Mayor O'Hare said good evening. Everybody like to welcome you tonight. At this time, we are going to start this meeting up, and this will be the public hearing for the Request For Proposal for the relicensing of the Curlew EMS Ambulance.

So at this time, I will read this. It's six pages long, so bear with me. I'll read it word for word, as it's been put together.

Mayor O'Hare read Request for Proposal. Emergency Medical Services, the Town of Snowville, Utah, and Box Elder County is requesting proposals from expert vendors to provide emergency medical services.

1. Scope of services-- Contract EMS services.
  - A. The Vendor shall provide AEMT-level service to the town. Respond to all emergency, interfacility transport services, mutual aid calls for service, (and collect all information for billing the EMS calls.) The Vendors shall monitor the activities of assigned personnel daily to ensure that all contracted services are supplied in a professional and competent manner. Management and /or supervisory staff shall meet monthly with the Town's Mayor and Council Members at the Town's Council Meeting to ensure a good working relationship between the Vendor and the Town.
  - B. The contract staff will follow the local EMS agency's rules and regulations for daily operations.
  - C. Each crew shall consist of one advanced life support provider and at least one Basic Life Support provider, as well as one EMR for driving.
  - D. The Vendor shall operate under the EMS agency's protocols as outlined under the license at the direction of the Medical Director. The Vendor shall

use the agency's identification and will be listed as an affiliate of the assigned agency.

E. The Vendor shall supply staffing (only) and utilize the equipment and supplies belonging to the Town and the EMS agencies, wash, clean, and stock the vehicles, and confirm and conformance with the state regulations inspection sheet; inspect each vehicle routinely and complete the inspection forms provided by the agency. The Town shall provide the uniforms for the staff with the EMS agency's name and the agency's logo.

F. The Vendor shall complete and enter all enter data immediately following each call. Paper copies of all reports shall be secured in accordance with the Health Insurance Portability and Accountability Act, which is the (HIPAA).

G. The Vendor shall provide service in the incorporated town of Snowville, Utah, as well as the area in Box Elder County, as per the current licensing.

H. Due to, no medical facilities within the geographic service area, Snowville town will not consider a primary inter-facility transport vendor.

## II. SPECIFIC TERMS AND CONDITIONS

A. Vendor shall provide a history of the firm, qualifications, and years of experience in 911 EMS services, including a list of the local jurisdictions in Utah in which the firm is currently operating, with contact information.

B. Vendors shall provide a description of the manner in which the firm would propose to provide emergency services to Snowville Town, including the background and training of the persons who would be providing services to the town, and any other information the firm deems useful to the town in making its decision.

C. Vendor shall provide the cost to the town of providing the services.

D. Vendor shall provide three current references from 911-based services.

E. Vendor shall submit their privacy policy to ensure that information obtained from citizens will remain confidential.

F. The vendor shall add and add an endorsement to its insurance policy naming the town as additional insured for the contracted EMS service operations. A certificate of insurance and a copy of said endorsement shall be required within 10 days of the date of the award. The certificate must contain a provision stating that the coverage will not be canceled unless a minimum of 15 days' prior written notice has been given to the town.

G. The vendor shall indemnify and hold harmless the town, its agents and employees from and all and against all claims, damages, losses, and expenses, including, but not limited to, attorneys' fees arising out of or resulting from the negligence of the vendor, his agents or employees during the performance of this contract.

### III. GENERAL TERMS AND CONDITIONS

By submitting a proposal, the Contractor agrees to the following contract provisions:

#### A. Anti-Discrimination:

By submitting bids or proposals, Vendors certify to Snowville Town that they will conform to the provisions of the Federal Civil Rights Act of 1964, as amended, and the Utah Fair Employment Act, as amended. Where applicable, and the Americans with Disabilities Act.

1. During the performance of this contract, the Vendor agrees as follows:

A. The Vendor shall not discriminate against any employee or applicant for employment because of race, religion, color, sex, national origin, political affiliation, veteran status, age, disability or other basis prohibited by law relating to discrimination in employment, except where there is a bona fide occupational qualification, reasonably, excuse me, reasonably necessary to the normal operation of the vendor, the vendor agrees to post in conspicuous places

available to employee and applicants for employment, notices setting forth the provisions of this nondiscrimination clause.

B. The Vendor in all solicitations or advertisements for employees placed by or on behalf of the Vendor shall state that such Vendor is an equal opportunity employer.

C. Notices, advertisements, and solicitations placed in accordance with federal law, rule, and regulations shall be deemed sufficient for the purpose of meeting the requirements of this section.

B. Ethics and Public Contracting:

By submitting a bid or proposal, vendors certify that their bids or proposals are made without collusion or fraud and that they have not offered or received any kickbacks or inducements from any other bidder or offer supplier, manufacturer or subcontractor in connection with their bid or proposal and that they have not conferred with on any public employee having official responsibility for the procurement transaction and payment, loan subscription, advanced deposit of money, services or anything of more than nominal value, present or promised, unless considered or of substantially equal or greater value, was exchanged.

C. Immigration Reform and Control Act of 1986 by submitting a bid or proposal vendor certified that they do not, do not, and will not, during the performance of their contract, employ illegal alien workers or otherwise violate the provisions of the Federal Immigration Reform and Control Act of 1980.

D. Drug and Alcohol Abuse:

The Town's goal is to provide a safe workplace by eliminating the hazards to health and job safety created by alcohol and other drug abuse. This applies to contractors, subcontractors, and employees of firms doing business with the Town while on Town premises. By submitting a bit of or proposal, vendors certify full compliance with the town's goals.

E. Receipt of Bids/ Proposals:

To be considered, bids or proposals shall be received at the location, provided and within the time period specified in the request for proposals. (RFP). Responses received after the specific date and time shall be returned unopened.

F. Acceptance/ Rejection of Bids/Proposals:

Snowville Town revert reserves the right to accept or reject any or all bids or proposals or portion of any bid or proposal, and to reissue said bid or proposal. The Town reserves the right to award a contract based on a lump sum or per item basis, or a sample provided.

G. Clarification of Terms:

Prospective Vendors may submit questions in writing concerning specifications or other solicitation documents no later than (7) working days before the due date. Any revisions to the RFP will be issued as an addendum.

H. Presidents of Terms:

Paragraphs A - G of these General Terms and Conditions shall apply in all instances. In the event that there is a conflict between any of the other General Terms and Conditions of any Special Terms and Conditions in this solicitation, the Special Terms and Conditions shall apply.

I. Use of brand names:

Unless otherwise provided in the solicitations. The name of a certain brand, make, or manufacturer does not restrict vendors to the specific brand, make, or manufacturer named. It conveys, it conveys the general style, type, character, and quality of the article desired. Any article which the town, in its sole discretion, determines to be the equal of that specific considering quality workmanship, economy of operation, and system suitability for the purpose intended shall be accepted.

J. Firm Prices:

Prices and all associated charges shall be firm for sixty (60) days after the due date of the bids or proposals, unless otherwise stated by. I don't know where that came from.

Should be Box Elder County,  
If we can make that correction.

#### K. Taxes.

Snowville town is exempt from federal, state, and local taxes. Taxes included on invoices will be deducted from the payment amount tax Tax-exempt forms will be completed for a vendor upon request.

#### L. Delivery.

All costs and other charges associated with the delivery of a good or non-professional service shall be included in the bid for or proposal. The town reserves the right to cancel all or any part of a contract without obligate obligation, if delivery is not made within the time period specified in the bid or proposal document.

#### M. Required Signature:

All bids and proposals shall be signed with the firm name, federal identification number, and by a representative possessing the authority to bind said firm with his/her signature. The Town may request documentation of the signer, authority.

#### N. Qualifications of Vendors:

Snowville Town may make such reasonable investigations as deemed proper and necessary to determine the ability of a vendor to perform the work or supply the goods the vendor shall furnish to the town all such information and data for this purpose as may be requested, the town reserves the right to inspect the vendor's physical facilities prior to award to satisfy questions regarding the vendors capabilities. Further, the town reserves the right to reject any bid or proposal if the evidence submitted by or the investigations of such bidder or offerer fails to satisfy the town that such vendor is properly qualified to carry out the obligations of the contract and to complete the work for the supply of goods.

