Mayor O'Hare said good evening, everybody like to welcome everybody to the July 10, 2024, town hall, town council meeting, Wednesday. I am Mayor O'Hare, we'd like to recognize council members McGary and Johnson that are here. We are going to excuse council member O'Hare tonight. She had a root canal done, so she's not feeling too well. And council member Arbon should be here. She will be joining us here shortly. Also like to recognize Stacey Hill and Tammie Morgan, our clerk and treasurer. At this time, we're going to go ahead and have the pledge by Stacey Hill, and then the prayer will be led by Rod McGary.

Stacey said I pledge allegiance to the flag of the United States of America and to the republic for which it stands, one nation under God, indivisible with liberty and justice for all.

Rod said our dear kind Heavenly Father. At this time, when we begin our town council meeting, we wish to offer thanks and gratitude to thee for thy many blessings thou has given us for this wonderful town, and the people there in pray a blessing upon them that they may be well and guided and protected in all things, and we as council members may be directed in our daily activities that we can most benefit the people of the town. We pray for guidance always, to do thy will and to be assured in thy hand, and pray for safety and peace and prosperity of this area. And again, thank you for the blessings that thou has given us. We pray in the name of thy son, Jesus Christ.

Mayor O'Hare said thank you, Stacey, thank you. Rod, the council was given the agenda for tonight, as well as the minutes. As far as the agenda, does anybody have any additions?

Rod asked Do you gotta wait until Trisha comes? Because you have some three, right?
I think you.

LuAnn said yeah, we've got to have three.
Stacey said can you start and then go back?

Mayor O'Hare yeah, well, we can add. I mean, does anybody have anything they need? We can't vote on anything right now. But did you guys have anything to add?

Rod said No.

Mayor O'Hare said okay, the only difference is on the top, but it does state that pro-term Mayor Rod McGary would be presiding, but I did make it, so I'll be presiding tonight. I do need to add on my part. I'm going to be adding all dread, Allred water. And we're also going to add water hookups outside the town.

LuAnn said That one's on there.

Mayor O'Hare said, is it?

LuAnn said Yeah, it's right underneath July.

Mayor O'Hare said Oh, oh, I'm sorry I see it now. Okay, that's all I need to add to it.

Stacey said I went back and I redid it, so it's on there.

Mayor O'Hare said Okay, okay, so at this time, we'll go with Carolyn Larkin, who's here, to address the town council. So you need to speak up. Just introduce yourself, and then you can go ahead.

Carolyn said Carolyn Larkin and I am a member of Snowville City, I have a couple of concerns we're going to lose our kids if we don't do something for our kids. I appreciate everything you guys do for Easter, Christmas and the Fourth of July. I really do. But when you've got kids here who have nothing for us to do here, I would like to ask the town council if we can somehow. I'm going to go talk to the bishop tonight, too, about the ballpark, if we can fix something over there at the ballpark. But with the town park, is there any way that we can find funding, grants, donations for a splash pad? It's expensive, and I will admit that it is dang expensive to do a recirculating pump, which is probably the best thing for Snowville because our water is so limited. But I would like to see a batting cage for our kids. I think a lot of kids would enjoy that. I know I can get a lot of donations to help do that. Where the old fire station was, the cement there, all you have to do is get some pipes welded and the net. It'll be about \$3,000 for that. The splash pad is a lot more expensive. It's anywhere from 35 to \$50,000 unless we can find a lot of people who can help. I have had some volunteers to help, and I should have done this before the Fourth of July so we could have had it out there and asked people what they think. But I thought, you know if we if you guys, okay, it that we could put up a thing on Facebook and just ask people's opinion if they would like to see something like that or, I mean, if there's something else, I don't know what else to do, but I have grandkids. None of them live here in town, but it's been my pet peeve since I was Mayor 25 years ago. Maybe, I don't know, but I think we need to do something for our kids.

Mayor O'Hare said Okay.

Carolyn said I don't know what. I don't know what the answer is, but that was, that's why I wanted to come to you guys. I do have some other stuff. These are rumors, and I

just want some clarification. If it's a rumor, then I will stop the rumor. I was told that our fire truck left and went on fire up in Holbrook, Idaho, without being dispatched to Box Elder County. If that's true, who's paying for those guys to go?

Mayor O'Hare said That would be a question for the fire chief.

Carolyn said Okay, well, and I was another one.

Mayor O'Hare said Yeah, go ahead.

Carolyn said I heard that the ambulance left once with the fire chief in it in the middle of the night, without being dispatched either. When I was the Mayor, we put the ambulance in play. We had to go through a lot of crap didn't we Tim? With the ambulance to get here.

Mayor O'Hare asked So where did you hear these rumors from? And if you don't want to say that's fine, all I can say is, don't listen to what people say.

Carolyn said Well, I know I need to. I mean, I don't want it if it is a rumor, then I want to tell them, you know, that's not true.

Mayor O'Hare said Yeah.

Carolyn said we need to stop this before it gets out there.

Mayor O'Hare said Yeah, well, they can get out there. All they want. What they need to do is talk to the president of EMS, which is Dave Smith, and with the fire department, you can speak to Jed Pugsley who is the fire chief.

Carolyn said All right, I can do that.

Mayor O'Hare said and then I will talk to them both myself, because now that I'm aware of it, then I will talk to them as well.

Carolyn said I just don't want the town to be responsible for something that somebody did out of and, you know, and I think it was out of the goodness of their heart, going to Holbrook. We did

Mayor O'Hare said have, well, we have a thing with them.

Carolyn asked but doesn't it have to be dispatched to Box Elder County?

Mayor O'Hare said I don't know. That's something I'd have to find out from Jed and them, I know, like today, they just went out on a fire. It came over the it came over the text message from Jed, we have a fire out here. Anybody that's available, please? I need some tenders, blah, blah, blah. And they already took off, because they were already aware of it. The fire chief was notified right away, and within 15 minutes of everybody texting back and forth, saying we're going go, and then the page came out. So it's possible, whoever is saying that the ambulance went and the fire truck went, but they didn't get paged. They might not have gotten paged right away, but maybe they got paged.

Carolyn said Okay.

Mayor O'Hare said or maybe the pages were down. So there's a lot of possibilities.

Carolyn said That's why, I guess, why I brought here and not just.

Mayor O'Hare said Yeah, and that's what we want you to do. We want you, maybe you can tell whoever told you if they have a problem.

Carolyn said Okay

Mayor O'Hare said it is the second Wednesday of the month, 6 pm right here.

Carolyn said Okay. Now, back to why I originally came, yeah, as I just want to see you guys as feelings. Do you want? Would you like me to check? I mean, I don't know if I can, if it has to be through the town.

Mayor O'Hare said Well, yes, it has to go through the town. Yeah, all the grants have to go through the town. Splash Pad. Anything that happens that goes into that park that's going to be open to the public has to go through our attorney because you're talking about serious insurance.

LuAnn said we'd have to have somebody there all the time when the splash pad was open.

Carolyn said and Tremonton doesn't, Tremonton just has it posted using your own risk.

Mayor O'Hare said okay.

Carolyn said I don't know, and the same thing with Malad I don't know.

Mayor O'Hare asked so Tremonton has one in their city park.

Carolyn said yes and so does Malad.

Mayor O'Hare said Okay.

LuAnn said we'd have to figure out, like, how much water liability years? Yep, liabilities, all that kind of stuff. And AJ would have to help us with that.

Mayor O'Hare said yeah because it's an all-water thing.

LuAnn said I understand yes or no.

Mayor O'Hare said and then cost, and then the cost and insurance, because we'd have to have liability insurance on something like that, even though putting up signs that say at your own risk doesn't always work.

Rod said But, I mean, we could solicit, you know, companies and stuff that might be able to help. So, you know, if we can't do a grant type thing, that might be asking for volunteer type stuff might be, I don't know, but that sounds like probably the money.

Carolyn said Well, it is expanding. That's why I said it is expensive. When I started looking at it, I thought it'd be maybe \$10,000 blew my mind when it said Mayor O'Hare said \$50,000 Yeah, and that's, I mean.

Carolyn said I mean, that's a recirculating pump and you use the amount of water that goes in, but you have to have somebody who checks it every day it's running to make sure that it's got enough chemicals in it.

LuAnn said And then, who would that be? Though,

Carolyn said I don't know.

Mayor O'Hare said Yeah, we'd have to have somebody on staff too but it's something that, by all means, we're definitely, we definitely look into it.

LuAnn said when my kids were growing up, we never assumed there would be anything out here. We think ball in town, and we did everything in town. Either in Malad or Tremonton.

Carolyn said you're right, but the price that you all, I know, but I just if we could just do the pitch, the batting cage, you can do the net, and it's a little thing that they can pitch behind. I actually have a pitching machine too, but we need electricity, and I noticed two things here about locking the Bowie's electricity. I understand Mayor O'Hare said well, it's more locking it here than now. Yeah, that we can turn off the Bower. We've got a switch to turn off, and there's a switch here to turn off. We just there's a switch here to turn off too. I just don't know where it's at. We got to figure it out.

Carolyn said but if we did the batting cage behind where the old fire station was before burn.

Mayor O'Hare said But we use that spot, though, we do use that for maintenance, on the mower and stuff. I mean, it'd be good to have a batting cage, if we could do it at the park, if the church would get involved.

Carolyn said that's the next time I was going to talk to him.

Mayor O'Hare said Yeah.

Carolyn said I wanted to talk to him before I came, but I couldn't.

Mayor O'Hare said that would be ideal to see if you talk to the bishop,

Carolyn said he can tell me, No.

