrictions on the use of stop signs described in Section 2B.05 apply to single and multiway stop applications.

The MUTCD has defined the criteria used for the evaluation of the intersections as follows:

1. Traffic signals are warranted and urgently needed, and the multiway stop signs are an interim measure.
2. A crash problem, as indicated by five or more reported crashes in a 12-month period that are susceptible to correction by a multi-way stop installation.
3. Minimum volumes warranting a multi-way stop:
  - a. The vehicular volume entering the intersection from all approaches must average at least 300 vehicles per hour for any 8 hours of an average day, and
  - b. The combined vehicular, pedestrian, and bicycle volume entering the intersection from the minor street approaches (total of both approaches) averages at least 200 units per hour for the same 8 hours, with an average delay to minor-street vehicular traffic of at least 30 seconds per vehicle during the highest hour.

The MUTCD further suggest the following additional criteria to be considered in an engineering study:

1. The need to control vehicle/pedestrian conflicts near locations that generate high pedestrian volumes.
2. Locations where a road user, after stopping, cannot see conflicting traffic and is not able to reasonably safely negotiate the intersection unless conflicting cross traffic is

also required to stop.

## Stop Sign Warrant Results

Single stop intersections are warranted along Shoreline Dr. A stop sign should be placed stopping the traffic on Overlook Loop, Silver Hill Loop, Recreation Dr, and Shoreline Ct. According to the guidelines and standards presented by MUTCD, the intersections along Shoreline Dr do not meet the criteria for multi-way stops for the following reasons:

1. There is no need for street lights in the near future therefore, temporary multi-way stops are not necessary.
2. The intersections along Shoreline Dr are not experiencing 5 or more accidents within a 12-month period.
3. Shoreline Dr is not experiencing the volume of cars necessary to warrant multi-way stops.
4. According to accident reports and vehicle volume there is no need to control left turns.
5. Shoreline Dr does not have high pedestrian crossing areas to warrant a stop sign.
6. Intersections along Shoreline Dr have clear visibility of approaching vehicles.

The MUTCD does not support the use of stop signs to be used as speed control and should only be placed if MUTCD criteria has been met. Stop signs are frequently violated if unwarranted. A stop sign that is not warranted due to low traffic volume is seen by drivers as unnecessary. Drivers will often ignore or roll through the stop sign. Drivers will also feel they need to make up for time lost while slowing down and stopping for a stop sign by increasing their speed in between stop signs.

## Traffic Calming Recommendations

Although the average speed recorded during the spot speed test is 25 mph, 33% of the vehicles sampled were traveling above 27 mph. When concern for public safety due to vehicle speeds is considered, the implementation of traffic calming measures can be a positive benefit to a community. The Institute of Transportation Engineers defines traffic calming measures as “a combination of implementations to reduce the negative effects of motor vehicle use, alter driver behavior, and improve conditions for non-motorized street users”.

Traffic calming consists of physical design and other measures put in place on existing roads to reduce vehicle speeds and improve safety for pedestrians and cyclists. Four common traffic calming designs are non-physical, vertical, horizontal, and narrowing measures. Non-physical measures encourage public education to ensure citizens understand the importance of traveling at safe speeds, vertical measures are implemented by raising the road forcing drivers to slow down through the raised areas, horizontal measures are implemented by placing curves in the road encouraging drivers to choose slower speeds to navigate the curves safely, and narrowing measures narrows the lane causing the drivers to feel uneasy in a smaller lane and slowing down to a safer speed. The following are traffic calming recommendations with descriptions,

approximate effectiveness, and approximate costs. Please refer to Appendix B for illustrated examples of less common traffic calming measures.

### Non-Physical Measures

Non-Physical Measures are measures such as signage or speed enforcement that do not require any construction or physical modifications to the roadway. These items can be attempted first since these can be economical and can be easier to remove if they do not improve the problem.

#### a. Community Education

Public awareness of safe driving speeds, especially through residential areas, is an essential asset to a community. Flyers, monthly newsletters, and meetings offer opportunities to inform and remind the community of speeding issues and concerns, and the importance of safe driving. Various resources and literature are available to inform the community on these issues. The cost for community education is negligible.

