#### B. REVIEW AND APPROVAL OF MINUTES

1. January 19, 2024 Combined DAC-UNTF Board Meeting,

Rebecca Benally motioned to approve the January 19, 2024 meeting minutes as presented. Jamie Harvey seconded the motion and all the DAC members voted in favor, none opposed, Vote: 5-0-0.

#### C. NEW BUSINESS

1. Blue Mtn Diné Septic Tank Cleaning Seven (7) Clients Chapter Projects \$2,800.00

The Blue Mountain Diné Community (BMDC) is requesting \$2,800.00 from their Chapter Projects allocation to provide septic tank cleaning services for seven (7) clients in Westwater. All documentation is in order and the UNTF staff recommends approval.

Jamie Harvey motioned to approve \$2,800.00 for the septic tank cleaning services as presented. Rebecca Benally seconded the motion and all the DAC members voted in favor, none opposed, Vote: 5-0-0.

2. Mexican Water Powerline Extension Luke Sagg Chapter Projects \$3,370.50

The Mexican Water Chapter is requesting \$3,370.50 from their Chapter Projects allocation for a powerline extension for Luke Sagg. Match funding in the amount of \$2,770.50 will be requested from the Navajo Revitalization Fund at their next board meeting on March 27, 2024. The cost quotation from NTUA is for \$5,541.00 and an additional \$600 was requested to pay for the archaeological clearance expense Completion document for a total of \$6,141.00. The Chapter Resolution was signed but contained the previous cost estimate and the resolution had handwritten corrections on the dollar amounts. All documentation is in order, except that the dollar figures need to corrected on the Chapter Resolution. The UNTF staff recommends approval conditional upon the corrected resolution from the Chapter.

Jamie Harvey motioned to approve \$3,370.50 for Luke Sagg as presented pending the corrected resolution. Rebecca Benally seconded the motioned and all the DAC members voted in favor, none opposed. 5-0-0.

3. Naatsis'Aan 28x44 New House Loretta King & Chapter Projects \$109,360.00 Gordon Warren (husband/wife)

The Naatsis'Aan Chapter is requesting \$109,360.00 for a new house construction for Loretta King and Gordon Warren from their Chapter Projects allocation. Addition funding is from the NRF and the Chapter PEP. There was discussion regarding the amounts listed on the resolution that contradicted their project proposal. Jamie Harvey motioned to approve the project pending the changes on the proposal to match the resolution, which was \$70,360.00 from UNTF and \$39,000 from NRF. However, there was not a second, so the motion ceased. Rebecca Benally then motioned to differ the project for a future meeting when the Chapter can provide all the correct documentation. Stanley Nez seconded the motion. All members voted in favor of the motion except Jamie Harvey. Not having five yes votes, the motion did not pass. After more discussion, a final motion was presented as follows.

Jamie Harvey motioned to table the proposal until the Chapter can provide the correct documentation. Stanley Nez seconded the motioned and all the DAC members voted in favor, none opposed. 5-0-0.

4. Teecnospos 28x44 New House Fenesia Manygoats Chapter Projects \$28,000.00

The Teecnospos Chapter is requesting \$28,000 from their Chapter Projects allocation to complete her self-help, new house construction. This project has been a self-help project but the family has requested assistance from the UNTF crews for plumbing and other specialty work so this request includes an additional amount for UNTF labor expenses. All documentation is in order and the UNTF staff recommends approval.

Jamie Harvey motioned to approve \$28,000 for Fenesia Manygoats as presented. Stanley Nez seconded the motioned and all the DAC members voted in favor, none opposed. 5-0-0

#### 5. UNTF Standard Floorplans and Standard Building Materials Policy

Tony Dayish

Tony Dayish presented a plan to standardize the construction of new house and renovation projects: Such standardization would include floor plans, concrete floors as opposed to wood, metal roofing instead of asphalt shingles, standard paint colors, laminate flooring, bathroom tub and shower surrounds etc. These changes would help decrease the cost of construction and would help limit client requests for expensive upgrades. The purpose of this presentation was to obtain input from the committee and their acknowledgment to proceed. No voting action was taken, but the committee agreed it was a good idea and to move forward with the standardization. Mr. Dayish mentioned that this policy was still in draft form and the finalized policy will be presented in a future meeting.

#### 6. UNTF Outstanding Senior Award Program Policy Revisions

Tony Dayish

Tony Dayish announced the upcoming Outstanding High School Student Awards Program and how the participants have been selected in previous years. Mr. Dayish reported that evaluation form and questions were modified at the request of the Dine' Advisory Committee members. Several committee members recommended that there needs to be more specific questions related to Navajo culture, current affairs, social concerns, local problems, and possible solutions. The committee was concerned that evaluation awarded points to the well-known sports activities and not to other extra-curricular activities and not to lesser-known sports. The DAC recommended amending the evaluation form to add more criteria such as band, art, music, service clubs, debate, academic competition events, etc. and other sports such as cross-country, soccer, tennis, etc. No formal action was taken at this time but the committee recommended UNTF staff to make the changes for the forms. UNTF will be proceeding with the modifications and will incorporate any additional recommendations.

#### D. REPORTS

#### DAC Education Sub-Committee Mtg Report

**Education Sub-Committee Members** 

Rebecca Benally reported on the recent Special Meeting that was held at Whitehorse High School in response to concerns that stemmed from a break-in at the high school and a lot of vandalism damage during the Christmas holiday break timeframe. The same group of vandals also broke into a local store and stole a vehicle. The perpetrators were caught and were charged and sentenced but they were also released and the concerns of the threats to the high school and the community is continuing. The meeting was held to address measures that could be taken to reintroduce the school properties to a safe, happy, and restored community.

Rebecca reported that they meeting was very productive meeting, that it was an emotional meeting that evoked feelings of sadness, hopelessness, sorrow, disappointment to the point of crying when the participants talked about the concerns. There is a lot that needs to be done but there was only so much the school and district could do and it would have to be a collective effort with the community's help and parent involvement.



Stanley Nez also commented on the productivity of the meeting and agreed with what Rebecca Benally had said. He suggested that a medicine man be requested to conduct a healing ceremony from the recent break-in and vandalism of the school. Stanley Nez also added the need for firewood for the needy and suggested that the UNTF monitor homes and help provide wood during the winter months.

