- emotional needs that demand high-intensity, specialized support
- Highly qualified teachers for students who are DHH are essential in addressing these needs
- National shortage: Fewer university programs -> fewer teachers -> higher caseloads and proper outcomes
- DHH Teacher Prep at the University of Utah
 - Program established in 1962
 - o Training program for low-incidence disabilities are historically small
 - Eliminated in 1987 due to low enrollment
- What We Offer
 - o B.S. or M.Ed. degree in Special Education
 - Teaching Licenses: Special Ed 0-5 or K-21
- Comprehensive Preparation
 - Students develop knowledge and skills to work across communication modalities
 - Preparation for diverse educational placements
 - o Only 3 comprehensive programs in the Western United States
- Program Structure
 - Two years (6 semesters)
 - o Hybrid model: live Zoom sessions + asynchronous online modules
 - Designed to fit the needs of working professionals statewide
- Where are our Graduates?
 - o USDB, Statewide, Early Intervention, and across the country
- Progress
 - Recent curriculum updates to ensure alignment with national standards and best practices
 - Full access for distance students

- Project ASSIST
 - Joint coursework, seminars, outreach, and field studies build collaborative practice
 - o Professional development and networking opportunities
 - o 29 students funded over the last 4 years
- Challenges
 - o Recruiting without grant funding
 - USDB creating own in-house training program.



	After concluding her presentation, Ms. Pilling spoke of an additional challenge. The funding that has been sustaining the consortium over the past 30 years is at risk right now. Ms. Pilling said she suspects that if their full funding is not restored, that one or both sensory impairment programs at the University of Utah will be eliminated. She doesn't have a call to action yet. She just wanted to make all aware of this issue and that the stakes are high for DHH children and families in the state of Utah. Ms. Pilling may be reaching out to stakeholders in the future to help in trying to preserve education for the children in Utah. EHDI* Updates	 Dr. McVicar reviewed EHDI updates The entire EHDI staff at the Federal level were let go, so our grant project is not being reviewed We were offered one more year of funding, and just received our notice of award (through June 30th of 2026) HRSA is in its 2nd year of a 5-year project. Status of future years' funding is currently unknown. In the meantime, it's business as usual.

NCHAM Updates	 Before providing NCHAM updates, Dr. Karl White spoke briefly about federal funding. Congress is on recess for the rest of August. Contact Utah representatives in early September, especially ones who are on budget committees. Federal government has authorized HRSA grant money through FY27, but that still must be separately appropriated. Received word this week at Utah State that personal prep grants that fund NCHAM's deaf education and pediatric audiology & speech language pathology programs are at risk. The programs themselves won't go away, but if that goes through, they won't have money to support tuition and stipends for students. There has been a lot of pushback against the announcement. Dr. White doesn't think it's a done deal yet. Keep watching for opportunities to inform people. NCHAM Updates: National conference: 25th anniversary of EHDI conferences. They're planning activities to celebrate those 25 years. In spite of everything, we should take a moment to look at how far we've come. Submissions for abstracts are being accepted now, with a 9/29 deadline. Call for instructional session abstracts. There is time for about 10-15 sessions on the Sunday prior to meeting and the Wednesday following it. We encourage everyone to think about whether there are particular topics you'd like to see and, if so, go to the National EHDI Conference website for instructions on submitting abstracts.