#### b. Community Gateway Identity Signage.

Community Gateway treatments involve the combined use of sign installations, landscaping, textured pavements, name plates, monuments, or other arrangements placed at the entrance of a neighborhood to communicate a sense of neighborhood identity. The installations serve to inform motorists they are entering a community where there is a significant change in the driving environment such as a transition from a rural or urban road to a residential street. Cost varies. The average reduction is approximately 2 mph.

#### c. Speed Enforcement

For areas where vehicle speed has been deemed excessive, speed enforcement can be a temporary traffic calming measure. For low volume streets, periodic daytime speed enforcement is the best option. Another option available for speed enforcement is a radar trailer device, which measures and displays a vehicle's speed as it approaches. The legal speed limit is shown in clear view next to the vehicle's speed. This reminds drivers to slow to the appropriate speed. These devices are easily transported and utilized rapidly at different locations. Approximate Cost: Varies

#### d. Radar Speed signs

Another option that is very similar to a radar trailer device is called radar speed sign. The difference between this device and other radar devices is that this is permanent or semi-permanent. The device can also have the capability of storing data overtime and providing historical speed information to the city. This device measures and displays a vehicle's speed as it approaches. The legal speed limit is shown in clear view next to the vehicle's speed. This reminds drivers to slow to the appropriate speed. Approximate Cost: \$10,000.



- e. Signage  
Signage such as speed limit and various restriction type signs can be used as a traffic calming measure. Approximate Cost: \$250 per sign.
- f. Speed Legend  
Speed legends are numbers painted on the roadway indicating current speed limit. These are usually painted near the speed limit signposts. Speed legends may be useful for reinforcing speed reduction between different roadway segments (e.g., from one functional class to another or at major residential entry points).
- g. Improve Visibility Around Crosswalks.  
Equip crosswalks with high-visibility paint and markings, appropriate lighting, textured surfaces, and orange flags.
- h. Additional Fine Signs.  
When properly implemented and posted on a residential street, impose a \$200 fine for speeding in addition to the typical fine. The Additional Fines require a formal acceptance process including a request by resolution of the local governing body for the signs, verification that there is a speeding problem and that the increased penalty has community support. The cost is about \$750 per sign. Unknown how effective this is in reducing speeds.

### Vertical Speed Control Measures

Vertical Speed Control Measures are vertical elevated segments of roadway that require a vehicle to slow down. Typical vertical speed control measures include speed humps, speed tables, raised sidewalks and raised intersections.

- a. Speed Hump  
A speed hump is a raised rounded device usually constructed from asphalt that is placed across a roadway. Speed humps are usually 3 to 4 inches in height and are parabolic or sinusoidal (e.g., gradual) in shape. They extend fully across the roadway but are tapered on each side to allow unimpeded water flow in curb and gutter system. The design speed for a speed hump is approximately 15-25 mph.
- b. Modified Speed Hump: Speed Lump  
Speed lumps are similar to speed humps, except they are divided into three lumps with one foot of space between each lump. The space between the lumps is specifically designed to accommodate the axle width of fire vehicles. All other vehicles with smaller axle widths have to go over the humps from at least one side of the vehicle. Speed lumps are typically 12-14 feet long. Extreme care must be taken to ensure the height of the speed lump can accommodate the ground clearance of fire vehicles. Speed humps were observed to reduce speed approximately 7 mph or approximately 22%. Approximate Cost: \$1,500 to \$4,000.

c. Speed Table

A speed table is a raised flat-topped device, which is placed across the roadway. Speed tables are usually 3 to 4 inches in height. The flat-top is approximately 10 feet in the direction of travel and each ramp is 6 feet. The flat-top is usually constructed of asphalt, concrete, brick, or other textured materials. The ramps are parabolic in shape and are usually made of asphalt. Speed tables extend fully across the roadway but are tapered on each side to allow unimpeded water flow in curb and gutter systems. The design speed for a speed table is approximately 30 mph, which is a safe and comfortable speed for passenger vehicles. Speed tables were observed to reduce speed at least 3 mph or approximately 9%. Approximate Cost: \$4,000 to \$15,000 depending on materials used.

