

Mayor O'Hare said we're back on the record. Folks, sorry about that, everybody. We just want to make sure that the record states that the recorder stopped, so we had to get it downloaded, and now we're back. Okay, continue.

LuAnn asked So do we have the funds to do that? Because if we don't go with Morgan at \$75,100.

Tammie said yes, there is.

LuAnn asked okay, and then, do we have the money if I find out how much it would be for the county to come out with gravel and fix 800 on the shoulders.

Tammie asked how much would that be?

LuAnn said I don't know.

Mayor O'Hare said We have to vote on it next month anyway.

Tammie said if you get a bid, we can.

Mayor O'Hare asked So what's in the you said \$218 is in the budget?

Tammie said Yeah, well, there's \$218,000.

Mayor O'Hare said Okay.

LuAnn asked for the roads.

Tammie said yes.

Mayor O'Hare said we are not spending it all right.

LuAnn said right.

Mayor O'Hare said I just want everybody to notice there's \$218 in the budget, in the roads bank, and this would cost us \$75.

LuAnn said \$ 75,100 if we go with Morgan.

Tammie said I would think, like, I would try to, maybe not spend more than \$100,000 like, so if the other gravel stuff is less than twenty five, I would just try to keep like, \$100,000.

LuAnn said Okay.

Tammie said for major repairs.

LuAnn said Okay.

Mayor O'Hare said so do you have to have Morgan do it. It'll leaves us \$142,900 in the roads and bridges, and then hopefully it won't cost too much more, I would check with Morgan to see how much it would cost to taper it there on 800 North. Oh, to see if they can taper it there. How much did it cost extra to taper it? And then, since they're out here anyway, and then if it's not that much more than what the county is going to charge us.

LuAnn said he said he could bring his mill out. That's what the original plan was yesterday. And then after we talked to the his boss, he said, No, that we'll just do it for free. So I don't know what they were going to do, but okay, I'll call him first thing in the morning. I'll let everybody know.

Mayor O'Hare said Okay.

LuAnn asked Do we want to go with Morgan? Then.

Trisha said yeah, I make a motion to go with Morgan paving.

Mayor O'Hare said Okay, so we have a motion from Trish for Morgan Paving to come out and do 100 North and 800 North. Mayor O'Hare said Do I have a second?

Heather said Second.

Mayor O'Hare said Heather, Second. All in favor? Aye, any opposed? Okay, it's passed with Morgan Paving.

LuAnn said so what did you tell me? If they come out and know the size I have, how much do I have \$25,000 more?

Tammie said I mean, I would just recommend not. I would leave money in, like, don't completely use it all.

LuAnn said so if we ask them to mill it, if they can do up there for this much, for some money, then it's okay?

Tammie said yeah.

LuAnn said I'll ask Yeah, and I'll let everyone know.

Tammie said yeah tell them we need to vote on it before.

LuAnn said I'll call him, and then I'll let you, and then I'll text you guys tomorrow so we can vote, because they want to get it scheduled, and then we want to have it done before we do our detour with the bridge, which won't happen till the end of August anyway.

Mayor O'Hare said So it was 75,100 right?

LuAnn said \$75,100.

Mayor O'Hare said Okay, so I've got to redo that. I'm sorry, folks. So for the streets and road, the bid is Morgan Pavement is for \$75,100 to do 100 North and 800 North. Do I have a motion for that?

Trisha said I make a motion to accept Morgan Payment for \$75,000 to do 800 North, 100 whatever.

Mayor O'Hare said Okay, I got a motion from Trish. Do I have a second?

Heather said Second.

Mayor O'Hare said I have a second from Heather.

All in favor?

Any opposed?

Okay, it's passed. Sorry, I forgot to say the amount.

Trisha said is that all?

Mayor O'Hare said Yeah. Okay, so our Parks and Cemetery positions have been filled for the Park. We have Matt Wilcock who has been hired to do the Park, and with the Cemetery, we have Brent Johnson, and they are doing that also with the Cemetery, just so everybody knows, Council Members know. But we did purchase a new town, purchased a new riding lawnmower, and it has been paid for and delivered, and it's doing a great job up there.

Trisha said I just have one thing to add. I had somebody reach out to me. Maybe they were thinking about trying to get a fundraiser together to gather up some money for the Cemetery, or maybe just their family donate some money.

LuAnn said We used to get donations. Do we get any donations anymore?

Trisha said Okay, so a donation would be good if they decided to do a project, or if we all got together, did a fundraiser. Is there any idea of a project?

LuAnn said so Keith and Carol Thompson did the most awesome thing. They made this book that has everything mapped.

Stacey said Yeah.

LuAnn said so what we need to do, but we got to do it in a way. We've been trying to think something up so that when he mows, he doesn't have to go around any more things besides what he's doing. But we need to make we need to have posts or some kind of identifying something on the end of each row that names a through whatever we go to, you know. So that when we put it up on the board or have the book, you know, we probably won't put the book up there, because there's too much vandalism, I think, unless we lock it. But we need to have something that will say, this is row A, B, C, D, E, F, so that everybody knows where, which aisle you're on.

Trisha asked, "Did we get a copy that we can whack, you know, somehow make weatherproof to put up on that board that's already up there?" There used to be something

Mayor O'Hare said we can do it, it's not that hard.

Stacey said Jim Beagley and Kay Harris were going to make something like that to put up there so that it would be accessible and everybody could see where the graves are.

Trisha said Yeah, that's what they know. They haven't done anything. So there's another idea. I'm just trying to get some ideas there volunteering on why not?

Kjerstin said I know there's a lot of it that could be used, like there's no grass in Marilyn's.

Trisha said that was another thing. If they donated that money, we could have pest control.

LuAnn said not only pest control, but we could have, we could get weed spray for the dandelions and, you know, that kind of stuff. So that might be a Brent's been planting grass on all of the graves. But then we have badgers that completely destroyed, about dug some people up. I mean, you would believe it. He's killed two up there so far this year, two badgers and and he's hoping, and, well, there was babies. He's still scoping that out. So hopefully we can get rid of all of them, but, but they've made a mess of everything. And the moles, you have moles as well, because moles just make the mounds. But you don't, they don't come out, yeah, and they just make the big mounds.

Mayor O'Hare said Yeah.

Trisha said So I'm thinking maybe if they want to do a donation and want to put together a fundraiser so we could make some more money, and that would probably be better

than we could use it for pest control and weed control. And I did tell them that Keith and Carol Thompson had done that book. So if we can get something put together, we should, we should do that.

Stacey said there are two books,

Mayor O'Hare said Yeah, one is here.

LuAnn said yeah, Brett has one, and Stacey, there's one here. And they've really, it's awesome. They did a great job.

Stacey said that Carol said if we gave them a flash drive, and they can plug it in. We can pull anything up too. So an add.

Mayor O'Hare said and that's something we can get over to them to put on the website too.

Trisha said Oh, yeah.

LuAnn said But another thing also is a lot of places where the people have put their headstones. The sprinkling system doesn't go to those places, like on the very outside by the so that's why you have the dry grass.

Kjerstin said right.

LuAnn said the dead grass, and the ones up on the north, on the west side, there's no sprinkling system up there. But that's where they still wanted to put their headstones, so there's no way to water it.

Kjerstin said Yeah, that's what somebody I was talking to was saying, that that's what they thought the problem was, was that there's no water, like, there's no way to water there.

LuAnn said right there where Leonard and Maryland there is no water there.

Kjerstin said I'm like, you're not burying me here. I don't want to be buried in the weeds.

LuAnn said there's no water.

Kjerstin said I guess I won't care at that point.

LuAnn said, and they go around and around like that, but where they picked it was right up against that fence, and there's just the water that's reached there.

Kjerstin said Well, if you need assistance upgrading the system, I'm sure Matt.

LuAnn said it's a brand-new system that we just put in last year.

Kjerstin said, but like adding a set or whatever. Matt would be willing to help with whatever.

LuAnn said Okay.

Kjerstin said so, like Brett and him could figure out what the problem is. If there's something they can do to fix it, I'm sure he would help.

