3	R277-217-1. Authority and Purpose.
4	(1) This rule is authorized by:
5	(a) Utah Constitution Article X, Section 3, which vests general control and
6	supervision over public education in the Board;
7	(b) Subsection 53E-3-401(4), which allows the Board to make rules to execute
8	the Board's duties and responsibilities under the Utah Constitution and state law;
9	(c) Subsection 53E-3-501(1)(a), which directs the Board to make rules regarding
10	the certification of educators; and
11	(d) Title 53E, Chapter 6, Educator Licensing and Professional Practices Act,
12	which provides all laws related to educator licensing and professional practices.
13	(2) The purpose of this rule is to:
14	(a) establish statewide ethical [and accountability] standards for educators;
15	(b) establish reporting requirements for educators and LEAs; and
16	(c) recognize that educators are professionals and share common professional
17	standards, [accountability standards,] expectations, and role model responsibilities.

19	R277-217-2. Prohibited Conduct by an Educator.
20	An educator may not:
21	(1) be convicted of a felony;
22	(2) be convicted of a misdemeanor offense that:
23	(a) adversely affects the educator's ability to perform an assigned duty and carry
24	out the educator's responsibilities; or
25	(b) adversely affects the well being of students;
26	(3) be convicted of, or engage in conduct of a sexual nature described in

31	hours, or while responsible for actively supervising students;

37	contact, or a pattern of inappropriate contact in any communication, including written,
38	verbal, or electronic, with a minor, student, colleague, or member of the community; or
39	(b) a single egregious instance or pattern of boundary violations with a student
40	<u>or minor</u> ;
41	([6]8) solicit, encourage, or consummate an inappropriate relationship, whether
42	written, verbal, or physical, with a student or minor;
43	([7]9) accept an inappropriate gift from, or give an inappropriate gift to, a student;
44	([8]10) be convicted of or commit a criminal offense involving a child, including
45	physical abuse, cruelty, or exploitation of child;
46	( $[9]11$ ) use corporal punishment, excessive physical force, or inappropriate
47	physical restraint, except as provided in Section 53G-8-302;
48	([ <del>10</del> ] <u>12</u> ) provide alcohol or unauthorized drugs to a student or allow a student
49	under the educator's supervision or control to consume or obtain alcohol or
50	unauthorized drugs;
51	([11]13) attend school or a school-related activity in an assigned employment-
52	related capacity while possessing, using, or under the influence of alcohol or an illegal
53	drua:

54	([12]14) attend school or a school-related activity in an assigned employment-
55	related capacity after intentionally exceeding the prescribed dosage of a prescription
56	medication that may impair the educator;
57	([ <del>13</del> ]15) possess or distribute an illegal drug or be convicted of any crime related
58	to an illegal drug, including a prescription drug not specifically prescribed to the
59	educator;
60	([14]16) be convicted of an alcohol-related offense;
61	([ <del>15</del> ]17) use or attempt to use an LEA computer or information system to access
62	information that may be detrimental to [young people] students or inconsistent with the
63	educator's role model responsibility;
64	([ <del>16</del> ]18) knowingly possess, while at school or any school-related activity, any
65	pornographic or indecent material in any form;
66	([17]19) use school equipment to intentionally view, create, distribute, or store
67	pornographic or indecent material in any form;
68	([18]20) knowingly use, view, create, distribute, or store pornographic or
69	indecent material involving children;
70	([ <del>19</del> ] <u>21</u> ) expose students to sensitive materials:

118	([ <del>28</del> ] <u>31</u> ) violate:

129	R277-217-3. Required Conduct for an Educator.
130	An educator shall:
131	(1) comply with all federal, state, and local laws;
132	(2) maintain a professional educator/student relationship, including by:
133	(a) treating a student with dignity and respect by promoting the health, safety
134	and well being of students; and
135	(b) maintaining appropriate physical, verbal, emotional and social boundaries;
136	(3) take prompt and appropriate action to stop, mitigate, and prevent
137	harassment[, hostile, intimidating, abusive, offensive, oppressive, or] inappropriate

language or conduct; or discriminatory conduct toward a student or school employee
that the educator knew or should have known may result in a hostile, intimidating,
abusive, offensive, or oppressive environment;