#### O. Payment Terms:

All approved invoices will be paid within forty-five (45) days of receipt.

#### P. Default:

In the case of failure to deliver goods or services in accordance with the contract terms and conditions, Snowville Town, after due oral and written notice, may procure them from all their resources and hold the vendor responsible for any resulting additional purchases and administrative costs. The remedy shall be in addition to any commutative with any other remedies the town may have under federal, state, and local law. Sorry,

Any litigation arising from this request for proposals or subsequent contracts shall be brought to the circuit court of Box Elder County.

#### IV. EVALUATION AND AWARD

Following receipt of proposals, the proposals will be elevated, evaluated based on the following criteria.

A. Qualifications and experience of the vendor as and assigned staff. B. Proposal preparation and understanding of the scope of work.

C. Reference, checks, and evidence of collection rates.

D. Availability of the vendor to provide timely client assistance and customer service based on prompt and timely updates, complaint and concern resolution, and delivery of monies collected.

E. Cost of service.

F. History of compliance with applicable state, federal, and local regulations concerning billing and labor practices and related issues.

So, in case anybody doesn't know this request for proposals, what we have to do to get licensing for the Curlew emergency services here that we have this has to go out, and then bids will come in, and then the town will make decisions on that.

So at this time, we'll open the floor for anybody that has any questions, concerns, or wants to add anything to this?

Okay, if we don't have any comments, if we could make that one correction, it's the page number, I think it was just a typo.

Page five, the top page, it will say at the end, right above K, " Box Elder County, And that will be in number J, firm prices with that.

At this time, we'll close the meeting.

I apologize for my phone not being turned on.

Mayor O'Hare said Okay. At this time, we'd like to open the meeting. We'd like to welcome everybody to the Snowville town council meeting for Wednesday, September 10, 2025.

I'm Scott O'Hare. I'm the mayor. We'd like to recognize our town council members, Rod McGary, LuAnn Johnson, Heather O'Hare, and Trish Arbon. We also like to recognize Stacey Hill and Tammie Morgan, our clerk and treasurer. I'd also like to recognize our EMS president, Dave Smith, and at this time, we will have a pledge led by Tammie Morgan and then a prayer from Stacey Hill. Tammie said I pledge allegiance to the Flag of the United States of America and to the republic for which it stands, one nation under God, indivisible with liberty and justice for all.

Stacey said Our dear Heavenly Father, we're so grateful to be here as members of this town council in this valley. Heavenly Father, please watch over and protect us and protect our families, and be with the families that are mourning today with the terrible shooting of Charlie. Heavenly Father, please watch over his family. Heavenly Father, please bless this nation that it will come together and we can all be strong together. We're so very grateful for the rains that have come, for thirsty land, and for our families that we have here, too. Mayor O'Hare said Amen.

LuAnn said Thank you for remembering Charlie.

Mayor O'Hare said Thank you, Tammie, thank you, Stacey.

Mayor O'Hare said So, I know everybody's aware of the tragedy that happened in Tremonton on the 17th of August.

I'd like everybody to please join me with a moment of silence to remember Sergeant Sorensen and Officer Estrada.

(There is a moment of silence.)

Mayor O'Hare said I um, also today we had another Tragedy in Orem. I'm sure everybody's already heard about it. Whatever each person's beliefs are, we just ask our community to please be mindful when they're out and about. Look out for each other, watch each other and try to keep yourself safe.

Mayor O'Hare said I need to before we start on the agenda. Oh, first about uh, the town council. I'm sorry. The Town Council was emailed the agenda in the minutes from last month. Did everybody receive that? Everybody got a chance to look at that. Was there any additions or anything?

Mayor O'Hare said I have three additions I need to add. We'll, do them right at the beginning or after we get done with the of the voting, the one is the second annual Box Elder County Summit. I'll read you the email from that. Also, is AJ here? Yeah, there he is, okay. Eric Dursteler actually sent me an email, and we'll actually do that when we get to AJ's part, and then, and then the email on the dog shelter, I sent you all that as well. And does anybody else have any additions?

Rod said no.

Mayor O'Hare said Okay. If not, can I get a motion to accept the agenda for September and the minutes from August?

Trisha said I make a motion to accept the agenda for September and the minutes from August.

Mayor O'Hare said I have a first. Do I have a second?

Heather said second.

Mayor O'Hare said I have a second from Heather.

All in favor? Aye. Any opposed?

Mayor O'Hare said Okay, it's passed.

Mayor O'Hare said on the Box Elder County.

So I'll just read this to you. Good afternoon, Snowville. We're pleased to announce the opportunity to register for the second annual Box Elder County summit to be held on Wednesday, September 24, 2025, from 9 am to 2:30 pm at the USU Brigham City Campus. Come join us at the USC Brigham campus to discuss on planning, agriculture, water, and growth issues specific to Box Elder County and its residents must register by 3 pm Tuesday, September 16. So they can get an accurate count for lunches, the cost is \$15 per attendee, and there's a link to register on.

Mayor O'Hare said so the council can decide whether they want to go. LuAnn said if they had something on how to lower property taxes. I'd be there, but the agenda didn't look great.

Mayor O'Hare said, but it's there, and I think we probably have it in the budget of the council wants to attend. We can pay for the \$15 fee for the thing, the if it's in the budget, to be able to do so. The other one I sent you guys was the dog shelter. Did you guys get a chance to see that?

Rod said Yes.

Mayor O'Hare said I probably already know what your thoughts are on that.

LuAnn said \$22 a day.

Mayor O'Hare said Yes.

LuAnn said that's too much money \$57 a week.

Mayor O'Hare said it is, Then I thought the same thing. I've kind of already told the guy, thank you for sending it, and we will probably have to find other options.

LuAnn said That's too much money.

Mayor O'Hare said So, okay, Kjerstin, the town website.

It's up and running.

Trisha said It's user-friendly. I think it looks good. It's informative.

Mayor O'Hare said So for those that don't know yet, we have a new [website@snowvilletown.gov](http://website@snowvilletown.gov). There you'll be able to, I don't think it's up yet, to be able to pay your bill, but it's going to be up soon.

Kjerstin said Yeah, right now, it just takes you to the Express Bill page, which I think.

Mayor O'Hare said Yeah.

Kjerstin said all will be able to do with the light version anyway, it'll be they'll put in their account number. But yeah, there's already a place where you can click it, just everybody doesn't have an account set up yet.

Mayor O'Hare said We've got just a couple of more things have to be added, I think, some names.

Kjerstin said we added what you told us.

Mayor O'Hare said Okay, so that's been added, okay. So we got to add the ordinances.

Matt said Yeah, I just need them all.

Mayor O'Hare said Yeah, we're getting them. We got to get them watermarked to make sure that they're watermarked, so that way, if somebody pulls them off, they don't they have one that's watermarked.

Kjerstin said, and I noticed on like, the minutes and that page that I need to change the phone colors, because you can't read what month the minutes are from, just as like you were down there. But we'll fix that. But, yeah.

Mayor O'Hare said I think it looks pretty good.

Kjerstin said I didn't know what other information everybody wants on there.

Once on there, there's any section missing, we put we uploaded a cemetery book.

Mayor O'Hare said Yep, that's nice.

Kjerstin said So you can look by last name or just the same way that looks is, so.

Mayor O'Hare said Yeah.

Kjersin said, but yeah. Other than that, I think I told Stacey, I just need, I probably just need to talk to Jed about how people can volunteer to be part of the fire department. And I got pictures from all, the pictures came from Heather, Trudy, or I took them, so.

Mayor O'Hare said Yeah, they look good. I liked all the pictures. It's nice to have pictures up there.

Kjerstin said Yeah, all the backgrounds are all ones Heather has taken and used on the Facebook page that she sent to me, and then Trudy gave me all the ones for the Fire and EMS, and hopefully she'll keep sending them to me and I can keep adding more. We could add, like, a photo gallery page of stuff.

Mayor O'Hare said Yeah. Photo Gallery be good, especially when we start to get pictures, you know, Fourth of July parties and Christmas.

Matt said the trunk or treat that's coming up.

Mayor O'Hare said Yeah.

Matt said whatever they want on the calendar.

Mayor O'Hare said Yep, that'd be great.

Rod asked What about a history page?