Mayor O'Hare said anything else on the Cemetery?

Trisha said No, that's everything. Sorry.

Mayor O'Hare said No, you're fine. No, you're good. You're good.

LuAnn said then I just, Brett wanted me to just tell you what they done.

Mayor O'Hare said Oh, yeah, for an update on the Cemetery.

LuAnn said he has replaced multiple sprinklers up there, and they got the weeds out of this. Tumble weeds out of there. Today, there's still a whole bunch of them on the outside. But I don't know what you do with the winds that we have.

Mayor O'Hare said I think, did the fire department go up there and burn them last year. Jed said inside the Cemetery.

Mayor O'Hare said Inside, and these are outside.

LuAnn said No these were all inside today. There were massive amounts of that. And when he got Rod Arbon with his tractor, and then he had to have a tractor to help load the old lawn, one of the old lawn ones, and he just threw it in the dump pile out to the ranch.

Mayor O'Hare said Okay, And that guy didn't want him.

LuAnn said He took one.

Mayor O'Hare said okay, and then he took one that didn't have wheels and all that on it. LuAnn said yeah, the one that didn't have wheels, yeah, he got rid of that today, all the old sprinklers that were piled up. He held all those away. He's been working his butt off up there. So,

Mayor O'Hare said okay.

LuAnn said it's starting to look better. It's getting green, a little green. He's mowed a couple of times, but it doesn't look great yet, but it will.

Mayor O'Hare said it will.

Trisha said Just a thought that came to me, Memorial Day is coming up here pretty quickly. We ought to put a little donation box with a lock on it and just check it, because I bet a lot of people would throw \$10 or \$20, bucks, you know, a little note, help us.

Cemetery. Nice. The one time of year that they come.

Mayor O'Hare said Yeah.

Trisha said maybe they're feeling a little sentimental, you know.

LuAnn said Yeah, we need to get some donations.

Stacey said we haven't received any donations for a long time. LuAnn said Yeah.

Trisha said Okay, I'm gonna see what I can do about that. If nobody is opposed to that.

LuAnn said No, that's great.

Trisha said Okay.

Kjerstin said I'm here to update on the park.

Mayor O'Hare said Park, yep.

Kjerstin said Go ahead, same thing. We're just working through all the problems. I don't think the lines got flushed or, like, blown out or whatever. So there are quite a few broken pipes.

Mayor O'Hare said They did that last year.

Kjerstin said, well, all the toilets and the sinks have some like, little repairs he's gonna do, and then the one toilet he's gonna replace that there's a problem with but, and I know Melissa, how did people rent the Park?

Mayor O'Hare said They get a hold.

Kjerstin said Okay, so I know that Melissa wants to rent the park for Cooper's graduation, so we'll try to have the by June 8.

Mayor O'Hare said So, what have toilets fixed? What?

LuAnn said Yeah, we bought a toilet last year, didn't we?

Mayor O'Hare said we just bought one for the ladies' room.

Kjerstin said Yeah. Oh, we had the toilet damage.

Mayor O'Hare said the men's ones were fixed, but the women's were leaking out the side. It was cracked and leaking water out of the side when you flushed it. So we bought a new toilet and put it in there.

Kjerstin said Yeah, so he hasn't done that yet, but we've done out of the probably 60s sprinklers. We're going to end up replacing 25 to 30 of them, I think. And then there's two here that need to be replaced on the park strip, but we've worked through about half of them. But there were a few that were like completely buried and not haven't functioned in many years, I would imagine. So that whole area by the playground. We're working on getting all the sprinklers to work. There's one that we're going to have to trench like we found the sprinkler, but no matter what system we've replaced, it does no water comes to it, so we need to dig it back and find it but there's no grass, so won't have any grass.

LuAnn said that Park looks bad right now. I mean, I mean, yes, we just need some weed spray.

Kjerstin said, right. I have sprayed the upper half, but I wanted to make sure it worked before I did the whole thing. And the dandelions were so far, but, yeah, we all keep working through. I have plenty of the bad shape it has. Um, yeah, so there's a whole section that, once we get all the dandelions gone, then we'll fertilize, and then we'll plant, we'll probably try to reseed, hopefully, so that it will grow before the Fourth of July. But it's definitely going to take some coming back, because there's a good big chunk that has not a blade of grass.

Trisha said, We realize it's not going to be overnight.

Kjerstin said Yeah, the sprinkler system. I think there's one that he needs to rewire. There's one section that's not wired in at all, but we have to manually turn it on. So sometimes, if you see it on during the day, it's because we're trying to, like, o down and and some of the systems are not turning off when they're supposed to be but we're changing it so it's gonna water every other day for longer, because some of the areas really need more water, I think

Mayor O'Hare said when we water, we usually water from 10 o'clock at night until in the morning.

Kjerstin said, right.

Mayor O'Hare said Because once the summer comes, we're gonna have no watering between the hours of 6 am.

LuAnn said and then if Matt knows how to configure those boxes for the sprinkling system, because that one up there is totally screwed up.

Kjerstin said Well, he's so forever done it before, but he's already figured it out, so that's worth it. Through it. And he's never done sprinkler systems. We don't have one, but he either he understands the irrigation system, so he got it figured out.

LuAnn said so one day, if he has a minute.

Kjerstin said I'll have him.

LuAnn said I'll have Brent call him.

Kjerstin said Yeah.

LuAnn said go up and help him reprogram that one up there, because he has to go up every day and start it by hand and stop it.

Kjerstin said Yeah, and go up and stuff, which we're having to stop it by hand. And that's what he's trying to figure out. Which set is going too long that it's not up there, but we're trying to keep on top of it? And then this park strip here, the little thing somehow got water in it. So when we opened it, it just it doesn't work. I replaced the batteries the other day, but I went in, they didn't have it in Tremonton, so I just ordered one, and I'll just bring in a receipt or something, yeah, but it's going to be here tomorrow, so we'll get that water on, hopefully tomorrow.

LuAnn said Is that tree dead.

Kjerstin said Oh, I don't know.

LuAnn said Should we just cut it down?

Stacey said it is up to you guys.

LuAnn said What do you think? What do you guys think?

Stacey said Well, it's the salt that the water sprays it at night, but when the sun comes up, it bakes it. So I don't know. What do you want it? I had permission to buy new trees there, but I never put the trees there, because of that.

Kjerstin said it's hard to get a salt-resistant tree.

Stacey said Yeah, because the salt comes from our water, and it sprays the trees and it kills them. That's why it looks like crap.

LuAnn said We have salty water,

Stacey said yes, where is every really salty water.

Kjerstin said there's an exceptional amount of the if you get the water tested, they'll tell you that it's not usable and the ground sterile, like when you get water tested.

LuAnn asked is that why my grass looks like shit?

Kjerstin said that's why in town you can like, spray your flowers, but if you spray your flowers directly with water and then let them dry inside. At least our water in Stone like your flowers will burn right off.

Stacey said right.

Kjerstin said Why do you have to use a drip system. Yeah, If you have salt-resistant flowers.

Mayor O'Hare said we don't have flowers, though. We just have plants.

Kjerstin said Yeah, as far as the park goes, yes, we'll try to bring the grass back.

Mayor O'Hare said could you have Matt look at the brand new fence that we put up two years ago between Mollie's, it got hit. Can you have him just look at that and see if that's something he might be able to fix it.

Kjerstin said there is a sprinkler right there, and I think they hit the sprinkler. So that's one of the ones I had to replace and the fence is like, leaning into it so it was tricky to replace, but, yeah, but I wonder how we can. I'll have him look at it.

Mayor O'Hare said, and see if it's something that he can do. If not, then that's fine, because I thought I had called the guy twice to put the fence up, and he still hasn't returned my call.

LuAnn said Well, we were going to get those cement barriers, but Keith can't get them for free, so we'd have to buy them.

Mayor O'Hare said that's fine. They're not that expensive.

LuAnn said if we want them, we have to buy them.

