





**Matters for Discussion**

- 1. Box, Bundle, and Bag – City Cleanup Program.** Public Works Director, Dennis Pay, reviewed a handout on this program with the Council. A copy is attached to these minutes and incorporated by this reference. This is Ace's program and will not use any City equipment. Ace will supply the labor and the trucks. If the City goes with this program it will start this fall and will be done in both fall and spring. Ace said the spring cleanup would be the first two weeks of May and the fall cleanup would be the first two weeks of November. The cost is about \$9,000 dollars per cleanup.

Council Chair Jones asked about green waste pickup.

Mr. Pay advised that waste pick up runs for eight months, April through November. The residents would only be billed for those eight months and the cost would be \$3.86 per cart per month. That is the City wide rate. If they do an "opt out" program the cost is

\$4.48 per cart per month. Under the “opt out” program, if participation is less than fifty percent the price per cart is \$5.23 per cart per month.

2. **Carlisle Neighborhood Open Space Master Plan.** Urban Design Director, Sharen Hauri, and Deputy Community Development Director, Frank Lilly, reviewed a handout on this Master Plan with the Council. A copy is attached to these minutes and incorporated by this reference.

Mr. Lilly advised the Council that the Master Plan will have two options, one option for an elementary school and another option for townhouses if the school does not come.

3. **Budget Discussion.** Council Member Snow asked how close the sewer rate study was to being completed.

Mr. Pay advised that they have a draft master plan that staff is currently reviewing. Their comments will go back to the preparers for the final draft. They are working on the rate study as well which should follow shortly after the master plan. It should be wrapped up by August with recommendations for sewer rates sometime in the fall.

Council Member Rapp asked about the 300 East road project. He asked if they were doing the sewer system under the road as well.

Mr. Pay said they were not because it's not the City's sewer but staff has notified other entities that have services under the road that the project is coming and suggested they fix any issues they have before the road is done so it won't have to be cut open later. Several have come in and made their repairs or upgrades. All the underground work will be done this year and the road will be started in the spring.

Council Chair Jones asked if staff was doing a storm water study.

Mr. Pay advised they do not have funds to do a storm water master plan. There are three master plans that he feels are a priority. They are sidewalk, storm drain, and transportation master plans. A storm drain master plan was done in 2000. It is now outdated and much of it was never implemented because of lack of funding.

Council Member Snow asked about the \$400,000 dollars for streetcar operations and maintenance.


Mr. Pay advised that this money is not for improvements. The City is obligated to help with maintenance for two years for a total of \$800,000. He hopes in the future they will be able to put some improvements in and dress it up more.

Ms. Hauri advised the Council that Salt Lake County has budgeted \$1.2 million dollars for South Salt Lake's section for the Parley's Trail, lighting, and irrigation. Another three million is earmarked for west of 300 West. Ms. Hauri also said that Salt Lake County just removed some lighting and irrigation from the project to meet their budget.

The meeting adjourned at 7:20 p.m.

# REGULATIONS AND GUIDELINES FOR BULK PICK UP

Bulky waste items are loaded by hand into a rear-loading waste collection vehicle. To make it easier to pick up the bulky waste material and help prevent littering, the items must be bagged, boxed, or bundled according to established rules and guidelines. All items must be cut or broken down to a 4 ft length or smaller and must not weigh more than 75 lbs. The collection crew has the discretion to refuse any items or materials that do not meet the guidelines outlined below.

## YARD WASTE

You can bag, box, or bundle excess yard waste (no grass clippings). Boxes must be 30 gallons or smaller (size of a standard garbage can). Please do not set boxes out in wet weather. The bottoms may fall out, creating a mess. Properly prepared items must be placed on the curb by 7:00 a.m., free of obstruction, on the scheduled collection day as advertised. Please ensure easy and safe access to your brush and bulky waste piles.