d. Raised Crosswalk

Raised crosswalks are speed tables with crosswalk markings and signage. The only geometric difference between them is the raised crosswalk extends from curb to curb and the raised crosswalk may be longer and higher than a typical speed table. The most similar device for which data is available is a 22-foot speed table, which can reduce speed at least 6 mph or approximately 18%. Approximate Cost: \$4,000 to \$15,000 depending on materials used.

e. Raised Intersection

Raised intersections are like speed tables that cover an entire intersection. Ramps are present on all approaches. The flat-top area is usually a textured material. Raised intersections usually rise to sidewalk level or slightly below to provide an edge for the visually impaired. If there is a concern about loss of on-street parking, raised intersections are a more acceptable traffic calming measure. Approximate Cost: \$25,000 to \$70,000 depending on materials used.

### Horizontal Speed Control Measures

Horizontal Speed Control Measures are altered segments of roadway, where the straight line of travel has been altered in order to require a vehicle to slow. Typical horizontal speed control measures are traffic circles, roundabouts, chicanes, and lateral shifts.

a. Traffic Circle

A traffic circle is a raised island placed in an intersection causing traffic to negotiate around the island. Generally, traffic circles are circular in shape and have some type of landscaping in its center. Also, traffic circles have outer rings (i.e., truck apron or lip) that are mountable so large vehicles can circumnavigate the small radius traffic circle. Traffic circles were observed to reduce speed at least 3 mph or approximately 11%. Approximate Cost: \$20,000 to \$40,000 for asphalt streets and \$30,000 to \$60,000 for concrete streets.

b. Roundabout

A roundabout is similar to a traffic circle. It also has a raised island placed in an intersection with circulating traffic. However, roundabouts generally are much larger than traffic circles and need more land for construction. Roundabouts are used at

intersections with higher traffic volumes and are designed for higher speeds. Roundabouts generally have raised splitter islands that deflect traffic to the right, which help form gaps in traffic. Roundabouts may also have flared entry lanes, which increase the capacity of the intersection. Roundabouts may also have bypass lanes to allow drivers to travel through the area without entering the intersection at all.

Effectiveness: Effectiveness is inconclusive. Speed entering roundabouts is affected by geometric curvature design features. However, roundabouts have been shown to reduce crash frequencies. Approximate Cost: \$100,000 to \$250,000 depending on materials and dimensions.

c. Chicane

Chicanes are curb extensions or edge islands that alternate from one side of the roadway to the other. These curb extensions or edge islands give the roadway more “winding” attribute. Curb extensions or edge islands can be semicircular, triangular or squared off. Trapezoidal islands have been found to be more effective at reducing speeds than semi-circular shapes. Curb extensions or edge islands should have a vertical element to draw attention to them. Trees and other landscape materials are an option. For low-speed roadways or roadways that lack right-of-way, mountable curbs are also an option to allow larger vehicles to maneuver through the chicanes. Chicanes can also be formed by alternating on-street parking from one side of the roadway to the other. Parking bays can be created using striping or by installing landscaped islands at each end. Effectiveness: Effectiveness is inconclusive. Approximate Cost: \$40,000 per chicanes (i.e., curb extensions or edge islands).

d. Lateral Shift

A lateral shift is like a chicane however the roadway alignment only shifts once. It is only one curb extension or edge island rather than a series of alternating curb extensions or edge islands. Because the road alignment shifts only once, the crossing speed is approximately 5 mph higher than a series of chicanes. A higher speed means that lateral shifts can be placed on higher functional classification roadways (i.e., collectors or arterials). Typical lateral shifts incorporate a landscaped center island to separate opposing traffic. This prohibits drivers from veering into the opposing lane. Effectiveness: Effectiveness is inconclusive. Approximate Cost: Varies depending on size of offset and length of transition.