Kjerstin said There was a history about Snowville. I just summarized find online, like, where you can purchase that book, but the only place I could find it online it was like \$140, is that? Right.

Matt asked is there a digital copy of it?

Mayor O'Hare said I don't know.

LuAnn said I think we paid seventy for the Snowville book, \$70 or 75 something like that?

Kjerstin asked Is it accessible somewhere? I found it like just one, and it was like \$140, and so I was gonna link it, like, if you want further, like history.

LuAnn said I think they only printed so many.

Kjerstin said Okay, you can double your money. I don't know how much interest there is in the one that's listed.

LuAnn said, It's a really well done.

Kjerstin said so we can at least reference the book and when it was published, so that people could have that information. But I just tried to, like, summarize it without plagiarizing anybody, and put what I could, but it was brief.

Mayor O'Hare said Yeah, it looks good.

Kjerstin said Make it more detailed, I don't know.

Mayor O'Hare said It's websites. They just, you know, as you're going through the life, it'll update itself and with stuff. So it's, I think it looks really good.

LuAnn said Brent uses it a lot for the Sexton job.

Mayor O'Hare said Yeah.

LuAnn said if he has to find, you know, he uses it all the time to look up stuff. He'd worn it completely out.

Mayor O'Hare asked What the website?

LuAnn said No, oh, the book.

Mayor O'Hare said The book.

LuAnn said Yeah.

Mayor O'Hare said Well, that's good.

Kjerstin said Yeah, the cemetery book is very, like, nice and organized. LuAnn said Yeah, that was Keith and Carol Thompson did it.

Kjerstin said Really nice. So just don't as they if, I don't know if do you have, how do you update it? Do you have, like, the digital copy?

Stacey said No, not yet.

Kjerstin said Okay, so yeah.

Stacey said Carol she was going to give us a flash drive.

Kjerstin said because once I if, if I can get it as, like, a Word document or something, I can upload it as a higher quality PDF, because I just scanned it so it's got, like, you know, it's not like a perfect scan, but we could turn it into a PDF, and then every time a new person is buried, it would immediately be like, show where they're at as soon as the book's updated. So that's easy to do.

Stacey said Yeah, because there's probably some up there that are new.

Mayor O'Hare asked Anybody else have anything for Wilcock's, Thank you so much for the hard work. We appreciate it. And on that note, the old website has been deleted, and people that were running it, we thank them and for their service for the town, for the time that they did it.

Mayor O'Hare said acceptance of the Request for Proposal for the relicense to the Curlew EMS ambulance. This will be a vote for the town council of the public hearing we just had, that you guys all have a copy of. But before we do that, I'm going to turn it over to Dave for a minute to Dave, because he just came back from the County Commissioners meeting, which they had to do their due diligence on this. So, Dave, it's turned over to you.

Dave said Yeah, so we sent this to them last week, so they had a chance to look it over. I was in there at the Commissioner's meeting. They all they did a motion and voted on it that they would give us a letter of recommendation and approval to whatever the Snowville Town Council decides. So we don't have the official signed documents, because obviously, you guys have to do your part, but they'll be behind what the council decides.

Mayor O'Hare said Very good.

Mayor O'Hare asked Anybody have any questions for Dave?

Mayor O'Hare said So everybody had a chance to, well, we read it, read the whole thing. Did you guys need a chance, Trish? Or actually, she's already read it because she she saw it.

Okay. Was there any questions from anybody?

LuAnn said Nope, it was a lot of thoughts from a simple process.

Mayor O'Hare said Yeah, covering it, covering our bottom, bottom side. Okay, well, with that, if we could get a motion to accept the request for proposal, RFP, for the relicensing of the Curlew EMS ambulance.

Trisha said I make a motion to accept the request for a proposal for the Curlew Emergency Medical Service.

Mayor O'Hare said I Have a motion from Trish? Do I have a second? LuAnn said Second.

Mayor O'Hare said, second from Luann. All in favor? Any opposed?

Okay, passed.

Mayor O'Hare said So, Stacey will need to change that one on page five, you know, put Box Elder County instead. And then we'll have to attach to Dave's portion that we worked on to the back of this and put it in color.

Dave said And then area.

Mayor O'Hare said Yeah, the part you did. And then put it all together as one packet, and then put it in color.

LuAnn asked what area that you'll serve from, where? Where is that from? Where is it from?

Dave said Mile marker 22 to Mile marker 262, and then it gives like a legal description to be from Stone to the Aaron Hill residents around to the Park Valley turn off and down, clear down to the Great Salt Lake.

LuAnn said Oh, okay.

Dave said, then back up.

LuAnn said That's a huge area.

Dave said that it is a huge area.

Mayor O'Hare said So when we get this done, we have to get it. I'll have to sign it, and then we'll have to get it over to the County Commissioners for their signatures. Is that correct?

Dave said Well, their signatures would be the

Mayor O'Hare said letter, Okay.

Dave said the approval, and that would be after you guys vote. I mean. There's a likelihood of very few bids coming in for this, but then you guys have to vote with who you're going with, and the County Commissioners. Then we'll just agree to what you guys do.

LuAnn asked How long do we have to wait for other bids to come in?

Mayor O'Hare said We give it. So we decided. We decided two weeks we're going to do it today. No, not from today. So we voted on it, so it's passed here. We've got to get the letter. Then this has to go to the state to get the licensing.

Dave said Well, our licensing will come. I mean, this is just one of the steps in our licensing.

Mayor O'Hare said, right?

Dave said Other stuff that's going in for the licensing, But it gets we need to put it out there. So someone could say, Hey, I want to come do this, and you guys

would have to address that and vote on it, and what that can happen before we finish putting up.

Mayor O'Hare said so we can't do it before we get the license. Okay. LuAnn said so, do we just posted on the Snowville thing?

Dave said Yeah, that I think the state is. I don't know that they've ever said exactly where.

Mayor O'Hare said I think Kade was saying we had to post it like we do our minutes.

Dave said Yeah.

Mayor O'Hare said or our agenda and stuff. So is it three spots?

Matt said we can post it on the website.

Mayor O'Hare said So we'll definitely post it on the website now.

Matt said, probably on the front page, with a spot for anything you want.

Tammie said Maybe there's something that says public notices that then we can.

Matt said Yeah.

Mayor O'Hare said there is a website that I was looking at that's an RFP website that people post their RFPs on there, and it goes all over the nation.

Tammie said That's this, where we put the agenda and stuff.

Mayor O'Hare said right.

Rod asked You put it where it goes all over the nation?

Kjerstin said [utah.gov](http://utah.gov).

Tammie said yes, it's what it is called.

Dave said so, yeah, I guess it could post to there.

Mayor O'Hare said Well, yeah.

Dave said, granted, once you put it out there, you could be getting phone calls or requests for additional information. I highly unlikely, but. Mayor O'Hare said so I say we posted in our, you know, on our website, on the state and then post office, or here, or even here. We don't even have to put it to the post office. We put it here, the website and the state.

Dave said Yeah, I leave it at that if it's posted at your minimum, places that it needs to post recover.

Tammie said I think it needs to be posted at the post office.

Mayor O'Hare said Okay, well, then if that's what you feel.

Tammie said, and then probably wouldn't be a bad idea just to put it at the Diner. We can put it just because it's not going to hurt. The more places you have posted, the more you're covered.

Mayor O'Hare said, and then post online. We'll put it on the website. Okay.

Dave said I think that should cover it well.

Mayor O'Hare said So you want to do this on, start it on Monday of next week.

Dave said Yeah.

Stacey said Okay.

Dave said Yeah.

Mayor O'Hare said so we'll post it on the 15th, and it'll go until the 29th Well, we can go the day after the well, 11:59, on the 29th, 11:59 and 59, so it'd be right at midnight on the 29th, that'll be two weeks, right? Or what do you see? What do you suggest?

Dave said, and then you guys, as the Town Council, on the Council the meeting in October, could vote on it.

Mayor O'Hare said on what?

Dave said the bids that were received,

Mayor O'Hare said yeah,.

Rod said Okay.

LuAnn asked you have to turn a bid in?

Mayor O'Hare said yes.

Dave said Probably yes, to cover our bases, then yeah, we have to turn in a bid in that time frame too.

Mayor O'Hare said Yeah, to make it legal. Yeah, they'll have to turn in too.

