Call to Order 4:50 p.m.

Mariah moved to approve the minutes from September 12, 2024. Kelly seconded the motion. All
voted aye. Mike moved to approve the 2025 Community Board meeting schedule. Natalie seconded and
all voted aye. Mariah suggested looking into a conflict with the meeting in June and Art City Days.

PUBLIC COMMENT

The public is invited to make comments or bring issues before the board for discussion.

There was none.

DISCUSSION ITEMS

Cody Ferguson from Houseal Lavigne presented the draft of the existing conditions document
and took questions from the board. He explained this document is important to guide policy on everything
from housing to transportation to community character. It becomes the foundation for regulations,
priorities in budgeting, and articulating the vision of the residents. The focus is on identifying issues not
giving recommendations.

The *Public Input DIY Kits* will be used to gather information through the spring. The preliminary
elements of the revised general plan will be available this winter and the draft of the general plan (after
lots of revision and work) will be available by the end of the year. He said the current responses to the
questionnaire are comparable to other cities this size and listed priorities in the survey responses like
community character (Art City), the historic architecture, the historic downtown, new jobs, transportation,
development, housing, and affordability. One thing noted in the comments was worry about a division
between the two sides of Springville. A board member complemented the graphs making the report more
readable—Cody gave Miles the credit. Growth, development, housing affordability, and traffic are key
priorities gleaned from the survey.

Cody moved on to show land use changes since 2000 according to the GIS information and
suggested there could be more density in the west and more commercial downtown. Updates to road
capacity and classification could address traffic and suggested considering a plan to get traffic off of
Highway 89. Industrial land use is scattered and as new opportunities become available could be
consolidated. He described a zoning dashboard to play around with accessible from a QR Code. An
example of the analysis was shrinking parcel minimal square feet requirements from 15,000 sq ft to 9,000
sq. ft could create more affordable housing. The QR Code allows anyone to play with the zoning map.

He moved on to transportation, mobility, and the active transportation plan and how traffic calming measures could make biking and pedestrians safer. Traffic issues that already exist show that road capacity should be addressed as well as more and better public transportation.

He moved on the public services like public safety, water, sewer, the community center, library and took a deeper dive into water. Springville has really good water and should extend the water infrastructure and conserve water. He suggested plans to create a tax structure supporting every mile of pipe because the region is growing.

He said people are very happy with the level of services and community programming in Springville. He showed areas that lack a park within a 10-minute walk—some are blocked by natural barriers and the railroad. He suggested floodplains could be usable as parks or open spaces and developers could address the gaps in access to parks/open space in those communities. A board member asked about shrinking parcel sizes and reverse engineering a park. Cody said a general plan provides the overall view and the city creates zone codes and regulations that have the force of law.

He concluded by saying this is your city and his team will sort out the recommendations for the plan. He asked the board to continue to encourage people to go to the website and use the QR Code to add recommendations and input. A board member asked about the floodplain. Cody said it is a geographic description and some of it is wetlands that cannot be used and some of it can be open space. He said to ensure developers build assets of a certain character like adding trails without structures in harm's way. There are hundreds of acres in the Pacific Northwest and North Carolina with trails. A board member complemented Cody saying the survey captured what people were saying.

BJ said he would email the board if there is an important agenda item or if it is canceled in December.
