Mayor O'Hare said Good evening, everybody. We'd like to welcome everybody tonight to the Wednesday, April 10, 2024, town hall meeting of Snowville. We want to recognize our council members Rod McGary, LuAnn Johnson, and Heather O'Hare. We also want to recognize our Clerk and Treasurer, Stacey Hill, and Tammie Morgan. My name is Scott O'Hare. I'm the Mayor, and we're going to go ahead and start with the pledge from LuAnn Johnson, followed by the prayer by Rod McGary.

LuAnn Johnson said I Pledge allegiance to the flag of the United States of America and to the Republic for which it stands one Nation under God indivisible with Liberty and Justice for all.

Rod McGary said Our dear Heavenly Father as members of the Snowville, town Council we wish to offer our thanks unto thee for blessings, for being part of our lives, to bless us with thy goodness, and pray that we may be able to have thy help and assistance in providing the services and the needs of the town, and to think of the residents Here, and to be able to accomplish those things before us and have thy guidance with us, to be able to accomplish these things in the most equitable manner. We thank thee for the opportunities we have, and we pray to be directed in all things. And pray for health, for strength and for Thy blessings to be upon our town, to be directed and that we may have joy and happiness in our town, we ask in the name of thy son, Jesus Christ, Amen. Mayor O'Hare said Thank you LuAnn, Thank you, Rod.

Okay. Before we start, I just want to remind everybody this is a town council meeting for the town council to discuss and vote on the needs of the town. We will not be talking or communicating with anybody in the members of the public, if you want to talk to the town council and ask questions and stuff you need to be put on the agenda. Okay, we do stop at the end of the meeting. We do allow public comment. So if you have any public comments, I suggest you write them down on your paper while we do our

meeting. And then at the end, you can have a public comment, but it won't be a question and answer. Question and answer with the town council. This meeting is made and is for the town council to discuss and vote. So if there's anything on your mind that you need to address to the town council, we ask that you please contact Stacey and get put on the agenda to address the town council and anything that you have questions about. Thank you. Everybody's been on the town council has been given the acceptance, or, I'm sorry, the agenda and the minutes from the previous meeting. Were there any changes that you saw that needed to be done? Nope, okay, so if I could get an acceptance of today's agenda, wait a minute first. I'm sorry, was there anything that needed to be added to the agenda? No, okay. If I can get a motion to accept the agenda and the minutes from the previous meeting.

Rod said to make a motion to accept the current agenda for the month of April and to also accept the meetings from the prior March.

Mayor O'Hare said I have a motion from Rod. Do I have a second?

LuAnn said Second?

Mayor O'Hare said LuAnn Second, All in favor. Any opposed?

Mayor O'Hare said okay, passed.

Mayor O'Hare said violations, a number. It's going to be SOV 003.

Rod asked if this was a new one.

Mayor O'Hare said No, no, no, this is an old one. I'm sorry. I apologize. This is an old one in your book.

Rod said SO what.

Mayor O'Hare said SOV 003.

Rod said okay.

Mayor O'Hare said okay.

Mayor O'Hare said Is that? Did you get the right one? I'm sorry.

Rod said all three.

Mayor O'Hare said No, no, I'm sorry. I'm getting confused. Yeah, in front of the tab 003

Rod said so, you're saying oh, right before.

Mayor O'Hare said yeah, right before the 003.

Rod said Okay, gotcha.

Mayor O'Hare said not after the tab. Before the tab.

Rod said before?

Mayor O'Hare said Because I think the way these are set up, the violation is before the tab, right? Okay, no, okay, so it's SOV 002, sorry, yeah, it'll be after the tab, after 002, sorry.

LuAnn said I don't have anything.

Mayor O'Hare said You don't Okay, that's fine. You can have mine. Sorry that yours isn't updated. This violation was at court today. I did have LuAnn go down a couple days ago, took some pictures, and looked at him. It is the person who has done what he was

asked to do. It's taken a long time, but so I emailed the attorney and let him know that it's been satisfied to the towns and that he can go ahead and not continue the court dates anymore and go ahead and close the court date so that one is finished. Okay. Now you all have manila envelopes with new violations in them.

The first one is SVO 009, so it'll be up on your right, top right. These have all been emailed to you as well. So this is again, this one has been taken if you notice, this one is going to have six months to get this taken care of. October 7, 2024 I did talk to this individual on the phone. He's supposed to come down here after the town council meeting tonight, meet with me to go over this and then sign it.

LuAnn asked What's the legal action? It'll be taken if it's not taken care of?

Mayor O'Hare said then what we discussed last month, the legal action will then, if he doesn't abide by this by the date, October 7, then it will be sent over to Blair Wardell, and he will subpoena it for court, and then the person, we are going to give him 30 days. And if, then, if he doesn't have it done after that, then fines will be imposed. I don't know what else we can do. I don't know if we gotta get with the lawyer on that, on whether, can you seize the property and have it done that needs to be done.

LuAnn said at their expense.

Mayor O'Hare said at their expense. I don't know what the next thing is. That would be something for Mr. Molgrad and Mr. Wardel to discuss with each other. But then on the second 100, I'm sorry, SVO, 010, this one is right here on Main Street, just on the east side, so he will have 30 days to get that taken care of.

LuAnn asked if they have these have already been served?

Mayor O'Hare said No, no, these are going to be served tonight. Yeah, and then SVO 011, is over on 300 North, and this one will be hopefully, I'm going to get this served tonight. I don't. I'm sure I can find this person, that or not, if not, we will. I have this. I have the format of this already, and we will change the dates on them and then get them out to them. We have, we actually have an address on this person, don't we? So, yeah, so I can, I can sign this before I leave tonight, and we can get in the mail tomorrow? Stacey said Yeah.

Mayor O'Hare said yeah, Will you certify it over to him.

Stacey said do you want certified mail?

Mayor O'Hare said Yeah. So those are the three that we'll be working on now. Do we have any questions on that one? Everybody in agreement on that?

LuAnn said Yeah.

Mayor O'Hare said Council member, seat, vacancy, anybody?

Rod said I was wondering if we should approach Casey Smoot?

Mayor O'Hare said He's in the town now, isn't he?

Rod said Yes. Has he?

Mayor O'Hare said has he been annexed over a year? It has to be a year. Okay, is that we can't take any questions. Sorry, not a question. Well, we can't Yeah. So let Yeah.

Let's talk to him, and let's see what his annexation was, and he has to revise too.

