5. **Discussion and consideration of approval of employee attendance at local caucus meetings during work hours** - Michael Harrington
6. **Discussion and consideration of approval of bid amount for the 100 North Water and Sewer Replacement Project** - Keith Despain
7. **Consider approval of a funding grant agreement with Governor's Office of Economic Opportunity for the Sage block improvements** - Keith Despain. City staff applied for an economic development grant to help with the Sage block improvements. The funding amount is \$200,000. The local match is 40% which will be exceeded. The grant encourages rural communities to initiate and sponsor economic development activities and projects to bolster the local economy. The grant included the examples of Zions and Cobblersrock block improvements and the impact to our downtown and local economy including filling vacant buildings.
8. **Consider the approval of Ordinance 2026-01, Changes to the Business License Code Section 5.04 Business License Generally - through Section 5.16 - Business License Fees** - Braeden Christofferson - This approval puts forth changes to Title 5 in an effort to update and clarify Vernal City's business license requirements and more clearly define when a business is required to obtain a City license. The changes refine existing language to better align with long-standing City practice, reduce ambiguity, and improve consistency in administration and enforcement. The intent is to ensure the business license code applies to businesses with a meaningful connection to Vernal City, while providing clearer guidance to applicants, staff, and the public.
9. **Consider the approval to repeal the Vernal City Municipal Planning and Zoning Code Section 16.20.308 IADUs and adding section 16.20.100 ADUs, Ordinance No 2026-03** - Braeden Christofferson - This repeal and addition clarifies and consolidates Vernal City's ADU regulations by repealing §16.20.308 and enacting a unified §16.20.100. The item was

previously remanded to the Planning Commission to address concerns regarding short-term rentals and exterior material requirements. The revised ordinance refines owner-occupancy standards, shared utility requirements, parking, subdivision prohibitions, and design compatibility while keeping short-term rentals regulated separately. The intent is to provide clear, enforceable standards that support housing flexibility while maintaining neighborhood integrity in alignment with state land use purposes.

10. **Consider approval of an annual stipend of \$3,600 to the Ashley Valley Sewer Management Board for appointed members** - Keith Despain - Each year two of the Vernal City elected officials are appointed to serve on the Ashley Valley Sewer Management Board (AVSMB). In 2026, those two are Mayor Corey Foley and Councilman Randel Mills. Serving on the board includes monthly board meetings and board training. The AVSMB has budgeted a stipend of \$3,600 for each board member and is requesting approval from the Vernal City Council of that amount.

5 **PRESENT:** Councilmembers Robin O’Driscoll, Randel Mills, Ted Munford, Ed Long, and Nick
6 Porter and Mayor Corey Foley.

7
8 **WELCOME:** Mayor Corey Foley welcomed everyone to the meeting.
9

10 **ACKNOWLEDGEMENT AND APPROVAL OF THE SPECIAL MEETING:**
11 Councilmember Randel Mills made a motion to acknowledge and approve the Special City
12 Council Meeting. Councilmember Robin O’Driscoll seconded the motion. The motion passed with
13 all in favor.
14

15 **REVIEW OF THE LAMPLIGHTER CONCEPT PLANS**

16 City Manager Quinn Bennion addressed the Council and the community members in attendance.
17 He explained the purpose of the meeting, stating the intent was to present the preferred conceptual
18 plan for the Community Block area. He emphasized that the plan was not being presented for
19 approval at this meeting, but rather as a public reveal and opportunity for feedback. Council action
20 on the concept is anticipated at a future meeting following additional review and public input.
21

22 Mr. Bennion stated the preferred concept represents the culmination of a ten-month planning
23 process that began with a full commitment by the City to involve as many community members
24 as possible. He reported that approximately 800 individuals participated throughout the planning
25 effort, and that community engagement remains ongoing. The process included the formation of a
26 steering committee, coordination with the Downtown Alliance, stakeholder interviews, online
27 engagement, a City Council work session, and a tour of comparable projects along the Wasatch
28 Front, which was attended by approximately 30 participants and focused on communities of
29 similar size to Vernal.
30

31 Hailey Wall of Terracon presented the conceptual master plan for the proposed Community Block
32 and reviewed the overall site layout, major and supporting elements, and the proposed phased
33 approach to development. It was emphasized that the plan is conceptual in nature and intended to
34 remain flexible, with phasing subject to funding availability and future City Council priorities.
35

36 Ms. Wall outlined the major site elements, which include a visitor center with an optional café,
37 gateway features, an event stage with a terraced concert lawn, a multi-use pavilion designed to
38 accommodate year-round markets and community events, a designated food truck court with utility
39 hookups, a restaurant with indoor–outdoor seating, flexible lawn space that could accommodate a
40 future ice ribbon, a vertical landmark or lookout tower, mixed-use buildings with ground-floor
41 activation and upper-story residential or office space, a potential hotel, and a family-oriented
42 adventure play and splash area with dinosaur-themed elements. Safety and noise mitigation along

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43 Main Street were addressed through the use of landscape buffers, parking placement, and a
44 proposed slip lane intended to slow traffic and separate vehicles from pedestrian areas.
45

46 Ms. Wall also reviewed supporting site elements, including publicly accessible restrooms, flexible
47 plazas and patios, temporary and permanent kiosks for pop-up vendors, stormwater gardens, a pet
48 relief area, movable seating and furniture, fire features, shaded gathering areas, and pedestrian
49 pathways designed to accommodate multiple uses simultaneously. The site was designed to
50 support both daily use and a wide range of community events.
51

52 Discussion was held regarding the farmers market, including vendor capacity and seasonal
53 configurations. It was shown that the proposed pavilion and surrounding areas could accommodate
54 current and future market demand. A community member asked if there were plans for the City to
55 charge a fee for farmers market booth space, and Mr. Bennion stated there are no plans to charge
56 the farmers market for use of the space, noting its value as a community asset.
57

58 Ms. Wall then presented a phased development plan, beginning with design guidelines,
59 environmental remediation, and site preparation, followed by incremental construction of
60 amenities and infrastructure as funding becomes available. Full build-out was discussed as a long-
61 term effort, potentially occurring over approximately seven years. Mr. Bennion reiterated that the
62 project is intended to be completed within existing budget constraints and without a tax increase,
63 utilizing grants, partnerships, and private development where possible.
64

65 Parking, traffic circulation, and pedestrian safety were discussed, including preliminary estimates
66 of approximately 298 parking spaces serving the block and the proposed relocation of a pedestrian
67 crossing to better align with plaza access and event circulation. Councilmembers discussed the
68 importance of balancing parking needs with fiscal responsibility.
69

70 Preliminary cost estimates were reviewed, with consultants noting a wide range due to the
71 conceptual level of design. The estimated cost for the City's portion of the project was discussed
72 as approximately \$10–12 million, exclusive of private development, with lower and higher ranges
73 acknowledged depending on final scope and finishes.
74

75 Councilmembers and members of the public asked questions regarding food truck capacity, winter
76 operations, storm impacts, event programming, pedestrian crossings, and coordination with
77 existing community events. Ms. Wall emphasized flexibility, phased implementation, and
78 continued refinement of the plan. She outlined next steps, including finalizing the concept plan,
79 compiling public engagement results and budget considerations into a report, and returning the
80 item to the Vernal City Council for further review and direction.
81

82 **ADJOURN:** There being no further business; *Councilmember Nick Porter moved to adjourn.*
83 *Councilmember Randel Mills seconded the motion. The motion passed with a unanimous vote and*
84 *the meeting was declared adjourned.*

16 **APPROVAL OF THE MINUTES OF THE REGULAR CITY COUNCIL MEETING HELD**
17 **JANUARY 21, 2026.**

18 *Councilmember Nick Porter moved to approve the minutes of the Regular City Council Meeting*
19 *held January 21, 2026. Councilmember Robin O’Driscoll seconded the motion. The motion passed*
20 *with Councilmembers Munford, Mills, O’Driscoll, Long, and Porter voting in favor.*

21
22 **REQUEST FOR SPONSORSHIP, BLOW WISHES FOR EMILY - MARK STRATTON**

23 Kevin Stratton and Pearl Cook, representing Blow Wishes for Emily, addressed the Vernal City
24 Council regarding a request for funding support for their annual Cornhole Tournament. Mr.
25 Stratton explained that the event is Blow Wishes for Emily’s primary annual fundraiser and has
26 been held for six years. Proceeds from the event support the organization’s nonprofit mission,
27 which has included assisting with burial costs for approximately 50 families in the Uintah Basin
28 and providing more than 5,200 meals to the local school district through a school lunch fund. Blow
29 Wishes requested \$750 in funding assistance from Vernal City to help offset event-related costs,
30 specifically the facility rental.

31
32 Mayor Corey Foley thanked the presenters and provided general context regarding the use of
33 Transient Room Tax (TRT) funds, noting that such funds are generated through hotel stays and
34 are subject to state-imposed guidelines. City Manager Quinn Bennion reviewed the City’s
35 sponsorship guidelines, explaining that events are evaluated based on priority criteria. While
36 community-building events that attract visitors rank as a higher priority, charity fundraisers are
37 categorized as a lower priority due to the volume of such requests. Mr. Bennion noted that the City
38 has supported this event for several consecutive years.

39
40 Councilmember Ed Long inquired about the organization’s financial information and requested
41 clarification regarding the profit and loss statement included in the application, noting that
42 revenues appeared to exceed expenses. Mr. Stratton explained that the document reflected only the

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43 event budget and that remaining funds are placed into the organization’s general fund to support
44 burial assistance and related services. He offered to provide updated documentation for
45 clarification. Additional discussion included the increased cost of the Uintah County facility and
46 the organization’s decision to seek funding through Vernal City rather than the County.

47
48 Councilmembers expressed appreciation for the services Blow Wishes provides to the community
49 and acknowledged the positive impact of the organization’s charitable efforts.

50
51 *Councilmember Robin O’Driscoll made a motion to approve the sponsorship funding of \$750 for*
52 *Blow Wishes for Emily. Councilmember Randel Mills seconded the motion. The motion passed*

61 **REQUEST FOR SPONSORSHIP, MARVELOUS XTREME BULL MADNESS - TONJA**
62 **LOFTHOUSE**

63 Ben and Tonja Lofthouse addressed the Vernal City Council regarding sponsorship support for the
64 annual Marvelous Extreme Bull Madness event, a Professional Rodeo Cowboys Association
65 (PRCA) sanctioned bull riding event held in Vernal, Utah. Mr. Lofthouse stated that the event has
66 been held for seven years and continues to grow in scale and regional impact. He explained that
67 the 2025 event featured approximately 80 professional bull riders, including nationally and
68 internationally recognized competitors, many of whom travel to Vernal midweek and remain
69 through the weekend, contributing to hotel stays and local economic activity. Mr. Lofthouse noted
70 that participants fly in from multiple states and internationally, utilizing the Vernal Regional
71 Airport.

72
73 Mr. Lofthouse further outlined increased operational costs, including higher PRCA-required rider
74 payouts, increased facility fees at Western Park, and rising insurance costs. He emphasized that
75 the event incorporates family-friendly and community-focused elements such as sheep riding and
76 a donkey race to encourage broad community participation. He also noted that, independent of the
77 riders, event operations result in the booking of approximately 30 hotel rooms to accommodate
78 staff and animal handlers, with livestock transported from several western states.

79
80 Mrs. Lofthouse presented a special concept planned for the upcoming event in recognition of the
81 250th anniversary of the United States, noting that the opening ceremony will feature a patriotic
82 theme centered on a large Liberty Bell display. She explained that local businesses are assisting
83 with materials and construction, and expressed hope that the Liberty Bell could be reused for future
84 community events and parades. It was also noted that the event has received national exposure,
85 including rebroadcasts on the Cowboy Channel.

86

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87 During discussion, Council noted that the sponsorship amount requested had been left blank on
88 the application. Mr. Lofthouse stated that he has traditionally left the amount open and has been
89 appreciative of prior City support, which was clarified to be \$1,000 in previous years. Mayor Corey
90 Foley and City Manager Quinn Bennion commented on the event’s strong alignment with
91 community identity and its demonstrated success, while also noting the long-term goal of
92 encouraging self-sustaining operations for for-profit events.

93
94 *Councilmember Ed Long motioned to approve a \$1,000 sponsorship for the Marvelous Xtreme*
95 *Bull Madness event. Councilmember Robin O’Driscoll seconded the motion. The motion passed*
96 *unanimously with the following roll call vote:*

104 **CONSIDER ACCEPTANCE OF ANNEXATION PETITION FROM MICHAEL**
105 **ESKELSON FOR BRIAR CREEK SUBDIVISION AND N&E PROPERTIES - QUINN**
106 **BENNION**

107
108 City Manager Quinn Bennion presented an annexation petition for property located near 500 West
109 and 1500 South, adjacent to existing Vernal City boundaries. He explained that the request is
110 primarily driven by water availability limitations through Ashley Valley Water and Sewer, which
111 create challenges for future subdivision development. The petition is supported by the vast
112 majority of property owners and exceeds the statutory requirement that at least one-third of the
113 total appraised property value consent to annexation.

114
115 City Attorney Michael confirmed that the petition meets state requirements and outlined the
116 annexation process, with City Recorder Sara Bell noting that Council consideration at this stage is
117 limited to accepting the petition for further review. Acceptance initiates agency notifications and
118 a 30-day protest period but does not finalize annexation. If protests are received, the matter would
119 be reviewed by the Boundary Commission. Following the protest period, the matter would return
120 to the Vernal City Council for a public hearing and potential adoption of an annexation ordinance.

121
122 Councilmembers requested that any formal protests received during the protest period be shared
123 with the Council for review. City Attorney Michael confirmed that protests are submitted to his
124 office and could be provided to the Council.

125
126 Applicant Michael Eskelson stated that nearly all property owners have agreed to the annexation,
127 with additional properties under contract or negotiation. He reported no significant opposition and
128 noted general support from Ashley Valley Water and Sewer and Uintah County officials.

129
130 Councilmembers expressed support for the annexation concept, noting the need for housing

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131 opportunities and long-term infrastructure planning, and acknowledged the existing and
132 anticipated water constraints within Ashley Valley Water and Sewer.

