Overview: What is a Community Health Assessment?

- A Community Health Assessment (CHA) is a fundamental tool of public health practice.
- Its aim is to describe the health of the community, by presenting information on health status, community health needs, resources, and epidemiologic and other studies of current local health problems.

Community Health Assessment Process

01



Collect & Gather Data

Gather secondary data, and collect primary data via community engagement activities such as conducting a Community Survey and focus groups

02



Analyze Data

Analyze data from secondary and primary data sources using appropriate statistical methodology

03



Identify Health Priorities & Write Report

Use CHA data to identify priority issues, and key factors impacting health in Summit County

04



Share Results

Share CHA results with community as well as stake holders

05



Develop 5-year Community Health Improvement Plan

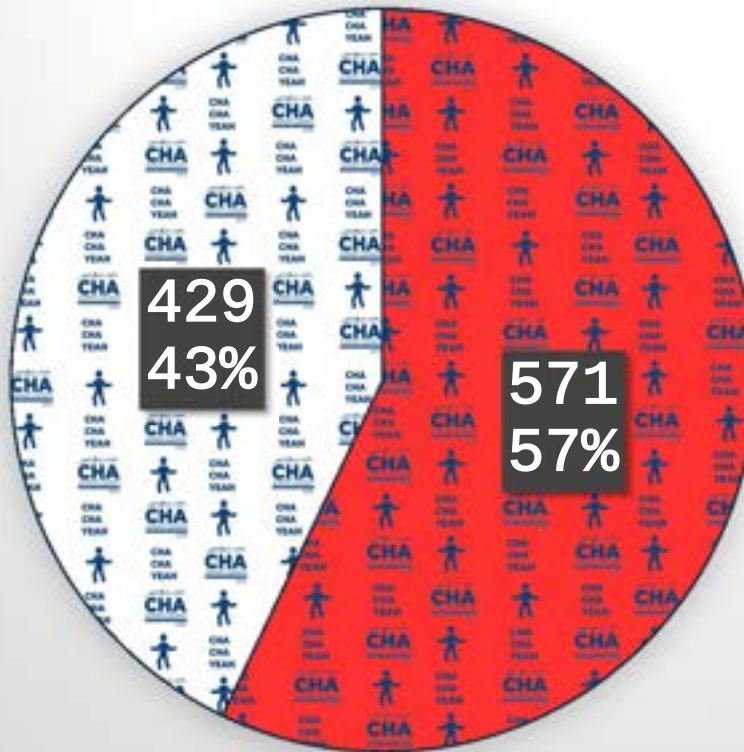
Use CHA data to develop and implement strategies for action. This is done in the form of a community health improvement plan (CHIP)

