9 Councilmembers present at the beginning of the meeting: Chair Jeannie F. Simmonds,  
10 Vice Chair Mike Johnson, Councilmember Amy Z. Anderson, Councilmember Ernesto  
11 López, and Councilmember Mark A. Anderson. Administration present: Mayor Holly H.  
12 Daines, City Attorney Craig Carlston, Finance Director Richard Anderson, and City  
13 Recorder Teresa Harris.

14 Chair Simmonds welcomed those present. There were approximately 18 in attendance at  
15 the beginning of the meeting.

16 **OPENING CEREMONY:**

17 Community Development Director Mike DeSimone encouraged the Council and others to  
18 participate in providing comments for the General Plan. He also distributed stickers that  
19 were made by Middle School art club students. Mr. DeSimone also led the audience in  
20 the pledge of allegiance.

21  
22 **Meeting Minutes.** Minutes of the Council meeting held on May 6, 2025 were reviewed.

24 **Meeting Agenda.** Chair Simmonds announced there are five public hearings scheduled  
25 for tonight's Council meeting.

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44 **QUESTIONS AND COMMENTS FOR MAYOR AND COUNCIL:**

45

46 Chair Simmonds explained that any person wishing to comment on any item not  
47 otherwise on the agenda may address the City Council at this point by stepping to the  
48 microphone and giving his or her name and address for the record. Comments should  
49 be limited to not more than three (3) minutes unless additional time is authorized by  
50 the Council Chair. Citizen groups will be asked to appoint a spokesperson. This is the  
51 time and place for any person who wishes to comment on non-agenda items and items  
52 that are germane or relevant to the authority of the City Council. Items brought  
53 forward to the attention of the City Council will be turned over to staff to respond to  
54 outside of the City Council meeting.

55 Matthew Fatuesi, a resident of Logan requested that more efforts be made in regard to  
56 UAMPS, RESAB, and renewable energy with third party contractors which he feel the City  
57 needs.

58 Kristi Fatuesi, a resident of Logan expressed her disappointment in regard to her son being  
59 terminated by his previous employer.

60 Gail Hanson, a resident of Logan expressed concerns about large employers that are  
61 coming into the valley and other communities. She feels we should always be aware and  
62 ensure there are proper policies and procedures in place to prevent mismanagement.

63 There were no further comments or questions for the Mayor or Council.

64 **MAYOR/STAFF REPORTS:**

65 **500 North Bike Lane – Sam Odd, Public Works Program Manager ([12:39](#))**

66 Sam Odd, Public Works Program Manager gave an update on the 500 North Bike Lane.  
67 He stated 500 North is one of the most trafficked by bicyclists and other community  
68 members and with change comes inconvenience. He said that feedback is appreciated as  
69 the bike lane is a trial run as they are trying to improve pedestrian safety and  
70 transportation.

71 Mayor Daines added that the reason the bike lanes are wide is so they can be plowed in  
72 the winter.

73 No further Mayor/Staff Reports were presented.

74 **COUNCIL BUSINESS:**

76 **Planning Commission Update – Councilmember Simmonds**

77

78 Chair Simmonds reported that the Planning Commission did not meet.

79

80 **Board and Committee Reports – Vice Chair Johnson, Councilmember A. Anderson**  
81 **and Councilmember López**

83 Vice Chair Johnson reported the RESAB (Renewable Energy and Sustainability Council)  
84 is currently working on a new energy efficiency outline. The audit committee met to  
85 discuss the quarterly financials, and the new chair is Chris Fawson. BPAC (Bicycle  
86 Pedestrian Advisory Committee) met and continued to plan for bike week. An ARFF  
87 (Aircraft Rescue & Fire Fighting) training was conducted at the airport on how the fire  
88 department responds to fire and rescue. He invited the community to attend the Wilson  
89 Neighborhood meeting on May 21, 2025 at 5:30 p.m. at Wilson Elementary.

90  
91 Councilmember A. Anderson reported the Bear River Local Homeless Council is  
92 planning for next year's Code Blue. Parks & Recreation reported being able to hire for the  
93 summer, and the summer schedule of events is available for the Laub Plaza. Utah Code  
94 80-80 was passed by the legislature in regard to supervision of children by volunteers.  
95 The code states that volunteers must have a background check and be trained. Hours of  
96 operation will change for the Rec Center commencing July 1, 2025. The library will be  
97 closed for Memorial Day and changes are coming regarding how rooms are scheduled,  
98 including the maker space which will be up and running July 1. Other library services  
99 will be posted on their website.

