

1      **R156. Commerce, Professional Licensing.**

2      **R156-11a. Cosmetology and Associated Professions Licensing Act Rule.**

3      **R156-11a-101. Title – Authority – Relationship to Rule R156-1.**

4      (1) This rule is known as the “Cosmetology and Associated Professions Licensing Act Rule.”

5      (2) This rule is adopted by the Division under the authority of Subsection 58-1-106(1)(a) to  
6      enable the Division to administer Title 58, Chapter 11a, Cosmetology and Associated Professions  
7      Licensing Act.

8      (3) The organization of this rule and its relationship to Rule R156-1 is as described in Section  
9      R156-1-101.

10     **R156-11a-102. General Definitions.**

11     Terms used in this rule are defined in Title 58, Chapter 1, Division of Professional Licensing Act,  
12     and in Title 58, Chapter 11a, Cosmetology and Associated Professions Licensing Act. In  
13     addition:

14     (1) “Balayage” means the technique of free-hand painting highlights onto the hair, creating a  
15     soft and natural gradation of lightness coloration towards the end.

16     (2) “Brow lamination” or “brow perming” as used in R156-11a-302.13, R156-11a-302.15,  
17     R156-11a-302.18, and R156-11a-302.23, means a semi-permanent treatment that restructures  
18     brow hairs using a chemical solution.

19     (3) “Client services” means services performed by one student or apprentice on one individual  
20     member of the public.

21     (4) “Comedone extractor” as used in Subsections 58-11a-302.11(1)(a), 58-11a-302.13(1)(g), 58-  
22     11a-302.18(1)(a)(xii), and 58-11a-302.23(2)(a) means a small handheld tool used to remove  
23     blackheads and whiteheads from the skin.

24     (5) “Genital area” means the external reproductive organs including the penis, testicles, vulva,  
25     vagina, or clitoris.

26     (6) “Hard wax” means a type of depilatory wax that hardens on the hair and is removed without  
27     the need for fabric strips.

28     (7) “Large area” as used in Subsections R156-11a-302.11, R156-11a-302.13, R156-11a-302.14,  
29     and R156-11a-302.18. means one of the following:

30     (a) full back;

31     (b) full front torso;

32     (c) a full leg; or

33     (d) a full arm.

34     (8)    (a) “Limited chemical exfoliation” as used in Subsections R156-11a-302.13, R156-11a-  
35     302.18, and R156-11a-302.23 means a resurfacing procedure performed with the use of chemical  
36     substances, like acids or enzymes, to dissolve dead skin cells and promote cell turnover that does  
37     not exceed the stratum corneum.

38     (b) “Limited chemical exfoliation” does not include the mixing, combining, or layering of skin  
39     exfoliation products or services, but does include:

41 (i) alpha hydroxy acids of 30% or less, with a pH of not less than 3.0; or  
42 (ii) salicylic acid of 15% or less.

43 (9) "Manipulating" as used in Subsections 58-11a-[102(35)(a),]302.11(1)(a), 58-11a-  
44 302.13(1)(g), 58-11a-302.18(1)(a)(xii), and 58-11a-302.23(2)(a) means applying a light pressure  
45 by the hands to the skin.

46 (10) "Manual extraction" as used in Subsections R156-302.11, R156-11a-302.13, R156-11a-  
47 302.14, R156-11a-302.18, and R156-11a-302.23, means removing impurities from the skin with  
48 a protected fingertip, a cotton swab, or a loop comedone extractor.

49 (11) "Natural manicure and pedicure" as used in Subsections 58-11a-302.13(1)(l), 58-11a-  
50 302.18(1)(a)(xiii), and 58-11a-302.23(2)(a) means the trimming, cutting, cleaning, manicuring,  
51 shaping, massaging hands to elbows and feet to knees, or enhancing the appearance of the hands,  
52 feet and nails of an individual using the technician's hands, mechanical or electrical preparation,  
53 antiseptic, lotion, exfoliating scrub, or cream.

54 (12) "NIC" means the National Interstate Council of State Boards of Cosmetology.

55 (13) "Practical session" means services performed by students or apprentices on each other,  
56 mannequins, or a model in a classroom type setting.

57 (14) "Removal of proximal nail fold" as used in 58-11a-501(6)(d) includes use of manual file, e-  
58 file, cutting, or buffing.

59 (15) (a) "Safety data sheet" or "SDS" means a document that provides information regarding  
60 hazards substances, precautions, and response actions for a product containing chemicals  
61 including:

62 (i) how they should be safely used, stored, transported and disposed of; and  
63 (ii) emergency procedures.

64 (b) "Safety data sheet" may also be called a material safety data sheet or MSDS.

