

1 A Meeting of the Nibley City Council held at Nibley City Hall, 455 West 3200 South,
2 Nibley, Utah, on Thursday, February 19, 2026.

3
4 OFFICIAL MINUTES OF THE MEETING
5 City Recorder Cheryl Bodily took minutes
6

7 **Opening Ceremonies**

8 Councilmember Erin Mann shared a thought about a book, *A Sand County Almanac* by
9 Aldo Leopold. She said the book was one of her top three books and a book of essays on
10 conservation and land management and proper land use. She quoted:

11
12 *“Quit thinking about decent land use as solely an economic problem. Examine*
13 *each question in terms of what ethically and aesthetically right, as well as what is*
14 *economically expedient. A thing is right when it tends to preserve the integrity,*
15 *stability and beauty of the biotic community. It’s wrong when it tends otherwise”*
16

17 Councilmember Mann said this reminded them that they needed to think about land in
18 multiple ways, not just economically.

19
20 **Call to Order and Roll Call**

21 Mayor Larry Jacobsen called the Thursday, February 19, 2026, Nibley City Council
22 meeting to order at 6:35 p.m. Those in attendance included Mayor Larry Jacobsen,
23 Councilmember Randy Spaulding, Councilmember Nick Kenczka, Councilmember Garrett
24 Mansell, Councilmember Erin Mann, and Councilmember Nathan Laursen. Justin
25 Maughan, Nibley City Manager, Tom Dickinson, Nibley City Engineer, Cheryl Bodily,
26 Nibley City Recorder, and Steve Eliason, Nibley City Public Works Director was also
27 present.
28

29 **Approval of the Previous Meeting Minutes and Current Agenda**

30 Councilmember Laursen made a motion to approve the meeting minutes with
31 amendments to consider. Councilmember Kenczka seconded the motion.
32

33 Councilmember Laursen reviewed his proposed amendments to the January 29, 2026,
34 meeting minutes.
35

36 The motion passed unanimously 5-0; with Councilmember Laursen, Councilmember
37 Kenczka, Councilmember Mann, Councilmember Mansell, and Councilmember
38 Spaulding all in favor.
39

40 Councilmember Laursen moved to approve the current evening’s (February 19, 2026)
41 agenda. Councilmember Kenczka seconded the motion. The motion passed unanimously
42 5-0; with Councilmember Laursen, Councilmember Kenczka, Councilmember Mann,
43 Councilmember Mansell, and Councilmember Spaulding all in favor.
44

1 **Public Comment Period**

2 Mayor Jacobsen gave direction to the public present and opened the Public Comment
3 Period at 6:42 p.m.

4
5 Jen Weeks of 752 Clear Creek Road proposed changes to Nibley City’s code
6 enforcement. She described that she had removed her cars from the road at 11:45
7 Tuesday night to ensure that her cars were off the street. They had received two code
8 violations for 2 cars hanging over onto the sidewalks. She described that they had 4 cars
9 that needed to be removed from the street each night. She said there was nowhere else
10 to park. She said there needed to be changes and some reasonableness. She thought
11 they could enforce sidewalk violation codes between certain hours. Ms. Weeks
12 described looking at her Ring doorbell camera and observing there had been no
13 pedestrians on her sidewalks in the middle of the night with exception of the code
14 enforcement officer. There should not be pedestrians in the dead of night. She had no
15 solutions except for kicking kids out of the house or getting rid of cars.

16
17 Holly Weston of 1190 West 2400 South said she was at the meeting to offer moral
18 support for her friends Jen and Jeff and described that her kids had been ticketed for
19 parking on the streets overnight and every time they had been ticked the streets had
20 been bone dry. She was asking for reasonable accommodations for ticketing when there
21 is no snow.

22
23 Mayor Jacobsen told the City Council he would be happy to put parking regulations on
24 the agenda again. He described recent circumstances of the Council debating Nibley City
25 parking ordinance.

26
27 Seeing no further public comments, Mayor Jacobsen closed the Public Comment Period
28 at 6:46 p.m.