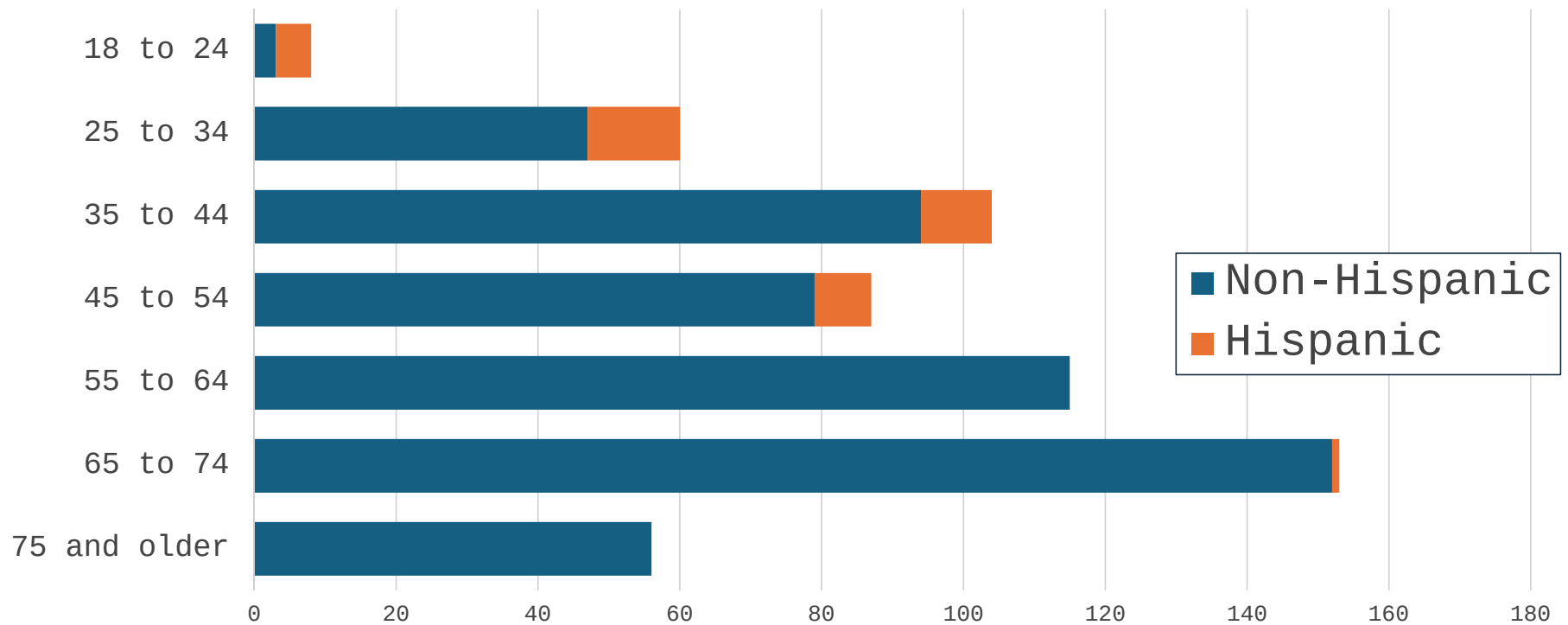

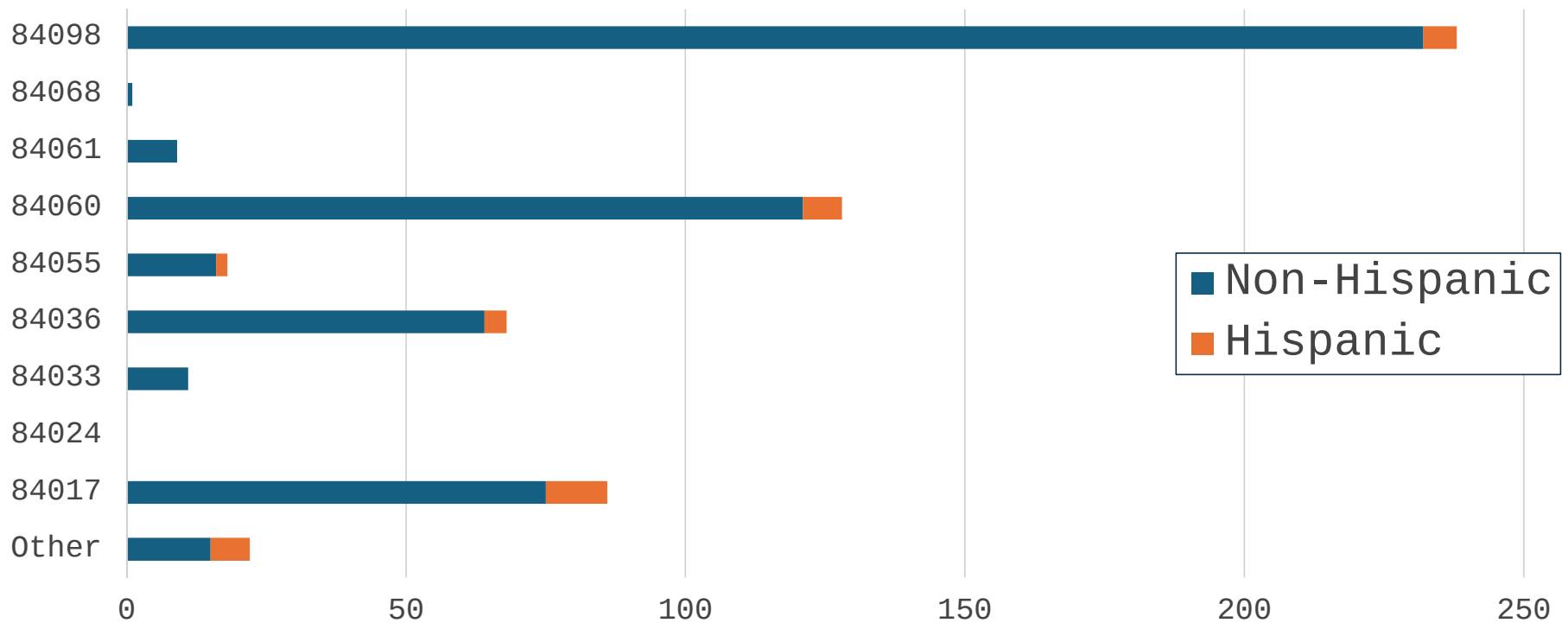

