71 Award Presentation - Mayor Daines (20:18)

- Mayor Daines announced that Sadie Boyer, Civil Engineer with the City of Logan was
- awarded the Outstanding Young Professional of the Year Award from the Utah Chapter
- of the Public Works Association. Nominations were gathered from around the entire
- 75 State of Utah and Sadie was selected. She was hired as an Engineering Intern while
- working on her undergraduate degree at Utah State. U graduation she was hired as a
- 77 fulltime Civil Engineer as she continued to work on her Master's Degree. Ms. Boyer has
- 78 managed some of the city's most complex Capital projects including the 100 West Bridge
- and Corridor, Main Street Pedestrian Underpass, 100 North Bridge, and many other
- 80 Road, Water and Sewer projects.



81 82	Update: Main Street Underpass Status – Paul Lindhardt, Public Works Director (22:05)
83 84 85 86 87 88	Public Works Director Paul Lindhardt addressed the Council and gave an update on the Main Street Underpass. In conjunction with UDOT, a pedestrian underpass will be constructed at approximately 600 South. Construction is anticipated to begin this summer. There is not a detailed construction plan available yet, but the contract has been awarded to ACME Construction with Stanley Consultants acting as overseers of the project.
89 90 91 92 93 94 95 96	The overpass is being constructed out of precast concrete box covert and confirming a date for delivery is difficult. The anticipation is the boxes will begin to arrive the first week of September with construction beginning at the end of July or August. Main Street will be closed to one lane in each direction for up to 60 days, and up to 10 nights for full closure. If on schedule, it is anticipated the tunnel will be completed by the end of October or the beginning of November. There is a Public Relations Manager who has started meeting with the adjacent businesses and homeowners in the project area and prepare them for the impacts.
97 98	Chair Simmonds requested signage be posted further ahead of the project area such as the Logan River Golf Course or at 100 West alerting drivers of the road closure.
99 100	Mr. Lindhardt confirmed there will be requirements for the contractor to have traffic control in place and the closer to the project the more signage there will be.