Dave said that's how we got to do it, to follow the rules.

Mayor O'Hare said Yeah, okay, but never know.

Stacey asked Scott, Will you help me with the wording on that?

Mayor O'Hare said I will, yes, we'll get together on that this week. And yep. Okay, so we're good, Dave. I want to thank you for all your hard work on that. Really do appreciate it, but we got the hard part out of the way. We got all the wording out of the way. So now it's just a bunch of red tape we've got to cut.

Dave said Yeah.

Mayor O'Hare said approval for the water tanks to be cleaned. Everybody got that bid last week or last month. Everybody got a chance to look at that. Do we have any comments or anything on that?

LuAnn asked Do we have the money to do the one where we paint, the inside, and do the whole thing.

Tammie said we do have the money.

LuAnn said that's the one I go with. What do you say?

Mayor O'Hare asked is that the \$12,000 one?

AJ said so it's there's two different sections. So the basic base of scope is that, for the first amount, is that they clean the floor. The second one is that they clean the walls for that \$12,000. I talked to Stacey yesterday, the lady at the office. And then there'll be, if they find cracks or anything, there it is. The \$750 an hour to repair cracks. That's an addition on top of that. But they will contact me and let me know. And I can say, Yeah, let's fix it, or let's not fix it, but I'm assuming that there is no cracks, or if there is, they're probably not big enough cracks to worry about.

LuAnn said it's been a long time since it's been painted and cleaned. AJ said Well, it's not painted. They're not painting.

Trisha said Well, what would be the point of cleaning the floor. If we don't clean the walls.

LuAnn said we've got to do the whole thing.

AJ said I agree.

Tammie said I don't think it was ever done.

AJ said it was probably 20-something years ago.

LuAnn said Yeah, it is time.

AJ said it was done before it was even owned by the town, when it was still a private water company.

LuAnn said Yeah.

AJ said my opinion, I think it's worth doing at least inspect the inside the tanks and make sure we don't have an issue, and we could drain them and do it ourselves, but then you have no fire protection if we drain the water off the hill. So I would say it's worth the money to pay them to dive and leave the tanks full.

LuAnn said I agree, we don't want to ever have our water contaminated and be completely out of water.

AJ said so.

LuAnn said we need to take care of it.

Rod said I agree.

Trisha said it's pretty unanimous.

Mayor O'Hare said So we're gonna go with bid one and bid two for a total of \$12,131.83. Is that correct?

LuAnn said Yep.

Mayor O'Hare said Do you need a motion?

AJ asked Do you we've a wait motion? Do you want a motion? Anything for additional, if there is a crack for so I can just tell him to fix it?

LuAnn said Yeah.

AJ said give me probably \$3,000 or \$4,000 if there is some make issues. You probably ought to vote on that. So I don't have to call everybody when they call me and say, Hey, there's a crack here. He wants to fix it.

LuAnn said Okay.

AJ said so.

Trisha said Well, I make a motion for the water \$4,000 if there are any cracks that need to be repaired.

LuAnn said I second that.

Mayor O'Hare said So we'll put it at, \$4,000 instead of saying three to four, we'll just we'll cap it at \$4,000.

And if it's cheaper soon.

AJ said I don't assume there's gonna be any issues. But just in case, so we have a motion from Trish for them to pay the \$12,131.83 with the additional \$4,000 cap on any fixes. Do I have a second?

LuAnn said second.

Mayor O'Hare said LuAnn Second? All in favor? Any opposed passed.

AJ said they will probably. She told me they were probably headed to Utah in the next couple of weeks, so it may be done before Town Council, the next town council.

Mayor O'Hare said Oh, that'd be great.

AJ said I told her I'd call her in the morning and give her a yes for sure to get us put on the list, because they're making a Utah trip. They're coming down and getting several people.

LuAnn asked how many days does it takes them?

AJ said, according to the bid, one, unless they find issues, possibly two.

Mayor O'Hare asked Are they going to take photos while they're in there? So we can see.

AJ said if you read the first part, they will all the divers have cameras, and I'm pretty sure I saw that drive, so I will ask Stacey that when I call her back.

Mayor O'Hare said Okay.

AJ said if we get it, make sure we get our hands on the photos.

Mayor O'Hare said Yeah, that'd be good to have.

Mayor O'Hare said Next one is the approval for the \$1,290 for the radios for the fire department to communicate with Oneida County.

Tammie said that it was what you talked about last month.

Mayor O'Hare said last month, yep.

Tammie said, but we didn't have it completely on the agenda.

Mayor O'Hare said Right, and then Jed's not here, of course, as you can see, but he did call me and asked if we were going to be able to get that paid. So any questions from we this? We talked about this last month.

Trisha said I think we all agreed. So I make a motion to go ahead and approve the \$1,290 for the radios for the Fire Department with the Oneida County.

Mayor O'Hare said I have a motion from Trish? Do I have a second? Heather said second.

Mayor O'Hare said, second from Heather, all in favor, any opposed? Okay. Passed.

Mayor O'Hare said the signs for the park are installed somewhat; if you saw the first I sent you all a picture of the one that's on the right here on Stone Road. So my question is, we have another sign that's actually in the ground? On just to the left of the sidewalk, an old sign that sits up. It's plastic, and it basically says the same thing as the new sign that we got. Do we want to remove that? Take that off?

LuAnn said I've never noticed that.

Kjerstin said we could replace it with a dog potty dispenser.

LuAnn said Oh, yeah.

Mayor O'Hare said Is that what we're doing? Is that what you guys want to do with it? Because we don't need both sides up there, the pole is that's not really a pole. It's all a one-piece plastic thing.

Tammie asked Is that the slide and stuff, isn't it?

Mayor O'Hare said It's that color, it's that material, yeah.

Kjerstin said I just see if it's something we could attach.

Mayor O'Hare said we could take it off and then put up.

Kjerstin said Yeah.

Mayor O'Hare said and put the bags, yeah, yep, that would work. And then the other the other ones I'm waiting on, these anchors, are called Red, Red Hook, or something like that, that will be able to go into the concrete.

LuAnn asked on the bell.

Mayor O'Hare said on the bell, on the sides of two that'll go on each side of the bell, and then, but you got to hammer the thing into it. But we got to get that anchor. That's the only, only thing that's that's going to hold it to where nobody can take it out. And the sign that we have on Stone Road facing the parking lot is riveted, so there's no chance of them unless they get in there, start prying, and

then the second sign, that big one, your sign, we'll put on the other side. Where do you think we should attach it to? Should we attach it to the building? Or should maybe put it on the pole or something.

LuAnn asked what would be the safest, do you think that somebody wouldn't destroy it on the building of the pole?

Heather said I think a building.

Mayor O'Hare said Yeah.

Kjerstin said I was thinking of building bigger than the pole. I would say probably the building.

Mayor O'Hare said Yeah, it's, pretty good size. You'll see it at the front. It's at the entrance to the park. It's right there on the right-hand side. Now it's on the fence. We can anchor it in just like we do the belt with both sides.

LuAnn said Okay.

Mayor O'Hare said Okay.

Mayor O'Hare said water dispute without saying names. We had the one water bill that's been accumulating, accumulating.

Trisha said I thought we agreed to pull them?

Mayor O'Hare said we agreed that we gave them. We gave them until the end of the month. We still didn't gotten in contact with them, and we finally sent one more email.

Stacey said, and I called the realtor.

Mayor O'Hare said the realtor got fired, so they're not no longer. But anyway, the person with the estate, we told him, listen you. She said, You need to call the Mayor, and continue to start to you now. And within 15 minutes, they called me. They will have it paid by the end of the month.

Trisha said Okay.

Mayor O'Hare said so.

LuAnn asked By the end of this month, now?

Mayor O'Hare said yes, they promised to have it paid by the end of this month.

Trish said if they don't this time, it will be done.

Mayor O'Hare said they're aware of that if it's not paid, it will go to the lawyer, and there'll be a lien put on the property.

Trish asked, and they're aware?

Mayor O'Hare said, and then they will pay not only that, but we'll also recoup all the all the fees for lawyers and administrative fees and everything else that we can legally put on it.

LuAnn asked we gonna believe them this time?

