1. Welcome

Chair Sonnenreich called the meeting to order at 2:32 p.m.

2. Approval of minutes of the February 12, 2025 meeting

Chair Sonnenreich asked for a vote to approve the February 12, 2025 minutes.

3. Subcommittee Reports

- a. The Training and Education Subcommittee reviewed training materials in post-production for the Office of Data Privacy (ODP), which were provided by Shane Paul, ODP's training director.
- b. The PIA Subcommittee reported that ODP's first privacy assessment will be performed in April.
- c. The Legislative Subcommittee deferred their overview to the Chief Privacy Officer to provide an in-depth presentation of the bills related to privacy during legislative session.

4. Report from the Office of Data Privacy

Mr. Bramwell reviewed the recently passed HB 444, and the changes that were made to the bill before it was passed. The main intention of the bill was to finesse the legislation around data privacy and provide a more holistic solution that will standardize conflicting definitions and regulations for data privacy.

Although the ODP supported a bill that was meant to be the most comprehensive ALPR bill to date in the United States, the bill did not actually pass, although it's likely an issue that will be brought up again in the near future.

Mr. Bramwell also discussed SB 260, a bill that recognizes individual identity in a digital setting for the state of Utah. Commissioners McCown and Sam Smith played a large role in consulting on the bill and ensuring that the language was comprehensive. The concept of digital identification has passed, but there is more work to be done in regards to creating a usable end product, which will also require legislative approval down the road.
