

1 **R156. Commerce, Professional Licensing.**

2 **R156-11a. Cosmetology and Associated Professions Licensing Act Rule.**

3 **R156-11a-101. Title – Authority – Relationship to Rule R156-1.**

4 (1) This rule is known as the “Cosmetology and Associated Professions Licensing Act Rule.”

5 (2) This rule is adopted by the Division under the authority of Subsection 58-1-106(1)(a) to

6 enable the Division to administer Title 58, Chapter 11a, Cosmetology and Associated Professions

7 Licensing Act.

8 (3) The organization of this rule and its relationship to Rule R156-1 is as described in Section

9 R156-1-101.

10 **R156-11a-102. General Definitions.**

11 Terms used in this rule are defined in Title 58, Chapter 1, Division of Professional Licensing Act, and in

12 Title 58, Chapter 11a, Cosmetology and Associated Professions Licensing Act. In addition:

13 (1) “Balayage” means the technique of free-hand painting highlights onto the hair, creating a soft

14 and natural gradation of lightness coloration towards the end.

15 (2) “Brow lamination” or “brow perming” as used in R156-11a-302.13, R156-11a-302.15, R156-

16 11a-302.18, and R156-11a-302.23, means a semi-permanent treatment that restructures brow hairs

17 using a chemical solution.

18 (3) “Client services” means services performed by one student or apprentice on one individual

19 member of the public.

20 (4) “Comedone extractor” as used in Subsections 58-11a-302.11(1)(a), 58-11a-302.13(1)(g), 58-

21 11a-302.18(1)(a)(xii), and 58-11a-302.23(2)(a) means a small handheld tool used to remove

22 blackheads and whiteheads from the skin.

23 (5) “Genital area” means the external reproductive organs including the penis, testicles, vulva,

24 vagina, or clitoris.

25 (6) “Hard wax” means a type of depilatory wax that hardens on the hair and is removed without

26 the need for fabric strips.

27 (7) “Large area” as used in Subsections R156-11a-302.11, R156-11a-302.13, R156-11a-302.14,

28 and R156-11a-302.18. means one of the following:

29 (a) full back;

30 (b) full front torso;

31 (c) a full leg; or

32 (d) a full arm.

33 (8) (a) “Limited chemical exfoliation” as used in Subsections R156-11a-302.13, R156-11a-

34 302.18, and R156-11a-302.23 means a resurfacing procedure performed with the use of

35 chemical substances, like acids or enzymes, to dissolve dead skin cells and promote cell

36 turnover that does not exceed the stratum corneum.

37 (b) “Limited chemical exfoliation” does not include the mixing, combining, or layering of

38 skin exfoliation products or services, but does include:

39 (i) alpha hydroxy acids of 30% or less, with a pH of not less than 3.0; or

40 (ii) salicylic acid of 15% or less.

41 (9) “Manipulating” as used in Subsections 58-11a-[102(35)(a),]302.11(1)(a), 58-11a-

42 302.13(1)(g), 58-11a-302.18(1)(a)(xii), and 58-11a-302.23(2)(a) means applying a light pressure

43 by the hands to the skin.

44 (10) “Manual extraction” as used in Subsections R156-302.11, R156-11a-302.13, R156-11a-

45 302.14, R156-11a-302.18, and R156-11a-302.23, means removing impurities from the skin with a

46 protected fingertip, a cotton swab, or a loop comedone extractor.

49 (11) “Natural manicure and pedicure” as used in Subsections 58-11a-302.13(1)(l), 58-11a-  
 50 302.18(1)(a)(xiii), and 58-11a-302.23(2)(a) means the trimming, cutting, cleaning, manicuring,  
 51 shaping, massaging hands to elbows and feet to knees, or enhancing the appearance of the hands,  
 52 feet and nails of an individual using the technician’s hands, mechanical or electrical preparation,  
 53 antiseptic, lotion, exfoliating scrub, or cream.

54 (12) “NIC” means the National Interstate Council of State Boards of Cosmetology.

55 (13) “Practical session” means services performed by students or apprentices on each other,  
 56 mannequins, or a model in a classroom type setting.

57 (14) “Removal of proximal nail fold” as used in 58-11a-501(6)(d) includes use of manual file, e-  
 58 file, cutting, or buffing.

59 (14) (15) (a) “Safety data sheet” or “SDS” means a document that provides information  
 60 regarding hazards substances, precautions, and response actions for a product containing  
 61 chemicals including:

- 62 (a) how they should be safely used, stored, transported and disposed of; and  
 63 (b) emergency procedures.

