

 MINUTES OF THE CENTRAL WASATCH COMMISSION ("CWC") STAKEHOLDERS COUNCIL ENVIRONMENT SYSTEM COMMITTEE MEETING HELD TUESDAY, DECEMBER 9, 2025, AT 3:00 P.M. THE MEETING WAS CONDUCTED BOTH INPERSON AND VIRTUALLY VIA ZOOM. THE ANCHOR LOCATION WAS THE CWC OFFICES, LOCATED IN THE BRIGHTON BANK BUILDING, 311 SOUTH STATE STREET, SUITE, 330, SALT LAKE CITY, UTAH.

OPENING

1. <u>Chair Kelly Boardman will Open the Public Meeting as Chair of the Environment System Committee of the Central Wasatch Commission Stakeholders Council.</u>

Chair Kelly Boardman called the Central Wasatch Commission ("CWC") Stakeholders Council Environment System Committee Meeting to order at 3:00 p.m. and welcomed those present. She asked the new Communications Director to introduce himself to the Environment System Committee.

Communications Director, Will McKay, reported that he has been in Salt Lake City since 2019, but he is originally from Iowa. He completed his undergrad in Environmental Science in Boulder, Colorado. He moved to Utah to work with Utah Mountain Adventures, which he did until 2023. After that, he transitioned to working in government and worked for the Utah Division of Emergency Management as one of the Public Information Officers. He also runs a company called Mountain Training Center, which is an online avalanche education platform that is used nationally. Until he started working for the CWC, he was also on the Board of the Wasatch Backcountry Alliance.

2. Review and Approval of the Minutes from the November 11, 2025, Meeting.

 Once there was a quorum of the Environment System Committee, the Meeting Minutes were considered. Chair Boardman reported that during the meeting on November 11, 2025, there was a discussion about modifying visitor behavior in the Central Wasatch. The Committee also talked about the recent ski resort presentations on sustainability. There was also discussion about the Central Wasatch Death and the Dis Cottomus of Courses Watershad Postantian Presinct

Wasatch Dashboard and the Big Cottonwood Canyon Watershed Restoration Project.

MOTION: Kelly Boardman moved to APPROVE the November 11, 2025, Meeting Minutes. Meagan McKasy seconded the motion. The motion passed with the unanimous consent of the Committee.

VISITOR BEHAVIOR IN THE CENTRAL WASATCH

1. The Committee will Identify Key Visitor Behavior Modifications that would Benefit the Environment in the Central Wasatch.

2. <u>The Committee will Discuss Creating a Survey to Better Understand Visitor Attitudes and Associated Behaviors.</u>

Chair Boardman reported that the Environment System Committee previously discussed visitor behavior in the Central Wasatch. The Committee will now consider visitor behavior modifications that would benefit the environment in the Central Wasatch and discuss the possible creation of a survey. Chair Boardman recently reviewed the list that was provided by Maura Hahnenberger and selected four broader ideas to use as a guide for the visitor behavior modification discussion:

- Travel using public transit, ride share or shuttle;
- Visit during off-peak hours;
- Reduce impact to ecosystems (Leave No Trace principles, trail etiquette, etc.);
- Reduce impact to other visitors (be prepared with appropriate equipment and supplies).

Chair Boardman shared information about some of the social media posts she has seen recently, including one where people did not have a parking reservation for Brighton. The intention was to inform others about the need for a parking reservation. She asked for feedback from the Committee regarding visitor behavior modifications and the four broader ideas that were outlined. Meaghan McKasy noted that there are a lot of different routes that can be taken. After the last meeting, there was a discussion about the creation of a survey that posed questions to people either on a bus or waiting for a bus. It might be possible to ask them questions about how they view their own behaviors. There could also be feedback provided about the overall bus experience. That sort of information could lead to a campaign that is focused on improving the user experience in the canyons.

Chair Boardman explained that it is important to consider how information will be shared. She noted that information could be included in the materials the Recreation System Committee is putting together. In addition, there could be information shared on buses or at rental car company locations. Ms. Hahnenberger mentioned a potential survey with QR codes. She is always hesitant to send out a survey unless there are clear actions that can be taken. An example is the Central Wasatch Dashboard survey, where a lot of the information received made it possible to improve the resource for users. She does not think a survey in this case would be ideal unless the survey itself is the communication method. There are some surveys where the goal is not to collect information, but to give information.

Chair Boardman pointed out that some of the information gathered from the survey could be disseminated via the Recreation System Committee and the Transportation System Committee. However, she likes the idea of a survey that also educates respondents. Ms. Hahnenberger confirmed that one option is to have a survey that acts as an educational tool, but that is not her favorite option.

 Co-Chair Dan Zalles wanted to better understand how a survey could be used as a way of conveying information. Ms. Hahnenberger shared an example related to climate science and climate actions. There could be a survey that asks what sustainable actions someone takes, such as owning an electric vehicle, carpooling, and so on. Simply sharing a list of sustainable actions could be considered an educational tool. After submitting an answer, there could be something that pops up to encourage additional actions be taken. The goal of a survey is not always to receive information about the actions that are being taken, but to inform respondents about different actions that could be taken.

