MINUTES OF THE STRATEGIC PLANNING MEETING OF THE SPRINGVILLE CITY COUNCIL HELD ON TUESDAY, NOVEMBER 11, 2025, AT 4:00 P.M. AT THE SPRINGVILLE CITY FIRE DEPARTMENT, 75 WEST CENTER STREET, SPRINGVILLE, UTAH.

CALL TO ORDER

Mayor Packard welcomed everyone at 4:05 p.m. Mayor Packard asked Councilmember Snelson to give an invocation.

I. WELCOME - MAYOR PACKARD

Mayor Packard welcomed all in attendance.

II. FRAMING

a. REFLECTION ON FIRST TERM/VISION FOR SECOND TERM - MAYOR PACKARD

Mayor Packard addressed the Council and explained that over the next four years, there were goals and responsibilities the City needed to address. He emphasized the importance of working together despite differences and stated that he welcomed healthy discussion among the Council.

Councilmember Snelson commented that even when there had been strong convictions and differing opinions, the Council had been able to disagree respectfully and ultimately act in the best interest of the City.

b. GROUND RULES/PURPOSE - TROY FITZGERALD, CITY ADMINISTRATOR

Troy stated that the purpose of the meeting was to review the City's current financial situation, revisit the planning document adopted two years prior, and discuss a project he and John had been working on over the past six months. He noted that dinner would be held with the firefighters to provide an opportunity for discussion. He emphasized the importance of prioritizing the Council's objectives.

III. CONTEXT

a. FISCAL SNAPSHOT (RESERVES, CONSTRAINTS, FORECAST) - BRUCE RIDDLE, ASSISTANT CITY ADMINISTRATOR/FINANCE DIRECTOR

Bruce presented a fiscal snapshot of the City and reviewed fund balances within the Governmental Funds and Enterprise Funds. He explained that the State provides guidelines regarding

appropriate reserve balances. He reported that the RDA project had concluded and that tax increment revenues previously directed to the RDA fund would now be distributed to the taxing entity. He stated that the City was in a stable position with general fund reserves, that capital fund reserves were healthy, that reserve levels met best practice standards, and that utility rates were set appropriately, with utilities generally in the middle range or slightly lower. He noted that staff would continue to closely monitor any upcoming legislation related to reserve requirements.

Councilmember Wright asked about funds recently received from a property sale. She also asked where the accrued interest was held.

Bruce responded that the proceeds from the property sale would be reflected in FY2026 under assigned capital funds. He explained that accrued interest was related to the permanent fund balance and that other non-restrictive funds could be commingled.

Troy commented that replacing a water pipe costs approximately \$250 per foot and noted that the City maintains about 140 miles of water pipe, which could significantly impact City finances.

b. WHY DID WE START THE SERVICE LEVEL PROJECT - JOHN PENROD, ASSISTANT CITY ADMINISTRATOR/CITY ATTORNEY

John reported on the Service Level Project, explaining that it was a review of the City's current service levels and whether they were sustainable under base-level budgeting. He presented a case study focused on City parks and reviewed how service levels had evolved over time. He described the 1990s as a period with minimal resources, including limited park acreage and staff performing basic maintenance tasks, followed by the early 2000s when growth required more complex systems, master plans, and the establishment of reserves. He reviewed the 2007-2008 recession, noting that maintenance funding was redirected toward operations, and the early 2010s, when sustainability plans, master plans, replacement funds, and impact fees were implemented. He stated that the City was now three years into base allocation budgeting, with no additional funding available beyond base allocations.

John explained that the primary challenge in determining service levels was how to maintain them in the future. He reported that increased maintenance costs were being applied to existing park acreage, that inflation and competition for general fund dollars continued, and that park replacement funding had not kept pace. He noted that some service levels no longer existed and that there were no allocated funds for the Left-Hand Fork property, Camp Jeremiah property, or the new Forest Service property, as these would constitute new services requiring additional funding. He also stated that there were no funds available for capital improvement projects outside of impact fees.

Councilmember Wright confirmed that the PAR tax was not included in the base allocation.

John questioned whether base allocations would be sufficient to support new services.

c. PLANNING PRIORITY LIST - TROY FITZGERALD, CITY ADMINISTRATOR

Troy reviewed past Council priority projects and discussed which projects had been completed and which remained in progress. He asked the Council whether any changes or additions should be made to the projects still underway. By consensus, the Council agreed to place the General Plan as the top priority, with the remaining projects listed below it.

Councilmember Jensen noted that planning for the north interchange and the Sunpro area on 1600 South were missing from the list.

Councilmember Millsap commented on the need for a comprehensive parking plan. He also expressed the need to include a plan related to the Hobble Creek Trail.

Councilmember Wright stated that the Reframing Downtown Project included a parking study.

Councilmember Jensen stated that Hobble Creek Canyon was a significant asset and that transportation access to the canyon could be improved to make it more enjoyable and easier to use.



92 Mayor Packard added that commercial design standards should be included within the General
94 Plan.

96 **IV. SERVICE LEVEL PROJECT INTRODUCTION**

98 **a. METHODOLOGY, COVERAGE, GENERAL FINDINGS - TROY FITZGERALD, CITY
ADMINISTRATOR**

100 Troy reported on the Service Level Project and explained that departments had been asked to
102 identify their core and supplemental services in order to understand the cost of maintaining City services
104 over time. He stated that there were 307 identified services and asked whether the Council wanted
106 additional information on the project in the future. By consensus, the Council indicated that it did.

108 Troy noted that initial conclusions were premature and that staff were still working on reports from
110 department directors. He stated that the process was challenging for directors due to funding
112 accountability, but that operations had been funded well while capital projects were limited. He
114 emphasized that the review was a process and that solutions were possible. He explained that, to remain
116 balanced, the City would need to either increase revenues and efficiencies or reduce service levels.

118 Troy reported that a document would be presented to the Council in January outlining a proposed
120 approach. He stated that maintaining current service levels would require additional revenues and that
122 citywide revenues would need to increase significantly. He noted that staff would return with a more
124 refined plan.

