2	R277-731. Catalyst Center Grant Program Policy.
3	R277-731-1. Authority, Purpose, and Oversight Category.
4	(1) This rule is authorized by:
5	(a) Utah Constitution Article X, Section 3, which vests general control and
6	supervision over public education in the Board;
7	(b) Subsection 53E-3-401(4), which allows the Board to make rules to execute
8	the Board's duties and responsibilities under the Utah constitution and state law;
9	(c) Section 53E-3-507.1, which establishes the Catalyst Center Grant Program;
10	<u>and</u>
11	(d) Section 53F-9-204, which describes legislative appropriation for the program
12	(2) The purpose of this rule is to establish standards and procedures for Local
13	Education Agencies (LEAs) to qualify for and administer funds from the Catalyst Center
14	Grant Program to create new or expand existing catalyst centers to enhance career
15	readiness and align students' skills with Utah's workforce needs.
16	(3) This Rule R277- 731 is categorized as Category 3 as described in Rule
17	<u>R277-111.</u>
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19	R277- 731-2. Definitions.
20	(1) "Advisory board" means a group of individuals composed of industry,
21	postsecondary, and community representatives that review program direction and
22	ensure alignment with workforce needs.
23	(2) "Consortium" means two or more LEAs located within the same CTE
24	geographic planning region.
25	(3) "First Credential" means the statewide initiative established under Utah Code
26	Section 53E-10-310 for the purpose of creating and supporting clear educational
27	pathways from high school to higher education and the workforce, ensuring students
28	can earn a valuable, employment-aligned credential.

29	[(2)] (4) "Profession based learning center" means a Catalyst Model Center as
30	defined in Utah Code Section 53E-3-507.1.
31	[ (3) "Consortium" means two or more LEAs located within the same CTE
32	geographic planning region.]
33	[(3)] (5) "Program" means the Catalyst Center Grant Program defined in Utah
34	Code Section 53E-3-507.1.
35	[(4)] (6) "Unwarranted duplication" means the overlap of resources that lead to
36	inefficiencies, wasted resources, or a lack of coordination in providing comprehensive
37	CTE programs.
38	
39	R277-731-3 LEA Grant Requirements.
40	(1) An LEA or LEA consortium may annually apply for grant funding beginning
41	with the 2025-2026 school year.
42	(2) An LEA or LEA consortium may not apply for an additional grant that would
43	overlap with an existing award.
44	(3) An LEA shall apply for a grant by submitting an application to the state board
45	that includes:
46	(a) a general plan, including a proposed timeline for the project;
47	(b) a detailed budget, identifying proposed expenditures and any matching funds
48	used for the project;
49	(c) justification for any capital expenditures, including plans for building use, cos
50	analyses, and estimates;
51	(d) a description of how the grant will be used to improve student outcomes;
52	(e) evidence of any existing partnerships with industry, including letters of
53	collaboration;
54	(f) evidence of alignment with the LEA's strategic plan;
55	(g) evidence of alignment with local labor market and industry needs;
56	(h) an explanation of how awarded funds will be used within the defined
57	performance period without unnecessary carryforward;

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58	(i) If requesting a portion of the grant as a lump sum payment, the LEA shall
59	work with the Superintendent to establish a payment timeline requiring milestones and
60	documentation;
61	(j) as applicable, a description of how the catalyst center programming will align
62	with or enhance programs funded by the weighted pupil unit add-on described in
63	Section 53F-2-311;
64	(k) for applications submitted by a consortium of LEAs, a description of:
65	(i) which LEA will be the fiscal agent;
66	(ii) how the catalyst center will serve students across the consortium;
67	(iii) how costs and resources will be shared; and
68	(iv) how economies of scale will be achieved;
69	(I) a description of any proposed planning activities, including expected timelines
70	and outcomes; and
71	(m) evidence of collaboration with the LEA CTE Director.
72	(4) Grant funding shall not be used for the unwarranted duplication of existing
73	resources, including physical assets and programmatic offerings, provided by other
74	state or local entities.
75	(5) To maximize resources and impact, LEAs may apply for funding as a
76	consortium.
77	
78	R277-731-4 Superintendent Responsibilities and Award prioritization
79	(1) Beginning with the 2026-2027 fiscal year, dependent on available funds, the
80	Superintendent shall make the application available beginning May 15.
81	(2) Prioritization for grant funding will be given to an LEA that:
82	(a) proposes innovative programming supported by local labor market data;
83	(b) collaborates with local postsecondary institutions and industry;
84	(c) aligns with the First Credential program;
85	(d) demonstrates the ability to sustain the catalyst center after the grant period;
86	(e) demonstrates a strong focus on student outcomes and workforce alignment;