LuAnn said he will well,

Mayor O'Hare said and you can go over his head and go to the FM because they're the ones that take care of the park, not him.

Carolyn said So the town doesn't take care of the park?

Mayor O'Hare said not anymore. No, do you have time to do some research?

Carolyn said Yeah,

Mayor O'Hare said okay, with Tremonton and Malad on their splash pads.

Carolyn said yep.

Mayor O'Hare said and then maybe we'll put you on the agenda for next month, and then.

LuAnn said and how much maintenance, and what the water usage is, and how many hours a day they run it, the total cost per month of to operate it.

Carolyn said because next month will be the.

LuAnn said because if we're going to do it for free, the city is going to have to have to pay for the water.

Carolyn said yeah.

Mayor O'Hare said and next month will be, that's one the 14th, August 14, and that's possible. The meeting will be at 6: 30, not 6 pm but it'll be posted.

LuAnn asked if we were going to change it.

Mayor O'Hare said Well, that's what I forgot to put on the agenda. We needed to talk about it. I was asked to I was asked if we could change it, and I'll explain it. I'll put it on here.

Carolyn said, okay I will check with them.

Rod said some good ideas. Appreciate that.

Carolyn said Yep. I just want to thank you guys for all you do. I know it's a thankless job, been there, done that, and that's why I won't log it again, but I just don't want to see our town struggle.

Mayor O'Hare said No, I anything we can do that will be beneficial for the kids and for people to come to visit more and, you know, we're all for it, I mean, but again, we've got a what, what I'll do until next month is I will get a hold of our attorney and email him and let him know about this, and get his input on what he would what his advice is for the town if we wanted to go that route, what we're looking at that we need, as far as insurance liabilities and all this stuff, and then get his input as well. And then that next

month, we can bring it together as a one package and find out where we're at on it. And if you have any more ideas, or anybody else has any more ideas on anything else, by all means, bring it to us. I'm done.

Mayor O'Hare said Thank you, Carolyn, appreciate it.

Next is Jose Jimenez. He's not here again, so he'll be. I have not got a chance to talk to him yet.

LuAnn asked Is the trailer moved?

Mayor O'Hare said No.

LuAnn said I didn't think it was.

Mayor O'Hare said he hasn't been in it. He's been out at the Great Salt Lake. So I. But I think you saw him in town, right? But she.

Stacey said they were there on the fourth.

Mayor O'Hare said But she's at work, and she can't really talk to people about other business when she's at work, doing her other job. So I'll try to go by here out tonight after I get off work, I don't go up to the trailer, though. I just stay at the thing and yell because they do. Got a sign. It says no trespassing and so, okay, so Trisha had asked if it's possible if we could change the meeting times to 6:30 pm instead of 6 pm just because, of course, she's not here right now, and her job, she doesn't get off until

Rod said I don't have a problem with

LuAnn said I don't care.

Mayor O'Hare said Okay,

Stacey said I'll get it posted.

Mayor O'Hare said Heather doesn't care either.

LuAnn said So I kind of care, but I won't say what I'm thinking.

Mayor O'Hare said Violations. Update. There's not much to update, except the moment we just kind of spoke about oops charging for water when the Bowery is being rented. Okay? So your thoughts on so we had the Bowery rented the other day, and they wanted the water on the side of the building turned on so they could run splash, whatever, whatever they had out there some water thing. So they wanted that water turned on for, I don't know how many hours it was turned on for. I personally think we

should charge for the water. I mean, they're using water. We need to charge for it. I mean, \$25 if they pay to rent the batteries, I don't think it's gonna pay for the water. And that's supposed to pay for cleaning and anything else. I don't know. If we put a meter on there, that's something we could ask. AJ, is there some type of meter we can put on to show us how much water they used?

LuAnn said would even make a difference.

AJ said So if that's the case, just read the meter before prior to rental, to rent it, and whatever the difference is.

LuAnn asked, is it worth it to charge them? Or we be petty?

AJ said it depends on how long it's on. I mean, you're, I mean water, this day and age, doesn't come free, so Right? I mean, it's a rare commodity, and it's the violations. Are not really the violations, but the red tape with water is becoming worse and worse all the time. So it's

LuAnn said so charge them.

Mayor O'Hare said And then with, and then with our, rule, our ordinance that says no watering anything between the hours of what is it? 10 am 6 pm.

LuAnn said is that still going on?

Mayor O'Hare said That's every year. That's every year during the summer, so during that time they should be using, you know?

AJ said I mean, I think it's pretty tough to, I mean, to read the meter. And I think my opinion is, if somebody wants to use water, you just charge them a flat fee, like \$50 or something extra.

Mayor O'Hare asked What is it we charge for the \$37 or the 10,000 gallons, so they're going to use 10,000 gallons? What would? I know you probably don't.

LuAnn asked Could they use that?

AJ said But that's kind of an immune issue because that's what you're paying for the whole month. So if they come and use that much, then you're paying it the rest of the month.

LuAnn said We're paying the extra.

AJ said So it's not like it's a one-time use. I mean,

Mayor O'Hare said well, I'm saying, Do you think they would use 10,000 gallons of water, with the water turned on over there for four or five hours, but they use 5000

gallons.

AJ said No, If you did that continuously for several different times, you easily would. You'd have to if I wish Eric was here. Eric could tell you what a garden hose at full stream, a garden hose would run. And I think he's probably right. It's somewhere around 30 or 50 odds a minute is what a garden hose would put out full a three-quarter inch hose fully over.

LuAnn asked Carolyn, what did you want to say?

Carolyn said Well, it was my family who rented the building, and I'm okay. But when we rented in the Malad, they charged \$50, \$75 for a family reunion. I was gonna, I mean, I'm \$25 is nothing. We had the water on for maybe an hour, an hour and a half. Mayor O'Hare said okay, Carolyn said but, you know, gladly.

Mayor O'Hare said I mean, no, no, no, no, no.

Carolyn said I knew what says. I saw that.

Mayor O'Hare said you know, you brought it up. So we don't, we don't bring up names. But that's okay. That's okay.

Carolyn said You're allowed to charge a change. You need to charge more because that is a convenience for the families who are here.

Carolyn said charge more.

Mayor O'Hare said Yeah, so it's probably easier just to charge more.

AJ said I just don't want to have to be the one that's got to come read them.

Mayor O'Hare said and you're talking at 30 gallons that's 1800 gallons an hour.

AJ said Yeah,

Mayor O'Hare said that's a one garden hose with a fully open so.

LuAnn said and if they used it for two hours.

Mayor O'Hare said So if we just if we just double the fee to \$50 for rental.

Stacey said okay, so we can put that on the agenda next time.

Rod said I mean, we may have to ask what their purposes are if they're not going to use water.

LuAnn said if they're just washing dishes, do we?

Mayor O'Hare said Yeah, yeah, no, no, no, I'm not talking about that. I'm talking about if outside, then we need to.

Rod said Yeah, right, right, yeah. If they want to schedule it, they want to do activities such as that, then yes, I think we should charge.

Mayor O'Hare said So if they're going to have water slides and all that, they're going to use the water if they're gonna have us turn the water key on.

LuAnn said then it's \$50.

Mayor O'Hare said okay so if we can add that to the agenda for next month,
Carolyn said \$75

Mayor O'Hare said No, no. 50 total,

LuAnn said no, \$25 isn't shit. Isn't anything. It isn't 25 bucks won't recover it if they use it for three or four hours you gotta have it.

Mayor O'Hare said yeah, That's if they use it for six hours. That's 10,800 gallons.

LuAnn said Okay, that's \$37.50.

Mayor O'Hare said that's \$37 yeah, so it'd be \$75 if they want the water turned on.

Stacey said Okay.

Mayor O'Hare said yeah and then we'll put that on the agenda for next month, for the vote on it.

Rod asked okay, are there any other types of things that we would have add-ons besides water. I mean, if they're thinking of doing, you know, a big light show or something, whether the electricity be a factor?

Mayor O'Hare said No

Stacey said I think that electricity bill over there is only, like \$12 bucks, between \$12 and \$16 a month, so that's just running the refrigerator. But half the time that's not even on either.

Rod said I was just wondering.

Stacey said I just wonder if it's sprinklers, what like that doesn't have energy?

Mayor O'Hare said that doesn't use any well, the box does. It's on electrical.

Rod said yeah, so Okay, I just wonder if there are any other add-ons besides water.
Mayor O'Hare said so \$25.

LuAnn said \$25 if you just want the thing, \$75 if you want the water.

Rod asked what if they wanted to use the stoves, you know, the propane.

Mayor O'Hare said So the propane, they need to bring their own propane.

Stacey said that was discussed last month.

Mayor O'Hare said Yeah, we talked about that.

Rod said I'm just shooting off the cuff here of any so propane, electricity, water, in the \$25 covers, cleaning and stocking the bathrooms and toilet paper and towels and stuff like that.

Mayor O'Hare said Yeah, it takes care of the necessities.

Rod said I can't think of anything else. Okay, good.

Mayor O'Hare said okay locking the outside power outlets to town hall, I am going to go ahead and address Mr. Heyder we have an inside switch right that turns off these power outlets out here when, when we're done tonight, could you show me where those are at and we can show Tammie or Stacey as well? Okay

Stacey said I thought it was turned off.

Mayor O'Hare said okay, we had a person charging their Tesla the other night, somebody pulled up to the town hall and plugged in their car and sat there and charged there.

Stacey said we turned it off.

