INTERLOCAL AGREEMENT

Between

SUMMIT COUNTY, CITY OF FRANCIS, CITY OF KAMAS, and CITY OF OAKLEY

For

FUNDING THE STATE ROUTE 32 CORRIDOR AND CITY CENTERS PLAN

THIS INTERLOCAL AGREEMENT, (the "Agreement") is made and entered into this
day of, 2024 (the "Effective Date"), by and between SUMMIT COUNTY,
a political subdivision of the State of Utah ("County"), the CITY OF KAMAS, a municipality
of the State of Utah ("Kamas City"), the CITY OF OAKLEY, a municipality of the State of Utah
("Oakley City"), and the CITY OF FRANCIS, a municipality of the State of Utah ("Francis
City"). The County, Kamas City, Oakley City, and Francis City are hereafter sometimes referred
to individually as a "Party" and collectively as the "Parties."

WITNESSETH

WHEREAS, the Parties are local governmental units and "public agencies" and are therefore authorized by the Utah Interlocal Cooperation Act, Utah Code Section 11-13-101, *et. seq.* (the "Act") to enter into agreements with each other for joint and cooperative action which will enable them to make the most efficient use of their powers on a basis of mutual advantage; and

WHEREAS, the Parties are working closely together towards an integrated State Route 32 corridor plan for eastern Summit County; and,

WHEREAS, on or about December 6, 2023, the Parties jointly submitted a grant application to the Utah Department of Transportation ("<u>UDOT</u>") to receive funding to conduct a State Route 32 Corridor and City Centers Plan, more particularly described below in Section 1 (the "<u>Project</u>); and,

WHEREAS, on February 29, 2024, UDOT awarded a monetary grant of \$135,000.00 toward the costs of the Project (the "<u>Grant</u>"); and thereafter Oakley City entered into a grant agreement with UDOT (the "Grant Agreement"); and,

WHEREAS, the Parties have agreed to provide up to \$15,000.00 in matching funds toward the costs of the Project; and,

WHEREAS, the County has agreed to manage the Project with coordination and participation from the other Parties; and,

WHEREAS, the Parties desire to continue cooperating with each other on the Project; and

WHEREAS, the Parties desire to enter into this Agreement whereby their respective responsibilities concerning the Project are specifically set forth.

NOW, THEREFORE, in consideration of the mutual promises, covenants, and conditions hereinafter set forth, the Parties hereby agree to enter into this Agreement under the provisions of the Act to foster the legitimate interests the Parties to actively work together on the Project. The Parties recognize that the Project transcends political jurisdictional boundaries, and intergovernmental coordination is essential for protecting lives and property and for facilitating the efficient use of available assets both public and private.

- 1) Project: The State Route 32 Corridor and City Centers Plan will create a vision and plan for addressing transportation, land use, and economic development issues along the SR-32 corridor with a focal point on the city centers of Francis City, Kamas City, and Oakley City. The results will be a State Route 32 Corridor and City Centers Plan with actionable implementation steps to direct progress towards the identified goals.
- 2) <u>Finance and Budget</u>: The Project shall be funded by the Grant together with matching funds from the Parties (the "<u>Matching Funds</u>"). The Parties shall provide Matching Funds as follows:
 - (a) Summit County: \$5,000.00
 - (b) Oakley City: \$4,000.00
 - (c) Kamas City: \$3,000.00
 - (d) Francis City: \$3,000.00
- 3) Oakley City Responsibilities: Oakley City shall exercise primary responsibility for Grant management, including budgeting, tracking, and reporting compliance to UDOT (the "Grant Manager"). Oakley City shall also exercise primary responsibility to collect and account for the Matching Funds from the Parties and expend them on the Project as needed.
- 4) <u>City Responsibilities</u>: While the County serves as the Project Manager, Oakley City, Kamas City, and Francis City will act in a supportive and informational role for the Project. These cities will review materials, be responsible as it pertains to their own city related items and make suggestions on all regional items.
- 5) <u>Duration</u>: Pursuant to Utah Code §11-13-206, the term of this Agreement shall commence upon the Effective Date. This Agreement shall terminate December 31, 2025. This Agreement may be extended by mutual written consent of the Parties but under no circumstance shall the term exceed five (5) years.
- 6) <u>Termination</u>: Pursuant to Utah Code §11-13-206, the Parties agree that this Agreement may be terminated, with or without cause, by any Party upon at least thirty (30) days advance written notice to the other Parties, in which event an accounting shall be made

- of all funds, whether spent, unspent, or encumbered, as of the effective date of termination. If the Project is terminated prior to completion, each Party will receive its pro rata share of the unexpended Matching Funds.
- 7) No Partnership Created. Nothing contained in this Agreement shall be deemed or construed, either by the Parties hereto or by any third party, to create the relationship of principal and agent or create any partnership, joint venture, or other association between the Parties.