Mayor O'Hare said Well, I talked we actually talked to the guy this time. Actually talked to him on the phone, so there was no more emails going back and forth.

There are eight different people in eight different states.

LuAnn asked Are these family members?

Mayor O'Hare said yes, they are part of the estate. So they all have to make decisions together as the beneficiary.

Trisha asked How big is the bill?

Stacey said \$1,000.

Mayor O'Hare said \$1,000.

LuAnn said, Just because they didn't pay month over month over month.

Stacey said he would tell me all pay you next month. Oh, I'll pay you next month, and then all of a sudden I heard crickets, and then I'm like, wait a minute.

Mayor O'Hare said and he was informed that that after paying the \$1,043 in the end of the month that on the fifth of October, they will be getting another bill for \$67 and every month after that, until they sell the property, because they have to have water and that I did tell them that we turned off the water so there's no water running to the house, so they have no concerns When it gets winter time that

pipe breaks, and they're paying \$2,000 so they're aware of that. So any questions on that one?

Mayor O'Hare said the Sheriff's Department, everybody got the email with the update. Was there any questions or any concerns, or anything? LuAnn said Yeah, there was a lot of crap that happened out here.

Mayor O'Hare said Okay, Eric, so we'll go ahead and add this now, and then and if AJ wants to add anything to it, he can. So Eric sent the email. He was not going to be here today. Where did I put it? Oh, it's in my primary. There we go, we'll make time catch me tonight. Wanted to pass along the email we just received. It sounds like there's a good chance UDDW will fund the well site study, if I remember correctly. AJ had a few potential well site areas we should investigate. Anyway, they say that they pretty much are gonna fund it 100%. AJ said so they're just gonna fund a study, so they're gonna winch it, and then is that say, that they're gonna drill a test hole? Or just use their high-powered, expensive equipment. And guess what is under there?

Tammie said it's just says, well, finding a study.

Mayor O'Hare said Yeah, it says.

LuAnn asked if this is on a grant?

Tammie said Yeah.

Mayor O'Hare said it says this says, Hi, Marianne, I received your voicemail this afternoon inquiring about the status of the Snowville planning application. I have been reminding Michael to review the funding request packet, but he always has a lot on his plate. I will remind him again tomorrow when I meet with him. That being said, I don't have any concerns that Michael won't authorize this funding, which would be for 100% principal forgiveness or grant funding. After Michael's authorization authorizes the funding, you will receive an authorization letter and a principal forgiveness agreement. The letter is for the system to sign, notarize, and return to us after authorization. It usually takes a few weeks for the letter and agreement to be sent out, but as soon as Michael has the authorization and the funding, I will let you know via email. And that was sent on September, yeah, it was sent today, September 10.

Luann asked Are we going north?

AJ said, we'll, that's, I don't know what we're going because the best spots and Potters Hollow, and I'm not convinced that I want to put a well on my private property, because I don't want the red tape with it. LuAnn said, right? And so that's my question.

AJ said we will have to have a Source Protection Plan around it. LuAnn said everything's private.

AJ said so all the way up there, the next best source is right here at the Town Hall, over by that new Fire Station, is where they witted one of the best spots. So that would be after discussion with Eric, because I know on the town property over there, there wasn't much water. They found water, but not very much water.

LuAnn said Okay.

Mayor O'Hare said, but over here, they found quite a bit or.

AJ said Yeah, supposedly, when whatever his name is from, Rural water came out. I wasn't around. I think Scott went with the men, and now this was one of the locations that they said was fairly decent water and a fair amount of water.

Trisha asked how long ago?

AJ said it's been a year and a half ago?

Trisha said, and then when they drill the well, where does it where does the water recede elsewhere from?

AJ said I don't know.

LuAnn said so when we drilled that other well. Was there any indication that it was going to be?

AJ said no, so that was actually a good hole. They drilled it. They pumped it, good hole. We put the pumps down the hole, tied the whole system in, and in the meantime, for whatever reason, we got manganese and iron and which makes the smell, the stinky smell, is the only reason that the well is not used. It's not because the water is not there. It's because it's stinky water. That's why we talked about for the last three years, or whatever, trying to figure out if we can treat that water well.

LuAnn said Isn't that where Stinky Dumps is right up there by it?

AJ said Yeah, but that's not why.

LuAnn asked Does that have anything to do with it?

AJ said so because by the time it was drilled and everything got done, it was probably Tim. Could probably correct me, I bet it was at least a year, a year and a half before we ever pumped that hole.

LuAnn said This stinks right out of the gate.

AJ said Yeah, it's done. We turned it on, not even thinking about it, and by that night, we were complaining.

LuAnn said Yeah, it was bad,

AJ said, and it was turned off, and it's never been put in the system again.

LuAnn asked if there is any way to check? Is there anybody we to know about before we put all the money into drilling?

AJ said there's no way it is an endless money pit; it's anybody's guess. And you get billed whether you find water or not, and you get billed to case it, whether you find water or not, you can dump a lot of money down a hole and find no water or not, or find good water.

LuAnn said crap shoot.

LuAnn said That's kind of scary.

AJ said just rough ball figures, I bet just I mean, the State's gonna charge you eight times what it's worth, but in the irrigation world, will you be \$300,000 to drill a hole if, if it wasn't for drinking water? But I bet we're a million dollars to drill a hole by the time you get engineering fees and everything in it.

LuAnn said But we're gonna, we're gonna do this on a grant.

AJ said it will have to be a grant; the town doesn't have the money to do it.

Mayor O'Hare said Yeah.

AJ said so, that's why it's never been done.

LuAnn said, but we need to have an alternate well, so we don't really have any places.

AJ said the thing about the town, the town has lots of water rights. There's no way to pump them. So that's a discussion with Eric, but I'm not sure Potter's Hollow is really a viable option, because I don't want to deal with it.

Mayor O'Hare said Okay.

AJ said were it's on my property.

LuAnn said Then just don't move somewhere else, you're not obligated one to one fit.

AJ said because there's a lot of red tape, it comes with it. Source Protection Plan, you'll pretty much eliminate what I can do with that piece of property.

LuAnn said Yeah, it's not worth it.

Tammie said Yeah.

AJ said so, this may be our best option, right here, behind by the fire station, at least, to have them do a study and see if it's where we're drilling there.

LuAnn asked, and then would it, if we did drill the Well there, would it inhibit with what the fire trucks can do in and out or behind, or behind it?

AJ said Yeah, and it would just be a hole. You could put everything else somewhere else.

Luann said Okay.

AJ said it would be a submersible. I'm sure it won't be above ground, so it would really be nothing in the way. You can put the electrical box or whatever, wherever you want. And the main line is not very far away to tie into it. It's actually an ideal place to do it, if they can find enough water there, and they think it's a good enough water.

But, also, remember that hole out there, we did another hole next to it, so probably what, 10 years after that hole was drilled, we had them come in and redrill again. We thought about going shallower to see if we could find less water, but better water, shallower. And they got another 150,000 up there drilling a hole, and they found water, but not very much water. So it says just a crap shoot.

LuAnn said the Well up to the Cemetery is really good water, there's a lot of water. There's a lot of pressure, a lot of water.

AJ said, and I don't know if that's ever been talked about, whether or not, if we could go, I don't know what it's cased to. I don't think the casing is big enough to get much of much volume, other than the two-inch line we got coming out of it.

LuAnn said, because there's so much pressure up there that it just, you happen to know, it breaks the sprinklers, there's a lot of pressure.

AJ said I just don't think it's, I mean, that's a good idea, and maybe that's still an option. Maybe we can go to the Cemetery and drill up on the hill, the main lines up there, and drill another hole up there. I mean, that's a possibility, so they might have, but part of that study that says find, and that's what that study is for, is to find a location and figure out if there's water there, so.

Mayor O'Hare asked if they could check both places?

AJ said that they can probably check wherever they want.

Mayor O'Hare said, wherever we ask them to.

LuAnn said I think we should have them check up there, because there's a lot of water up there, and it's really, really hard pressure, a lot of water that comes out of there. Like I said.

Tim Heyder said there is a problem.

AJ said I don't know. I don't know anything about that water.

Tim Heyder said twice in August, September, we couldn't pump water.

Stacey said it was dry.

LuAnn said What was the reason?

Tim Heyder said, and we've had them look at that. Excuse me for interrupting.