Mayor O'Hare said I think when I priced them last year, it was \$1,000 for us to put a line of barriers there.

LuAnn asked How much?

Mayor O'Hare said \$1,000 dollars.

Luann said Oh, really, that's it.

Mayor O'Hare said to get all of them. I think it was 15.

LuAnn said That's not bad.

Kjerstin asked people back into the fences a lot?

Mayor O'Hare said Well, they did a lot, but we also had to get permission from Mollie's to put them on their property.

LuAnn said, but we got that permission.

Mayor O'Hare said We got that permission,

LuAnn said, but then Keith was gotta help us out with some of the older ones that they just had, but his boss wouldn't let him do that.

Kjerstin asked what do we need to do to get permission to dispose of like, there's a broken picnic table up by that white building that's painted, I don't even know what that building is on the back of it, but there's like a broken picnic table. And then in the shed, there's like old bleachers, wood bleachers, like the whole side where you park the lawnmower. The whole sides were built up with like a very old set of bleachers that is just old wood, and we wondered if we could throw it away. There are also old lawnmower parts.

Trisha said Just throw them away.

Mayor O'Hare said it's actually those bleachers that are padlocked into the shed.
Kjerstin said to the shed.

Mayor O'Hare said there are holes in the shed.

Kjerstin said we're gonna have to cut the chain.

Mayor O'Hare said there's a chain that goes around the bleachers into the shed, and then inside the shed, there's a padlock, locks in the chain.

Kjerstin said We just wondered if you're okay, if we get rid of stuff that we clearly can see hasn't been used in years.

LuAnn said I'm good with it.

Trisha said I'm fine with that.

Tammie said So I just have something with the budget. I just don't know how much all this is going to cost. Is it going to be over?

Kjerstin said What's that additional cost?

Tammie said Well, like just repairing all the stuff?

Mayor O'Hare said Oh, well, we've already

Bought the sprinkler heads.

Tammie said Okay.

Kjerstin said Yeah, so that was the \$200, I'm sure, yeah,

Mayor O'Hare said the sprinkler, the first.

Tammie said I just was looking at the budget. So I'm just letting you guys know. So because for the hours allotted, for the next two months. Because the budget will be reduced in July.

Kjerstin said I was told 40 hours, and I reported every hour, and we did a ton of extra work and mowed the park as much as we were supposed to, and I only got 20 hours for the last two weeks. So, like, I don't know how people were getting 40 hours just mowing, because I don't think they were doing but like, as far as Matt and I highly doubt we'll go over the hours, because, yeah, if what we report is what we're actually doing.

Tammie said what I meant. I don't want you to have to be doing stuff.

Kjerstin said Well, I thought we were, I texted you and asked, Are people gonna be upset because we've spent so much time down here?"

LuAnn asked how many hours does Cameron and Brent have to use until the end of the month?

Tammie said they have 80 hours.

Mayor O'Hare said it's 120 hours total for both. We split it and we switched it around and put 80 hours on the Cemetery and 40 hours on the Park.

Tammie said there's \$100 dollars left in the park budget, and for 80 hours for two months is \$1,200, that's not, you're not looking at, well, that's the budget. That's the proposal for next year.

Mayor O'Hare said Oh, I was looking, I couldn't find it.

Kjerstin said We can fit all the work that we need to do at regular hours.

Tammie said That's just what I was saying, yeah, I just like supplies.

Kjerstin said I just thought it was more than normal because we also mowed and we'd worked, and it still was done. Like, there was a lot of cushion in the hours.

Tammie said I'm sure there was. So it only took you 20 hours to do.

Kjerstin said Yeah, I only turned in 19 and a half hours for the last two weeks, and we've replaced, like, 20 sprinklers. And, yeah, I'm sure people sprayed weeds.

Mayor O'Hare said So you're on track for your 40 hours.

Well, no, no, you said two weeks.

Kjerstins said Yeah.

Mayor O'Hare said Well, that's 40 hours is for the month, right?

Kjerstin said So I'm less.

Mayor O'Hare said You're one hour shy.

Kjerstin said Yeah.

Tammie said May 1 to May 31 is 40 hours, then June 1, each month is 40 hours.

Mayor O'Hare said Yeah.

LuAnn said that's for Brent and Cameron.

Mayor O'Hare said it's 80 hours for the Cemetery.

Tammie said they might have a little bit more. I just gotta get the bill for what the lawn mower was.

Mayor O'Hare said \$3299, no tax.

Tammie said So there might be some money there.

Mayor O'Hare said we also with the lawn mower. We also use the money we got from Rocky Mountain Power.

LuAnn said Yeah.

Mayor O'Hare said Because we have that \$1,800.

Tammie said that it hasn't been added back into it.

Mayor O'Hare said Yeah, that's why we were able to get the lawn mowers, because of that money.

LuAnn said Brent still got a lot of work to do up there.

Tammie said I will have a copy for you guys next time.

Stacey asked Do you want me to make it and make it so they can take it home?

Tammie said Sure. Just do that one.

LuAnn said I just don't want him to go over, because they've got a lot of work to do.

Another thing. Does anybody have any ideas in the audience or in the council, you know, all the dirt that we have piled in the corners up there for when they dig the graves? What's the best way we could move it? I mean, where could we put the dirt?

Because we have three corners full of it.

Trisha said we can put it up to the landfill.

Mayor O'Hare said the trash drop.

Trisha said By the way, I spoke to Jed. I'm either gonna have AJ or my dad push all those big stumps into the pit, and we're gonna burn it. I'm worried if a fire goes through there and they start burning, they're just gonna swell, and it's gonna be a wreck. So we might as well just get it burned. Be done with it. And then also, I talked to Stacey and LuAnn, because I went up there thinking that the dumpster was empty, which it's not. LuAnn said I didn't ever get back to you, it's full because of, you know, all the mess that Brandon cleaned up for us.

Trisha said Stacey got back to me.

LuAnn said Yeah, that's what I talked to Scott.

Mayor O'Hare said We just got to call Rupp's and have them switch it out.

Trisha said Well, and I didn't like climb up in there. Brandon thought maybe there wasn't enough to have it dumped yet. I mean, how full do we want to get it?

LuAnn asked How much do we pay?

Mayor O'Hare said What's the rule with Rupp's? We should only have it to the top right.

Stacey said Brandon said there was metal in it, that's why.

LuAnn said So they won't take metal.

Stacey said Well, they take it to the scrap yard, and then they see how much it weighs, or whatever, and then we get money if there was enough to cover the cost.

LuAnn said Oh.

Mayor O'Hare said we get paid for the metal. So we can swap out that container anytime.

Stacey said I guess if that's what you guys want to do.

Trisha said All right, I'll go and take a closer look. I guess it was up, because my dad and I are going to put the signs up, and so we're just figuring it out. I was just checking it all out.

Mayor O'Hare said Okay.

Trisha said Okay, I'll get back to you.

Mayor O'Hare said Okay.

Tammie said Just for clarification, I was just letting you know what was there, because I don't want Matt and Kjerstin to be like, working all these hours. You know what I mean?

Like,

LuAnn said you'll get paid for your hours, so don't turn your hours in.

Kjerstin said no.

Tammie said, letting them know where they were at.

Kjerstin said yes. Well, I just don't know how we could pretend like we worked anymore, just mowing. So I don't know. Like, yeah, I think we'll be fine. I reported it all, and then he's like, I think they allotted 40 out. Because I was like, I'm like, I feel so bad. We've spent so much time replacing all these sprinklers. Like, the lawn mower. Yeah, it broke the first time we used it. So you Matt, put the belt back on.

Mayor O'Hare said She said, The new budget comes out on June 1, right, July 1. So we got two months. So that's \$1,200 for two months. There's 21there's 2100 in there.

Kjerstin said, because hopefully, as we get the grass healthier.

Mayor O'Hare said We do have one for \$500 dollars, it went \$20 over the \$500 allotment. But,

Tammie said Okay, I was thinking.

Mayor O'Hare said we bought the toilet, and we bought, like, a set of sprinklers, and then they, I think they picked up a second set of sprinklers. So we should be real close to that, okay.