8) Indemnification and Immunity.

- (a) The Parties are governmental entities under the Governmental Immunity Act of Utah (Utah Code §63G-7-101, et. seq., as amended) (the "Governmental Immunity Act"). Consistent with the terms of the Governmental Immunity Act, the Parties agree that each Party is responsible for any negligent acts or willful misconduct which it commits or which are committed by its authorized agents, officials, or employees, and no Party shall have any liability whatsoever for any negligent acts or willful misconduct of the others, its agents, officials, or employees. The Parties do not waive any defenses or limits of liability otherwise available under the Governmental Immunity Act and all other applicable laws, and all Parties maintain all privileges, immunities, and other rights granted by the Governmental Immunity Act and all other applicable laws. The Parties agree to assume any and all legal costs for their own defense.
- (b) Each Party (an "<u>Indemnifying Party</u>") agrees to indemnify, hold harmless, and defend and release the other Parties (the "<u>Indemnified Parties</u>"), their agents, officials, and employees from and against any and all suits, claims, and proceedings for loss, damages, injury or liability, arising out of the conduct of the Indemnifying Party and its employees and agents in the performance of the Project, unless caused by the negligence or willful misconduct of an Indemnified Party.
- 9) Governing Law. It is understood and agreed by the Parties hereto that this Agreement shall be governed by the laws of the State of Utah both as to interpretation and performance without regard to principles of conflict of laws. All actions, including but not limited to court proceedings, administrative proceedings, arbitration and mediation proceedings, shall be commenced, maintained, adjudicated and resolved within the jurisdiction of the State of Utah.
- 10) Compliance with Laws. Each Party agrees to comply with all federal, state and local laws, rules and regulations in the performance of its duties and obligations under this Agreement. Any violation by any Party of applicable law, rule or regulation, shall constitute an event of default under this Agreement. Each Party is responsible, at its sole expense, to acquire, maintain and renew during the term of this Agreement, all necessary permits and licenses required for its lawful performance of its duties and obligations under this Agreement.
- 11) <u>Severability</u>. In the event that any condition, covenant or other provision hereof is held to be invalid or void, the same shall be deemed severable from the remainder of this Agreement and shall in no way affect any other covenant or condition herein contained.

If such condition, covenant, or other provision shall be deemed invalid due to its scope or breadth, such provision shall be deemed valid to the extent of the scope or breadth permitted by law.

- 12) No Assignments. No Party shall assign its performance, duties or obligations under this Agreement or any portion of this Agreement without the prior written consent of the other Parties.
- 13) No Third-Party Beneficiaries. There are no intended third-party beneficiaries to this Agreement. It is expressly understood that enforcement of the terms and conditions of this Agreement, and all rights of action relating to such enforcement, shall be strictly reserved to the Parties, and nothing contained in this Agreement shall give or allow any claim or right of action by any third person under this Agreement. It is the express intention of the Parties that any person, other than the Party who receives benefits under this Agreement, shall be deemed an incidental beneficiary only.
- 14) Entire Agreement. This Agreement contains the entire agreement between the Parties hereto related to the transactions and services contemplated hereby and all prior or contemporaneous agreements, understandings, representations, and statements, oral or written, with respect to the subject matter hereof are merged herein. This Agreement may be modified only by a subsequent written instrument approved and signed by all Parties.
- 15) Notice. All notices to be given under this Agreement shall be delivered to the Parties as follows:

Except as otherwise provided in this Agreement, any notice, demand, request, consent, submission, approval, designation or other communication which any Party is required or desires to give under this Agreement shall be made in writing and mailed, faxed, or emailed to the other Parties. A Party may change its address, telephone number, facsimile number, or email address from time to time by giving notice to the other Parties in accordance with the procedures set forth in this section.