100  
101 Councilmember López reported that the Cache Valley Arts Committee did not meet nor  
102 did the Logan Youth Council. The Library Board received new telescopes via a grant and  
103 the Library is now fully staffed. A generous donation was received toward a new  
104 children's mural and it will be placed on the east wall of the Library in the Children's  
105 area.

106  
107 **Board Appointment (Renewable Energy & Sustainability Advisory Board-RESAB)**  
108 – **Chair Simmonds ([23:45](#))**

109  
110 Chair Simmonds requested the ratification of Peter Howe to serve on the RESAB which  
111 is a new appointment.

124 **Council Budget Workshop: May 27, 2025 – Chair Simmonds**

125

126 Chair Simmonds announced a Budget Workshop will be held on May 27, 2025 at 5:30  
127 p.m. in the Council Chambers. The public is invited to attend.

129 No further Council Business items were presented.

131 **ACTION ITEMS:**

132

133 ***(Continued from the May 6, 2025 Council Meeting) – PUBLIC HEARING -***  
134 ***Consideration of a proposed resolution adopting the Community Development Block***  
135 ***Grant (CDBG) Annual Action Plan (Program Year 2025) for the City of Logan –***  
136 ***Resolution 25-17 – Amanda Pearce, CDBG Coordinator (25:47)***

137

138 CDBG Coordinator Amanda Pearce addressed the Council regarding the proposed  
139 resolution.

140

141 The 2025 Annual Action Plan defines the funding priorities for project year 2025. This will  
142 be the second year of the 2024 - 2028 Consolidated Plan. **HUD has awarded \$558,464** to  
143 Logan City for 2025.

144

145 Based on the Con Plan's priorities, the funding outcome for 2025 should be approximately  
146 60% to provide for a suitable living environment (50% to infrastructure & 10 % to the  
147 remediation of access & mobility barriers), 20% to improve the capacity of public service  
148 providers that serve LMI residents (10% to public facilities improvements & 10% to public  
149 service activities, and 20% to CDBG administration and planning.

150

151 It is important to emphasize that there are specific federal spending limitations on certain  
152 categories that • are an annual cap and cannot be exceeded nor saved for subsequent years,  
153 including a 15% cap on Public Services (service providers) and a 20% cap on  
154 administrative/planning activities.

155

156 The original estimate considered by the CDBG Steering Committee was \$550,000. There  
157 were some misunderstandings regarding the funding required to administer the CDBG  
158 grant as the approximate numbers originally presented did not reflect the current budget  
159 proposal for FY26. The current award amount with the 20% cap on administration/planning  
160 results in \$111,693 available for admin/planning activities during this Annual Action Plan.  
161 CDBG salaries and benefits will total approximately \$105,076 during this project year  
162 while operational supplies and public notice expenses average approximately  
163 \$5,000 annually. The result is that there is approximately \$1,616 available to put toward  
164 the proposed homelessness service and sheltering feasibility study.

165

166 The increased funds (original estimate vs actual award) have been applied to the ADA  
167 Ramps, Pedestrian Crossings, and CDBG Admin & Planning.

172 Chair Simmonds opened the meeting to a public hearing.

173

174 There were no comments and Chair Simmonds closed the public hearing.

175

176 Councilmember A. Anderson stated that a public comment was received.

177

178 Johnson asked what the original amount intended for the warming study is.

179

180 Councilmember A. Anderson answered the original request was \$15,000.

181

182 The Council discussed whether it was possible to move funds but are aware that CDBG funds have limitations on how they can be used and spent.

183

184 Mike DeSimone, Community Development Director, clarified that unfortunately, the limitations of the CDBG funds make it hard to move them anywhere else than where they are currently allocated. The Council can adjust the budget as is their determination. An award letter has been received but the funding has yet to arrive.

185

186 Councilmember A. Anderson added that the planning portion for a study (a plan) must come from the city budget, but a project arising from the study CDBG funds can only then be used.

187

188 Vice Chair Johnson requested confirmation that \$15,000 was the total amount for the study.

189

190 Mr. DeSimone responded that the requested \$15,000 was for a portion of the study not for the total amount of the study.