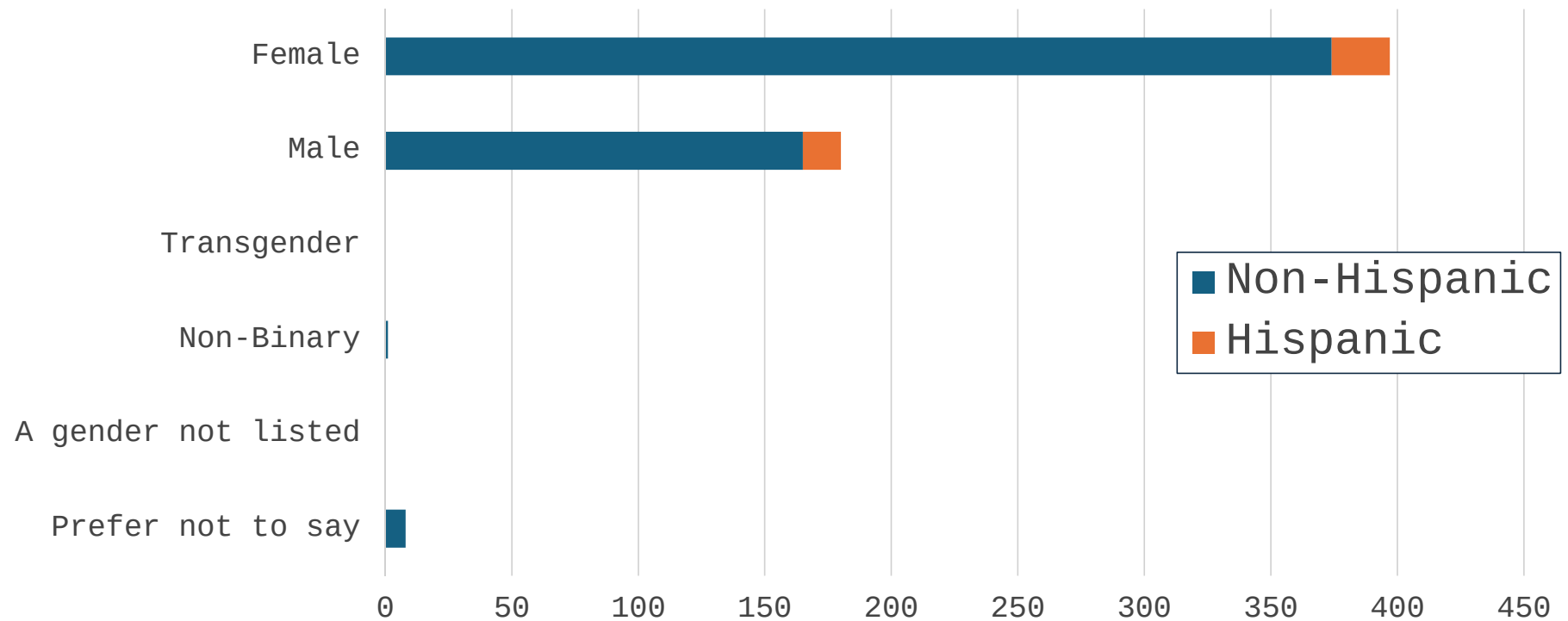
Survey Demographics: Age by Ethnicity