Stacey said I have one question. Did you find out if we had irrigation water?

Kjerstin said Matt said, Yes, but he has no idea. He does not think it would be possible for you to use it. You have no way to use it. So he's like, I would guess the town should just sell their shares, because, like, there's no way for them to use the water.

LuAnn said We don't have a ditch that goes over on that side, right on the other side.

Stacey said there should be a ditch.

Mayor O'Hare said It comes right at the corner of the.

Trisha said the watershed and comes up along the backside of the church parking lot. That's where the ditch used to be.

Mayor O'Hare said Yeah, that's it still does. It comes right at the back. It comes right at the corner of the church parking lot

Trisha said I don't think it's been maintained. I think that's what the problem is.

Mayor O'Hare said there's a ditch there, and it was maintained when I was taken care of it.

AJ said Before you talk about selling water shares or anything, I would talk to Rod because I'm not 100% sure the town actually owns water that is not the church's water.

Mayor O'Hare said So that's what?

AJ said the church's water.

Mayor O'Hare asked

Kjerstin said she pays for it.

Tammie said Well, there was, there's, so there's something with that.

AJ said Yeah, Rod will know exactly how that all works. Some of them were donated.

LuAnn asked Have we ever irrigated the park side?

Mayor O'Hare said no, only the ball field side.

Kjerstin said Matt said. He said that, as far as he knew, there was no way.

Mayor O'Hare said so I was told, when I was out there going to park, that that water belonged to the town, and the town watered the ball field, since the town was taking care of the ball field for the church. Now, that's what I was told.

AJ said that's possible, I know that some were donated. Some are one thing or another. Rod actually told me about it, how it all worked a year or so ago.

Trish said I will have Rod write it all out.

Stacey said Roy Neal told me that we had shares, that's what he told me. He gave me my paper back, and that's why I paid it.

Mayor O'Hare said Well, if we're paying for it, then it's our shares. Stacey said Roy said we had shares.

Tammie said donated shares. Yeah, I don't think how many he did, he tell me how it was, like \$100 bucks.

LuAnn said That's what mine is, too.

Trisha said maybe that was their handshake agreement. I owe these shares. I'm gonna let you use them, but you're gonna pay for them.

Mayor O'Hare said Well, if it's if we can't use it in the town and the church needs it, then I and if we don't own it, then give it to them and stop paying.

Stacey said Yeah, we don't pay that. We don't pay for the water anymore. I told him. I said, I'm not gonna pay that. We don't use it. It's the church's. And he goes, No. He said, You have water shares, because I saw him at the store.

Mayor O'Hare said who said that.

Stacey said Roy Neal.

Mayor O'Hare said Roy Neal.

Stacey said Yeah, because Erin takes care of the water books. She's a secretary. And he told me that that's what I had to pay. And so I did.

Trisha said okay, so half cocked here, let's ask dad and find out from Rod. Let's find out what the Scooby Doo is. So they told me, so I paid it last year.

Kjerstin said the park's fine without it.

Mayor O'Hare said Yeah, well, there's no way for us to Use it.

Mayor O'Hare said Okay, anything else from the Park?

LuAnn said she was good.

Mayor O'Hare said Trish, anything else for the Park?

Trisha said No.

Mayor O'Hare said okay. The Box Elder County Sheriff's Department are not here tonight. Did you get an email from deputy Shaw? LuAnn said Thanks, Kjerstin.

Mayor O'Hare said Thanks, Kjerstin.

Stacey said No.

Mayor O'Hare said okay. Eric, how are you doing, bud?

Eric said Good, how are you?

Mayor O'Hare said good. Hope you brought good news.

Eric said Sure.

Mayor O'Hare said Okay. Awesome.

Stacey said So, Eric, you have to stand really close to that machine, because I can't hear you on that machine.

Eric said, really.

Stacey said Will you hold it up to your mouth? Or in your pocket, too? I don't care. Eric said So, Utah has created a unified water infrastructure plan, which now makes a consortium of agencies to control funding in Utah for water improvement projects that's wastewater, stormwater, non non-drinking water. So as part of that, at the New Funding Agency approach. They required us to put any project we want funding for the next five to 10 years on this plan. So I took what we had identified for the over here at the well, the SCADA system over here, over here, to generate those kinds of things. We identified this Pe already completed a couple of years ago, and I put them on this plan. And the reasoning we did that is because the current administration has stirred the pot for funding, and funding is kind of gone.

LuAnn asked, "What?

Eric said stirred the pot?

LuAnn said Oh.

Eric said so, it's kind of gone sideways on all the projects. So I think the state created this unified water plan to kind of manage that sideways approach to our American administration. So, now we have this agency that's going to control these funds for all these projects. Now we do have USDA funding. Still, rule development is going to fund the federal wise forests. We have Civ money, but this is just strictly division of drinking water, water resources, and water quality, and so on. So now they're going to take each project coming into the state and review them against all other projects. So we had to prioritize your projects on this. This is this sheet. So, this next page this is pretty brief. I apologize for this. This page lists your projects in the PR done by Marianne and myself here a few years back. So we put a priority number on it. She's got them one through nine down there, the first being the well signing study. Now I called Heather down at the State Division of Drinking Water to see if that funding was still available through planning money, just to do the bill signing study. It's a planning thing. It's not construction, and she hasn't called back yet. I understood it was planning. Money was separate from construction money. I've got to confirm that with it, but nonetheless, we put it on here just in case. The next thing I want to do is do a test well, if the test proves out good, we'll chase it. If not, we'll have to go back to square one on that. Well, too out there. The third option was SCADA, so that could be controlled. Tammie and Stacey from here, and then AJ's phone, and Carson's phone if they want to monitor things, and probably the Mayor's too. The next one is eight, an eight-inch loop water line on 800 North. So the blue line may get that page. We'll tear it up again for you. That sounds okay.

LuAnn said Dang, that's fine.

Eric said Anyway, so that might be 5 to 10 years. Now, it kind of depends on how funding goes, and moving on that same note. If you have Morgan do the shoulder of the road for you, it's falling. It's a warranty, too, period. So, it is the warranty period. So you know what I'm saying. So if they shoulder the known payment, then it's warranted.

LuAnn said Oh, do they know that?

Eric said Oh, yeah, they'll be on the projects, making this change order.

LuAnn said Oh.

Eric said What am I saying? So, okay, I wouldn't have the county come back and do it.

Tammie said that we should have them do it.

Eric said Yeah.

LuAnn said Just have Morgan do it.

Eric said right.

Tammie said that because then it will be under warranty, is what he says.

Eric said Yeah.

LuAnn said Oh, gotcha.

Eric said, Just a side note there.

LuAnn said Okay.

Tammie said Yeah.

Eric said, and then an eight-inch SC water main on Main Street that's going, that's going east of here, to those homes out there east of us. Identified a new water storage tank. It sounds like the use in town. We have a certain user that uses quite a bit of water, and that's kind of teetering the edge of a new water tank. So she just tossed on there for you, too. And she's got a she had that prioritizing 2025, oh, concept screen that's probably 2035, Yes. Five years. It's that party for yourself. And then this East Side spring development. Now you folks have a spring, you probably east side of town that feeds a couple of homes. It's not connected to the town system, so that's a pipe dream out there, and it's a small spring. So, in the event you want to put it private, to do it isn't that, right? Tammie. AJ, we've been AJ many years ago. What did this ring the side that feeds that guy's house?

AJ said Shane Eliason's.

Eric said Yeah, yeah. So that's the town's, if you ever want to develop it, it's stuck in there for you. So, those are the nine projects that we've put on this planning grant planning funding application need to kind of give. So we have some space here. You got an earmark on the funds out there in the future. So I want to give you a heads up that's been in place now. So in the event that.

Tammie asked, so you did submit it?

Eric said we did.

Tammie said Okay.

Eric said things got turned into the past, so did I send this to you? Tammie said No, you didn't send it to me.