Tammie said So, right, he just barely moved into his residence.

Mayor O'Hare said but, the whole thing is, has been.

Tammie said Oh, I thought it was just his parcel wise.

Mayor O'Hare said No, it's where he's living now, that whole thing is, yeah. It's the first section of it, right?

Rod said Yeah, he's been living in the arena areas, right?

Mayor O'Hare said And I think the arena is part of the town, yeah.

Rod said that was my assumption. That is my question. So if.

Mayor O'Hare said I guess, we would check that, and then, yeah, I would approach him, see if he's even interested in it.

Rod said Okay, I kind of mentioned it to him, and maybe.

Mayor O'Hare asked Did he seem interested?

Rod said Yeah.

Mayor O'Hare said Anybody else? No,

LuAnn said I have talked to everybody, I know.

Mayor O'Hare said Okay, well, we'll continue with Casey, and we'll find out his annexation. We'll find out the boundaries real quick.

Mayor O'Hare said Oneida County contract is signed and sent back to the office.

Stacey good with that Park Cemetery, mowing the streets. The road positions are open. So we only had two people that applied for the Park and one person that applied for the Cemetery. The bad thing is, only one person applied for the Park and only one person applied for the Cemetery. The good thing is, it's the same people that did it last year, so we didn't have any complaints, except for one complaint that we're going to discuss with the person.

LuAnn said I do not think Brent applied?

Stacey said No.

Mayor O'Hare said well, that can always be taken over, but so do I so. So Jesus is the one for the Cemetery, and Brian Hernandez is the one for the Park. So Brian, finished up the mowing last year for me. When, my when we had the contract to do it, and then I had to leave because of my job. Then I hired Brian to come in to do it. And Brian, I think, did a good job. I mean, I didn't hear any complaints about it so, and he's willing to pull the water and everything. So we would just have to get it.

Stacey asked the Bowery and stuff too?

Mayor O'Hare asked to do what?

Stacey asked the Bowery to clean it and, like, open and clean the Bowery.

Mayor O'Hare said Yeah,

Stacey said because it is being rented out. Okay.

Mayor O'Hare said Well, if he Yeah, if it's rented out, we can either that or Heather can go down and take care of that, because she oversees it.

Stacey said I have it rented out like, two weekends in a row.

Mayor O'Hare said yep. So if the following is agreed, we will go ahead and offer those positions to Jesus and Brian and get them back on. We're starting on May 1 again. Is that correct? May 1, and then September. The end of September will be the last. So May 1.

Rod asked for six months.

Mayor O'Hare said five months. That's a five-month thing.

Actually, I don't see it here and I but the church, we have to, yeah, I'll talk to you after this. Well, it doesn't matter Stacey said what's on the bottom.

Mayor O'Hare said is it? Oh, okay, well, we'll talk about them. Okay, so before this, we had the public hearing for resolution number 2024, dash 0401, except the electronic meetings. During the meetings, we had comments of changing, since this is a town, not a city, everything that's in this wording anywhere where it says of the city, we need a change to town. Does everybody agree with that?

LuAnn said Yep.

Mayor O'Hare said Okay, so we will rewrite this change from city to town on the resolution, because we're just adding this section trying to address the requirements. Town Council. So everywhere where it says city will change over to town, I will work on that in the next couple of days. Get it over to you guys. Everybody can proofread it, make sure that there's nowhere I missed. And then if it's good, then as long as the council is ready, we can vote on accepting the proposed resolution for Title One, chapter six, section four, I would need a motion to accept or deny.

Rod said So are we going to accept the changes?

Mayor O'Hare said Sorry.

Tammies said we need to wait until it's all changed and put it back on the agenda, because.

Mayor O'Hare asked oh, we don't vote on it tonight?

Tammie said no because there you have public comment.

Mayor O'Hare said Okay, so we will. So okay, so we will, it'll be back. We'll put this back on next month. We'll make the changes, we'll get it over to everybody, and then we will read it at the next meeting to make sure. Here. Do we have to have another public hearing on it or not, so we'll read it, and then, as long as all those cities are changed to towns, then we will be good.

Stacey said I apologize for that.

Mayor O'Hare said I thought we could vote on it.

Mayor O'Hare said Box Elder County Sheriff. Not again. Okay? So I have not called the sheriff himself, but I will reach out to him when we still haven't received the emails back from him. Monday, can we, well, you know what? I'll just, let's say, Monday, can we email him again and see if he can ask him. Just tell him, I need to talk to him and maybe give him my phone number and see if he'll call me. Stacey said she would.

Mayor O'Hare said next, engineer, Forsgren, sorry. Eric, yep.

Eric said So I came to collect the homework.

Rod said I sent mine to Stacey.

LuAnn said I couldn't get mine to fill in.

Eric said Scott?

LuAnn said I can do it really quickly.

Eric said This is important.

LuAnn said I started, I already know what I'm going to put.

Eric said yeah, far right column. Make that all five.

Mayor O'Hare said Yeah.

Eric said it sounds good.

Mayor O'Hare said I apologize. I did not do mine either. Eric said Okay. Do you want to do those tomorrow?

Mayor O'Hare said yeah,

LuAnn said I couldn't get mine to send it on my phone.

Mayor O'Hare said let's send it to, let's send it to stay safe, to Stacey in the town email.

Eric said Okay, does that sound good? Then, yeah,

Mayor O'Hare said to do homework.

Heather said I did mine on paper, but I left it, but I asked how to do it because I can't figure it out either.

LuAnn said So I have this one, and I had already started it, and then I forgot this way.

Rod said Just fill it out and scanned.

Mayor O'Hare said I filled it out really you should have called. Okay, all right, thank you.

Mayor O'Hare said Oh, the stop sign.

LuAnn said Keith Oman we'll let you have a minute, if that's okay with everyone, stop sign.

Mayor O'Hare said stop sign.

LuAnn said the sign, the signs on the stop sign.

Keith Oman said I was just gonna wait till the end.

Mayor O'Hare said Okay, yeah, let's wait. Because we gotta, we gotta do the meeting. We gotta get back to where it's normal.

Eric said Gotcha.

Stacey said there were no batteries.

Mayor O'Hare said So they bought a battery. Did they put it in?

Stacey said Yeah, it doesn't work.

Mayor O'Hare said it doesn't work.

Stacey said the invoice that you sent me is that who we bought it from.

Eric said it is from the Utah Commercator, I'll call Kade. We know I'm your workforce.

