| 1. Highlights of the 2026 American Planning Association & Lincoln Institute of Land Use Policy Trend Report for Planners |

21 Senior Planner Grant Allen and Dina Blaes, Chief of Strategic Engagement presented
22 highlights from the 2026 APA Lincoln Institute of Land Policy trend report. They focused
23 on artificial intelligence (AI) as a rapidly changing landscape for both planners and the
24 public. He shared a quote from Tom Sanchez, PhD, highlighting the difficulty in adjusting
25 to AI's rapid evolution and determining its impact.

26 Commissioner Wright asked what staff's concerns were regarding AI usage. Those
27 concerns included the following:

- 28
- 29 • The potential dilution of quality when AI is used extensively in professional work
 - 30 • The importance of quality inputs and underlying models when using AI tools
 - The need to be careful about appropriate applications of AI in planning work

31 Mr. Allen noted that Taylorsville planning staff had not yet used AI in their work and
32 explained that the city was working to determine appropriate usage policies.

33 Ms. Blaes noted that the city was taking a serious approach to AI policy development,
34 with Jay Ziolkowski currently preparing an AI policy for the city. She emphasized the need
35 to maintain the city's credibility as an institution and discussed approaching AI as if it were
36 an "intern" - a tool that required professional oversight before any work was released.

37 Commissioner Wilkey inquired about the validity of developer-submitted plans that might
38 be AI-generated. Staff acknowledged this was likely already happening but emphasized
39 the need for human verification of any AI-produced work.

40 Ms. Blaes highlighted the trend of state preemption in local governance, noting that states
41 across the country were increasingly telling cities what to do regarding land use decisions.
42 They discussed the concept of "cooperative localism" versus true preemption, and noted
43 this was an ongoing issue in the current Utah legislative session. The report also covered
44 various other serious topics including environmental issues and workforce stability issues.

45 Upcoming agenda items for future meetings would include:

- 46 • Open and Public Meetings Act training on February 24th
- 47 • Discussion about GRAMA (Government Records Access and Management Act)
- 48 and use of personal emails
- 49 • A new Planning Commission alternate was expected to be appointed at the
- 50 February 18th City Council meeting

51 Ms. Blaes mentioned that staff would be reaching out to each commissioner to determine
52 what contact information could be included on a roster that would be distributed only to
53 the planning commissioners.

54 Commissioner Muñoz offered to provide training on Utah's legislative process if there was
55 sufficient interest in having her do so.

64 **MOTION: Commissioner Wilkey moved to approve the minutes of January 13, 2026**
65 **as presented and January 27, 2026 as amended. The motion was**
66 **seconded by Commissioner Wright and passed unanimously.**

LEGISLATIVE ACTION

3. Public Hearing and Recommendation to the City Council for a Zoning Text Amendment to Title 13 of the Taylorsville Municipal Code, Amending State Code Reference Numbering Pursuant to SB1008

70 Mr. Allen presented a zoning text amendment to Title 13 of the Taylorsville Municipal
71 Code. He explained that during the 2025 first special session, the Utah Legislature
72 passed Senate Bill 1008, which recodified the Land Use Management Act. This
73 recodification reorganized and renumbered chapters, requiring the city to update all
74 references in its municipal code.

75 Mr. Allen showed examples of the changes, noting that the staff report contained
76 approximately 36 pages of these reference updates. The amendment was published on
77 the state notice website with no comments received.

78 **MOTION: Commissioner Muñoz moved to open the public hearing. The motion was**
79 **seconded by Commissioner Wilkey and passed unanimously.**

80
81 There was no one in attendance either in person or online who expressed a desire to
82 speak.

83
84 **MOTION: Commissioner Wilkey moved to close the public hearing. The motion was**
85 **seconded by Commissioner Muñoz and passed unanimously.**

86 Commissioner Wilkey inquired if staff had double-checked all the reference updates. Mr.
87 Allen confirmed that he had thoroughly reviewed the document twice, and Ms. Blaes
88 conducted a final review.

89 **MOTION: Commissioner Wright moved to forward a positive recommendation to**
90 **the City Council on File No. 1Z26-DCA-000577-2026 to amend Title 13**
91 **Land Development Code of the Taylorsville Municipal Code as specified**
92 **in Exhibit A of the staff report based on the findings outlined in the staff**
93 **report. The motion was seconded by Commissioner Willardson and**
94 **passed unanimously.**