126 Councilmember Millsap asked whether there was a foreseeable need for a property tax increase
128 and whether the Council should be aware of that possibility.

130 Troy responded that preparation would be needed over time for future needs and that those needs
132 would continue to be reviewed.

134 **V. TEAM BUILDING - MISSION MOMENTS - JOHN PENROD, ASSISTANT CITY
ADMINISTRATOR/CITY ATTORNEY**

136 Councilmember Wright stated she was proud that Buc-ee's had located in Springville as the first
138 in Utah and expressed hope for additional commercial development to increase sales tax revenue.

140 Councilmember Millsap stated he was proud of the Spirit of Art City documentary and what it
142 represented about being a "Springvillian". He expressed hope for continued community safety,
144 particularly for walking and bicycling.

146 Councilmember Smith stated he was proud of the Parks Department and its role in reinforcing
148 Springville's identity as the Art City. He expressed a hope to change perceptions that Springville was
150 difficult to work with and to improve the City's overall image.

152 Councilmember-elect Ellingson stated she was proud of how neighbors came together during
154 potential flooding and hazard situations. She expressed hope that the Lakeside Landing development
156 would provide strong connections within the community.

158 Councilmember Snelson stated he was proud of the collaboration between Parks and Recreation
160 and the Museum and how those efforts connected with residents. He expressed hope that progress would
162 be made on the Allen's Block property over the next four years.

164 Councilmember Jensen stated he was proud of the new Springs logo and the City's ability to
166 maintain a small-town feel while other communities had changed. He noted that maintaining that
168 character would be challenging.

Troy asked the Council to identify any items that may have been missed or that stood out from the discussion.

190 Councilmember Snelson suggested exploring a public-private partnership with developers to help move the Allen's Block project forward.

192 Troy asked the Council what they would like the Allen's Block property to look like in one year.

194 Councilmember Jensen asked whether progress on Allen's Block would require additional funding or zoning changes and stated that different options would need further discussion.

196 Councilmember Millsap stated that there needed to be a discussion regarding options to advance the Allen's Block property.

198 Troy suggested returning in a future work session to further discuss and update the Council on the Allen's Block project.

200 Troy reported that the General Plan was behind its target completion date and asked the Council to consider its vision as development continued to increase.

202 Troy asked for additional guidance regarding the Council's vision for a tree program. Councilmember Jensen suggested adding the item to a to-do list, with limited staff time spent investigating grants and other options.

204 Mayor Packard stated that the entrances into Springville should be attractive and welcoming and that they reflect the City's identity. He expressed interest in seeing a plan or improvements to the entrances.

206 Troy recommended that staff review the identified priorities and return to the Council with recommendations.

208 Mayor Packard suggested prioritizing Group A items through the first of the year and beginning work on Group B items thereafter.

210 Troy reminded the Mayor and Council to plan for a budget meeting scheduled for January 14, 212 2026.

214 Councilmember Millsap asked how Group C items would be tracked. Troy responded that service level discussions occurring in the background would include those items and that they would be brought to the Council in due course.

3. Approval of the minutes for the November 18, 2025, work meeting, election canvass, and regular meeting.

Mayor Packard asked if there was any discussion on the consent agenda. There was none.

3. WORK MEETING DISCUSSIONS/PRESENTATIONS

a) Legislative Briefing from David Stewart

Dave Stewart presented and gave an overview of the upcoming legislative session. He reported that there were proposals under consideration that could result in budget cuts. He stated that Transportation Utility Fee (TUF) legislation was expected to be introduced and that property tax proposals were generating discussion. He noted that affordable housing legislation would likely be reworked during the session and that homelessness-related legislation was anticipated. He also advised that the state was considering a possible water connection fee.

b) Presentation of the Springville City Audit Report - Bruce Riddle, Assistant City Administrator/Finance Director

Bruce introduced auditor Aaron Hickson with HBME.

Aaron Hickson reported on the recent Springville City audit. He stated that the audit results were positive and commended the Finance and Treasury staff for their experience and for providing the requested information in a timely manner.

c) Memory Wall Discussion - Stacey Child, Parks and Recreation Director

Stacey introduced the Wall of Honor Committee, including Lee Taylor and Craig. She provided information on the American Legion's vision for a Memorial Wall at both Evergreen Cemetery and Springville Historic Cemetery and indicated they would like to create a memorandum of understanding. She noted that the committee sought assistance with maintaining the grounds and explained that the American Legion would handle donations and had an online system for the public to view the wall and suggest names to be added.

Councilmember Snelson stated that the project needed to move forward.

Patrick said the city could assist by including information about the Memorial Wall in the city newsletter.

d) Historical Society Discussion - Patrick Monney, Director of Administration

Patrick discussed a service level adjustment for Springville historical preservation and proposed creating a memorandum of understanding (MOU) to formalize it.

Councilmember Smith asked who would serve as the city's historical contact. Patrick responded that Kathy Hansen would work with the Historical Society.

Councilmember Snelson inquired about digitizing records and ensuring they had searchable capabilities.

Councilmember Wright noted that cataloging and digitizing could typically be done simultaneously.

Josh reported that the state historical group recommended securing records, removing them from the floor, and then prioritizing where to begin preservation efforts.

e) Property Holdings Update - Scott Sensanbaugher - Internal Services Director

Director Sensanbaugher and I.T. Systems Manager Nico Ruivivar explained that the policy required an annual report. He stated that the report would clarify current ownership and maintenance assignments, discuss future land needs, resolve discrepancies across various property lists, and produce

one authoritative list. He presented a GIS map showing current and potential future property holdings and asked the council for feedback on what they would like included in the annual report.

Councilmember Smith asked for details on the types of properties, specifically whether they were long-term holdings or remnant parcels.

Mayor Packard commented that, over time, it would be beneficial to clean up titles and boundaries.

Troy noted that staff were aware of the issues and were addressing them on a case-by-case basis, acknowledging that the process could be time-consuming and costly.

CEREMONIAL AGENDA

1. Recognition of outgoing Councilmember Craig Jensen

City Recorder Kim Crane gave a presentation recognizing Councilmember Craig Jensen for his eight years of service on the city council.