Mayor O'Hare said What do you recommend? As far as we need to get two signs that go on each side that says cross traffic does not stop.

Eric said Oh

Mayor O'Hare said and put it underneath the stop sign, that's fine. Do you recommend we go and just order them online?

LuAnn said Keith and already taken care of them.

Eric said Okay?

Mayor O'Hare said So we can go ahead. We don't need to go through the people who put it up to this.

Eric said okay.

Mayor O'Hare said very good. Thank you, Eric, appreciate it.

Next on the agenda is the Snowville Fire Department

Chief Pugsley. A couple of quick things.

Mayor O'Hare said yes, sir.

Jed asked first one's the invoice from Teton.

Mayor O'Hare said yep.

Jed said for the radios that were installed in the crash truck and the tower.

Mayor O'Hare asked the tower, is this all together, just the radios?

Jed said Just radio, nothing out of pocket for the tower. Mayor O'Hare said gotcha.

Jed said this is just the radios and the installation.

Mayor O'Hare said okay.

Jed said so they are operational.

Mayor O'Hare asked if they were in the vehicles and if they were working good.

Jed said Yeah, so far.

Mayor O'Hare said okay,

Jed said the signal is kind of weak right here in town, but that's what the tower is fixing.

Mayor O'Hare said Okay.

Jed said they've had Rocky Mountain Power in the last two days, working on installing the generator as well. And so they are optimistic it'll be like next two weeks that'll be fully functioning and ready to go. We're waiting for the concrete to cure before they put their tower up.

Mayor O'Hare asked okay do they know about when that'll be done, the curing?

Jed said Um, they said three weeks after they poured it, Mayor O'Hare said okay.

Jed said a week ago.

Mayor O'Hare said yeah. So we're on week two, okay?

Jed said not too long, I think I sent it to Stacey, but that \$2,663.56 would be approved in expenses.

Mayor O'Hare said, yep.

Jed said that was already.

Mayor O'Hare said well, it was approved. But we're gonna go ahead and vote on the final pay it once you, once you're finished your with what you need

Jed said perfect.

Mayor O'Hare said perfect.

Jed said um, open residential burn, so it's back open now for people to burn, lawn clippings, branches, trees, all that sort of stuff that will be open through May 30. If there's still a permit required, they can call me, they can call the county, or they can fill it out online. All that was just posted on the Snowville Town or Snowville Stone Facebook page. Mayor O'Hare said okay.

Jed said and keep in mind, the agricultural burning is open year-round, so that's anybody that has more than five acres and is burning fence lines, pastures, all that sort of stuff. So there's no open and closed window for agricultural burns.

Rod said but we still need to coordinate through you.

Jed said yep, there's still a permit required through either myself or through the county um truck inspections, so all our emergency vehicles are up for their yearly inspection. Safety inspections. I'll call Brian he was the mobile mechanic. Will come out and get them all done. He's done them before.

Mayor O'Hare asked if he was one that did them last year, right?

Jed said two years ago.

Mayor O'Hare said okay.

Jed said that way we don't have to run each individual vehicle.

Mayor O'Hare said that it's better to have somebody come down here, correct?

Jed said I'm not sure the cost on that yet, but I'll just call him and get it done. We can address that later. The county will pay for their three trucks.

Mayor O'Hare said yeah, the county will pay for their trucks.

Jed said so and put them there on the county's bill.

Mayor O'Hare asked do we have I do we have a bill from that last year. this yearly, correct? What did it cost us last year to do it? Off the top of your head?

Jed said it came from Nick. It was over in my shop.

Mayor O'Hare said yeah.

Jed said sorry I can't remember off the top of my head, it was part of the service, and everything that was done wrong.

Mayor O'Hare asked if was it more than \$500.

Jed said I don't think the seasons are but I could be wrong. How we did it two years ago is we just kind of came out and did them and then approved the expenses after.

Mayor O'Hare said okay.



Jed said the last one is, I give Tammie a casual contract. It's just our MOU

Tammie said yeah, as I was looking at it, it does require the attorney, so like Scott will need to sign it, and then either Stacey or I, and then the attorney needs to say.

Jed said awesome.

Mayor O'Hare asked does it needed to be notarized.

Tammies said No, this one doesn't need to be notarized. Mayor O'Hare said great, okay.

Tammie said we just needed our seal on it. We have our seal.

Mayor O'Hare is right.

Jed said it's just an MOU contract that would allow us to go into Cassia County and Cassia County to come into Box Elder County.

Mayor O'Hare said basically, mutual aid.

Jed said yep.

Mayor O'Hare asked for a mutual aid contract, with Cassia County.

Jed said so, that's Burley, Cassia County, so out on 42 Mayor O'Hare said yeah.

Jed said by Curlew Valley junction, and as soon as that turns into Idaho, that's Cassia County.

Mayor O'Hare said oh, okay.

Jed said everything west, sorry, kind of south and west of I -84.

Mayor O'Hare said okay.

Jed said and so like where the mine is situated, that's technically Cassia County.

Mayor O'Hare said okay.

Jed said so we'll get all that figured out. It's already been signed by Box Elder County.

The only reason we're having to sign it, as far as Fire and EMS is, because we're doing it MOU with Box Elder County.

Mayor O'Hare said right.

Jed said so it's just formalities.

Mayor O'Hare said okay.

Jed said other than that, any questions for me from the council? Stacey, Tammie.

Mayor O'Hare asked oh, just a question. Exit, five-mile marker. Five Mile Marker four.

So has the state come out and started inspecting that road?

Jed said I think so.

Mayor O'Hare said, is that a Keith question? Okay, we'll talk to him at the end. Then perfect. I was just curious because my pager went crazy the other night with like, three different rollovers right now.

Jed said there are the ones that happened counting one of the ones that happened the other day, because it was right on five on our usual spot. That's 13 in the last 24 months at the same location.

Keith Oman said, yeah, What do you think caused the one over here by the Creek Bridge and the one out here by 15 and 17?

Jed said stupidity.

Keith Oman said exactly.

Mayor O'Hare asked Is that all?

Jed said That's all I have.

Mayor O'Hare Okay, thank you, Jed, appreciate you so Chief Pugsley, The invoices are in for the total amount for the radios from Teton, for the crash truck in the ambulance. It came to \$2,663.56. I will need a motion to go ahead and pay that.

LuAnn said I made a motion to pay for the radios from Teton, for the Fire Department at \$2,663.56.

Mayor O'Hare said I have a motion from LuAnn. Do I have a second?