## GRASS CLIPPINGS

You can dispose of your grass clippings by putting them in a plastic bag and/or dumping them on top of the other garbage in your regular roll-out garbage container for weekly collection. Grass clippings are **NOT TO BE PUT OUT** for bulky waste collection.

## CONSTRUCTION OR DEMOLITION DEBRIS

Debris from major construction and demolition projects **WILL NOT BE COLLECTED** with the bulky waste service. If it is leftovers from last weekend's home improvement or remodeling project, we will take it if it is boxed, bagged, or bundled. Disposal of major construction or demolition debris requires special arrangements. Ace Disposal can arrange this service for you.

## APPLIANCES & FURNITURE



Appliances that **DO NOT** contain Freon will be collected (refrigerators, freezers, air conditioners, dehumidifiers, or water coolers). Appliances that have had the Freon removed by a certified technician will be collected if documentation is attached. Furniture, carpet and padding, sofas, mattresses, and water heaters are also collected. Box springs for Queen and King Beds need to be cut down.

## BRANCHES & SHRUB TRIMMINGS

Branches and limbs (4" inches or less in diameter) must be tied in bundles less than 18 inches in thickness. They cannot be longer than 4 ft. and must weigh less than 75 lbs. per bundle. Shrub trimmings and other yard

waste will be collected if properly contained. Loose piles of yard waste and trimmings **WILL NOT BE COLLECTED**.



### HAZARDOUS MATERIALS



Flammable material such as oil, gas, or paint products and hazardous or toxic waste such as solvents, motor oil, transmission fluid, antifreeze, tires, batteries, pesticides, fertilizers, and other chemicals are considered to be household hazardous waste and **WILL NOT BE COLLECTED**. You may call your local city/county health department for information regarding the disposal of these hazardous materials.

### HOUSEHOLD GARBAGE

Every day household garbage such as food waste and packaging must be disposed of in your regular roll-out garbage container for weekly collection. The health department requires the collection of such material on a weekly basis. If you consistently generate more garbage than your container will hold, a second container may be needed. The additional container may be requested through the City for an extra charge.

### NON-COLLECTABLE ITEMS

Commercial, industrial, and business waste is prohibited. We **DO NOT COLLECT** contractor-produced waste of any kind. Dirt, rocks, sod, bricks, broken concrete, major construction or demolition debris, household hazardous waste, and 55 gallon drums **WILL NOT BE COLLECTED**.

### HOLIDAY SCHEDULE

The holiday schedule for picking up bulky waste is the same as for regular garbage collection service. If your collection day falls on Thanksgiving, Christmas, or New Year's Day or after the holiday during the same week, it will be collected one day later for the remainder of the week.

### RIGHT OF REFUSAL

The bulky waste collectors have the discretion to refuse items which do not meet the guidelines or that which they believe will pose a risk to human health.

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# Introduction

## INTRODUCTION

The neighborhoods surrounding the Jordan River in South Salt Lake, between 2100 South and 3900 South, are a mix of industrial, residential and small agricultural parcels. Most of the area is built out, but there is one major section where the future is open, an undeveloped area between 3600 South and 3800 South, called the Riverfront / Carlisle-neighborhood. The City of South Salt Lake with the support of the Jordan River Commission has prepared this master plan for future parks, trails and open space in this neighborhood to make the most of this opportunity.

South Salt Lake has a tremendous opportunity to create a remarkable new neighborhood in an overlooked part of the city and a relatively unknown part of the Jordan River Parkway. This neighborhood is a mix of industrial and residential uses, with little to no connection to the Jordan River, despite the close proximity. At the heart of this plan is a 50-acre greenfield parcel for sale by UTA at approximately 3800 South and 700 to 1000 West,. The current development proposal, agreed upon in concept by both the city and the developer, is roughly 50% light industrial and 50% residential (single family homes and apartments). This is currently a low to moderate income neighborhood, with 2,231 residents (2010 census) in a mix of apartments, condos and single family homes. Hamlet Homes is currently building 47 market-rate townhomes (Carlisle Place) on the east end of this property.