### Narrowing Measures

Narrowing Measures are short roadway segments that are narrower than the typical roadway section. Typical narrowing measures are lane striping, neckdowns, chokers, and island narrowing.

a. Lane Striping

Lane striping can be used to create formal bicycle lanes, parking lanes and/or edge lines. The striping “narrows” the travel lane for vehicles and may encourage drivers to lower their speeds. This measure is low cost and requires no construction. Approximate Cost: \$0.20-\$0.30 per lineal foot.

b. Neckdown

Neckdowns are curb extensions at an intersection. These neckdowns reduce the roadway width from curb to curb and provide shorter pedestrian crossing distances and times. The short curb return radius also reduces the speeds of turning vehicles. The most similar device for which data was available is called narrowing, which can reduce speed at least 2 mph or approximately 4%. Approximate Cost: \$10,000 to \$40,000 per corner.

c. Choker

Chokers are curb extensions at mid-block that narrow the roadway by widening the sidewalk, planting strip, or centerline. A typical two-lane choker is 20 feet from curb to curb. One-lane chokers narrow the roadway to just one travel lane. This is similar to a one-lane bridge condition. The constricted length in the direction of travel varies but should be kept short enough not to block driveways or accesses. Approximate Cost: \$10,000 to \$40,000 depending on site conditions and landscaping.

d. Center Island

Center islands are raised barriers in the center of the roadway that narrow the travel lanes. The center island should be large enough to draw attention (e.g., 6 feet wide by 20 feet long). The center island can also be offset to the left from the perspective of approaching traffic. They are often landscaped and can be used as refuge for pedestrians crossing the roadway. Center islands create intermittent left turn areas rather than a continuous median. Center islands placed at intersections or entrances to neighborhoods are often called gateways. The most similar device for which data was available is called narrowing, which can reduce speed at least 2 mph or approximately 4%. Approximate Cost: \$10,000 to \$20,000 per 100 feet depending on site conditions and landscaping.

## Conclusion

The average speed on Shoreline Dr is 5 mph above the posted speed of 20 mph. The town of Hideout could see a decrease in speed by implementing traffic calming measures. Public education is the most cost-efficient measure. Public awareness is important in maintaining community safety. The town of Hideout may experience slower traffic by placing speed legends, painted crosswalks, and implementing vertical measures at residential entrances. When selecting a traffic calming measure to implement, there are several items to consider: is the measure cost effective, is the measure effective at slowing vehicle speeds, does the measure hinder emergency vehicles, and what is the level of construction involved are just a few considerations. Implementing traffic calming measures can add order and beauty to city streets, while slowing drivers and creating a safer environment for the community.

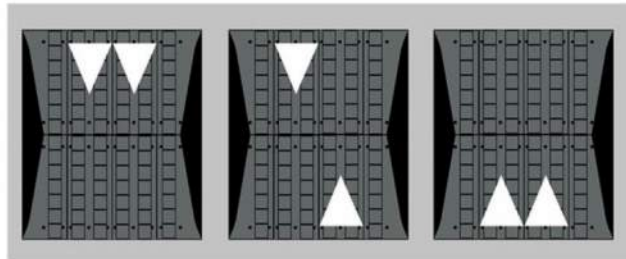

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#### TASK REQUEST

The Town of Hideout requested that Epic Engineering provide additional recommendations for Traffic Calming Options along Shoreline Drive, with general focus on the intersection of Recreation Drive. In October 2023, the Town of Hideout had Epic Engineering conduct a Traffic Study to determine the number of vehicles and the speeds at which they were traveling along North Shoreline Drive. The report that was provided to the Town is titled “Hideout Utah North Shoreline Traffic Study” (October 2023). Recommendations are based upon the data and information provided in this original report.

#### GENERAL BACKGROUND

Shoreline Drive is a collector road and has a signed speed limit of 20 mph and the majority of this roadway has a pavement width of 22'. At the time this study was conducted, it was determined that the average speed of vehicles traveling along this roadway was 25 mph with 33% of the overall vehicles traveling above 27 mph. The total number of vehicles that traveled during the period of 7 am to 6 pm was 246. Also based on MUTCD (Manual of Uniform Traffic Control Devices) Standards, Shoreline Drive did not meet the requirements for recommendation of stop sign placement along this collector road (a more detailed description can be seen in the original report). It should also be noted that potential liability risks are possible with traffic accidents occurring in areas where stop sign placements are not warranted.