Heather made a second motion.

Mayor O'Hare said Have a second from Heather? All in favor? Any opposed? Okay, we can pay that and then truck inspections are due. We're not sure of the amount, but just need the okay to go ahead and move forward with the truck inspections.

Rod asked do you need a motion for that or just a verbal one?

Mayor O'Hare said I just think of verbal, okay, right? Tammie, do we need a motion? For that, or to go ahead with the truck inspections and then pay it once we get the bill.

Tammie said yeah, you can. We can just, just say yeah, if you're all, okay with that?

LuAnn said yes.

Mayor O'Hare Okay, thank you.

Mayor O'Hare said Snowville EMS. President Smith.

Dave Smith said okay, so we finally got stuff put together with FirstNet for the tablet for the ambulance, and they're quoting us a price of \$36.80 per month. There are a few fees that attach to that price. So really, we're looking at about \$44 a month. Probably it could be less than that. They just didn't have an exact number there on the tablet they offered a bunch. But the one that would be a good fit for what we're doing is \$479.99 so basically \$480 and that would be the one time we pay that by upfront with the first month.

Mayor O'Hare asked and that's the, that's a nine, right? Dave said yeah.

Mayor O'Hare said I'm sorry, the S-9

Dave said it's an S 9f, E5, G1, 28, gigabyte.

Mayor O'Hare, but you can add, you can add storage to it if you need it.

Dave said yeah, it does.

LuAnn asked and that's for the tablet?

Mayor O'Hare said it correctly.

Dave said yeah. The \$480 is for the tablet. And then the \$36.80 a month, plus we're tax-exempt, so I don't think they'll charge us taxes, but there's some, you know, federal fees to tax on a couple of dollars to that our old Verizon account, I believe we're paying \$111 a month, is what we've come up with. So this would be, you know, savings.

Mayor O'Hare said yeah.

Dave said savings for us. So I just need to go ahead for us to, you know, to make this change, cancel the Verizon set up and, oh, and then the other thing with FirstNet is we're not entering a contract, so we're not obligated for some time.

Mayor O'Hare said okay.

Dave said we can, if we don't like it, we can cancel at any time. Obviously, we own the tablet, but.

Mayor O'Hare asked if it is a pay-as-you-go, or is it a pay you we pay the first month in advance.

Dave said you pay the first month in advance, because the first payment, depending on when we get this all done, it may have a prorated amount for a partial month, you know, so the first.

Mayor O'Hare asked if the payments would be made on the first of every month.

Dave said yeah.

Mayor O'Hare said okay.

Dave said yeah.

Mayor O'Hare said so we'll just make sure.

Dave said the first one would be a little bit bigger because they prorate.

Mayor O'Hare said correct.

Dave said part of April, you know, and then you'd be going.

Mayor O'Hare said and then paid for the tablet.

Dave said yeah.

Mayor O'Hare said okay.

Dave yeah, so, I think it's a good deal for us. I think it's well worth a try.

Mayor O'Hare said yeah.

Dave said I mean, we're not accomplishing anything with our Verizon setup because we need to upgrade it anyway, even if we short the Verizon because we got us set up so that we can Bluetooth to our defibrillator. But having the tablet makes it so we can start reports while we're en route or coming home, which would be a benefit.

Mayor O'Hare asked if First Net is it, does it use a certain provider, or does it just roams and grab whatever providers available?

Dave said so it's primarily with AT&T, but FirstNet is giving priority to because, and we went through the whole process to be approved as one, to have it this way, where first responders, so we get priority, like, if the system is struggling or down, it's supposed to kick other people off and keep us.

Mayor O'Hare asked what if there's not an AT&T thought service in that area, or do, or is it? Is it going to cover the the area where you guys are.

Dave said yeah, I, mean, we're gonna, that's some of that may be yet to be seen 100% because, you know, they always say, Oh yeah, we've got good coverage for you. Mayor O'Hare said okay.

Dave said until you're out there. But the benefit there is we're not in a two-year contract with them or anything like that.

LuAnn said so I know Trenton had an AT&T phone, and when he was at my house, anyway, it didn't work. But Roy has one in Stone, and it works great up there.

Dave said yeah.

LuAnn said but it didn't work. It didn't work on my street. Trenton's AT&T phone did not work.

Dave said yeah, it's, it's always a little.

LuAnn said you just never know. But then half the time I'm on the horizon half the time it doesn't work.

Dave said I know the county is using this with their deputies.

Mayor O'Hare said right.

Dave said, you know, Officer Eddington is the one that kind of here a number of months ago, told us about this, and they feel like they've had really good luck with good and that's what the county officers are using.

Mayor O'Hare asked, "Is there anything else?"

LuAnn asked do we need a motion.

Dave said however you want to do that. I just need to go ahead to go with it. The only other, I mean, on another note, we're working. On updating our controlled substance permit with the town, because it expired for us having morphine and fentanyl and that type of stuff. It's kind of a circle. We're going through everybody we talked to saying, talk to this person.

Mayor O'Hare said sure.

Dave said but we're working on that. So just, you know, just to be aware that's important because we technically are expired with our agreement or license to have controlled substances. So,

Mayor O'Hare said okay.

Dave said we're trying to remedy that currently.

Mayor O'Hare said okay, thank you, President Smith, so President Smith was letting us know about the first net cost for the tablets \$480 and then we switched services from Verizon over to the first net for roughly around \$38 plus a little couple of fees. So if you have any questions, Rod, LuAnn, okay, so we'll need a motion to accept that and get a new tablet and switch over the provider.

Rod said I'll make the motion to accept the cost for the tablet and to switch over to FirstNet.

I have a motion from Rod, second,

Heather said, second, all in favor. Any opposed passed.

Okay, so Stacey, we can go ahead and do whatever President Smith means. We go ahead and follow up with that.

Stacey asked are you gonna turn off Verizon? Because I don't have any access to that. Tammie said she could cancel that one.

Stacey said I couldn't remember if it was you or Tammie. Tammie asked Dave will you just text me or something when you get your other everything, I don't want to leave you without service or whatever.

Dave said yeah, I'll get with you after the meeting, and we'll just coordinate that. But Tammie should be able to cancel that deal.

Mayor O'Hare said okay, Tammie, CBDG.

Tammie said so I've been in contact with

Mayor O'Hare said CDBG.