133
134 Mr. Bennion provided additional commentary regarding future coordination with Ashley Valley
135 Water and Sewer, outlining four potential service scenarios related to water infrastructure, water
136 rights, and billing arrangements following annexation. He emphasized that while these matters do
137 not prevent acceptance of the annexation petition, they will require resolution prior to final
138 annexation approval. He noted that discussions with Ashley Valley Water and Sewer are ongoing
139 and that similar annexations are anticipated in the future due to regional water limitations.

140
141 Mr. Eskelson clarified that the internal water and sewer infrastructure within the subdivision
142 remains under his control during the bonding period and has not yet been accepted by Ashley
143 Valley Water and Sewer, which may affect future service agreements if annexation proceeds.

144
145 City Manager Quinn Bennion advised that accepting the petition would initiate the statutory
146 timeline and formalize coordination efforts with affected agencies. He stated that Ashley Valley
147 Water and Sewer and Uintah County have been notified and are aware of the request.

148
149 *Councilmember Ted Munford made a motion to accept the annexation petition from Michael*
150 *Eskelson for Briar Creek Subdivision and surrounding properties as presented. Councilmember*
151 *Nick Porter seconded the motion. Councilmember Ed Long excused himself from the vote due to*
152 *a familial tie within the proposed annexation area. The motion passed with the following roll call*

161 **PRESENTATION REGARDING GEO-GRID DISTRICT AND CONSIDER APPROVAL**
162 **OF A PHASE 1 STUDY - KEITH DESPAIN**

163 Public Works Director Keith Despain provided a follow-up discussion regarding the proposed
164 geothermal thermal energy network, explaining that the concept involves using the Earth’s natural
165 heat to provide heating and cooling to buildings through a shared water-based utility loop. He
166 stated that the feasibility study under consideration would help answer questions previously raised
167 by the Council. As a preliminary estimate, he projected that approximately one mile of geothermal
168 loop with eleven building connections could cost roughly \$2 million, including boreholes and
169 distribution piping. He emphasized that this figure is conceptual and based on assumptions, as no
170 formal design has been completed.

171
172 Mr. Despain noted that return on investment is difficult to quantify due to variables such as existing
173 building efficiency and potential energy savings, but suggested the system could provide long-
174 term cost benefits and serve as an economic development incentive. He also indicated the City’s

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175 interest in coordinating with Uintah County, which has secured grant funding for a related
176 geothermal study, and combining resources to evaluate both approaches through a single feasibility
177 effort.

178
179 Matt Garlick, CEO of the Gray Edge Group, joined the meeting remotely and presented an
180 overview of thermal energy networks and geothermal systems. He reviewed system components,
181 including heat pumps, ambient temperature loops, and thermal storage, and explained how energy
182 can be shared between buildings to improve overall efficiency. Mr. Garlick presented case studies
183 from Colorado Mesa University and Weber State University, highlighting significant long-term
184 utility cost savings, reduced water use, and high system efficiency achieved through similar
185 systems. He also discussed scalability, long system lifespans, and potential ownership and
186 operating models involving public entities, utilities, and third-party partners.

187
188 Mr. Garlick outlined a proposed phased study approach. Phase One would be a \$20,000 fixed-fee
189 feasibility study to identify potential building clusters, estimate thermal loads, and evaluate
190 possible energy sources and sinks. Subsequent phases could include test bore drilling, further
191 engineering analysis, and system design, with significantly higher costs.

192
193 Councilmember Ed Long raised questions regarding upfront costs, long-term financial
194 commitments, depreciation, maintenance requirements, and realistic return on investment
195 timelines. Councilmember Randel Mills expressed concerns about committing City funds without
196 a clearer understanding of total project costs, funding sources, and the likelihood of
197 implementation. Councilmember Ted Munford requested additional information from other
198 municipalities that have completed similar studies, including phased costs, timelines, maintenance
199 histories, and documented savings.

200 Mr. Garlick discussed the potential funding mechanisms, including federal tax credits, utility
201 incentives, grants, and utility-style financing repaid through user fees. Councilmembers
202 emphasized the importance of identifying grant funding opportunities before committing City
203 budget funds. Councilmember Ted Munford stated that, while he is not opposed to the geothermal
204 concept, he would like to review detailed information from public entities that have already
205 implemented similar systems before making a decision. He indicated that such information should
206 be publicly available and requested documentation outlining the full process those entities
207 followed, including phase-by-phase costs, project timelines, and overall implementation structure.
208 Quinn Bennion noted that Uintah County has secured grant funding for a related geothermal study
209 and expressed interest in coordinating efforts.

210
211 *Councilmember Nick Porter motioned to table Phase 1 of the Geothermal Study, allowing more*
212 *time for information to be collected. Councilmember Ted Munford seconded the motion. The*
213 *motion passed with all in favor.*

214
215 **CONSIDER APPROVAL OF A DEMOLITION CONTRACT WITH ALTA**
216 **EXCAVATION FOR THE DEMOLITION OF THE MOTEL PORTION ON**
217 **LAMPLIGHTER BLOCK - KEITH DESPAIN**

218 Public Works Director Keith Despain stated that the item was a follow-up to the prior Council

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219 meeting at which the project was awarded to Alta Excavation for demolition of the motel portion
220 of the Lamplighter. He explained that the contract has since been signed by the contractor and is
221 now before the Council for review and approval. Director Despain requested approval of the
222 contract so the City may execute the agreement and proceed with demolition. Councilmember Ed
223 Long inquired about the total contract amount, noted as approximately \$134,000.

224
225 *Councilmember Ed Long made a motion to approve the demolition contract with Alta Excavation*
226 *for the demolition of the motel portion of Lamplighter Block. Councilmember Robin O’Driscoll*
227 *seconded the motion. The motion passed unanimously with the following roll call vote:*

237 **CONSIDER THE APPROVAL OF ORDINANCE NO 2026-02, ADOPTING THE 2006**
238 **UTAH WILDLAND-URBAN INTERFACE CODE, AS ADOPTED UNDER UTAH CODE**
239 **§ 15A-2-103 - BRAEDEN CHRISTOFFERSON**

240 Assistant City Manager Braeden Christofferson presented the revised Wildland Urban Interface
241 (WUI) map as a follow-up to Council discussion held approximately one month prior. He
242 explained that the Council had previously reviewed a draft map and expressed concern that the
243 highlighted areas were overly expansive. In response, Braeden worked with Jeremy Raymond and
244 Corey Auger, along with partners from the Department of Natural Resources, to recalibrate and
245 significantly reduce the designated areas. A public meeting was held the previous week to gather
246 input, with limited attendance from Vernal residents as well as representatives from surrounding
247 communities. The updated map was provided to the Council in ledger format for parcel-level
248 review and displayed publicly during the meeting. Braeden emphasized that the map reflects what
249 staff believe is an appropriate and necessary representation of WUI areas within the City, while
250 remaining subject to Council discretion for further adjustment.

251
252 Mr. Christofferson clarified that no areas within Vernal City are designated as “high risk” under
253 the State’s separate high-risk WUI map released the prior month. The areas identified within City
254 limits are classified as “moderate risk” and are intended to address defensible space requirements
255 under the 2006 WUI Code. Properties located within the designated areas would generally be
256 required to maintain approximately 30 feet of defensible space from structures to adjacent wildland
257 vegetation. Existing homes would not be required to replace roofs or retrofit building materials,
258 however, new construction within designated areas would be required to comply with applicable
259 WUI building code standards.

260
261 Councilmembers asked questions regarding the number of homes affected, potential insurance
262 implications, and whether assistance would be available to property owners. Mr. Christofferson

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263 estimated that approximately a dozen homes may be directly impacted, along with several
264 undeveloped parcels. Jeremy Raymond stated that the revised Wildland Urban Interface (WUI)
265 map reflects a significant reduction from the previous version presented to the Council. He
266 explained that staff removed agricultural fields and vegetation areas deemed not directly pertinent
267 to wildfire risk and carefully reevaluated residential areas based on on-site review and Council
268 feedback. Corey Auger confirmed that the Fire District can provide home assessments, education,
269 and mitigation assistance at no cost to homeowners through existing cooperative agreements and
270 available funding. Councilmembers expressed appreciation for having resources available to help
271 residents comply, noting that the goal is education and hazard mitigation rather than punitive
272 enforcement.

273
274 Mr. Auger explained that the WUI map is not permanent and must be reviewed at least every three
275 years under state code. As development expands, vegetation is cleared, or annexations occur,
276 designated areas may be adjusted accordingly. Discussion also included consideration of how
277 future annexations or adjacent county-designated areas may impact the City’s map.
278 Councilmembers acknowledged the importance of addressing fire risk while minimizing
279 unnecessary burden on residents and ensuring ongoing review and coordination with county and
280 state agencies.

281
282 *Councilmember Robin O’Driscoll moved to approve Ordinance 2026-02, adopting the 2006 Utah*
283 *Wildland-Urban Interface Code. Councilmember Ted Munford seconded the motion. The motion*

299 appreciates the City Council’s support and requested formal acknowledgment of the leadership
300 appointments.

STAFF REPORTS

Police Chief Mike Gledhill provided an update to Mayor Corey Foley and the City Council regarding a planned student protest scheduled for the following day involving Immigration and Customs Enforcement (ICE). He stated that students intend to walk from the high school into City limits, concluding at the library. The Police Department has coordinated with the school district and developed safety plans to ensure the event remains peaceful and orderly. Chief Gledhill reported that the Vernal Police Department will monitor the activity and remain present to ensure public safety. The school district is aware of the protest and has indicated it will not prevent students from participating.

City Manager Quinn Bennion reported that, upon review of the Haunt lease agreement, staff discovered an automatic one-year extension is already in place, eliminating the immediate need for Council action. He further updated the Council on ongoing legislative developments, noting that city manager groups are participating in daily briefings due to the volume of proposed bills. He highlighted significant discussion surrounding property tax legislation, including proposals ranging from eliminating certain tax authorities to requiring voter approval for increases or limiting increases to 5% above the certified tax rate. Mr. Bennion stated that while the City is not immediately concerned, such changes could create challenges in responding to unforeseen financial needs. He also addressed proposals to reduce required reserve funds from 35% to 25%, expressing his recommendation to maintain the current 35% reserve, which provides approximately four months of operational coverage compared to three months at 25%.

MINUTES OF THE VERNAL CITY COUNCIL REGULAR MEETING HELD FEBRUARY 4, 2026

351 Finance Director Nick Rousseau addressed a recent notice indicating the City is currently out of
352 compliance with certain state reporting requirements. He explained that the issue stems from
353 staffing vacancies and transition-related cleanup from the prior year. Mr. Rousseau assured the
354 Council that the City is actively working to bring all filings current and remains on track to submit
355 required documentation moving forward.

- g) A Rural Community must have a functioning planning and zoning commission or a duly organized municipal economic opportunity advisory board or commission that will act under the same advisory requirements as a CEO Board, as described in Attachment E: County Economic Opportunity Advisory Board incorporated herein, and which exists in the municipality in which the Grantee is domiciled.

 - (2) For a multi-year grant (if applicable):

 - (b) in the final quarter of each year of the grant period, excluding the final year, Grantee shall deliver to GOEO a report that details Grantee’s progress towards fulfilling the grant's purpose, including the annual deliverables and performance metrics described in the Contract made in accordance with Subsection (4), below.
 - (3) GOEO may not make the final grant funds disbursement until:
 - (a) Grantee or Subgrantee delivers to GOEO a final annual or quarterly report that details the extent to which Grantee fulfilled the grant's purpose, including the deliverables and performance metrics described in the agreement made in accordance with Subsection (4), below; and
 - (b) GOEO determines that Grantee and Subgrantee have satisfactorily produced each deliverable provided in this Contract, as described in Subsection (4), below.
 - (4) Except as otherwise provided in the grant appropriation and consistent with the other provisions of this section, GOEO may not disburse grant funds to a Grantee before GOEO and Grantee execute this Contract with the following included requirements:
 - (a) the disbursement schedule for the grant funds;
 - (b) the deliverables, reporting, and performance metrics that Grantee will produce and use to demonstrate that Grantee used the grant funds to fulfill the grant's purpose;



- (c) if the grant is a multi-year grant, annual deliverables and performance metrics that Grantee will produce and use to demonstrate sufficient progress towards fulfilling the grant's purpose;
- (d) Grantee acknowledges that disbursement of grant funds is subject to Legislative appropriation; and
- (e) Grantee and Subgrantees consent to follow-up audit and clawback of the grant funds if an audit shows that the grant funds were inappropriately used. ATTACHMENT A: STANDARD TERMS AND CONDITIONS FOR SERVICES BETWEEN GOVERNMENT ENTITIES

This is for a contract between Government Entities within the State of Utah for services (including professional services) meaning the furnishing of labor, time, or effort by a contractor. These terms and conditions may only be used when both parties are government entities or political subdivisions as defined in the Utah Government Immunity Act.