191

192 Chair Simmonds inquired about the possibility of a feasibility study.

193

205 Councilmember A. Anderson replied that the Warming Center will continue to seek  
206 funding.  
207  
208 Mayor Daines offered an option of providing support for the feasibility study by  
209 contributing an additional \$5,000 and moving the funds from another budget.  
210  
211 Vice Chair Johnson expressed concerns about setting a precedent and moving funds from  
212 a set budget.  
213  
214 Councilmember M. Anderson added that if the study does not go forward, the funds will  
215 be returned.  
216  
217 Richard Anderson, Finance Director, cautioned that the funds will be coming from the  
218 Community Development budget if the study goes through.  
219  
220 Chair Simmonds asked what occurs after the year ends with the funds if they are not  
221 spent.  
222  
223 Mr. DeSimone answered the funds will return to the CDBG budget to be used for other  
224 projects, but any funds for planning must be used this fiscal year.  
225  
226 **ACTION. Motion by Councilmember M. Anderson seconded by Vice Chair  
Johnson to amend Resolution 25-17 adding \$5,000 to the available amount of \$1,616  
for a total of \$6,616 for a feasibility study as presented. Motion carried by roll call  
vote.**

236 **PUBLIC HEARING - REZONE - Consideration of a proposed rezone. Alex  
Bearnson, Jake Clark/Cache Valley Transit District, authorized agent/owner, is  
requesting a zone change of 4.47 acres located at 754 West 600 North from Public  
(PUB) to Commercial Services (CS). TIN 05-061-0004 (Ellis Neighborhood) –  
Ordinance 25-08 – Russ Holley, Planner ([46:28](#))**

238  
239  
240  
241  
242 At the May 6, 2025 Council meeting, Planner Russ Holley addressed the Council regarding  
243 the proposed rezone.  
244  
245 **RECOMMENDATION**  
246 Staff recommended that the Planning Commission recommend **approval** to the Municipal  
247 Council for a rezone of approximately 4.47 acres of property located at approximately 754  
248 West 600 North (TIN# 05-061-0004) from Public (PUB) to Commercial Services (CS).

249 *Land use adjoining the subject property*

250 North: IP: Industrial Uses East: COM: Commercial Uses

251 South: PUB: Public Uses West: PUB & CS: Public & Commercial Uses

252

### 253 **Background**

254 In January of 2025, Cache Valley Transit District (Connect) completed their new modern  
255 and larger facility located in North Logan City. All operations and equipment from this  
256 location at 754 West 600 North have moved to the new property, leaving this facility  
257 vacant. The applicant is requesting a rezone from Public to Commercial Service with the  
258 intention of subsequently selling the land. The 4.47-acre property currently contains an  
259 office/administration building, shop building, and a large vehicle carport. Landscaping and  
260 paved parking lots complete the site improvements, with fencing enclosing the parking and  
261 shop areas. The property is currently accessed via three driveways approaching 600 North  
262 and 800 West.

263

### 264 **GENERAL PLAN**

265 The Future Land Use Plan (FLUP) identifies this area as Public (PUB). The public  
266 designation is reserved for public facilities such as government offices, safety services,  
267 public schools, and similar public services. A change to the FLUP to recognize the change  
268 from a public ownership and/or use to private ownership will be handled within the General  
269 Plan update process.

270

### 271 **LAND DEVELOPMENT CODE**

272 The Land Development Code (LDC) describes the CS zone as a designation that fills the  
273 need between industrial and commercial land uses. CS areas are intended for light  
274 manufacturing, warehousing, wholesaling, construction support services, and limited  
275 commercial. CS zoning is not intended for residential or heavy manufacturing.

276

### 277 **EXISTING ZONING**

278 The current PUB zoning designation would be appropriate if the property were to be  
279 purchased and used by a public entity. The applicant has contacted several local  
280 government entities, including the City of Logan, to see if there was interest in the property  
281 for a public use. According to the applicant, there was no interest from public entities. The  
282 surrounding area is currently a variety of land uses and zoning designations. To the east,  
283 the 11-acre property contains commercial self-storage units. North of the site is currently  
284 vacant and previously contained a landscaping business. To the south and west, the City of  
285 Logan owns and operates the City's Service Center and Light and Power Department  
286 building. 600 North acts as a larger boundary in the Bridger Neighborhood, with Industrial  
287 zoning to the north and a mix of Commercial, Mixed Use, and Commercial Service zoning  
288 to the south.

289

### 290 **SUMMARY**

291 With 600 North being a boundary between Industrial and Commercial zoning in the  
292 Bridger Neighborhood, staff considers the proposal for CS appropriate. If this property is

293 purchased by a private entity (most likely buyer), the FLUP designation of PUB will be  
294 inappropriate and will be evaluated during the next FLUP amendment cycle. The  
295 surrounding area is a mixed bag, with storage units, service centers, warehousing, and  
296 manufacturing. The CS zone permits or conditionally permits land uses that are in a similar  
297 character with the current surrounding land uses and built environment. The CS zone  
298 permits office, automobile service and repair, heavy truck service and repair, contractor  
299 supply, wholesales, warehousing, gas stations, truck stops, lumberyards, and similar uses  
300 further specified in the LDC 17.11.030. Staff recommends the Planning Commission send  
301 a favorable recommendation on to City Council.

