Over the past nine years, Layton City residents have transformed our community through Recreation, Arts, Museum, and Parks (RAMP) funding. Since 2015, when we voted to implement this tax, more than \$17 million has been invested in over 278 projects and programs that touch every corner of our community. The following are just some of the reasons I support RAMP and urge you all to register to vote and say “YES” For RAMP:

- Funded the construction and enhancement of **trails, playgrounds, gyms, ballfields, parks, and pool.**
- Supported **free concerts, theater, art exhibits, and museum improvements.**
- **It's a small sales tax:** just 1/10 of 1% — or 1 penny for every \$10 spent.
- Because a “YES” vote is a continuation of an existing tax, **your current tax rate will not change.**
- **Visitors shopping in Layton contribute significantly,** helping fund Layton’s growth.
- **All RAMP dollars stay in Layton,** directly benefiting local families, businesses, and neighborhoods.
- Promotes a **stronger local economy** and builds **community pride.**
- Managed through a **citizen advisory board review** process.


No arguments for or against the RAMP Tax were submitted.

RAMP Tax Authorization Election

## What is R.A.M.P. Tax?

Recreation, Arts, Museum, and Parks (R.A.M.P.) Tax is a 1/10th of 1% sales tax charged while shopping in Layton.



For every \$10 spent

=



\$0.01 revenue collected

### Who pays the tax?

Anyone who makes a qualifying point-of-sale purchase in Layton City will pay the tax, regardless of their place of residency. This is true for our residents when visiting other cities that have implemented a R.A.M.P. tax.

### How much funding is expected and how long will it be available?

R.A.M.P. tax will generate approximately \$2,000,000 per year based on current sales tax projections. After 10 years, the R.A.M.P. tax may be re-submitted to voters to decide on another 10-year term.

## How does the City spend it?

Your penny helps provide funding for R.A.M.P. projects such as new playgrounds, sports facilities, trails, concerts, traveling museum exhibits, and more. Below is a snapshot of Layton City's use of R.A.M.P. funds over the last 10 years:

### Who decides what projects to fund with the proceeds of the R.A.M.P. tax?

The City Council makes final funding decisions on which projects to fund based on recommendations from a citizen advisory board. Potential projects are reviewed annually as part of the City's regular budget process, which includes opportunities for public input and comment.

### What if R.A.M.P is not Reauthorized?

If the R.A.M.P. tax is not reauthorized, the tax will expire in April 2026 and funding of recreation, arts, museum, and parks projects and activities would be delayed, downsized, reorganized, or canceled altogether.
