COMMUNICATIONS AND REQUESTS

Presentation and Discussion on a Proposed Interlocal Agreement Regarding the Transfer of the Fillmore Class IVb Landfill from Millard County to Fillmore City

The council has reviewed the interlocal agreement. One thing to be finalized before the agreement could be executed is that the closure and post-closure estimated amounts be disclosed to the council. Sunrise Engineering has been retained to complete that task. The amounts are slightly higher than was expected (approximately \$40,000) due to an increase in administrative costs. The estimated closure cost is \$41,492 and the estimated post-closure cost is \$116,657. The county will transfer those funds to the city following the execution of the agreement. If the city were to do a close and post-closure on their own (without hiring a third-party contractor), these estimated costs would be significantly lower.

Transfer of the operating permits from the county to the city would be a relatively quick process. The council directed Attorney Harris to review the current operating permit and verify that everything is up-to-date and that the county is in compliance with the terms of the permit before they sign the agreement. One example is that according to the permit, the flesh pit is to be covered daily, and it is currently not being covered daily. The State does two to three surprise inspections of the landfill annually.

The city will compare other landfill's fee and rate structures to come up with their own. If the council would choose to keep the landfill open six days a week, the city could staff it with part-time and seasonal employees.

The scales should be installed and in place before the city takes over the landfill operations. The city public works crew should be able to install them. There is heavy equipment that will be transferred with the landfill; however, it is very old equipment that is very expensive to keep operating due to maintenance costs. The city may be better off financially leasing new equipment.