29
30 **Planning Commission Report**

31 No Planning Commission meeting had taken place and there was no report.

32
33 **Report and Discussion: Connect Transit; Lieren Hansen, Connect Transit Board Chair**

34 Lieren Hansen, Nibley City’s representative on the Connect Transit board was present at
35 the meeting.

36
37 Ms. Hansen updated the City Council that use of the Connect Pool service was growing.
38 Connect had recorded 7,294 Pool trips in 2025 and the overall system continued to
39 grow. They had 1,516,244 trips in the past year, with Nibley’s route 11 providing 55,203
40 trips for Nibley’s residents.

41
42 Ms. Hansen said Connect was excited about a comprehensive public outreach study to
43 assess short and long-term needs across the valley and how they could better provide
44 efficient, effective services. They would be coordinating with City staff to help gather

1 the information and gather meaningful public input. They anticipated the data collection
2 and planning process to be completed January 2027. Ms. Hansen reported that total
3 Connect system hours in 2025 were 92,427 hours and 1,380,745 miles covered.

4
5 Councilmember Mann asked if they were seeing a trend of riders increasing. Ms. Hansen
6 thought it was increasing. She said she would follow up with numbers to answer
7 Councilmember Mann's question.

8
9 Councilmember Kenczka asked if they collected data on ridership and how granular this
10 data was. Ms. Hansen said they collected data on ridership. The technology on the buses
11 kept track as people got on the buses. She believed the homepage showed the daily
12 number of riders per route.

13
14 Mayor Jacobsen asked how Nibley could help collect public input for Connect Transit's
15 planning process.

16
17 Mr. Dickinson told Ms. Hansen that he had worked with Todd Beutler and Jody Kimball
18 on the completion of Nibley City's 1200 West that connected Logan's 10th west to
19 Hyrum. They had planned and accommodated for some in-lane bus stops and a pickup
20 stop on the road. He wanted to explore opportunities for future routes and stops on
21 12th west.

22
23 Councilmember Mansell said his son rode the bus every day. He appreciated the service
24 and had some input on where he believed they could add a few Nibley stops.

25
26 Mayor Jacobsen and Ms. Hansen discussed micro-transit (Pool) and the success of that
27 program. Mayor Jacobsen questioned if micro-transit might be offered in Nibley and
28 questioned, when that might be?

29
30 **Discussion and Consideration: Resolution 26-06—Adoption of the Nibley City Storm**
31 **Water Master Plan (First Reading)**

32 Steven Wood, with Sunrise Engineering and project manager of the Nibley City Storm
33 Water Master Plan, was present at the meeting. Cameron Bird was also present at the
34 meeting.

35
36 Mr. Wood said Nibley's staff had been wonderful to work with. He said Tom, Chet, and
37 Justin had all been really top-notch to work with. Mr. Wood used a PowerPoint
38 presentation titled *Nibley City Stormwater Master Plan – 2025* with his presentation (a
39 printed version of the presentation is included in the printed meeting minutes). The
40 topics discussed by Mr. Wood included the following: Data Collection, Irrigation
41 Infrastructure, Hydrologic Parameters, Existing Systems & Problem Areas, Pond
42 Utilization for 100 Year Storm Event, HEC HMS Results, High Ground Water/Sump
43 Pumps, Regional Ponds vs Regional Conveyance, Irrigation Capacity Analysis, Capital
44 Improvement Projects, Trunk Line Projects, User Rate Analysis, and Impact Fee Analysis.

1
2 Councilmember Kenczka was curious about Nibley only having an agreement with one
3 of the three canal companies. He questioned what they needed to do to get an
4 agreement? Mr. Wood said the Nibley City Manager was already completely “gung-ho”
5 about doing this and getting functioning agreements in place. Mr. Dickinson said having
6 agreements was great but there were prescriptive rights as well. There was a balance
7 between what they had to accept and what they could design so they were not
8 increasing the flows. Mr. Dickinson said the City had really good relationships with all of
9 the canal companies. Mayor Jacobsen discussed the City’s historic relationship with the
10 Blacksmith Fork Canal Company. He said Nibley City was a shareholder in each canal
11 company, particularly with the Blacksmith Fork Canal Company and the City paid annual
12 water share assessments. Mayor Jacobsen wanted to ensure there was full disclosure
13 that Justin Maughan was also a member of the Nibley Blacksmith Fork Canal company
14 and Steve Eliason was a contract employee with the NBFCC. Councilmember Kenczka
15 asked about the ratio of private versus public detention pods. He questioned what the
16 City did to ensure ponds still functioned. Mr. Dickinson said the City Council mandated a
17 stormwater agreement for a private stormwater detention pond. They required an
18 annual inspection by the property owner to be turned into the City every year and every
19 five-years the City was allowed to inspect the pond.
20

