Minutes of the Salem City Council Meeting held on March 4, 2026 in the Salem City Council Chambers.

6:00PM WORK SESSION

1. Agenda Item Discussion

City Manager Matt Marziale came to the podium to lead the agenda item discussion for tonight's work session. He went through each of the items individually to provide council with a summary. The items discussed included:

-Settlement of the Davis Water agreement – this is on the agenda so the signatures on the document can be ratified.

-Plat 1 agreement – This was presented and approved unanimously in DRC and is now coming before council for approval.

Sewer Map – The impact study from 1.5 years ago just needs an update to the map that is included to include newer development areas. We are only replacing the map that is in the impact fee study currently.

Marziale gave a brief review of additional agenda item lists and turned the time over to city staff that will report on each of the items.

Utah Local Governments Trust – This is Salem City's insurance company. They are reporting that they are seeing a lot of sidewalk lawsuit issues in municipalities. We are updating our sidewalk ordinance for clarity. Councilperson Snyder asked if residents are aware that they can contact the city to report sidewalk repair issues. Public Works Director James Thomas responded that we encourage residents to report issues such as sidewalk repairs needed.

Sewer Impact Fee Ordinance – We are requesting that we ask for impact fee payment at the time of plat bonding. This helps to ensure that we are getting the money necessary for us to help pay back our portion of the bond.

Salem Central Garner Annexation – The majority of the Garner property is within Salem City boundaries and a portion of it is in Payson City. The agenda item tonight is just to request council's approval for us to proceed with the process of annexing that property. The hope is to have that annexation policy for the first council meeting in April.

Off-site Water Tank – Bradey Wilde is confident that the costs listed in the document have been closely reviewed and will be the actual cost that the project will cost.

Public Works Snow Plow Package – Thomas is requesting that we update the bid from February 4th council meeting for the public works snowplow to include the cost of the snowplow portion. Councilperson De Graw requested that we could possibly rephrase the budgetary impact section on the staff report template to help clarify.

Dog Park – The proposed dog park is located in a neighborhood just west of 54 townhomes that do not have yards for pets. The site was previously a weed patch and will be repurposed into a low-maintenance dog park using turf, gravel, and double gates at the entrances.

Councilperson De Graw inquired about parking. The city plans to build multiple dog parks so this will not be the only one. While there has been some pushback from nearby detached homeowners, the project will proceed, focusing on serving residents of higher-density homes. Councilperson De Graw emphasized the importance of addressing parking in future projects.

Staff Reports - Additional time during work session was filled with staff directors briefly reporting on anything that needed to be discussed from their respective areas.

a. Ordinance Requiring Sewer Impact Fee Payment at Time of Subdivision Plat Bonding

City Planner Webster came forward to present the agenda item regarding the fee payment at time of subdivision plat bonding. We are now wanting to require that we can collect the impact fee at the time of plat bonding.

De Graw asked for any public comments regarding the public hearing item. There was no public comment.

b. Salem City Sewer Collections Master Plan Update

City Manager Marziale came forward to present the updated sewer collections map. Our sewer treatment plant collection system and map was last evaluated roughly 1.5 years ago and a study was created at that time. We are now bringing forward for approval an update to the map that is included in the study because there has been additional development in a few areas since the last map was created.

The request of the council is to adopt this more current map. In July 2026, we will update the sewer impact study and the whole thing will be updated at that point.

This agenda item was tabled in the last council meeting of February 18th to add clarification regarding information on storm drains as well as a striking of a request from city council.

This request is for the city council to review the signed documents and ratify Councilperson Taylor's signature on the agreement to resolve disputed claims.

The second signed agreement between Salem City and Three Bridges is titled Supplemental Conditions of Plat Approval Three Bridges Plat 1. Both parties – Three Bridges and Salem City - are in agreement and in favor with the agreement and it has been signed by a Three Bridges representative and Councilperson Taylor.

This request is to ratify what was agreed upon and signed. Councilperson Snyder asked for a brief clarification of the first sentence in section d of the document which was answered by City Manager Marziale and Councilperson Taylor.

City Planner Webster came forward to present agenda item 12. She presented the map of the land owned by the Garner family which is currently split between Salem City and Payson City. This request of council is just the first step for Salem City to begin the process to petition to annex the land. Webster is requesting permission to proceed with an annexation policy process.

This is for the impact fee reimbursement agreement for the Flagship Homes development. Near our cemetery tank number one, we have built a second tank. Staff has gone through the costs of adding the second tank in a way that can be reimbursed by our impact fee policy. They are just requesting that we approve the fee agreement to move forward with the offsite water tank infrastructure.

19. MATT MARZIALE, MANAGER

20. CHIEF GREG GURNEY, PUBLIC SAFETY DEPT.

Nothing additional. Councilperson Snyder asked Chief Gurney if there is anything that the council can do to support their efforts with the reported increase in child abuse cases in the city. There has been an increase in cases that are typically reported to DCFS – including physical and emotional abuse.

21. STEVE COX, BUILDING DIRECTOR

Councilperson Cox reported on attendance at a Home Builders Association (HBA) meeting, noting that three days remain in the current legislative session. HB 470 and HB 184, relating to zoning for small homes and building inspectors, respectively, did not pass and are expected to be reintroduced.

Cox also highlighted SB 245 concerning impact fees, which proposes a rewrite of current statutes, and noted the importance of monitoring this bill. Additional legislation discussed

included requirements for building and engineering departments to clearly specify and post all fees, as well as a bill addressing detached ADUs on 10,000 square foot lots.

Councilperson Snyder suggested preparing a short list of these legislative issues for discussion at a future meeting with Mike McKell to better communicate impacts on cities.

22. WALTER BIRD, CITY ATTORNEY

Bird just briefly updated that the sidewalk ordinance on tonight's agenda is the one from the February 18th, 2026, meeting just returning with the updated ordinance information that was requested.

23. LISA WEBSTER, CITY PLANNER

Councilperson Snyder reported on her trip to Utah Municipal Power Agency (UMPA) in Washington, D.C., where they met with members of the Senate and House of Representatives. She noted that one of the primary issues discussed was the Colorado River. Approximately 25% of UMPA's power is generated from Glen Canyon Dam; however, continued low water levels could result in reduced or halted power generation, requiring UMPA to purchase power on the open market. Snyder expressed appreciation for UMPA's efforts to secure cost-effective power.

Councilperson De Graw requested that a council visit be arranged to the UMPA headquarters ticker room.