Tammie said I've been in contact with Brian. They haven't sent the official letter out that gives me the dates and everything. That's why we didn't have the public hearing this time, it's just because I don't know all the details, what needs to be said in the public hearing and all of that so but he said, we're fine to do the public hearing in May. We have been awarded the grant, so don't worry.

Mayor O'Hare asked if we still knew the amount we got rewarded.

Tammie said I am assuming the full amount. I asked him if it was the full amount. He didn't say it wasn't.

Mayor O'Hare said and that was \$202,\$190,000. Okay, so he's gonna get this, all this information to us before the Mays meeting. Okay.

Tammie said we just have to complete the application by May 31. That's our second public hearing and have all that like you'll all have to sign it, you'll have to sign it. We have to send it back in.

Mayor O'Hare said okay.

Tammie said yeah, and then I'm gonna plan on meeting tomorrow morning, right?

LuAnn said yep, 8:30 here.

Tammie said that's all I have.

Mayor O'Hare said Thank you so much.

Treasure. Stacey,

Stacey said okay, so everybody remembers the Dog licensing from on the 27th at the firehouse from 10:30 to 12 and then opening and closing meetings.

Did I get yours  
right?

Mayor O'Hare said you got mine.

Stacey asked Heather Did you do it already? It's just that little link thing that they send you a certificate. Do you just watch videos and stuff?

Heather said okay, we'll get it.

Stacey said okay, I don't, they just ask it for the audit. So we just always had to keep up on that. And then, so I sent the contract to the church.

Mayor O'Hare said yeah.

Stacey asked so what did you find?

Mayor O'Hare said so I called the lady and left her a message, but the email that you sent me shows we sent them an invoice.

Stacey said we did.

Mayor O'Hare asked if shouldn't we have sent them saying that we're upping their amount.

Stacey said Well, that's what she is asking for now.

Mayor O'Hare said yeah.

Stacey said so I have a contract in the office. It's already printed out.

Mayor O'Hare said but she they haven't even approved it yet.

Stacey said No.

Mayor O'Hare said yeah.

Stacey said no, but I don't know how long it's been without a contract, because I couldn't find anything recent.

Mayor O'Hare said okay.

Mayor O'Hare said so I would send them a contract with the new price and let them know that we've upped the price due to increase in cost, basically,

Tammie said well, we have the old one item that we can just get what we're responsible for?

Stacey said yeah.

Mayor O'Hare said yeah, okay, yeah, she knew I left her a message, but she never called me back, so I think she called. I left her my phone number, but she'll get a hold of one of us, but yeah, if we just send a contract to her and then just let him know that the increase is due to cost, the rising costs of maintaining.

AJ.

Tammie said he couldn't be here, but I have his stuff if you want me to.

Mayor O'Hare said okay, yeah. If you go ahead and let us know, you guys are okay with that, getting an update from Tammie?

LuAnn said sure.

Tammie said he doesn't have much. I just wanted to let you know. That they found the water meter out front. Finally, it's been buried for years.

Mayor O'Hare said I didn't know it was missing.

Tammie said yeah, it's been a concern, and so they found it with the metal detector and I think Rod Arbon and somebody did some winching, and it was Tim. Did you help with that? Yeah, so they found that it's all fixed. The meter has been replaced. It wasn't a

field either. But he was wondering if we have any asphalt patching that we could put around there. Do you want him just to buy some to fix around the meter?

Mayor O'Hare said I don't know. Do we? Do we have any? We have any.

Jed said so we have some patch in the fire department. Tammie said see, that I'm probably asking for the wrong thing.

Mayor O'Hare said if he wants to, if he wants to take it upon himself to fix it, to make it pretty, and make it to where it doesn't get, just go ahead. And I would say, go ahead and do it right? Yeah, if it's gonna be over \$500. Yeah, let us know so we can so I can send out an email and it.

Rod asked, will it be accessible in the future, now?

Tammie said yeah. So there's a problem. They can shut the water off.

Stacey said that was the biggest I was worried when I drove by to see water running out, and we'd had no way to shut it off, because when I had Matt here to fix the keyless ones, he's like, You need to get something in here. If these pipes break, your building's going to be destroyed. So there was Mike and AJ and Kyler out there on a rainy day.

Tammie said they didn't have anything to do, then, just on another note, Kyler did pass the water, so that was good news. And so we do have two operators now.

Mayor O'Hare said it was awesome.

Tammie said That's good for our point system.

Mayor O'Hare said Very good.

Tammie said That works, and that's all we have.

Mayor O'Hare said okay, Thank you. Tammie.

Tammie said yep.

Mayor O'Hare said Council member McGary first, just in the FYI, I got an email from Box Elder County for the water master plan. There's a meeting tomorrow for anybody who wishes to attend, April 11, from seven to 8:30 pm, at the USU Multi-Purpose room, and there's an address, and they'll be giving you a presentation at Open House on what they want to do, and they're gonna give Aggie ice cream afterward.

LuAnn asked Is that the one Tim Muns told us about?

Rod said Yes,

LuAnn said okay.

Rod said so this is for the small area Water Conservation District type stuff. They're not saying what's going to happen or directing us that they're kind of looking for inputs and stuff like that. Anybody wishes to.

LuAnn said He was afraid that they were going to take our water and send it somewhere else. So it's. He wanted us. I'll be there so we can have a voice. So they couldn't do that.

Mayor O'Hare said anything else for you. Okay,

Thank you.

Rod said FYI, for that.

Mayor O'Hare said Council Member, Johnson,

LuAnn said we just have a meeting tomorrow morning with Nicholas Clark. He's going to show us a little PowerPoint production thing on the bridge, what's going to happen, approximate dates, stuff like that, and so on.

Mayor O'Hare said perfect.

LuAnn said and then just a couple of things with Keith. He was good enough to say that he would help with that stop sign, and you have some information on that. And then just another question on the barriers that we were going to put down the side of the fence over by Mollies.

Keith said between Mollie's and you.

LuAnn asked Keith do you have some or do we need to buy some?

Keith said yeah, I have some, but I told Cody, I said, You got to come to me, not the town. It's on your property, right?

LuAnn asked oh, so Cody needs to come down.

Keith Oman said Cody needs to come to me to get the stuff to put on his property, because you're putting it on Mollie's side of the fence, right?

LuAnn said okay.

Keith Oman said So in other words, he has to.

Mayor O'Hare said we had all this done, but then, unfortunately.

LuAnn said she would call Cody tonight.

Keith Oman said just like he can't put stuff on yours.

Mayor O'Hare said right.