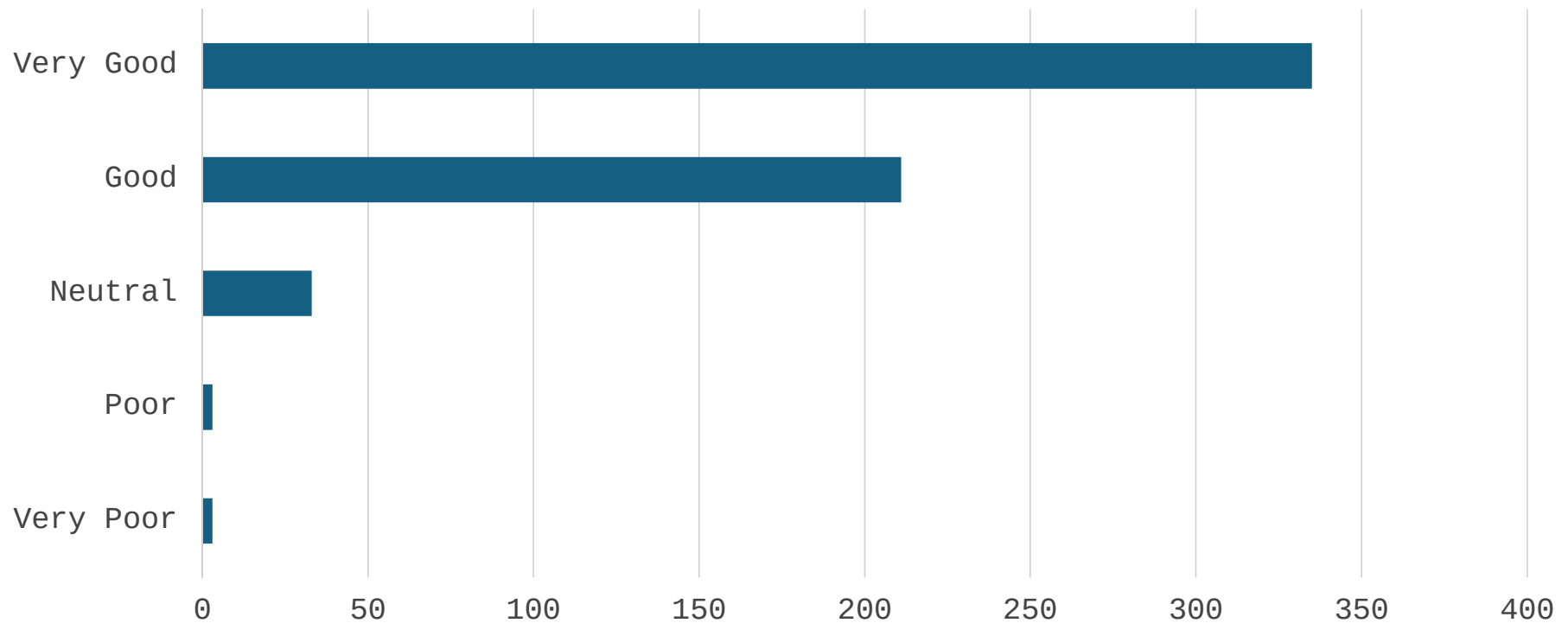
Survey Demographics: ZIP Code by Ethnicity