87	(f) addresses gaps in high-demand, high-skill career pathways;
88	(g) ensures funds are used to enhance programming quality before expansion;
89	<u>and</u>
90	(h) provides for a large number of students to participate in catalyst center
91	programs without limiting participation to students based on socio-economic challenges
92	(3) Grant funds may be distributed through smaller planning grants to bring
93	existing career and technical education (CTE) programs to CTE Quality Standards and
94	larger multi-year grants for capital expenditures and program expansion.
95	(4) The Superintendent may use up to one percent of the funds appropriated by
96	the Legislature to administer the program.
97	
98	R277-731-5 Program Requirements.
99	(1) An LEA receiving a grant shall utilize funds to create, establish, enhance, or
100	expand profession-based learning programs that:
101	(a) provide learning experiences and instruction that:
102	<ul><li>(i) replicates professional environments and workplace practices;</li></ul>
103	(ii) utilizes student projects that address the specific needs or objectives of
104	industry partners;
105	(iii) incorporates industry-standard tools, technologies, and methods;
106	(iv) builds durable professional skills;
107	(v) provides opportunities for students to develop a product or presentation that
108	is shared with an audience; and
109	(vi) facilitates mentorship by industry professionals to guide and evaluate the
110	student's work;
111	(b) align programming with labor market needs and local industry demands;
112	(c) establish or enhance partnerships with:
113	(i) local industries and employers to ensure workforce relevance; or
114	(ii) technical colleges, degree-granting institutions, or other postsecondary
115	entities to support postsecondary transitions for students;

116	(d) address gaps in regional workforce training or opportunities;
117	(e) incorporate:
118	(i) career and technical student organizations as the LEA determines relevant;
119	(ii) advisory boards with representation from local industries and workforce
120	experts;
121	(iii) professional learning opportunities for instructors to improve workforce-
122	focused skills; and
123	(iv) strategies for using labor market data to refine and improve program
124	offerings;
125	(f) establishes formal collaboration mechanisms between the catalyst center
126	administrator and the LEAs career and technical education director to align catalyst
127	center initiatives with existing career and technical education programs; and
128	(g) align with CTE Quality Standards.
129	(2) LEAs or LEA consortiums shall use any equipment or capital purchased with
130	awarded funds for the purposes outlined in the application.
131	(3) Catalyst centers may be collocated on the campus of an institution of higher
132	education with an agreement between the LEA and the institution of higher education.
133	
134	R277-731-6 Oversight, Monitoring, and Reports.
135	(1) An LEA that receives a grant shall submit an annual report to the state board
136	no later than September 15.
137	(2) The annual report shall include:
138	(a) the use of grant funds;
139	(b) progress in meeting proposed goals and benchmarks;
140	(c) updates on partnerships with industry and postsecondary institutions;
141	(d) a demonstration of the alignment of programming with labor market data; and
142	(e) a description of student participation and outcomes, including
143	(i) secondary and postsecondary credentials earned; and
144	(ii) CTE pathway completers.

145	(3) An LEA receiving funds will be monitored to ensure that awarded funds are
146	used in accordance with an LEA's application.
147	(4) If requesting a portion of the grant as an initial lump sum payment, the LEA
148	must provide evidence of achieved benchmarks before receiving the remainder of the
149	awarded funds on a reimbursement basis.
150	(5) Annually, funds that are not used within the defined performance period will
151	be recaptured for reallocation.
152	(6) An LEA that does not comply with the requirements of this Rule R277-731,
153	including not providing evidence of adherence to program standards or misuse of funds
154	may be subject to a corrective action plan and potential reduction of funds or penalty in
155	accordance with Rule R277-114.