South Salt Lake wants leverage this new development for an overall net benefit to this area of town, by raising the quality of development, being attractive to new home buyers and creating a unique character. The development can make the most of its unique location by celebrating the Jordan River Parkway, increasing use of the trails and parks and supporting best practices of green building to lessen impacts on the natural areas surrounding it. This neighborhood has the potential to be one of the most attractive locations for people who are interested in living close to nature and spending time outdoors to live.

## PURPOSE

The purpose of this plan is to establish a vision, goals and green space master plan for a new neighborhood adjacent to the Jordan River. This includes

- Comprehensive open space master plan for the UTA parcel and surrounding parcels
- Trails network plan, including trails within the parcel as well as connections to the regional network, including the Jordan River Trail.
- Design guidelines for new parks and open spaces to encourage compatibility with the natural surroundings
- Design guidelines for development that encourage green design and stormwater solutions compatible with the natural surroundings.

This plan builds upon the recommendations of the Jordan River Commissions' two guiding toolboxes:

- "Blueprint Jordan River" (2008), and
- "Best Practices for Riverfront Communities (2013)

## Master Plan Goals

- To provide a Major East/West Trail Connection along Fine Drive to the Jordan River Parkway.
- To improve exiting trailheads leading to the Jordan River.
- To provide additional small access points to the Jordan River Parkway.
- To maintain and enhance existing Neighborhood Parks, and to enhance the connections these facilities share with the Jordan River park way.
- To provide open space and parks that help South Salt Lake and Salt Lake County meet their Parks Master Plan goals. This includes new park space that accommodates a multi-purpose field for soccer, football, etc..
- This park should be at least one-acre in extent. The property could be either owned and maintained by South Salt Lake City or the Granite School District as part of a potential future elementary school.
- To protect and maintain existing natural open spaces - the Jordan River Parkway and Meadowbrook Natural Area — in a manner that benefits neighborhood residents, visitors, natural ecosystems and associated wildlife.
- To improve and encourage pedestrian and biking throughout the neighborhood and beyond..



## PARKS AND OPEN SPACE

### NATURAL OPEN SPACE

#### Meadowbrook Natural Area

This segment of the Jordan River and the Parkway is unique. As the Jordan River meanders through this area the east bank of the river has wide swaths of associated natural lands. This area is owned by Salt Lake County and protected as natural open space. It was enhanced as part of a Utah Reclamation, Mitigation and Conservation Commission project, which has special protections for the natural habitat and water resources. Jordan River Trail passes through this Natural Area, A nature and interpretive trail, the Meadowbrook Nature Trail is proposed here to allow people to get closer to nature and learn more about this area. An existing informal trail should be formalized. and interpretive, educational signage should be added.

Uses here should respect and celebrate the unique setting and natural system, while highlighting the natural views of the river and landscape, including views of the Oquirrh Mountains in the distance. The area suffers from perceptions of unsafe conditions, as well as homeless camps, and illicit behavior. Increased legitimate use will improve conditions for users throughout this area.

An informal nature trail currently exists within the Meadowbrook Nature area. The trail should be formalized, including refining the route and installing interpretive signs.

### PARKS

#### 1. James Madison Oxbow Park

Located at the northwest edge of the neighborhood adjacent to the Jordan River Parkway, the primary function of this park is a trailhead to adjacent open spaces. Enhancements to the park are recommended to improve user experience and promote better use of the park. Key enhancement include upgrading the existing restroom to promote safe uses, interpretive signage, and improved monitoring of park operations.

#### 2. Overlook Park

Located on the east edge of the Jordan River Parkway at the terminus of Fine Drive, this linear park provides a setting for passive activities such as viewing and outdoor eating. The park also helps buffer light-industrial and similar uses adjacent to the park to the east.

