The purpose of this staff report is to provide an update on the status of the Multi-Jurisdictional Hazard Mitigation Plan and propose adoption of those changes described below.

***Re-Adopting the MJHMP.*** Last year MSD council adopted the Multi-Jurisdictional Hazard Mitigation Plan (MJHMP), later FEMA under final review made minor changes to the plan for each of the city annexes. Though these changes were minor, the plan are now being repropose to approve the changes. By readopting the MJHMP these final changes will be approved, and no further revisions are anticipated and likely will hold our compliance with FEMA until 2030.

1. **Summary of changes to the MSD Jurisdictional Annex:**

**Kearns:**

- The State indicated that even if the risk for landslides is low, assets must still be listed in the vulnerability section. The Vulnerability Assets section was updated to reflect this risk (p. 15).
- Kearns, Magna, Copperton, White City, and Emigration Canyon\_were required to describe how local floodplain management regulations are implemented and enforced to regulate development in Special Flood Hazard Areas (SFHAs). The annexes were updated accordingly.
- Earthquake Mitigation Action #2 had insufficient detail in the benefits column describing what “develop and implement education programs” entails. The action was updated to include frequency and methods for training and outreach.
- Several mitigation actions were identified as preparedness or response actions or lacked sufficient detail to demonstrate mitigation. These actions were updated to better describe how they mitigate the listed hazards.

**Copperton:**

- The mitigation action table was updated to clearly identify a single lead agency for each action where multiple agencies had previously been listed without clarification.