#### TRAFFIC CALMING LIMITATIONS

The report described a number of ways traffic calming could be accomplished by Non-Physical Measures, Vertical Speed Control Measures, Horizontal Speed Control Measures, and Narrowing Measures. The section of Shoreline Drive near the intersection of Recreation Drive is 22' wide and has a narrow overall road Right-of-Way. Therefore, this limits the possibility of Horizontal Speed Control measures such as traffic circles, roundabouts, medians, etc. Vertical speed control measures such as speed bumps, and speed tables were discouraged by the Town on previous

road improvement projects and also can create issues with snow removal as well as delayed emergency vehicle response times.

## EXISTING IMPROVEMENTS

Currently the Town has used Non-Physical Measures by installing a Radar Speed Sign on the East side of Recreation Drive Intersection as the road slopes downward to this intersection. Additional 20 mph Speed Limit Signs are posted at various locations along Shoreline Drive. There are no existing stop signs restricting travel along Shoreline Drive, only single stop intersections of oncoming roadways, including the intersection of Recreation Drive.

## GENERAL COMMENTS

Another way that traffic calming could be improved in these areas is by means of additional Narrowing Measures like Lane Striping and Non-Physical Measures like Speed Legends. The basic concept of traffic calming striping is to reduce the driver's perceived width of the roadway and by doing this the drivers tend to reduce their speeds to maintain travel in the distinguished lanes. The painting of speed legends, demonstrating boldly on the asphalt surface bring awareness to the driver's perception of posted speed limits and severity of these limits in these areas (an example of a Speed Legend can be seen in Appendix B of the Original Report). These types of traffic calming improvements have been know to reduce travel speeds from 2 to 7 mph in other case studies. One of the major advantages is the cost of these improvements. It can be implemented less expensively that many other options and can be modified or removed without major cost implications. These types of improvements also do not impact emergency service vehicles as they are responding to emergency events. It is also helpful to increase police enforcement time in these specific areas.

## RECOMMENDATION AND SUMMARY

**We would recommend that the Town first consider Narrowing and Non-Physical Measures including:**

- 1) The installation of a Solid Double Yellow Line (4" standard stripping width) along Shoreline Drive. An outer Solid White Line (4" standard) could also be added to declare a 10' travel lane widths, but may not be as effective as the existing road asphalt width is 22' wide.**
- 2) That a Speed Legend be painted at the location of the installed Radar Sign and possibly at a location West of the Recreation Drive intersection.**
- 3) Police enforcement have more concentrated time at this location.**

**Secondly, if these improvements do not provide the satisfactory results for the Town, we would then recommend Vertical Speed Control Measures be considered such as:**

- 1) The installation of Speed Humps or Speed Tables at key locations.**





HIDEOUT ORDINANCE #2024 – O –01

ORDINANCE AMENDING TITLE 10 CHAPTER 16 SECTION 040  
“DEFINITIONS” TO ALLOW HOLIDAY LIGHTS FROM THANKSGIVING  
TO MARCH 1 EACH YEAR

WHEREAS, the Town of Hideout (“Town”) enacted a Dark Skies Ordinance on October 22, 2022; and

WHEREAS, the Dark Skies Ordinance only allowed for Holiday Lighting between December 1st and March 1st; and

WHEREAS, the Council desires to extend the allowed dates for Holiday Lighting to run from Thanksgiving to March 1st each year.


NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE HIDEOUT COUNCIL OF HIDEOUT, UTAH, THAT:

SECTION I: Title 10 Chapter 16 Section 040 “Definitions” in hereby amended as written in Exhibit A.

SECTION II: Effective Date. This resolution shall take effect upon publication.

### EXHIBIT A

#### 10.16.04 DEFINITIONS

Correlated color temperature (CCT): the temperature at which a blackbody emits radiant energy competent to evoke a color the same as that evoked by radiant energy from a given source (such as a lamp).

Dark sky fixture or fully shielded: any light fixture that is designed or shielded in such a manner that all light rays emitted by the fixture, either directly from the lamps or indirectly from the fixture are projected below a horizontal plane running through the lowest point of the shield.