LuAnn said right.

Keith said it had to be him.

Mayor O'Hare said yeah.

Keith Oman said so if you want me to take a minute and call now I will or call him in an hour.

Mayor O'Hare said to wait on the if you want to ask him, you're allowed to ask him yeah questions if you want.

LuAnn asked pardon me?

Keith Oman said I can wait until you guys are Done.

LuAnn said You can go ahead.

Mayor O'Hare said a council member can dress.

Keith Oman said I went to the UC sign shop. That's the prison shop. Email. Then they said they were available. I called. This is the sign. I can't think of his title. They all got a



title. He said he could get them, but he didn't think I gave him any cheaper. I asked my financial analyst if I could just buy them. And we need it just to help the smaller municipalities. So that's where I'm at. I'm going to get with him tomorrow. If he hasn't ordered him, I'm going to try and order before either tomorrow or Monday and then just however long it takes to make them and I'll have them. I'll just get them if there's if there's an issue with me, with UDOT paying for it, then I will get back to you on the price. But they are available.

Mayor O'Hare said are those ones that say cross traffic does not stop.

Keith Oman said Yeah, they're black

on yellow. And then I'll tell them how there are separate different sizes you can order.

I'm assuming that's a 36-inch stop sign.

Mayor O'Hare said It is.

Keith Oman said just looking at it, I'm thinking that. So I'll get the one that matches with that according to the respect. And then on mileposts four and five, we had the district regional manager, the district engineers, and traffic and safety. They're all out. I asked them if we all took a van that had nine of us in the van. They went out and took some pictures, and looked at the road. I had some pictures of when it rained. They get copies of, not only the wrecks the DMS gets, they get they know where every single pass happens that is reportable. So we appreciate the extra input. They're aware of it.

They've ordered a machine. I don't know the name of it, and I My memory is not that great, because it's not on the top of my list. What it does is it goes in and they will profile that section around for 1000 feet. It's really less than 500 feet. And in that 500 feet, we just say there's about 200 where the pond is, that's what I'm guessing. They're going to go in and profile that and see where the elevations are, and then they'll decide what they can do. They'll either chip seal that little portion of the road if they think they can do it without forcing that water in the other lane. It's not a design issue. What happened when Parsons did that road like it's probably been three summers ago now, or come in three summers? There was a rough spot there, and they profiled it. When they profiled it, they probably went too deep to take it, because they get a smoothness factor and how they get paid on the contract. You probably know a little bit about that. Anyway, that's what I'm guessing happened. But anyway, there the wheels moved slowly, but I pushed it as far up my chain as I could go.

Mayor O'Hare said it's a puddling issue, or it's a puddling issue, it's hydroplaning.

Keith Oman said They don't deny it, and there have been excessive crashes there. But like I was, my point to Jed is, like, how do you explain that 5000 people went through there that didn't have wildfire speed phones, but it is a bad deal? We don't want to cause any trouble with that, so they are going to address it, and they won't put up a sign that signs don't work in that instant. If we knew when it was going to rain, we could bring a portable message board out and if they let me control the message, it probably wouldn't be X-rated. You can't fake a stupid box on that. And the other thing, and I don't

know when you were, you were talking here. I don't know what you know, your dash, whatever. And I heard you mentioned 300 North, that's the road that goes out and around Webeckes. We mix it up. There is quite a bit of damage there. And I've been that's the world I live in. And I'm tasked when we have damage to the road, if I can tie it to a motorist, if there's an accident, if there's damage from somebody towing something and they take the seal off, that's how a pothole starts if they damage the shoulder. In order to protect the taxpayer, we go after the person that caused the damage, get their insurance company involved, and get whatever. If I can't, then weed, then that comes out. I'm just saying that to you as common sense. If you get into your rows and grounds if you have people dragging stuff up and down the road, and they're taking if they're scarring the road, they're starting to take a seal off, and that's where it'll start to let moisture in. And then if they're dragging stuff off, and they're taking dirt away from the shoulder that makes the shoulder weak, the shoulder right? Only educating you a little, and I apologize if I'm stating the obvious.

LuAnn said I've actually seen that.

Keith Oman said I've seen that anyway. Just food for thought on that. If you see, if you see damage or I do like and call any, anybody, any concerned citizen calls, call the Mayor, say we got damaged on the road. This guy just dragged his pile across there because his tractor broke down. Yeah, sad that it broke down, but he did the damage. If he backed into your car, he did the damage. So he should pay.

LuAnn said okay, and usually calls and he doesn't have insurance. Keith Oman said Well, you'd have to call the cops and get it. You'd have to call a cop and say to go after the person that damaged you. First of all, you have to know, like, if you trail them into their yard and say, Well, this guy just dumped diesel down the road, we know it's him. He's going to eat all that's what I'm, that's all I'm saying. I noticed the damage from them guys dragging stuff in there, and I thought, I'll just bring that to the attention. So we've, we've talked about the sign, we talked about the road on the I-84 And that's really nothing to do with the council.

Mayor O'Hare asked that damage on the road that you know was from dragging was on 300 North.

Keith Oman said yeah.

Mayor O'Hare said Okay

Keith Oman said yes, sir.

Mayor O'Hare said So we will have to redo it.

Keith Omand said I had a question, if I could ask it just, I had a question, Where can we get a copy of town ordinances? Are they posted somewhere? I mean, I apologize if they're right here.

Mayor O'Hare said we have two books in here that you can come in and read. You just can't take them.

Keith Oman said okay.

Mayor O'Hare said and then I think we have an electronic copy that's watermarked that if you email Tammie or email for the town and request it, then they will email it to you. It's 400. It's a big file.

Keith Oman said No, so a couple of things people keep asking us, like, oh, there's ordinances. Because you have the dog catcher, we can't get the dog.

Mayor O'Hare said That's what we're working on, that.

Keith Oman said I don't mean to hurt anybody's feelings

Mayor O'Hare said No, no, we're working on that right now.

Keith Oman said I'm sure you are.

Mayor O'Hare asked so I've got another question for you. So we have to call Box Elder County Sheriff's Department,

Keith Oman said just, for example, to drop this file. I'm back into your pickup.

Mayor O'Hare said Right.

Keith Oman said, " That's all. It's just they're damaging public property.

Mayor O'Hare said so you're but you, you're the one that saw them dragging it down.

Keith Oman said I didn't.

Mayor O'Hare said you didn't it okay?