Rod said we could test the outlets. I've got an outlet tester. LuAnn said Oh, cool Let's do it.

Rod said we could just go around and test them.

LuAnn said we don't ever use them, only at Christmas, so we must turn them off and leave them off.

Stacey said I don't know who did it.

Mayor O'Hare said increasing the amperage at the Bowery.

LuAnn said yes, yes, yes.

Mayor O'Hare said Carson was telling me about their fiasco during this Fourth of July where it was dropping. So we need to see about increasing the amperage over there.

LuAnn said yeah because we had to bring in stuff to keep the food going.

Mayor O'Hare said yeah.

LuAnn said like we did the year before.

Mayor O'Hare said so that's something we can do. I've talked to Tammie. She's still in there about going after a grant for next year to redo the Bowery.

LuAnn asked did you have an electrician in mind.

Mayor O'Hare said the electrician came in and dropped, dropped a four plug that comes down over the top of the cooking surface, the little island. And then she went and put those plugs in on the outside, in the bowery, but the same, the same amp edge. She didn't change the amperage or anything.

LuAnn said that Carson has an electrician in mind that he'd like to use.

Mayor O'Hare said correct. Yeah, so just wait. We're waiting for him to come through town to look at it.

Carson said I looked at that because we had a problem with it.

Tim Heyder said I Think they've got to run a new line.

Carson said he'll be able to tell us.

Mayor O'Hare said yeah.

Rod said that was my first question. You're running a power source that far.

Carson said It won't really be that much, we just have to watch out for the sprinklers we might have to dig through them and fix them after.

Mayor O'Hare said when you talk to him, ask him if this is something that if we decide to gut the Bowery, what I'm saying is if we, if we pay him to go ahead and come in and do this, and then we end up, in a year, or a year and a half, or whatever, gutting that Bowery will that line still, it'll still be okay.

Carson said so we can use the breaker box.

Mayor O'Hare said Okay

Carson said we can use the wire from the shed here to the breaker box and everything else should be fine. It just comes off the breaker box.

Rod asked do we have to get three bids for it.

Mayor O'Hare said yep, since it's not an emergency, so just tell him if he could, when he comes out here to give us a bid for it. What it cost to tell him what we want, and then we'll get the other lady, and then we'll try to find the third one.

LuAnn asked what other lady?

Mayor O'Hare said her name is Gwen Johnson.

Carson said there is an electrician in the valley, too.

Stacey said Yeah, there is, he's bought Gary Frandsen's house.

Mayor O'Hare said No, we just need it before the 14th of August. Is that the 14th, right? Yeah, or the 13th. Yeah. And then Tammie is going to look into trying to see what we can do to get the grant to redo the Bowery, redo the bathrooms, and the kitchen.

Mayor O'Hare said landfill cleanup. Okay, you guys were given this when we started. So Brandon did some research and pulled up his text message. Here it is. So this, here is a rental of a John Deere mini excavator, and this is, it's got the thumb on and everything. So he can take this excavator. This is for delivery pickup. So they'll bring it down. They'll drop it off. He'll use it for two days, for the weekend, yeah, he's already had it a few times at his house. So what he's going to do is he's going to have ruts bring down an empty container, and then he'll start putting all the metal in the empty container. He says he's looking at probably two loads. He went down there yesterday and looked at it. He's thinking about two loads. Rupp's will come down. They'll drop off the container, they'll pick it up, they'll take it to Western Metal, drop it off. And then Western Metal will pay us for the metal. It's, I think it's \$90 a ton. And then whatever the payment is, Rupp's will take what they need to get paid, and then the rest will come to the town. Or we can just take whatever we get from Western and however you guys have to do it, put it towards them. Put it towards that. The one that's down there now he's going to go ahead and put the rest of the trash, it's over there, the mattress, the couches, and everything inside that one, and get rid of that one as well. And then they'll come back and bring a second one for the metal, and he'll get all that cleaned up. And at the same time, he's got this, he's going to push all the green waste into the pit. LuAnn asked What do we do with all the cement that piled out there? Just leaving it?

Mayor O'Hare said yeah, and then there's, it's, it would cost probably a fortune to get it moved. It's not hurting anything. So he'll do that. It'll be a weekend thing or a two-day, two-day thing. And then Rupp's will come back when it's all done. Rupp's will come back and give us an empty container, and then that sign. Did you guys come up with any wordage for the sign for this month? No, no. Okay, so I will go ahead and I've got wordage, but I left it in my truck.

LuAnn asked so did we decide what we will take or what we won't take?

Rod said well, there's always something that somebody can come up with.

Mayor O'Hare said okay, so we'll put down what we will take, and I can get that sign made and get it put up there. And then once it gets put up there, then we're ready to go.

LuAnn asked who's gonna be over that?

Mayor O'Hare said That's the other thing we gotta discuss. So, we can't vote on this yet, because it's over 500 and we gotta wait for Trisha. I thought we only needed two people to vote.

Stacey said She is coming right here, she is hurrying.

Mayor O'Hare said Is that's fine.

My two well, I'll wait till Trish comes in.

We'd like to welcome Trish is now present. We're talking about the landfill. Well, the drop, the Drop Location, we're calling it now, so on your one page that when you just had your hand, that's the that's the cost that it's going to cost to rent the excavator for two days.

LuAnn said and Brandon Garbanati is going to do it.

Mayor O'Hare said Brandon, who's taking care of the park, is going to be the one that goes out, and he's going to clean it all up. He said it's going to take probably at least two loads of metal to get all the metal out of there. Rupp's will bring the container, and drop it off. He'll fill it up. Rupp's will take the container with the metal to Western Metals. And Western Metals pays us \$90 a ton.

Trisha said okay.

Mayor O'Hare said the money that Rupp's gets from Western Metals will go towards their bill, and then whatever's left will come to the town, unless they decide just to push it towards the bill, because it's probably gonna be more than what we get. I don't think there are many tons out there, not all, but who knows?

Trisha said it might surprise you.

Mayor O'Hare said this here shows sales tax, but just take that sales tax off so it only be \$900 will be the total. Because we get tax we're tax exempt, and it'll take them two days to do it. And then, did you happen to come up with any wording for the sign that we're gonna put out there?

Trisha said not yet.

Mayor O'Hare said okay, so we were talking about just getting the sign made.

Trisha asked did you decide what I'm gonna be in charge of?

Mayor O'Hare said well, that was, that was the next thing we're getting ready to discuss. But we waited for you, so we have what, usually the council member for this position would oversee the drop site for trash drop and animal control. But with animal control, I think everybody was in agreement to just drop that whole thing, and then we'll discuss what we talked to the Mayor and the Lawyer about when we talked to the attorney about the rabies and everything. So everybody else has a job. So that would be you overseeing it. But my thought was, we really need somebody that's in town to oversee

the trash drop off location, because you're at work, if somebody needs to go and make there's nobody here.

LuAnn said so you can't open it for every day.

Mayor O'Hare said No, no.

Trisha said didn't it used to be one Saturday a month.

Mayor O'Hare said yeah, you can do it that way, or you they can call and make they used to call and make an appointment.

LuAnn said with Jim.

Mayor O'Hare said yeah, when Jim was doing it, they made it and the same with John Levenduski. When he was on a town council, they would just call on a Saturday. Now that's one Saturday a month.

Trisha said or two. I don't really care.

Mayor O'Hare said are you available on Saturdays? Well, then that would take care of that. Then.

So you're the council person over it all.

Trisha said just not every Saturday.

Mayor O'Hare said not just one Saturday a month. Well, it's all but the thing is, it's not going to be an all-day thing, though. It's not an all-day thing, though.

Trisha said Yeah.

Mayor O'Hare said you're not going to be out there from eight in the morning till five in the afternoon. No, no, it's gonna be like two hours, if that you know.

Rod said And I would think that they would have to call and make arrangements.

LuAnn said you'll be the one, you'll know what we take and what we don't take and where they have to put it.

Mayor O'Hare said or you could, or you, if you want to, you could do it from eight in the morning till 5 pm on this Saturday. Call let me know when you're gonna go, and I'll go down there and open it for you, or however you want to. I mean, whatever you think's the best way for you to do it.

Trisha said okay.

Rod said I mean, I recommend by appointment only.

Mayor O'Hare said that seemed to work pretty good with John and Jim.

LuAnn said to do what?

Rod said by appointment only. By an appointment.

Mayor O'Hare said yeah.

Rod said because if you just have it open, free time, stuff, you might be spending your whole day.

Mayor O'Hare said it's only the people that live in the town limits.

Rod said right.

Mayor O'Hare said It's not open for those out of town.

Carolyn said I thought that it was closed a long time ago.

Mayor O'Hare said It was, it's been, it's still closed. Yeah, it's still closed, but we're trying to get it reopened.

Carolyn said okay,

Mayor O'Hare said so you're gonna do that.

Trisha asked so are we charging a fee?

Rod said yes.

Mayor O'Hare said there is a fee. Yeah, we'll have to get heard of the fee table.

Trisha said so we're charging a fee. Why are we keeping it within the town limits?

Mayor O'Hare said that's between you guys to discuss. That's what the last council decided.

Rod said yeah, we just figured that out of towners, there would be two, you know, they'd have to have a different fee structure.

LuAnn said because they don't pay taxes to help pay for the dump.

Trisha said but you can, you can have a fee and let the people you know within Snowville come. They can prove that they don't. I don't feel like we have to leave it within the town limits. Why not make some money?

Mayor O'Hare said well, that's for you guys to discuss. Yes.

Trisha asked what are you, Shaking your head for?