Mayor Packard thanked Councilmember Jensen for his service to the community and shared a few remarks.

2. **Mayor Awards - Jessica Maxwell, Community Health and Wellness Resource Coordinator**

The following youth were recognized and awarded the December 2025 Mayor's Award for their positive impact on their schools and the community. Jessica introduced this evening's Mayor's Youth Award recipients, Ella Martin, a senior at Springville High School, and Ella Young, a sophomore at Springville High School.

PUBLIC COMMENT

Mayor Packard introduced the Public Comment section of the agenda and inquired if there were any written requests to speak.

Carolyn Collett, discussed the Dry Creek area in Kelvin Grove, expressing appreciation for the mixed-use development. She spoke about studies on a variety of residential zoning and income levels, emphasizing the importance of welcoming newcomers and making space for more inclusive, mixed-use zoning.

Mayor Packard asked for a discussion or a motion on the consent agenda.

Motion: Councilmember Millsap moved to approve the consent as written. **Councilmember Wright seconded** the motion. **Roll Call Vote: Voting Yes:** Councilmember Jensen, Councilmember Millsap, Councilmember Smith, Councilmember Snelson, and Councilmember Wright. PRESENTATIONS

5. **Traffic Violations and Nuisance Code - High School Interns**

City Attorney John Penrod introduced local high school legal interns Brooklyn Johnson and Lucas DeSilva.

Brooklyn Johnson reported that she had been reviewing Title 9 of the city code and offered recommendations to update and standardize it. She noted the increasing number of roundabouts and suggested including guidance on how to use them, as well as updating presentations related to school property.

Mayor Packard suggested enacting the changes Brooklyn had recommended.

John stated that the interns would continue working on the proposed amendments.

Lucas DeSilva presented on nuisances and their impact on the community, including environmental damage, harm to the city's reputation, and declining property values. He described the city's current voluntary compliance agreements and suggested implementing a chronic nuisance ordinance, citing an example from Denver that includes fees for repeated offenses. He asked the council what additional measures could be considered.

Councilmember Snelson inquired about how nuisances are currently reported.

John explained that enforcement could be tailored depending on council priorities and that high-priority nuisances could be addressed through resolutions.

Councilmember Snelson emphasized the need for a more proactive approach.

90 Troy provided an explanation of current efforts and indicated that further discussion and planning
would continue.

94 **6. Discussion regarding an amendment to City Code regarding chickens - Lance Haight, Public
Safety Director**

96 Chief Haight provided a follow-up on the existing chicken ordinance, reviewing the current city
code. He noted there was confusion regarding the code and recommended amending it to limit residents
to six chickens, no roosters, and only for personal use. He also confirmed that the current requirements
98 for housing chickens would remain.

Councilmember Smith asked how the ordinance would be enforced.

100 Chief Haight explained that the animal control and nuisance officer would review the lot size and
the number of chickens in response to any nuisance complaints.

102 Mayor Packard opened the floor for public comment.

The wife of Mr. Anderson commented regarding the number of chickens allowed.

104 Michael Anderson, via telephone, expressed frustration about a dispute concerning the number
of chickens and parcel size, noting that they currently have 36 chickens and there is confusion about how
106 the law is written.

John suggested bringing the matter to a future work session for further discussion and to allow
108 property owners to provide input, with a recommendation to contact the property owners when the
meeting is scheduled.

of the current SUVPS Station along Dry Creek and approval of an access easement to SUVPS

the Dry Creek Trail to make improvements to the trail and the adjacent city-owned property. One of the

142 easement is needed.

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2025 SPRINGVILLE CITIZENS' VIEWPOINTS

History of the study

The purpose of this section of the code book is to provide a procedural history for the 2025 Springville Citizen's Viewpoints survey and to provide not only the specific methods of data collection and processing, but some context as to decisions that were made. The study is unique in that (1) it was undertaken at the request of the City of Springville, and (2) samples a cross-section of Springville residents to evaluate their perceptions regarding city services, the quality of life in the community, and to seek input for improving services.

Overview and project history

The 2025 Springville Citizens' Viewpoints study was a household survey of residents in Springville, Utah, building on prior data collection efforts conducted between 2004 and 2023. Survey fieldwork for the 2025 wave occurred from October through December. Consistent with earlier waves (2004–2023), the initial mailing included a personalized cover letter, a paper copy of the survey, and a postage-paid return envelope. Diverging from earlier mail-only efforts (2004–2021), but consistent with the 2023 wave, the 2025 Springville Citizens' Viewpoints survey also offered respondents the option to complete the survey electronically.

A multiple-wave data collection protocol was employed to maximize response rates while minimizing coverage error. After removing addresses included in the previous (2023) wave of the Springville Citizens' Viewpoints study, ten independent cross-sectional samples ($n = 500$ each) were randomly selected from the City of Springville's residential electric billing address list. Prior to sampling, business, landlord, and vacant addresses were removed from the sampling frame to the extent possible. The first cross-sectional sample was mailed via the U.S. Postal Service on Wednesday, 1 October 2025. Seven additional samples were subsequently fielded over the following seven weeks, with approximately one sample mailed per week. After mailing the eighth sample on 21 November 2025, the decision was made to discontinue further mailings. Although sampling efforts were designed to ensure coverage across the entire city, the study does not meet the criteria for formal neighborhood stratification. Nevertheless, the overall sample size was sufficiently large to yield an adequate number of responses from each neighborhood.

Respondent anonymity

To ensure complete anonymity, surveys did not include names or any other identifying information. In cases where respondents voluntarily provided identifying details, all such information was carefully redacted from the final dataset.

Sample and Response Rate

Of the 5,000 addresses contacted for the study, the U.S. Postal Service returned 92 survey packets as undeliverable (e.g., deceased, moved). In addition, two individuals

explicitly refused to participate via return letter or electronic communication. Eighty-five blank online surveys were submitted and were subsequently classified as refusals. After accounting for these cases, the final sample consisted of 4,821 eligible households. As of December 22, 2025, a total of 1,021 valid responses had been received, yielding an adjusted response rate of 21.17%.

