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22 Council Member Kunz:

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- Council Member Kunz reported on his participation in the RFP tree bid award meeting with Council Member Speth and city staff Ryan, Skarlett, and Rob.
- He also mentioned meeting with Ryan on separate occasions to discuss the agenda and other matters.
- Council Member Kunz noted a postponed painting project for Zollinger Park through Just Serve and upcoming projects at Braegger Park, including staining benches and painting basketball court lines at Cattle Corral Park currently scheduled for August 8th.
- He briefly mentioned mosquito abatement, stating that West Nile virus had been found in the valley, but didn't have specific data on the number of traps affected.

31 Council Member Speth:

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- Council Member Speth confirmed his participation in the tree assessment meeting and discussions with Ryan about agenda items.
- He mentioned visiting sites related to the agenda and listening to planning and zoning discussions on agenda items, particularly the rezone.

36 Council Member Sealy:

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- Council Member Sealy reported attending a county library meeting and meeting with fiber vendors to discuss various matters.
- She also mentioned talking to some residents about various issues in the city.

44 • Council Member Kirk reported on preparations for the new youth council, stating that applications were

63 • Council Member Kirk opened the floor of public comment.
64 • Linda Chappell, a resident living near Meadow Ridge Park, thanked the council for fixing the water
65 issue on the east side of the park. She expressed concern about eight horizontal lines across the pathway
66 that needed filling before they crumble and become a hazard. Mrs. Chappell described how children on
67 scooters, skateboards, and roller skates have difficulty navigating these areas and urged the council to
68 address this issue to prevent potential accidents and lawsuits.
69 • Council Member Kirk assured Mrs. Chappell that the city staff works hard to maintain the parks and that
70 they would ensure the issue is addressed.
71 • No further comments were made. Council Member Kirk closed the public comment portion of the
72 meeting.

73 Resolutions/Ordinances:74 **12 MIN 45 SEC.**

75 ➤ **Item No. 2 Ordinance 05-2025 Timber Brook Rezone:** The Providence City Council will review,
76 discuss and may take action on an ordinance that rezones parcel 02-096-0048, located in the general area

85 of 314 W 100 S Providence Ut, from AGR. to R-1-6. Planning Commission held a public hearing on July
86 9th and recommended that the City Council reject the rezone as requested. **(ORDIN. 05-2025) &**
87 **(ANAYLSIS) & (APPLICANT PRESENTATION)**

- 89 • Ryan Snow, the city manager, provided a brief overview of the application process and mentioned
90 that the Planning Commission had recommended rejecting the R-1-6 application at their previous
91 meeting.
- 92 • Jayden Smith, representing Dallin Tolman and Timber brook Homes, presented their case for the
93 R-1-6 zone application. He argued that the R-1-6 zone would be the best transition between
94 existing apartments and townhomes and the R-1-10 zone in the area. Mr. Smith emphasized that
95 the general plan had always included R-1-6 zoning in this area. He expressed concerns about
96 potential pressure from the state for affordable housing and argued that their proposal for 10,000
97 square foot lots within the R-1-6 zone was a good compromise.
- 98 • Several residents provided public comments:
 - 99 ○ Doug Snow expressed support for the development but requested consideration of a cul-
100 de-sac instead of a through street to create separation between different zones.
 - 101 ○ Mark Thompson, who had donated land for the nearby park, supported the zoning change,
102 arguing it fit the area and provided a good transition between different housing densities.
 - 103 ○ Crystal Howe raised concerns about discrepancies between the master plan shown on the
104 city website and the information presented by city staff regarding R-1-6 zoning in the area.
 - 105 ○ Eric John, representing the current landowners, emphasized the impact on the landowners
106 if the zoning change is not approved and urged the council to consider their perspective.
 - 107 ○ Diana Price advocated for R-1-8 zoning to accommodate a cul-de-sac and suggested
108 creating a bike trail to connect Meadowridge Park with other areas.
- 109 • Council members discussed various aspects of the application, including:
 - 110 ○ Concerns about parking issues with 60-foot frontages in R-1-6 lots
 - 111 ○ The potential for future subdivision of adjacent lots
 - 112 ○ The affordability of homes in the proposed development
 - 113 ○ The possibility of modifying the application to R-1-8 or R-1-10 zoning
- 114 • Council members continued their discussion about the proposed zoning, considering factors such
115 as lot sizes, frontage requirements, and potential impacts on the neighborhood. They also
116 discussed the possibility of tabling the item to allow for further consideration and potential
117 amendments to the application.
- 118 • After extensive discussion, the council decided to table the item to allow for further consideration
119 and potential modifications to the application and for the actual applicant to be present

133 ➤ **Item No. 3 RFP Tree Inventory Bid Award:** The Providence City Council will review, discuss and
134 may take action on a bid award for arborist services for city tree inventory and management plan. **(RFP)**
135 & **(RFP Q&A)** PROPOSALS: **(DRG)** **(GOODFELLERS)** **(PLANIT GEO)**
136 **(ARBORPRO)** **(EOCENE)**

137 • Ryan Snow explained that the city applied for a grant with the forestry department to fund a tree
138 inventory of city-owned trees in park strips, parks, and rights-of-way. He described it as a master
139 plan for trees that would help identify where trees should be added, thinned, or reduced, and how to
140 manage them throughout their lifecycle.

141 • Mr. Snow noted that a committee of council members and staff reviewed five proposals and
142 recommended awarding the contract to Arbor Pro. He explained that this inventory would help the
143 city apply for additional grants and potentially qualify Providence as a "Tree City."