Tim Heyder said you never can charge enough to pay for the dumpster itself. The town has to subsidize the cost.

Trisha said we can do a trial of error, and see how it does.

Tim Heyder said we only did it for a couple of hours. People make appointments from like eight to 10. So the person who told everything stayed down there. People who want to go down there can be there between eight and 10. They charge the fee guessed the weight, charged by the pickup loans. But the town always has to subsidize some of the money.

LuAnn said because they charge by the ton.

Mayor O'Hare said anyway, well, we're paying a lot. Yeah. And if we, if we again, if we let people from out of town start filling up as well, that that thing's gonna be filled up like that, and then we're gonna have them. We're paying for it to be hauled away and paying for another one to come out. So it's we might but you guys think about it next month because we can't do enough nothing about it now, next month.

Trisha said I was asking questions.

Mayor O'Hare said yeah, yeah, that's fine.

Rod said one thought on the weight type thing, rather than guessing, I just made a stock wear that fits on my chute, my cow shoot, and it cost me \$300.

Mayor O'Hare said oh, really.

Rod said and it's off from you put four points, and, you know, have a solid ground and it just sits there, and it's back run by batteries, no big power.

Mayor O'Hare said okay.

Rod said and you just calibrate it to your setup, to zero that out, and then whatever comes on, and you go up to 20,000 pounds.

Mayor O'Hare said Okay.

Rod said so if you know it's on Amazon, they're called.

Mayor O'Hare said stock scale.

Rod said Yeah it was called livestock scale.

Mayor O'Hare said livestock.

LuAnn said except for, can you drive a trailer or a pickup onto it?

Rod said Well, it depends on what you want to make as your platform to weigh with if you're going to drive a trailer or something like that. Then you're looking at making a big platform.

Mayor O'Hare said when you know how much the truck weighs then total it out.

Rod said yeah, and so that would be your more expensive part than just the scale. So would be your platform?

Mayor O'Hare said okay, and then let us know how you want to, how you want to do it next month, and we'll put that all down.

Rod said I think important.

Mayor O'Hare said so I'm going to go back before we get much further. Did you have anything to add to the agenda? You saw it, and you got the minutes, and you saw the minutes. So we're going to go back to the first to accept the agenda and the minutes from the previous meeting.

Rod said Okay, I'll make a motion to accept the agenda for today, with the changing of the personnel at the beginning and the minutes from last month.

Mayor O'Hare said I have a motion from Rod. Do I have a second?

LuAnn said second.

Mayor O'Hare said second from Luann. All in favor? Any opposed. Passed.

Rod said you gotta vote this?

Mayor O'Hare said yeah, so, well, we're still on that. So on the landfill, I'm sorry, on the trash, and we gotta stop calling it a landfill. On the trash drop area, everybody is in favor of having Brandon take care of what is not gonna get cleaned up unless we get it ourselves done. And we need to. We need to do it. So I just need a motion to accept the bid for the \$900 for Black Peak Equipment for the rental of the excavator.

Rod asked Stacey, is there any problems with that?

Do you have cost wise, we have an allocation that we cover?

Stacey said yes.

LuAnn said I make a motion to accept the bid from Black Peck Equipment for Brandon Grabanati to clean up what are we calling it?

Mayor O'Hare said the trash drop.

LuAnn said the trash drop.

Mayor O'Hare said I have a motion from LuAnn. Do I have a second?

Trisha said second.

Mayor O'Hare said Second from Trisha? All in favor, any opposed? Okay, it's passed. I'll get a hold of Brandon tomorrow, or if you want, well, you're gonna be busy. I'll call him tomorrow and let him know to go ahead and set it up. Fourth of July.

LuAnn said Thank you. Thank you. Thank you.

Mayor O'Hare said Great job, Eddie, and everybody that was a part of your, of your crew, yes, did a good job.

LuAnn said Did a great job. Turned out really good. I've had only good comments. It was really, really good.

Rod said heard good comments too, especially that they like the crew.

LuAnn said Yep, it all turned out really good and had a good crew. Thanks for all your hard work.

Mayor O'Hare asked Any ideas for next year?

Well, we'll talk about that after the first of the year. Yeah, we appreciate it. Thank you so much for taking that off the hands of the Council this year and allowing the council to rest.

Carson said only bigger and better next year.

Mayor O'Hare said bigger and better next year.

LuAnn said I didn't freaking rest.

Mayor O'Hare said well some of us did. I was driving all day. Yeah, it was a good job, though.

LuAnn said it was so nice. The food was great, everything was really good.

Mayor O'Hare said Next on the agenda, we added the Allred water. Sorry, let's, let's, let's skip over that for a minute.

The other one was the water that we had an outstanding balance on that we talked about that's going to be taken care of. We talked to the new property owner that's taken over the estate, and they're going to take get that taken care of.

LuAnn asked and the monthly one too?

Mayor O'Hare said that's what we're going to speak about that So, and this is probably something I'm gonna have to send over to the attorney, so the person and this is my question, and I don't know. So we have in the ordinance, we have an ordinance that states that if you have property in the town of Snowville, that you have to have the water turned on, and you have to have one garbage can whether you use it or not. Okay. The person I talked to does not live in the town limits. They live outside the town limits.

LuAnn said but they still have a town hook-up.

Mayor O'Hare said okay, yes and that's why there's a there's this catch 22 they have a water hookup. But does that ordinance? Is that part of our water department's rules and regulations, or is it a town ordinance? Because if it's a town ordinance, and this is something that the lawyer is going to probably have to get involved with, are they liable to have that water hook up? Are they? Do they have to, you know, abide by the town ordinance if they don't live in the town ordinance?

AJ said so what you're saying is, you have an individual who has a water hook-up that doesn't use it and doesn't think you should have to pay for it.

Mayor O'Hare said right.

AJ said let's take it out then, and he can pay \$3,600 to put it back in again. You can pay, that's the rate every month, but serve water to him. It's pretty simple.

Mayor O'Hare said yeah, yeah, and that, and that was my idea, too, is we can just take it out and then the person, and then the person who buys the property. We'll have to, we'll have to pay the \$6,500 and put it back in. That was my idea.

AJ said It's not fair to everybody else to maintain the system. I know you still have to maintain.

Mayor O'Hare said yeah, I know but when he brought it up, you know that he doesn't live in the town limits, it actually, after I got the phone with him, I went, Hmm.

AJ said you are nicer to me.

Mayor O'Hare said well, no, and I get where he's coming from.

AJ said I don't get where he's coming from.

Trish said well it is a town's hook-up, he has to pay for it.

Mayor O'Hare said that the town ordinances are for the town of Snowville.

LuAnn said not if he had city water, then he would fall under that same ordinance, or he could go without water.

AJ asked Did you adopt the water ordinances when I'm pretty sure you did? And I'm pretty sure when it was a private water company, you adopted those.

Mayor O'Hare said I wasn't here when it was.

AJ said I'm pretty sure you did.

Mayor O'Hare said yeah, okay, that's what I'm saying. The Water Department, Snowville Water Department, right? It's its own entity, right?

AJ said Technically, yeah.

Mayor O'Hare said right. So it's separated from Snowville Town Incorporated, right?

Tammie said yeah, it's own enterprise.

Mayor O'Hare said okay, so in the entity of Snowville Water, is it called Snowville Town Water? Right? Do, they have SOPs, or whatever that state, that anybody who has a hookup must pay monthly?

AJ said I am assuming yes.

Mayor O'Hare said go ahead I'm gonna, break the rules, but go ahead.

Tim Heyder said when the state lent us the money, we had to sign up for anyone that has a hook-up.

Mayor O'Hare said okay.

Tim Heyder said has to pay a monthly bill.

Mayor O'Hare said okay, so it's okay. It's perfect, perfect, perfect.

Tammie said whoever it is. I mean, water adds a ton of value to somebody's property. They're gonna be able to sell it 100 times quicker with water on their property than you're selling a piece of property without water.

LuAnn said so you'll have to explain it to them like that.

Mayor O'Hare said Yeah, and that's fine.

LuAnn asked It's 60, isn't it? \$6,500.

Mayor O'Hare said \$6,500 a resident.

Stacey said \$6,500.

AJ asked, is it straight 3/4?

Stacey said It's \$6,500 is what we charge.

AJ said whatever you want to charge, I don't really don't care.

Mayor O'Hare said it's \$6.500.

LuAnn said if he wants it ever hooked back up again.

Mayor O'Hare said so if he wants it taken out, we can take it out. We can take it out.

The Water Department has no problem with it being taken out.

AJ said I will just go pull the meter.

Mayor O'Hare said it's off right now.

AJ said I can leave the meter loop in. I just pull the Meter Out Of The meter loop, right so he has no water.

Mayor O'Hare said okay, I'll explain that to him.

Tim Heyder said and you don't have to pay for it.

but if he ever wants to.

Mayor O'hare that answers my question right now. We don't have to ask the lawyer, because if the town, and that was my question, yes.

AJ said tell me and I will lock and pull a meter.

Mayor O'Hare said Okay,

AJ said the problem solved.

Rod said Is there a cost to do that?

AJ said whatever you pay me, which is nothing.

Mayor O'Hare said we don't, we don't charge,\$6,500

right? Yep, yeah, and when, and then when he's, well, that's up to him when he sells the property, whether he tells him there's water or not.

Trisha said I don't know why he wouldn't want water with his property when he sells it, but whatever.

LuAnn said for \$39.