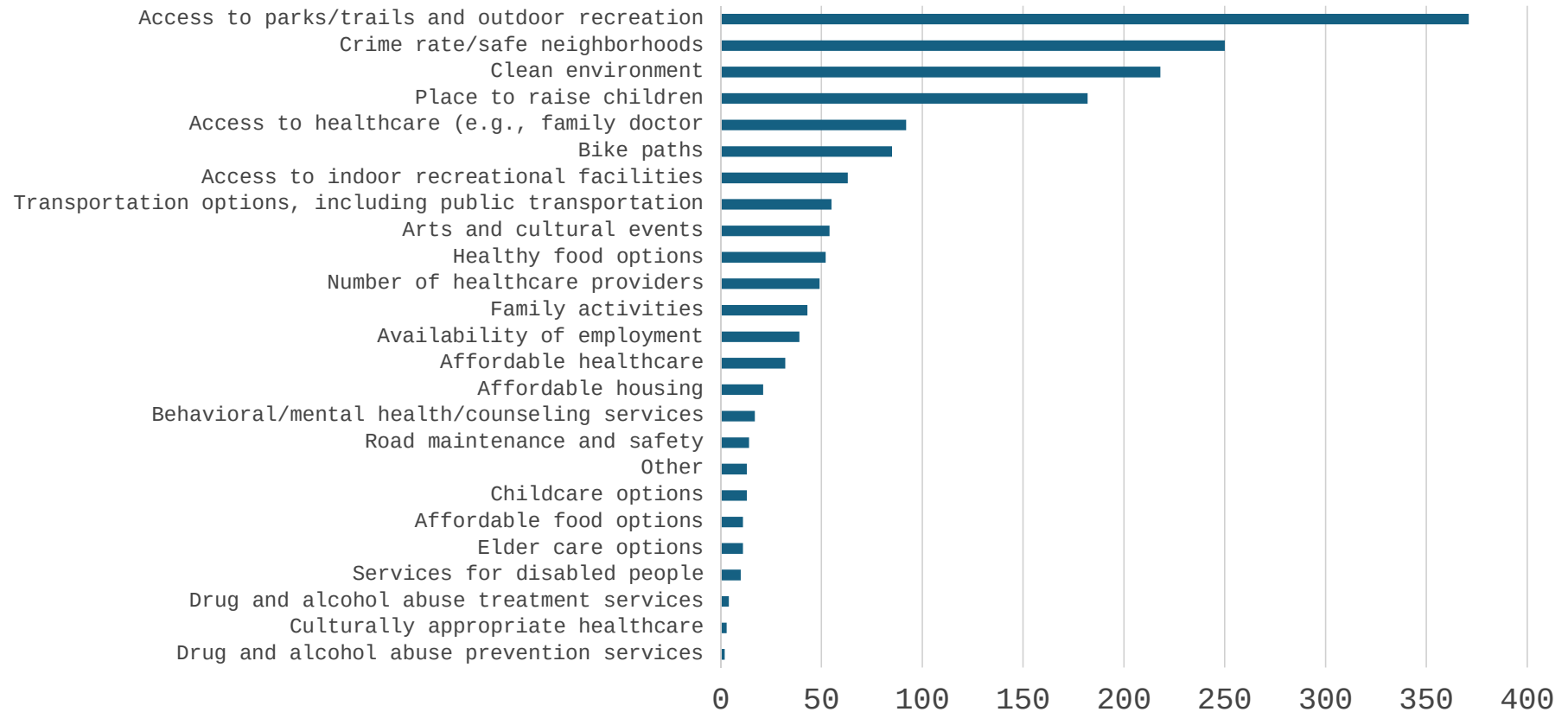
Survey Demographics: Gender by Ethnicity