Melvin Capitan Jr. mentioned that Whitehorse High School needs to have better security. The recent break-in caused over \$25,000 worth of damages and that students and staff are nervous about the possibility of future incidents. He would like to see funds allocated to pay for a School Resource Officer in all three high schools on the reservation in Utah. Also noted was that approximately one third of the students are coming to school hungry. The school district provides breakfast and lunch, but many students are not having a nutritious evening meal, which affects the child's ability to perform in the classroom. His vision is to have the UNTF help fund a School Resource Officer and a food insecurity program. A final note from Mr. Capitan Jr. was to have students design a large school-related decal that could be displayed on buses traveling to school events. He felt this would help promote school spirit and pride.

He also mentioned that San Juan County is still working with the Navajo Nation Justice Dept. on an agreement to be able to have cross-jurisdictional authority so the County Sheriff's Dept. can assist in law enforcement on the Utah side of the Reservation. Currently, there is a cease-and-desist order that exists and that needs to be abolished in order for the two entities to come to an agreement.

Jamie Harvey also mentioned that the street lights in Montezuma Creek are not working and that UDOT has been notified and that they are planning on installing new lighting with the construction of the intersection round-about.

Rebecca Benally announced that Oljato Chapter has a new housing committee which is a great accomplishment. She recommends that the committee should be trained on land uses and homesite leases.

Melvin Capitan Jr. mentioned that the Housing Committee in Aneth has had some recent conflict with the Chapter Officials. He also noted that the Solid Waste Transfer Station was open for business but feels the area should be paved or concreted.

Doug Seager provided a brief report of the FY-23 audit that indicated that the financial administration showed a clean audit. He provided a report on the auditing processes and accounting standards that they used for the audit and reported on the Required Communications section. Mr. Seager complimented the UNTF staff,

especially Maury Bergman and Tony Dayish on cooperating with the audit and making all the requested documents readily available for inspection. The one area that some of the DAC members had a question on was the Disclosures section which said the most sensitive disclosure affecting the financial statements was: The recognition of royalty revenue on a cash basis. The staff explained that the UNTF accounting is on an accrual basis but the royalties received section is on a cash basis because it is hard to predict the revenue. UNTF does know how much the oil companies will produce and sell and how much the price of oil will be and other factors that are difficult to predict and all of these factors that go into the prediction of the exact amount of the royalty revenue was beyond UNTF's control. So, UNTF got permission about 12 years ago to use the cash basis of accounting just for the royalty revenue so UNTF could record on the actual amount received.

#### Dineh Advisory Committee:

Before adjourning, Rebecca Benally brought an issue for the committee and administration to consider. She said a family that is living on White Mesa in Red Mesa has built a rodeo arena with their own personal funds and wanted to see if they could use the bleachers that used to be at the Bluff Fairgrounds. Ms. Benally reported that this family conducts a number of community events such as rodeos, events for the 4H Club, training of the care of animals, etc. One of the side benefits is that it provides youth something to do during the summer to keep them occupied and out of trouble.

Stanley Nez added a comment that some of the grazing officials such as the Aneth Grazing Rep, Mr. Hayden Lansing have indicated that they need a staging arena when they hold horse round-ups and this arena might help out. If not, he said, maybe portable corrals might be an option that might work.

Tony Dayish responded that UNTF would love to provide not only the bleachers but all the equipment from the former Bluff Fairgrounds to one of Chapters or host family but it would have to be approved by the majority of the Utah Navajo Chapters. He reported that there are three sets of large bleachers, rodeo arena metal pole fencing, stock fencing, announcer's stand building, bucking chutes, a plywood box building (for tickets), and a single wide trailer that was used as an office. He added that the trailer needs a lot of repairs. Mr. Dayish stated that that UNTF does not want to provide just one piece of equipment because each piece would disappear and the contributing partners from the past Utah Navajo Fair events would probably like to keep all the equipment together and to rebuild a site once one of the Chapters decides to have the Utah Navajo Fair in their Chapter area.

Mr. Dayish reported that the Mexican Water Chapter was very interested in having the fairgrounds equipment in their Chapter several years ago but they could not execute their plans because the Navajo

Nation Risk Management indicated that the risks were too high and they did not recommend the fairgrounds in the Chapter area. This would probably apply to all Chapters; however, the Herman Farley has been very interested in locating the fair in the Ratherford area. Tony said he recommended to Herman that the fair equipment could be set up where the old UNDC farms used to be which is north of the Ratherford area next to the San Juan River. There is about 400 acres that used to be farmland where UNDC grew hay, corn, and vegetables. Some of the irrigation pipes and fences are still there. Mr. Farley is trying to re-establish the farm area but so far it hasn't happened yet. Mr. Dayish asked Rebecca Benally to ask her contact if they are willing to take the entire fairgrounds equipment.

Rebecca Benally motioned to adjourn the meeting at 4:40 pm, Anna Mae Jim seconded and all members voted to approve the adjournment, Vote: 5-0-0.

R661-13. Veterans' Housing Program Policy.

#### R661-13-1. Veterans' Housing Program Policy.

- (1) Definitions
- (a) "Veteran" is defined as a person who served in the active military, naval,  $\underline{C}[\underline{e}]$  oast  $\underline{G}[\underline{g}]$  uard, or air services, and who was discharged or released there from under conditions other than dishonorable, and who served  $\underline{(\{90[\})\}}$  days or more during war time and 181 days or more during peace time. The definition of a  $\underline{v}[\underline{V}]$  eteran as used in this rule [herein] includes Widows and Gold Star Mothers.
- (b) A "widow" is defined as a surviving spouse who was validly married to and lived with the veteran continuously from the date of marriage to the date of the veteran's death and has not remarried. The term "widow" used in this guideline includes widowers.
- $(\underline{c}[i])$  A "Gold Star Mother" is defined as a mother whose child was killed in the line of duty, [(]killed in action[)] or has been declared missing in action.
  - (2) Program for eligible veterans requesting new house construction assistance.
- (a) Applicants shall work directly with their respective Community Veterans Organization first then to the Chapter through which they are seeking housing assistance.
- $(\underline{b}[i])$  All requests, budget preparation, updates and progress reports, will be processed through the Chapter.
- (c[ii]) Veterans' Housing projects will follow the regular Chapter project procedures for housing projects.
- $(\underline{d[b]})$  The Applicant's Chapter shall identify match-funding sources [in order] to maximize the number of applicants that can be assisted with this program.
- (e[i]) UNTF will maintain a Veteran's Housing set aside <u>fund</u> with a limit, per applicant, <u>that</u> is approved by the UNTF board [of trustees] in the annual budget. Funds will be used for new house <u>construction</u>, renovations or remodeling. [Of \$60,000 from UNTF and \$40,000 from other sources for new house construction, or 60% of the house renovation cost from UNTF and 40% from other sources.]
- (f[ii]) A Chapter may use their own chapter crew, contractor, or request the UNTF crew to build these houses for veterans.
  - (3) Types of Assistance
- (a) New construction projects, assistance includes funding for building materials and [/or ]labor. Matching funding will be required from other sources.
- (b) House renovation projects: assistance includes funding for building materials and [<del>/or]</del> labor.
  - (c) Individuals eligible to apply for assistance:
  - (i) veteran; and
  - (ii) recipient of the most priority points.
  - (4) Eligibility and Selection Criteria
- (a) Applicants for UNTF housing assistance must first submit their application to their Utah Chapter.
- (b) A UNTF Veterans Housing Program application must be filled out and submitted to the Utah Chapter where the applicant resides, including homesite lease, allotment deed, leasehold interest, and [/or] other legal landownership documentation, and house size and floor plan that is acceptable to the Chapter.

