Minutes of the Salem City Council Meeting held on January 21, 2026 in the Salem City Council Chambers.

## **6:00PM WORK SESSION**

### **1. Ordinance Amending Title 10 Chapter 3 Sidewalk Installation**

#### **Sidewalk Bond Fee Rate Schedule**

Council discussed proposed changes to the sidewalk bond fee rate schedule, including holding the bond for six months following issuance of the Certificate of Occupancy in case repairs are required. Discussion included whether a flat \$5,000 bond is appropriate regardless of frontage length. It was noted that the city previously did not require a sidewalk bond. Comparisons were made to neighboring cities, including Payson and Spanish Fork. James Thomas stated that a \$5,000 bond would be a fair amount for typical repair needs.

#### **Historic Salem Map and Sidewalk Standards**

Matt Marziale presented proposed updates to the Historic Salem map, noting that perimeter areas, the central cross, and the pond area can accommodate storm drainage. He stated the proposed changes should be reviewed by the Planning Commission prior to Council action. Discussion included increasing the project trigger from \$60,000 to \$120,000 and clarifying standards for five-foot sidewalks, with the goal of providing clearer guidance.

#### **Sidewalk Safety and Access**

Councilmember Taylor asked whether residents may pay for the full frontage of their property. City Attorney Walter Bird stated he would review the ordinance to confirm this requirement. Council noted the recent road re-shouldering near 100 East. Residents expressed support for sidewalks along 300 West to improve safety for children walking to school. Mr. Marziale stated staff will explore options to create safer walking routes, including areas where sidewalks are currently lacking. The matter will be taken to the Planning Commission and returned to Council for further consideration.

### **2. Ordinance Addressing Medical Cannabis and Non-compliant Cannabinoid Products**

Council discussed an ordinance regulating medical cannabis dispensaries and similar businesses. City Attorney Walter Bird explained that state law allows the City to impose time, manner, and place restrictions, including zoning limitations. The ordinance would permit these uses in the industrial zone, with the understanding that if pharmacies are allowed in additional zones, similar establishments would also need to be permitted. The city may regulate traffic, signage, visibility, and separation from residential zones. Salem Police Department concerns regarding civil penalties were addressed and a discussion was had about the possibility of needing to revise codes to allow for better code enforcement.

Councilmember De Graw stated the ordinance appropriately addresses the City's legal authority and requirements. He noted that medical cannabis is highly regulated by the state and cannot be smoked, and that the ordinance is intended to address less-regulated businesses such as vape shops. He expressed concern about the risks associated with unregulated products and supported limiting these uses within Salem City. Councilmember De Graw also expressed interest in coordinating with the Nebo School District on enforcement efforts.

Councilmember Sacco asked about distinctions between traditional pharmacies and medical cannabis dispensaries, including signage requirements, which require specific identification such as a green cross.

### **3. Agenda Item Discussion**

#### **Public Information Officer Position**

City Manager Matt Marziale introduced the next agenda item regarding the addition of a Public Information Officer (PIO) position for Salem City. He explained that following Councilmember Simons' transition to Mayor, staff evaluated options to fill the role. It was proposed that Jen Wright transition into the PIO position while continuing as Recreation Director. Under the proposed restructure, Parks will be split off from Recreation and Chris Smith would oversee the cemetery and limited-use parks, while Ms. Wright will manage recreation programs and assume PIO responsibilities. Mr. Marziale stated that the position is being introduced to improve the consistency and effectiveness of communication with residents.

Mayor Simons expressed support for the position and confidence in Ms. Wright, noting she already performs many related duties. Marziale and Mayor Simons encouraged Councilmembers to coordinate directly with Wright regarding resident communications. Councilmember De Graw stated he is willing to work with Ms. Wright to help update the City website to meet ADA requirements this year.

Staff director reports were addressed during the work session prior to the regular City Council meeting.

## 5. LIFE SAVING RECOGNITION

Chief James and Lt. Greg Gurney presented life-saving recognition to Salem emergency personnel. Kevin and Paula Jackson requested that several first responders be recognized for their actions during a cardiac emergency at the Jackson residence on Tuesday, December 9th. Officer Matt Taylor and members of the Salem Ambulance crew, including Elkins, Ealey, and Taylor, were recognized for their prompt and effective response.

Paula and Kevin Jackson, both former members of the Salem Emergency Ambulance Association, expressed their gratitude and shared that when they helped establish the organization approximately 30 years ago, they never anticipated it would one day be directly responsible for saving Mrs. Jackson's life. The Jacksons presented handmade woodworking gifts to each responding first responder, and photos were taken following the presentation.