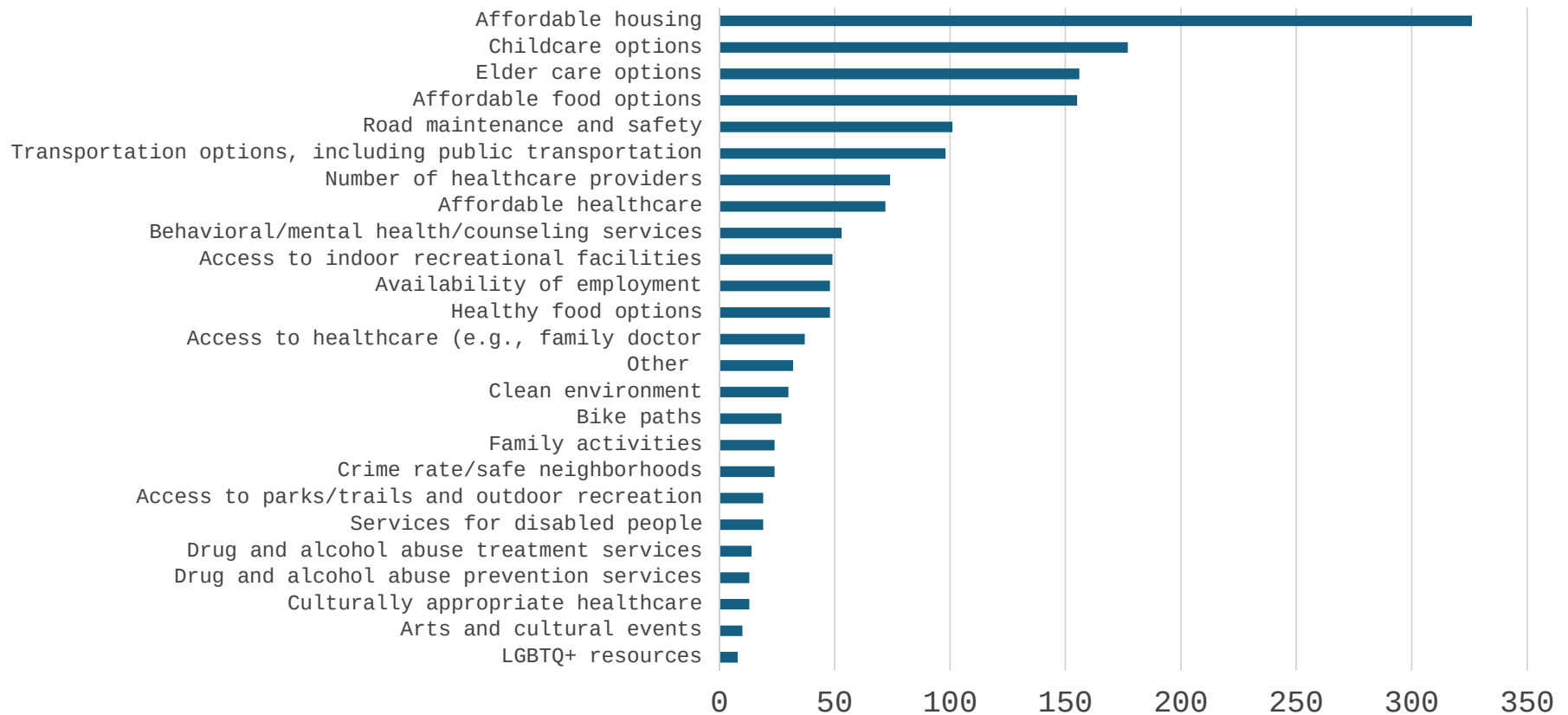

Motivation for Sept 19th theme

- In May 2024, the Health Department hosted two *Health + Our Changing Environment* events as part of the Community Health Assessment (CHA)
- Each event included a presentation on risks associated with a changing environment in Summit County, including wildfire and drought, followed by focus group discussions to hear from community members
- The breakout discussions were facilitated by staff and volunteers with the Mountain Mediation Center who provided a summary report to Health Department staff after the event
- Themes and comments were wide-ranging and included the following related to the agricultural community and economy in Summit County:
 - *Questions about the implications of drought on crops and livestock*
 - *Curiosity about potential shifts in growing seasons*
 - *Anxiety about water availability for all facets of the community*
 - *Concerns for mental health of those working in the agricultural sector*