302

### 303 **AGENCY AND CITY DEPARTMENT COMMENTS**

304 No comments.

305

### 306 **PUBLIC COMMENTS**

307 Notices were mailed to property owners within 300 feet of the subject property. As of the  
308 time of this report, no comments have been received.

309

### 310 **PUBLIC NOTIFICATION**

311 Legal notices were published in the Herald Journal on 4/12/25, posted on the City's and  
312 Utah Public Meeting website on 4/14/25, and mailed to property owners within 300 feet  
313 on 4/7/25.

314

### 315 **RECOMMENDED FINDINGS FOR REZONE**

316 The Planning Commission bases its decision on the following findings supported in the  
317 administrative record for this project:

- 318 1. The Logan City FLUP identifies the area as PUB. PUB is only appropriate if the  
319 property owner is a public entity.
- 320 2. 600 North is a regional boundary between IP to the north and CS, COM, and MU  
321 to the south, and this application for CS is consistent with that pattern.
- 322 3. The CS zone permits and conditional permits land uses that are similar or  
323 compatible with the current land uses and developments in the area.
- 324 4. The design standards, height limitations, and setbacks in the Land Development  
325 Code will ensure compatibility for adjacent property use and enjoyment.

326

327 On April 24 , 2025 , the Planning Commission **recommended approval** to the Municipal  
328 Council for the CVTD Rezone Amendment as proposed by the applicant. **Planning**  
329 **Commissioners voted (6-0) to approve**

330

331 Chair Simmonds opened the meeting to a public hearing.

332

333 Kristi Fatuesi, a resident of Logan asked why the location was not considered for a new  
334 City Recreation Center, and requested it be considered.

336 Matthew Fatuesi, a resident of Logan stated this is a missed opportunity for the City to  
337 create another transportation hub similar to what Connect, formerly known as CVTD is  
338 doing in North Logan.

339

340 Mayor Daines clarified that the transportation/bus system is not owned by the City nor is  
341 the property being discussed tonight. The Transit District (Connect) is its own entity and  
342 receives a portion of the sales taxes in order to function.

343

344 Chair Simmonds added that the Transit District needs to sell this piece of property in  
345 order to pay for its new building located in North Logan.

346

347 Vice Chair Johnson further expanded that as the owner of the property, the Transit  
348 District is the one who requested the rezone.

349

350 There were no further comments and Chair Simmonds closed the public hearing.

351

352 **ACTION. Motion by Councilmember López seconded by Vice Chair Johnson to**  
353 **adopt Ordinance 25-08 as presented.** Motion carried by roll call vote.

360 **PUBLIC HEARING - Consideration of a proposed resolution approving the Wilson**  
361 **Neighborhood Plan – Resolution 25-19 – Russ Holley (54:10)**

362

363 At the May 6, 2025 Council meeting, Planner Russ Holley addressed the Council regarding  
364 the proposed resolution. The neighborhoods are divided by older elementary school  
365 boundaries. They have since evolved and are somewhat different now. The Wilson  
366 Neighborhood has a long range of older structures. Generally, the further East, the newer  
367 the neighborhood. The primary zones of the area are NR-4 & NR-6. The Cliffside area is  
368 primarily owner-occupied, and the island is more non-owner occupied.

369

370 **Wilson Neighborhood Recommendations:**

- 371 1. Future Logan City documents and planning efforts should recognize sub-  
372 neighborhood names Island, Cliffside, Canyon Road, & Sumac.
- 373 2. Zoning Map amendments should consider changes inside and near downtown  
374 to better facilitate new affordable and obtainable infill housing.
- 375 3. When developed, the large vacant areas south of Cliffside should include  
376 multiple street connections to for better traffic distribution and safety response.
- 377 4. Future zoning along the edge of downtown should encourage higher density  
378 development, as that is the preferred location indicated by residents.

379 5. Zoning Map amendments should change Public Zoning designations to  
380 Recreation for the large eastern areas of natural open space.

381 6. Local programs should be established to help incentivize and retain more  
382 owner-occupied homes in the Island area.

383 7. Local housing programs should be established to better inform and  
384 collectively harness buying power for potential home buyers.

