CHAPTER 3

Malcolm Campbell informed the committee that most of the current amendments can be carried forward. He did have one item of concern for the table in Chapter 5, Table 509.1 Incidental Uses. It now calls for stricter requirements for storage rooms greater than 50 square feet. He will propose an amendment for review at the next meeting that will take the requirement back to 100 square feet.

Malcolm Campbell was asked to look at Chapter 11 of the IEBC since he deals with the requirements for I occupancies.

Reed Thompson informed the committees that the Fire Review Committee reviewing Chapters 7 & 9 for the Fire Marshall's Association of Utah should have their review completed for the next meeting.

Jenefer Youngfield brough up a concern with the requirement for adult changing tables and the cost involved. Malcolm Campbell will investigate this requirement in Chapter 11.

START THE REVIEW OF THE IEBC AND CURRENT AMENDMENTS

The committees started their review of the 2024 IEBC along with the current amendments. Those who volunteered to review the various chapters gave their overview of the chapters. It was pointed out that many of the changes are for clarification or additional information.

In the review of Chapter 5, a concern was brough up by Lorin Wilcox with the state amendment for Section 503.6. There was some reorganization of the chapter and additions for clarification. He will draft an amendment for this section.

During the review of Chapter 7, Jenefer Youngfield pointed out the major changes. It was recommended that Aarin Holt be asked to review this section.

Chapter 8 will be reviewed at the next meeting.

Jenefer Youngfiled pointed out the changes in Chapters 9 and 10. Arris Holt was asked to review Chapter 9.

Hans Hoffman reported that he found that the changes in Chapter 11 mirrored those already covered in Chapter 5.

Lorin Wilcox gave his review of Chapter 12. He highlighted the major changes. Reed Thompson brought up a concern with the door swing direction and will request that the Fire Code Committee with the Fire Marshall's office review this section.

There were no significant changes to the remaining chapters.

At the meeting in May the committees will complete the review of the IEBC. They will also do a cost analysis review for the IEBC. Malcolm Campbell will complete his review of Chapter 3-5 along with the current amendments for these chapters. They will review the spreadsheet for the major changes in the IBC

In conjunction with 2024 HB 84—School Safety Amendments, the following language is proposed as an amendment, adding 2406.6 and 2406.6.1 to the 2024 IBC:

2406.6 Glazing in Educational Occupancies (K-12)

Exterior entrance level windows within 25 feet of an exterior entrance shall have ballistic glass or security glazing, extending from ground level to a minimum height of six feet from ground level.

Windows surrounding the interior of the classroom entrance or instructional areas shall have ballistic glass or security glazing installed, extending from the floor to a minimum height of six feet from the floor.

2406.6.1 Standard for Security Glazing in Educational Occupancies (K-12)

For the purpose of this section, "Ballistic Glass" is defined as glass certified at a minimum level of:

- (i) Underwriters Laboratories Standard UL752-23, Standard for Bullet-Resisting Equipment, Threat Level UL-RF-E from Table C1 (Legacy Level 7) (2023); or
- (ii) ASTM F3279-24, Standard Test Method for Ballistic Resistant Security Glazing Materials, Threat and Performance Level 4, Ballistic Test Identity (BTI) R1-T1-C5-2L under Table 1, Ballistic Criteria (2021).

"Security Glazing" is defined as: a clear or tinted durable material applied to glass doors and windows that enhances the structural integrity of the glass by preventing it from shattering and falling to the ground when impacted by an object and meets the minimum standard established by:

- (i) ASTM F3561, Standard Test Method for Forced-Entry-Resistance of Fenestration Systems After Simulated Active Shooter Attack, minimum level 3 of Table 2, Potential Energy of Impactor and Drop Height (2023); or
- (ii) ANSI Z97.1-15(R20) American National Standard For safety glazing materials used in buildings safety performance specifications and methods of test, must meet the durability requirements of section 5.3 and 5.4.