- (c) Applicant must be a <u>v[V]</u>eteran as defined <u>in Subsection (1)(a)</u> [herein]. Applicant must verify that <u>they</u> [he/she] is a veteran by proof of separation papers (DD-214).
  - (d) Applicant must be a San Juan County, Utah resident as required by Rule R661-3.
- (5) There must be proof that applicant's housing condition is substandard, dilapidated or is inadequate in terms of the capacity to meet the basic living standards of the veteran household.
  - (a) Proof that applicant is homeless or is living in borrowed housing or with relatives;
- (b) The Utah Chapter where [were] the applicant resides shall make the initial determination of eligibility for UNTF assistance
  - (6) t[\(\frac{\pi}{1}\)he Chapter shall take into consideration:
  - (a) income;
  - (b) family size;
  - (c) age;
  - (d) health;
  - (e) housing condition;
  - (f) the Chapter's priority listing; and;
  - (g) ineligibility for other housing programs.
- (7) The Chapter shall also use the following priority rating system in reviewing  $\underline{v}[V]$  eteran applications:
- (a) Handicapped and Disabled (up to 25 points) applicants, Disabilities sustained from Military Service (up to 25 points), Nonservice-connected disabilities (up to 10 points).
- (b) Elderly applicants (up to 25 points), 65 years of age or older (25 points), 59 64 years old (10 points).
- (c) Family size and Overcrowded conditions (up to 25 points: 5 points for veteran, 5 points for every family member, but no more than 25 points).
- (i) If the  $\underline{v[V]}$  eteran is living with relatives, only the immediate family members shall be eligible for points consideration.
- (ii) Immediate family members are the applicant, the applicant's spouse, the applicant's biological son[(]s[)] and[/or] daughter[(]s[)], and any legally adopted children that are living with the applicant on a full-time basis at the time of application.
- (d) Housing or[]Dwelling Conditions (up to 25 points), If the existing house belongs to the veteran, the house condition shall be evaluated, taking into consideration the interior, exterior, roof, insulation, windows, doors, type of structure, year built or []-age of house[]-.
  - (i) Good condition 0 points;
  - (ii) Fair condition 5 points;
  - (iii) Poor condition 15 points;
  - (iv) Very Poor condition 25 points; and
  - (v) Homeless 25 points;
- (8) Veteran Housing Projects shall be completed with 24 months of approval by the UNTF board.

The Aneth Chapter has requested for and received approval from the State of Utah-Navajo Trust Fund (UNTF) for a public safety police housing grant that was planned to be built in the Aneth 23-Unit Housing Subdivision that is located just north of and across Highway 162 from the existing Aneth Chapter House: UNTF Grant # TF21-08-27-144 in the amount of \$55,000.00. There was also a matching grant in the same amount of \$55,000 from the State of Utah-Navajo Revitalization Fund (NRF) Grant #21-10-19-760 as well.

The Chapter is in the process of planning for the pre-architectural and engineering work for a new Public Safety Building that will include Navajo Nation Police services and the Chapter intends to provide public safety/police housing in Aneth to enable a police presence in the community.

The Chapter re-evaluated the original plan to build a house in the Aneth 23-Unit Housing Subdivision and encountered some problems and the Chapter will work to resolve those problems in on a long-term plan to eventually build a house there but there is an immediate need for housing arrangements in the short-term. Therefore, the Chapter is requesting that the Scope of Work for this grant should be changed from building a house to renovating an existing double wide mobile home (MH).

The MH is located on the Chapter compound grounds and was originally set up to meet an immediate need to provide office space to the Temporary Assistance to Needy Families (TANF) program back in 2004. The MH unit was used by TANF and others for office space for a number of years and is currently vacant.

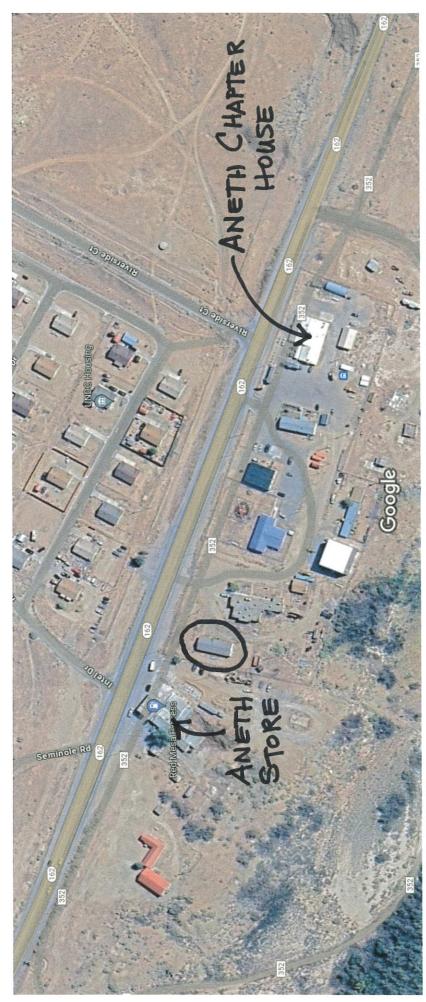

Bitsinni and Ms. Pearlinda Folgheraiter. Both reside in the late Joe & Nancy Folgheraiter house that was built in the early 1970's. This home is assigned to an older brother (Edward Folgheraiter) who will be retiring from employment soon. Mr. Bitsinnie and Ms. Folgheraiter will be in dire need of a home. Mr. Bitsinni is a veteran who has served in the Army in the early 80's.

#### f. Scope of Work:

The Naatsis'Aan Chapter is approving a housing assistance for long time community members, Mr. Teddy S. Bitsinni and Ms. Pearlinda Folgheraiter who currently are residing at the late parents Joe & Nancy Folgheraiter house that is located three (3) miles north of the Naatsis'Aan Chapter house, in the San Juan County, Utah.

