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PUBLIC HEARING – ZONING CODE TEXT AMENDMENTS – BODY ART FACILITIES AND PERMANENT COSMETICS - CZC 12.12.040, 12.36.040, 12.62.040, 12.62.060, AND NEW 12.55.260

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Community Development Director Mike Eggett summarized the staff report and praised the Planning Commission for their hard work on the issue which followed council director from February 18th and included a review of codes from nearby cities. The Planning Commission recommended new and revised definitions, changes to the table of uses, and the addition of CZC 12.55.260 to regulate such facilities in line with health department guidance.

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Mayor Wilkinson opened a public hearing for this item.

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Abby Cook, staff attorney at the ACLU of Utah, spoke about constitutional considerations for tattoos in Centerville. She emphasized that tattoos, the art of tattooing, and the business of tattooing are all protected by the First Amendment. She urged the council to protect the free speech rights of their constituents and allow tattoo studios in Centerville.

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JTee Naea expressed support for Nicole Hutchins continuing her business and voiced concerns about potential discrimination against people with different cultural backgrounds.

Mayor Wilkinson closed the public hearing.

Councilmember Plummer moved to table the proposed Zoning Code Text Amendments to Centerville Zoning Code 12.12.040 regarding "Definitions", amending Centerville Zoning Code 12.36.040 regarding "Table of Uses for Commercial Uses", adding a new section to the Centerville Zoning Code as 12.55.260 "Body Art Facilities and Permanent Cosmetics", and other associated amendments as located in Centerville Zoning Code 12.62.040 and 12.62.060, as presented by City staff and the City Attorney, until such a time as staff needs to be determined. Councilmember Hirst seconded the motion which passed (4-1) with Councilmember Hayman dissenting.

- Mayor Wilkinson noted that Preston Lee started as the new executive director of Wasatch Integrated Waste Management on July 1st.
- Mayor Wilkinson mentioned the upcoming Fourth of July celebrations, and highlighted various events and volunteer opportunities.
- Mayor Wilkinson attended a watershed tour and noted the importance of both conservation and exploring additional water resources.
- Mayor Wilkinson emphasized the importance of council members setting an example by obeying all laws, no matter how small.