1. **DEFINITIONS:** The following terms shall have the meanings set forth below:
 - a) "Confidential Information" means information that is deemed as confidential under applicable state and federal laws, including personal information. The State Entity reserves the right to identify, during and after this Purchase Order, additional reasonable types of categories of information that must be kept confidential under federal and state laws.
 - b) "Contract" means the Contract Signature Page(s), including all referenced attachments and documents incorporated by reference. The term "Contract" may include any purchase orders that result from the parties entering into this Contract.
 - c) "Contract Signature Page(s)" means the State of Utah cover page(s) that the State Entity and Contractor sign.
 - d) "Contractor" means the individual or entity delivering the Services identified in this Contract. The term "Contractor" shall include Contractor's agents, officers, employees, and partners.
 - e) "Services" means the furnishing of labor, time, or effort by Contractor pursuant to this Contract. Services shall include, but not limited to, all of the deliverable(s) that result from Contractor performing the Services pursuant to this Contract. Services include those professional services identified in Section 63G-6a-103 of the Utah Procurement Code.
 - f) "Proposal" means Contractor's response to the State Entity's Solicitation.
 - g) "Solicitation" means the documents used by the State Entity to obtain Contractor's Proposal.
 - h) "State Entity" means the department, division, office, bureau, agency, or other organization identified on the Contract Signature Page(s).
 - i) "State of Utah" means the State of Utah, in its entirety, including its institutions, agencies, departments, divisions, authorities, instrumentalities, boards, commissions, elected or appointed officers, employees, agents, and authorized volunteers.
 - j) "Subcontractors" means subcontractors or subconsultants at any tier that are under the direct or indirect control or responsibility of the Contractor, and includes all independent contractors, agents, employees, authorized resellers, or anyone else for whom the Contractor may be liable at any tier, including a person or entity that is, or will be, providing or performing an essential aspect of this Contract, including Contractor's manufacturers, distributors, and suppliers.
2. **GOVERNING LAW AND VENUE:** This Contract shall be governed by the laws, rules, and regulations of the State of Utah. Any action or proceeding arising from this Contract shall be brought in a court of competent jurisdiction in the State of Utah. Venue shall be in Salt Lake City, in the Third Judicial District Court for Salt Lake County.
3. **LAWS AND REGULATIONS:** At all times during this Contract, Contractor and all Services performed under this Contract will comply with all applicable federal and state constitutions, laws, rules, codes, orders, and regulations, including applicable licensure and certification requirements.
4. **RECORDS ADMINISTRATION:** Contractor shall maintain or supervise the maintenance of all records necessary to properly account for Contractor's performance and the payments made by the State Entity to Contractor under this Contract. These records shall be retained by Contractor for at least six (6) years after final payment, or until all audits initiated within the six (6) years have been completed, whichever is later. Contractor agrees to allow, at no additional cost, State of Utah and federal auditors, and State Entity staff, access to all such records.
5. **CERTIFY REGISTRATION AND USE OF EMPLOYMENT "STATUS VERIFICATION SYSTEM":** INTENTIONALLY DELETED
6. **CONFLICT OF INTEREST:** INTENTIONALLY DELETED
7. **INDEPENDENT CONTRACTOR:** Contractor's legal status is that of an independent contractor, and in no manner shall Contractor be deemed an employee or agent of the State Entity or the State of Utah, and therefore is not entitled to any of the benefits associated with such employment. Contractor, as an independent contractor, shall have no authorization, express or implied, to bind the State Entity or the State of Utah to any agreements, settlements, liabilities, or understandings whatsoever, and agrees not to perform any acts as an agent for the State Entity or the State of Utah. Contractor shall remain responsible for all applicable federal, state, and local taxes, and all FICA contributions.
8. **INDEMNITY:** Both parties to this agreement are governmental entities as defined in the Utah Governmental Immunity Act (Utah Code Ann.



63G-7-101 et. seq.). Nothing in this Contract shall be construed as a waiver by either or both parties of any rights, limits, protections or defenses provided by the Act. Nor shall this Contract be construed, with respect to third parties, as a waiver of any governmental immunity to which a party to this Contract is otherwise entitled. Subject to and consistent with the Act, each party will be responsible for its own actions or negligence and will defend against any claims or lawsuit brought against it. There are no indemnity obligations between these parties.

9. **EMPLOYMENT PRACTICES:** Contractor agrees to abide by the following employment laws: (i) Title VI and VII of the Civil Rights Act of 1964 (42 U.S.C. 2000e) which prohibits discrimination against any employee or applicant for employment or any applicant or recipient of services, on the basis of race, religion, color, or national origin; (ii) Executive Order No. 11246, as amended, which prohibits discrimination on the basis of sex; (iii) 45 CFR 90 which prohibits discrimination on the basis of age; (iv) Section 504 of the Rehabilitation Act of 1973, or the Americans with Disabilities Act of 1990 which prohibits discrimination on the basis of disabilities; and (v) Utah's Executive Order, dated December 13, 2006, which prohibits unlawful harassment in the work place. Contractor further agrees to abide by any other laws, regulations, or orders that prohibit the discrimination of any kind by any of Contractor's employees.
10. **AMENDMENTS:** This Contract may only be amended by the mutual written agreement of the parties, provided that the amendment is within the Scope of Work of this Contract and is within the scope/purpose of the original solicitation for which this Contract was derived. The amendment will be attached and made part of this Contract. Automatic renewals will not apply to this Contract, even if listed elsewhere in this Contract.
11. **DEBARMENT:** Contractor certifies that it is not presently nor has ever been debarred, suspended, or proposed for debarment by any governmental department or agency, whether international, national, state, or local. Contractor must notify the State Entity within thirty (30) days if debarred, suspended, proposed for debarment, declared ineligible, or voluntarily excluded from participation in any contract by any governmental entity during this Contract.
12. **TERMINATION:** Unless otherwise stated in this Contract, this Contract may be terminated, with cause by either party, in advance of the specified expiration date, upon written notice given by the other party. The party in violation will be given ten (10) days after written notification to correct and cease the violations, after which this Contract may be terminated for cause immediately and is subject to the remedies listed below. This Contract may also be terminated without cause (for convenience), in advance of the specified expiration date, by either party, upon sixty (60) days written termination notice being given to the other party. The State Entity and the Contractor may terminate this Contract, in whole or in part, at any time, by mutual agreement in writing. On termination of this Contract, all accounts and payments will be processed according to the financial arrangements set forth herein for approved Services ordered prior to date of termination.

Contractor shall be compensated for the Services properly performed under this Contract up to the effective date of the notice of termination. Contractor agrees that in the event of such termination for cause or without cause, Contractor's sole remedy and monetary recovery from the State Entity or the State of Utah is limited to full payment for all Services properly performed as authorized under this Contract up to the date of termination as well as any reasonable monies owed as a result of Contractor having to terminate other contracts necessarily and appropriately entered into by Contractor pursuant to this Contract.

13. **NONAPPROPRIATION OF FUNDS, REDUCTION OF FUNDS, OR CHANGES IN LAW:** Upon thirty (30) days written notice delivered to the Contractor, this Contract may be terminated in whole or in part at the sole discretion of the State Entity, if the State Entity reasonably determines that: (i) a change in Federal or State legislation or applicable laws materially affects the ability of either party to perform under the terms of this Contract; or (ii) that a change in available funds affects the State Entity's ability to pay under this Contract. A change of available funds as used in this paragraph, includes, but is not limited to, a change in Federal or State funding, whether as a result of a legislative act or by order of the President or the Governor.

If a written notice is delivered under this section, the State Entity will reimburse Contractor for the Services properly ordered until the effective date of said notice. The State Entity will not be liable for any performance, commitments, penalties, or liquidated damages that accrue after the effective date of said written notice.

14. **SUSPENSION OF WORK:** Should circumstances arise which would cause the State Entity to suspend Contractor's responsibilities under this Contract, but not terminate this Contract, this will be done by written notice. Contractor's responsibilities may be reinstated upon advance formal written notice from the State Entity.
15. **SALES TAX EXEMPTION:** The Services under this Contract will be paid for from the State Entity's funds and used in the exercise of the State Entity's essential functions as a State of Utah entity. Upon request, the State Entity will provide Contractor with its sales tax exemption number. It is Contractor's responsibility to request the State Entity's sales tax exemption number. It also is Contractor's sole responsibility to ascertain whether any tax deduction or benefits apply to any aspect of this Contract.
16. **INSURANCE: INTENTIONALLY DELETED**
17. **WORKERS COMPENSATION INSURANCE:** Contractor shall maintain during the term of this Contract, workers' compensation insurance for all its employees as well as any Subcontractor employees related to this Contract. Worker's compensation insurance shall cover full liability under the worker's compensation laws of the jurisdiction in which the service is performed at the statutory limits required by said jurisdiction. Contractor acknowledges that within thirty (30) days of contract award, Contractor must submit proof of certificate of insurance that meets the above requirements.
18. **ADDITIONAL INSURANCE REQUIREMENTS: INTENTIONALLY DELETED**
19. **PUBLIC INFORMATION:** Contractor agrees that this Contract, related purchase orders, related pricing documents, and invoices will be public documents, and may be available for public and private distribution in accordance with the State of Utah's Government Records Access and



Management Act (GRAMA). Contractor gives the State Entity and the State of Utah express permission to make copies of this Contract, related sales orders, related pricing documents, and invoices in accordance with GRAMA. Except for sections identified in writing by Contractor and expressly approved by the State of Utah Division of Purchasing and General Services, all of which must be in accordance with GRAMA, Contractor also agrees that the Contractor's Proposal to the Solicitation will be a public document, and copies may be given to the public as permitted under GRAMA. The State Entity and the State of Utah are not obligated to inform Contractor of any GRAMA requests for disclosure of this Contract, related purchase orders, related pricing documents, or invoices.

20. **DELIVERY:** All deliveries under this Contract will be F.O.B. destination with all transportation and handling charges paid for by Contractor. Responsibility and liability for loss or damage will remain with Contractor until final inspection and acceptance when responsibility will pass to the State Entity, except as to latent defects or fraud.
21. **ACCEPTANCE AND REJECTION:** The State Entity shall have thirty (30) days after delivery of the Services to perform an inspection of the Services to determine whether the Services conform to the standards specified in the Solicitation and this Contract prior to acceptance of the Services by the State Entity.

If Contractor delivers nonconforming Services, the State Entity may, at its option and at Contractor's expense: (i) return the Services for a full refund; (ii) require Contractor to promptly correct or reperform the nonconforming Services subject to the terms of this Contract; or (iii) obtain replacement Services from another source, subject to Contractor being responsible for any cover costs.
22. **INVOICING:** Contractor will submit invoices within thirty (30) days of Contractor's performance of the Services to the State Entity. The contract number shall be listed on all invoices, freight tickets, and correspondence relating to this Contract. The prices paid by the State Entity will be those prices listed in this Contract, unless Contractor offers a prompt payment discount within its Proposal or on its invoice. The State Entity has the right to adjust or return any invoice reflecting incorrect pricing.
23. **PAYMENT:** Payments are to be made within thirty (30) days after a correct invoice is received. All payments to Contractor will be remitted by mail, electronic funds transfer, or the State of Utah's Purchasing Card (major credit card). If payment has not been made after sixty (60) days from the date a correct invoice is received by the State Entity, then interest may be added by Contractor as prescribed in the Utah Prompt Payment Act. The acceptance by Contractor of final payment, without a written protest filed with the State Entity within ten (10) business days of receipt of final payment, shall release the State Entity and the State of Utah from all claims and all liability to the Contractor. The State Entity's payment for the Services shall not be deemed an acceptance of the Services and is without prejudice to any and all claims that the State Entity or the State of Utah may have against Contractor.
24. **TIME IS OF THE ESSENCE:** The Services shall be completed by any applicable deadline stated in this Contract. For all Services, time is of the essence. Contractor shall be liable for all reasonable damages to the State Entity and the State of Utah, and anyone for whom the State of Utah may be liable, as a result of Contractor's failure to timely perform the Services required under this Contract.
25. **CHANGES IN SCOPE:** Any changes in the scope of the Services to be performed under this Contract shall be in the form of a written amendment to this Contract, mutually agreed to and signed by both parties, specifying any such changes, fee adjustments, any adjustment in time of performance, or any other significant factors arising from the changes in the scope of Services.
26. **PERFORMANCE EVALUATION:** The State Entity may conduct a performance evaluation of Contractor's Services, including Contractor's Subcontractors, if any. Results of any evaluation may be made available to the Contractor upon Contractor's request.
27. **STANDARD OF CARE:** The Services of Contractor and its Subcontractors shall be performed in accordance with the standard of care exercised by licensed members of their respective professions having substantial experience providing similar services which similarities include the type, magnitude, and complexity of the Services that are the subject of this Contract. Contractor shall be liable to the State Entity and the State of Utah for claims, liabilities, additional burdens, penalties, damages, or third party claims (i.e. another Contractor's claim against the State of Utah), to the extent caused by wrongful acts, errors, or omissions that do not meet this standard of care.
28. **REVIEWS:** The State Entity reserves the right to perform plan checks, plan reviews, other reviews, and/or comment upon the Services of Contractor. Such reviews do not waive the requirement of Contractor to meet all of the terms and conditions of this Contract.
29. **ASSIGNMENT:** Contractor may not assign, sell, transfer, subcontract or sublet rights, or delegate any right or obligation under this Contract, in whole or in part, without the prior written approval of the State Entity.
30. **REMEDIES:** Any of the following events will constitute cause for the State Entity to declare Contractor in default of this Contract: (i) Contractor's non-performance of its contractual requirements and obligations under this Contract; or (ii) Contractor's material breach of any term or condition of this Contract. The State Entity may issue a written notice of default providing a ten (10) day period in which Contractor will have an opportunity to cure. Time allowed for cure will not diminish or eliminate Contractor's liability for damages. If the default remains, after Contractor has been provided the opportunity to cure, the State Entity may do one or more of the following: (i) exercise any remedy provided by law or equity; (ii) terminate this Contract; (iii) impose liquidated damages, if liquidated damages are listed in this Contract; (iv) debar/suspend Contractor from receiving future contracts from the State Entity or the State of Utah; or (v) demand a full refund of any payment that the State Entity has made to Contractor under this Contract for Services that do not conform to this Contract.
31. **FORCE MAJEURE:** Neither party to this Contract will be held responsible for delay or default caused by fire, riot, acts of God, and/or war which is beyond that party's reasonable control. The State Entity may terminate this Contract after determining such delay will prevent successful performance of this Contract.



32. **CONFIDENTIALITY:** If Confidential Information is disclosed to Contractor, Contractor shall: (i) advise its agents, officers, employees, partners, and Subcontractors of the obligations set forth in this Contract; (ii) keep all Confidential Information strictly confidential; and (iii) not disclose any Confidential Information received by it to any third parties. Contractor will promptly notify the State Entity of any potential or actual misuse or misappropriation of Confidential Information.

Contractor shall be responsible for any breach of this duty of confidentiality, including any required remedies and/or notifications under applicable law. Contractor shall indemnify, hold harmless, and defend the State Entity and the State of Utah, including anyone for whom the State Entity or the State of Utah is liable, from claims related to a breach of this duty of confidentiality, including any notification requirements, by Contractor or anyone for whom the Contractor is liable.