Data Cleaning and assigning numerical values to assigned responses

Data users should note that all responses were obtained through self-administered questionnaires. No interviewer was present to assist respondents with skip patterns, clarify question intent, or monitor whether the survey was completed as instructed. As a result, the data collection process relied on respondents to interpret questions appropriately and to follow all instructions correctly. Overall, we believe the questionnaire functioned effectively for its intended purposes: assessing residents' perceptions of city services, evaluating quality of life in the community, and soliciting input for service improvement. However, a small number of respondents either chose not to, were unwilling, or were unable to follow all survey instructions. For example, a respondent may have failed to answer a filter question but nonetheless proceeded to complete subsequent items in that section. In such cases, the unanswered filter question was coded as missing. Consistent with best practices, all responses are coded exactly as provided by respondents; non-responses were coded as missing.

Numeric values were assigned to survey responses with two primary goals: (1) to preserve the substantive meaning of respondents' answers as closely as possible, and (2) to retain variation in responses. The specific coding scheme is detailed in the "Numerical Values Assigned to Responses" section of the codebook. Multiple quality-control procedures were implemented to ensure accurate coding, including review of frequency distributions and checks for illegal or improbable values. When necessary, the original questionnaire was consulted to resolve ambiguities. Despite these efforts, it is likely that some minor errors or data anomalies remain. As such issues are identified by data users, we will evaluate their scope and determine the feasibility of correction.

Following established survey research practices, open-ended responses were transcribed as faithfully as possible from the original questionnaires. When transcribing written comments, we endeavored to reproduce responses exactly as they appeared on the questionnaire, except in cases where comments included identifying information, which was redacted to protect respondent anonymity. Data users should be aware that many respondents completed written responses hastily, often with limited attention to grammar, punctuation, handwriting, or spelling. This haste occasionally complicated the transcription process, and some transcription errors may remain. As with coding issues, any transcription errors brought to our attention will be reviewed to assess their extent and the feasibility of correction.




Figure 1: overlaying neighborhood schemas

#34 – What is one thing that you feel the city could do to make Springville a better place to live?

Springville has an “detrimental” attitude of maintaining “a small town” feel and has a notorious reputation of being hard to work with when starting new businesses, building new homes, remodel homes and commercial property construction.

The problems come because of a lack of vision for the city and lack of permit transparency: a lack of complete requirements stated on permits, inconsistency with inspector’s requirements, unnecessary permits for small projects on one’s property and inconsistency in issuing permits.

Examples: All are actual experiences from people I know, told to me directly. No hearsay info.

1. Building a home – took 2 yrs to get permit finalized to build a home as requirements kept being added; each time an item was complete, another was added
2. Development of property – daughter wanted to build a home on back half of father’s lot; city would not give an easement but required a full street with sidewalk to be put in. Would have required an adjacent house owned by the father, where a son lives, to be torn down
3. Another landowner was given an easement permit for basically the same scenario as #2
4. Developer – big project, nearing completion, inspector required developer to bury powerlines costing \$20,000+, not on the original permit nor budgeted for

5. Family remodeling a deck – took 2 years because each time an item was completed, it was not accepted even when completed exactly as instructed, or another item was added

The permit process needs to be streamlined, made consistent with all requirements clearly stated, have uniform inspections by educated inspectors, don't over regulate property owners.

The "small town" attitude has gone overboard. We have one decent restaurant, 2 MacDonalds, many fast-food places, a ton of credit unions and banks, but no place to shop or go for family entertainment like a movie theater or bowling alley. And only a few people golf! So, we give our tax dollars to Spanish Fork and Provo.

The city worries about building more affordable housing. The city needs more than "affordable housing"! The west side of town has commercial businesses but not any that would be frequented for entertainment or shopping. That area could be developed into a multi-use area that could have housing, shopping – a "live & walk" atmosphere and be accessed from both town and the freeway from all towns along the I-15 corridor, especially south of us, if the city would let go of the "small town" mentality and look at the opportunities and options. We don't have shopping, except 3 grocery stores because businesses need to be sought after, encouraged to come and get established here. And not have be so hard to get started that they leave and go to SF or other places.

If the west side was developed well, it would not have to affect the center part of Springville. The last time downtown was really a fun place to go was when Town & Country Gift store was operating. If that is the feel the city wants. Then they need to update, remodel and create an environment that draws people in. It needs some destination places – an art store, a gift shop, a office supply store, a real playhouse theater, more "nice, sit down" restaurants, etc. It needs to say, "come and linger a while" "walk down the street" "say Hi to friends". And it needs parking.

Not everyone uses the splash pad, the canyon or the golf course. Those are seasona options. The library has a cold atmosphere – drab, not warm and welcoming. Warm it up!!! Downtown is not inviting. It is very unattractive!!! It's a place to drive through to get someplace else, or to go to the city center for business, or UPS store or eat at Magleby's. Not much else.

ID 271: nothing

ID 362: The sidewalks need updating, specifically among areas that have been developed for a while, E. Center Street

ID 364: Do something with the Old Allen's Shopping Center, Enforce property codes (Junk in yards)

ID 365: Continued improvement of shopping. With everything in Spanish Fork, I'm not sure that is possible For Springville

ID 366: Some improvement on traffic control on Canyon Road

ID 367: Enforce & follow through on neighbors parking in front of our mailbox & us not receiving our mail. Also parking cars on grass and yards. Trashy!

ID 368: Save open spaces no more housing developments

ID 370: Create more bike paths!!! Also, we would love to deter cars from using our street (1150 North) as a commuter street.

ID 371: More businesses to help bring in income & grow our city. Spanish fork as done a wonderful job---we have not!

ID 372: Improving the traffic flow.

ID 373: More options for recreation and family venues. More attention to over-all property maintenance!

ID 374: Just control the population.

ID 375: During peak traffic times, Main St & 400 S are very frustrating to navigate

ID 378: Less high density housing. Too many town homes, condos apartments etc. Build more single family homes. There is so much traffic around these developments. People want to live in homes.

ID 380: Nice restaurants, no more fast food do something with the old Allens grocery store.

ID 381: Fire {name redacted}!