Mayor O'Hare said No, he was just, he was, he was questioning the ordinance of having to pay the \$37.50 a month. Okay, so we'll take care of that. I will call him and let him know. Did you hear from Deputy Shaw?

Stacey said no.

Mayor O'Hare said I didn't either.

LuAnn said we need to thank him too for coming out. He seems to schedule all around and be out there and spend the day with us.

Mayor O'Hare said we took him.

Trisha said he got plenty of free food. He was happy. He did. I was happy about that.

Yeah, he was having a great time. And we did thank him when he was over there with us.

LuAnn said yeah, I did too. He's a good guy.

Mayor O'Hare said we took him home. After we got done, we took him home and set up another dinner and made him sing one karaoke song, and then he had to go.

LuAnn said I'm sorry I didn't come help take decorations down, but I was done.

Mayor O'Hare said yeah, we were good. Okay, Eric

called, and Eric will not be here tonight, of course, as you can see.

Rod said so was there a question with the stop sign?

Mayor O'Hare said yes.

LuAnn said so it did work.

Mayor O'Hare said I sent pictures. So apparently it did work.

LuAnn said yep.

Mayor O'Hare said I sent pictures. I took, went out there, took pictures, I sent it to Eric, and he called me the next day, and I told him. I said.

Rod said so it was not working?

Mayor O'Hare said It's not working.

LuAnn said I think it got vandalized.

Mayor O'Hare said well, that's pulled out the wires are just hanging. So anyway, the guy, he talked to the guy, and the guy sent us a picture showing that it was working when they put it together. That's the wrong one. It was working when it was flashing. It was together and the wires were zip-tied up. Well, now the wires are not zip-tied. They're hanging and it's not working. And if you actually notice now that I'm thinking about it, it might have gotten vandalized because or might have gotten hit, I don't know, by a truck or something. The one bracket broke on the back of the stop sign.

LuAnn said because I thought, when I looked at it, I thought somebody did this on purpose. They vandalized it, is my guess.

Mayor O'Hare said so anyway, I told Eric, and he's gonna have him come out and fix it, or he's checking to find out if it's something that we can do, is it something that we can just zip, tie the wires back up.

LuAnn said we need to put a sign there no truck parking too, because I've seen trucks park right there.

Mayor O'Hare said huh? Yeah, yeah. He had it working. It was working because he sent us a picture showing it was working, and a girl saw it working, but now, when I came home from my on my route, when I came home that day, yeah, I saw you, I noticed it wasn't working so and then with the curb and gutter, he said he got a hold of what's his name, Boyd, and he had heard back from him yet. So I told him. I said, well, we need to, you know, we're supposed to be done in the spring, and here we are in the summer. Do you know anything about the stage one fire restrictions? Chief didn't send me.

Stacey said yes. So they are posted. I posted it here and I posted it at the post office.

Mayor O'Hare said okay.

Stacey said so he wanted to talk about, like, specifics on that.

Mayor O'Hare said okay. So I will get a hold of Chief Pugsley and have him email us with the information.

Stacey said I mean, they sent it to me, I can email it to you,
Mayor O'Hare said okay.

Stacey said yeah because I pulled it off.

Mayor O'Hare said if you want to just forward it to everybody, that way, we've got it, and then everybody can read it. And then if Chief Pugsley has anything. A he needs to add he can get a hold of everybody, individually, anything for EMS that you know of?

Stacey said they did get the per capita grant.

Mayor O'Hare said good.

Stacey said it was \$4,033 we did get the check on Monday. So I text Dave about that. So that's taken care of.

Mayor O'Hare said and they're using that for?

Stacey said they're using it for training.

Mayor O'Hare said that going to pay for that one girl that was out of state cost so much money.

Stacey said it was good for me because that's all I have to do is go grab that invoice and send it to them, and we're done. So I don't have to go. It's good.

Mayor O'Hare said okay.

Stacey said so, but other than that. I don't think there was anything else. I am not sure.

Mayor O'Hare said okay, Snowville Clerk, anything for us?

Mayor O'Hare said did you, I know, just last week, but did you, you're gonna check on a possible grant for the Bowery? Okay?

Tammie said I was thinking, I mean, next year for a CDBG,

Mayor O'Hare said okay, is that the only one that we could probably get for it?

Tammie said that's the one that I feel most comfortable with.

Mayor O'Hare said okay.

Tammie said I know the system.

Mayor O'Hare said that we can't apply for that until next year.

Tammie said yeah, we'll be able to apply in November. Well, they'll have their meeting in November.

Mayor O'Hare said yeah, okay.

LuAnn asked What's the chances of us getting a second One?

Tammie said Pretty good. A lot of our projects.

LuAnn said that's great.

Tammie said the Fire Station, all the sidewalks, the sidewalks up there, the street, they redid this whole street.

Mayor O'Hare said yeah.

Tammie said the drainage one they did a couple of years ago. It's pretty good.

LuAnn asked Are we supposed to have water coming out of that fountain?

Tammie said at the park?

Mayor O'Hare said No, no. Over here, they never finished it.

LuAnn said we did at one time. Wasn't there water coming out of it?

Mayor O'Hare said I don't think it ever had water coming out of it. Yeah, we don't have enough running water.

LuAnn said Okay? We're fine.

Mayor O'Hare said Treasure anything for us. AJ County, water, just more or less a discussion. I'm not sure if you guys are aware or not, but Snowville is pretty much the only what's the correct word system where you can draw water out of a fire hydrant in Box Elder County, the county north of Tremonton. So anytime there's a county fire, a BLM fire, a state fire. Guess where they are coming to get water. They come to Snowville just like the other day. So the county was here. What brought it up, my what made me think about the county was here filling a 4,000-gallon water tanker for Park Valley the other day.

Mayor O'Hare said what do you mean for Park Valley.

AJ said to fight fire in Park Valley.

Mayor O'Hare said they don't have water.

AJ said well, that's the problem. So my opinion is, not only as the water operator but as a paying water customer. I don't think it's fair that 109 connections are paying to fight County Fire because that's pretty much what it is.

Tammie said Yeah.

AJ said the people that are paying to maintain the system are fighting the County. Fire, State fighter. BLM, fire, whatever you want to do.

Mayor O'Hare said okay.

AJ said all I need from you guys is to tell me what you want to do. If you want to charge that's not a problem with them getting water. It's whether you want to start charging them for water. What the law is as a municipality, if you can charge for water, I don't know those things.

LuAnn said yeah, well, I think we should check into that. And if we can charge them, let's charge them.

Rod asked did we have a meter-type thing.

AJ said I have a flow meter. I can put on it.

Mayor O'Hare said well, we did that, we did for the road construction.

Rod said yes.

AJ said I've got two flow meters. It's just a matter of in somebody's pulling water. You give me the authority to say, hey, doing you ain't pulling water from this? Nobody gave you permission to pull water.

LuAnn said Absolutely.

AJ said I just need to know what you guys want me as the water operator to do.

Because it is going to be an issue.

Mayor O'Hare said so you said there's only one. We're the only entity in Box Elder County that allows it.

AJ said well, we're the only one that has a system with fire hydrants to pull water out of fire hydrants, you can pull water out of flight irrigation systems.

Mayor O'Hare said Tremonton has no fire.

AJ said Tremonton does. But wells north of Tremonton, Howell doesn't Park Valley, doesn't.

Mayor O'Hare said they don't have any fire hydrants.

AJ said No, they don't have an organized water system like Snowville, everybody pulls water from Snowville.

Mayor O'Hare said so how do they get it?

AJ said Howell may have one.

Mayor O'Hare asked How does Tremonton or Park Valley get water then?

AJ said they probably pull out of wells. Carson would know irrigation wells.

Carson said they use irrigation wells. On the way back the County guys stop here for water. And just like the fire they are on tonight.

AJ said they're all going to be here.

Carson said the BLM guys are going to come fill up in about two hours.

AJ said You're going to have about five trucks in here wanting water to go back up there.

Mayor O'Hare said to go back to Idaho, no.

LuAnn said the bullcrap, that's not right.

Mayor O'Hare said so, what if we charge the town, the municipality, that that's getting the water, and instead of a fire department?

AJ said there is there's tons of money involved with fire. They're not fighting fire for free. There's money all over. So they just as well pay for their water.

Mayor O'Hare said Okay.

AJ said Because if they're not paying you, they're paying me to pull out my irrigation well.

Mayor O'Hare said so we charge, the fire department, or like the County, to get the water. And then if they and if they want to charge Park Valley, for their for fighting their fire.

LuAnn said you probably need a form that has to be filled out or something.

AJ said we have been we have forms.

Mayor O'Hare asked if there is a way we lock these fire hydrants so they can't get water.

AJ said no there is not a way to lock them. It's just a matter of time before somebody sees somebody say, Hey, you ain't pulling water. That's because that's what I need from you guys. Is, no they're not getting water. You have the authority to say the town council says you're not getting water unless you're buying that water. Because unless you give me that authority, I don't have that authority to tell them that, that's up to you guys.

LuAnn said you have the authority. But then, what do I say if I see a fire truck up here? Just what you said. But then what if they say, they tell me to stick it?

AJ said they're stealing water.

Mayor O'Hare said I think we don't have to have some type of documentation with the County, though.

Carson said So is that included?

AJ said I wished I really wanted to talk to Jed about this and see what he says again.

Mayor O'Hare said what did you say to Carson?

Carson said the county paid \$950 just to call out the fee.

Tammie said we have a contract.

Carson said so I don't know how much water that entails. I don't think they should be having to fill Park Valley's tender up. That's not all. They came to fill it up from Honeyville and they're just gonna go stage up there. There's not even a fire. We're just gonna go stage it up there. So when there is a fire, they have water.