21 Councilmember Mansell asked if there was a type of housing Mr. Wood would propose
22 to help Nibley City with stormwater management. Mr. Wood said this was a loaded
23 question. If they went with a higher density development, they would need a larger
24 detention facility. In Agricultural densities, stormwater took care of itself. Mayor
25 Jacobsen said it was the City’s responsibility to make developers pay for mitigating their
26 stormwater impact. Councilmember Mansell asked Mr. Eliason about a culvert shown
27 that had black barrels. He asked if the barrels were there to mitigate pets or animals
28 from getting in the culvert. Mr. Wood said the culvert was in UDOT’s responsibilities for
29 maintenance. Councilmember Mansell asked if the study would update Nibley’s GIS
30 layer for groundwater. Mr. Dickinson said the maps used to show the soil profiles tied
31 into the groundwater map and was how they’d generated the water table map.
32

33 Mayor Jacobsen discussed low impact designs (LIDs) and said the City Council needed to
34 decide if this was something the City Council wanted to utilize in future development.
35 Mayor Jacobsen discussed that Nibley City didn’t currently have a stormwater impact
36 fee. He and Mr. Wood discussed an impact fee that might address the capital
37 improvement need for trunk lines. Mayor Jacobsen said they needed to increase their
38 stormwater fee for the existing stormwater problems. Impact fees needed to be used
39 for the impact of new development. He wondered about a regional assessment. Mr.
40 Maughan said this was how they had done the north side of town and described their
41 experience with a regional fee.
42

43 Councilmember Laursen asked if there were other policy decisions that would help with
44 stormwater. He used piping canals versus not piping canals as an example. Mr. Wood

1 said Steve’s group was doing what they needed for their MS4 permits to the State
2 regarding the maintenance, preserving, and quality of the stormwater ponds and
3 facilities. Councilmember Laursen asked if there were State actions that the City should
4 be looking at that would impact the City’s master plan. Mr. Wood said there was a bill
5 that would impact user fees. The results of the bill, HB501 would be a dramatic on any
6 city in Cache Valley. Councilmember Laursen asked if there was a list of all 94 suggested
7 projects listing in the Stormwater Master Plan. Mr. Wood felt this was included in the
8 plan appendix. Mr. Dickinson described MS4 State requirements. He said Nibley was
9 dragged into an MS4 in 2008 because of their location proximity to Logan. Mr. Dickinson
10 said in 2008 there was a Cache Valley Stormwater Design standard using the 100-year
11 storm development. This plan had been updated in 2017 and there would be other
12 updates coming.

13

14 *Councilmember Kenczka moved to approve Resolution 26-06—Adoption of the Nibley*
15 *City Storm Water Master Plan for first reading. Councilmember Laursen seconded the*
16 *motion.*

17

18 Councilmember Kenczka had a few questions about odd dates in the plan and asked for
19 some clean up on dates. Mr. Wood said it should be classified as Storm Water Master
20 Plan 2025. Mayor Jacobsen asked Councilmember Kenczka to provide his list of dates to
21 Mr. Wood. Councilmember Laursen asked for more time to review the plan.

22

23 *The motion to approve Resolution 26-06 for first reading passed unanimously 5-0; with*
24 *Councilmember Kenczka, Councilmember Laursen, Councilmember Mann,*
25 *Councilmember Mansell, and Councilmember Spaulding all in favor.*

26

27 Seeing no objection, there was a meeting break at 8:21 p.m. The meeting resumed at
28 8:31 p.m.

29

30 **Discussion and Consideration: Ordinance 26-01—Adoption of the Nibley City General**
31 **Plan (Second Reading)**

32 *Councilmember Mann moved to adopt Ordinance 26-01—Adoption of the Nibley City*
33 *General Plan. Councilmember Laursen seconded the motion.*

34

35 The City Council began their review of the proposed General Plan, going section by
36 section. They began discussion with the Intro and Public Input section.