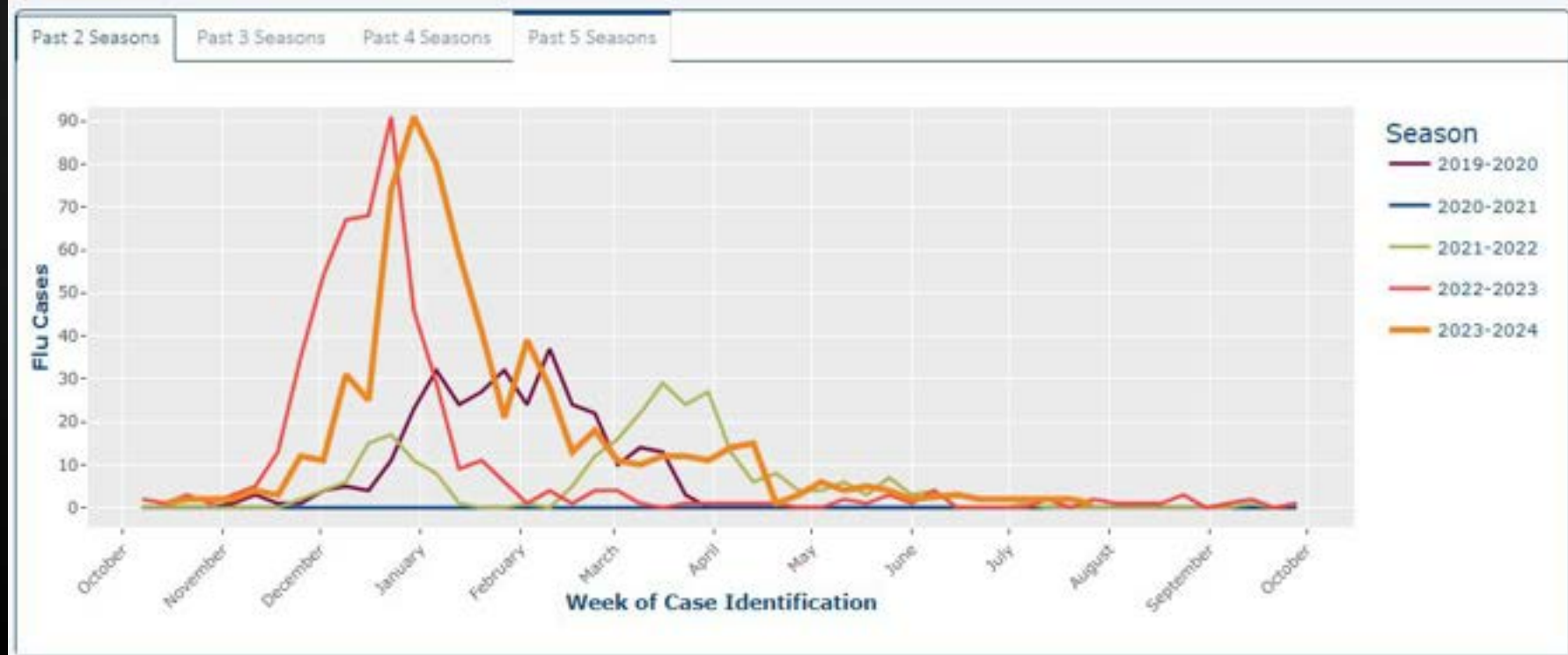


IS INSURANCE NEEDED

- o The county doesn't take all insurances, but we take most - added 2 insurance carriers this year
- o We have Flu vaccine for adults and children that are uninsured
- o We are hoping to have covid vaccine for adults and children that are uninsured-not sure if it will be here in time for drive thru clinics