Eric said that was kind of quick and dirty. But again, the costs are just in the prior PR. I just wanted to get them into funding agencies' hands. So in this, in the event that federal money doesn't come in, if these states come in, they're funded in some way, direction. Now the state will allow us to stack funds, stack grant funding. Use federal grants, state

grants, and local grants to build one grant, so to speak, you can mix and match grants, which is nice for us. And I'll let you folks know when I find out from Heather Pate if they'll let us use that planning money to complete the well center study.

LuAnn asked so we would have some help with grants to drill our new Well?

Eric said yes, that's the whole plan. And for you folks, it's been on the docket for quite a while, on the radar. State well number two is a bit challenged as far as secondary standards, water quality, they're aware of. It won't surprise me. Any questions on this, yeah? Just, just informational. Put you on the list. You've now got some placement.

LuAnn said Thank you, Eric

Eric said Yeah, curb and gutter, so I tried to call Boyd for the 49th time today, and for the 49th time, he hadn't responded yet. So I printed this up from last year's office for the 2023 project. You can have the kind of where it was sat back then you

Carson. So this is the peer request form from back in 2023, sooner to Landmark companies for their work on this warning beacon, out here, this traffic light, that top section is what we paid in \$46,000 plus or minus, really. Beacon, the improvement stayed out here. They did not do anything below the change orders. We originally thought he was gonna have him come back and do the curb and gutter out there. And I think with them, I don't know what happened there, just things got lost, and then in the shuffle, they never came back out to do their change order stuff. We never did change the order to allow them to come back into it. So then I called Boyd Rick here about a year ago. He said, Yeah, I'd be happy to do it for you for under about \$45- \$40 and since then, again, he's gone responsive on me. So I pulled it this old pay request, and put the numbers in, kind of what I understand now. I did call Landmark construction here a few days ago, and got some costs on the curb and gutter. And he told me it was 30 bucks a foot in the Cache Valley area. So 38 bucks are pretty close to today's costs. So that price shouldn't change. Ribbon curb probably hasn't changed much. I think it was pretty inflated at the time they gave it to you. And I threw in the purple there a mobile fee to get them back out here again. So the purple highlighted section is what I changed today. So I made some minor modifications in the quantities and the unit bid prices there on top, too. So, if I already estimated the Mayor and Council cost to get the curb and go to put in, it's about \$9,300.

Mayor O'Hare asked if we have that money, though, right?

Stacey said We don't know that yet.

Tammie said We don't know if they've still got it. The mayor's changed for what was done, right? We have to send them an invoice when we get the other stuff, then. And then they paid for it. Stacey was going to reach out and see if the funds are available. Mayor O'Hare said still there. Didn't we have a certain amount of time we had to use it.

Stacey said I don't know that was back in 23 when, like a pole went in, because we went back and looked at the invoices and stuff. So I don't know if they closed it out or what.

Tammie asked Mayor O'Hare if he had been to a Mayor's Association meeting. Mayor O'Hare said I haven't been to one because I haven't been here, and they haven't the new one. They have it every quarter, so I'm waiting for the next one.

Tammie said I think we just need to reach out. I'm sure that it's still sitting there. Mayor O'Hare said Okay.

Tammie said we just need to make sure.

Stacey said on the invoices that said that the project wasn't. Completed.

Tammie said Yeah, it was only 75%, so on the last numbers that we sent to them.

Eric said so, there's like \$4,500 left.

Tammie said I don't know how much was actually awarded. I never saw an actual paper on it.

Mayor O'Hare said we were awarded \$70-76- 75- \$76,000, that was when Tim was the mayor. So,

Stacey said, but we had to pay \$5,000 of that too.

Tammie said Yeah, \$5,000 was our portion.

Mayor O'Hare said right.

Stacey said So I think it was only like \$65.

Eric said Yeah, we had to buy the street light, the street poles. That's like \$10,000 we paid like \$15,000 to UDOT.

Mayor O'Hare said we only had like \$65, but we only used \$4046, six of it, plus about so we got about \$19,000- \$18,000 left, Eric said no, about \$4000, we paid. We paid you about \$15,000 UDOT for the whole pole.

Tammie said I don't think we paid our portion of it. So that might be our \$5,000 and then the \$4,000 they did hold it out. I think they did two years ago. I'd have to go, and that was in 2023.

Mayor O'Hare asked who did these designs here?

Eric said we did.

Mayor O'Hare said Okay.

Eric said Yeah, oh, the red numbers, Mayor, sorry, red numbers, right, went through and just tuck today and verified quantities. So my thought on this, too, just as a side note, instead of putting asphalt down, maybe we just put it all in concrete and make the turn there. Instead of putting asphalt, haven't teared up again, just make this shaded area in concrete.

LuAnn said All right. Oh, right here.

Mayor O'Hare asked But do we want it to go a horseshoe like that, or do we want it to match across the street? So going like that, going like that, and matching across the street.

Eric said I think back then, the concern was having these, these were the Dominion trucks pool here, made the radius out of here. We wanted to kind of protect that.

Mayor O'Hare said, but if we went out all the way, then they couldn't go out at all. I don't know, though, if that's something that because of the truck entry.

Eric said if we turned back a little bit. You could do that too. Yeah. Is that something you want to do? Just go straight West with it.

Mayor O'Hare said it would be if you see how the Ranch Houses and this one match together. It'd be nice if we could match it with that.

Eric said Yeah, we could do that.

Mayor O'Hare said because if time, if it ever comes to where we're able to put a curb and gutter over on Mollie's side, if whatever they decide to do with that building, if it ever comes to where we were able to put it, then we could put, make it all uniformal At all match.

Eric said Yeah.

Mayor O'Hare said You know.

Eric said Yeah.

Mayor O'Hare said Because then we would be able to put crosswalks if it comes to that point, but, again, I don't know how that's going to work, because this is out further than this, this road here, you see.

Eric said Yeah, and this is the reason we did that, because it's these signs sitting right here.

Mayor O'Hare said Yeah.

Eric said I can push the signs in,

Mayor O'Hare said, and move it, and we're matching, I'm just saying towards uniform matches. Matches up.

Eric said Yeah.

Mayor O'Hare said I don't know if that's something that the council wants to do.

LuAnn said Yeah, I'm good with having a match or whatever is going to be that they can't ruin.

Mayor O'Hare said match with this, because then we could put the gravel, well, yeah, that they'd have to design it up and figure it out. It's how much it costs.

Eric said right.

Stacey said Oh, yeah, no, we found out. No, oh, we're in the hole.

Mayor O'Hare said we need a grant.

Stacey said we need a grant to finish the curve together.

Eric said Gotcha, okay.

Mayor O'Hare said Maybe if it matched this over here.

Trisha said, let's find out what how much money we have, and then.

Mayor O'Hare said Yeah, well, that's what we have to do. We can't do anything we can do tonight.

Eric said Yeah, you think about it, then just, that's what you want to do. I can just mirror it over, just, yeah.

Mayor O'Hare said We'll just take this and flip it over on this side, just like a mirror.

Eric said Yeah, I designed that too. In fact, I designed this.

Mayor O'Hare said If we just do the same thing like this over here, where it matches up and it evens out, Yep, see how much that costs, that's all we can do.

Eric said Yeah, be happy to then one more. One more note, the Utah lost the name here, Utah recreation and recreation. Some organizations here just award several grants for some big park improvement projects,

LuAnn said for some what?

Eric said Park improvement projects we need?

Mayor O'Hare said We need money for that.

Eric said Yeah, so I applied for Newton and for Mendon and for a couple of other places, can't remember was, well, Newton and Mendon for sure, they just got ordered \$300,000 Tammie said Wow.

LuAnn said Oh my goodness.

Mayor O'Hare asked, Is that something we could go after?

Eric said Well, we just, it just got awarded.

Mayor O'Hare said Oh.

Eric said Yeah, so did I say that too? I think I did for sure. We need that kind of money to apply for sure, when's the next time we can apply for it using a year? But I'll find out for you, if it's every quarter the money, the money is there.

