Communities that Care is....

A community-based approach for healthy youth development

- The CTC process is a scientifically studied approach for implementing prevention science in the community and works best when all types of community members are represented.
 - Prevention Science - Reducing risk factors for unhealthy behavior, and increasing protective factors against risk factors will promote healthy behavior outcomes.

Evidenced-Based

- CTC is supported by numerous long-term studies across communities and has been identified by BluePrints as a Certified Promising Program for Healthy Youth Development.

Communities that Care is....

Effective

- Youth in communities that are using the CTC process are:
 - **25%** less likely to engage in crime
 - **32%** less likely to start using alcohol
 - **33%** less likely to start smoking cigarettes
 - **37%** less likely to binge drink

Worth the Investment

- For every \$1 put into the CTC process, the community saves \$5.69 (Washington State Institute for Public Policy, 2023).


- The community needs an active coalition to be eligible to apply for this grant funding and would appreciate city council support


Substance Use Behaviors Among Magna's Youth

Magna Youth Marijuana Use Compared to Salt Lake County




Risk Factors for Youth Substance Use in Magna

Magna and Salt Lake County Risk Factors





Prevention Classes and Afterschool Programs in Magna

Salt Lake County Afterschool Program operates in 5 of Magna's schools. This program provides a safe place for learning and growth after school.

- Collectively, there were **438** students last school participating in ASP in Magna's schools. There was an average of **150** youth on average on any given day.
- **784** academic sessions were held last school year within the ASP.

Safety and Success Violence Prevention Initiatives

SALT LAKE COUNTY PUBLIC WORKS OPERATIONS

- Our team consists 81 Department employees operating 60 large plow trucks. Our team is on standby 24 hours a day, 7 days a week to address snow and ice events within 36 hours after the end of a storm.

STREET PRIORITY


The county's present snow control policy establishes the following priorities:

- **First Priority:** All major arterial streets considered to be the minimum network which must be kept open to provide a transportation system connecting hospitals, fire stations, police stations, and emergency medical services.
- **Second Priority:** Minor arterial streets and those streets serving public schools, selected hot spots such as steep hills.
- **Third Priority:** Collector streets and those additional streets serving public transportation.
- **Fourth Priority:** All remaining streets such as residential and local streets.
- **Fifth Priority:** Cul-De-Sacs and dead ends.





PLOW DISPATCH

- To make plow dispatch decisions County supervisors monitor:
 - Weather forecasts
 - Road cameras
 - Onsite conditions
 - Law enforcement reports
- County staff do not wait for snow accumulation thresholds to start service. Prompt action improves effectiveness.
- County personnel are dispatched when a roadway hazard is anticipated with such treatments as:
 - Pre-storm brine placement
 - Snow plowing & salt distribution



PLOW ROUTES (WEST SIDE)




West side snow removal team serving the Copperton, Magna, Kearns, & Unincorporated SLCo

- Main shift (12 am – 3 pm)
 - **1 Supervisor**
 - **17 Operators**
- Night shift (3 pm – 12 am)
 - **1 Supervisor**
 - **5 Operators**
- Sidewalk (3 pm – 12 am)
 - **1 Supervisor (shared)**
 - **5 Operators (shared)**

PRIORITY PLOW ROUTES (NIGHT)

- Night operations (3 pm – 12 am) focus on critical routes and are comprised of reduced crews.
 - Only priority routes are included in the night shift route plans
 - Respond to police requests if high traffic incident areas