## 6. RECOGNITION OF PLANNING AND ZONING COMMISSION MEMBERS

City Manager Matt Marziale presented the next agenda item and recognized two individuals who have served on the Planning and Zoning Commission for the past three years: Kam Valgardson and Rodger Critchfield. Mr. Marziale thanked both members for their dedicated service and contributions to the Planning and Zoning Commission.

## 7. DECISION: APPOINTMENT OF PLANNING AND ZONING COMMISSION MEMBERS

Mayor Simons and City Manager Marziale discussed proposed additions to the Planning and Zoning Commission. Two new individuals were recommended for appointment:

1. **Bruce Ward** – Bruce has 32 years of experience in municipal government and is currently employed with the Central Utah Water Conservancy District.
2. **Mat Larsen** – Mat grew up in Spanish Fork and currently resides in Salem. He has a background in manufacturing and expressed interest in learning more about city government and contributing his perspective to serve the community.

Council members briefly discussed the qualifications and potential contributions of the proposed members and expressed support for each as a valuable new addition to the group.

Mayor Simons called for motion to appoint Bruce Ward and Mat Larsen to the Planning and Zoning Commission.

## **8. DECISION: APPOINTMENT OF POLICE CHIEF/PUBLIC SAFETY DIRECTOR**

Mayor Simons expressed her appreciation for Chief Brad James, noting his exceptional service to Salem City and referring to him as “the greatest of all time of police chiefs” and a great friend to the community. She invited Chief James to the podium to receive recognition and share a few words.

Chief James reflected on his tenure, recalling that he was sworn in as a new police chief on April 4, 1990, following a busy day on duty. He expressed confidence in the City’s future leadership and announced that an exceptional individual had been selected to serve as the next Chief. Chief James thanked the Mayor, City Council, staff, and his family for their support and sacrifices. He extended his best wishes to Lieutenant Greg Gurney in his new role as Salem’s new Police Chief.

Councilmembers Sacco, Rees, Taylor, De Graw, and Snyder each shared remarks, expressing gratitude and recounting personal memories of Chief James.

Mayor Simons then introduced and officially recognized Chief Greg Gurney, highlighting his readiness and willingness to assume the role of Salem City Police Chief.

Mayor Simons called for a motion to accept and appoint Lieutenant Greg Gurney as the new Police Chief of Salem City.

## **9. SWEARING IN NEW POLICE CHIEF**

### **Oath of Office – Chief Greg Gurney**

Chief Greg Gurney came forward to take the oath of office as Chief of the Salem Police Department, which was administered by Jeff Nielsen. Officers of the Salem Police Department joined to honor both Chief James and Chief Gurney. A group photograph was taken with the Mayor and City Council to commemorate Chief Gurney’s appointment.

Following the swearing-in, a short break was held to celebrate Chief Gurney and allow photographs with the police department and emergency personnel.

Chief Gurney addressed the Council and attendees, expressing his appreciation to Chief James, the Mayor, and City Council, and thanking them for the opportunity to serve alongside the department and City staff.

## 10. DECISION: SURPLUS POLICE SERVICE GUN

Following his swearing-in, Chief Greg Gurney remained at the podium to present the next agenda item. The Police Department requested approval to surplus a service weapon and to present Chief Brad James with his service weapon in recognition of his years of service to the City.

### **Presentation of Resolution – 250th Anniversary of the United States**

Jen Wright, Recreation Director came forward to present the next agenda item, a resolution for Salem City to partner with the State of Utah in recognizing the 250th anniversary of the United States. The resolution includes the creation of a committee to incorporate this initiative into City activities for the year.

The celebration will be part of **Salem Days 2026** with the theme *Built on Freedom*. Committee members include Mayor Simons, Councilmember Sacco, City Manager Marziale, Jen Wright, Joe and Nyla Aldridge (2026 chairs), and Mark and Amberlee Cope (2027 chairs).

Ms. Wright expressed that the State of Utah is encouraging community participation through a “Walk 250” event and neighborhood potlucks. She also noted that there is a commemorative display on the top floor of the Utah State Capitol building that will be open to the public.

Mayor Simons asked if there were any further questions and then followed up by calling for a motion to approve the resolution to partner with the State of Utah in recognizing the 250<sup>th</sup> anniversary of the United States.