37

38 *Councilmember Mann made a motion to amend Ordinance 26-01 to include the*
39 *following mission statement:*

40

41 *“We will provide fiscally sound municipal services that Nibley residents*
42 *cannot easily provide for themselves, we will equitably find the balance*
43 *between individual property rights and the rights of our community, and*
44 *we will help our citizens be proud to live in Nibley.”*

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Councilmember Kenczka seconded the motion. The amendment passed unanimously 5-0; with Councilmember Mann, Councilmember Kenczka, Councilmember Laursen, Councilmember Mansell and Councilmember Spaulding all in favor.

The City Council discussed the Transportation section of the proposed Master Plan.

Councilmember Mann questioned a table included on page 30 of the plan regarding Traffic Circulation Senate Bills 195. Mr. Dickinson described that SB195 mandated that every general plan contain an analysis of barriers that would obstruct a network of roadways. This would include canals and they'd interpreted it to include the highways. Councilmember Kenczka questioned if the projects on the table were determined by Nibley City or by the State. Mr. Dickinson said his understanding of SB 195 was that the cities had to compile the list, including the associated costs.

Councilmember Mann said she loved the implementation suggestions on page 31.

The City Council moved to discussion of the Parks, Recreation, and Open Space section of the proposed General Plan.

Councilmember Mann said page 50 talked about promoting open space subdivision to promote preservation of open space. She felt the City Council had much discussion about small pieces of open space versus preserving larger parcels of open space. She didn't know if the verbiage reflected what they wanted as a Council. The City Council discussed their interpretation of the section. Mayor Jacobsen said he was not sure item three was talking about a specific ordinance or if it was referring to a concept. He felt it was referring to a philosophy of open space.

Councilmember Laursen made a motion to amend Ordinance 26-01, page 50, item 3 to read:

"Promote and utilize ~~open space~~ subdivision concepts that incentivize open space preservation within newly developed subdivision"

Councilmember Mansell seconded the motion. The amendment passed unanimously 5-0; with Councilmember Laursen, Councilmember Mansell, Councilmember Mann, Councilmember Kenczka, and Councilmember Spaulding all in favor.

Councilmember Mann made a motion to amend Ordinance 26-01, page 50, item 7.b. to read:

1 *“Strengthen organizations that sponsor and support public activities,*
2 *business, and social networks. Support new programmed events, such as*
3 *Heritage Days, Morgan Farm, nature/science education programs, fairs,*
4 *festivals, markets, and performing arts events in the City.”*

5
6 *Councilmember Kenczka seconded the motion. The amendment passed*
7 *unanimously 5-0; with Councilmember Mann, Councilmember Kenczka,*
8 *Councilmember Laursen, Councilmember Mansell, and Councilmember Spaulding*
9 *all in favor.*

10
11 After prompting by Councilmember Kenczka, the City Council discussed a map on page
12 45 and a callout for the Nibley City regional park. He questioned if they wanted to
13 callout the Nibley indoor recreation center as part of that list. Councilmember Laursen
14 remembered that the map had been pulled from the Nibley Parks and Recreation
15 Master plan.

16
17 The City Council had no discussion on the Public Facilities section of the proposed
18 General Plan.

19
20 The City Council discussed on the Water Conservation & Preservation section of the
21 proposed General Plan.

22
23 Councilmember Kenczka questioned if the numbers set on page 55 of the plan for DNR
24 study were realistic. Mr. Maughan said they were close.

25
26 The City Council discussed the Economic Development Analysis section of the proposed
27 General Plan.

28
29 Mayor Jacobsen had wording he suggested the City Council might include to justify how
30 economic development was more than just about dollars and cents.

31
32 *Councilmember Mann made a motion to amend Ordinance 26-01 to add the*
33 *following:*

34
35 *“This section on economic development focuses on the financial impact to*
36 *Nibley citizens, specifically as an opportunity to broaden and diversify*
37 *Nibley’s tax base. In addition, economic development can strengthen a*
38 *community in ways that go beyond dollars and cents. Commercial centers*
39 *with shops and restaurants can bring neighbors together and create a*
40 *shared sense of place. A vibrant town center can preserve and promote*
41 *Nibley’s identity and boost community pride. Developing employment*
42 *opportunities within Nibley can limit traffic congestion and promote*
43 *active transportation by decreasing travel distances between home and*

1 *work. Many of the community benefits considered in other sections of this*
2 *plan are enhanced by the economic development discussed here.”*

3
4 *Mayor Jacobsen seconded the motion for discussion.*

5
6 Councilmember Mansell felt another reason to push economic development was to
7 diversify Nibley tax base and to help keep property taxes low by trading out property tax
8 into another kind of income for the City to function and operate.