64 (b) “Safety data sheet” may also be called a material safety data sheet or MSDS.

65 (15) (16) (a) “Small area” or “medium area” as used in R156-11a-302.11, R156-11a-302.13,  
 66 R156-11a-302.14, and R156-11a-302.18, means one of the following areas:

- 67 (i) axilla or arm pit;
- 68 (ii) neck;
- 69 (iii) feet;
- 70 (iv) hands;
- 71 (v) bikini area;
- 72 (vi) upper arm;
- 73 (vii) lower arm;
- 74 (viii) upper leg;
- 75 (ix) lower leg;
- 76 (x) upper back;
- 77 (xi) upper chest;
- 78 (xii) abdomen; or
- 79 (xiii) sides of the torso.

80 (b) “Small area” or “medium area” includes a Brazilian that meets the requirements of  
 81 Subsections R156-11a-302.22(4)(e)(iv) and R156-11a-306(2)(d)(iv).

82 (16)(17)(a) “Sugaring” as used in Subsection 58-11a-102(10)(b)(iii) means the removal of  
 83 unwanted hair by applying a mixture to the skin and then removing it.

84 (b) “Sugaring” includes using a mixture of lemon juice, sugar, and water.

85 (17)(18) “Soft wax” means a type of depilatory wax that hardens on the skin and hair and is  
 86 removed with fabric strips.

87 (18) (19) “Thermal styling” as used in 58-11a-304(13)(e) means hairstyling techniques that use  
 88 heat, such as curling irons, flat irons, and hair dryers, to temporarily alter the shape and texture of  
 89 hair.

90 (19) (20) “Unprofessional conduct” is further defined in Sections 58-1-501 and R156-11a-502.

91 (20) (21) “Wet styling” refers to the process of setting and shaping the hair while it is wet,  
 92 allowing it to dry in a specific form or style.

R156-11a-102.14. Definitions – Specific to Electrology License.

Terms used in this rule are defined in Title 58, Chapter 1, Division of Professional Licensing Act, and in Title 58, Chapter 11a, Cosmetology and Associated Professions Licensing Act. In addition:

(1) “Blend method” means the combining of galvanic current with thermolysis current.

(2) “Galvanic current” means a constant low-voltage direct current.

(3) (a) “Large area electrolysis” as used in Subsection R156-11a-302.14 means any portion of the following:

(i) upper back;

(ii) lower back;

(iii) upper chest;

(iv) abdomen;

(v) sides of the torso;

(vi) upper leg;

(vii) lower leg;

(viii) upper arm; or

(ix) lower arm.

(b) “Large area electrolysis” includes a Brazilian that meets the requirements of Subsections R156-11a-302.22(4)(e)(iv) and R156-11a-306(2)(d)(iv).

(4) “Small area electrolysis” or “medium area electrolysis” as used in R156-11a-302.14 means one of the following areas:

(a) axilla or arm pit;

(b) neck;

(c) feet;

(d) hands;

(e) bikini area;

(f) brow;

(g) lip;

(h) exterior of the nose;

(i) cheeks;

(j) exterior of the ear;

(k) chin;

(5) “Thermolysis current” means using alternating current to create heat to destroy hair growth cells in the follicle.

154 **R156-11a-102.18. Definitions – Specific to Master Esthetics.**155 Terms used in this rule are defined in Title 58, Chapter 1, Division of Professional Licensing Act, and in  
156 Title 58, Chapter 11a, Cosmetology and Associated Professions Licensing Act. In addition:157 (1) "Advanced extraction" as used in Subsection[s] 58-11a-302.18(1)(a)(vi)-means to perform  
158 extraction with a lancet or device that removes impurities from the skin.159 (2) "Anti-aging resurfacing enhancements" as used in Subsection R156-11a-302.18 means  
160 treatments designed to improve the appearance of skin that has been affected by the aging process,  
161 sun damage, or other environmental factors and include:

162 (a) skin tightening;

163 (b) sublative scar reduction; or

164 (c) skin lightening.