Mayor O'Hare said No, you're fine.

Tim Heyder said we've had them look at that. And there is a problem with that. I'm not sure what it is.

Carson said it is the casting.

Time Heyder said I think we'd have to go 65 feet. I know we dropped that well from what it was the last time we, I know we, when I was a mayor, we put two pumps down it, and we deepened them once,

And we ran out of water once, and we thought about doing it, especially when we run the eight-inch line up to past Keith's, and

We talked about running the town water up to the Cemetery.

It would only cost us about \$20,000 to take the town water out there and get rid of that Well and put it back. But there was a problem with doing that, and I cannot actually remember.

Mike Morgan said we kept going through pumps.

Time Heyder said I know we kept going through pumps.

AJ said, but it's an option. If Carson just said it's a 12-inch casing, and so if it is a 12-inch casing, there's probably some options there, because you can drop the rig down that hole, and we can go deeper, if we don't think it's deep enough, so.

Mayor O'Hare said I say we just we check it.

AJ said, yeah, that this point this is part of that study is maybe we let them know, and that's a site that they check into when we get to that point.

Mayor O'Hare said So any other questions?

LuAnn said no.

Mayor O'Hare said Okay, thank you. AJ, Fire department, Jed's gone. Won't be here tonight. He did call me, and it's on here for the He's, uh, wanting to know if the town about doing credentials for the fire department, for each for the members, because there's places they can go to get uniforms and stuff and buy boots and stuff, and they can get discounts, and they can just show that they belong to a affiliated

I told him. I said, I don't see a fire asked him. I asked him if he wanted the town to pay for it, or if the fire department's gonna pay for it. He says they got it in the budget to pay for it themselves. He just wanted to know if the town council had any if they wanted to say what kind of badges they get, or whatever.

LuAnn said he can decide on that.

Mayor O'Hare said that's what I told them. So, okay, yeah, I told him. I said I think you would know more better than what you need, as far as credentials, than what we would you know.

Mayor O'Hare said EMS, Mr.Dave.

Dave said I really have anything else other than I guess we could just put it on next month, but we'll have the conference that we normally go to coming up in December, so if you just put that on to vote for next month, or us attending that, but yeah, I don't have anything else.

Mayor O'Hare said Okay.

LuAnn asked, Where is it this year? It's still in Salt Lake?

Dave said it has had been in Provo. They moved it back to Salt Lake now. So it had been in Provo for the past four years.

LuAnn asked So did Officer Sorenson do any training with you guys?

Dave said Yeah, he did the class that Garrett and Carson have been to that class, so, yeah.

LuAnn said huge lots.

Dave said Yeah, and we'd interact with him too as the medical examiner on certain calls.

Mayor O'Hare said Thank you. Dave

Mayor O'Hare said Tammie.

Tammie said I have is this bid. The bids came in for the bridge.

Mayor O'Hare said Oh, yeah.

Tammie said so there were six different people that bid on it. I handed all that out.  
LuAnn said, and we need to vote on that today.

Tammie said we should vote on it today, but we can't, because we got this information last night and it wasn't on the agenda.

LuAnn said Oh, my Hell.

Tammie said so we're gonna have to have either if you want.

Mayor O'Hare said we need to have a special meeting next week and just meet that.

Tammie said you're gonna meet to discuss the bids.

Mayor O'Hare asked what's a good time for everybody for next week? Just to meet for 10 minutes here. We'll have to post it as a as meeting comes in, vote on this. Whatever you guys want to do.

LuAnn said Wednesday works for me.

Mayor O'Hare said you want to do Wednesday?

Rod said Yeah, same time.

Mayor O'Hare asked Do you 630?

Rod asked Is that good? Are you up late?

Trisha said Yeah.

LuAnn asked Trisha Are you working that day?

Trisha said I am working that day.

LuAnn said Is it the 16th? At 7:15?

LuAnn said I made my pajamas. Fine.

Mayor O'Hare said 7:15. Oh, my goodness.

LuAnn said I'm coming in my pajamas.

Rod said that's fine.

Mayor O'Hare said Wednesday, so Tammie, you could, I mean, can you post on Monday?

Staceys said Yeah.

Mayor O'Hare said Okay.

LuAnn said Okay, Wednesday, 7:15.

Mayor O'Hare said So you guys look at this and and we'll vote on this on Wednesday night.

Tammie said Then will you let me know, and I will email them.

Mayor O'Hare said we'll let him know at 7:30. We don't have to have a public hearing for it. It's just a it's just a vote meeting, right?

Tammie said Yeah.

Mayor O'Hare asked anything else from you?

Tammie said no.

Mayor O'Hare said Stacey.

Stacey said just everybody you remember about the Water Meeting on the 18th, so I guess everybody's supposed to be here, and I am totally sorry. I was gonna put it in the water bills, and I just totally blew that right off.

LuAnn said Water meeting on the 18th.

Stacey said at six o'clock it's here. It's for the Water Master meeting.

Trisha asked all the needs to the council here for that?

Stacey said I mean, everybody's invited. So whoever, I mean, everybody that has water shares. That's what AJ said in the minutes, that everybody should have water shares should.

AJ said it doesn't matter whether you're whatever; if you own water rights, you ought to come, if it's a master plan for water to save Utah. Mayor O'Hare said But if you don't have water rights, then it's really not going to pertain to you at all.

AJ said you can come, voice your opinion, or what you think they should or shouldn't do. But,

Mayor O'Hare said Okay, tell somebody that's water right decisions. LuAnn asked What day is that?

Stacey said I think that's Thursday.

Mayor O'Hare said It is.

LuAnn said we have a track meet in Idaho, and we'll try and do that.

Mayor O'Hare said That's at 6 pm?

Stacey said, and then I called Beehive and you guys all about the thing to add the new line. So they said they cannot give us the same number as the number here.

Mayor O'Hare said So we get a new number there.

Stacey asked So you're okay with that? If we get a new number on the website.

LuAnn said Yeah, just post a new number on the website.

Mayor O'Hare said And then when we get the new number.

Stacey said I haven't gotten it yet.

Mayor O'Hare said when we get the new number, we'll just put it in the water bill. So let everybody know.

Stacey said Yeah, so I thought it was a great price. I like looking at it too. So, and when it just it talks about, like, you can have that tech come and install it. I don't know why. I have to ask for more about that. Mayor O'Hare said Yeah, could you, because I was reading that they're gonna charge us \$40 for us to install it.

Stacey said that's what I thought, too. I was like, Hey, wait a minute.

Mayor O'Hare said if I'm installing it, I don't think you're not gonna charge it. I'm gonna charge you.

LuAnn said Yeah, they're gonna pay us.

Mayor O'Hare said Yeah.

Trisha said Yeah, it's probably short action.

Stacey said But anyway, it's more money. It's less money than Frontier, because right now, just for one line for Frontier was \$136

Mayor O'Hare said Yeah.

Stacey said I about died when I saw it.

LuAnn asked just the first phone?

Stacey said it was still there. I canceled everything.

Mayor O'Hare said Okay, so we're going to do that, correct.

Stacey asked to cancel Frontier.

Mayor O'Hare asked Yeah, well, you guys okay with that? Yeah, let's cancel Frontier and then get Beehive and get a new phone number and pay for the new phone number.

Stacey said So we'll tell everybody that we have a new phone number, Mayor O'Hare said Yeah.

Stacey said in the water bills for sure.

Mayor O'Hare said Yeah, and you can post it here, Anything else for us? Stacey.

Stacey said no.

Mayor O'Hare said Okay, thank you. AJ, I guess whatever's written on here.

Mayor O'Hare said Brett Reeder's.

AJ said we put Brett Reeder's water meter in. We only ran into a few issues.

Tammie said we didn't have water for a minute.

Mayor O'Hare asked was that the water pressure went down. The other night?

AJ said the water pressure went down. You probably didn't have any water.

Mayor O'Hare said Well, I just was there when it was down.

AJ said the water was off. So that valve that goes up there must obviously not work, because we shut that valve off and the water didn't stop running when we get it. So we ended up having to shut most of the town off to get so at some point I'll talk to Eric. We may have to dig that and get a new valve put in.

LuAnn asked what we paid Cody Carter?

AJ said yes, Cody came and did.