The scope of work that will include the timeline of construction once the funding sources are approved and available beginning in the early spring of May 2024 and complete on April 30, 2026. The Naatsis'Aan Chapter, UNTF and NRF Funds will match fund this project of housing construction with material needed and with man-power assistance as detail in # 5. Project Construction Cost. The scope of this project will begin with the foundation plan and detail with footing sizes, footing details and other valuable information needed to properly construct the home (i.e. concrete slab of foundation to be "4").

The floor plans will show walls, interior and exterior of the entire building, denote ceiling heights. Location of the plumbing fixes, cabinets, door and window locations and sizes, given the square footage, and location of the water heater and hvac systems.

The exterior elevations will depict the exterior finishes with stick-built sidings, gable roof style with overhang lengths.

The building sections will have typical height, roof constructions, with stick-built direction of the sealing joist member and interior roof support members. The roof plan will depict the roof structure style, plate heights, and roof slopes of each plane.

Interior Cabinets will depict the overall standard style and layout of the kitchen and bathroom cabinets.

The Electrical plan will depict the general standard of all interior and exterior of electrical devices. This will generally be based on Navajo Tribal Utility Authority matter and concerns, but the home will include light switches, outlets, ceiling fixtures, and smoke detectors. The certified electrician will locate the breaker box and power entry but work closely with NTUA.

#### g. Status of the Matching Funding Sources

- Naatsis'Aan (Navajo Mountain Chapter) Public Employment Program will assist with man-power.
- The Utah Navajo Trust Fund (UNTF) Veterans Housing Program and UNTF Chapter Project Funds will be used as matching funding sources to assist housing projects.

- The Navajo Revitalization Funds will also be another funding source match fund this housing assistance project to assist the mention community members of Naatsis'Aan Chapter.

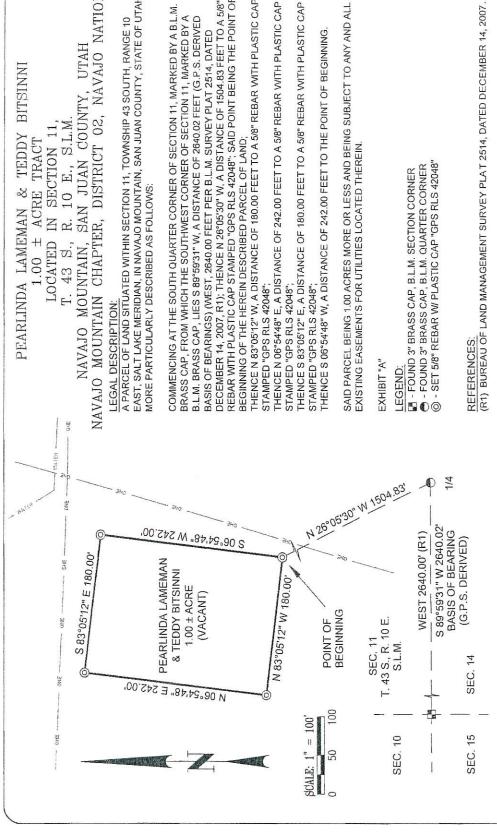

- a. Description of Undertaking: The proposed undertaking will involve the construction of a new home with associated utilities within a 208.71 feet by 208.71 feet square parcel of land. The total area of potential effect equals 43,560 square feet or 1.0 acre. Ground disturbance is expected to be intensive and extensive from the use of heavy equipment. Mr. Bitsinni and Ms. Lameman are in the process of homesite lease approval.
- b. Existing Data Review: A site file search of the project area was conducted at the Navajo Nation Historic Preservation Department (NNHPD) in Window Rock, Arizona. The file search indicated that no sites were previously recorded within 100 feet of the project area. Three projects were previously reported: #HPD-02-804, #HPD-03-465, and #HPD-03-1158. A check of Traditional Cultural Property (TCP) was researched at the NNHPD/TCP office and no sacred places were reported within five (5) miles of the project area. The TCP Record Search Verification Form is attached.
- c. Area Environmental and Cultural Setting: The project area is situated at an elevation of 5,640 feet above mean sea level. The proposed homesite is on a one acre parcel of undisturbed land. Vegetation consists of sagebrush, Mormon tea, cedar shrub, wild carrot, and prickly pear. The nearest water resources are several unnamed drainages to the north, northeast, east, southeast, south, southwest, west, and northwest. The contemporary cultural setting is modern Navajo. The prehistoric use was Anasazi.
- **d. Field Methods:** Loretta Flatrock walked subparallel transects spaced 10-12 meters apart to survey for cultural resources. The survey included a buffer zone of 50 feet around the perimeter of the project area. The total area surveyed was 66,931 square feet or 1.54 acres. All exposed ground surfaces were carefully examined and special attention was given to areas of erosion and deflation. Ms. Lameman was interviewed for knowledge of Traditional Cultural Properties or sacred places.