Upon termination or expiration of this Contract, Contractor will return all copies of Confidential Information to the State Entity or certify, in writing, that the Confidential Information has been destroyed. This duty of confidentiality shall be ongoing and survive the termination or expiration of this Contract.

33. **PUBLICITY:** Contractor shall submit to the State Entity for written approval all advertising and publicity matters relating to this Contract. It is within the State Entity's sole discretion whether to provide approval, which must be done in writing.
34. **CONTRACT INFORMATION:** INTENTIONALLY DELETED.
35. **INDEMNIFICATION RELATING TO INTELLECTUAL PROPERTY:** Contractor will indemnify and hold the State Entity and the State of Utah harmless from and against any and all damages, expenses (including reasonable attorneys' fees), claims, judgments, liabilities, and costs in any action or claim brought against the State Entity or the State of Utah for infringement of a third party's copyright, trademark, trade secret, or other proprietary right. The parties agree that if there are any limitations of Contractor's liability such limitations of liability will not apply to this section.
36. **OWNERSHIP IN INTELLECTUAL PROPERTY:** The State Entity and Contractor each recognizes that each has no right, title, interest, proprietary or otherwise in the intellectual property owned or licensed by the other, unless otherwise agreed upon by the parties in writing. All deliverables, documents, records, programs, data, articles, memoranda, and other materials not developed or licensed by Contractor prior to the execution of this Contract, but specifically created or manufactured under this Contract shall be considered work made for hire, and Contractor shall transfer any ownership claim to the State Entity.
37. **WAIVER:** A waiver of any right, power, or privilege shall not be construed as a waiver of any subsequent right, power, or privilege.
38. **ATTORNEY'S FEES:** INTENTIONALLY DELETED
39. **PROCUREMENT ETHICS:** Contractor understands that a person who is interested in any way in the sale of any supplies, services, construction, or insurance to the State of Utah is violating the law if the person gives or offers to give any compensation, gratuity, contribution, loan, reward, or any promise thereof to any person acting as a procurement officer on behalf of the State of Utah, or to any person in any official capacity participates in the procurement of such supplies, services, construction, or insurance, whether it is given for their own use or for the use or benefit of any other person or organization.
40. **DISPUTE RESOLUTION:** INTENTIONALLY DELETED.
41. **ORDER OF PRECEDENCE:** In the event of any conflict in the terms and conditions in this Contract, the order of precedence shall be: (i) this Attachment A; (ii) Contract Signature Page(s); (iii) the State of Utah's additional terms and conditions, if any; (iv) any other attachment listed on the Contract Signature Page(s); and (v) Contractor's terms and conditions that are attached to this Contract, if any. Any provision attempting to limit the liability of Contractor or limits the rights of the State Entity or the State of Utah must be in writing and attached to this Contract or it is rendered null and void.
42. **SURVIVAL OF TERMS:** Termination or expiration of this Contract shall not extinguish or prejudice the State Entity's right to enforce this Contract with respect to any default of this Contract or defect in the Services that has not been cured.
43. **SEVERABILITY:** The invalidity or unenforceability of any provision, term, or condition of this Contract shall not affect the validity or enforceability of any other provision, term, or condition of this Contract, which shall remain in full force and effect.
44. **ENTIRE AGREEMENT:** This Contract constitutes the entire agreement between the parties and supersedes any and all other prior and contemporaneous agreements and understandings between the parties, whether oral or written.

ATTACHMENT B: RURAL COMMUNITIES OPPORTUNITY GRANT TERMS AND CONDITIONS

1. **PROJECT DESIGN, SCOPE OF WORK, AND USE OF FUNDS:** The scope of work for this Contract shall be the Grantee’s Project Plan as described in Attachment C: Project Plan. Grant funds awarded under this Contract shall be used by Grantee to accomplish the project as described therein.

2. **NATURE OF ENTITY:** For the purposes of this grant, a “Rural Community” means a rural county or a rural municipality as defined in Utah Code Section 63-4-801. Rural communities eligible for the RCOG include counties of the third², fourth, fifth, and sixth class; cities, towns, and metro townships located in counties of the third, fourth, fifth, and sixth class; and municipalities with a population of 10,000 or less in counties of the second class. An Association of Governments (“AOG”) means an association of political subdivisions of the state established pursuant to an interlocal agreement under Title 11, Chapter 13, Interlocal Cooperation Act, and as defined in the same section as above. Qualified AOGs are currently as follows:
 - a) Bear River Association of Governments (BRAG)
 - b) Five County Association of Governments
 - c) Mountainland Association of Governments (MAG)
 - d) R6 Regional Council, formerly known as Six County Association of Governments
 - e) Southeastern Regional Development Agency (SERDA); formerly known as Southeastern Utah Association of Local Governments (SEAULG)
 - f) Uintah Basin Association of Governments (UBAG)
 - g) Wasatch Front Regional Council (WFRC)

3. **FUNDING:** All Grant funds awarded under this Contract are subject to the following funding conditions:
 - a) Grantee shall not receive any Grant Money until this Contract is fully signed and executed.
 - b) Grantee shall submit an invoice for 75% of the Contract Amount to be disbursed prior to full completion of the Grantee’s project.
 - c) Grantee shall submit an invoice for 25% of the Contract Amount to be reimbursed contingent upon completion of the Grantee’s project and submission of the Final Report.
 - d) In no event shall payments from the State to Grantee exceed in sum the Contract Amount.
 - e) The final delivery of the Contract Amount shall be distributed as reimbursement for dollars spent by the Grantee within the scope of the Grantee’s project.

4. **REQUIREMENTS FOR REIMBURSEMENT OF GRANT FUNDS:** The State shall make available to the Grantee an online portal allowing Grantee to make requests for final reimbursement of the outstanding 25% of grant funds. The Compliance Department of the Governor’s Office of Economic Opportunity will examine the key elements in Attachment C: Project Plan, including Project Proposal, Scope of Work, Deliverables and Outcomes, Timeline and Budget to determine reimbursement qualification. In addition to documentation relating to the key elements as stated above, Grantee will submit the following documentation upon final reimbursement request:
 - a) A Letter of Request on entity letterhead specifying the amount requested and certifying that the project is fully completed and all project invoices to Grantee have been paid by Grantee. The Letter of Request shall be signed, and the accuracy of the information verified by a company officer.
 - b) Copies of all invoices and evidence of payment (i.e. checks, bank statements, loan agreements) for work on the project.
 - c) Documentation of Grantee’s contribution to the Project Plan equal to or greater than the matching amount as specified in section 6(d) of the contract.
 - d) A Final Report as described herein.

5. **REIMBURSEMENT REQUESTS:** Requests shall be submitted to the State electronically, to the GOEO Department Program Director and/or the Compliance Department at GOEO. A link to the online portal will be sent to Grantee upon the completion of the processing of this Contract. Grantee shall document that all of the Contract Amount received by the Grantee for this project was spent on efforts towards the project.
6. **SCHEDULE OF PAYMENT:** All reimbursements are subject to performance review of goals and benchmarks established by the Grantee's Project Plan. Grant funds shall be disbursed as follows:
 - a) Reimbursement requests received by GOEO after six (6) months after the Contract End date WILL NOT BE ELIGIBLE FOR REIMBURSEMENT.
 - b) Contract Amount is payable within sixty (60) days of a complete request, and only after approval of the completion of the project.
 - c) Successful completion will be determined by the State, based on documentation of completion of goals and benchmarks as outlined in Attachment C, and as defined above.
 - d) In no event shall payments exceed the total Contract Amount provided for in this Contract. Funds shall be disbursed within sixty (60) days of receipt of a complete request from Grantee and approved by the Compliance Department of GOEO, in cooperation with the Program Director.
7. **REPORTING REQUIREMENTS:** On or before September 1 of each year, Grantee shall provide a written report to the State that describes the following information:
 - a) The amount of Grant Money the Grantee has received.
 - b) How the Grant Money has been distributed by the Grantee, including:
 - i. What companies or entities have utilized Grant Money,
 - ii. How much Grant Money each company or entity has received, and
 - iii. How each company or entity has used the Grant Money.
 - c) An evaluation of the effectiveness of awarded grants in improving economic development in the county, including:
 - i. the number of jobs created,
 - ii. the infrastructure that has been created, and
 - iii. the capital improvements in the Rural Community or AOG.
 - d) How much matching money has been utilized by the Grantee and what entities or sources have provided the matching money, and
 - e) Any other reporting, auditing, or post-performance requirements established by the State in collaboration with the Rural Opportunity Advisory Committee. The Rural Opportunity Advisory Committee (the "Advisory Committee") is defined in Utah Code 63N-4-804.

With request for final payment, Grantee shall submit a Final Report to the State. The Final Report shall address the following:

 - a) Assurances that all monies paid to the Grantee were used towards completion of the project outlined in Attachment C: Project Plan.
 - b) A description and itemized report detailing how key activities and commitments were accomplished and identifying the deliverables with performance measures as outlined in Attachment C: Project Plan.
8. **SITE VISITS:** The State reserves the right to visit the Grantee's operations, the project site, and other facilities related to the project. Grantee agrees to allow State access to such sites and facilities as agreed, upon reasonable notice to Grantee.
9. **ACCESS TO DATA:** At State's request Grantee shall allow State access to data and information about the project to assess progress and ensure that grant funding is being spent on the project specified within the Grantee's Project Proposal.
10. **AUDIT:** Grantee shall allow State auditors to make audits and inspections of all records relating to this Grant. Grantee shall make available for audit and inspection the records of expenditures relating to this Contract until all State audits are completed or for period of up to five (5) years from the date of this Contract. Grantee shall refund



to the State any grant funds spent that did not meet the requirements of this Contract and determined by audit to be ineligible under the terms hereof or in accordance with State and Federal law.

11. **STATE CONTACT PERSON:** The State designates the current GOEO Department Program Director, or their successor, as the contact person at the Utah Governor's Office of Economic Opportunity to consult with the Grantee on an ongoing basis. The contact person will provide the Grantee with any additional guidelines, standards, procedures, and reporting requirements on which the State will review progress and evaluate performance hereunder.
12. **EVALUATION:** The State reserves the right to conduct an independent evaluation of the use of the grant funding and of the activities covered by this Contract, including achievement of goals and benchmarks, location of entity, and achievement of outcomes, economic development, and job creation. Such evaluation may employ qualitative as well as concrete measures of outcomes. The State reserves the right to engage consultants or others to carry out this evaluation. Grantee agrees to allow the State or its representatives access to and will make its personnel, facilities, records, and sponsors available to State evaluators, subject to reasonable notice.
13. **BREACH OF CONTRACT:** The State reserves the right to demand a refund of the full amount of the grant or a portion thereof, or to terminate this Contract and pay no further funds, in the event that Grantee breaches any of the terms of this Contract. Grantee agrees to pay any associated collection fees, court, attorney's fees and costs, incurred by the State in collection efforts or caused by the Grantee's breach of this Contract.
14. **ATTRIBUTION:** Grantee shall make appropriate and reasonable efforts to ensure that the GOEO is recognized as a partner in the Project. Such efforts may include recognition of the office in fundraising materials, use of the GOEO name and official logo, and other appropriate attribution for the funding made possible by the office.

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ATTACHMENT C: PROJECT PLAN

PROJECT PROPOSAL:

Vernal City is advancing the Downtown Revitalization Plan to its next phase with the Sage Block Design and Reconstruction Project. The plan is transforming downtown and is making a significant economic impact and diversifying the local economy. The plan with its public and private investments is working! The City's portion of the sales and TRT taxes within the downtown district have doubled within the last four years (\$608,944 to \$1,257,756). Property values, previously declining, have increased 37.7% within the downtown district in four years. The next phase will build on the momentum of prior successes and continue the transformation of Downtown Vernal into a vibrant, accessible, and economically thriving district.

The Sage Block project scope includes designing and constructing public utilities, renovating a public parking lot, pedestrian walkway with accessible elements, landscaping, lighting and patio space to support adjacent local businesses. The project requires securing easements with property owners to ensure long-term access and maintenance, while working directly with business owners to create spaces that are both functional and visually appealing.

With the revitalization of these community spaces, it is expected that vacant spaces along the block will fill, attracting new businesses and start-ups, like the other completed blocks. This initiative represents Vernal City's second ROCG Grant and builds on the proven record of completion and success demonstrated in previous phases. With strong partnerships, including collaboration with the Governor's Office of Economic Opportunity, Vernal City is positioned to deliver a successful project that strengthens downtown's role as a hub for commerce, culture, and community.

DELIVERABLES AND OUTCOME:

The Sage Block reconstruction is the next major phase of the Vernal Downtown Plan, following successful revitalization efforts completed at the Zions Block and the Cobble Rock Block. Both completed projects demonstrate how targeted investment in public infrastructure, streetscapes, and community-centered design stimulates economic activity, improves quality of life, and attracts new businesses and increases employment. The Sage Block project will continue this momentum to bolster and stabilize the local economy.

Completed Project Vision

When completed, the Sage Block will deliver a fully designed and implemented revitalization of one of Vernal's key downtown areas. The planned improvements will create an environment for small businesses to succeed. Improvements include upgraded streetscape, accessible pedestrian infrastructure, LED lighting, landscaping with trees and flowers, enhanced signage and façade coordination. The new public parking lot will connect with a driveway to an existing public parking lot within the block. The outcome will be a walkable, safe, and visually appealing downtown core that supports both existing and new businesses and attracts additional private investment.

This project is designed not only to strengthen Vernal's economic base but also to reinforce downtown as the cultural and social heart of the community. By enhancing public spaces, improving infrastructure, and aligning with community-driven design standards, the Sage Block will directly support local small businesses, strengthen the tourism and hospitality sector, and create an environment that supports entrepreneurship and workforce. The results of the similarly completed projects are notable. The City's portion of sales and TRT taxes within the downtown district have doubled within the last four years



(\$608,944 to \$1,257,756). Property values, previously declining, have increased 37.7% within the downtown district in four years.