Mayor O'Hare said Yeah, I would like to see if we can get a grant. LuAnn said It's just terrible.

Mayor O'Hare said to redo our Bowery, our Bowery needs to be gutted.

Eric said they'd find anything for recreation.

Mayor O'Hare said Yeah.

LuAnn said so many things.

Eric said a new course.

LuAnn said by my house.

Mayor O'Hare said Yeah, because I like to see that either they gutted and or recompleted or just demolished and put a new structure up. Because it's that, just, it's just old.

Trisha said they just put it in the 80s.

Mayor O'Hare said Yeah, but it's just, even the bathrooms are just so disgusting.

They're just, it's like, it's like, you pulled into a 1980s or 1990s rest area, and you walk in and it's like, you know, we try to do the best we can with it, but it's just concrete floors.

Eric said I wouldn't imagine you're just probably scientifically sound, either. So that'll be a caveat for everything applying for today is not sound. Let's get the replacement torn down. Replace. So yeah, but there are a couple of funding agencies.

Tammie said I don't see an email.

Eric said Maybe next time. Yeah, let's get over to you guys. But anyway, there's some funding, funds out there.

LuAnn said that'd be great, keep us in mind for that next year.

Eric said it sounds good. Anything else?

Mayor O'Hare asked Eric how his finger was doing.

Eric said It's going good, good, good. Thank you.

Mayor O'Hare said Thank you so much. Fire Department. Jed. Jed said I've got a couple of things. The first one is that the residential burn closed on May 31. Does anybody want to burn sticks, trees, branches, weeds, that sort of stuff? We will get the town dump burnt the town green waste facility burned when we can, and then we have a house outside of town limits to burn as well. A few things coming up on board for it are LuAnn asked there a reason why we didn't ever burn down that old house going to the church, now, up here, that old.

Jed said because we don't own it.

LuAnn asked who owns it? Can we make them do something?

Jed said I think it's,

Stacey said I thought it was Deloy Mills.

Jed said I think it's Deloy Mills.

Mayor O'Hare asked the one that's right next to the church.

LuAnn said Yeah, the one in between Ev Mays and Joanne Heyder's old houses.

Trisha said Oh, yeah, we do need to do something with that eyesore.

Jed said it's under Deloy Mills, same guy who owns the white one.

Mayor O'Hare said maybe he'll donate it, and we can burn it down. Jed said If you wanted to burn. We could burn it. Other than that, I've got a couple of grant options that I'm working on for some stuff they need to be on June 1, but we'll just kind of see where it goes from there. The radio system still sucks, but sucks for the entire State, so it's been a fight. We're trying to figure out.

Mayor O'Hare asked what was wrong with them. I mean, I thought they just replaced the whole system.

Jed said they rebuilt the whole system for the State. There have been significant issues with it since they rolled it out. There are lawsuits going on over it down in Salt Lake County, and a few things so receptions just bad, and it's not reliable. It's kind of hanging us out on the ground once in a while.

Mayor O'Hare said It's not good.

Jed said Let the state screw something up that was working.

Any questions for the fire department?

Mayor O'Hare said Heather.

Jed said, kind of anticipating that the state will put us under stage one restrictions starting June 1. Let's kind of see where that goes.

LuAnn said I do have one question. So when we did the dog licensing, and there was stuff that was the County stuff inside our sheds that were stored for them, why are we doing that?

Jed said That's part of the contract that we have with Box Elder County.

LuAnn asked, so we're obligated to do that?

Jed said obligated to some extent, when we get paged out on calls, the County pays us a call out fee to run our firefighters with their equipment first, but with that like we pay for the fuel and the housing of those vehicles, but it's \$950 to the fire department every time our pager goes off to run their equipment. So we end up make the fire department ends up making money in that sort of sort of circumstance, other than fuel for the for those fire trucks, the county provides everything else, all the supplies, all the maintenance, 1000s and 1000s and 1000s of dollars a year that the town benefits from without having to pay for necessarily. LuAnn said Okay.

Jed said we could pull all those vehicles out, but we would lose two brush trucks, our side by side, and a large water tender that we kind of rely on.

LuAnn said Okay, I just wondered what the deal was?

Jed said Yep, that's how it works.

LuAnn said okay.

Jed said anything else?

LuAnn said No.

Mayor O'Hare said Thanks. Jed, appreciate it.

Jed said Thank you.

Mayor O'Hare said EMS. So I did meet with the EMS state EMS committee, and we did get approved for our EMR variants. So now we can run our ambulances with EMRs, and we don't have to be 100% EMTs there. So now we just have to get some of our other helpers officially licensed as EMR.

Tammie asked What is an EMR?

Dave said Emergency responder.

Tammie asked, so is that like, the same as a basic?

Dave said no, it's lower than a basic because your EMT and advanced EMT, EMR is below that.

Tammie asked So is that the same state test you have to take? Dave said No, no, it's a lot easier to get EMR certification.

Mayor O'Hare said that's just an Emergency Medical Responder. Dave said yeah and so we can work with those in the Fire Department that have been helping us get the EMR certification, and it just protects us with we're running the ambulance with, as long as we have an advanced EMT, we can have EMRs on board with the other ambulance if

we're running it as A basic the old ambulance we have one. It does have a time limit, or they'll renew it if we need it. So it'll go for two years, and then they'll because the idea with the state is they want us to get those EMRs to the EMTs.

Mayor O'Hare said Yeah.

Dave said So we'll still have that as our goal, but it protects us in the meantime,

Mayor O'Hare said okay.

Dave said so, and the old ambulance still has just a few other small things with the State to have it, so it's officially ready to go, and it helps to have this EMR variance in place, so I have to have Dr. Anderson sign off on our EMR thing. But that shouldn't be too hard. We'll sign anything.

Mayor O'Hare asked Do you have a time frame? Do you have a time frame for when the old ambulance will be up and ready to go. Dave said we should be really by the end of this month.

Mayor O'Hare said If everything goes according to plan.

Dave said Yeah, just signing some papers more or less.

Mayor O'Hare said okay.

Dave said, and that's all I know.

Mayor O'Hare asked if anybody had any questions for Mr. Smith, for EMS.

Mayor O'Hare said Thank you. Thank you. Appreciate it. Dave.

Mayor O'Hare said Tammie, okay, so I just thought that was the paper you were looking at. If you guys want to just take this home, look at it, if there are changes that you want to have made, we can do that, but just kind of a rundown of it. The first page you'll see says general fund revenue. I should have numbered the pages. Sorry about that. So it'll save you seeing where it says government or general fund revenue. One says that, and one says expenditures. So on that revenue side, it will show you the last two years, and then the proposed years, the 2025- 2026 our revenues have gone up for property tax again this year. So that's good. So there is a little bit more money we can use in different areas. And basically what I did when I prepared this, if you look. I mean that the Revenue page shows you kind of what revenue news we expect to collect for 2025-2026, and then the other side is for expenditures. And I've just gone and pretty much a lot of them are the same. I did up the Fire Department, because they did have more revenue this year than they actually added back into theirs. So I did add that there. But you guys, this is just kind of a proposal, just where we were getting more money. So if you see that, there's a spot that you'd rather like I let the last couple years, we've had the Cemetery at \$7,000 and then, yeah, like the Park, we didn't have as much expense this year, this last year, so I kept it the same \$5000 Well, it's \$200 less. Anyway, I think it's a pretty good budget to go off of, according to our expenses from last year. That's what I did, as I took the expenses we used this year and tried to anticipate what next year would be like.

Mayor O'Hare said the recreation that's for the Fourth of July and Easter.

Tammie said the cost of everything is going up.

Mayor O'Hare said Yeah.

Tammie said that's but if we need, I did add, I think there was another \$1,000 there.

Mayor O'Hare said Yeah.

Tammie said \$8,000, but I mean, that's up to you guys, if you'd rather put that somewhere else, the Park or, let's see, the Landfill kind of fluctuates, just depending on how many times we empty that. But for the most part, garbage services, unless they raise our rates again, it's going to be the \$27,000, so I left that the same. The streets and roads. I bumped up a little bit because you have been doing some repairs on the roads and stuff. So anyway.