Tim Heyder said that \$950 was for our Fire Department.

Tammie said Yeah.

Tim Heyder said the way we used to do it when Alan was here, we used.

LuAnn said that's ridiculous.

Tim Heyder said that needed on there with the backfill on, and we kept track of it and we charged. But it actually stopped.

AJ said It's hard to do because you'll have these fire trucks, they'll come in here, and they'll stop at any hydrant any time, and they just think they're right, because I called Jed when that truck was sitting out here. I called Jed and said, Hey, Jed, did you give him permission to pull water, he told me, yes. So if you're gonna do that, you need to tell Jed, no, that's not okay.

LuAnn said can we post something that the Hydrant? You guys all agreed that if AJ sees them or Carson.

Mayor O'Hare said we also need to get with Jed so everybody's on the same page. Rod said Yes, agreed.

Mayor O'Hare said and then we need to get Jed to let him know what's going on, so he can get up with the county fire marshal or whoever's in charge and tell them to let their crews know.

AJ said I really honestly think that they all know that, but they're going to take water until someone tells them they can't.

LuAnn said to go back to the water company or to the city.

AJ said because it's private water. I don't care who you are, it goes to the town's water. If you pull water in the hydrant without authority, you are stealing water.

Mayor O'Hare said right? That's just like the person that came up and charged their car, they're stealing electricity from the town, yeah.

AJ said or going and stealing something on the back of somebody's truck. You were stealing the water.

Tammie said and when you do that annual report, the reports are all out of whack.

Mayor O'Hare said yeah, where does the water go? Yeah, where's this water going?

Tammie said and we have to tell them where that water went.

AJ said every drop of water that comes through that Well, I have to account for sure whether it goes through a meter, and if it doesn't go through a meter, it's just lost water. And I have to file it as unclaimed water, and nobody has any idea where that goes. And sometimes it's millions and millions and millions of gallons of water that are unclaimed, because I have no idea where they went, that you as residents are paying for.

Mayor O'Hare asked so do we, do we charge the county than for the water? Or do we? Tim Heyder said Yes, you need to charge.

Mayor O'Hare said well, no, no, no, that's what I'm saying. Do we charge the county, or do we allow them to use the water? But they need to monitor that. We need to know how much they're taking.

LuAnn said well, a fire truck holds how many gallons.

Mayor O'Hare said Well, it all depends on the fire the engine will hold 500 the tanker will hold 4,000 you know.

Carson said this fire that they were out, they were already out there before they got a page. They just self-dispatch themselves. Jed told me they're not getting paid for this fire. Watch that city trucks out there. City trucks are out there, Box Elder County trucks are out there.

Mayor O'Hare said I got the text message too, and the page came in 15 minutes later.

Carson said Box Elder County. And Jed says, well, they're worried about how they're gonna pay us. And I said, we'll figure that out later, but I don't care if the birds will mount them.

Mayor O'Hare said well, we should be going anywhere until we get paged.

AJ said well, that's a discussion between you and your fire Chief.

Mayor O'Hare said yeah, and it'll be anything that got brought up earlier.

Carson said the conversation you have without it now.

Mayor O'Hare said Right, okay.

AJ said some checks and balances need to be put in place.

Mayor O'Hare said Correct. No, I agree.

LuAnn said I agree.

Colleen Hansen said are there other trucks other than County city and County Township.

Carson said the city with the black one he leaves parked at this house from his house. And then David took, I don't know there's three guys there. So they took the big county

truck, and yeah, then not only that, was the structure fire or county fire in Box Elder County, they have to wait till they get back to Malta. To fight it.

Mayor O'Hare said so how come Idaho is not fighting their own fire? Okay. Do we have a contract with Idaho to fight grass fires?

Carson said he was working on getting the counties, working on doing an interstate.

Mayor O'Hare said so I need to have one of you town council members LuAnn

LuAnn said what?

Mayor O'Hare said I'll need to have one of you when we sit down to talk to the chief about this, I'll have to have another council member. Oh, yeah, yeah, because I can have one town council member, yeah, I just can't have to because then it has to be public then we have to post it, have a meeting, yeah? So as long as one of you is available tomorrow.

Rod said in the evening, sorry, an evening. Okay,

LuAnn said I can do it anytime. Okay.

Mayor O'Hare said I'll find out from him when he's available tomorrow. If it's during the day, I'll get I'll get up with you. If it's at night, I'll get up with you. That sounds good, okay.

AJ said and Jed, as far as water may be billing the County, but I need to put a flow meter on there. So when you talk to Jed, see what gets he may have this all under control, but we just need to put a flow meter on there. And I need to be aware that they're taking water because sometimes it's like a fire like that. If I knew they were coming to get water, I really ought to kick the other pump so.

Mayor O'Hare said yeah, especially if they're doing 4000 gallons and all that. Now, if there's a flow meter on there, what? What stops them from going down the street?

AJ said well, if they don't, then that's an issue, because you'll see, and it's going to be a fire season. So these is the only fire trucks that will stop at all kinds of different hydrants, and they try to get in and out of here before anybody even knows they got water. It happens.

Stacey said I haven't seen any money coming from them.

LuAnn said so we're not getting any.

Mayor O'Hare, we'll talk to the chief tomorrow, yeah

Tim Heyder said I would put a meter on that hydrant by the fire station and they can't fill up anywhere else.

Mayor O'Hare said if you see a County truck at another fire hydrant filling up water, take a picture. Just take a picture of it, and then we'll just send a picture of the county and say, you know.

AJ said and as far as I'm concerned, that's the mean county ought to be responsible. So if I read that meter, any water that goes to that meter ought to be billed in the County, the County, I know they can take water, then the County can deal with Idaho.

Mayor O'Hare asked you to put a lock on it.

AJ said there's no way to put a lock on it. You can't lock fire hydrants.

Rod said that's right, yeah, it's a safety issue for fire safety.
AJ said you can't lock fire hydrants.

Mayor O'Hare said Well, can, is there not some other Well, no, that'd be a cost of money putting another.

AJ said hydrants have to be accessible.

Mayor O'Hare said No, no fire hydrant, but just a regular hydrant. You know, I'm saying just when it comes out of the ground, it goes 90 degrees and there's a lock on that, and that's what they used to fill up with, not the car hydrant.

AJ said yeah, but you know, but then you got a cost?

Mayor O'Hare said No, I know,

LuAnn said I didn't know that we weren't getting paid for any of the water for the fires. I've seen them filling up.

Trisha said this has been an ongoing concern.

AJ said I just want to make you guys aware of it. Council may not have dealt with it, at least.

Mayor O'Hare said I didn't know anything about it. I thought when they came and got water, they were getting charged. They were charging them for it.

AJ said you have no idea what they're taking.

Mayor O'Hare said okay, so we're all in agreement to charge the county for the water they take.

LuAnn said Absolutely.

Rod said they need to be accountable.

AJ said and I think the town if you're taking county trucks, I think the county ought to pay for the water goes county trucks. I think the only ones that shouldn't have to pay if it's a town truck.

Mayor O'Hare said right.

Carson said another thing, that big tender going water people's branding corrals with city water also, and I don't want them, I'm anonymous, but it'll drive clear. It'll drive good Idaho and water branding corrals for people, the county says, All right, they're not paying for the water. And I always thought that there was a barrier there.

Mayor O'Hare said okay, hold on for a minute. Now we're now, we're getting into Okay, so the county tender. Tender out, watering. What did you call because I'm not, I'm not, a farmer. Say again, the corrals, branding, branding, trails, corrals, okay? Branding? Oh, that's the corrals that you guys put all the cows in when you brand them and all that.

LuAnn said Yes,

Mayor O'Hare said okay, I, like I said, I'm not a farmer. I see it. I see crap going on, but I can't tell you half of what's going on.

LuAnn said Who gives him permission to do that?

Carson said Fire Marshal said he's trying to do it.

Trisha said but he's paying for the fuel?

Mayor O'Hare said The county pays for their own fuel. It's count, it's a county, but the water that's in there is the town's water

Tammie said I don't know how that works because we made the fuel bill on those trucks. Yeah.

Mayor O'Hare said So then, so then the county can't give permission for it.
Carson said I don't know.

Mayor O'Hare said They can get tech. We can get technical.

Tammie said each truck should have a card in it. So when it comes through, it should list what truck it's for. I feel like the same people use the same PIN number, yeah. So it all gets applied to EMS, like, oh, for the ambulance, yeah, maybe we need to retrain on that.

Mayor O'Hare said well, it should be, the card should be for one vehicle with a pin number for that vehicle.

LuAnns said and that pin number should match the number on every individual number.
AJ said so when I get fuel, I type my number in.

Tammie said So you know.

AJ said that activates if you still have to put a number in, right?

Mayor O'Hare said the driver ID, yes, yeah. Driver number.

AJ said I have my own numbers. They know it opens the building,

Tammie said and that's to keep track of who's going in and out, who's buying fuel.

Mayor O'Hare said So the fuel that's being charged to all these going, it's separated, so you can see it.

Tammie said as long as everyone's using the right numbers.

Mayor O'Hare said Snowville, has a the contract with the county, as we pay for the fuel for the trucks.

Tammie said No, no, they pay for it. They should.

Mayor O'Hare said Okay,

Tammie said they should get reimbursed when we get a payment on fire. if that makes sense,

Mayor OHare said gotcha.

Tammie said because they and

Mayor O'Hare said are we getting reimbursed for it?

