The goal is to have the caseload near **650** cases per officer, thus giving opportunity for proactive policing and providing community oriented policing.

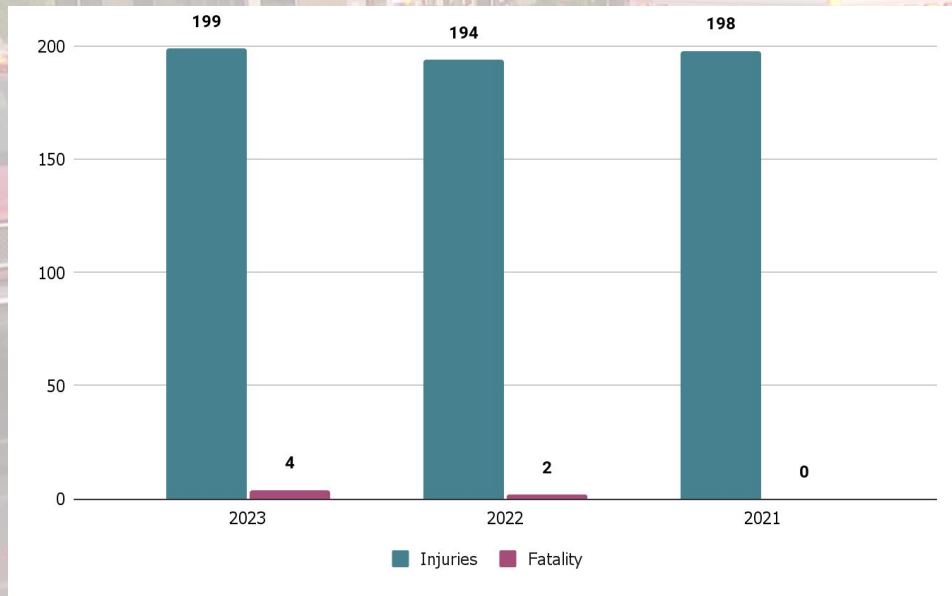

Update on 2023 Flooding Reimbursement

- President Biden signed a Disaster Declaration for Utah on 12/23/23
- “Federal funding is available to state, tribal, and eligible local governments and certain private nonprofit organizations on a cost-sharing basis for emergency work and the repair or replacement of facilities damaged by the flooding in the counties of Iron, Morgan, Sanpete, Utah, and Wasatch.

Next steps:

- 1) Notice of intent to apply for Public Assistance (PA) has been submitted to the state
 - 2) We will be assigned a representative from FEMA to work with through the whole process
 - 3) We will schedule an “exploratory call,” followed by a Recovery Scoping meeting
 - 4) Damage inventory will be gathered, and a full application for reimbursement will be submitted
 - 5) If awarded, the State DEM will receive the funds, then disperse them accordingly. We will go through a close out process and everything will be finalized.
- This PA is a 75/25 match. Donated time, employee time, resources and volunteers can be used for that match.
 - We need to go after insured properties first.
 - Mitigation costs may be covered up to 100% by the 406 Mitigation funds. This will be determined with the help of our FEMA rep. All of our work will be determined either emergency or permanent work.
 - This will take time, but at least the ball is rolling!

Other notable projects:

- Held various departmental tabletop exercises
- Created Incident Action Plans (IAP's) for large city events including Fiesta Days, Wings & Wheels and others
- Held 2 CERT classes with 18 graduates
- Trained city employees in active shooter response, CPR, First Aid, Stop the Bleed, departmental disaster response, and running an emergency shelter for residents
- Worked with Utah County to submit expense report for FEMA reimbursement from the flood
- Obtained AEDs, Med-sleds and Stop the Bleed kits for Library Hall, Trauma kits for our School Resource Officers, and Narcan kits for the Police Department.
- Purchased HAZMAT trailer to serve Spanish Fork and surrounding agencies