Ms. McKasy mentioned the issue of survey fatigue. There is no desire to release a survey simply to release one. However, there could be a two-prong approach taken in this case, where it is possible to both gather and share information. Director of Operations, Sam Kilpack, reported that Utah Transit Authority ("UTA") was receptive to the idea of a QR code on the buses that would link to a survey, so there is the potential for some level of partnership. Chair Boardman asked Committee Members to think about the survey more. At the end of the meeting agenda, there will be a discussion about the Committee goals for 2026. There can be a decision made about whether to pursue this further.

Ms. Hahnenberger likes the idea of pursuing specific messaging. As for what the end goal is, she believes it is the modification of visitor behavior, but it is possible to be more specific than that. For example, the goal might be to encourage more bus ridership or to encourage off-peak visits. There is an opportunity to share the survey QR code at bus stops or on UTA buses, but that essentially determines the audience, as it will focus on people who are already taking the bus. The Committee needs to think about the key messages as well as the most effective communication methods for the desired audience. She pointed out that social media posts are likely to reach a different audience than a QR code on a bus. If there is a certain audience there is a desire to reach, the type of outreach should be considered. Ms. Hahnenberger suggested that there be consideration of what partners to leverage. The capacity of the Environment System Committee also needs to be taken into account.

Co-Chair Zalles noted that people riding the buses are a valuable audience to hear from. In that case, the primary purpose would be to receive feedback about their experience riding the bus, find out how often they ride the bus, and determine whether they will ride the bus again. In addition, there can be education on broader issues. There could also be a QR code shared in other areas with questions that are specific to that audience. He imagines different versions of the survey with different QR codes.

Ms. McKasy stated that anything gathered would be a convenient sample rather than a representative sample. She agrees with the comments shared by Ms. Hahnenberger about focusing on the goals and creating an outline from there. Thinking through the process, audience, and objective makes sense. As for the comment about the capacity of the Environment System Committee, there is a class at the University of Utah where students run campaigns for a community partner. It might be possible to pitch the Committee as a community partner so the students could take on the preliminary work.

Chair Boardman noted that at the last meeting, there was a discussion about educating people on the vision of the Mountain Accord. As an educational component of a survey, there could be a question about familiarity with the CWC and the vision of the Mountain Accord. Ms. McKasy thought the Committee should think about the overarching goal. It would make sense to determine whether this is a knowledge campaign or a behavioral change campaign. It is okay to have a little bit of both, but there needs to be some decisions made. Chair Boardman agreed that if this moves forward, there will need to be decisions made about the goal and audience. She is excited about what this could become.

 Jonny Vasic stated that surveys tend to work best when they are focused. The longer a survey is, the less participation there tends to be. There could be some kind of incentive offered for those who complete the survey, such as entry into a draw for ski resort passes or something similar.

Ms. McKasy agreed that it is best to aim for a five-minute survey. The longer a survey is, the less likely it is that people will complete the survey. If there is an incentive offered, there will be more people willing to take the survey. Ms. McKasy pointed out that it is possible to create some survey flow. Some of the questions may be dependent on how someone responds. As an example, there could be a question asking if the respondent is on a bus heading to Big Cottonwood Canyon. Based on their answer, that could shift some of the questions. Chair Boardman noted that there could be a question about the reason for the visit to the canyons. She asked Committee Members to continue brainstorming ahead of the next meeting so that a determination can be made on the survey.

Chair Boardman asked about the Recreation System Committee pamphlet. Ms. Kilpack reported that the Committee created a pamphlet of short historical hikes in the Central Wasatch. She is not sure how that will be disseminated, but it has been created. Barbara Cameron took the lead on that. Ms. Kilpack shared a copy of the pamphlet with the Environment System Committee. There is information about how to prepare for a hike, etiquette, and there are links to different hikes. The Recreation System Committee only meets every other month, but she offered to check in with them to find out where the pamphlet has been shared. It might be possible to partner with the Environment System Committee so there is additional reach. Committee Members reviewed the digital pamphlet.

Chair Boardman suggested that a link to the Recreation System Committee pamphlet be added to the Central Wasatch Dashboard. Ms. Kilpack confirmed that this can be added. She reported that the landing page map should be live on the Central Wasatch Dashboard in the next week or so. Chair Boardman asked Committee Members to continue to think about the survey goal, audience, key messages, and communication before the next Environment System Committee Meeting takes place. Ms. McKasy noted that the survey might be something the Committee aims to launch next year.