Keith Oman said I just saw the damage to the road. Mayor O'Hare said You've seen the damage to the road. Keith Oman said That's all I'm saying. If a guy wanted to investigate, you may or may not see where it's entered, and where it came from.

Mayor O'Hare said okay.

LuAnn said 300 North.

Mayor O'Hare said okay, yeah, that's over there.

Keith Oman said Going on there. Today I noticed my stuff drag in where the rubber is off, and you see the rim tracks. And, yeah, I don't want to focus on you.

Mayor O'Hare said Okay. Councilman, are you done? I'm sorry,

LuAnn said yes.

Mayor O'Hare said okay.

Mayor O'Hare said Council member O'Hare.

Mayor O'Hare said thank you, Mr Oman. I appreciate it. Keith Oman said You're welcome.

Mayor O'Hare said Thank you.

Heather said we had the Easter Bunny party. Jed got Garrett, which was actually really good.

LuAnn said he did a really good job.

Dave said I told him he needed to be a more enthusiastic Easter Bunny.

LuAnn said he patted some on the back.

Heather said he did a good job. He did thank you for that, and Stacey for helping everybody else.

Mayor O'Hare said Jed and everybody that came out. We really appreciate everybody that came out and helped. LuAnn said I forgot to count kids.

Mayor O'Hare said please let the young women know. Tell them thank you. I've already talked to Brinley, so, yeah, okay. Is that all from you? Miss O'Hare, okay.

Mayor O'Hare said I'm going to add something in here. I just want to read it. So I got an email from Matt Sullivan. He is the Matt Sullivan environmental scientist for the solid waste program. He's the guy that we've been talking to about the landfill or not the landfill, but our dump site, okay, and he's been talking with Tim, and I talked with Tim after I talked to Matt and me and Tim were on the same page with this, and then I got this email on the 27th that basically says what we were doing. We can still, we can still have our container out there and use it as a drop site and don't have to pay any, far any fees. Yeah, that's basic, so I'm gonna read you the email. Okay, for the public, for everybody, I did some reviewing and spoke with my boss, and I have just forwarded it. I don't know if I forwarded it to you guys, and if I didn't, I apologize, but I just forwarded to you, so you guys have it now in your emails. And Tammy you guys, too. I did some reviewing and spoke with my boss about our conversation. You and I had my boss, and I discuss and inquire about the use of using a drop box. A drop box is defined in our rules as means of means a facility used for the placement of a large, detachable container, or drop box for the collection of solid waste, for transport to a solid waste disposal facility. The facility includes the area adjacent to the containers for necessary entrance, exiting, unloading, and turnaround areas. Dropbox facilities normally serve the general public with Uncompacted loads and receive waste from off-site. Dropbox facilities do not include residential or commercial waste containers on the site of waste generation. I believe this is something Snowville could consider that doesn't have a fee. I also think this could be stationed at the site year-round. Basically, a drop box is a roll-off bin that is in a design location for the community. Here are more details on the rules that would be required to do that. These rules came from the Utah Office of Administrative Rules. The rule reference number is r3, 15313, dash, three. The yellow highlighted areas reference states have a sign that identifies the facility and shows at least the name of the site hours during. Which the site is open for public use, materials not accepted at the facility, and other necessary information is posted at the site entrance. So you would also need to mount a sign with all this listed info to go on it. I will also pass this information to Mr. Tim Hyder, thank you for your continued effort in looking into this matter. Matt Sullivan, so basically, after going around and around and around with this, our bin, like I was telling them to begin with, is just a bin. It's not a transfer. It's not a drop site, it's a dump site. So with that being said, we can get Ruppsto pick up. If it needs to be picked up, we still need to get out there and get all that metal and stuff out of there, get it all thrown in there, and get done with that. Then we can put

that bin out there and continue doing what we've been doing. Did you? Did you understand that to be the same, Mr. Heyder?

Tim Heyder said you need to look up that regulation, and post a sign.

Mayor O'Hare said yep.

Tim Heyder said, telling them what they can put in, what you can put in, like, I know, like we used to have a sign saying no tires, batteries, but you can't put household waste down there.

Mayor O'Hare said you can put couch chairs, wood, TV, and no freezers because they have antifreeze in them, no refrigerators, no freezers, no microwaves.

LuAnn said we still have to charge something.

Mayor O'Hare said Yeah, we can still charge your expenses. That's your expense to take care of the drop, right?

Tim Heyder said but you can't make money on essentially what you're doing now right, other than right, so keep it locked up.

Mayor O'Hare said so what we'll need to do for the next meeting is come up with a sign where we want a word. And on the sign, of course, they're not going to be any open.

Times that it's open, it's going to be by appointment only. We can make an appointment only. Please call this number, and then whoever's going to be able to see it in the garbage, we'll have that number posted up there. We'll have it as a removable number, so we can just if somebody changes positions or whatever, we can change the number and then, and then we put down items we don't take, or items that we do take.

Tim Heyder said we need to look at that regulation. It's got one down there, but find out what that is saying. I think that'll call out what you can and can't put in there.

Mayor O'Hare said it doesn't say it just says solid waste. Tim Heyder said there is a number there I think it says no tires, or batteries.

LuAnn said where do you find it? Where do you look that up?

Mayor O'Hare's right here. It's on the solid waste management thing.

Mayor O'Hare said there's a number there that says each has a sign at the entrance that complies with the subsection. So we got to go to the subsection and look at that. So we'll do that. We have to get a bigger sign. We can get a bigger sign. So, that's good news for the town. We can get this open, backup.

Tim Heyder said Matt's good to work with. I've talked to Mayor O'Hare said Yeah, and I appreciate your help with this. Thank you so much. So do we have any questions about that? Heather, LuAnn.

LuAnn said no.

Mayor O'Hare said okay, so we're going to open the floor now to public comments. If anybody has a public comment, please state your name, and whatever comments you have.

Keith Oman, say thanks for your service. Appreciate coming down to a little civic duty. Glad you're focusing on the issues. Keep up the good fight.

Mayor O'Hare said Thank you,

LuAnn said Keith, thank you, Keith, thank you for all your efforts, too. Appreciate it.

Quick one for me. Jed Pugsley, sorry, our chief, Fire Chief Pudsley just driving around the other day, I noticed some damaged collets for runoff water. That's going to be somewhat of the town's responsibility at some point to replace the one that crosses under the road in front of the school and diverts water back to the north. The other one, if you continue on that same drainage in between the school and Will Thomas's old house or the culvert there that's all smashed in and that converts water down that drainage and then out into the fields sometime before we have another runoff storm or issue. Those are the collets that cause issues and problems. They're just old. They need to be replaced at some point. I think there's, there's numerous bullets around the town that I know they're spending. Probably need to look at replacement at some point. Tammie said I wonder if there's excess money with that CDBG funding. If we don't use them.