9
10 *Councilmember Mansell made a substitute motion to amend Ordinance 26-01 to*
11 *read as follows:*

12
13 *“This section on economic development focuses on the financial impact to*
14 *Nibley citizens, specifically as an opportunity to broaden and diversify*
15 *Nibley’s tax base and reduce the residential tax burden. In addition,*
16 *economic development can strengthen a community in ways that go*
17 *beyond dollars and cents. Commercial centers with shops and restaurants*
18 *can bring neighbors together and create a shared sense of place. A*
19 *vibrant town center can preserve and promote Nibley’s identity and boost*
20 *community pride. Developing employment opportunities within Nibley*
21 *can limit traffic congestion and promote active transportation by*
22 *decreasing travel distances between home and work. Many of the*
23 *community benefits considered in other sections of this plan are enhanced*
24 *by the economic development discussed here.”*

25
26 *The motion was seconded by Councilmember Kenczka. The motion to amend*
27 *passed unanimously 5-0; with Councilmember Mansell, Councilmember Kenczka,*
28 *Councilmember Laursen, Councilmember Mann, and Councilmember Spaulding*
29 *all in favor.*

30
31 *Councilmember Kenczka moved to continue discussion and consideration of Ordinance*
32 *26-01. Councilmember Spaulding seconded the motion. The motion passed 5-0; with*
33 *Councilmember Kenczka, Councilmember Spaulding, Councilmember Laursen,*
34 *Councilmember Mann, and Councilmember Mansell all in favor.*

35
36 **Discussion and Consideration: Ordinance 25-36—Amending NCC 21.10.020 Open**
37 **Space Subdivision, Including Requirements for Setbacks, Lot Size Standards, and**
38 **Variation (Second Reading)**

39 Councilmember Mansell discussed creating a buffer to areas abutting existing homes or
40 neighborhoods. He also suggested simplifying the ordinance and requiring an average
41 lot size within each zone and eliminating the minimum lot size, with no incentive for
42 open space. Councilmember Spaulding questioned if they wanted to have open space
43 subdivision continue in Nibley City. The City Council discussed potential ownership and
44 maintenance of open space. Councilmember Kenczka said with the R-2A it came down

1 to math. In order to grant the number of lots with the bonus, and the amount of open
2 space, it became the math. His consternation was to the Nibley citizen. When they
3 legislated a R-2A zone it came with some expectation, but when they went with a R-2A
4 with open space it became another thing all together. He said he felt it needed to be its
5 own zone and then they could go case by case. If they zoned it then the City Council
6 could decide if they wanted to put it in their city. Mayor Jacobsen clarified that the City
7 Council would be empowered with the decision with the rezone. Mayor Jacobsen said
8 he like the legislative rezone decision. He felt the City Council had lost the ability to
9 negotiate what was of value to the community with the open space.

10
11 *Councilmember Kenczka moved to approve Ordinance 25-36—Amending NCC 21.10.020*
12 *Open Space Subdivision, Including Requirements for Setbacks, Lot Size Standards, and*
13 *Variation. Councilmember Mansell seconded the motion.*

14
15 *Councilmember Laursen made a motion to amend Ordinance 25-36 to remove R-*
16 *2A from all the tables and consideration for open space subdivision.*

17 *Councilmember Mansell seconded the motion.*

18
19 Councilmember Laursen said he was very much in line with Councilmember Kenczka’s
20 thinking. They’d lost what the R-2A zone was. He said it still served the purpose for the
21 lot they knew were not common lot sizes in Nibley anymore, which was anything below
22 R-2A. He didn’t like their current open space code, he didn’t like this code, but he was
23 okay with the proposed code if they removed R-2A and they needed to move forward.
24 Councilmember Laursen said now that they couldn’t legislate the open space
25 subdivision, they needed to come up with something they were comfortable with and
26 he was only comfortable with the proposed code if they removed R-2A. He didn’t
27 believe they would have many open space subdivisions presented to them any time
28 soon.