165 (3) "Aroma therapy" means the application of essential oils that are applied directly to the skin,  
166 undiluted or in a misted dilution with a carrier oil or lotion for varied applications such as  
167 massage, hot packs, cold packs, compress, inhalation, steam or air diffusion, or in hydrotherapy  
168 services.169 (4) "Body wraps" as used in Subsection 58-11a-302.18(1)(a)(i) means body treatments utilizing  
170 products or equipment to enhance and maintain the texture, contour, integrity, and health of the  
171 skin and body.172 (5) (a) "Chemical exfoliation" as used in Subsection 58-11a-302.18(1)(a)(iii) means a resurfacing  
173 procedure performed with the use of chemical substances such as acids or enzymes to dissolve  
174 dead skin cells and promote cell turnover.

175 (b) "Chemical exfoliation" includes:

176 (i) a limited chemical exfoliation as defined in Subsection 58-11a-102(8); or

177 (ii) using an acid with a pH of at least 1.0 including:

178 (A) an alpha hydroxy acid [with a pH of not less than 1.0 and] at a  
179 concentration of up to 50% [shall include] with partially neutralized acids;180 (B) a beta hydroxy acid[s] with a concentration of [not more than] up to  
181 30%;182 (C) a trichloroacetic acid, under Subsection 58-11a-501(17)(c), in a  
183 concentration of [not more than] up to 15%[ but no manual, mechanical, or  
184 acid exfoliation can be used before treatment unless under the general  
185 supervision of a licensed health care practitioner];

186 (D) a vitamin-based acid[s]; or

187 (E) a modified Jessner solution on the face or the tissue immediately  
188 adjacent to the jawline.189 (F) no manual, mechanical, or acid exfoliation can be used before treatment  
190 unless under the general supervision of a licensed health care practitioner  
191 under 58-11-501(7)(a)192 (c) "Chemical exfoliation" includes the following acids with a pH of less than 1.0 if  
193 performed under the general supervision of a licensed health care practitioner:

194 (i) an alpha hydroxy acid with a concentration higher than 50%;

195 (ii) beta hydroxy acids with a concentration of higher than 30%;

196 (iii) an exfoliant that contains bichloroacetic acid or phenol in any concentration

197 (iv) trichloroacetic acid, under Subsection 58-11a-501(17)(c), in a concentration  
 198 higher than 15%;  
 199 (v) a vitamin-based acid; or  
 200 (vi) a manual, mechanical, or acid exfoliation used before treatment on a client.

201 (6) "Corneocytes" means terminally differentiated keratinocytes found in the outermost layer of  
 202 the skin.

203 (7) "Exfoliation" means the sloughing off of non-living skin cells called "corneocytes" by  
 204 superficial and non-invasive means.

205 (8) "Hydrotherapy" as used in Subsection 58-11a-302.18(1)(a)(ii) means the use of water for  
 206 cosmetic purposes or beautification of the body.

207 (9) "Lymphatic massage" as used in Subsections 58-11a-302.18(1)(a)(x) means a method using  
 208 light rhythmic pressure applied by manual or other means to the skin using specific lymphatic  
 209 maneuvers to promote the drainage of lymphatic fluid through the tissue;

210 (10) "Microdermabrasion" as used in Subsection 58-11-302.18(1)(a)(v) and R156-11a-  
 211 302.18(5)(iii) means the mechanical exfoliation of the uppermost layers of the stratum corneum  
 212 using a closed-loop vacuum system.

213 (11) (a) "Microneedling" means the use of a device:  
 214 (i) with multiple tiny solid needles designed to pierce the skin to stimulate collagen  
 215 production or cellular renewal; and  
 216 (ii) that may be in the form of:  
 217 (A) a stamp[s]; or  
 218 (B) an electronic "pen[s]."

219 (b) "Microneedling" may also be called:  
 220 (i) dermal needling;  
 221 (ii) Collagen Induction Therapy (CIT);  
 222 (iii) cosmetic dry needling;  
 223 (iv) multitrepannic collagen actuation; or  
 224 (v) percutaneous collagen induction.

225 (12) "Patch test" or "predisposition test" means applying a small amount of a chemical  
 226 preparation to the skin of the arm or behind the ear of a client to determine possible allergies to the  
 227 chemical preparation.

228 (13) "Photo rejuvenation" as used in R156-11a-302.18 means using light energy to improve the  
 229 appearance of the skin and includes:  
 230 (a) pigmentation removal;  
 231 (b) spider vein reduction;  
 232 (c) telangiectasia reduction;  
 233 (d) acne reduction;  
 234 (e) facial erythema reduction; and  
 235 (f) hemangioma reduction.