Mayor O'Hare asked can we use it for that, or does it had to be for because then we ask for the money

Now, thank you, Mr. Pugsley, anybody else for open comment?

Mayor O'Hare said who would we hire to replace the culverts? That is the question.

Jed said to put it up for bids.

Mayor O'Hare said Yeah, three, three bids

Tim Heyder said the Mayor's money.

Mayor O'Hare said yeah.

Jed suggested the town could mean a town employee could do it as part of a higher job, roads, bridges, normal.

Tammie said just a thought, too. I know how many years ago they did this big project that was Stone Road, a road project, four years ago? Do we need to start looking at the side roads?

Keith Oman said typically if you don't mind, I can address some of that.

Mayor O'Hare said Go ahead.

Keith Oman said Scott has construction. A lot of everybody has constructed sprays because they chip seal the road. They used to do it every five years. That seals the top of the asphalt. And that's probably a pretty chip and a lot of bang for the buck. The other thing they can do is crack the seal. You can contract that. And there's a lot of contractors that do that. Then they do that in spring and fall. We're doing it right now on the state roads. That's a really good bang for the buck, as I say once you break the seal

on asphalt and let moisture in, that's the beginning of your problems. All in cracks, when the frost will freeze-thaw cycles. I want to go big. So typically, if you can keep the road sealed for 50 years if you don't keep it sealed, you'll have problems in three or four.

Jed said I guess, on that note too, when we had the big flood last spring, in order to get that road fixed over on Potter's Hollow, of what we did, the top of that road did come off. So that's one that probably ought to be chipped still sooner rather than later, especially in that high area. Drive around losing that culvert.

Keith Oman said the Cemetery Road has big tracks, and anytime there's what you call a horizontal curve that's over the bottom is a horizontal curve. I'm wondering if we should have vertical horizontal curves. Under any place, there's a vertical curve. I remember when Dean Robinson did that, they put those, I bet they're a foot kick. They did the right thing because the county gave it. It's really good. We need to follow up as a town, if we can, or the county, and keep it sealed because they've got a good base.

Tammie said I know we have money. You know, the B & C money and the road department has quite a lot of money that we need to use some of it.

Mayor O'Hare said You said, crack seal.

Keith Oman said crack seal.

Keith Oman said I would chip seal. Potter Hollow, crack seal is specific, if you wanted to come up with similar to show you what I'm talking about they'll have long, transverse cracks, longitudinal cracks, and then just, you'll notice them, and if you ever reckon but there's someone there, they're like that a big crack. They tell us to fill anything small, bigger than a pencil.

LuAnn said and that's where they hit the black stuff.

Mayor O'Hare said Yeah.

they're

Keith Oman said, it just cracks, because it has a freeze-and-thaw cycle that doesn't break the asphalt.

Luann asked and where did you say there was a whole bunch of them?

Keith Oman said the Cemetery Road is Right above as that vertical curve goes over. That's really there, just saying that I'm surprised that I haven't done anything, but it's probably because there's no traffic.

Colleen Hansen, we got numerous potholes just right here.

Mayor O'Hare said well, Dairy Road, we have the 800. There's a lot of heavy, heavy, heavy trucks that go over there.

Keith Oman said Just something to think about.

Mayor O'Hare said, "Do we have the expenses somewhere?" Do we have money to fix those? We

can talk after I can show you how much.

Tammie said there's a lot. After I can tell you how much there's a lot in there. Is it over two now?

Mayor O'Hare said Okay,

Stacey said almost \$200,000.

Tim Heyder said County, excuse me, the county is cheapest, and they're willing to help you too.

Mayor O'Hare said yeah.

Mayor O'Hare said they're really good.

Mayor O'Hare said yeah, I'm actually talking, I've talked to Mr. McFarland. You weren't here, so I went by and spoke with Darren McFarland, who is with the county roads for Box Elder County, the other day, they're doing a project, because I want to still find out why this bridge is gonna cost \$3.7 million and they're doing getting ready to do a project with what I was talking about, those concrete box cover, yeah, and they're getting ready to do one that's costing them \$350,000 and they're using 20 of them, box culverts, eight foot by eight foot by 16 foot. So anyway, I was thinking, well, at least they've got those. Designs are ready if we want to do the stone road over here at Potter's Hollow, where we went out the other day last year. But anyway, and that's something we could get Mayor money from, the Mayor Association.

LuAnn asked and the county has grants?

Mayor O'Hare said no,

Keith Oman said the county is trying to get these signs there. They try to help small municipalities.

LuAnn said and I talk to Darren McFarland?

Mayor O'Hare said yeah, I've got his number. I can get it to you.

LuAnn said Okay.

Tim Heyder said when they first came up to do the bridge this one down here. It was \$700,000.

Mayor O'Hare said well, I just, I can't believe that they have to put a steel bridge there, that they can't put concrete but then I just found out that that's a natural stream that goes through there. So I didn't realize that. I thought that it was just running off water from flooding and stuff that went through there. So that kind of explained, but still, \$3.7 million, I think, is too expensive, and it's just a State waste of money. But anyway, okay, talk. Yes, sir. Eric,



Eric said so I texted Kade at Landmark Construction. He takes me back. The signs were installed on May 22, 2023, so they should officially be under warranty. So he said, I bought them from Utah Barricades. You can get the same signs here through the same company. Not very often. Both he and I challenged landmark companies several weeks ago. He said, you're working on it, but they should still be able to work. So let me, let me check in.

Mayor O'Hare asked Could you let him know it's an emergency that this sign gets fixed?  
Eric said okay.

Mayor O'Hare said I appreciate that. Thank you so much. Is there anybody else for public comment? Okay, I need everybody's expenses. Got to look over the expenses. Are there any questions or concerns? Okay, need a motion to accept.

LuAnn said I made a motion to accept the expenses.

I got a motion from LuAnn,

Rod second

Mayor O'Hare said from Rod. All in favor, any opposed?

Okay, I need a motion to adjourn.

Rod said Motion to adjourn rod. Got a motion from Rod Heather said second.

Mayor O'Hare said Heather seconded it, all in favor. Pass. We adjourned.