65 (16) (a) "Small area" or "medium area" as used in R156-11a-302.11, R156-11a-302.13,  
66 R156-11a-302.14, and R156-11a-302.18. means one of the following areas:

67 (i) axilla or arm pit;  
68 (ii) neck;  
69 (ii) feet;  
70 (iv) hands;  
71 (v) bikini area;  
72 (vi) upper arm;  
73 (vii) lower arm;  
74 (viii) upper leg;  
75 (ix) lower leg;  
76 (x) upper back;  
77 (xi) upper chest;  
78 (xii) abdomen; or  
79 (xiii) sides of the torso.

80 (b) "Small area" or "medium area" includes a Brazilian that meets the requirements of  
81 Subsections R156-11a-302.22(4)(e)(iv) and R156-11a-306(2)(d)(iv).

82 (17)(a) "Sugaring" as used in Subsection 58-11a-102(10)(b)(iii) means the removal of unwanted  
83 hair by applying a mixture to the skin and then removing it.

84 (b) "Sugaring" includes using a mixture of lemon juice, sugar, and water.

85 (18) "Soft wax" means a type of depilatory wax that hardens on the skin and hair and is  
86 removed with fabric strips.

87 (19) "Thermal styling" as used in 58-11a-304(13)(e) means hairstyling techniques that use heat,  
88 such as curling irons, flat irons, and hair dryers, to temporarily alter the shape and texture of hair.

89 (20) "Unprofessional conduct" is further defined in Sections 58-1-501 and R156-11a-502.

90 (21) "Wet styling" refers to the process of setting and shaping the hair while it is wet, allowing it  
91 to dry in a specific form or style.

106 Terms used in this rule are defined in Title 58, Chapter 1, Division of Professional Licensing Act,  
107 and in Title 58, Chapter 11a, Cosmetology and Associated Professions Licensing Act. In  
108 addition:

109 (1) "Blend method" means the combining of galvanic current with thermolysis current.

110 (2) "Galvanic current" means a constant low-voltage direct current.

111 (3) (a) "Large area electrolysis" as used in Subsection R156-11a-302.14 means any portion of  
112 the following:

113 (i) upper back;

114 (ii) lower back;

115 (iii) upper chest;

116 (iv) abdomen;

117 (v) sides of the torso;

118 (vi) upper leg;

119 (vii) lower leg;

120       (viii) upper arm; or  
121       (ix) lower arm.  
122       (b) “Large area electrolysis” includes a Brazilian that meets the requirements of Subsections  
123       R156-11a-302.22(4)(e)(iv) and R156-11a-306(2)(d)(iv).  
124       (4) “Small area electrolysis” or “medium area electrolysis” as used in R156-11a-302.14 means  
125       one of the following areas:  
126       (a) axilla or arm pit;  
127       (b) neck;  
128       (c) feet;  
129       (d) hands;  
130       (e) bikini area;  
131       (f) brow;  
132       (g) lip;  
133       (h) exterior of the nose;  
134       (i) cheeks,  
135       (j) exterior of the ear;  
136       (k) chin;  
137       (5) “Thermolysis current” means using alternating current to create heat to destroy hair growth  
138       cells in the follicle.

150       **R156-11a-102.18. Definitions – Specific to Master Esthetics.**

151       Terms used in this rule are defined in Title 58, Chapter 1, Division of Professional Licensing Act,  
152       and in Title 58, Chapter 11a, Cosmetology and Associated Professions Licensing Act. In  
153       addition:

154       (1) “Advanced extraction” as used in Subsection[s] 58-11a-302.18(1)(a)(vi) means to perform  
155       extraction with a lancet or device that removes impurities from the skin.  
156       (2) “Anti-aging resurfacing enhancements” as used in Subsection R156-11a-302.18 means  
157       treatments designed to improve the appearance of skin that has been affected by the aging  
158       process, sun damage, or other environmental factors and include:  
159       (a) skin tightening;

160 (b) sublative scar reduction; or

161 (c) skin lightening.

162 (3) "Aroma therapy" means the application of essential oils that are applied directly to the skin,  
163 undiluted or in a misted dilution with a carrier oil or lotion for varied applications such as  
164 massage, hot packs, cold packs, compress, inhalation, steam or air diffusion, or in hydrotherapy  
165 services.

166 (4) "Body wraps" as used in Subsection 58-11a-302.18(1)(a)(i) means body treatments utilizing  
167 products or equipment to enhance and maintain the texture, contour, integrity, and health of the  
168 skin and body.

169 (5) (a) "Chemical exfoliation" as used in Subsection 58-11a-302.18(1)(a)(iii) means a  
170 resurfacing procedure performed with the use of chemical substances such as acids or enzymes  
171 to dissolve dead skin cells and promote cell turnover.