- (4) take prompt and appropriate action to protect a student from any known condition detrimental to the student's physical health, mental health, safety, or learning;
- (5) report suspected child abuse or neglect to law enforcement or the Division of Child and Family Services in accordance with Sections 53E-6-701 and 80-2-602;
- (6) cooperate in providing all relevant information and evidence to the proper authority in the course of an investigation by a law enforcement agency or by the Division of Child and Family Services regarding potential criminal activity, except that an educator may decline to give evidence against himself or herself in an investigation if the evidence may tend to incriminate the educator as that term is defined by the Fifth Amendment of the U.S. Constitution:
- (7) take appropriate steps to notify a student's parents and refer a student to appropriate prevention services if a student threatens suicide or self harm as required by Subsections 53E-9-203(7) and 53G-9-604(2);
  - (8) provide truthful, accurate, and complete information in:
  - (a) licensing, transfer, and employment applications or other documentation;
  - (b) evaluations of the educator, other educators, or students;
  - (c) proceedings related to educator licensure, employment, or related benefits;
  - (d) student IEP plans and related special education documentation;
- (9) be forthcoming with truthful, accurate, and complete information to an appropriate authority regarding known educator misconduct that could adversely impact performance of a professional responsibility, by another educator;
- (10) subject to the educator's constitutional rights against self-incrimination, fully cooperate with criminal or civil law enforcement and LEA investigations involving a student or employee of the educator's LEA by:
  - (a) responding truthfully and promptly to lawful inquiries by law enforcement;

168	(c) complying with lawful subpoenas, warrants, or other compulsory processes.
169	([10]11) notify the Superintendent at the time of application for licensure of:

173	(c) past criminal convictions;
174	([ <del>11</del> ]12) report an arrest, citation, charge or conviction to the educator's LEA in

177	funds committed to the educator's charge, as school responsibilities require, consistent
178	with LEA policy;
179	([ <del>13</del> ]14) follow an LEA's fiscal policy for collecting money in connection with a
180	school activity, accounting for all money collected, and not commingling LEA or school
181	funds with personal funds as described in Rule R277-113;
182	([14]15) demonstrate honesty and integrity by strictly adhering to all state and
183	LEA instructions and protocols in managing and administering a standardized test to a
184	student consistent with Section 53E-4-312 and Rule R277-404; and
185	([ <del>15</del> ]16) use supplemental materials consistent with LEA policy as required by
186	Subsection 53G-4-402(26).

188	R277-217-4. Educator Reporting of Arrests, Citations, Charges, and Convictions.
189	(1) An educator who is arrested, cited, or charged with the following alleged
190	offenses shall report the arrest, citation, or charge within 48 hours or as soon as
191	possible to the licensed educator's district superintendent, charter school director, or the
192	LEA's designee, or to the Executive Secretary if not employed:
193	(a) any matters involving an alleged sex offense;

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194	(b) any matters involving an alleged drug-related offense;
195	(c) any matters involving an alleged alcohol-related offense;
196	(d) any matters involving an alleged offense against the person under Title 76,
197	Chapter 5, Offenses Against the Person;
198	(e) any matters involving an alleged felony offense under Title 76, Chapter 6,
199	Offenses Against Property;
200	(f) any matters involving an alleged crime of domestic violence under Title 77,
201	Chapter 36, Cohabitant Abuse Procedures Act; and
202	(g) any matters involving an alleged crime under federal law or the laws of
203	another state comparable to the violations listed in Subsections (1)(a) through (f).
204	(2) An educator shall report any conviction or plea in abeyance for a felony or
205	misdemeanor offense to the educator's LEA, or the Executive Secretary if not
206	employed, within 48 hours, or as soon as possible thereafter.
207	(3) An LEA superintendent, director, or designee shall report conviction, arrest,
208	or offense information received from an educator to the Superintendent within 48 hours
209	of receipt of information from an educator.
210	(4) The Superintendent shall provide a form on the Board's website for reports
211	required under this section.
212	(5) An educator shall report for work following an arrest and provide notice to the
213	licensed educator's employer unless directed not to report for work by the employer,
214	consistent with LEA policy.

216	R277-217-5. LEA Reporting of Misconduct to UPPAC.
217	(1) An LEA shall notify UPPAC if an educator is determined pursuant to a judicial

231	(a) the findings of the LEA's internal investigation or administrative proceedings;
232	(b) criminal charges filed by a prosecuting agency;
233	(c) the LEA's internal disciplinary action or decision not to take action, and the
234	evidence supporting the decision; and
235	(d) any evidence that may be relevant if UPPAC chooses to investigate the
236	matter.
237	(4) The Executive Secretary shall provide a form for an LEA to make a
238	notification required under Subsections (1) and (2).
239	(5) Upon submitting a notification under Subsection (1) or (2), an LEA may make
240	a recommendation to the Executive Secretary concerning whether an investigation by
241	UPPAC would be appropriate under the circumstances, taking into account any
242	employment action taken by the LEA, but the LEA's recommendation is not binding on
243	UPPAC, which shall make its own independent determination consistent with Section
244	R277-211-3.