ID 382: Fix up Allens area (400 S. Main St)

ID 383: Our neighborhood has a busy street, this causes people to speed we've asked for speed bumps in our neighborhood & have never gotten any. We also need more street lights and brighter ones. Our area has houses with multiple cars that cover the street and very messy yards. We'd like more activities for our children: roller skating rink, bowling, arcade, etc. A bigger rec center. Some older elementaries need updating. A dog park, nicer looking water retention areas. More trees more hiking/biking trails community garden. Tax incentive for keeping yard clean or planting native plants and trees. Enforce parking restrictions/ junk cars lingering on streets.

ID 384: More roundabouts – better traffic flow. 4th South is crazy. Canyon Road is too busy. Be kinder – listen more too people

ID 386: Better access to urgent Healthcare facilities. Not all health insurances cover local facilities and the emergency rooms in Provo and Spanish Fork get over loaded quickly.

ID 387: There is a roundabout at 1750W and 900S. From the roundabout, create/build a street due east, across the tracks, and hook up with 1200W. This would avoid going up to 400S or down to 1600S if I want to go east

ID 388: Fill in the empty/abandoned lots with more new things to do. As well as expedite public transportation! This city is not walkable anymore, and hasn't been for a long time.

ID 400: Control traffic speeds on main roads

ID 401: Reduce traffic noise, enforce speed limits

ID 403: Improve trails. Connect hobble creek trail to Utah Lake and put it by the creek!

ID 405: Improve junky houses and yards

ID 406: Enforce HOA requirements and clean up the multifamily housing that is delapidated.

ID 407: Change code enforcement back (out of police department) The sidewalk in our neighborhood is unusable due to 4' high weeds in the city park strip. It makes it difficult for drivers to see cars coming. Several of us have contacted the city + nothing happens. It is not a safe situation

ID 408: Try to attract or construct a bowling alley that would have at least 8 to 10 lanes + include 2 to 3 pool tables, several ping-pong tables, and several pin-ball machines. We would have loved to have that kind of entertainment available locally while we were raising our family during their early youth and teen years.

ID 409: Improve traffic on major roads (Main + 4th South)

ID 410: Clean up plat A neighborhoods

ID 411: Keep population as a smaller community. Don't overgrow too fast!

ID 413: Improve down town area. CB is a great start but do something with the old Allen's Market. The parking lot has turned into a used car lot surrounded by food trucks. This is a pivotal intersection in our down town area. Especially coming right off the freeway. This area is screaming for improvement

ID 414: Revitalize Allen's block

ID 415: Deal with traffic issues. No more low income housing

ID 416: enforce speed especially on streets near High School & 400 E

ID 418: do something w/ the Allen's lot (that's not high density housing – we don't have the infrastructure to support that)

ID 419: Honestly the city is doing a great job.

ID 420: 1. DO NOT actively seek any more "BIG BOX" retailers within "2 miles" of existing neighborhoods! Spanish Fork is an example of Retail Development "Run AMOK"! No thank you!! Traffic near those corridors is absolutely insane. And if Springville residents NEED those

products we can drive to them in Provo, Spanish Fork, Orem, etc ... Let THEM deal w/ the negative traffic & aesthetics of such dev.'s!!

2. Provo's downtown is a better example of a cool, inviting downtown w/ character. (Emulate that!)

3. Try to attract more Restaurants that are full service, and serve alcohol. (Not everyone is LDS!) I am a former restaurant industry executive – the dining options for dinner are very poor (except Maggleby's). We drive to Spanish Fork , Orem, or Provo a few nights a week, but even they offer only mostly chain brands (like Texas Roadhouse, Olive Garden, Chili's, etc). Use tax & permitting incentives to attract these, and you will attract more affluent retiree, etc to live here...

ID 472: Slow down on housing! So many apartments/duplexes popping up near in our neighborhood and traffic already is horrible on 400 S & main. *So I guess figure out traffic too? (other than 400 S)

The traffic headed east and westbound on four south is extremely congested and most drivers drive it and excessive speed of up to 50 miles an hour or more. It appears most of these drivers live in Mapleton. The downtown is losing its luster and its charm. The city office is known for sitting on their asses and not really serving the public. We should have city employees, especially directors of departments that live here in the city so they care about where they live.. having city employees that make important decisions commute in and out of our city is a poor decision. They have no real ownership or are they affected by the decisions that are made

ID 643: Improve traffic patterns and better preparation for growth

ID 644: Enforce codes. My neighborhood has declined tremendously over the last five years and the city seems to do nothing about it. Multiple homes with unkempt yards that are terrible eyesores, single family dwellings with multiple families, sometimes upward of 20 people in a single home and cars parked up and down the streets. ID 645: Finish the older sections of town with curb, gutter, and sidewalks. Most of the time, these areas only improved with new development, but many of these existing parcels will never redevelop and the city should invest the funds to finish these projects.

ID 646: Keep Springville a quiet suburban community. Reduce businesses and commercial areas, and increase residential areas. I would like Springville to protect farmland and open space instead of building up on every piece of land. I would like more pedestrian/bike paths. I would like Springville to take better care of it's parks and green spaces and to stop over-watering them. The city government should not be telling residents to curb their water use when they are flooding some of their parks (Kelvin Grove Park is an excellent example of this) all summer long with over-watering. I would like the city council to take more of an interest in keeping western Springville beautiful and not overgrown or overly commercialized. And when citizens speak up, they should listen instead of saying they've already made a decision simply because what the city wants brings the city more money - even when it is against the wishes of all the residents living in the affected area.

ID 647: Traffic on the main roads

ID 648: Less traffic on 400 S and Main Street

ID 649: Housing for lower income families and traffic control.

ID 651: Getting Mapleton residents off our main thoroughfares. Or creating a more southerly route for them to get to their homes.

ID 652: Lower utilities and stop the high density housing in single family neighborhoods.

ID 653: We need entertainment to help keep our young families, youth staying in our town and no having to go to the neighboring towns for movies, bowling, eating out at bigger sites down family restaurants. If we want to bring in the business to our city we have to bring more than just a tons of banks on all the corners of our commercial areas. Bring in a fats cats, top golf or place that people want to gather during all times of the year and no only the summers at the resevior.