172 (b) "Chemical exfoliation" includes:

173 (i) a limited chemical exfoliation as defined in Subsection 58-11a-102(8); or

174 (ii) using an acid with a pH of at least 1.0 including:

175 (A) an alpha hydroxy acid [with a pH of not less than 1.0 and ]at a concentration of up to 50%  
176 [shall include ]with partially neutralized acids;

177 (B) a beta hydroxy acid[s] with a concentration of [not more than]up to 30%;

178 (C) a trichloroacetic acid, under Subsection 58-11a-501(17)(c), in a concentration of [not more  
179 than]up to 15% but no manual, mechanical, or acid exfoliation can be used before treatment  
180 unless under the general supervision of a licensed health care practitioner];

181 (D) a vitamin-based acid[s]; or[KS1]

182 (E) a modified Jessner solution on the face or the tissue immediately adjacent to the jawline.

183 (F) but no manual, mechanical, or acid exfoliation can be used before treatment unless under the  
184 general supervision of a licensed health care practitioner under 58-11-501(7)(a)

185 (c) "Chemical exfoliation" includes the following acids with a pH of less than 1.0 if performed  
186 under the general supervision of a licensed health care practitioner:

187 (i) an alpha hydroxy acid with a concentration higher than 50%;

188 (ii) beta hydroxy acids with a concentration of higher than 30%;

189 (iii) an exfoliant that contains bichloroacetic acid or phenol in any concentration

190 (iv) trichloroacetic acid, under Subsection 58-11a-501(17)(c), in a concentration higher than  
191 15%;

192 (v) a vitamin-based acid; or

193 (vi) a manual, mechanical, or acid exfoliation used before treatment on a client.

194 (6) "Corneocytes" means terminally differentiated keratinocytes found in the outermost layer of  
195 the skin.

196 (7) "Exfoliation" means the sloughing off of non-living skin cells called "corneocytes" by  
197 superficial and non-invasive means.

198 (8) "Hydrotherapy" as used in Subsection 58-11a-302.18(1)(a)(ii) means the use of water for  
199 cosmetic purposes or beautification of the body.

200 (9) "Lymphatic massage" as used in Subsections 58-11a-302.18(1)(a)(x) means a method using  
201 light rhythmic pressure applied by manual or other means to the skin using specific lymphatic  
202 maneuvers to promote the drainage of lymphatic fluid through the tissue;

203 (10) "Microdermabrasion" as used in Subsection 58-11-302.18(1)(a)(v) and R156-11a-  
204 302.18(5)(iii) means the mechanical exfoliation of the uppermost layers of the stratum corneum  
205 using a closed-loop vacuum system.

206 (11) (a) "Microneedling" means the use of a device:

207 (i) with multiple tiny solid needles designed to pierce the skin to stimulate collagen production  
208 or cellular renewal; and

209 (ii) that may be in the form of:

210 (A) a stamp[s]; or

211 (B) an electronic "pen[s]."

212 (b) "Microneedling" may also be called:

213 (i) dermal needling;

214 (ii) Collagen Induction Therapy (CIT);

215 (iii) cosmetic dry needling;

216 (iv) multitrepennic collagen actuation; or

217 (v) percutaneous collagen induction.

218 (12) "Patch test" or "predisposition test" means applying a small amount of a chemical  
219 preparation to the skin of the arm or behind the ear of a client to determine possible allergies to  
220 the chemical preparation.

221 (13) "Photo rejuvenation" as used in R156-11a-302.18 means using light energy to improve the  
222 appearance of the skin and includes:

223 (a) pigmentation removal;

224 (b) spider vein reduction;

225 (c) telangiectasia reduction;

226 (d) acne reduction;

227 (e) facial erythema reduction; and

228 (f) hemangioma reduction.

229 (14) "Sanding" means using a rapidly rotating tool to remove the outermost layers of skin above  
230 limited to the stratum corneum, unless the individual is under the supervision of a licensed health  
231 care practitioner acting within the scope of the health care practitioner's license.

232 (15) "Stratum corneum" means the outermost layer(s) of the skin, composed mainly of dead  
233 corneocytes.

234 **R156-11a-102.19. Definitions – Specific to Master Barber and Master Hair Designer.**

235 Reserved.

236

237 **R156-11a-102.20 Definitions – Specific to Nail Technician.**

239 Terms used in this rule are defined in Title 58, Chapter 1, Division of Professional Licensing Act,  
240 and in Title 58, Chapter 11a, Cosmetology and Associated Professions Licensing Act. In  
241 addition:

242 (1) “Artificial nails” means any type of nail enhancement added to the natural nail and includes  
243 tips, overlays, and sculptured nails.

244 (2) “Efile” or “electric nail drill” means an electric-powered rotary tool used for filing nails or  
245 removing nail enhancements.

246 (3) “Eponychium or proximal nail fold” means the thickened, living tissue at the base of the  
247 fingernails and toenails.