Mayor O'Hare said okay.

Tammie said, and if somebody has some changes you want me to do or want to do before the next town council meeting, that's what we'll adopt it.

Mayor O'Hare said so, any changes that we need, that we want to add or subtract, whatever, just get it to you before next month.

Tammie said Yeah, maybe the Monday before, and then I can update it, and you guys can talk about it.

Mayor O'Hare said Vote on it.

Tammie said and vote on it if you want to make the changes.

Mayor O'Hare asked if we don't have to have a second public hearing on this, right?

Tammie said Nobody showed up for and look at us. We're all out of the city limits anyway.

Mayor O'Hare said okay.

Tammie said Oh, we will have a public hearing next month, but that's going to be to open up the budget. And if you notice on that paper that Stacey made a copy for you, there are a couple of like, some of them are in the negative, so we need to move money around to get that balance, so we don't get in trouble with our auditor next month. All fixed before June

30.

LuAnn asked if the one in parentheses is negative.

Mayor O'Hare said Yeah.

Tammie said Well, if yours really isn't negative, I need to move money from your fees from that P.T.I.F account. I'll cover that \$35,000.

LuAnn said okay.

Tammie said we just usually wait till the end of the fiscal year to do that, because when you're done doing all your projects.

LuAnn said okay.

Tammie said So, yeah.

Mayor O'Hare said okay. Any questions for Tammies?

Tammie said I know it's like really confusing, especially if you're not used to budgets and stuff.

Mayor O'Hare asked Trish, Any questions?

Trisha said no.

Mayor O'Hare said no. Okay. Thank you. Tammie.

Mayor O'Hare said Stacey, thanks everyone for helping with the dog license. Tammie and those guys came. Tammy and Luann came and helped me. We kind of had a big turnout, but not I mean.

Tammie said we didn't have a big turnout.

Stacey said no, like, well, Natalia brought all of her dogs, so that was good. Yeah.

Tammie said she was our big customer.

Stacey said Yeah.

Tammie said Jim Beagley he brought us donuts.

Stacey said they were so good.

Tammie said Yeah, Yoder's doughnuts.

LuAnn said they were good.

Stacey said the vets were really super cute. They did a great job. They helped us out a lot. So the next thing is the elections. So you guys, if you want to re-run, you have to fill out your papers on June 2, because I'll be here, or you have to, like, make an appointment with me during that week. It ends on the sixth. So if you're gonna re-run again, everybody's up except Heather. So Heather has another year.

Mayor O'Hare said so every, well, I know all the Mayors do in the county, but everybody else.

Tammie said I didn't think we had any, but I was correct. I'm glad that Box Elder County helps us out.

Mayor O'Hare said Yeah, because I called them too, and I was like, Wait a minute. I've already, and they're like, No, it's all the Mayors in the county have to. I was like, okay.

Tammie said it was just confusing with all the vacant seats and who took the spot.

Stacey said I'm glad they can know what they're doing.

Mayor O'Hare said everybody's up for election, except for Heather.

Stacey said yes.

Mayor O'Hare said okay, and then she'll go up for election next year, or that seat will go up for election next year.

Stacey said yes.

Mayor O'Hare said okay, so if you guys want to stay, we've got a paper. Bring our paper, paperwork, paperwork. We have to do it in front of you, too, right? It has to be in person. Stacey said yes.

Mayor O'Hare said okay.

Stacey said Then we talked about this briefly last time, canceling the Frontier.

Mayor O'Hare said yes, so what it was, apparently we're under contract with them. After 30-something plus years, they won't just cancel our contract. So it was so I just noticed on the receipt, we just paid them 300 bucks. Yes, but to cancel it costs us.

Stacey said I don't know how many, it's \$189 for each line, and we have two lines. I think we still just paid two lines. It's up to you guys, but I just want a clarification.

Mayor O'Hare said So do you guys want to pay the cancellation fee with Frontier? What we were talking about was canceled, because it's Frontier, \$300 a month.

Trisha asked When does the contract end?

Stacey said in August.

Mayor O'Hare said in August.

I have to call them on July 20th to cancel it.

LuAnn said to pay the cancellation fee.

Stacey said Oh, I know.

Mayor O'Hare said yeah. So it'd be \$303- \$170 something dollars. It should be one month of payments, a little over one month.

Trisha said Just cancel it.

Mayor O'Hare said You guys get so all in favor or to cancel the Frontier.

Trisha said I make a motion to cancel Frontier.

Mayor O'Hare said Trisha made a motion to cancel Frontier.

LuAnn said second.

Mayor O'Hare said I have a second. LuAnn, all in favor. Aye, any opposed? Okay, it's passed. Cancel it.

Stacey said Okay.

Mayor O'Hare said Then we don't have it on here, but that's okay. We need to call Beehive and have them add the phone line.

Stacey said okay. So you call Beehive and have them do that

Because every time I call them, they never answer me.

Tammie said Really.

Stacey said yes.

Mayor O'Hare said I always call. They always answer. Are you calling the business line? Probably.

Stacey said Is that the number that I am supposed to call?

Mayor O'Hare said No, you are. Yeah, I'm saying, but I call, I just call the residential line, and they answer right away.

Stacey said, Am I doing something wrong?

Mayor O'Hare said, No, no, you're doing it, right? I'm just saying my residential line right away.

Stacey said Of course.

Mayor O'Hare said you might be able to just go online and order the phone. Or I tried that too, okay. Well, if you need help, let me know. I can make phone calls too.

Stacey said Okay, so Trish, are you over the garbage?

Mayor O'Hare said Yep.

Trisha said okay, I guess, yeah.

Stacey said Okay, so one day you and I need to get together. They so IDAWY. They want numbers and addresses, and names of cans. The lady, whose name is Gail Mason, and she's really funny. She's from Malad. She's been in contact. So I do have numbers here on paper, but I'm not sure if they're all the same. So one day we're gonna, we'll get them all written down, and we'll jump in side by side and go around. Is that all right?

Trisha said Yep, perfect.

Mayor O'Hare said What do they want?

Stacey said they are just numbers and like kind of do an audit.

Mayor O'Hare said Those are our cans, all right?

Stacey said yeah.

LuAnn said either way, so they just need to do an audit to see if the customer matches the number of cans.

Stacey said Well, our if we make sure that they're actually being charged enough, or maybe they're not overcharging us.

LuAnn said Okay.

Stacey said, so I mean, it could be good and bad. So with the audits, that's what it's kind of out.

Mayor O'Hare said Oh, so they just want to know the people at that address, how many cans they have.

Stacey said Yeah, when the guy drives by, he's cuz if there's somebody, like, if my house has three cans, that's wrong, because I only have two and I'm only getting charged for two, but which is the town, no big deal, right? But there was a problem out west, out of the city limits, and they called and said they were getting charged, or that one can wasn't getting dumped, or something. Well, they were only being charged for one can, so that's why the other can didn't get dumped.

LuAnn said Oh, get it dumped.

Stacey said Yeah, oh, so, she just wanted to know, it's just for the driver.

LuAnn said What about the second can.

Stacey said it wasn't from here. No, it wasn't from here. But I'll have to tell you after a bit, but I'm not gonna put it on the record. So anyway, um, that's what it's about.

LuAnn said so, wow.

Stacey said yeah.

Mayor O'Hare said so, I guess the driver is going to know how many cans are at each house, and if there's more than that, he's only going to dump what they have, what they pay for.

Stacey said yeah.

Mayor O'Hare said Okay, well, they want to put that on the driver, then that's fine. That's up to them.

Tammie said they have some fancy things you never know.

Mayor O'Hare said I don't know. I've seen that. I've seen that garbage truck. It doesn't look like it's got very much fancy stuff on it. Thank you. So, does anybody have questions? Nope, okay, thank you.

AJ, no.

Carson said we're ready to go home.

Mayor O'Hare said you have nothing.

AJ said I have nothing.