Amenties should include seating and picnic areas, native plant demonstration garden, a viewpoint , and an pathway connection to the parkway trail.



### 3. Connector Park

Granger-Hunter water district owns a small property surrounding a pump house near 3800 S 1000 West. With the owner's cooperation, this long and linear space could be developed into "connector park". In addition to a pathway and seating areas, the site should include a range of small recreation elements not found elsewhere in the neighborhood. Examples of uses that might be considered include pathway "skate spots," playground elements, and places to play games such as horseshoes, bocce ball and hopscotch. The park should include trees and be well-shaded.

### 4. General Holm Park

Located at the southwest edge of the neighborhood adjacent to the Jordan River Parkway, the park has a playground, pavilion for small events, and trailhead/open space access. The location and access to this park, through the River Run condos, blurs public perception that it is public facility. In order to improve use of the park, minor modifications are required, including improved trailhead access, river shore, new trees and shade features, directional/park signage, and interpretive signage.

## NEIGHBORHOOD GREENWAYS

### 1. 700 West

As the primary continuous access road to the neighborhood, 700 West should be improved to encourage safe and comfortable pedestrian and bicycle movement. Key enhancements include the wide sidewalks separated by wide, tree-lined park strips on both sides of the road, attractive and comfortable bus stops, and possibly a designated on-street bike lane. These actions should be coordinated with regional partners—Salt Lake County, UTA and UDOT to ensure they are coordinated with local and regional plans and projects.

### 2. Carlisle Park Lane

This roadway is the primary link to existing and future residential uses, as well as General Holm Park. The wide right-of-way should have traffic calming measures, such as on-street parking or a protected bike route. There is also an opportunity to add street trees on both sides with redevelopment.

### Public Transit Routes and Bus Stops

Bus routes are located on 900 West, 700 West, 500 West and Billinis Roads provide transit options to bring residents and visitors to and from the neighborhood. These routes should be clearly marked and the bus stops upgraded to provide attractive, safe and comfortable waiting places. A more interesting bus stop design could be adopted, to celebrate the unique riverfront location and access.



# Trail Facilities

## TRAILS

### Trailheads

Major access to the Jordan River Parkway is provided at trailheads. Trailheads should include parking, public restrooms, and trail signage. Trailheads should be enhanced to ensure they are safe, inviting and attractive for trail users. There are two existing trailheads:

- James Madison Oxbow Park
- General Holm Park

### Access Points

Minor access points to the Jordan River Parkway are defined locations that connect to the adjacent neighborhood to enhance easy and seamless connections to the Jordan River Parkway and the adjacent neighborhood. Access points should be simple features, consisting of paths, ramps and stairs as appropriate for each location. There is one access point:

- Overlook Park

### Meadowbrook Trail

Meadowbrook Trail is the primary east-west trail connection through the Riverfront/Carlisle Neighborhood, linking Meadowbrook TRAX station to the Jordan River Parkway. The trail should be safe and comfortable paved trail for pedestrians in addition to significant and visible landscape features and signage to provide a clear and inviting connection. The trail exists between 200 West and 500 West and is proposed between 500 West and the Jordan River in South Salt Lake. It is recommended that the trail continue west into West Valley City and other destinations. Wherever possible, the trail should be separated from traffic where possible, with on-street cycling opportunities provided as well.

### Millcreek Trail

Millcreek Trail is a primary east-west connection through South Salt Lake. It is currently planned to be constructed between the Millcreek TRAX station and the Jordan River in the form of a wide sidewalk from 200 W to 1000 West.

### Jordan River Trail

This is one of the premier regional trails in the area, connecting Utah Lake to the Great Salt Lake. The trail is complete through the neighborhood, although on-going maintenance and upgrading are necessary. The trail is perceived by some as unsafe through this section because of the limited access and little adjacent development. Increased trail use and neighboring “eyes on the trail” will improve conditions, along with resident stewardship.


