Topic	Discussion
Welcome	Stephanie Morgan opened the meeting at 9:01 am and welcomed the Committee. Krysta Badger assisted in taking attendance.
Approval of Minutes	The minutes from the August 12 th , 2025, meeting were reviewed.

What We Know

- Reinstated all Reductions in Force (RIFs)
- Continuing Resolution through January 30, 2026
- o Congress working on 9 appropriations bills through end of year
- Potential shift of OSEP programs to HHS
- What Remains Constant
 - o The Individuals with Disabilities Education Act (IDEA) is still the law
 - The Utah Parent Center has great relationships with both the Utah State Board of Education and many Local Education Agencies

Ms. Reyes opened the meeting up for questions about her presentation.

Ms. Morgan asked what happens to funds for these programs that were paid through taxpayer money if the programs end.

Ms. Reyes responded that if a move were to happen and if the functions of the Department of Education were to move to a different agency, it would have to happen via notice in support of the Senate. It is written into Senate rules that a major move like that would have to have their input and support.

Dr. White added that, historically, Congress has authorized funding and appropriated funding, and then the executive branch has distributed that funding according to what Congress has mandated.

Dr. White also stated that, over the last year, there appeared to be exceptions to that, where cuts were made in federal funds which had been appropriated by Congress. And there have been many lawsuits filed and people who say that can't happen, but it continues to happen. So, the answer is, we really don't know right now. Dr. White suggested that anyone who is concerned ought to reach out to the members of their local house of representatives.

cCMV Diagnosis and Evaluation Update


Mack Tempero from the University of Utah presented an update on Congenital Cytomegalovirus (cCMV) Diagnosis and Evaluation. Presentation slides are available on the Public Notice Website.

Topics included, but were not limited to:

- What cCMV is and why it's important
 - Most common congenital infection worldwide (0.5% prevalence)
 - o In utero infection
 - o Important cause of neurodevelopmental delay
 - o Most common cause of pediatric nonhereditary SNHL (25%)
 - o Early intervention is important for improving speech & language
- Diagnosis
 - o Child less than 2-3 weeks of age



- o Postnatal infection not associated with hearing loss
- Urine culture of PCR
- Saliva breastmilk contamination (26-41% false positive), confirm with urine PCR
- Dried blood spot (DBS) samples
- Hearing Targeted Testing in 2013
 - o July 1, 20103 June 30, 2015: 103,868 births
 - 509 never passed NBHS and were eligible for cCMV testing
 - o 243/509 infants tested for cCMV before 3 weeks of life
 - 14 cCMV positive
 - 6 cCMV disease with SNHL
 - 8 cCMV infection
 - o 0.013% prevalence
- Expanded Targeted Testing in 2019
 - o Improvement on existing program
 - o Infants with cCMV disease
 - Most at risk for long term sequelae and most likely to benefit from antiviral therapy
 - o 2024: 69% born at hospitals with expanded testing

- Created a letter with pediatric audiology working group and a few primary care providers
 - To be sent at time of diagnosis from the diagnosing audiologist
 - Notifies doctor of patient diagnosis
 - Asks doctor to encourage patient's parents to enroll in El
- Changed process in recommending that all audiologists refer newly diagnosed families directly to PIP in the hopes that they would have an opportunity to be able to talk to families about El services.
- Enrollment data findings
 - > 95% of children were receiving that referral from their diagnosing audiologist.
 - Maternal ethnicity was not significant.
 - Maternal education was statistically significant. College graduates were more likely to enroll.
 - Patients with severe to profound hearing loss were more likely to enroll in PIP services.
 - Undetermined hearing loss were less likely to enroll.
 - Salt Lake County was least likely to enroll in El services.
- Sent out two surveys, one to El providers and one to USDB PIP providers.
 - Learned that a clear system of how to work together is needed to address and work on
 - communication issues
 - timing of appointments and assessments
 - staff education
- Meeting in December, planning next steps for better education, etc. Possibly creating an optional Canva training course for El providers.

Utah Midwives Organization (UMO) Conference Recap

Holley Ezzell provided a recap of the Utah Midwives Organization Conference

- November 6th 8th, 2025, at Thanksgiving Point in Lehi, UT
- Holley did a 45-minute presentation with epidemiologist, Max Sidesinger
 - o 35 people attended in-person and 4 online. It was also recorded.
 - Started with a live survey and, from that, saw what information midwives had about hearing screening, CMV, and the processes.
 - o Gathered info and did education based off the survey.
 - Covered the following topics:
 - CMV testing and House Bill 363
 - The importance of talking with their clients about opting in to keep the blood spot
 - Genetic hearing loss, Microtia, Atresia & hearing loss, cleft palate, cleft lip, Downs Syndrome, and ear pits & tags. These



	topics served to inform attendees a bit of what to look for when they have babies that may have these anomalies, and the importance of hearing screening follow-up. There were midwives from Wyoming and Idaho who were very interested in learning how Utah EHDI works with midwives in our state, and how they can return to their states and try to work more closely with their EHDI programs.