Populations and Industry Sectors Affected

The Sage Block design will benefit multiple populations and economic sectors:

- **Small businesses:** With enhanced public spaces, local retail, dining, and service providers will gain visibility and higher foot traffic. The upgraded block will make it easier to attract and retain tenants in available spaces. Currently two spaces within the block are vacant (a third vacant space just opened as a coffee shop). The former historic post office has already been purchased by a local entrepreneur with the goal of renovations for commercial and residential loft living. The new owner purchased the building due to the anticipated Sage improvements. He expects to utilize the city's facade grant program and invest significant funds to renovate the building.
- **Tourism and hospitality:** Vernal serves as a regional hub for outdoor recreation, energy development, and heritage tourism. A revitalized downtown will extend visitor stays and encourage greater local spending. The local businesses have seen a significant increase in downtown business during events such as Phenomecon, mountain bike race weekends, Freedom Fest, Balloon Fest and Trick or Treat Street. Tourists often stay longer to walk through the downtown shops - something that rarely occurred three years ago.
- **Community residents:** Families, workers, and students will enjoy safe, accessible, and attractive gathering places, support quality of life and increasing community pride. The project connects pedestrians in the downtown area to and from Ashley Valley Regional Center - a major employer and regional medical facility.
- **Entrepreneurs and investors:** A stronger downtown identity encourages private investment, encourages innovation, and expands Vernal's reputation as a regional center for commerce. The Cobble Rock Block renovations provide an example of the private investment that follows public improvements. As the Cobble Rock Block was under design, a local developer purchased a large, underutilized building. A large store front was vacant as well as the entire upstairs. Taking advantage of the new public amenities (public parking, patio, accessibility), City's facade grant and City's RISS grant, the developer was motivated to renovate 14,000 sf of vacant store front and upstairs space into a new storefront and 11 upstairs loft apartments (with an elevator). This local investment was significant and well over \$2 million.

Business Opportunities and Job Creation

The Sage Block project will expand business opportunities in several ways:

- Increasing usable retail and office space for both new and existing businesses. Two of the spaces are vacant including the historic post office. It is the expectation that both spaces will be renovated as the public improvements are made. A new downtown coffee shop just opened within the last few weeks with a welcoming back door with the anticipation of the Sage Block improvements in the summer of 2026.
- Enhancing occupancy rates for buildings in and around the Sage Block.
- Strengthening Vernal's downtown brand, positioning it as an attractive destination for entrepreneurs.

Based on trends observed from the Zions and Cobble Rock block projects, the Sage Block is projected to result in the creation of 10–15 new jobs within two years of project completion. These jobs will primarily be in retail, food service, and professional services, and will add to the direct employment created during construction.

Metrics of Project Success



Success will be tracked, recorded, and measured against clear benchmarks, ensuring accountability and alignment with economic development goals. Key metrics include:

- Business recruitment, development, and expansion: Number of new business licenses issued in the Sage Block; increased occupancy of available spaces; measurable increases in downtown sales tax revenue.
- Workforce training and development: Jobs created through new business activity and construction; partnerships with local workforce programs to prepare residents for new opportunities. The City and County support the Rise and Thrive Business Pitch contest which provides training and opportunity for new and growing businesses.
- Infrastructure and capital facility improvements: Completion of pedestrian pathways, lighting, landscaping, and façade upgrades; improved accessibility and safety; increased use of downtown for public events and programming. The public improvements will encourage private investment within the block.

Annual reporting will be conducted by Vernal City in partnership with the Vernal Downtown Alliance. Data will be compared against baselines established prior to construction, as well as benchmarks set during earlier phases. This ensures the Sage Block improvements can be directly tied to measurable economic growth.

Timeline for Completion

The Sage Block project is scheduled across a multi-year timeline to allow for design, construction, and recruitment activities:

- Fall 2025: Finalize Sage Block design documents, secure permits, and confirm funding alignment.
- Spring 2026: Begin infrastructure improvements, including demolition of outdated features, site preparation, and underground utility coordination.
- Summer 2026 to Fall 2026: Implement streetscape improvements, landscaping, lighting, and coordinated façade enhancements.
- End of 2026: Achieve substantial completion of construction. Launch coordinated marketing and tenant recruitment campaigns to encourage business expansion into the vacant spaces.
- 2027: Conduct measurement of outcomes, including business recruitment, job creation, and sales tax growth. Integrate Sage Block results in planning and implementation of the Lamplighter Block project.

Deliverables

The project will provide the following clear deliveries upon completion:

- Comprehensive Sage Block design documents reflecting community priorities, technical standards, and alignment with prior downtown improvements.
- Upgraded streetscapes and public spaces, including lighting, landscaping, signage, pedestrian walkways, and coordinated façade improvements.
- Infrastructure upgrades to support safe, accessible, and functional business operations.
- Business development outcomes, including new tenant recruitment, higher occupancy rates, and at least 10–15 new jobs within two years.
- Annual reporting framework to measure and track results against goals in business recruitment, workforce development, and infrastructure improvements.

Conclusion



The Sage Block design is the next exciting step in the transformation of downtown Vernal into a thriving economic center. Building on the momentum of the Zions and Cobble Rock blocks, this project will deliver visible improvements, measurable business outcomes, and lasting community benefits. With enhanced opportunities for small businesses, increased tourism appeal, and long-term job creation, the Sage Block is positioned to strengthen Vernal’s role as a regional hub for commerce, workforce growth, and community vitality.

BUDGET:

The Sage Block phase of the Vernal Downtown Plan requires a total investment of \$2,080,000 to complete design, infrastructure upgrades, and public space enhancements. This total is based on calculated engineer’s estimates and contractor bid data, with the largest costs associated with streetscape construction, pedestrian and accessibility improvements, lighting, landscaping, and façade coordination. Administrative and project management costs are estimated at approximately 5% of total expenditures (\$104,000) to support oversight, reporting, procurement compliance, and coordination with the Utah Governor’s Office of Economic Opportunity.

Matching Funds and Local Commitment

The City of Vernal, population 10,640, will provide the required 30% match totaling \$120,000 through municipal general funds and reinvestment agency allocations. Additional in-kind support—such as staff time, equipment use, and existing planning resources—will further leverage the state’s contribution and reinforce the City’s commitment to long-term downtown redevelopment.

Summary

The \$400,000 requested through the Rural Communities Opportunity Grant will fully fund the Sage Block’s design and construction in partnership with the City’s matching and capital resources. A detailed project budget spreadsheet accompanies this application, documenting engineer’s estimates, administrative costs, and matching fund allocations.



Completion of the Sage Block improvements will advance the Vernal Downtown Plan’s next phase, enhancing safety, accessibility, and economic vitality in the city’s core while creating a more inviting, pedestrian-friendly public space for residents and visitors alike.

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ATTACHMENT E: COUNTY ECONOMIC OPPORTUNITY ADVISORY BOARD

"CEO Board" means a County Economic Opportunity Advisory Board as described in Utah Code Section 63N-4-803.

Note: For a municipality to qualify for a RCOG, it must have a functioning planning and zoning commission, or a duly organized municipal economic opportunity advisory board or commission, that will act under the same advisory requirements as a CEO Board. An Association of Government's General Board must act under the same advisory requirements as a CEO Board, regarding eligibility for an RCOG.

Each rural county that seeks to obtain a RCOG shall create a CEO Board composed of at least the following members appointed by the county legislative body:

- a county representative,
- a representative of a municipality in the county,
- a workforce development representative,
- a private-sector representative, and
- a member of the public who lives in the county

The county legislative body may also appoint additional members with experience or expertise in economic development matters. In appointing members of the CEO Board, the county legislative body may consider gender and socioeconomic diversity.

Each CEO Board shall assist and advise the county legislative body on:

1. applying for a RCOG,
2. what projects should be funded by grant money provided to a Rural Community under the program, and
3. preparing reporting requirements for grant money received by a Rural Community under the program.

CEO Boards are subject to Utah Code § 52-4-101 through 52-4-305 and are expected to abide by ethics in governance and conflict of interest practices.

For the purposes of this Rural Communities Opportunity Grant program, County elected officials shall not be appointed to, or serve on, County Economic Opportunity Advisory Boards. GOEO may withhold grant funding if an elected county official serves on, or served on, a County Economic Opportunity Advisory Board during the term of this Contract.

Appointment and Terms of CEO Board Members

1. Appointment and Terms:
 - a. The county legislative body shall appoint each new member or reappointed member to a four (4)-year term. It is encouraged that an appointed member of the CEO Board be limited to serving two (2) consecutive terms.
 - b. The county legislative body shall, at the time of appointment or reappointment, adjust the length of terms to ensure that the terms of CEO Board members appointed by the county legislative body are staggered so that approximately half of the appointed CEO Board members are appointed every two (2) years.



2. The CEO Board shall elect a chair of the advisory board. It is encouraged that a CEO Board Chair serves for no more than two (2) consecutive years.
3. The CEO Board shall elect annually a vice chair from the advisory board's members.
4. If a vacancy occurs in the CEO Board membership for any reason, the county legislative body shall appoint the replacement for the unexpired term.
5. A majority of the CEO Board constitutes a quorum for the purpose of conducting advisory board business and the action of a majority of a quorum constitutes the action of the advisory committee.

ORDINANCE 2026-01

CHANGES TO THE BUSINESS LICENSE CODE SECTION 5.04 BUSINESS LICENSE GENERALLY - THROUGH SECTION 5.16 - BUSINESS LICENSE FEES

WHEREAS, the Vernal City Council finds that existing Chapter 5 of the Vernal City Municipal Code was organized in a manner that lacked consistent structural sequencing, clearly defined administrative authority, and standardized procedural clarity; and

WHEREAS, the amendments to Sections 5.04 through 5.16 reorganize and restructure the Business License Code into a cohesive and clearly sequenced framework, including consolidated definitions, defined administrative authority, standardized application and review procedures, clarified issuance standards, and codified enforcement processes, thereby improving clarity, usability, and consistent administration; and

WHEREAS, the amendments establish objective licensing criteria that clearly define when a business is required to obtain a Vernal City business license, including measurable standards related to operational presence and revenue thresholds, thereby reducing ambiguity, improving predictability, and strengthening enforceability; and

WHEREAS, the amendments modernize the appeals process by transferring appellate review authority from the City Council to a qualified, independent Hearing Officer and by establishing defined procedures, timelines, and written decisions, thereby enhancing procedural fairness, administrative consistency, and appropriate separation of legislative and quasi-judicial functions; and

WHEREAS, the amendments revise and clarify the business license fee structure, including the applicability of licensing requirements to government entities, in order to ensure equitable application, transparency, and consistent cost recovery;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF VERNAL CITY, UTAH, AS FOLLOWS:

SECTION 1: REPEAL "Chapter 5.04 Business Licenses Generally" of the Vernal Municipal Code is hereby repealed as follows:

SECTION 5: ADOPTION “Chapter 5.01 Business Licenses General” of the Vernal Municipal Code is hereby added as follows:

Chapter 5.01 Business Licenses General

Section 05.01.010 - Purpose and Intent

A. The purpose of this Title is to regulate businesses operating within Vernal City in order to promote public health, safety, and welfare; ensure fair and consistent enforcement; and provide a clear framework for licensing, renewal, denial, suspension, and revocation of business licenses.

B. This Title is adopted pursuant to the authority granted to municipalities under Utah Code §10-1-203 to license and regulate businesses, and under Utah Code §76-8-410 regarding the requirement to obtain a business license where one is required by law.

C. This Title establishes criteria that identify when a business is required to obtain a Vernal City business license. These criteria are intended to provide objective, consistent standards for both the City and business owners, reduce ambiguity, and ensure that enforcement is predictable and legally defensible.

D. The regulations contained in this Title are intended to apply only to businesses that have a meaningful operational, physical, or economic presence in Vernal City. The intent of this Title is not to

regulate businesses whose activities within Vernal City are incidental, minimal, or unrelated to business operations conducted in the City.

Nothing in this Title shall be interpreted to require a business license for:

1. A telecommunications provider except as allowed under Utah Code §10-1-203(4);
2. A home-based business whose combined offsite impact does not materially exceed the offsite impact of the primary residential use, pursuant to Utah Code §10-1-203(8);
3. A business operated only occasionally by a person under 19 years old, pursuant to Utah Code §10-1-203(7);
4. Activities that do not constitute "transacting business" pursuant to Utah Code §16-10a-1501(2).
Utah Code 16-10a-1501

E. This Title shall be interpreted to ensure consistency with all applicable State laws, including but not limited to:

1. Utah Code Title 10-1-203 (municipal licensing authority);
2. Utah Code Title 32B (Alcoholic Beverage Control Act);
3. Utah Code Title 11-10-1 (alcohol-related business licensing requirements for local authority)
Utah Code 11-10-1;
4. Utah Code Title 76-8-410 (Penalty for operating without required license);
5. Utah Code Title 16-10a-1501 (foreign corporations—activities that do *not* constitute transacting business).

F. The provisions of this Title are intended to simplify regulatory interpretation, increase transparency for residents and business owners, reduce redundancy, and remove outdated language while maintaining compliance with State law and established municipal practices.

Section 5.01.020 Business License Definitions

For the purposes of this Title, the following terms shall have the meanings assigned below. If a term is not defined in this section, the City may rely upon definitions contained in Utah Code Titles 10, 11, 16, 26, 32B, 41, and 76, and Vernal City Municipal Code Titles 4, 5, 9, 12, 13, and 16.

"Alcohol License" – A license required under Chapter 5.20 regulating the sale, service, storage, manufacture, distribution, or consumption of alcoholic products, consistent with Utah Code Title 32B.

"Applicant" – Any person or entity applying for a business license, renewal, modification, or transfer under this Title.

"Business" - Means any enterprise carried on for the purpose of gain or economic profit, except that the acts of employees rendering services to employers are not included in this definition.

“Business License” – A license issued by Vernal City authorizing operation of a business within the City.

“Business Premises” – The physical location or property from which a business operates, stores equipment, or conducts regulated activity.

“Caterer” – A business that prepares and serves food and/or alcoholic products at temporary locations.