Stacey said I haven't seen any money?

Mayor O'Hare said Okay

Trisha said Yeah, when you get payment on fire, going out you're not getting money who's paying for the fuel?

Tammie said I don't know that anymore, what they agree on.

Trisha said we are.

Tammie said they pay so much per call-out depending on how many firefighters show up to go on. So I think that they just figure that covers the fuel on the ones that you don't end up fighting fire on. If that makes sense.

LuAnn asked so if they go out on a call before they're paged, it's for free.

Tammie said I don't think so.

Carson said I don't think they were even paged.

Mayor O'Hare said well, no, that's I'm saying they went out on a call without being paged.

Carson said they called, he called them to the dispatch and said, a page Snowville for this, and we'll do whatever it takes.

Mayor O'Hare said Well, yeah, I understand that.

Carson said But so many firefighters.

Tim Heyder said you have to have so many
Firefighters respond.

Carson said that's fine.

Mayor O'Hare said We'll just talk to him about it and ask him to clarify. No, I've already had two complaints about different incidents that we have.

Carson said that is how ParkValley works.

Mayor O'Hare said well again, if the county is allowing them to go and use their trucks to go water corrals and stuff, that's fine, and they're paying for the fuel, that's fine, but they're gonna pay for the water. They're gonna pay for the water if they allow them to go out and then, whoever's driving the truck and spraying the water can get paid from the county, not from, not from Snowville. Yeah, I don't think you get it. Right? Well, I'm just saying if they think they're going to get paid, they can get paid from the county.

Carolyn said when Tim and I were in town council together, we had to bring the fire chief in and have a big discussion. And somebody quit because we were questioning their integrity. And that wasn't it. It was that the town is responsible for both that equipment over there, and if you choose to use it as your own personal

their own checking account, and all the money they got, they did it whatever they wanted. We took the money away from them, and it caused a lot of problems.

Mayor O'Hare said well, there's, you've got to be accountable your town, the town, ultimately, the town's in charge of it, so, yeah, okay,

AJ said sorry about that big discussion.

Mayor O'Hare said No, no, you're fine.

AJ said I am just concerned about the residents of Snowville.

Mayor O'Hare said correct. And I and that's what your job is to do, is to let us know, and I'm glad you did.

LuAnn said because now we can stop them. And then, what if they just can? Then if they just do it, then,

Mayor O'Hare said so can that flow meter that goes on the hydrant,

Trisha said once they figure out that somebody's watching they're gonna be.

Mayor O'Hare said can I be taken off, or does it lock all the Hydrant?

AJ said you take it off if they want to be dishonest. You can still water if you want to be dishonest.

Mayor O'Hare said Okay. I was just wondering, do we just go ahead and put the flow meter on that hydrant now and leave it on there? I can or somebody gonna come and take it, steal it.

AJ said Hey, stop here and get water. It's almost like inviting somebody to stop and get water.

If I do it.

Mayor O'Hare said so, we have to have some type of communication before they come to get water.

AJ said have a discussion with Jed and see what Jed's thoughts with the county are, and then let me know.

Mayor O'Hare said okay, right.

AJ said In years past, BLM will be in the night. Idaho will be here if they get a fire truck, Idaho will be here tonight,

Carson said before and after they can have water.

Trisha said so we need to figure out how we build the BLM too?

Mayor O'Hare said But what we would bill them the same way we bill when had the construction crews, we bill them. I think it was five cents a gallon, up to 10,000 gallons.

AJ said It's on the form.

Mayor O'Hare said yeah. So we just use the same, the same format, yeah. I mean, it's water, water. It doesn't matter where it goes, it's water.

Stacey said The billing is also in place.

Mayor O'Hare said okay? So that's what we start doing. Then we but we just needed to how much water they were taking.

AJ said Water is not free. Will cost more and more and more every day.

Mayor O'Hare said No, I agree.

AJ said there's going to be a huge call for Water in this valley here fairly soon.

Mayor O'Hare said Yeah,

AJ said and it's not going to be good, and every drop is going to be accounted for.

Mayor O'Hare said yep, to the fire marshal Scott, give the county members. At this point, I don't think I trust anybody you know, because it seems like everybody's trying to go around.

Carson said and there's a new fire marshal too. It's not Corey Park anymore. His name is Kevin Lloyd, so he might not have any idea.

Mayor O'Hare said oh, who's Scott?

Carson said his name is Kevin Lloyd. Now. He's a new fire marshal,

Mayor O'Hare asked Tim Heyder, Who were you talking about at the county? You said, if you were just saying, call the county just said the county fire marshal, Scott?

Carson said, Kevin Lloyd.

Mayor O'Hare said yeah, well, no, I'm gonna

go. I'm gonna go to the chief first because I don't want to go over anybody's head and do it by the chain of command. I don't want to go behind the chief's back. And if we're gonna and if we're gonna go then I want the chief there too, because that way.

Tim Heyder said but our local trucks or the more call-out fee is the water that they filled their trucks with to go out on that initial call.

Mayor O'Hare said yeah.

LuAnn said that part of that money should come back to the city for the water.

Timm Heyder said when, they pay you, yeah?

Carson said I think you should lock the water inside the station too. Every time it goes in, you gotta have a log on the fire station. So that goes in brush 145 this has how many start gallons and gallons you turn in every month.

Mayor O'Hare said yeah.

Carson said so one inside the station. That's the one I can fill up. That's where the brush trucks fill up. The tanker fills up.

LuAnn said Yeah, that's true. I didn't know that we even had a problem.

Stacey said it is going to get worse.

Carson said I don't like complaining. I don't want to be brought up.

LuAnn said we don't even know who said it okay.

Mayor O'Hare said What happens at the Snowville town meeting, stays in Texas. Remember that?

AJ said No, I don't think anybody should have an issue. These are valid concerns.

Mayor O'Hare said no, it is what it is. Anything else.

AJ said I don't have anything. Oh, I do have something. The big Well possibly may be going bad. I know we talked about it. We fixed the wire. I got an alert on my phone the other day that the water level was low. The big pump wasn't on. It obviously wasn't keeping up. So I kind of did a calculation. It should be pumping about 250 gallons a minute. It's only putting about 175 out a minute right now, shortly, when that pump is going bad. So just to be aware, it was about time, that it's about time. So just be aware. I changed when the pumps kicked on the levels to make sure they both kicked on earlier to keep the tanks full. But just be aware, may be replaced.

Mayor O'Hare asked do we have money put aside for the 2 million for the new pump.

Tammie said \$2,000,000.

Mayor O'Hare said 11 grand, isn't it? We paid 11 grand the last time.

AJ said we paid \$20,000.

Mayor O'Hare said yeah, so we paid 11 grand for last time. I think, if I remember correctly, okay, Council Member Gary, do you have anything?

Rod said there are just a couple outstanding things that we've been Tim Munns have been talking about, you know, the water usage type things, and says there's going to be some more meetings coming up on it. We also had the that one initiative that we were supposed to make in the accounting of all the residents of Snowville for the lead and copper-type things, and I think that was Eric. Eric was taking care of that.

Mayor O'Hare said yeah.

AJ said Eric's not taking care of that. Sunrise Engineering was taken care of it.

Rod said Sunrise Engineering.

AJ said and somehow they got funding from the State to do that. So they've been all over that.

Tammie said right, they've been in contact.

AJ said they've been contacted with us, as far as I know, they've done what they're supposed to in the first in the first phase, they're done.

Rod said all right, that was my only comment, you know, because I know that we were supposed there's a deadline that we were supposed to have phase one done or something. And then there's the, you know, Rural Water conservatory type thing that Tim Munns is kind of heading up that's still ongoing.

Tammie said so are there still meetings for that?

Rod said Yeah, he says there's still ongoing meetings and stuff like that. So not that it's, you know, any actions type things, but just be aware FYI.

Tammie said I just thought there was one meeting, the big meeting.

Rod said they're still holding them he told caught me last Sunday. Says, now we're gonna have another meeting here soon. He told me that he would let me know.

Mayor O'Hare asked Rod anything else.

Rod said no.

Mayor O'Hare said Okay, thank you, Council Member Johnson.

LuAnn said they're not all the way done. I don't think with the chip seal, they must have ran out or something, but they didn't come back out today to finish it. They were supposed to go on the Dairy Road, down through the dip, and up to the first driveway, but they only made it partway. So I'll have to call that guy, and find out. Can remember his name, he's on my phone. I'll have to call him and find out if they're gonna finish it

because we shouldn't. We don't have our whole mile in if they don't finish it. So the bid was for the mile of chip seal. So I'll, I'll try and get a hold of him tomorrow, and then. Mayor O'Hare said I'm gonna let you go ahead and do this one.

LuAnn said Scott and I talked with the lawyer on the control of rabies and rabid animals, and what we found out was it's actually the health department that takes care that oversees that part of it, it's not the state. They don't have anything in place for not accepting or accepting waivers, but there are a lot of other countries that do accept the waivers. So the attorney said that he would think we'd be fine to accept the waiver, even without the resolution. Just do it on a case-by-case basis. Angie White was called. It wasn't actually Angie.

Mayor O'Hare said It was another, yeah, the other gentleman that called me, it was saying.

LuAnns said that they don't, they don't have anything in place there.

Mayor O'Hare said our health department is Bear River Health Department.

LuAnn said yeah.

Mayor O'Hare said they have nothing on their books for animal control.

LuAnn said and the attorney also said it is the county or city who can accept the waiver. So we would just accept that on a case-by-case basis.