248 (4) “Extreme nail art forms” means an extra-long stiletto or edge shape built on a nail entirely by  
249 sculpting including competition nails.

250 (5) (a) “Sculptured nails” means a custom-formed extension that are built directly on the  
251 natural nail using a nail form and then sculpted with product including acrylic, hard gel, or  
252 polygel.

253 (b) “Sculptured nails” does not include a nail tip.

254 (6) “Source capture system[,]” as used in Subsection 58-11a-502(6)[,] means the source capture  
255 system required under Section 15A-3-402.

256

257 **R156-11a-102.21. Definitions – Specific to Instructor.**

258 Reserved.

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260 **R156-11a-102.22. Definitions – Specific to Schools.**

261 Terms used in this rule are defined in Title 58, Chapter 1, Division of Professional Licensing Act,  
262 and in Title 58, Chapter 11a, Cosmetology and Associated Professions Licensing Act. In  
263 addition:

264 (1) “Equivalent number of credit hours” means:

265 (a) Theory -1 credit hour to 30 clock hours; and

266 (b) Practical – 1 credit hour to 30 45 clock hours

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270 **R156-11a-102.23. Definitions – Specific to Esthetics License.**

271 Reserved.

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273 **R156-11a-102.24. Definitions – Specific to Barbering License.**

274 Reserved.

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276 **R156-11a-301. Change of Legal Entity – School.**

277 (1) Under Section 58-11a-301, a school shall submit a new application for licensure upon a  
278 change of legal entity status

279 (2) The new legal entity under Subsection (1) may not engage in practice as a licensed school  
280 until the Division approves the entity's application and issues a school license.

281

282 **R156-11a-302. Qualifications for Licensure – General Examination Requirements –**  
283 **Equivalency of Foreign School Education – General Requirements for Transfer of**  
284 **Crediting Hours - Implementation.**

285 (1) Under Section 58-11a-302(1)(c), the general examination requirements for licensure and  
286 permits are established as follows:

287 (a) Except as otherwise provided in Sections 58-1-308 and R156-11a-308, an applicant shall:

288 (i) pass the respective examination with a score of at least 70% as determined by the  
289 examination provider; and

290 (ii) within three years before the application date.

291 (b) The Division may accept a theory exam, practical exam, or instructor exam that is approved  
292 by the licensing authority of another jurisdiction in the United States if it is substantially  
293 equivalent to the applicable Utah examination.

294 (2) Under Section 58-11a-302(2)(a) the requirements for hours earned from a permit or license  
295 to transfer credit to another license are established as follows:

296 (a) each school or apprentice supervisor may accept up to, but no more than the hours allotted  
297 for permitting or licensure under Subsections 58-11a-302.10 through 58-11a-302.21, Subsection  
298 58-11a-302.23, and Subsection 58-11a-302.24.

299 (b) each school or apprentice supervisor may accept course work and service counts from an  
300 approved apprenticeship, a licensed or recognized school, or an evaluation performed on behalf  
301 of an internationally trained applicant provided the evaluation is performed by a current member  
302 of the National Association of Credential Evaluation Services (NACES) at [www.naces.org](http://www.naces.org).

303 (3) By May 31, 2026, each licensed school and apprentice instructor shall have fully  
304 implemented the curriculum and service counts required under Title 58, Chapter 11a  
305 Cosmetology and Associated Professions Licensing Act, and this rule.

306 (4) accredited schools will follow the number of service counts as well as the curriculum subjects  
307 for each permit and license, they will not be held to the clock hours listed in each table.

309 **R156-11a-302.10. Qualifications for Barbering Permit –Curriculum – Minimum Service**  
310 **Count Requirements – Examination.**

311 (1) Under Subsections 58-11a-302(1)(b) and 58-11a-302.10(3), the educational requirements  
312 and minimum service count requirements to meet the 130 hours of instruction and minimum  
313 service counts requirements for a barbering permit are defined, clarified, and established in this  
314 section.

315 (2) Under Subsection 58-11a-302.10(3), the curriculum for a licensed school, registered school,  
316 or approved apprenticeship program for a barbering permit shall include theory instruction in the  
317 following subject areas:

332 (1) Under Subsections 58-11a-302(1)(b) and 58-11a-302.11(3), the educational requirements and  
333 minimum service count requirements to meet the 200 hours of instruction and minimum service  
334 counts requirements for a basic esthetics permit are defined, clarified, and established in this  
335 section.

336

337 (2) Under Subsection 58-11a-302.11(3), the curriculum for a licensed school, registered school,  
338 or approved apprenticeship program for a basic esthetics permit shall include theory instruction  
339 in the following subject areas:

841    (8) violating a standard established in Subsection R156-11a-306.

844    **R156-11a-503. Administrative Penalties - Unlawful Conduct.**
