- 762 (b) The instructor shall be approved by the Division and may not have had any disciplinary
- action in the preceding three years;
- 764 (c) there shall be a conspicuous sign near the workstation of the apprentice stating, "Apprentice
- 765 in Training".
- 766 (d) the instructor will use the service counts and theory instruction listed under the applicable
- 767 <u>license or permit for which the apprentice is in training, these will be recorded daily and the</u>
- record shall be available to the division upon request;
- (e) a complete set of textbooks pertaining to the license or permit shall be available to the
- 770 apprentice
- 771 (f) the instructor shall provide each apprentice a list of basic kit supplies needed by the
- apprentice. The basic kit may be supplied by the instructor or purchased independently by the
- 773 apprentice.
- 774 (g) the instructor shall provide each apprentice a copy of the written contract prepared under
- 775 Subsection 3
- 776 (h) the instructor shall limit the training of an apprentice to not more than 40 hours per week and
- not more than five days out every seven consecutive days;
- 778 (i) an apprentice may be compensated for services performed as established in the written
- 779 contract under Subsection 3;
- 780 (i) an apprentice may not perform work on the public until the apprentice has received at least
- 781 10% of the hours of practical training and theory training;
- 782 (k) an apprentice instructor may not be an employee of an apprentice.
- 783 (2) Under Subsection 56-11a-102(1)the standards for protection of apprentices include the
- 784 <u>following:</u>
- 785 (a) if an apprentice supervisor dissociates for any reason, the supervisor shall:
- 786 (i) provide the apprentice with a written record of all theory and service counts completed
- 787 including hours performed in each.

- 788 (b) an apprentice supervisor may require an apprentice to:
- 789 (i) clean up an area after the apprentice has used it; and
- 790 (ii) perform or participate in daily cleanup of work areas including:
- 791 (A) the floor space shampoo bowls;
- 792 (B) laundering the towels and linen; or
- 793 (C) another general cleanup duty that is related to the performance of a client service or a
- 794 practical experience.
- 795 (c) Subject to Subsection (2)(d)(ii), an apprentice supervisor may provide instruction to the
- 796 <u>apprentice regarding product sales techniques as part of the business and shop management</u>
- 797 portion of the curriculum.
- 798 (d) An apprentice supervisor may not:
- 799 (i) use an apprentice to perform maintenance, janitorial, or remodeling work including:
- 800 (A) scrubbing the floor, a wall, or a toilet;
- 801 (B) cleaning a window;
- 802 (C) waxing the floor;
- 803 (D) painting;
- 804 (E) decorating; or
- 805 (F) performing any outside work on the grounds or building.
- 806 (ii) require an apprentice to sell products applicable to the industry as a condition to graduate;
- 807 (iii) remove an hour earned by a student except that:
- 808 (A) based on the apprentice's level of competency, the supervisor may require an apprentice to
- take a refresher course towards completion of the training program; or
- 810 (iv) require an apprentice to perform an activity listed under Subsection 58-11a-502(2).
- 811 (3) Under Subsection 56-11a-102(1) an apprentice supervisor shall complete a written contract
- with each apprentice before starting the apprenticeship that:
- 813 (b) is signed by the apprentice supervisor and the student; and
- 814 (c) includes:
- 815 (i) the rules of conduct for the supervisor, and the apprentice;
- 816 (ii) a class outline including the expected timeline to complete the training and the distribution
- of each kit item;

- 818 (iii) the attendance requirements;
- 819 (iv) the provisions for make-up work;
- 820 (v) the grounds for dissociation by the instructor and apprentice and
- 821 (vi) a detailed fee schedule with the refund amounts including the apprentice's financial
- responsibility upon dissociation from the supervisor or vice versa.
- 824 R156-11a-501. Unprofessional Conduct.
- 825 "Unprofessional conduct" includes:

- 826 (1) using a device classified by the Food and Drug Administration as a prescriptive medical
- device without the appropriate level of supervision by a licensed health care practitioner acting
- within the licensed health care practitioner's scope of practice;
- 829 (2) performing a service within the individual's scope of practice without having been
- adequately trained to perform the service;
- 831 (3) performing a procedure while the licensee has a known contagious disease that may be
- transmitted by performing the procedure unless the licensee takes medically approved measures
- 833 to prevent transmission of the disease; [and]
- 834 (4) performing a procedure on a client who has a known contagious disease that may be
- transmitted by performing the procedure unless the licensee takes medically approved measures
- 836 to prevent transmission of the disease[.];
- 837 (5) using a product containing formaldehyde, formalin, or methylene glycol;
- 838 (6) violating a standard established in Subsection R156-11a-302.18(4) or Subsection R156-11a-
- 839 <u>302.18(5);</u>
- 840 (7) violating a standard established in Subsection R156-11a-302.22(4), Subscription R156-11a-
- 841 302.22(5), or Subsection R156-11a-302.22(6); or
- 842 (8) violating a standard established in Subsection R156-11a-306.
- 843 (9) use of a dermal roller
- 844
- 845 R156-11a-503. Administrative Penalties Unlawful Conduct.
- 846 (1) In addition to the penalties in Section 58-11a-503, the penalties under Sections 58-1-502 and
- R156-1-502 shall apply to a violation of Title 58 Occupations and Professions.