Mayor O'Hare said Thank you. AJ.

Mayor O'Hare said LuAnn, do you have anything else?

LuAnn said Nope.

Mayor O'Hare said Heather, yep. Update on the Easter Egg Hunt.

Heather said it went lovely.

Stacey asked how many kids did we have.

Heather said I don't have a count? I thought it was good. Not as much is there last year.

There wasn't much, but it was more than last year, but not as much as normally.

Mayor O'Hare said to Jed want to thank your daughter for doing the Easter Bunny.

LuAnn said yes, she did awesome.

Mayor O'Hare said Thank you very much.

LuAnn said the picture I'll never forget is your grandson running to the Easter Bunny.

That was the cutest thing I've ever seen.

Mayor O'Hare said We really need to get a new bunny outfit before next year, though.

Mayor O'Hare said, " Trish, you got anything?

Trisha said no.

Mayor O'Hare said okay. And I'm glad that you're here, because I wanted, I was gonna call you, but I'm so busy. Do you want to give us an update on the Fourth of July? Or is there anything? Is there anything to update? Or is everything, I mean, do you need anything from us?

Carson said the whole budget, so if there's any more money we can throw towards it, call four or 5 places, the food can be five to \$6,000,

Mayor O'Hare said what?

Carson said it's gonna be seven to \$10 a plate?

Mayor O'Hare said well, I just did, I did just hear a freaking thing on the news about how the price of beef has gone up, outrages, you know.

Carson said I'm sure we can find cheaper food somewhere, We do have it made it somewhere that I've had

\$5,000 for just around stuff, you know?

Mayor O'Hare said About a food truck? They can't make it fast. That's the problem. People who defend 30 minutes.

LuAnn asked everybody if they were only in favor of us, the city, footing the bill.

Carson said No.

LuAnn said we used to charge people.

Carson said what I told them this morning.

LuAnn said we used to have to pay five bucks, then we had to charge people \$5 a plate, it just has to be.

Carson said we will have to ask for donations.

Tammie said we have been meeting every month.

LuAnn said I'm not opposed to paying five bucks.

Carson said It's the same people every time they've asked for donations.

LuAnn said \$10 dollars.

Mayor O'Hare said Well, yeah, because we don't have, I mean, we don't have a lot of businesses here, and it's not really the

Best.

LuAnn said I don't think that's a bad idea.

Mayor O'Hare said I know, if you go, have you talked to Shane Eliason.

Carson said I think someone was going to talk to Shane.

Mayor O'Hare said Yeah, because I talked to Shane last year and he said he'd be more than willing. The Eliason Ranch Trucking would be more than willing to make a donation or pay for something for the Fourth of July.

Trisha asked Where are you getting the food?

Carson said I've called Jim Brian's. I've called a few Mexican restaurants, and we're gonna go to tacos.

Tammie said Yeah, they talked about doing tacos because it'll be cheap.

Carson said the taco bar for everything, completely catered, other than they don't come and do it. It's \$6,000; everything else is \$5,000, but we have to buy the plates, the drinks, everything.

Mayor O'Hare said Wow. And that's the budget. The budget is \$6,000.

LuAnn said I think we should charge people a little bit.

Carson said How do you do that the problem.

LuAnn said Well, we advertise it and say the, you know, due to the cost of living.

Trisha said If you want it, this is how we do if you want a dinner, if this is what it yeah costs. Otherwise, we're just gonna do it without the dinner.

Heather said, and have tickets.

LuAnn said Yeah, because we can't just keep adding money to that and feeding everybody, it's too expensive.

Tammi said there aren't a lot of cities and towns that do a free meal, if you think about it, like us.

LuAnn said yeah.

Mayor O'Hare said How do they do it?

Tammie said They don't. They charge. You can come to the park and enjoy the fireworks, but if you want to buy dinner, you can buy your dinner.

Mayor O'Hare said What if we had maybe a couple of food trucks that came out, and then people just buy food off the food trucks.

Heather said it might be too slow and too late for this year.

Trisha said Like the food trucks are going to go where they're going to make big bucks, right? That's what I would do. I tell you no, I'm going to go where I make the money.

Carson said you guys are going to get backlash from it for charging the community. I can already see it.

Mayor O'Hare said Well, and that's fine. They can yell at us.

LuAnn said either that or we can do hot dogs and a bag of chips.

Carson said maybe burgers, which would be fine too. I can get enough people with a grill.

Mayor O'Hare said I mean, we haven't done hot dogs and hamburgers in a long time. Why don't we just, why don't we just do that with that?

LuAnn said we need to go with the cheapest option, or we need to charge them for the expensive.

Carson said Beef is expensive.

LuAnn said So let's just do hot dogs. Hot dogs in a bag of chips. And I don't think it's to be too big or old, it doesn't need to be a huge gourmet meal.

Jed said he wants Maddox's Prime rib.

Trisha said you could do a sloppy joe sandwich pretty dang cheap.

Carson said that the problem is to make it, if you have people making it at their house or bringing it.

Tammie said you gotta have, like, a restaurant that's, don't you think that's got food handlers permits?

Trisha said Yeah, I don't know. I just feel like in the old days we could have all that.

LuAnn said when we used to do it, we always did hamburgers and hot dogs, and grilled them right there on the grill. We just started early. Let's brush that.

Carson said I will talk to Shane and Josh to see if they can donate the beef.

Mayor O'Hare said I would do hamburgers, hot dogs, and then we'd go to Costco and buy a whole bunch of individual bags of chips, you know, the big old package at once.

Mayor O'Hare said I can check with Niagara and see if they'll donate some cases of water.

Trisha said Okay, let's go that route. I'm done for the day. Let's wrap this up.

Mayor O'Hare said I gotta get to bed. I gotta get up and freaking three hours.

LuAnn said Let's go for a cheaper option. Carson.

Carson said I will check with hot dogs.

LuAnn said if hamburgers are too expensive, and then we'll go with hot dogs, either donate to say, hey, we give me the beef out of your freezer, you know, then cut me a check for 500 bucks. Yeah, it'll be about the same.

LuAnn asked Did we get any donations for the Halloween party?

Carson said that's a little bit of the problem. And then they never do. I don't like to ask twice, because they're not going to.

Mayor O'Hare said yeah, I agree with you. I agree

Carson said I only had about half of it.

Tammie said between the Fourth of July last year and the money you got for yourself. I don't remember the October one. Anyway, it was about \$2,000 in donations you got last year to help with the Fourth.

LuAnn said Yeah, so let's just do what we just said.

Mayor O'Hare asked How's the fireworks? The price on those have gone up to?

Carson said to buy them today and get them, buy two, get one free, or buy one, get two, three.

LuAnn said they said fireworks are going to go at a really high price.

Mayor O'Hare said Well, we've got the money to buy the fireworks anytime, right? And we've got a place to store them.

Jed?

Jed said we can just see them in my trailer.

Carson said or my shop.

Jed said we can blow them up anytime we want.

Carson said Maybe I'll work on that. You'll get them bought.

Mayor O'Hare said If it's cheaper right now.

Tammie said a little bit of money was left in the I was just asking Stacey if all the bills came through for the Easter party, or maybe a little bit of this year.

Mayor O'Hare said I've got one out of the car for you, a receipt. It's not much, though.

Tammie said if you buy stuff before June 30.

Mayor O'Hare said yeah.

Carson said I will use my card and turn in the receipt, They don't like checks anymore.

Mayor O'Hare said If that's something you can do, that's fine, or whatever we need to do, it's okay. I would do that, okay.

Mayor O'Hare said Public comment. Anybody for public comment? Nobody's here.

Trisha said Next, I make a motion to accept the expenses for last month.

Mayor O'Hare said Are there any additions to the thing? I got a motion from Trish to accept expenses.

LuAnn said second.

Mayor O'Hare said second for LuAnn, all in favor. Aye, opposed any motion to adjourn.

LuAnn made the motion to adjourn.

Trisha second.

Mayor O'Hare said Trish, second it, all in favor. Aye, done. Thank you, everybody.