- 16) <u>Counterparts</u>. This Agreement may be executed in several counterparts and all so executed shall constitute one agreement binding on all the Parties, notwithstanding that each of the Parties are not signatory to the original or the same counterpart. Further, executed copies of this Agreement delivered by facsimile or electronically shall be deemed an original signed copy of this Agreement.
- 17) Relief of Obligation. This Agreement does not in any way relieve any Party of any obligation or responsibility imposed upon it by law (Utah Code §11-13-208).
- 18) Interlocal Cooperation Act Requirements. In satisfaction of the requirements of the Act, the Parties agree as follows:
 - (a) This Agreement shall be conditioned upon the approval and execution of this Agreement by the Parties pursuant to and in accordance with the provisions of the Act, including the adoption of resolutions of approval, but only if such resolutions of the legislative bodies of the Parties are required by the Act.

- (b) In accordance with the provisions of Utah Code §11-13-202.5(3), this Agreement shall be submitted to the attorney authorized to represent each Party for review as to proper form and compliance with applicable law before this Agreement may take affect.
- (c) A duly executed copy of this Agreement shall be filed with the keeper of records of each Party, pursuant to Utah Code §11-13-209.
- (d) No separate legal entity is created by the terms of this Agreement. To the extent that this Agreement requires administration other than as set forth herein, it shall be administered by the chief executive officer of each Party.
- (e) No real or personal property shall be acquired jointly by the Parties as a result of this Agreement unless this Agreement has been amended to authorize such acquisition. To the extent that a Party acquires, holds, or disposes of any real or personal property for use in the joint or cooperative undertaking contemplated by this Agreement, such Party shall do so in the same manner that it deals with other property of such Party.

Background

Summit County has partnered with the cities of Kamas, Oakley, and Francis to receive a Utah Department of Transportation (UDOT) Technical Planning Assistance (TPA) grant of \$150,000 to conduct a State Route 32 Corridor and City Centers Plan.

The communities in eastern Summit County are at a pivotal stage. State Route 32 is a regional corridor that connects the rapidly growing communities of Oakley, Kamas, and Francis to recreation and economic activities in Summit and Wasatch Counties, and the highway also forms the main streets for community life. The SR-32 Corridor and City Centers Plan will create a vision and plan for addressing transportation, land use, and economic development issues with a focal point on the city centers of Francis, Kamas, and Oakley. Following this plan, the eastern Summit County communities will be able to evaluate how to balance the various needs of the corridor, define policies and actions, and guide redevelopment, policies, and infrastructure improvements that reflect the community vision and goals. Likewise, Summit County will be better situated to address upcoming transportation infrastructure projects, such as the Hallam Road extension

Staff is requesting council approval of the Interlocal Agreement, including a local funding match of \$15,000, with Summit County committing to \$5,000, with the remaining \$10,000 from the partner cities. The county matching funds have been allocated to the transportation department budget for 2024. The project will begin this summer with an expected completion of Summer 2025.

Background:

In 1991 the Summit County Commission implemented a 1% tax to be charged on all restaurant sales within Summit County. The 2024 grant cycle is the 33rd year of Restaurant Tax Grant awards in Summit County.

This year there are 55 applications requesting a total of over \$5.3M in grant funds. The total money available to grant this year is approximately \$4.1M.

Process:

The committee meets annually before the application goes online to review the process, set the calendar for this year's meetings, and address any concerns from the committee. At the end of the Grant application collections, each committee member receives a copy of all the applications through the Summit County "Box." The applications are then divided and assigned to each committee member to act as a liaison answering any questions and confirming that the application is complete in preparation for the presentations. This year that equaled five or six applications per member. The committee then scheduled a meeting to review and discuss applications. The committee scheduled two (2) full days of 15- minute interviews with all applicants. The applicants were given 15 minutes to present their grant proposal and for committee questions.

The Committee ranks each application based on six criteria:

- 1. <u>Sustainable Tourism</u> How does the proposal increase tourism, especially overnight visitors, in a sustainable manner using the definition from the World Tourism Organization?
- 2. Does the project generate <u>cultural tourism?</u>
- 3. The ability of the project to <u>leverage</u> grant funds from other sources of funding and to generate positive partnerships.
- 4. Potential of the project to increase the one percent (1%) Restaurant Sales Tax
- 5. Is the proposed project new or developing.
- 6. Does the project provide or maintain a tangible or iconic <u>asset</u> that enhances tourism in the County?