Mayor O'Hare said Davis County has its health department, they have it. You can go on the website and see it. They have, and they accept waivers for every year. They'll have to renew it every year. And then Utah County, or is it Utah County or Weber County, Weber County?

LuAnn said Utah and Weber.

Mayor O'Hare said and Utah,

LuAnn said Yeah, they both accept them. So our attorney said he is just assuming that it's fine to do because other counties are doing it. And he looked that up for us, and he just said that what we're doing should be fine the way we're doing it.

Mayor O'Hare said and he said Not, not to worry about changing the ordinance.

LuAnn said Yeah,

Mayor O'Hare said so don't worry about changing anything in the ordinance. Leave the ordinance way. It is just the council can decide,

LuAnn said yeah,

Mayor O'Hare said on a case-by-case basis, if somebody like, I don't think we're going to have this big influx of people coming in saying, oh, rubbish, or with waivers from their vets.

LuAnn said so, and there is a statute in the Utah laws that says that the dogs have to be vaccinated, but waivers are acceptable, and the city decides that the city or the county, whichever decides that. So he said he thinks we're well within our rights to do that.

Mayor O'Hare said so any questions from either one of you, Does anybody have any questions about that?

Mayor O'Hare said okay, so we're gonna put this to bed. That's over and done with, councilmember O'Hare is absent.

Mayor O'Hare said Council member, Arbon. Do you have anything for tonight?

Trisha said no.

Mayor O'Hare said Okay, I wanted to. I added something here at the end of the water bill. We've already started notifying people of the No watering between the hours of 10 am and 6 pm.

Stacey said we could post it as a public notice.

Okay, when will that go out?

Stacey said I can do it tonight.

LuAnn said 10 am and 6 pm, right?

Mayor O'Hare said Is it 10 am-6 pm is that what we had?

LuAnn said I think so.

Tammie said It has been.

Mayor O'Hare said okay go ahead.

AJ said I don't know if that's a huge concern anymore. Mayor O'Hare said Okay.

AJ said when you drive up the road, nobody waters their lawns anymore, anyway.

Mayor O'Hare said I am. I got my sprinkler system fixed.

AJ said you can put on two hands. Who waters their lawn in the valley?

Mayor O'Hare said okay, it's not like it used to be, so.

Mayor O'Hare said okay,

LuAnn said Brent's been watering the cemetery a lot. Is that exempt?

AJ said it has its own well.

LuAnn said okay, because if we don't then.

Mayor O'Hare said that's got its own well.

AJ said so do what you want. I think, as of right now, I think we're fine.

Mayor O'Hare said so it should come from you.

AJ said don't worry about it right now.

Mayor O'Hare said so don't worry about it okay.

AJ said I only have one low Alert on my phone.

Mayor O'Hare said okay.

AJ said that's because I had the water level a little bit lower than it probably needed to.

And I think the wells. But as of right now, I don't think it's an issue. My phone tells me if the water levels are low.

Mayor O'Hare said okay.

AJ said and I have only had that one alert.

Mayor O'Hare said so if you say we're good, I'm not sure why we should be.

AJ said okay we can talk about next month.

Mayor O'Hare said or if you feel the need, if you start seeing something going on and you say, hey, we need to, do this then go ahead.

AJ said I would almost encourage people to use water. Mayor O'Hare said yeah.

AJ said I think we're almost to the point now. I don't know what our revenue is, but I know the revenue was down, Tammie said yeah.

AJ said just from reading meters that we may need to adjust water rates higher just because of the nonuse of water. So you have to maintain a system whether you use water or not.

Mayor O'Hare said No, agreed,

AJ said people aren't going to use water. Don't want to pay for water, but they're going to pay for it one way or another.

Mayor O'Hare said yeah.

AJ said that's what I tell people, you just won't water your lawns. If you don't water your lawn, you're going to pay for it another way.

Mayor O'Hare said right.

Tammie said so, did they put water in the grapes because did they freeze?

AJ said I don't know.

LuAnn said well, they've been putting some white powder on the base of them. And the ones that they've done that to are coming back.

Tammie said I noticed that.

LuAnn said so they just go with this big bucket, and they're just putting a scoop of white powder underneath, and then they're watering them really well. They hit it maybe twice a week. There are just 20 of those guys, and they just work their guts out. And so I think.

Mayor O'Hare said sorry.

LuAnn said I think some of them are coming back.

Rod said and they water from irrigation water.

LuAnn said yeah.

Rod said so it's not all but these.

AJ said the ones over by the school.

Mayor O'Hare said but my water and my water is back on, so I'm watering my yard now. We are there every day for public comments. At this time, we are going to invite the public to make any comments that you may have. This is not an answer-in-question time for the council. The council will not answer any questions, but if you have a comment to make that you want the council to be aware of, now is the time, and we'll open. Up the floor to anybody.

AJ said I only have a comment because I forgot to mention AJ Morgan, so we've had, I mean, I'm talking on behalf of the water operator.

Mayor O'Hare oh, I'm sorry.

AJ said so we've had a second positive water sample. We've had two this year so far. If we get a third, another third possible bad water sample. I'm seriously thinking about pulling my own water samples and taking them to the health department, instead of having the Bear River Health Department come home because they pull them at Flying J out of that hydrant or that kitchen sink or whatever that's just inside the door, because that's where it's the most convenient for them to pull and add it, anywhere in Snowville, that's probably the filthiest place to pull water sample.

LuAnn said to have them come to my house and get it.

AJ said well, they won't, because they come and do their own thing.

Mayor O'Hare asked if would they just pull it from a hydrant.

AJ said No, they won't pull them from a hydrant. So that's what they do. So if we get it, I'm just throwing this out, if we get another positive water sample.

Mayor O'Hare asked what is it positive for.

AJ said chloroform is not for E coli. So what happens is I have to pull repeat samples, and I have to take them to Logan, and drop everything. It's kind of a pain because it has to be done in 24 hours. And I've never had a positive sample, but I've taken my own and sent them back, so.

Mayor O'Hare said so they only pull from one source.

AJ said they pull from one source Flying J.

Mayor O'Hare said that doesn't make sense. It should be pulled from multiple sources.

LuAnn said and everyone in the world probably uses that sink.

AJ said so when I pull them, I actually take my lighter and I heat the bottom up to kill whatever's there.

Mayor O'Hare said Yeah.

AJ said well, that's fine because that's what they ought to do too.

LuAnn said Exactly.

AJ said so if it does it again, I may start pulling my own water sample.

LuAnn said who knows what else they wash.

Mayor O'Hare said can we just do that anyway?

AJ said we can do that, Howell does that themselves.

Mayor O'Hare said so what's the cost of us doing it?

AJ said it would be for them to run the samples and then for my mileage to go there and back.

Mayor O'Hare said okay.

AJ said you're probably paying them to come do it anyway.

Stacey said they charged us \$30 to do the water sample.

Mayor O'Hare said we're paying them \$30 every time they come out to do a water sample.

LuAnn asked how often they come out.

AJ said once a month, and it's random. Sometimes I think it's the beginning of the month, sometimes all I do is get a call that you have a positive water sample. You have 24 hours to pull repeat samples. And if it's on a Thursday, you're paying \$300 for them to run them on Friday.

Mayor O'Hare said Let's just cancel them and we'll pull.

AJ said let's just see what happens if we get another one, we're good, then we'll think about it, because it is going to be a pain for me.

Mayor O'Hare said when did they pull this last one?

AJ said like the 12th.

Tammie said no, it was before Juneteenth, the 19th, because we were all boating, I ran the Logan.

AJ said just giving you a heads up.

Mayor O'Hare said okay, okay,

AJ said and I've asked him about that, to pull from somewhere else, and he says that they have to be accessible, 24/7, and easy to get to, and that's where they pull them.

Mayor O'Hare said why does that have to be 24/7?

AJ said they come at any time.

Mayor O'Hare said it would just be better, just for us to do it.

AJ said and don't get me wrong, they've been good. He's been good this Ben Harbor, is that his name?

Tammie said Yeah.

AJ said he's really nice.

Mayor O'Hare said did you watch him pull a sample?

AJ said, I don't. They just do. The only thing I know is, if it comes back bad, I have no idea when they pull them nothing.

Tammie said yeah,

Mayor O'Hare said I would ask him if you can if you can watch them pull a sample.

AJ said I can talk to Ben and see if.

Mayor O'Hare said I mean, say nothing against you. But we've had two positives that we've never had positives, and I'm trying to figure this out.

AJ said we roughly do one a year in the heat of the summer, but we've had two this year already.

Mayor O'Hare said okay, so anybody else public comment?

LuAnn said chloroform? What would cause chloroform? What's something that would give you a positive on chloroform?

AJ said bacteria, is the big issue, but we never had E coli. It's just chloroform.

AJ said when I cracked a fire hydrant the other day, I had 18 people call me if I knew I had a fire hydrant open. Yes, I know.

Rod said at least you got a public comment.

Mayor O'Hare said It was nice to let you know.

AJ said Yeah.

LuAnn said can I make a motion for the expenses with the addition of Trisha's.

Mayor O'Hare said yep. So I need everybody to see the expenses we've added. Tricia is paid on there.

LuAnn said I make a motion to accept the expenses with the addition of Trisha Arbon's.
Trisha said I second it.

Mayor O'Hare said I've got a motion from Luann seconded by Tricia. All in favor. Any opposed. I need a motion to adjourn.

Rod said I Motion to adjourn our meeting.

Mayor O'Hare asked for a second.

LuAnn said second. All in favor, aye, any opposed, we are adjourned