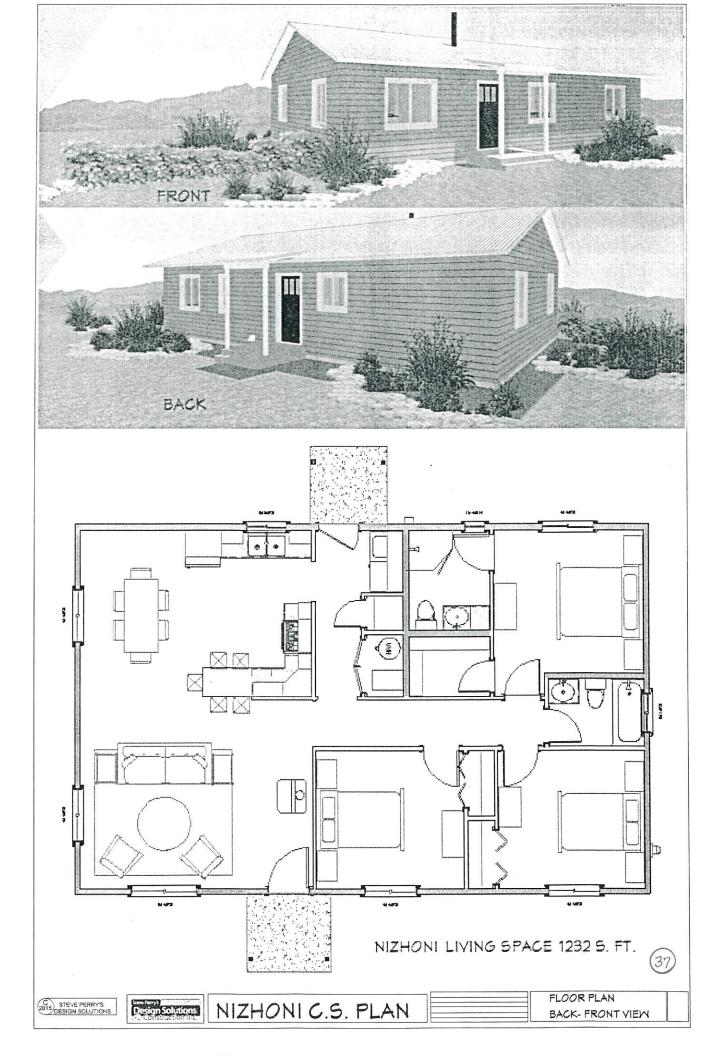

#### 8. Require Documentation (Attach Documents):

- a. Housing Committee Approved: The Naatsis'Aan (Navajo Mountain) Chapter had their regular meeting on January 28, 2024, at 1pm. At the meeting the Community Service Coordinator presented the Housing Assistance request for community members: Gordon Warren and Loretta King and the request was approved by the community registered members of the Naatsis'Aan Chapter. Currently, the Naatsis'Aan (Navajo Mountain) Chapter does not have a Housing Committee to approve housing, so the requests are made through the chapter's regular meetings. Until such as time the Community Service Coordinator and the Chapter Official will address this concern.
- b. Signed Chapter Resolution: Yes, the chapter resolution is signed by the chapter president.
- c. Scope of work: Gordon Warren and Loretta King have established a homesite least in 2015 and it is complete. See Attached homesite lease. The floor plan is attached which is a four-(4) bedroom (1232 sq. ft) sticks-built house with a four (4) inches cement slab. Gordon and Loretta have five (5) children and three (3) of their children are of minor ages. Two (2) are enrolled with the San Juan School District at the Navajo Mountain High School and one (1) is attending the Naatsis'Aan Community School.

Loretta King is an eligible recipient of the 37 ½ UNTF Oil Royalty funds. Her parents are Willie King and Fanny Bitsinnie whose parents were also lived in the Utah area. The clients on UNTF Census Database family sheet will be attached.

The Naatsis' Aan (Navajo Mountain Chapter will work directly with the over cost or cost estimate with the Navajo Tribal Utility Authority. The chapter will also work directly with the Utah Navajo Trust Fund and the Navajo Revitalization Fund to identify funds for house wiring and to pay towards electrical extension and hook-up after the house waits for the phase for utility.

The Community Service Coordinator of Naatsis'Aan (Navajo Mountain) Chapter has establish a Prioritization System for community members who are in dire need of a housing assistance. The assessment and prioritization process is based on an individual's vulnerability or need level according to a standardized prioritization criteria. In the prioritization system, the chapter uses assessment data to compare the participant's level of need with the needs of others on the priority list and prioritizes the person for housing and supportive services based on the Naatsis'Aan (Navajo Mountain) Chapter prioritization standards. Prioritization must be based on a specific and definable set of criteria that are made available through written prioritization standards, conducted according to the written prioritization policies and procedures, and applied consistently throughout to all households being prioritized. The Naatsis'Aan (Navajo Mountain) Chapter are prohibited from using the prioritization process to discriminate based on protected classes as defined by Federal Civil Rights laws and requirements.

The Naatsis'Aan (Navajo Mountain) Chapter send a commitment letter to the Utah Navajo Trust Fund and the Navajo Revitalization Fund Board in providing that the community member is being assist with housing.

Housing Affidavit is not available as this will be a new housing assistance but the housing application in place and other documentation on the clients.

d. Status of the Matching Funding Sources: See the attached table in regard to the funding sources needed in order to complete the phase one, phase two, phase three and four to make this a complete home for Gordon Warren and Loretta king along with their three (3) minor children who are attending the local school in Naatsis'Aan Community within the Utah (San Juan County) area.

- e. Status of the Land Survey, Archeological Clearance, Environmental Assessments. Other Clearances and Permits: Please see attached homesite lease on Gordon Warren and Loretta King.
- f. Floor Plan with Measurements of Building and Rooms: The floor plan of the stick-built house is attached to the scope of work, resolution, and housing applications. The client will receive a four (4) bedroom (1232 sq. ft.) stick built house due to the three (3) minor children who are part of recipient's request.
- g. How will the project be provided with Utilities? (Type, Distance, Cost, Schedule): After the house is almost complete, during the phase for house wiring, the chapter will identify the funds for house wiring, powerline extension and house electrical hook-up. Another resolution will be established for electrical and waterline and hook-up in May 2025.
- h. If this project is not located in Utah, Attach the Justification with the UNTF Proportionate Share Analysis: This project is in San Juan County (Utah), approximately seven (7) miles northeast of the Navajo Mountain Chapter house. The mention clients are proportionate statue of the 37 ½ Oil Royalty of the State of Utah, Utah Navajo Trust Fund, Navajo Revitalization and the Naatsis'Aan (Navajo Mountain) Chapter and has ancestral ties through descendant of paternal grandparents, David and Margret King and maternal grandparents Betsy Bitsinnie and Jack Nimrod.