#### Examples of Acceptable / Unacceptable Lighting Fixtures



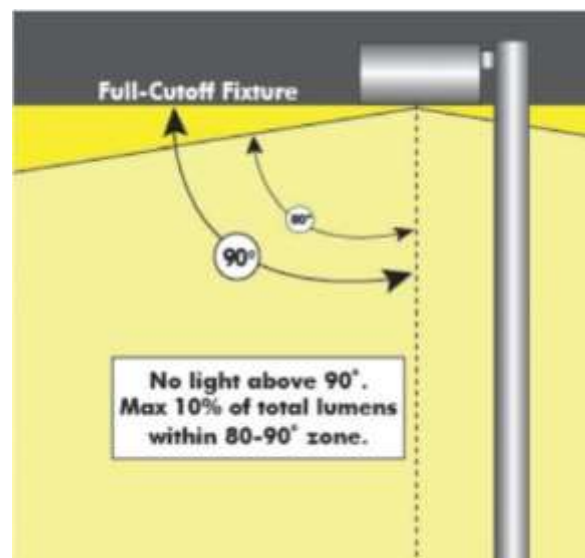
*The lights on the left are non-conforming. Those on the right can be used in most cases. Depending on the mounting height and proximity to the property line, additional shielding may be necessary to prevent the luminous elements from being visible from any other property.*

fixture. These include but are not limited to, for example, fixtures outfitted with caps or housings or installed under canopies, building overhangs, roof eaves or shielded by other structures, objects or devices.

Electronic messenger system (EMS): electronic messenger system with scrolling messages.

Emergency lighting: lighting as required by civil officers, agents, utilities and officials to perform their duties to maintain the public health, safety and welfare.

Full Cut-off Fixtures: fixtures, as installed, that are designed or shielded in such a manner that all light rays emitted by the fixture, either directly from the lamps or indirectly from the fixture, are projected below a horizontal plane running through the lowest point on the fixture where light is emitted.



*Full cutoff fixtures do not allow any light to be emitted above the fixture. The fixture controls glare by limiting the light output at 10 degrees below the horizontal.*

Holiday lighting: temporary lighting for a specific celebration which may be one of the following types:

- Holiday lighting is permitted from ~~December 1<sup>st</sup>~~ Thanksgiving – March 1<sup>st</sup> and must be turned off from midnight to 6am daily.
- Festoon type low-output lamps, limited to small individual bulbs on a string.
- Up lighting of wreaths and similar holiday items is permitted provided that individual lamps are less than 10 watts and 70 lumens.
- Low-output lamps (less than 50 watts and 750 lumens) used to internally illuminate yard art.
- Flood or spotlights producing less than 2000 lumens each whose light source is not visible from any other property.

Kelvin: relating to, conforming to, or having a thermometric scale on which the unit of measurement equals the Celsius degree and according to which absolute zero is equal to  $-273$  degrees Celsius.

Light fixture: any device intended to produce outdoor illumination.

**Light trespass:** light emitted from fixtures designed or installed in a manner that unreasonably causes light to fall on a property other than the one where the light is installed, in a motor vehicle driver's eyes, or upwards toward the sky.

**Lumen:** a unit of luminous flux equal to the light emitted in a unit solid angle by a uniform point source of one candle intensity.

**Major addition:** enlargement of 25% or more of the buildings gross floor area, seating capacity, or parking spaces, either with a single construction project or cumulative series of construction projects after the enactment of this ordinance. The term also includes replacement of 25% or more of installed outdoor lighting.

**Minor addition:** enlargement of less than 25% of the buildings gross floor area, seating capacity or parking spaces, either with a single construction project or cumulative series of construction projects after the enactment of this ordinance. The term also includes replacement of less than 25% of installed outdoor lighting.

**Motion sensor:** any device that turns a light fixture on when it detects motion and off when motion stops or very shortly thereafter (5-10 minutes).

**Nits (candela):** the base unit of luminous intensity in the International System of Units that is equal to the luminous intensity in a given direction of a source which emits monochromatic radiation.

**Switch:** any device that can be manually controlled by a person to turn a light fixture on and off. For the purpose of this chapter, switches include motion sensors, but switches do not include light sensors or timers.

**Temporary:** refers to lighting as required by citizens to carry out legally approved activities for durations as specified in the permits for those activities. These include but are not limited to, for example, activities such as nighttime agricultural operations, construction work lighting, and seasonal decorations, but in no case for more than a period of 60 days without an exemption granted by the town of Hideout.