29
30 *The motion to amend passed unanimously 5-0; with Councilmember Laursen,*
31 *Councilmember Mansell, Councilmember Mann, Councilmember Kenczka, and*
32 *Councilmember Spaulding all in favor.*

33
34 The City Council discussed if the ordinance was ready for approval with the removal of
35 the R-2A references and with the changes recommended by the Nibley Planning
36 Commission.

37
38 *Councilmember Laursen moved to continue discussion and consideration of Ordinance*
39 *25-36. Councilmember Mansell seconded the motion. The motion passed unanimously 5-*
40 *0; with Councilmember Laursen, Councilmember Mansell, Councilmember Mann,*
41 *Councilmember Kenczka, and Councilmember Spaulding all in favor.*

42 **Workshop: 2026 Goals**

43 Councilmember Mann suggested her City Council goals for 2026:
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1. Continue to work on an indoor recreation facility
2. Pursue economic development in the city
3. Southern annexation policy between Nibley and Hyrum
4. Meet with municipalities to discuss planning topics (non-quorum)
5. Multi-City Council Pickleball tournament

Councilmember Laursen said he liked the Planning Commission’s goals. He really liked the corridor problem. He suggested the city needed to come up with a communication plan or look at if they needed a communications director and look at new mediums of communicating with the public, adjoining communities, and with each other. He suggested they may need to come up with a strategic communication plan.

Mayor Jacobsen suggested they needed to write an economic development plan.

Mr. Maughan summarized where the City stood in regard to the 2025 goals they’d set.

Councilmember Laursen said the City needed to start collecting data and have a repository for data. This may involve a database administrator or data analysis. He thought they could consider a strategic data warehouse structure or policy.

Mr. Maughan said he felts like Nibley City was a in a weird spot with their growth and need to starting thinking about taking on departments and considering things for themselves or deciding what or if they were willing to sacrifice to be owners instead of renters.

Council and Staff Reports

Councilmember Spaulding thanked the Public Works crew for the recent snow removal.

Councilmember Kenczka thanked staff for being respectful to everyone in all situations.

Councilmember Mansell asked about the HB of reducing tax exemption from \$35,000 to \$60,000. Mr. Maughan reported that the bill had lost its steam and was more of a requirement for commercial properties to report their real estate sales data.

Councilmember Mansell reported on his discussions with the Weeks family and asked for follow up data on when they’d received warnings.

Councilmember Mansell said he’d gotten a call from Chet about doing a ride along for snow plowing but was unable to go. He still looked forward to doing a snowplow ride along.

Councilmember Laursen reported on his conversations in online forums. He asked the Mayor to consider putting code enforcement on an agenda or consider putting together

1 a task force to review code enforcement and consider if code enforcement should be
2 proactive or reactive?

3
4 Councilmember Laursen questioned their snow removal priority map and suggested
5 Public Works might review that map.

6
7 Councilmember Laursen reported on his participation in an interview with the rural
8 economic Blueprint program and suggested they might look into the USU Extension
9 program and ask for help with this.

10
11 Councilmember Laursen said he understood they were behind in the recreation special
12 service district, but this was intentional. He'd sent out example resolutions to fellow
13 councilmembers in other cities and suggesting they might want to consider looking at
14 and potentially passing those Resolutions.

15
16 Mayor Jacobsen discussed news articles regarding 1200 west modifications.

17
18 Mayor Jacobsen summarized a meeting he and Mr. Maughan attended with Providence
19 City. He said the big items they'd discussed were defining the proper scale of
20 government, fire, library, recreation, and wastewater.

21
22 Mr. Maughan recapped the status of HB501.

23
24 Mr. Dickinson said Nibley City had gotten 4 proposals to update the Transportation
25 Master Plan. He would be sending out email to assemble the steering committee to
26 organize selection and bringing the approval back to the City Council.

27
28 Mr. Dickinson reported on the Nibley Meadows Park. He'd met with the Parks and
29 Recreation Advisory Committee about concepts included in the Parks Master Plan.
30 Collectively, he'd like to set up a workshop with the Council, Planning Commission and
31 members of the Parks and Recreation Advisory Committee to give direction to staff of
32 what they wanted so they could get a design and start applying for grants. He hoped to
33 have the workshop of the week of March 2-5. Councilmember Mann and
34 Councilmember Kenczka expressed that they'd like to participate.

35