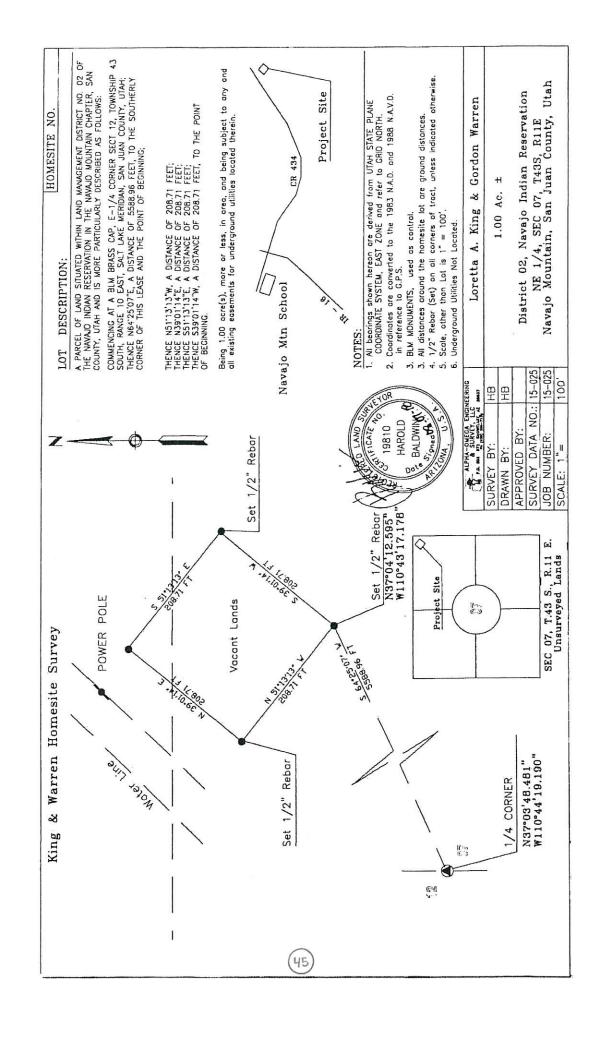

## 14. REPORT /X/ OR SUMMARY (REPORT ATTACHED) // OR PRELIMINARY REPORT //

- A. Description of Undertaking: The lead federal agency for this project is the Bureau of Indian Affairs (BIA), and the clients propose to construct a homesite with associated water and power utility lines to the proposed homesite area. Both surface and subsurface ground disturbance activities will be intensive and extensive. The area of effect is approximately 1 ac/0.4 ha.
- B. Existing Data Review: A check of Navajo Nation Historic Preservation Department archival records indicates that one project (HPD-94-667) with no recorded archaeological sites, has been conducted within a 328 ft (100 m) radius of the project area. A Traditional Cultural Property (TCP) database check at the Navajo Nation Historic Preservation Department (NNHPD) revealed that two TCPs (#240 and 957) are near the project area. See the attached "Traditional Cultural Property Record Search Verification Form."
- C. Area Environmental & Cultural Setting: The project area is situated within the Navajo Mountain Chapter, which is located approximately 5.5 mi (8.8 km) to the southwest of the project area. The nearest water source is Piute Canyon located approximately 1.6 mi (2.5 km) to the east of the project area. The elevation of the project area is 5,268 ft (1,606 m). Vegetation includes Russian thistle, snakeweed, and bunch grasses. The cultural setting is rural with surrounding multiple scattered homesteads.
- D. Field Methods: Harriett K. Sandoval, Senior Archaeologist, conducted the archaeological survey and an interview regarding Traditional Cultural Properties with the client, Loretta King. Ms. King indicated that to her knowledge, there are no TCPs and no burials in the vicinity of the project area. The archaeological survey was conducted as a Class III pedestrian survey by walking concentric transects spaced 15 m (45 ft) apart extending out to a 200 ft (61 m) radius area, thus, providing 100% survey coverage for a total area surveyed of approximately 125,664 sq ft (11,674 sq m) or 2.88 ac (1.17 ha). The area of potential effect is 1 ac/.40 ha, to be positioned or centered within the 200 ft surveyed homesite radius, since there is no legal land/tract description at time of survey.
- A. Location/Identification of Each Resource: Two TCPs (#s 240 and 957) were identified with the HPD-TCP data base located within 5 mi (8 km) of the project area, and they are described as:
  - 1). TCP #240 is identified as Naatsis'ann/Enemy Mountain Sitting/Navajo Mtn/Navajo Mtn, UT/240/UT T43S R9E and large surround zone; it is located approximately 2.1 mi (3.36 km) to the west of the project area.
  - 2). TCP #957 is identified as Tse Bikaa'to/Upon-rock Spring/Spring on top of Navajo Mtn/Navajo Mtn, UT/957/UT T43S R9E; it is located approximately 1,274 ft (388 m) to the west of the project area.
- B. Evaluation of Significance of Each Resource: TCPs #240 and 957 are considered Traditional Cultural Properties, and they have the potential to be eligible for nomination to the National Register of Historic Places, however, they are not protected under the Archaeological Resources Protection Act. In addition, the two TCPs have the potential to warrant consideration under the American Indian Religious Freedom Act (AIRFA). It is unknown if the TCPs are associated with any known graves or grave goods; thus, the Native American Graves Protection and Repatriation Act (NAGPRA) would not apply.

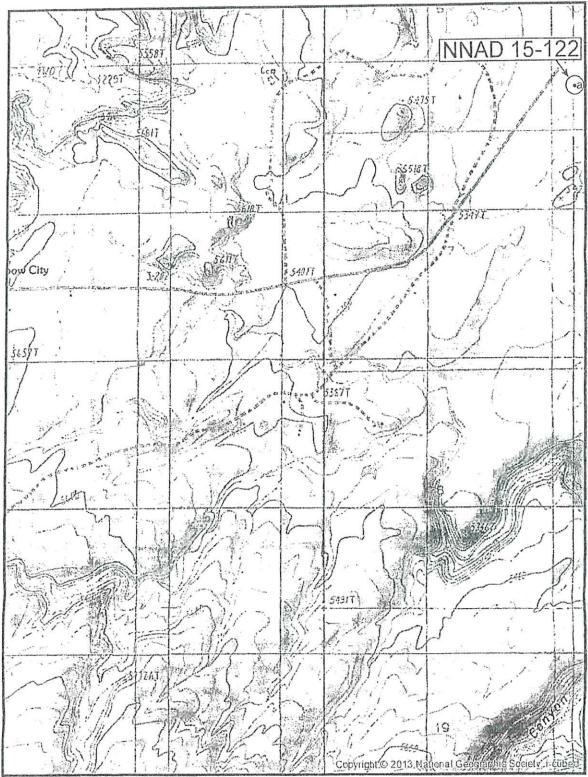


Figure 1. Specific Project Location of NNAD 15-122: A Cultural Resources Inventory of a One Acre Homesite for Loretta King and Gordon Warren near Navajo Mountain, San Juan County, Utah. USGS 7.5' map is Deep Canyon South, Utah-Arizona 1987 (PE).