ID 654: Quicker moving traffic.

ID 655: Stop building low income housing. Preserve farm land. Make improvements to downtown and make the towns appearance better. Lower our overall city bill, it's pretty much triple what I used to pay. Open the rec center on Sunday's. We do not need to add more retail shops. Spanish fork is booming enough and causing an influx of traffic.

ID 656: Making residential roads safe for pedestrians and cyclist. We live on a wide 25 mph road with painted bike lanes. All that road design does is encourage speeding and make it unsafe for cyclist and kids.

ID 658: Traffic is horrible on 4th south. I know you are working on it with the new freeway exit/entrance.

ID 660: More events

ID 661: Improve traffic flow

ID 663: Improve the traffic issue and reduce low income housing.

ID 664: Enforce code so we don't look and feel like a trash heap or attract new citizens that like that vibe

ID 665: Improve traffic main street is always backed up and my neighborhood is always backed up after school. Why is the new light not open yet?

ID 666: More shipping options that have gone to SF

ID 667: Require wider streets without planter strips for developments. Streets are so narrow when cars are parked on street it becomes too congested and the flow of traffic is restricted. Resurface streets. Stop with the slurry seal. It is messy, causes rocks to pile up, and roads are bumpy. Neighboring cities resurface streets and it makes all the difference. Snow removal scrapes off loose rocks and creates a mess. I've seen this buildup cause accidents on bikes and other things.

ID 668: 1, Require, to the extent possible, residence to clean up their homes/yards. If someone is going to own a home they should be required to maintain and keep clean and water their lawn. The number of ppl just letting yards go to pot is ridiculous!

2.Keep pressure on the state to complete new exit on time so traffic flow/congestion improve and return to normal.

3. Provide any incentives possible to develop Allen's and surrounding area. 4. Continue developing parks and walking trails. 5. It's too late to do the right thing and put in a round about at red devil drive. Expensive, but worth every penny.

ID 669: Renovate the rivoli theater or build a performing arts space already!!! We need a stage big enough to accommodate a full orchestra, and a place to show community plays. Also do something centered on the arts with the Allen's block!! Something wholesome that connects people together, in person, like a dance hall.

ID 670: Develop the bike trials and make it safer to walk and bike.

ID 671: Maintain a high level of public safety to slow growth of crime. Maintain roads, sidewalks and parks (keep clean, drug and graffiti free).

ID 672: Be more walkable or easier to bike around. Also the cops are awful every time I've needed them to help with anything with the exception of one guy after my husband got into a car wreck. I wish I remembered his name because he genuinely was the only cop from Springville I've ever thought "oh he's actually a kind person who cares about the community." All the others act like they hate us and can't believe they have to pretend to care I got robbed. When you ask other people from Utah county who has the meanest cops they always say Springville or Mapleton. I also have black in laws that have said they don't come to visit because they are treated like criminals here.

ID 674: Quit building apartments

ID 675: Make better use of the money the City already has.

ID 678: Eliminate high density housing!!!

ID 683: Strengthen families and slow the growth! I moved out of Orem because it was getting too big.

ID 684: We need sidewalks. I love walking everywhere but it is truly mind boggling how I can't walk to stores, restaurants shops etc. that I can see from my house without walking on poorly paved roads that don't have curbs or sidewalks.

ID 685: I would love for the city to apply more funding to recycling initiatives. It seems counterproductive to charge for recycling services, rather it should be incentivized for residents to recycle. Along with that, there could be cleanup programs. Many older neighborhoods have homes and yards that are filled with junk to a level that I haven't seen on an collective level elsewhere in Salt Lake or Utah county.

ID 686: Traffic on both exits seems to get pretty bad. Traffic in general seems to be a big issue. Fair amount of accidents each day it seems on 400 S. New exit will hopefully help

ID 687: find a new Public Works Director that is progressive willing to listen to the citizens, not stuck on the ways of prior years and has a vision for the future of our city. for example, a neighboring city has at least 15 roundabouts and Springville has two maybe three. That is a way

to improve traffic flow. Remove some of the congestion and make the road a safer place for both citizens and drivers. He can start with Center Street and fourth E. Unfortunately, he has encouraged the city leaders to disregard the idea of roundabouts where they should've been put in could've been put in, and if there was an increasing cost, it would've been worth it to for public safety.

ID 689: Get a Trader Joe's please!

ID 690: Google fiber apparently goes to part of the city, if its infrastructure was improved this would give a much better option than other providers (Xfinity) who are a bit of a scam - you have to cancel your membership every year with them or they raise the price every month on you.

ID 693: Expand pedestrian trails

ID 694: Get rid of old unused buildings on Main Street and get rid of all the cheap motels and car dealerships on Main Street. Just clean up the city.

ID 695: Less multi family housing. We already are being told we don't have enough water. Slow down multi family homes.

ID 697: Improve the downtown area(Allen's, Burger King)

ID 698: Improve traffic congestion, and actually enforce traffic laws.

ID 699: Not much. You hit it out of the park with Buc-ee's! 😊

ID 701: Reduce utility costs

ID 702: Focus less on all the arts

ID 703: bring in more stores and restaurants to the commercial area. Why do they always go to Spanish fork?

ID 704: Take care of the used car lot, food truck, Allen's market corner eye sore that's been sitting there for a decade

ID 705: Control public property weeds, make a playground/park closer to our home. There is space, yet parks/playground keep being developed within the same few blocks.

ID 706: Do something about the Allen's block! ☺ and somehow bring back Art City Trolley

ID 707: More business development for residents to spend there money here and have better food and shopping options. and tax base to lessen the burden on property tax.

ID 708: Manage the growth in ways that maintain green space and still provide housing for the coming generation. We need more affordable housing.

ID 709: As a part of city development plan for the traffic too

ID 710: Do more to attract businesses. Lots of tax dollars go to Spanish Fork or Provo due to lack of shopping and dining options. Allen's is an extreme eye sore. Why not develop it?

ID 711: More bike trails, dog parks, and pedestrian features like the stone steps installed next to the river near the library.