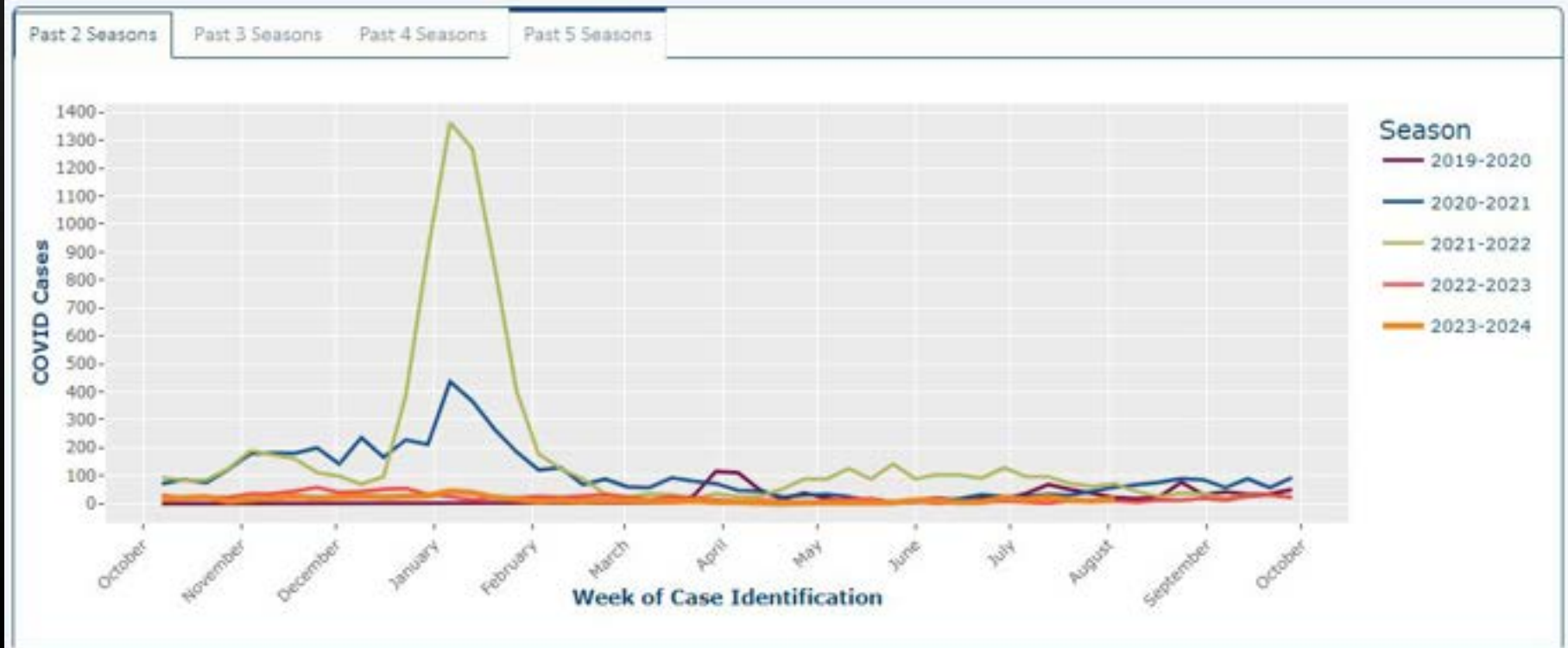
FLU SEASON TRENDS

FLU SEASON 7/1/22-6/30/23

- LESS THAN 18 YEARS OF AGE 32.9%
- ADULTS OVER AGE 19 YEARS 26.2%

COVID VACCINE RECORDED

≥1 DOSE BIVALENT COVID

- 19-34 YEARS 16.1%
- 35-49 YEARS 24.2%
- 50-65 YEARS 39.1%
- 65+ YEARS 60.2%