“City” or “Vernal City” – The municipal corporation of Vernal City, Utah.

“Clerk” – The Vernal City Business License Clerk or designee.

“Contractor” – Any person licensed under the Utah Division of Professional Licensing (DOPL) to perform construction-related services, including subcontractors.

“Customer Entrance” – The primary access point through which patrons enter licensed premises.

“DABS” – The Utah Department of Alcoholic Beverage Services.

“Delivery Business” – Any business that delivers goods or services to locations within the City, whether headquartered inside or outside Vernal City.

“Employee” – A person providing labor or services for a business, with or without direct monetary compensation.

“Event Vendor” – A person selling goods or services at a permitted special event within Vernal City.

“Farmer’s Market Vendor” – A seller of agricultural or handmade goods participating in a permitted farmer’s market.

“Food Truck” / “Mobile Food Business” – A business operating from a motorized or towable vehicle where food or beverages are prepared, cooked, or served for immediate consumption.

Includes trucks, trailers, carts, and mobile commissaries.

Must comply with VCMC §16.20.630 when operating in an approved Food Truck Court.

“Food Truck Court” – Any area where one or more Mobile Food Vendor(s) are parked for more than 60 days in a calendar year OR any area where three (3) or more Mobile Food Vendor(s) are simultaneously located for any amount of time outside of an approved and permitted event. Food truck courts can include area(s) designated and designed for mobile food vendors, including food trucks, trailers, and carts, where food and beverages are sold to the public. The court may include amenities such as seating areas, restrooms, and parking.

“Franchise” (Business Franchise) A business model in which the owner of a trademark, trade name, service mark, or proprietary operating system (the franchisor) grants another person or entity (the franchisee) the right to operate a business using that system in exchange for fees, royalties, or other compensation.

A franchise includes, but is not limited to, branded restaurants, hotels, motels, retail chains, and similar establishments operating under a national or regional brand.

“Franchisee” A person or entity authorized to operate a franchised business at a specific location under a franchise agreement. For purposes of this Title:

A franchisee is considered the responsible party for compliance with Vernal City business licensing requirements;

A franchisee must disclose all individuals or entities holding 25% or more ownership interest in the business;

A franchisee is distinct from the franchisor and must obtain its own business license regardless of brands or corporate affiliations.

“Franchiser” or “Franchisor” A person or entity that owns the trademarks, trade names, service marks, and operational methods associated with a franchise system and grants franchisees the right to operate businesses under that system.

The franchisor is not considered the business owner for licensing purposes

“Gross Revenue Generated Within Vernal City” – Revenue derived from business activity occurring within Vernal City, including sales, service calls, installations, or deliveries.

“Headquartered in Vernal City” – A business whose principal office or management location is within Vernal City boundaries.

“Independent Contractor” – A person or business providing goods or services to another business under contract and not classified as an employee.

“Licensee” – Any person or business holding a valid Vernal City business license.

“Local Authority” – Vernal City

“Manager” – Any individual responsible for supervising employees or business operations, including those required to complete state-mandated alcohol manager training.

“Mobile Vendor” – Any transient business operating from a vehicle or temporary structure, including but not limited to food trucks, ice cream trucks, or merchandise trucks.

“Major Home Occupation” - The combined offsite impact of the home-based business and the primary residential use materially exceeds the offsite impact of the primary residential use alone

“Minor Home Occupation” - The combined offsite impact of the home-based business and the primary residential use materially does not exceed the offsite impact of the primary residential use alone

“Nonprofit Organization” – An organization recognized under Internal Revenue Code §501(c) and registered as a nonprofit with the State of Utah.

“Operator” – The person responsible for controlling, directing, or managing a business.

“Person” – Any individual or legal entity recognized by law.

“Physical Presence” – Any storefront, shop, office, yard, dwelling, warehouse, or location used for business operations within Vernal City.

“Premises” – The land, buildings, vehicles, or equipment used in connection with the business.

“Professional Service” – A business requiring licensing by the State of Utah (e.g., attorneys, accountants, engineers, medical professionals).

“Remote Seller” – A business that sells goods or services to Vernal City customers without maintaining a physical presence in the City.

“Restaurant” – An establishment primarily engaged in preparing and serving meals to the public.

“Residential Solicitors” – An individual who travels residence-to-residence for the purpose of selling goods, services, or subscriptions. Any person attempting to sell goods or services in person, whether door-to-door or at temporary locations.

“Seasonal Business” – A business operating for less than six months per year, including fireworks sales, Christmas tree lots, and seasonal roadside stands.

“Short-Term Rental (STR)” – A residential dwelling or portion thereof rented for fewer than 30 consecutive days.

“Special Event Vendor” – A vendor operating only during a City-permitted special event.

“Temporary Business” – A business operating within Vernal City for fewer than 90 days, including tent sales, pop-up shops, and seasonal stands.

“Transacting Business” – Conducting activity within Vernal City to a degree that meets one or more objective licensing criteria established in this Title.

“25% Revenue Threshold” – The minimum percentage of annual gross revenue derived from Vernal City activity that requires a business license.

“Vendor” – Any business selling goods or services within Vernal City.

Section 05.01.030 - Business License General

Business License General

This section establishes the general requirements applicable to all businesses that are required to obtain a business license under this Title. The purpose of this section is to ensure that licensed businesses operate lawfully, maintain accurate information, and comply with all applicable federal, state, and local regulations.

A. Applicability.

The provisions of this section apply to all businesses required to obtain a license pursuant to the licensing criteria established in Section 05.01.040.

Nothing in this Title shall require a license for businesses or activities that fall exclusively within the exclusions identified in Utah State Code.

A business that is exempt from licensing under State law remains subject to all zoning, building, fire, and health regulations.

B. License Requirement.

A business that meets one or more of the licensing criteria in Section 05.01.040 shall obtain a business license prior to conducting business within Vernal City.

A separate business license is required for each:

- a. Business location situated within Vernal City;
- b. Distinct business classification or regulated activity;
- c. Temporary, seasonal, mobile, or event-based operation when required by this Title;
- d. Alcohol license classification issued under Chapter 05.20.

A business license issued under this Title does not authorize violation of any zoning, land use, building, fire, or health regulation.

C. Non-Transferability.

A business license is valid only for the person or entity to whom it is issued and only for the location and activities listed on the approved license.

A license may not be transferred to another person, entity, or location.

A change in ownership involving twenty-five percent (25%) or more ownership interest constitutes a material change requiring a new license application.

D. Compliance with Laws.

A licensed business shall comply with all applicable federal, state, and local laws, including but not limited to zoning regulations under VCMC Title 16, building and fire codes, public health standards, and alcohol laws under Utah Code Title 32B.

Issuance of a business license does not constitute approval, verification, or certification of compliance with any other applicable requirement outside this Title.

Failure to remain compliant with applicable laws may constitute grounds for denial, suspension, or revocation of a business license.

E. Inspections.

A business may be subject to inspection by City departments or regulatory agencies to verify compliance with applicable laws and requirements.

Inspections may be required prior to issuance, renewal, or reinstatement of a license.

A business shall provide reasonable access for inspections as required under this Title.

F. Duty to Maintain Accurate Information.

A business shall maintain accurate ownership, contact, and operational information with the Business License Clerk.

Any material change in ownership, business location, or business activity shall be reported to the Business License Clerk within ten (10) business days.

Material changes may require the submission of a new license application or additional documentation.

G. Violations.

Operating a business without a required business license constitutes a violation of this Title.

Providing false or misleading information on a business license application is a violation of both this Title as well as Utah State Code and constitutes grounds for denial, suspension, or revocation of a business license.

Each day of operation without a required license may constitute a separate violation.

Each violation of this Title shall be a Class C misdemeanor.

Section 05.01.035 – Administrative Authority

This section establishes the administrative duties and authority of the Business License Clerk in administering and enforcing the provisions of this Title. The purpose of this section is to ensure consistent, effective, and lawful processing, verification, and management of business licenses within Vernal City.

A. Administrative Responsibility.

1. The Business License Clerk is designated as the administrative officer responsible for implementing, interpreting, and enforcing the provisions of this Title.
2. The Clerk shall receive, review, approve, deny, suspend, and initiate revocation proceedings as authorized by this Title.
3. The Clerk shall maintain all records related to license applications, approvals, renewals, inspections, violations, suspensions, and revocations. These records shall also be maintained in a manner consistent with the State of Utah record retention laws.
4. The Clerk may adopt administrative procedures, forms, and checklists necessary to carry out the duties of this Title, provided such procedures do not conflict with City ordinance or State law.

B. Authority to Request Information.

1. The Clerk may require applicants or licensees to submit any information or documentation necessary to verify compliance with this Title or State law, including but not limited to State registrations, ownership disclosure, operational details, and verification of required inspections.
2. Failure to provide requested information shall be grounds for denial, suspension, or revocation of a business license.
3. The Clerk may require applicants to correct or clarify information that appears incomplete, inaccurate, inconsistent, or contradictory.

C. Verification Authority.

1. The Clerk may review State and local records, including information provided by the Utah State Tax Commission, to verify accuracy of information submitted by an applicant.
2. If discrepancies, omissions, inconsistent filings, or irregularities appear in State tax records or documentation provided by the applicant, the Clerk may require the applicant to obtain a Letter of Good Standing issued by the Utah State Tax Commission.
3. The Clerk shall not interpret or resolve State tax discrepancies; the applicant is responsible for obtaining clarification or correction directly from the Utah State Tax Commission.
4. The Clerk may place an application on hold until adequate verification and documentation is provided.

D. Inspection Authority.

1. The Clerk may require inspections by Building, Fire, Health, Public Safety, or other agencies as necessary to verify compliance with applicable laws.
2. A license may not be issued until all required inspections have been completed and approved.
3. The Clerk may coordinate or schedule any inspection required under this Title.

E. Enforcement Authority.

1. The Clerk may issue notices of deficiency, denial, suspension, or revocation for violations of this Title or applicable State law.
2. The Clerk may impose reasonable conditions on a license to ensure compliance with applicable laws and to protect public health, safety, and welfare.
3. The Clerk may require corrective actions to remedy violations or deficiencies.
4. The Clerk may initiate enforcement actions or refer matters to the appropriate department or agency for enforcement.

F. Coordination with Other Departments.

1. The Clerk may refer applications to other departments or agencies for review, including Planning and Zoning, Building, Fire, Public Safety, Public Works, and Health.
2. No license shall be issued until all required department approvals have been obtained.

G. Appeals.

1. Any person aggrieved by a decision or action of the Business License Clerk may appeal as provided in this Title.
2. The Clerk shall maintain written records of all decisions subject to appeal.

Section 05.01.040 - Licensing Criteria

This section establishes the criteria used to determine whether a business is required to obtain a Vernal City business license. These standards ensure that licensing is applied only to businesses that are

headquartered in Vernal City, maintain a physical presence in Vernal City, or derive a substantial portion of their gross revenue from activities occurring within Vernal City. Businesses that do not meet one or more of the criteria in this section are not required to obtain a license unless otherwise required by State law.

A. Businesses Required to Obtain a License.

1. A business shall obtain a Vernal City business license if it meets one or more of the criteria listed in Subsection B of this section.
2. Businesses that do not meet any criteria listed in Subsection B are not required to obtain a license under this Title.

B. Licensing Criteria.

A business is required to obtain a business license if it satisfies any of the following:

1. Headquartered in Vernal City.
 - a. A business whose principal office, headquarters, or primary management location is situated within Vernal City shall be licensed.
 - b. A business is considered headquartered in Vernal City if executive, administrative, management, or operational decisions are primarily made within the City.
2. Physical Presence in Vernal City.
 - a. A business that maintains a physical presence within Vernal City shall be licensed.
 - b. The specific conditions constituting a physical presence shall be specifically defined in Section 05.01.050 following administrative and legal review.
3. Twenty-Five Percent (25%) Gross Revenue Threshold.
 - a. A business shall be licensed if twenty-five percent (25%) or more of its annual gross revenue is generated from activities occurring within Vernal City.
 - b. Gross revenue includes income from sales, services, deliveries, contracts, or other compensated activities completed within the City.

C. Businesses Exempt from Licensing.

1. Occasional Youth-Operated Businesses
The City shall not require a business license or permit for a business that is:
 - a. Operated only occasionally; and
 - b. Operated by an individual under nineteen (19) years of age.

Participation by an exempt individual in a City-sponsored or City-regulated event may still be subject to applicable event permitting requirements.

2. Home-Based Business Fee Limitations

- a. The City shall not charge a fee for a home-based business operated by a resident of the City unless the combined off-site impacts of the home-based business and the primary residential use materially exceed the off-site impacts of the primary residential use alone.
- b. For purposes of this subsection, “off-site impacts” may include, but are not limited to, traffic, parking demand, noise, odors, or similar external effects.

3. Prohibited Licensing Conditions.

As a condition of obtaining or maintaining a business license the City shall not require a business to:

- a. Complete education, continuing education, or training requirements beyond those imposed by state law or state licensing requirements; or
- b. Disclose financial information, inventory quantities, or proprietary business information, except as specifically authorized by state or federal law.

4. Voluntary Licensing of Home-Based Businesses.

- a. A home-based business that is otherwise exempt from licensing fees under this section may voluntarily request a City business license.
- b. The City may charge a reasonable administrative fee for a voluntarily requested license issued under this subsection.
- c. The City shall notify each home-based business owner of the licensing exemption described in Subsection B in any written communication regarding business licensing.

D. Interpretation.

- 1. The purpose of the licensing criteria is to apply business licensing requirements fairly, consistently, and objectively.
- 2. The criteria shall be interpreted to prevent overregulation of businesses with minimal or incidental contact with Vernal City.
- 3. Any formal interpretation affecting legal rights shall be reviewed by the City Attorney.

E. Administrative Guidance.

- 1. The Business License Clerk may issue administrative guidance to assist businesses in determining whether they meet the licensing criteria.
- 2. Guidance shall be consistent with this Title and shall not modify or expand any licensing requirement.

F. Presumption.

1. Where the applicability of the licensing criteria cannot be reasonably determined based on provided information, the Business License Clerk may require a business to obtain a license until adequate documentation is provided to demonstrate that licensure is not required.