<u>LEGISLATIVE AND LAND TENURE COMMITTEE MEETING ATTENDANCE DISCUSSION</u>

1. <u>The Committee will Discuss Sending a Member to Attend CWC Legislative and Land Tenure Committee Meetings.</u>

Chair Boardman explained that she looked for the Legislative and Land Tenure Committee meeting schedule, but found that meetings occur on an as-needed basis. She asked if there is a meeting planned. Ms. Kilpack denied this but believed there would be one held in the next few months. She reported that it is possible to subscribe to the Utah Public Notice alert email. When a meeting is scheduled and an agenda is posted, there is an automatic email sent out to subscribers.

Chair Boardman asked for additional information about the Legislative and Land Tenure Committee. She noted that the website has a brief summary that states the Committee looks at the Central Wasatch National Conservation and Recreation Area Act ("CWNCRA"). However, the Environment System Committee is curious about properties that might be of interest in looking into for conservation.

Ms. Kilpack stated that the Legislative and Land Tenure Committee has not met a lot in the time that she has been with the CWC, because the Committee largely focuses on the CWNCRA. There will

be more meetings now that the CWNCRA is becoming more front of mind, but other conservation easements have not been discussed. Having a member of the Environment System Committee designated to attend the Legislative and Land Tenure Committees might make sense.

Ms. Hahnenberger asked if there is a Chair of the Legislative and Land Tenure Committee. Ms. Kilpack believed the Committee had the same membership as the Executive/Budget/Audit Committee. There is a limit of four voting Commissioners on the Legislative and Land Tenure Committee, because the committee cannot have a quorum of the CWC Board. The membership previously included Jeff Silvestrini, Christopher Robinson, and Erin Mendenhall. Mr. Silvestrini recently stepped down, so the new membership of that Committee will need to be determined. Ms. Kilpack reported that Mayor Roger Bourke from Alta is the new Co-Chair of the CWC Board. It is possible that Mayor Bourke will join the Legislative and Land Tenure Committee, but he is not required to do so. Additional discussions were had about the Legislative and Land Tenure Committee.

Chair Boardman asked if there is a member of the Environment System Committee interested in attending the next Legislative and Land Tenure Committee Meeting and reporting back. Co-Chair Zalles offered to attend future meetings of the Legislative and Land Tenure Committee and share information about the discussions with other members of the Environment System Committee.

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2026 COMMITTEE GOALS DISCUSSION

Chair Boardman reported that the Environment System Committee will continue to have discussions about modifying visitor behavior in the Central Wasatch in 2026. The survey can continue to be considered. In addition, there will now be a liaison attending the Legislative and Land Tenure Committee Meetings and reporting back to the Environment System Committee in the new year.

Discussions were had about the Central Wasatch Symposium for 2026. It was noted that some potential Committee ideas might arise after attending the symposium. There are already ideas that the Committee can continue to build on and there could be additional ideas after the symposium.

2026 MEETING SCHEDULE

1. The Committee will Discuss its Meeting Schedule for 2026.

The Committee will Discuss Ideas and Goals for 2026.

It was noted that Ms. McKasy might have to attend meetings late in the future due to her schedule. Chair Boardman asked what time she would be available to attend. Ms. McKasy reported that she teaches until 3:20 p.m., so a 3:30 p.m. start time would work, or she can arrive at meetings slightly late. Chair Boardman reported that 3:30 p.m. would work better for her schedule as well. Other Committee Members expressed support for the 3:30 p.m. start time. Ms. Kilpack confirmed that the

Ms. Kilpack reported that there is a Stakeholders Council Meeting scheduled for next week. During a portion of the meeting, there will be a review of the Stakeholders Council's accomplishments from the last year. The Environment System Committee has several accomplishments to highlight, including the survey conducted on the Central Wasatch Dashboard and the resulting enhancements.

meeting time can be changed. She offered to send out an email to the other Committee Members.

She asked that someone from the Committee be prepared to share a short summary of the work and outcomes. Co-Chair Zalles offered to share information during the Stakeholders Council Meeting.

NEXT MEETING AGENDA

Discussions were had about the next Environment System Committee Meeting. Ms. Kilpack asked if there is a desire to cancel the scheduled meeting on January 13, 2026. The CWC Board meets on January 12, 2026, and the Central Wasatch Symposium will take place on January 8 and 9, 2026. Chair Boardman is fine to meet on January 13, 2026, but the meeting can be canceled if other

The Committee will Discuss Items for the Next Meeting Agenda.

Committee Members feel overwhelmed at that time. Other Committee Members thought it made sense to cancel that meeting. The Environment System Committee will meet on February 10, 2026.

OTHER ITEMS

Ms. Hahnenberger reported that the Big Cottonwood Canyon Environmental Assessment has been released and is currently receiving public comment. There are some open house and virtual meetings.

The meetings will take place next week and the public comment period will end in January 2026.

Ms. Kilpack reported that the call for short-term projects for the Short-Term Projects Grant Program will open on January 13, 2025. It will be open from January 13, 2025, to February 10, 2025. Additional information about the Central Wasatch Symposium was shared with the Committee.