LuAnn said Okay.

AJ said it was supposed to be a simple fix because, well, we don't go into details. But anyway, right ended up hitting the line. So that's that was Cody's backhoe time.

LuAnn said Okay.

AJ said, and the water I talked to you a little bit about. Everybody says there's some fluctuation in the water. I did raise the tank level, so the pumps turned on at 14 and a half feet instead of 13 and a half feet. I don't know if anybody's seen any difference.

LuAnn said mine's always been good, but it was better at my mom's. AJ said Roger hasn't said anything to me, so I'm assuming Roger must be a little better.

LuAnn said Mine's good.

AJ said Did he say anything to you? Tim?

Tim Heyder said no.

AJ said Okay, so I'll leave it at 14 half-feet for now.

LuAnns said mom's was better.

AJ said Okay, and then Fast Stop put a new water line in because they had a leak. They had a big leak, and so it looks like they got it all tied in. He called and talked to me about it, and I told him to do whatever he needed to do to get his as long as he stayed away from the meter was on private property, so it looks like they got it fixed, so at least it's tied in. So soon they fixed our problem.

LuAnn asked so and then they just abandoned the other line?

AJ said I'm assuming. So, yeah, they ran right over their fuel tanks. I asked Rod witch it for them to see, and Rod said the leak was right where their fuel tanks were.

LuAnn said Oh.

AJ said so, I suggested they dig around it, and that's what they did. So I think it's fixed.

Mayor O'Hare asked did they didn't tie into the water meter, did they? AJ said See the back of the water meter has a four-foot stub line? Mayor O'Hare said Okay.

AJ said they would have tied on to that. If they tied onto that show, he would have stayed away from the meter.

Mayor O'Hare said, right?

AJ said So they just would have just tied onto the stuff off the back of the meter. There are quite a few. You'll probably Stacey, get some bills from Ken Ford.

There are like eight water tests that need to be done before the end of the year. So they're sending me the stuff, and I'll get that sent in. Stacey said Okay.

AJ said Other than that, we're good. Unless you guys have any questions for me.  
LuAnn said no.

Mayor O'Hare said I have one question. So the resident is not going to name names, but across from the church, the well is across from the ball field. The ditch is eroding away, and it's not on their property. It's on town property. So who do we talk to about fixing that ditch? Because it's starting to.

LuAnn asked Is it on the east canal side?

AJ said I'm sure it's on the canal right away. So as long as it's on the canal right away, and it doesn't get to your town right away, they're probably not going to do anything with it.

Mayor O'Hare said Okay.

AJ said because the town that the water company will have a right of way through there.

Mayor O'Hare said I'll show you my opinion. I'll show you the video.

AJ said Yes.

Mayor O'Hare said after the meeting.

AJ said they have so many feet from the center of that ditch, and unless that's roaded onto town property, I'm assuming the water company is not going to do anything with it.

LuAnn asked, so that would be the town's responsibility?

AJ said Well, or nobody's responsibility. Just leave it alone until it gets into town. But that would be something you'd have to talk to the Curlew Irrigation Company about.

Mike Morgan said Rod Neal.

Matt, no, Josh Wilcock

LuAnn said no, he quit.

Mike Morgan said Roy quit.

LuAnn said Dave Showell. He's one that sends the bills, the damn bills for the attorneys.

Matt said I think that's my answer.

AJ said Unless, Matt, you know something different me, but that's what I would say, right?

Matt said That sounds right.

LuAnn said Yeah, oh yeah, because you're on the other side, aren't you?

Mayor O'Hare said Okay.

AJ said you're the guy, watermaster.

Mayor O'Hare said Carson, truck or treat.

Carson said Yep, we're good.

LuAnn said We're good.

Rod asked Okay, what do you need for help with?

LuAnn asked How can I help you?

Carson said Okay.

Trisha asked So, do you need?

LuAnn said Just plan on me.

Mayor O'Hare asked When is it? What is being there?

Carson said I really just talked to Maddie. She wants to live on Halloween itself.

Tammie said I think that's a good idea.

Stacey said Yes.

Carson said she says the kids don't need to be double-dipping.

Mayor O'Hare said What time? What time?

Carson asked Mom, What time do you want to do it?

Tammie said I don't know, six is a good time, 6:30.

LuAnn asked, so then we're not going to have kids come to our houses?

Rod said they will probably keep going around.

Mayor O'Hare asked Did we say what time?

Tammie said Let me say what time they do have something that just says they participated if you don't want to come to your house?

LuAnn said no, that's fine, except for what time? because then they're not going to come like late at night, because most of them are done by the time it gets dark.

Mayor O'Hare said Yeah.

Carson said I would assume most of the parents want to hang out here for a little bit.

Luann asked, So they don't want to take, so what time do you want to start? I think we should have it earlier, rather than later.

Carson asked what time do people start trick-or-treating?

LuAnn said they start trick-or-treating around maybe 5:30.

Mayor O'Hare said we ask the people that want to give candy to the kids. Instead of the kids going to their house, we just do it here. And we can just line up the cars, you know, each house brings their car and opens a drunk and has candy in the back.

Carson said I mean, they're younger people that go around like the older people that can't come, you know, Wilma Neal people like that, they can't come. They're still gonna want visitors, so.

Tammie said Yeah.

Trisha asked, So is it six or 6:30?

Tammie said we could do six.

Mayor O'Hare said Okay, six.

Tammie said I think Maddie said she was gonna, because there was so many people came last time.

Carson said I talked to Jed. yeah.

Tammie said, and there was so many cars. They were everywhere. LuAnn said they came from everywhere, and I don't ever get that many trick-or-treaters.

Carson said I'm gonna talk to Jed, but I think we'll just do it here. Mayor O'Hare said Okay.

Carson said so we will close most of this road down and make it so it's a lot bigger again.

Mayor O'Hare said Okay, good.

Mayor O'Hare asked Rod. Do you got anything for us?

Rod said I'm good this month.

Mayor O'Hare asked LuAnn?

LuAnn said I didn't bring this up to put on the agenda, but I do have one concern about the people that are still living on the property, in the trailer that we talked about last summer, up on this end. They're still living there.

Mayor O'Hare asked right here?

LuAnn said Yeah.

Mayor O'Hare said from OSI.

LuAnn said Yep.

Mayor O'Hare said I will go talk to them, because they were told last year.

LuAnn said they're there.

Mayor O'Hare said Okay.

LuAnn said that's all I have.

Mayor O'Hare asked if Heather had anything?

Heather said no.

Mayor O'Hare asked if Trisha had anything?

Trisha said no.

Mayor O'Hare said Okay, so our, maybe somebody can answer this question, because I'm looking at this, our town, our town border, the town is at the on ramps and off ramps of 84, is that correct?

Someone said yes. But I don't know who it was.

Mayor O'Hare said Okay.

Stacey said they fixed it.

Mayor O'Hare said They did.

Stacey said Oh yeah, they did.

Mayor O'Hare said Oh they did.

Stacey said yes, they did.

Mayor O'Hare said Oh, okay, we don't have to worry about it. Then, okay.

LuAnn asked what was broken?

Mayor O'Hare said nothing was broken, we'll talk about it at after the meeting when we're off the record. Very good. I didn't, I didn't know.

Stacey said it is fixed.

Mayor O'Hare said Thank you for that. Yes, appreciate it.

Mayor O'Hare said Public comment. Open the floor for anybody that has any comments or wants to address. Tim Heyder.

Tim Heyder said you can address me when I'm done, then you can ask me questions.

Mayor O'Hare said Okay?

Tim Heyder said on August 27th, the town of Snowville, in a short time, received somewhere between two and a half and four inches of rain, which put us in a flood state. The East Mountains received over four inches of rain. Common Sense told me we were in for a flash flood. So I headed up town. Found water running everywhere. Mollie's Cafe was getting flooded. Had water running in it. So I called, and I met up with some other people. Was were worried about it, so we called Cody Carter, who called the owners, told them that they had water running in that we had several drains here in the middle of town that were plugged from the flood. We had other places in town that were flooding. The citizens that here were with me we diverted the water and cleaned the drains the best we could. My question was, Mayor, where were you?

Mayor O'Hare asked What time was this at it?

Tim Heyder said it was about 6:37 o'clock at night.