Section 05.01.050 – Physical Presence

This section defines the conditions under which a business is considered to maintain a physical presence within Vernal City for purposes of determining licensure under Section 05.01.040. The purpose of this section is to ensure that physical presence is applied consistently and fairly based on operational activity occurring within the City. This section may be amended following administrative and legal review to reflect final policy direction.

A. General Definition.

1. A business maintains a physical presence within Vernal City when it occupies, uses, or operates from property located within the City in connection with business activity.
2. Physical presence may include temporary, seasonal, permanent, or recurring use of property, facilities, or structures for business purposes.
3. The specific classifications and conditions of physical presence will be further defined following administrative review.

B. Indicators of Physical Presence.

1. A business may be considered to have a physical presence within the City if it:
 - a. Maintains store front, office, warehouse, yard, storage, or operational space;
 - b. Maintains a staffed or unstaffed physical location for business purposes;
 - c. Operates out of a commercial, industrial, or residential property for business functions.
2. The indicators in this subsection are general examples and may be refined by subsequent administrative or legal review.

C. Documentation.

1. The Business License Clerk may require documentation to determine whether a business maintains physical presence within Vernal City.
2. Documentation may include lease agreements, utility records, operational logs, employee assignments, or other evidence demonstrating use of property.

D. Administrative Review.

1. This section may be revised after consultation with City staff, the Business License Clerk, and the City Attorney to reflect final policy direction.
2. The Business License Clerk may issue interim guidance consistent with this section until a final definition is adopted.

Section 05.01.060 Application Requirements

This section establishes the minimum information and documentation required for submitting a business license application under this Title. The purpose of this section is to ensure that applicants provide

sufficient information for the City to verify licensing eligibility, ownership, compliance with applicable laws, and operational details. Additional requirements may be adopted administratively to support efficient processing.

A. Application Submission.

1. An applicant shall submit a complete business license application through the submission platform, portal, method, or format designated by the Business License Clerk.
2. The application shall include all information necessary to determine whether the applicant meets the licensing criteria established in Section 05.01.040.
3. The application shall not be processed until all required information is provided.

B. Required Information.

A business license application shall include, at a minimum, the following:

1. Business identification.
 - a. Publicly displayed business name
 - b. Business entity type, if applicable (corporation, LLC, partnership, sole proprietorship).
 - c. Physical and mailing address of the business.
 - d. If the publicly displayed business name does not match what is registered with the State, a copy of your business registration from the Utah State Department of Commerce.
2. Ownership disclosure.
 - a. Names of all individuals or entities holding twenty-five percent (25%) or more ownership interest in the business.
 - b. Contact information for each disclosed owner.
 - c. Identification of any parent company, franchisor, or affiliated entity with ownership interest.
3. Business Owner or manager.
 - a. Name and contact information of the individual responsible for day-to-day operations within Vernal City.
 - b. Emergency contact information for the responsible party.
4. State registration numbers.
 - a. Utah State Tax Commission registration number, where required.
 - b. Utah Department of Commerce entity number, where applicable.
 - c. Any professional or occupational license numbers required under State law.
5. Business description.
 - a. A brief description of the business activities to be conducted.
 - b. Identification of any regulated or conditional activities requiring additional review.

C. Required Documentation.

1. Proof of State registrations identified in Subsection B.
2. Property owner authorization when the applicant does not own the business premises.
3. A site plan or layout may be required for businesses with physical locations, mobile operations, or uses requiring safety review.

4. Additional documentation may be required for businesses governed by specialized chapters of this Title, including alcohol licenses, event-based licenses, and mobile food businesses.
5. Tax Compliance.
The applicant shall provide any documentation necessary to verify State tax compliance as requested by the Business License Clerk.

D. Review for Completeness.

1. The Business License Clerk shall review each application for completeness.
2. Incomplete applications shall be returned to the applicant with a description of the missing information or documentation.
3. No application shall proceed to departmental review until deemed complete.

E. Departmental Review.

1. Applications may be forwarded to relevant departments for review, including:
 - a. Planning and Zoning;
 - b. Building and Fire;
 - c. Public Safety;
 - d. Health Department;
 - e. Any other agency with regulatory authority.
2. Departmental review may vary depending on the nature of the business.

F. Duty to Update Information.

1. Applicants shall notify the Business License Clerk of any material change in the information provided in the application.
2. Changes in ownership, business location, or operational characteristics may require submission of a new application.

G. False or Misleading Information.

1. Providing false, incomplete, or misleading information in a license application constitutes grounds for denial, suspension, or revocation of a business license.
2. Such conduct may also constitute a violation under Utah Code §76-8-410.

Section 05.01.070 - License Review and Approval

License Review and Approval

This section establishes the procedures for reviewing and approving business license applications submitted under this Title.

A. Initial Review for Completeness.

1. Upon receipt of an application, the Business License Clerk shall review the submission to determine whether all required information and documentation under Section 05.01.060 has been provided.
2. If an application is incomplete, the Clerk shall notify the applicant of the missing information. Processing shall not continue until the application is complete.
3. The date an application is determined complete shall constitute the official filing date for purposes of review and approval.

B. Departmental Review.

1. Upon determining that an application is complete, the Business License Clerk may refer the application to relevant City departments or outside agencies for review, including but not limited to:
 - a. Planning and Zoning;
 - b. Building and Fire;
 - c. Public Safety;
 - d. Health Department;
 - e. State agencies with regulatory authority.
2. Each department or agency may identify conditions, requirements, or deficiencies relevant to its regulatory responsibilities.
3. An applicant shall correct any deficiencies or provide additional documentation as required by reviewing departments.

C. Verification of Licensing Criteria.

1. The Business License Clerk shall verify that the applicant qualifies for licensure.
2. Verification may include review of:
 - a. Ownership disclosures;
 - b. Physical presence or operational footprint in Vernal City;
 - c. State tax compliance documentation;
 - d. Applicable State registrations;
 - e. Any information necessary for determining eligibility under this Title.
3. If the Clerk determines that the applicant does not meet the licensing criteria, the application may be denied.

D. Conditional Requirements.

1. The City may impose reasonable conditions necessary to ensure compliance with zoning, building, health, safety, or State regulatory requirements.
2. A license shall not be issued until all required conditions have been satisfied.
3. When conditions extend beyond the authority of the Business License Clerk, the Clerk may require written verification from the responsible department prior to license issuance.

E. Background Checks for Regulated Businesses.

1. When required by State law or specific chapters of this Title, background checks shall be completed prior to license approval.
2. The Business License Clerk shall not issue a license until the required background check is completed and the applicant is found eligible under applicable law.

F. Final Determination.

1. A license shall be approved when:
 - a. The application is complete;
 - b. All reviewing departments or agencies have approved their portions;
 - c. All conditions have been satisfied;
 - d. The applicant meets the licensing criteria; and
 - e. Applicable fees have been paid.
2. The Business License Clerk shall notify the applicant of the approval and proceed with issuance.

G. Denial of Application.

1. The Business License Clerk may deny an application when:
 - a. The applicant does not meet the licensing criteria;
 - b. Required conditions were not met;
 - c. False or misleading information was provided;
 - d. Required State documents were not provided; or
 - e. The business activity is prohibited under City, State, or Federal law.
2. Denial shall be issued in writing, stating the reason(s) for the decision and the applicant's right to appeal.

H. No Authorization to Operate Until Approval.

1. Submission of an application does not grant permission to operate a business.
2. A business may not begin operations until the license is formally issued.

Section 05.01.080 - License Issuance and Conditions

License Issuance and Conditions

This section establishes the procedures and conditions governing the issuance of a business license after approval under Section 05.01.070.

A. Issuance of license.

1. The Business License Clerk may issue a business license when all of the following have been satisfied:
 - a. The application has been approved;
 - b. All required fees have been paid;
 - c. All conditions imposed by reviewing departments or agencies have been met; and
 - d. Any required inspections or background checks have been completed.
2. No business license shall be issued until the applicant has provided all documentation required under this Title or requested by the Business License Clerk.

B. Effective date of license.

1. A business license becomes effective on the date it is issued by the Business License Clerk.
2. A license issued after January 1 shall be valid for the remainder of the licensing year unless otherwise specified in this Title.
3. Issuance of a business license does not create vested rights to future renewals.

C. Conditions on license.

A business license is issued subject to the following conditions:

1. The licensee shall comply with all applicable Federal, State, and Local laws, including but not limited to zoning, building, fire, public health, and environmental regulations.
2. The licensee shall conduct only those business activities specified in the approved license.
3. The licensee shall maintain accurate ownership, contact, and operational information with the Business License Clerk.
4. The licensee shall allow inspections by City officials or regulatory agencies as authorized under this Title or required by law.
5. The licensee shall comply with all conditions imposed by reviewing departments during the approval process.

D. Location-specific authorization.

1. A business license is valid only for the physical location stated on the license, unless expressly authorized as a mobile, temporary, or non-fixed business under specific chapters of this Title.
2. A business license does not authorize operation at any other location within Vernal City.

E. Non-authorization of illegal activity.

1. Issuance of a business license does not legalize any business activity prohibited by Federal, State, or Local law.
2. A business license does not constitute approval of a use that is restricted or prohibited under VCMC Title 16 (Planning and Zoning).
3. A licensee shall obtain any additional permits or approvals required by other laws prior to engaging in regulated activities.

F. Conditional or deferred issuance.

1. The Business License Clerk may issue a business license subject to conditions when final approval by a reviewing department requires additional documentation, verification, or final inspection, provided that:
 - a. The remaining conditions do not present an unreasonable risk to health, safety, or public welfare; and

b. The applicant agrees in writing to satisfy all outstanding conditions within a timeframe established by the Clerk.

2. The Business License Clerk may defer issuance of a license when remaining conditions relate to zoning, building occupancy, or safety approvals that must occur prior to operation.
3. Failure to satisfy deferred conditions may result in suspension or revocation.

G. No authorization to operate prior to issuance.

1. Submission or approval of an application does not authorize operation of a business.
2. A business may not begin operations until a business license is issued pursuant to this section.

H. Operation without license prohibited.

1. Except as expressly authorized under this Title, no person or entity shall operate a business within Vernal City without a valid and active business license.
2. Submission of an application, renewal request, or other documentation does not authorize business operations unless a business license has been issued or temporary authorization has been granted in writing by the City.

I. Temporary administrative allowance.

1. When a business has timely submitted a complete application or renewal request, but final issuance is delayed due to circumstances outside the applicant's control, the Business License Clerk may grant a temporary administrative allowance.
2. A temporary administrative allowance:
 - a. shall be issued in writing;
 - b. shall be limited in duration;
 - c. may include conditions or restrictions on operations; and
 - d. does not constitute issuance of a business license.
3. Failure to comply with the terms of a temporary administrative allowance shall constitute operating without a license.

Section 05.01.090 - License term and Renewal

License Term and Renewal

A. Term of license.

1. Unless otherwise specified in this Title, all business licenses issued under this Chapter shall be valid for one (1) licensing year.
2. The licensing year begins on January 1 and ends on December 31.
3. A business license issued after January 1 shall be valid for the remainder of the licensing year unless otherwise provided by City fee policy.

B. Annual renewal required.

1. A business that continues operations into a new licensing year shall renew its business license annually.
2. Renewal of a business license is not automatic and is subject to continued compliance with the provisions of this Title.
3. The Business License Clerk may require updated information to verify continued eligibility, including ownership, business activity, contact information, State registrations, and compliance with the licensing criteria under Section 05.01.040.

C. Renewal notices.

1. Renewal notices may be provided by mail, electronic communication, or any other method designated by the Business License Clerk.
2. Failure to receive a renewal notice does not relieve a business of the obligation to renew or from penalties associated with late renewal.

D. Renewal deadline.

1. Renewal applications and all required fees shall be submitted before April 1 of each licensing year.
2. A renewal application may not be considered complete until all required information, documentation, and fees have been submitted.

E. Late renewal penalties.

1. If an application for business license has not been submitted and paid by February 1, a late fee shall be assessed in an amount equal to 25% of the application fee. An additional 25% shall be assessed if not paid by March 1. If the applicant fails to apply and pay the appropriate fee with penalties by April 1, the application fee shall be double the amount of the standard application fee.
2. Continued failure to renew may result in additional enforcement action pursuant to Section 05.01.100.

F. Failure to renew; expiration.

1. A business license that is not renewed by April 1 shall be considered expired.
2. Operation of a business after expiration constitutes operating without a license and is a violation of this Title.
3. An expired license shall not be reinstated.
4. The Business License Clerk may require submission of a new business license application when:
 - a. the license has expired;
 - b. there have been material changes in ownership or business activity;
 - c. the expiration in licensure raises compliance concerns; or
 - d. there has been a change in State tax information related to the business.

G. Duty to maintain current contact information.

1. A licensee shall maintain current mailing and electronic contact information with the Business License Clerk.
2. Notices, renewal reminders, or compliance communications sent to the last contact information provided by the licensee shall be deemed valid notice.

H. Vacated licenses.

1. A business license shall be considered vacated when the licensee ceases business operations, voluntarily surrenders the license, or otherwise discontinues the licensed activity.
2. A vacated business license may not be renewed.
3. Any person or entity seeking to resume business operations after a license has been vacated shall be required to submit a new business license application in accordance with this Title.

I. No vested right to renewal.

1. Renewal of a business license is a privilege and not a vested right.
2. A business license may be denied renewal when the licensee fails to meet the licensing criteria or is in violation of this Title or other applicable law.
3. Denial of renewal shall be subject to the procedures set forth in Section 05.01.100.

Section 05.01.100 - Denial, Suspension, and Revocation

A. Authority and roles.

1. The Business License Clerk is authorized to administer, enforce, and initiate actions under this Title, including the denial of applications, administrative suspension of licenses where authorized, and initiation of revocation proceedings.
2. The City Council is the final decision-making authority for the revocation of a business license.