236 (14) "Sanding" means using a rapidly rotating tool to remove the outermost layers of skin above  
 237 limited to the stratum corneum, unless the individual is under the supervision of a licensed health  
 238 care practitioner acting within the scope of the health care practitioner's license.

239 (15) "Stratum corneum" means the outermost layer(s) of the skin, composed mainly of dead  
 240 corneocytes.

244 **R156-11a-102.19. Definitions – Specific to Master Barber and Master Hair Designer.**  
 245 Reserved.

246  
247**R156-11a-102.20 Definitions – Specific to Nail Technician.**

248 Terms used in this rule are defined in Title 58, Chapter 1, Division of Professional Licensing Act, and in  
249 Title 58, Chapter 11a, Cosmetology and Associated Professions Licensing Act. In addition:

250 (1) “Artificial nails” means any type of nail enhancement added to the natural nail and includes  
251 tips, overlays, and sculptured nails.

252 (2) “Efile” or “electric nail drill” means an electric-powered rotary tool used for filing nails or  
253 removing nail enhancements.

254 (3) “Eponychium or proximal nail fold” means the thickened, living tissue at the base of the  
255 fingernails and toenails.

256 (4) “Extreme nail art forms” means an extra-long stiletto or edge shape built on a nail entirely by  
257 sculpting including competition nails.

258 (5) (a) “Sculptured nails” means a custom-formed extension that are built directly on the  
259 natural nail using a nail form and then sculpted with product including acrylic, hard gel, or  
260 polygel.

261 (b) “Sculptured nails” does not include a nail tip.

262 (6) “Source capture system[;]” as used in Subsection 58-11a-502(6)[;] means the source capture  
263 system required under Section 15A-3-402.

**R156-11a-301. Change of Legal Entity – School.**

287 (1) Under Section 58-11a-301, a school shall submit a new application for licensure upon a  
288 change of legal entity status

289 (2) The new legal entity under Subsection (1) may not engage in practice as a licensed school  
290 until the Division approves the entity’s application and issues a school license.

294 **R156-11a-302. Qualifications for Licensure – General Examination Requirements – Equivalency of**  
 295 **Foreign School Education – General Requirements for Transfer of Crediting Hours.**

296 (1) Under Section 58-11a-302(1)(c), the general examination requirements for licensure and  
 297 permits are established as follows:

298 (a) Except as otherwise provided in Sections 58-1-308 and R156-11a-308, an applicant  
 299 shall:

300 (i) pass the respective examination with a score of at least 70% as determined by  
 301 the examination provider; and  
 302 (ii) within three years before the application date.

303 (b) The Division may accept a theory exam, practical exam, or instructor exam that is  
 304 approved by the licensing authority of another jurisdiction in the United States if it is  
 305 substantially equivalent to the applicable Utah examination.

306 [ (2) Under Section 58-11a-302(2)(a) the requirements for hours earned from a permit or license to  
 307 transfer credit to another license are established as follows:

308 (a) each school or apprentice supervisor may accept up to, but no more than the hours  
 309 allotted for permitting or licensure under Subsections 58-11a-302.10 through 58-11a-302.21,  
 310 Subsection 58-11a-302.23, and Subsection 58-11a-302.24.

311 (b) each school or apprentice supervisor may accept course work and service counts from  
 312 an approved apprenticeship, a licensed or recognized school, or an evaluation performed on behalf  
 313 of an internationally trained applicant provided the evaluation is performed by a current member  
 314 of the National Association of Credential Evaluation Services (NACES) at [www.naces.org](http://www.naces.org).

315 **R156-11a-302.10. Qualifications for Barbering Permit – Curriculum – Minimum Service Count  
 316 Requirements – Examination.**

317 (1) Under Subsections 58-11a-302(1)(b) and 58-11a-302.10(3), the educational requirements and  
 318 minimum service count requirements to meet the 130 hours of instruction and minimum service counts  
 319 requirements for a barbering permit are defined, clarified, and established in this section.

320 (2) Under Subsection 58-11a-302.10(3), the curriculum for a licensed school, registered school, or  
 321 approved apprenticeship program for a barbering permit shall include theory instruction in the following  
 322 subject areas:

725 (F) performing any outside work on the grounds or building.

726 (ii) require a student to sell products applicable to the industry as a condition to  
727 graduate;

728 (iii) remove an hour earned by a student except that:

729 (A) if a student is late for a specific class session, the school may require  
730 the student to retake the specific class session before giving credit for the

(f) If a school ceases to operate, the school shall:

(i) notify the Division within 15 days by registered mail or certified mail; and

(ii) name a trustee who shall:

(B) upon a student's request, provide information including the student's accumulated hours and dates of attendance.