LuAnn asked What? What drains are you talking about? Tim?

Tim Heyder said on the 27th of August.

Mayor O'Hare said Yeah, 27th of August, which was on.

Tim Heyder said a Wednesday night.

LuAnn asked What drains are. Did you say we're clogged?

Mayor O'Hare said Wednesday night.

Tim Heyder said all the way down the street, up the street, the canal. I got a picture here if you want to see it. I have another question for you, Mayor.

Mayor O'Hare said Can I, can I answer the first question?

Tim Heyder said Wait till I'm done, and you can?

Mayor O'Hare said Well, you asked me a question.

Tim Heyder said so, yeah.

Mayor O'Hare said where was I was in bed, sleeping. Okay, there you go, next question.

Tim Heyder said Okay.

Heather said as he works.

Tim Heyder said When you get time, I would like you to drive slow

And look at the entrance of your town. Since you're the Mayor, look at the junk, the weeds, etc. Then, when you come to this corner, I'd like you to go east, look at the corner, and travel north. Look at the junk that's parked on both sides of the road. Just as you go east, sometimes you can't even get past it. Go clear to the 30s. Turn down that road. You're starting to get junk piled down there, if you would. I would just like you to look at that.

Heather said maybe you should clean it up because you have time.

Tim Heyder said this is more, just more food for thought.

Mayor O'Hare said Yeah, I drive the town all the time. I see what you're saying.

Tim Heyder said You see what I am saying.

Mayor O'Hare said cars are parked on the side of the road, just like you, to drive around town. Your town in the last couple three years

It's starting to look like a dump town.

Mayor O'Hare said Okay.

Tim Heyder said Now you got any more questions you'd like to ask me?

Mayor O'Hare said I don't have any questions for you.

LuAnn said Why do you have to be so nasty?

Heather said You are such an ass.

Tim Heyder said I am not being nasty.

Heather said some people work. Some people are there 24,7.

He works 12 hours a day. He runs his town all day long, you know, excuse you.

Sorry, I don't care.

Tim Heyder said But what I'm saying.

Heather said we don't care. This town is beautiful and all we will be.

Tim Heyder said if you're going to be an elected official, and the Mayor.

Heather said, and he does a nice job and works hard. I thought you didn't want to be Mayor anymore. I thought you quit for a reason, Tim. Tim Heyder said that's what I'm saying.

Heather said Why'd you quit if you want to come in here and nag everybody?

Tim Heyder said I am not nagging at everybody.

Heather said Yes, you do.

Tim Heyder said No, I am not.

Heather said Yes, you do. That's all you do. All you do is talk behind people's backs. Cause problems. Nag: Yes, you do.

Tim Heyder said I am not causing problems.

Heather said Do you have anything good to say? Tim, do you have anything good to say?

Trisha said Let's take a breath.

Heather said Do you?

Trisha said Let's take a breath.

Heather said Do you? Do you ever? No, thank you, goodbye.

Mayor O'Hare said So just, just for your just for your reference, I drive the town every week. Okay? I've talked to the people about their cars parked on the side of the road. Okay?

Tim Heyder said Oh, yes, you can.

Mayor O'Hare said I can't force them to do anything. Oh, no, I can't. Tim, how am I going to force them?

Tim Heyder said You got an ordinance you can press.

Mayor O'Hare said, right? And they're not. They're not prosecutable, so I can't prosecute them.

Tim Heyder asked How come they're not prosecutable?

Mayor O'Hare said Because they're not, they're not a Class B misdemeanor.

Tim Heyder said yes, they are.

Mayor O'Hare said No, they're not.

Tim Heyder said You got a court system and a lawyer.

Mayor O'Hare said we have a court system, but no judge because he got busted, so.

Tim Heyder said You know, you can change that.

Heather said Just leave it, who cares.

Mayor O'Hare said Well, we can change it. You're right. We can change it. Then come to a town council meeting and ask us to change it.

Heather said If you're so happy, go pick up trash.

Mayor O'Hare said Okay.

Heather said nothing else better.

Mayor O'Hare said Then come and ask us to change it. Maybe your buddy, maybe your buddy, will win the election, and then he can do whatever you want to do. Okay?

I drive it every week. Tim, I drive up and down every week.

They got two cars that I know what you're talking about over there on 300, they got two cars there. That's not a bunch of junk. They're allowed to have two cars.

Tim Heyder said Are you gonna wait till they're six?

Heather said My gosh.

Mayor O'Hare said Well, why am I gonna but listen, Tim, this town does not have an HOA, okay. People live in this town for a reason, not to have people up their butts about stuff.

Tim Heyder said I am not here to argue with you.

Mayor O'Hare said Well, you are here? I did. Go look. I see it. I see it all the time.

Tim Heyder said to Stacey, I need a copy of the minutes.

Heather said you don't like it. Go live somewhere. There's an HOA. Mayor

O'Hare said You can get a copy of the minutes on the website. Go to the website.

Heather said There's an HOA, because we don't have one.

Mayor O'Hare said What are you gonna do with the copy of the minutes? I mean, seriously.

Tim Heyder said to see if I got my three minutes.

Mayor O'Hare said I'm giving you more than three minutes, Tim. But I mean, yes, sir.

Mike Morgan said I agree with Tim to a certain point. I think the town has gone downhill. The weeds in that on the roadsides look terrible. We're not getting the mowed. We're not cleaned up, especially along Flying J here, along the motel. I don't know what the answer is, whether we need to have a committee go in and do it, or hire somebody to do it.

Mayor O'Hare said I thought we have somebody that that mows the roads. Do we not have somebody who mows the roads?

Mike Morgan said It doesn't, it doesn't look good. The town looks terrible.

LuAnn said I've tried to get the county out here to do the county roads. They just so.

Mayor O'Hare said What do you guys suggest we do?

LuAnn said I've called them.

Mike Morgan said I don't know. Like I said, whether we hire somebody or we get a committee together and get the town people on a Saturday or something and go out and try and do something,

get a little pride in the town. I don't know what the answer is.

Mayor O'Hare said Tim, how? Hold on. Hold on. Tim, how long? How long have you noticed this that the town looks like shit, as you said, well, not that you said, like that, it's gone downhill. You said the last three years, right? You said the last three years. Am I correct?

Tim Heyder said yes, the last three years.

Mayor O'Hare asked Why is that now? We're hearing about it just right now. You haven't said anything in three years.

Heather said he is always causing problems.

Mayor O'Hare said No, no, no, no, no, no. I want to know why.

Trisha said Let's be productive.

Mayor O'Hare said Because I know why it is. I know why it is.

Tim Heyder said Why.

Mayor O'Hare said Because there's an election coming up, I know exactly what it is. Tim, I'm not stupid. You're not blowing smoke up my butt. Okay, if you were that concerned about this town for the last three years, you should have come and said something earlier, instead of coming two months before an election to say something.

Heather said Amen.

Mike Morgan said It doesn't matter.

Mayor O'Hare said It does matter.

Heather said It does it does matter.

LuAnn said we used to have a community cleanup.

Trisha said Yeah.

Kjesrtin said I might be responsible for the weeds. So I actually spent three hours the last two weeks doing these weeds, weeding in front of the Ranch House.

Tim Heyder said it looks nice.

LuAnn said the weeds up and down the road, but I don't know if it's my job.

Kjerstin said Is it my job? I don't know.

Mayor O'Hare said your job is to park jobs, to park in here.

Kjerstin said it the park.

Heather said maybe for people that want an HOA your way.

Kjerstin said I don't know if it is somebody's job, but I didn't hear like. Trisha said we need to be productive, not argumentative, and all this personal stuff, set it

aside. You, you, you set it aside. If we're going to come in here and have him said his peace doesn't have to be an argument; we can come back next week. We can have a productive discussion on what can be done about it, not this other. Bs, my personal opinion. Now we've heard what you've had to say. We thank you for your suggestions. Let's end this meeting and go home, and next week, come with some suggestions to do what we need to do to fix the town up. None of us wants to live here. I addressed this lot the last meeting. I asked Scott about what we can do about the weeds over here behind Shanna's. Now I'm making a motion to adjourn this meeting.

Mayor O'Hare said Nope, it is adjourned. Well,

LuAnn said we have to accept the expenses.

Mayor O'Hare said no.