B. Denial of application or renewal.

The Business License Clerk may deny an application for a new or renewed business license for any of the following reasons:

1. Failure to meet the licensing criteria established in Section 05.01.040;
2. Submission of false, misleading, incomplete, or inaccurate information;
3. Failure to provide required documentation or information requested;
4. Failure to complete required inspections or obtain required approvals;
5. Noncompliance with applicable zoning, building, fire, health, or safety regulations;
6. Failure to demonstrate compliance with State registration or tax requirements when required under this Title; or

7. Outstanding violations of this Title or other applicable law.

C. Administrative suspension.

1. The Business License Clerk may administratively suspend a business license when:
 - a. the licensee fails to comply with the conditions of the license or requirements of this Title;
 - b. required inspections, approvals, or documentation lapse or are withdrawn;
 - c. continued operation presents an immediate risk to public health, safety, or welfare; or
 - d. the licensee operates outside the scope of the approved business activity or location.
2. An administrative suspension is temporary in nature and does not constitute revocation.
3. Written notice of suspension shall be provided to the licensee and shall include the basis for suspension and the steps required for reinstatement.

D. Initiation of revocation proceedings.

1. When the Business License Clerk determines that revocation may be warranted, the Clerk shall initiate revocation proceedings by issuing a written notice of intent to revoke.
2. The notice of intent to revoke shall state the grounds for revocation and advise the licensee of the right to a hearing before the City Council.

E. Revocation authority.

1. A business license may be revoked only by action of the City Council.
2. The City Council may revoke a business license upon finding that:
 - a. the licensee has engaged in repeated or a willful violation of this Title;
 - b. the grounds for suspension remain uncorrected after reasonable opportunity to cure;
 - c. material misrepresentations were made in obtaining or maintaining the license; or
 - d. the licensee no longer meets the eligibility requirements of this Title.

F. Notice and hearing.

1. Prior to revocation, the licensee shall be provided notice and an opportunity to be heard before the City Council.
2. Notice shall include the proposed action, the grounds for revocation, and the date, time, and location of the hearing.
3. Notice may be provided by mail, electronic communication, or any method reasonably calculated to provide notice.

G. Effect of suspension or revocation.

1. A suspended business license does not authorize business operations during the period of suspension.
2. Upon revocation by the City Council, all authority to operate the licensed business shall cease.
3. A revoked license may not be reinstated, and any future operation shall require submission of a new application.

H. No waiver or estoppel.

1. Failure of the City to immediately enforce a violation shall not constitute a waiver of enforcement authority.
2. Continued operation during review or investigation does not create authorization to operate unless expressly provided in writing by the City.

Section 05.01.110 - Appeals

Appeals

A. Right to appeal.

1. Any person or entity aggrieved by a decision of the Business License Clerk under this Title may appeal the decision as provided in this section.
2. Appealable decisions include, but are not limited to:
 - a. denial of a business license application or renewal;
 - b. administrative suspension of a business license; and
 - c. conditions imposed on a business license.
3. Decisions of the City Council regarding revocation of a business license are appealable, and may be appealed to the Appeals Hearing Officer for Vernal City, and then may be submitted for judicial review.

B. Appeal authority.

1. Appeals of decisions made by the Business License Clerk or the City Council shall be heard by the appointed Appeals Hearing Officer.

C. Filing an appeal.

1. An appeal shall be submitted in writing to the City within ten (10) business days of the date of the decision being appealed.
2. The appeal shall state the grounds for the appeal and include any supporting information the appellant wishes the Appeals Hearing Officer to consider.
3. Failure to timely file an appeal constitutes a waiver of the right to appeal.

D. Effect of appeal on enforcement.

1. Filing an appeal does not automatically stay enforcement of the decision being appealed.
2. Appeals Hearing Officer may grant a stay of enforcement upon request when they determine that a stay is appropriate and does not pose a risk to public health, safety, or welfare.

E. Hearing procedures.

1. Appeals shall be scheduled for consideration by the Appeals Hearing Officer.

2. The appellant shall be provided notice of the hearing date, time, and location.
3. The Appeals Hearing Officer may receive testimony, documents, and other relevant information from the appellant, City staff, and other interested parties.
4. The Appeals Hearing Officer may affirm, modify, or reverse the decision being appealed.

F. Decision.

1. The decision of the Appeals Hearing Officer on appeal shall be issued in writing and shall include the basis for the decision.
2. The decision of the Appeals Hearing Officer shall be final for purposes of administrative review.

G. Judicial review.

1. Any judicial review of an Appeals Hearing Officer decision shall be pursued in accordance with applicable State law.
2. Nothing in this Title shall be construed to expand or limit the availability of judicial review beyond that provided by law.

Section 05.01.120 - Fees

A. Fees established by resolution.

1. All business license fees required under this Title shall be established by resolution of the City Council.
2. The fee schedule may include, but is not limited to:
 - a. application fees;
 - b. initial license fees;
 - c. annual renewal fees;
 - d. late fees or penalties;
 - e. inspection or review fees; and
 - f. fees for specific business classifications or regulated activities authorized under this Title.

B. Payment required prior to issuance or renewal.

1. All applicable fees shall be paid in full prior to issuance, renewal, or reinstatement of a business license unless otherwise authorized by City Council resolution.
2. Failure to pay required fees shall constitute grounds for denial of issuance or renewal of a business license.

C. Non-refundable fees.

1. Application, processing, and inspection fees are non-refundable regardless of whether a license is approved, denied, or withdrawn, unless otherwise provided by City Council resolution.
2. Payment of a fee does not guarantee approval or issuance of a business license.

D. Late fees and penalties.

1. Late fees or penalties may be assessed for failure to timely renew a business license in accordance with Section 05.01.090.
2. Late fees and penalties shall be assessed as provided in the fee schedule adopted by the City Council.

E. Proration.

1. License fees may be prorated when authorized by City Council resolution.
2. Proration of fees does not alter the licensing year or renewal requirements established in this Title.

F. Additional fees.

1. Additional fees may be required to cover the cost of inspections, background checks, or reviews conducted by City departments or external agencies when such reviews are required under this Title.
2. Payment of additional fees required under this subsection shall be a condition of license issuance or renewal.

G. Effect of nonpayment.

1. Failure to pay required fees may result in denial of issuance, denial of renewal, or administrative suspension of a business license.
2. Continued operation without payment of required fees constitutes operating without a valid business license.

H. Governmental entities.

1. Federal, state, county, municipal, and other governmental entities shall be exempt from business license application fees imposed under this Title.
2. Governmental entities shall remain subject to all applicable administrative requirements of this Title.
3. The City may require payment of reasonable administrative or processing fees necessary to recover the actual costs incurred by the City in reviewing, issuing, renewing, or administering a business license for a governmental entity.

Exemption from business license fees under this subsection does not constitute exemption from compliance with any other applicable provision of this Code.

SECTION 6. EFFECTIVE DATE.

This ordinance shall take effect immediately upon adoption and posting, as required by law.

ORDINANCE 2026-03**

**AN ORDINANCE OF THE VERNAL CITY COUNCIL REPEALING VERNAL
CITY MUNICIPAL CODE § 16.20.308 “DWELLING, INTERNAL ADDITIONAL
(IADU)” AND ADOPTING VERNAL CITY MUNICIPAL CODE §16.20.100
"ADDITIONAL DWELLING UNITS (AADUS, DADUS, IADUS)"**

WHEREAS, the Vernal City Council desires to expand attainable and flexible housing options while preserving the character and livability of established neighborhoods; and

WHEREAS, the City Council finds it necessary to consolidate and update existing Internal Accessory Dwelling Unit regulations and establish standards for all Additional Dwelling Units within Vernal City; and

WHEREAS, the Planning Commission held a duly noticed public hearing on October 14, 2025, and forwarded a positive recommendation to the City Council; and

WHEREAS, the City Council finds that the adoption of §16.20.100 promotes efficient use of existing infrastructure, supports long-term neighborhood stability, and complies with Utah Code §10-9a-530;

NOW THEREFORE, be it ordained by the Council of the Vernal, in the State of Utah, as follows:

SECTION 1: **REPEAL** “Section 16.20.308 Dwelling, Internal Additional (IADU)” of the Vernal Municipal Code is hereby *repealed* as follows:

REPEAL

Section 16.20.308 Dwelling, Internal Additional (IADU)

~~A. An IADU may only be created in relation to a primary single family dwelling. B. One (1) additional parking space must be created to support the IADU so that the minimum number of parking spaces for a single family dwelling with an IADU shall be three (3). 1. The parking space supporting the IADU must be surfaced in either asphalt, concrete, masonry pavers or gravel. C. The minimum lot size for an IADU shall be six thousand (6,000) square feet. D. Current fire egress requirements concerning bedroom window egress must be met at the time an IADU is created. E. An IADU may not be created or maintained within a manufactured home as defined in this title.~~

SECTION 2: **ADOPTION** “16.20.100 Additional Dwelling Units (AADUs, DADUs, IADUs)” of the Vernal Municipal Code is hereby *added* as follows:

ADOPTION

16.20.100 Additional Dwelling Units (AADUs, DADUs, IADUs)(*Added*)

A. Purpose. The purpose of this section is to establish uniform standards for internal, attached, and detached additional dwelling units within Vernal City. These provisions are intended to:

1. Encourage a range of attainable and flexible housing options that complement established neighborhoods and support intergenerational living;
2. Promote efficient use of existing infrastructure and public services;
3. Provide opportunities for residents to age in place and for homeowners to maintain long-term investment and stability in the community;
4. Preserve the single-family character and livability of residential zones; and
5. Comply with Utah Code and related housing provisions.

B. Applicability.

1. Additional Dwelling Units are permitted in the RA-1, R-1, R-2, R-3, R-4, and MH zones, provided that: a. The owner-occupancy requirements of subsection H are met; and b. All public infrastructure and access meet Vernal City engineering standards.
2. Additional Dwelling Units are prohibited within mobile-home parks.
3. Each Additional Dwelling Unit shall remain accessory to a single-family dwelling located on the same lot.
4. An Additional Dwelling Unit shall not be approved on a lot that contains more than one principal dwelling.

C. Definitions.

1. **Internal Additional Dwelling Unit (IADU):** A self-contained dwelling unit created wholly within the existing footprint of a single-family dwelling, including attached garages or basements.
2. **Attached Additional Dwelling Unit (AADU):** A self-contained dwelling unit constructed as a physical addition to the principal dwelling and sharing a common wall or roof.
3. **Detached Additional Dwelling Unit (DADU):** A self-contained dwelling unit that is structurally separate from the principal dwelling but located on the same lot.
4. **Owner Occupancy:** The property owner resides in either the principal or the additional dwelling as their primary residence.

D. Prohibited Subdivision and Sale.

1. An Additional Dwelling Unit may not be subdivided, conveyed, or sold separately from the principal dwelling or lot, whether by condominium conversion, metes-and-bounds description, or other means.
2. All Additional Dwelling Units shall remain under common ownership with the principal dwelling.

E. Utilities.

1. All Additional Dwelling Units shall utilize the same utility connections as the principal dwelling for culinary water, sanitary sewer, electric, and natural-gas service.
2. Separate meters, service laterals, or independent utility accounts are prohibited.
3. Any required upgrades to existing service lines shall be the responsibility of the property owner and installed in accordance with Vernal City Engineering Standards (2016).

F. Development Standards.

1. **Lot Size:** Minimum 6,000 square feet for IADUs; 10,000 square feet for AADUs and DADUs.
2. **Setbacks:** Shall comply with § 16.24.160 (Accessory Buildings and Structures) or the base-zone standards, whichever is more restrictive.
3. **Height:** Shall not exceed 25 feet or the height of the principal dwelling, whichever is less.
4. **Design Compatibility:** a. AADUs and DADUs shall utilize exterior materials, colors, and roof forms that are consistent with or complementary to the principal dwelling. b. Detached units shall include similar window and door proportions and roof pitch.
5. **Fire and Building Safety:** All Additional Dwelling Units must comply with adopted building, fire, and health codes, including egress requirements for sleeping rooms.
6. **Floodplain and Sensitive Lands:** Units within mapped flood or sensitive-land areas must meet applicable provisions of Titles 8 and 12.

G. Parking Requirements.

1. A single-family dwelling containing an IADU shall provide a total of three (3) off-street parking spaces.
2. AADUs and DADUs shall provide one (1) off-street parking space per bedroom, up to a maximum of two (2).
3. Parking surfaces shall consist of asphalt, concrete, masonry pavers, or gravel.
4. All parking shall be located outside required front-yard setback areas unless otherwise approved by the Planning Department.

H. Occupancy and Use.

1. Either the principal dwelling or the Additional Dwelling Unit must be owner-occupied at all times.

2. No more than one (1) family, as defined in § 16.04.030, may occupy an Additional Dwelling Unit at any time.

I. Flag Lots.

Detached Additional Dwelling Units are prohibited on flag lots unless otherwise approved through the subdivision process and compliant with all access and utility standards.

J. Administrative Procedure.

1. Applications shall be reviewed administratively by the Planning Department.
2. Submittal requirements include: a. Completed application form; b. Scaled site plan showing structures, driveways, and parking; c. Floor plans demonstrating compliance with building and fire codes; and d. Proof of owner occupancy.
3. Upon approval, the City shall record a Notice of Compliance with the Uintah County Recorder identifying the property as containing an approved Additional Dwelling Unit.

K. Enforcement and Revocation.

1. Failure to maintain owner occupancy, shared utilities, or compliance with the provisions of this section constitutes a violation of this Title.
2. Violations are subject to enforcement under Title 1, including revocation of approval and daily civil penalties.
3. Upon revocation, continued occupancy of the Additional Dwelling Unit is unlawful.

L. Relationship to Other Uses.

This section does not modify or supersede § 16.20.310 (Dwelling, Mixed Use Accessory). Mixed-use dwellings within commercial or mixed-use zones remain governed by that section.

M. Re-evaluation Upon Transfer of Ownership.

When a property containing an approved Additional Dwelling Unit is sold or otherwise transferred, the new owner shall submit verification of continued owner occupancy and compliance with this section within sixty (60) days of the transfer. Failure to do so shall render the prior approval void, and continued occupancy of the Additional Dwelling Unit shall be unlawful until a new administrative approval is granted.