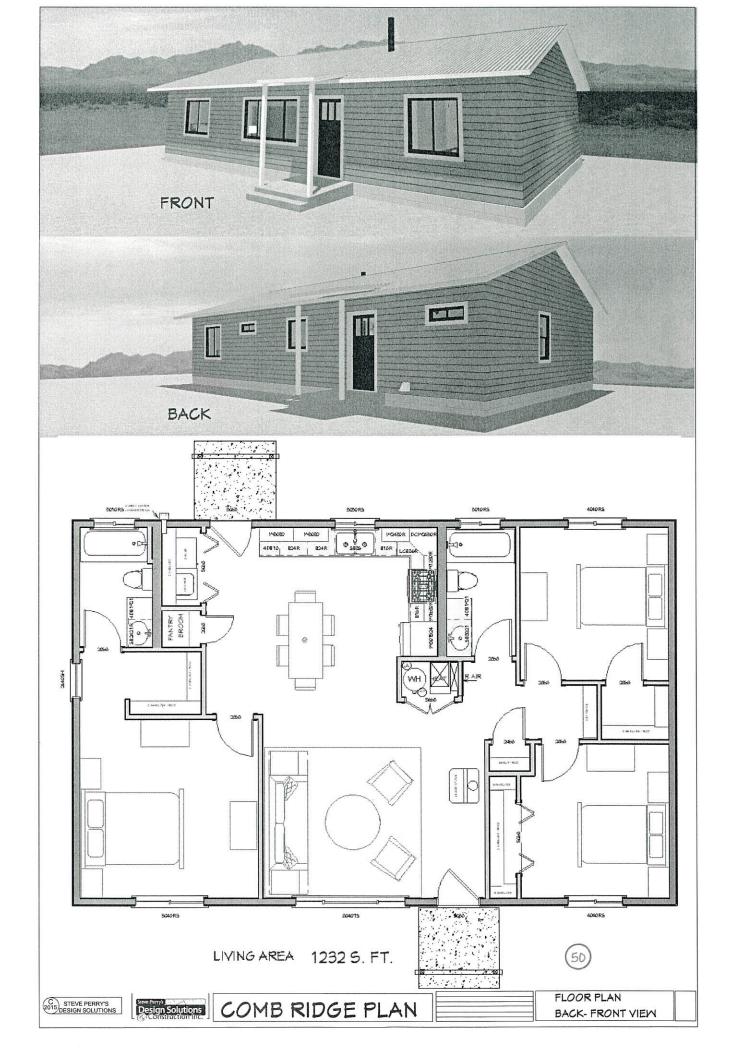

This is not feasible currently. Mica is mainly working on getting her homesite lease completed so that her homesite lease with be a readily stage incase if she will need to have waterline or wastewater to be extended to her homesite lease area soon.

Currently, Mica has made phone calls directly to Land Administration is Tuba City, communicate with the biological survey group from Window Rock and she has attended the chapter's regular meeting back in October 2023 to make a request for assistance on her behalf. Now the chapter is processing her paperwork to Utah Navajo Trust Fund to address her request to make it possible to complete her homesite lease.
- h. If this project is not located in Utah, Attach the justification with the UNTF Proportionate share analysis. This project is in Navajo Mountain within the San Juan County, Utah and Mica Dejolie is the daughter of the late Jean Dejolie (mother) and maternal grandmother, Louise (Elstosie) Greymountain who lived in the Utah portion in the early 1900's. Their homestead is in the Cradle Board area, a mile east Navajo Mountain Chapter and 1/8 of miles north of the Utah/Arizona Stateline in the Navajo Mountain, Utah.

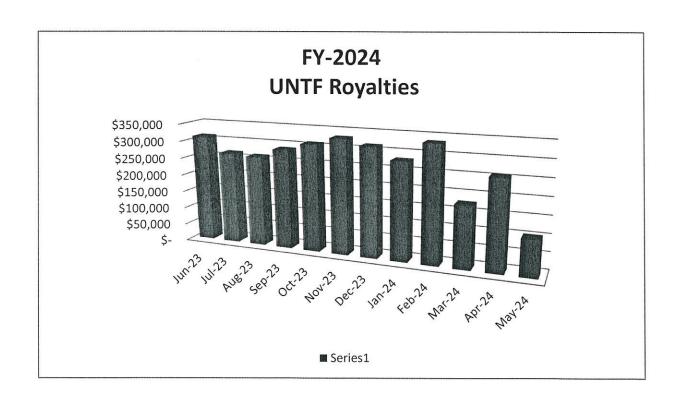

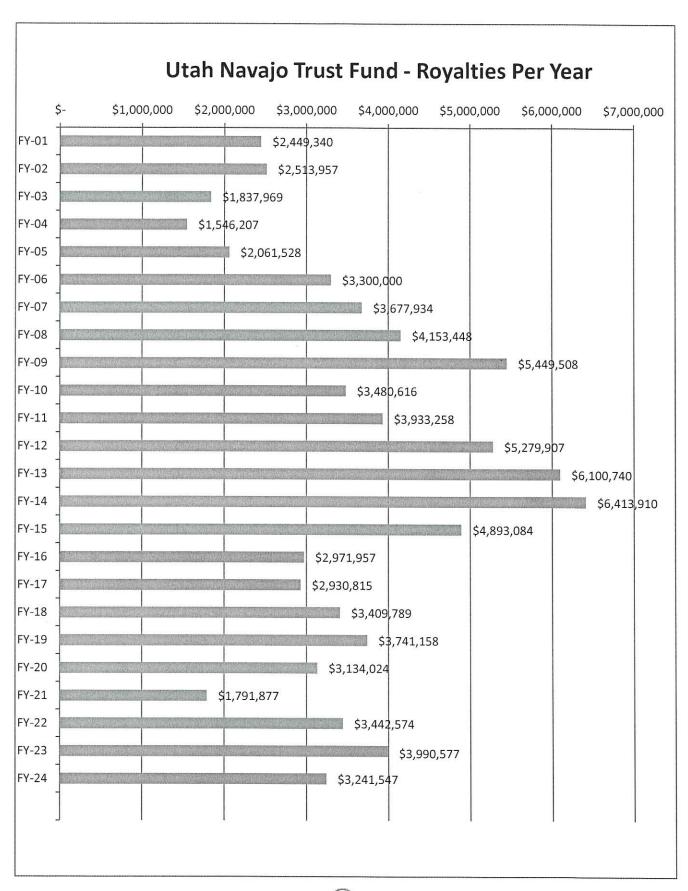

**UNTF Administrator's Report** 

To: the UNTF Board of Trustees (BOT) and the Dine' Advisory Committee (DAC)

Date: June 11, 2024 DAC-BOT Combined Meeting

#### 1 Westwater (WW) Waterline Project

- a. The WW Technical Group has coordinated with the State of Utah Div. of Drinking Water, City of Blanding, NTUA, IHS-OEHE, and the Waterline Engineers/Consultants to dig the deep well (which is completed) north of Blanding next to the city water treatment plant.
- b. The City of Blanding and NTUA have completed their agreement so enable the city to supply water to NTUA at a master meter at the boundary between the city and Westwater property. The city had to annex a small parcel of land between the city property and Westwater property in order to run the water line to Westwater.
- c. IHS-OEHE completed the water access point so that the Westwater residents can obtain water from this station and haul to their houses. The water access point is located on the west side of the City of Blanding's Warehouse, which is located about 1/2 mile east of Westwater.
- d. NTUA has completed the engineering work for the water distribution system for Westwater and they have arranged to use Lot #1, which is vacant, to store their pipes, valves, and other equipment.
- e. Construction of the waterlines at Westwater has not started yet.