385 8. More efficient methods of construction and alternative building materials  
386 should be applied in appropriate locations for more affordable housing units.

387 9. Standard home occupancy limits should increase and be based on structure  
388 and property capacities to open more housing opportunities and supply.

389 10. New accessory dwelling units in owner-occupied homes should be further  
390 encouraged and implemented to open more housing supply.

391 11. Larger vacant and infill parcels should utilize the PD-Overlay zone to develop  
392 affordable single-family homes in innovative ways.

393 12. Neighborhood street design should prioritize local safety and neighborhood  
394 character over suburban commuter vehicle speed and volume.

395 13. 200 East should bridge the Logan River and connect south to I 100 East and  
396 future street widening should only be done on critical transportation corridors.

397 14. Transit service should increase frequency and hours of operation to attract  
398 new and more ridership.

399 15. Pedestrian and bicycle infrastructure should be expanded because it's a  
400 healthier and less impactful mode of transportation to the neighborhood.

401 16. New developments should connect to existing street grid patterns to  
402 minimize dead-ends and ensure equitable traffic distribution.

403 17. City emergency services and utilities should continue to provide essential  
404 services while planning for future growth areas in the neighborhood.

405 18. Canyon Road Trail and the Boulevard Trail should officially connect to each  
406 other and narrow sections should be widened to 8-foot multi-use standards.

407 19. The Bonneville Shoreline Trail should naturally follow hillside contours  
408 versus the straight deer fence and ultimately connect Dry and Logan Canyon.

409 20. A better trail connection between Denzel Stewart and Canyon Road Memorial  
410 Park will help the overall trail network and link two popular areas.

411 21. Trail fundraisers and adopt-a-trail efforts could create new revenue for  
412 improvements and new trail naming of generic names, like Canyon Road  
413 Trail.

414 22. Neighborhood street intersections should continue to be enhanced with clear  
415 markings, lighting, and signage for safety and clarity.

416 23. Multi-use trails inside Merlin Olsen Park and Pioneer Park should be widened  
417 to meet standard 8-foot widths for two-way traffic.

419 24. New concrete trail surfaces should saw-cut joints and avoid rounded control  
420 joints for smoother and more enjoyable use by wheeled users.

421 25. Streets with no sidewalk on either side or near school zones should be  
422 prioritized for future sidewalk installation projects.

423 26. Natural rivers and canals should be highly valued by residents and local  
424 leaders for their beauty, neighborhood uniqueness, and wildlife habitat.

425 27. Large public infrastructure projects should involve neighborhood residents for  
426 better collaboration, analysis and alternatives when necessary.

427 28. The FLUP should be updated to accurately account for Herm's Inn, Rudy's  
428 Greenhouse and other similar stable commercial uses.

429  
430 Councilmember A. Anderson referenced the slide of the zoning map and remarked that  
431 the zone for parks is Public rather than Recreational.

432  
433 Mr. Holley confirmed that a change of zones to recreation is one of the recommendations.  
434 The change will be part of the General Plan and will be reflected in the Future Land Use  
435 Plan.

436  
437 Chair Simmonds opened the meeting to a public hearing.

438  
439 There were no comments and Chair Simmonds closed the public hearing.

440  
441 **ACTION. Motion by Councilmember A. Anderson seconded by Councilmember M.**

448  
449 **PUBLIC HEARING - Consideration of a proposed resolution designating a Closed**  
450 **Area to Ignition or Use of Fireworks – Resolution 25-20 – Fire Chief Nate Thompson**  
451 **(1:02:15)**

452  
453 At the May 6, 2025 Council meeting, Fire Chief Nate Thompson addressed the Council  
454 regarding the proposed resolution.

455  
456 He reported on the upcoming fireworks season and the wildland fire predictions forecasted  
457 for this year.

458  
459 As a State we have done well the past couple of years reducing loss due to wildfire. This  
460 was largely in part to public education and awareness. We need to continue in these efforts  
461 going forward.

462 Utah State Code 1 5A-5-202.5 states that when hazardous environmental conditions  
463 necessitate the controlled use of any ignition source, including fireworks, the legislative  
464 body of the municipality may prohibit the use of ignition sources in mountainous brush-  
465 covered areas, forest-covered areas, the wildland-urban interface area, undeveloped land,  
466 and agricultural land.

467  
468 He stated that it's not easy to predict what the environmental conditions will be in July.  
469 We do the best we can to set restrictions based on what is known in May. We will post the  
470 restricted areas at all points of sales beginning June 24, 2025. For Council review and  
471 consideration and approval, he recommended the following historical fireworks restricted