ID 712: More access to good shopping and restaurants especially on 400 S. Provide more places for kids/teenagers to hang out and socialize.

ID 713: Springville City officials are known to be very difficult to work with when compared to other surrounding cities in the valley. My recommendation would be to change attitudes and be happy and welcoming and willing to work with residents and incoming business alike. Don't just turn off power when a bill is not paid, see if it's a problem with a credit card on your on-line payment program. Don't just give someone a ticket on their property without a warning that the weeds are out of control. Work with people! Be happy! Find a win win situation that works for both parties. Put your mallet away and come to the table! Let's change that reputation!

ID 715: Continue growth.

ID 716: Better enforcement of code violations to keep yards and home looking neat. Continued improvement to park and making them more accessible to those with disabilities (sidewalks and parking that are maintained)

ID 717: - Please build out the bike path along hobble creek. We're down by 1500 W. and it currently only goes along a small stretch of the river.

- We would also love more enforcement for neighbors to not let their yards go to crap. We don't have an HOA, so they don't have to be perfect, but some of them get 2-3' tall weeds sometimes.

ID 718: Focus on controlling drug activity, limiting annual housing development, and preserving the town's low-density, historic character.

ID 719: -Get rid of half of staff at the city office buildings.

- Troy needs to go.
- Josh need to go.
- Brad needs to go.
- Fire Cheif should have been gone 5 years ago.
- Police chief doesn't need to be working on his second retirement here.
- Rec dept needs to give up sports on Saturdays. Look at Mapleton. All kids stuff is during the week. So much better. I know so many people that do rec in Mapleton because of this. "

ID 720: Leave wild land wild instead of developing everything.

ID 723: Make the pickleball courts next to the rec center a much bigger complex with many more courts (use the Spanish Fork Complex as an example) and add restroom facilities, drinking fountains/ bottle refill and lots of green grass, playground, walking/ jogging path and surround with trees etc.. it is much more fun when you can pick up games with other couples and teens love to come in groups for a wholesome activity. A big must (unlike Sp Fk) is that the rack for

paddes must be by each gate entry to each court. This ensures the waiting players are next up after the current game finishes.(see Sharon Pickleball Courts in Orem for the best example. The property taxes need to be reduced. We need DOGE badly. There is a HUGE conflict of interest with the current representatives that have a stake and make profit in building facilities and monopolizing such as not allowing Lowe's because the Sunroc ownership didn't want the competition. This is dirty and abusive and makes us pay higher prices at the store and in taxes and I personally and beyond fed up. The nerve to raise taxes during Covid was appalling and disgusting and the level of increase in both rate and general inflation increase is insane.

ID 724: More retail, community events

ID 725: We have noticed Springville going downhill in the recent years. Weeds everywhere from businesses to private homes. It is looking more and more trashy which is so sad to see.

ID 726: Be careful with high density housing that brings lots of traffic in a small area.

ID 727: The coty looks a little rundown. Clean up / repair sidewalks and borders between streets and sidewalks. They look awful. Enforce codes requiring well-maintained, clutter-free yards. Require the owners of ""Allen's"" to clean up their property, a major eyesore that makes the city look rundown. All of these things contribute to the "Broken Window" syndrome. Enforce illegal dumping laws. The area down by the railroad tracts and creek. It looks like a landfill. W1400N and N400 W. It's really bad. All that trash flows in or creeks and Utah Lake. Also illegal dumping up Hobbie Creek Canyon Road is getting worse. Mainly around the flood basin and the roadsides beer the Hobbie Creek trail parking area. The street lines could use some repairing. And a more reflective type of paint. In the rain at night it's hard to see the lanes, crosswalks and turn lanes due to glare. Also the lanes up hobble creek are almost nonexistent. Hope they will be repainted soon. It would also be nice to see more Police patrols up the canyon road as well as enforcing the speed limit on the Hobbie Canyon road. The people and the animals would appreciate it. There is a car that has been abandon on the side of the road for almost a year. Past The "Cottages" community.

ID 728: Expand the rec center facilities! We love the workers and offerings, but the facility itself is a bit cramped and could really use some more classrooms and a better child care. It would also be great to have fans installed in the basketball court area.

ID 729: better public transportation

ID 730: More affordable single family homes (not apartments/townhomes, actual homes)

ID 731: More parks and more biking and hiking trails

ID 732: Stop spending resources on being the Art City. Nobody cares. Just be a good city.

ID 733: Reduce traffic or help it move better through the city, especially on 400 and main, when they have the farmers market and things like that.

ID 734: MY ROAD 1300 E IS SO NOISY (center and 1300). ANY EFFORT TO MITIGATE TRAFFIC FROM COMING ON TO 1300 WOULD BE GREATLY APPRECIATED

ID 735: Small single family homes

ID 736: Better roads in neighborhood. Narrow roads are the worst. They don't work here in town.

ID 737: Revitalize downtown

ID 738: I don't think you can stop this, but it seems like all the murders happen in Springville and Utah County

ID 739: Moving cars off the street that have not moved in months. Trash and garbage in yard cleaned up

ID 740: Do something with the old Allen's- it doesn't attract growth

ID 741: Address traffic on Main Street during rush hour

ID 742: Lower utility costs

ID 743: Continue mitigating conflicts of interest in our city offices and public business dealings. Mark the minutes of city YouTube videos to help watchers. Develop a city program to help residents successfully manage their finances and road to retirement. This can double as a way to yoke us together and provide service opportunities. Higher property taxes.

ID 746: Traffic on Main Street

ID 747: More sit down food options

ID 748: Fix the HUGE traffic issues on main streets throughout Springville.

ID 754: More affordable housing options!

ID 755: Speed up traffic solutions on 400 S and on Main Street

ID 756: Improve traffic

ID 758: Speed humps on 800 S or somehow crack down on unreasonably noisy cars.

ID 760: Make it more pedestrian and bicycle friendly, educate users of E scooters and E bicycles to follow basic safety and traffic rules

ID 761: I don't know

ID 762: Improve fire and police. Separate the two departments they should not both be ran by the police chief. He doesn't know how to run or what is best for a fire department he will only fight for police which he doesn't do a great job at that either. ID 783: The park in our area has playground equipment that is old and in disrepair to the extent that I feel some pieces are unsafe for my grandchildren to play on.