#### 2 Aneth 24-Acre Development Master Planning

- a. The Aneth Chapter approved DFCM to advertise for an architect in the state's purchasing website (VBS method) to do a detailed architectural and engineering work for all the buildings that are planned at the new 24-acre development site.
- b. DFCM and CORE Architecture have started the work of meeting with each group that will occupy each building and they are currently in the middle of the architectural programming work.
- c. The NN-CPMD and it's delegated Project Management Group (JSRa and Parsons) have started meetings with the Chapter to hire an architect for the new Chapter House Building and the Water Purification Building.

#### 3 Montezuma Creek Community Center (Multi-Purpose Bldg)

- a. The Aneth Chapter was successful to obtain 2 acres that are needed for the parking lot for this Chapter. The project manager is the NN-CPMD. The NN funded \$3.4 million for this project. Elmerson Phillips, Aneth Chapter Vice-President, has been meeting with various directors within CPMD and the Dept of Community Development and the ARPA office to get this project going.
- b. The NN-CPMD has assigned Andy Thomas as Project Manager for this project and he has arranged for the bid opening, which was held on May 23, 2024. The award to the building contractor has not been made yet due to the work on the legal agreement and also finish up the land withdrawal at the same time.
- 4 Dennehotso 11 SS Comb Ridge Bathroom & Kitchen Preparation Project

a. The UNTF work crews continue to work on this project. Roy Hathale Veterans House Addition was completed and Danny Atene's house renovation, which is a retrofit for the kitchen and bathroom sections, is about 80% complete. The UNTF crews will be working on Joan Tsosie's house addition and renovation next.

#### 5 Blanding GSB Boiler Replacement

- a. The Boiler (heating system) for the UNTF-owned Blanding State Gov't Services Building (GSB) will be replaced in the next several months. A Pre-Bid Conference was held on May 24, 2023 to give the bidders a first hand look at the conditions before they submit a bid.
- b. The award of the construction contract was given to Combustion & Control Svc, LLC of Salt Lake City and due to getting the right parts until November, the actual replacement has been happening now during the Spring of 2024.
- c. The project was almost doubled because the boiler system needed a new updated control system and that increased the cost by another \$402,608.66 to put the grand total for the new system at \$858,608.66.

#### 6 Mont Creek 5-Acre Sale to UNHS for Grocery Store

- a. Met with the UNHS top managers on 5/09/23 to discuss UNHS buying 4 acres of land in Mont. Creek so they can build a grocery store and operate it themselves
- b. The DAC and Board decided to lease 4 acres to UNHS and authorized UNTF Administration and the UNTF Board Chair to execute the lease agreement for this project.
- c. Tony Dayish prepared a lease agreement and sent to Chris Pieper, Legal Counsel for review. UNTF is awaiting information on the actual land survey, property description, and exact acreage to be lease from UNHS.
- d. UNHS has been working with their architect and they have been going through the design process. There has been no word on any new development.

#### 7 Naatsis'Aan Chapter House Renovation Project

a. There was one bid for this project and the NN-CPMD awarded the contract to Loren A. Miller (LAM) Corporation but the project is at a standstill now probably due to a large amount of work that is placed on the NN-CPMD and not enough staff to get all the projects done.

#### 8 Red Mesa Administration Building Project

a. The architect has completed the Programming Phase but the project is at a standstill now probably due to a large amount of work that is placed on the NN-CPMD and not enough staff to get all the projects done.

#### 9 Montezuma Creek Post Office Project

- a. The architectural work has been completed and the next step is for the Navajo Utah Commission to obtain construction funding. A meeting was held with the main regional leaders of the post office regarding the design of the building.
- b. A recent meeting was called by the Navajo Utah Commission on March 05, 2024 with NUC, UNTF, and the Aneth and Red Mesa Chapter officials to try to obtain funding commitments from both of those Chapters.
- c. It was decided during the March 05 meeting that mainly the building shell will be built and the U.S. Postal Service will provide their own design, their own boxes, counter, offices, receiving areas and that 2,000 sq. ft. will be provided to the post office. The lease agreement will be negotiated to account for USPS initial investment in this building.
- d. The remaining 1,200 of the building will be constructed and leased out to either UPS, FEDEX, or possibly to a Credit Union.

#### 10 Oljato Housing Committee

a. The Oljato Housing Committee has re-established itself by coordinating with the Chapter officials identifying committee members, develop policies, receiving, reviewing, prioritizing applications, and recommending funding proposals for housing. The committee plans on recommending 18 clients to receive housing assistance and submitting funding requests to UNTF and NRF. The committee was very adamant to make sure to use the funding that is available since it has not been used for housing for over 10 years and there is a critical need for housing in the Oljato Chapter area.

#### 11 Navajo Nation ARPA Funding

- a. The NN-ARPA is set to expire in December of 2024 and the Navajo Nation has set a deadline for June 30, 2024 for Chapter projects to obligate their fund. If Chapter do not obligate their funding by June 30, then the Navajo Nation has plans to re-distribute the funds to other projects that are construction ready or other uses of the ARPA dollars.
- b. A lot of the NN Chapters, including the Utah Navajo Chapters, are rushing to get things in place as soon as possible to secure their ARPA funding.

#### 12 New Chapter CSC Orientation

a. Several Utah Navajo Chapters have hired a CSC or a Chapter Manager and UNTF has been providing orientation sessions to these new staff: Ronalda Joe, new CSC at Red Mesa Chapter, Marcie Williams, Dennehotso Chapter Manager, and Karilyn Begay, new Oljato Chapter CSC. We are still trying to coordinate our schedules with Lucinda Tomchee, Mexican Water Chapter Manager, and Alta Isaacs, new CSC at Naatsis'Aan Chapter.

#### 13 Volunteer Work Groups

- a. We have two work groups this year. One was the Kevin Bardsley work group from Salem, UT (just south of Spanish Fork, UT) who worked on the Karen Begay new house project. Karen is registered with the Teecnospos Chapter and lives about 9 miles southeast of the Red Mesa Chapter House and is part of the Daisy Brown camp.
- b. The other workgroup is the Ramon Roberts work group, who will assist the BMDC with woodhauling, repainting the exterior on some of the houses in Westwater, and they will also donate 3 sheep and 2 lambs.
