## Monthly Subcommittee Check-in Reports

Conduct subcommittee monthly check-in reports from subcommittee heads:

Preservation (Amanda Rojas, Chris Schow)	<ul style="list-style-type: none"><li>Laurel gave an in-depth debrief of the city’s June 11 kickoff meeting—the purpose of which was to define the characteristics of a Main Street consultant who will be employed by the city using their MAG grant. Next steps are for the city to issue an RFP, establish a Steering Committee to vet the responses, and recommend a candidate to city council for hire. Laurel told Scott Darrington that she’d like to be on the Steering Committee.</li><li>Laurel reported that PG City was accepted to the Utah Main Street Program (in response to the PGHPC’s application). Next steps are for Daniel Cardenas to pick a meeting time with SHPO for an initial call. They requested this meeting a week ago, but Daniel has not responded as of June 19.</li></ul>						
Community Outreach (Amy Wadley)	<ul style="list-style-type: none"><li>We had over 80 people attend our June 18 Locust Avenue walking tour. We debriefed the event and have the following suggestions:<ul style="list-style-type: none"><li>—Buy more headsets. We currently have 60 and run out every time.</li><li>—We always need 2 people assigned to check in and out the headsets. We only had 1 this month, and it was a challenge.</li></ul></li><li>Amy outlined the July and August schedule. Laurel sent the following to the <i>Daily Herald</i>: “The Pleasant Grove Historic Preservation Commission is continuing its historic homes walking tour series on Monday, July 21. This tour features the homes on 200 South from 400 East to 200 East. Meet on the sidewalk in front of the historic marker at 455 East 200 South at 7 PM. The tour is free, but an optional walking tour booklet is \$5 via cash or Venmo. The August walking tour will be in the Monkeytown neighborhood of 500 East 500 North on August 18.”</li><li>Laurel needs help researching the August walking tour homes. ### Other Business Items

- We discussed proactive steps we can take to prevent historic structure demolitions, including:
  - Host more workshops for owners of historic homes.
  - Resume our quarterly newsletter to owners of historic homes that lists resources.
  - Create a PGHPC grant that helps homeowners rehab their properties. (Money could come from a SHPO grant, an increase in our budget, or maybe the CARE Tax.)
  - Build in steps in the demolition permit process that requires education about grants and tax credits available.
  - Create an education flier for Sheri to deliver to homeowners when she takes pictures of to-be-demoed homes.
  - Can we create salvage options for historic home fixtures?
  - When an extremely notable home (such as the Elijah Mayhew home or others on the National Register of Historic Places) is slated for demolition, can we request interior pictures?
- Laurel updated the group on the Old Town Hall furnishings: carpet and chairs are installed, and 6 tables will be delivered on June 24 (unassembled). Laurel will contact Deon Giles for assembly.
- We will discuss our FY 2025-2026 budget at our July meeting. Suggestions should include what currently fits into our budget and what we'd like to do if we had a larger budget.