The Committee members assign each application a score based on the following point system:

Tourism Based = 20 points; Cultural Tourism = 10 points; Leverage = 15 points; Increase One Percent (1%) Tax = 20 points; New or Developing = 10 points; Asset = 25 points

There are varying degrees of tourism components included in these applications. The Committee's review process concentrates on the applicant's ability to augment the Restaurant Tax Fund by sustainably attracting day and overnight visitors, particularly from outside of Summit County.

Some of the applications are for marketing promotion with the sole purpose of bringing visitors to the County. In other cases, the application is for an event, service or facility that will enhance the experience of guests visiting the area.

The Committee recognizes and agrees that some local events and facilities, while not directly driving overnight visitation, provide opportunities for guests to enjoy their stay in Summit County and enhance the perception of the County as a desirable vacation destination.

<u>2024 Timeframe:</u> Note that all SCRTAC members attended trainings and meetings were held in accordance with the Utah Open Meetings Act

The committee met on Wednesday January 31st, 2024, to establish this year's application, set the calendar of meetings and review our process.

Applications forms were made available on County website March 1st and the submission deadline was 5:00 pm March 29th, 2024.

This year we hosted a grant applicant information meeting on March 8th at 5:00pm. This was made known and available to the public and notified via Utah Public Notice and the Summit County Website.

The Committee held a two-2-hour meeting to divide and review the applications on April 8th at 12:00pm at the Quinn's Public Health Building. Applicant interviews were held from 9:00am –

5:00pm on April 10th, at the Richin's Building, and 11th at the Summit County Courthouse. On April 12th the Committee met at the Richin's Building from 8:00am until 11:30am to rank the applications and make recommendations for awarding grant funds.

This year there were no Grants that were disqualified for funding this year for late financial filing. The committee did, however, decided against funding 2 applications:

41-24 Snyderville Basin Special Recreation District- Field House Equipment

- The Committee felt that this project as presented did not meaningfully enhance public recreational opportunities nor draw additional tourism to Summit County. This was the lowest scoring grant reviewed.

55-24 Weilenman School of Discovery

- The Committee advises the Weilenman School's proposal and application did not meet four of the six criteria to receive Summit County Restaurant Tax funding. This was the second lowest scoring grant reviewed.

Other Business: None

On behalf of the Committee Members, we appreciate the opportunity to Serve in this important role assisting County Council in distributing these important funds to enhance the quality and sustainability of life and tourism in Summit County.

Through a partnership with the Lamar group they can leverage Restaurant Tax funds to maximize exposure to arriving visitors as well as the regional population to make the trip to Summit County to visit our Museums, therefore driving daily visitation for our shops and restaurants. According to the grant presentation, 95% of Museum visitors ate out on the same day that they visited the museum.

2024 RECIPIENT RESPONSIBILITIES: Grant funds will be used for the advertising expenses as presented in the Spring & Fall of 2025. Please make sure the SCRTAC Logo is utilized as much as possible in advertising as well as any materials relevant to the grants support. On February 13, 2024, Summit County received the request for mailing for the petition for parcel SS-104-B to annex into Park City, referred to as the Robbins Annexation. The proposed annexation area consists of approximately 0.93 acres, located near Thaynes Canyon and includes parcel SS-104-B. A map of the area is attached as Exhibit A and outlined below in yellow.



The proposed annexation area is currently zoned Rural Residential (RR) and is located in the Snyderville Basin Planning District. The parcel is surrounded by properties within Park City and is also located within the Annexation Plan Area of Park City. The Park City Council accepted the petition for further consideration on March 7, 2024.


The petitioner, Brad Mackay with Ivory Development, LLC, seeks to annex into Park City and work with the City to determine the density and types of development that could be allowed on the property.

On April 5, 2024, the County received the certified petition. Under Utah Code §10-2-407, the County has the right to protest the annexation within 30 days of receiving the certified petition.

Staff reviewed the proposed annexation and finds it complies with <u>Utah State Code §10-2-402</u> and does not see any reason to formally protest the annexation.