ID 784: Develop the Allen eye sore corner!

ID 785: More shopping opportunities

ID 786: Multiple: 1) Incentivize solar panels/batteries - net metering! 2) Have some actual worthwhile bike trails and lanes. Current trails are pathetic, bike lanes are basically non-existent. 3) Narrower roads slow down traffic. 4) Chill out in the permitting department.

ID 788: Active transportation, Frontrunner station, traffic on main street, and public safety

ID 829: Clean up yards junk and trash

ID 831: More stores so I don't have to travel to Spanish and north

ID 833: Speeders and those that run red lights. It is terrible.

ID 834: Reduce the traffic noise on 400 S 2600 W.

ID 835: Lower taxes

ID 836: More variety in restaurants/more restaurants. More perks for public employee teachers

ID 837: Lighten traffic

ID 839: Less taxes

ID 840: I'm sure you hear this a lot but I would like to see the old Allen's turned into useable space of some kind. It has been the main eyesore in the city for a decade.

ID 841: Add more restaurants and places to eat. Also shopping places. We need more commercial as well as walking/biking trails.

ID 843: You're doing great!

ID 845: More businesses

ID 846: We need a good hangout space for teenagers like a bowling alley or something. If they had a place to go they be safer having a safe place or hangout spot. Also, a family hangout spot as well!

ID 847: More walking trails please! So many people on the roads it can get dangerous

ID 849: Improve traffic.

ID 850: Enforcement of codes and cracking down on unregistered businesses being ran from houses

ID 851: I would love to fix up the old Allen's and Blockbuster property. It would be great to get new businesses and clean up that look.

ID 852: Improve the flow of traffic. Connect 1200 W from 400 S to center st

ID 853: reduce homelessness and petty theft

ID 856: I was unaware Springville had any trails or biking paths. Can these be more in the public notice?

ID 857: Build the roads too handle the growing population before the building is complete.

ID 858: Adjust city ordinance to allow for taller building development so the Allen's Block can be developed in a way that will allow developers to be profitable for the space

ID 859: Less junk housing and more business, eating, entertainment and shopping places.

ID 860: Plan better for growth and development. There has been too much, too fast, without adequate infrastructure.

ID 861: A little more retail but not blown up like Spanish Fork. I like the small town feel. Also do something with the deserted Allens. It's been like that for years and it's an eyesore.

ID 862: Improve the flow of traffic, more restaurants, more retail, but keep it near the freeway.

ID 863: Add a few new restaurants. Not fast food

ID 864: Get a new city manager that cares about the citizens instead of his own agenda. He is way over paid and has too much power.

ID 865: Provide more information about parks and recreation. A map of the city showing where parks and other venues are would be a great help.

ID 866: NO TRAX.

ID 868: Enforce speed limits on main st, center st and US-89

ID 869: Clean up the junk.

ID 870: Public transport. Alternative transport (i.e. Bike/walk trails interconnected throughout the city and to other cities

ID 871: Increase its tax base with more businesses

ID 873: Don't charge extra for recycling. Make it opt in, and revoke if people don't respect it or contaminate.

ID 875: Bussiness/building/commerce. Please have better use of businesses. There are too many delapidated buildings just sitting there rotting. GET RIDE OF THE OLD ALLENS and use that section of land better. Do not make it housing. There are too many banks, McDonald's, and car washes. WHY is a TANNING business coming to town? Nobody tans anymore. Also have better understanding of your community. Very little people drink coffee here yet they built a Human Bean last year and guess what.... Of COURSE it didnt survive and it is already closed. A 6 year old could have told you that was going to happen. And now with the way Springville building works the building will just sit there for years or get taken over by Mexican food. Also all those new business buildings by Swig are still empty. Finally, why is the world would you build TWO GYMS right next to each other in the same part of town??? There are about 4 run down building on the north side of town you could have knocked down and rebuilt a rec center or gym over there. I do not understand!!!!

ID 876: Revitalize Main Street. Bring in businesses that can help support the tax base and provide goods and services we currently leave town to access.

ID 878: Create more natural spaces and limit water/lawn usage of new housing

ID 880: Better police control of speeders & bad driving.

ID 881: reduce car dependence. specifically, disallow ALL curbside parking within the city, increase pedestrian and cycling-friendly infrastructure (including buses), increase local taxes on gas-powered (non-electric) vehicles, replace city vehicles with EV, add public EV charging stations, i have other ideas and suggestions as well.

ID 882: -Fix 400 south! It's ALWAYS backed up!

ID 883: Handicap access. You need to have fishing and handicap parking closest to the parking lot not furthest away! Let us register our license plates and then forget the color paper we have to come get to authorize vehicles at bartholomew.

ID 884: Revitalize downtown

ID 885: it looks so run down and old in many areas. Sidewalks are destroyed. More relevant shopping opportunities. Horrible traffic on main roads.

ID 886: traffic flow and reducing traffic

ID 890: We desperately need a sidewalk on our corner, 200 N, 400 E. We saw some kids almost get hit there trying to get to school. The accessibility there needs to be improved.

ID 892: Reduce traffic.

ID 896: Constant enforcement of weed and junk tree removal, debris, vehicles not parked on pavement, and junk piled around houses and doorways. I feel like it attracts crime and allows irresponsibility of residents it also gives impressions to others that they can be as careless as well. There is no pride in what they have worked their whole life for. And once one neighbor lets things go it starts to ripple effect for the entire neighborhood. I also believe it would help with crime if things were properly taken care of on their property, meaning bushes, trimmed trees, trimmed clutter, and debris, removed where it is easy to see if someone is out of place at any time of the day or night.

To maintain the quality and character of the city, the development of additional high-density housing should be strictly forbidden

ID 937: -City planning, maintaining Springville's identity with smaller town vibes and focus on art, outdoor beauty. We could use more retail options downtown, off the freeway exits - Bucees hopefully will prove to be a great win.