144 • Council Member Speth, who participated in the review process, stated that Arbor Pro stood out as
145 providing the best value and assessment of the number of trees.

155 ➤ **Item No. 4 Library Lease Agreement:** The Providence City Council will review, discuss and may
156 take action on a lease agreement between the City and the County regarding the Library building at 15 N
157 Main Street here in Providence UT. **(AGREEMENT)**

158 • Ryan Snow explained that the previous agreement with the county was complicated and
159 outdated. The new agreement simplifies responsibilities, with the city owning the building and
160 providing water, sewer, garbage, and fiber communication, while the county takes care of the
161 interior maintenance.

162 • Council Member Sealy, who serves on the library board, expressed support for the new
163 agreement, stating it provides more clarity and saves money for the city. She mentioned that the
164 agreement had unanimous support from the administration, county council, and library board.

174 ➤ **Item No. 5 UDOT Blacksmith Fork Trail Agreement:** The Providence City Council will review, discuss and may take action on an agreement between the City and UDOT regarding the Blacksmith Fork Trail. ([AGREEMENT](#))

- 179 • Ryan Snow presented the agreement for the Blacksmith Fork Trail, which will follow the west
180 side of the Blacksmith Fork River. He explained that UDOT would pay for the entire
181 construction cost, while Providence would be responsible for maintaining the section from 1700
182 South to where it meets the highway, including a portion in Millville.
- 183 • Mr. Snow outlined the maintenance responsibilities for each city and mentioned that Millville
184 had decided not to participate at this time. He noted that Providence would maintain snow
185 removal and keep the trail operational year-round.
- 186 • Nate Worthen commented on the agreement which was clarified by Ryan Snow the City
187 Manager.
- 188 • Council members discussed the specifics of the trail's location, maintenance responsibilities, and
189 potential benefits to the community.
- 190 • Council member Sealy commented on restrictions based on the open space bond from the
191 county.

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- Council Members briefly discussed the importance of the sewer system and its development over time in Providence. They acknowledged the value of having this infrastructure in place and the foresight of previous administrations in implementing it.

He explained that he lives on 100 South, has been a Providence resident for about three years, and works at USU as a historian and academic advisor. Lee expressed his passion for local history and his desire to give back to the community.
- The Council asks Mr. Lee a few questions about himself and expressed appreciation for Mr. Lee's willingness to serve and his qualifications as a historian, which met the specific needs of the commission

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281 ➤ **Item No. 10 Review and Deliberation – Lighting Regulations:** The Providence City Council will

282 review Providence Code 10-15, which currently regulates lighting that blinks, flashes, moves, or varies in

283 intensity or color, with specific application to commercial signage. The Council will discuss whether these

284 regulations should be expanded to include residential lighting in response to the growing use of LED

285 lighting on private homes. [**\(PC 10-15\)**](#)

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- Council Member Kirk introduced the topic, explaining that she had requested this item be added to the agenda due to complaints about lights creating nuisances in residential areas. She suggested considering expanding the existing commercial lighting regulations to include residential areas, particularly in response to the growing use of LED lighting on private homes.

- 293 • Several residents provided public comments:
 - 294 ○ Erica Low described issues with bright, flashing lights from neighboring homes affecting
295 her view and quality of life.
 - 296 ○ William Mason, a resident who puts on elaborate light shows, argued against strict
297 regulations and emphasized the community enjoyment his displays bring.
 - 298 ○ Eileen Bird supported some regulation, particularly for those with medical conditions like
299 seizure disorders that can be triggered by flashing lights.
 - 300 ○ David Knight argued that the issue is emerging due to new lighting technologies and
301 suggested seasonal restrictions on moving, flashing, and multicolored lights.
- 302 • The Council discussed various aspects of potential regulations, including:
 - 303 ○ The possibility of addressing the issue through the nuisance ordinance rather than zoning
304 regulations
 - 305 ○ Challenges in quantifying and enforcing lighting regulations
 - 306 ○ The need for balance between individual property rights and community standards
 - 307 ○ Potential educational approaches to encourage neighborly consideration
- 308 • After extensive discussion, the council decided to:
 - 309 ○ Consider forming a subcommittee to review and potentially update the city's nuisance
310 ordinances, including the possibility of addressing residential lighting.
 - 311 ○ Explore educational initiatives to raise awareness about lighting considerations and
312 encourage neighbor-to-neighbor communication.
 - 313 ○ Gather more information about lighting regulations in other communities and their
314 effectiveness.
- 315 • No formal action was taken on this item, but the council agreed to continue the discussion in future
316 meetings.

- 320 • Ryan Snow provided several city and staff updates:
 - 321 ○ A water leak occurred on Sunday, which was successfully repaired by the city crew with
322 assistance from Blacksmith Fork.
 - 323 ○ A fiber outage occurred due to a contractor cutting a line without calling for utility location
324 services.
 - 325 ○ The new lift station is operational, with a few finishing touches still needed.
 - 326 ○ Progress is being made on the design for Grandview Park, and grant applications are being
327 submitted for land purchase funding.
 - 328 ○ Improvements are underway at the pony field, and designs are ready for the Thompson field
329 spring core system and trails.
 - 330 ○ A preliminary drawing for a COG application to improve 300 East from Center Street to 200
331 North was presented.
- 332 • Council members expressed appreciation for the staff's hard work, particularly in handling recent
333 emergencies and ongoing projects
- 334 • Council Member Kirk noted that the calendar for Sauerkraut Days has been published, with various
335 events planned.