(5) Under Subsection 58-11a-302.22(1)c)(iv), a school shall have at least one licensed instructor in attendance for every 20 students or fraction thereof who attend a practical session or while performing a client service.

808 (g) the instructor shall provide each apprentice a copy of the written contract prepared  
809 under Subsection 3  
810 (h) the instructor shall limit the training of an apprentice to not more than 40 hours per  
811 week and not more than five days out every seven consecutive days;  
812 (i) an apprentice may be compensated for services performed as established in the written  
813 contract under Subsection 3;  
814 (j) an apprentice may not perform work on the public until the apprentice has received at  
815 least 10% of the hours of practical training and theory training;  
816 (k) an apprentice instructor may not be an employee of an apprentice.

817 (2) Under Subsection 56-11a-102(1) the standards for protection of apprentices include the  
818 following:

819 (a) if an apprentice supervisor dissociates for any reason, the supervisor shall:  
820 (i) provide the apprentice with a written record of all theory and service counts  
821 completed including hours performed in each.  
822 (b) an apprentice supervisor may require an apprentice to:  
823 (i) clean up an area after the apprentice has used it; and  
824 (ii) perform or participate in daily cleanup of work areas including:  
825 (A) the floor space shampoo bowls;  
826 (B) laundering the towels and linen; or  
827 (C) another general cleanup duty that is related to the performance of a  
828 client service or a practical experience.  
829 (c) Subject to Subsection (2)(d)(ii), an apprentice supervisor may provide instruction to  
830 the apprentice regarding product sales techniques as part of the business and shop  
831 management portion of the curriculum.  
832 (d) An apprentice supervisor may not:  
833 (i) use an apprentice to perform maintenance, janitorial, or remodeling work  
834 including:  
835 (A) scrubbing the floor, a wall, or a toilet;

- (B) cleaning a window;
- (C) waxing the floor;
- (D) painting;
- (E) decorating; or
- (F) performing any outside work on the grounds or building.

(ii) require an apprentice to sell products applicable to the industry as a condition to graduate;

(iii) remove an hour earned by a student except that:

- (A) based on the apprentice's level of competency, the supervisor may require an apprentice to take a refresher course towards completion of the training program; or

(iv) require an apprentice to perform an activity listed under Subsection 58-11a-502(2).

Section 56-11a-102(1) an apprentice supervisor shall complete a written contract  
apprentice before starting the apprenticeship that:  
signed by the apprentice supervisor and the student; and  
includes:

- (i) the rules of conduct for the supervisor, and the apprentice;
- (ii) a class outline including the expected timeline to complete the training and the distribution of each kit item;
- (iii) the attendance requirements;
- (iv) the provisions for make-up work;
- (v) the grounds for dissociation by the instructor and apprentice and
- (vi) a detailed fee schedule with the refund amounts including the apprentice's financial responsibility upon dissociation from the supervisor or vice versa.

R156-11a-501. Unprofessional Conduct.

### III. Unprofessional Conduct

- (1) using a device classified by the Food and Drug Administration as a prescriptive medical device without the appropriate level of supervision by a licensed health care practitioner acting within the licensed health care practitioner's scope of practice;
- (2) performing a service within the individual's scope of practice without having been adequately trained to perform the service;
- (3) performing a procedure while the licensee has a known contagious disease that may be transmitted by performing the procedure unless the licensee takes medically approved measures to prevent transmission of the disease;[-and]
- (4) performing a procedure on a client who has a known contagious disease that may be transmitted by performing the procedure unless the licensee takes medically approved measures to prevent transmission of the disease[-];
- (5) using a product containing formaldehyde, formalin, or methylene glycol;
- (6) violating a standard established in Subsection R156-11a-302.18(4) or Subsection R156-11a-302.18(5);
- (7) violating a standard established in Subsection R156-11a-302.22(4), Subscription R156-11a-302.22(5), or Subsection R156-11a-302.22(6); or
- (8) violating a standard established in Subsection R156-11a-306.
- (9) use of a dermal roller

## **R156-11a-503. Administrative Penalties - Unlawful Conduct.**

885 (1) In addition to the penalties in Section 58-11a-503, the penalties under Sections 58-1-502 and  
886 R156-1-502 shall apply to a violation of Title 58 Occupations and Professions.
