SYNOPSIS

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Kenneth Robinson, Iron County Commission Chair, excused Commissioner Cozzens from today’s meeting.

INVOCATION

An invocation was offered by Karsten Reed.

PLEDGE OF ALLEGIANCE

Those assembled were led in the pledge of allegiance by Michael Bleak.

APPROVAL OF MINUTES

Michael Bleak made a motion to approve the minutes of the Iron County Commission meeting held on April 13, 2025. Second by Kenneth Robinson. Voting: Michael Bleak, Aye; Paul Cozzens, Absent; Kenneth Robinson, Aye.

APPROVAL OF CLAIMS FOR PAYMENT

Michael Bleak made a motion to approve Claims for Payment from April 13, 2025, to April 26, 2026. Second by Kenneth Robinson. Voting: Michael Bleak, Aye; Paul Cozzens, Absent; Kenneth Robinson, Aye.

DEPARTMENTAL REPORTS

Lori Eichelberger, Justice Court Administrator, noted that the budget was at 21.18% spent. Lori reported on the Justice Court monthly recap from January to March, comparing 2025 to 2026. DUIs, Driver’s License Violations, Moving Violations, Assaults, Controlled Substance/Narcotics, Domestic Violence, and other miscellaneous Misdemeanors/Infractions were all up from 2025. Impaired Driving DUI Violations, Non-moving Violations, and Theft were all down from 2025. Revenue collected was up by \$35,872, Revenue disbursed was up by \$14,092, and Revenue retained was up by \$21,680. She reported on Citation comparisons from January to March 2025 to 2026. Cedar City Police was down by 46, SUU Police was down by 57, Iron County Sheriff’s Office was up by 437, and Utah Highway Patrol was up by 4.

Jared Wilson, Information Technology (IT) Director, noted that the budget was on track. Jared expressed his appreciation to Josh Merideth for noticing that the price of computers was increasing by 50%, and for ordering some before the increase. He reported that there were 2 new employees, Bailey Banks (GIS) and Boston Miles (Technician), in the IT Department, and both were going to be great assets to the department. Bailey had already made her presence welcome by creating a GIS Layer program. He strongly encouraged any department to utilize the program. Jared reported that the Dispatch 911 was converted from a desktop to a ProVision program that speeds up the process. There was a new enhanced Iron County computer security program, which was doing better than anticipated, a new ticketing system, and an MDM Management system.

Carri Jeffries, Iron County Recorder, reported on year 2025. There were 14,922 Documents, 61 Subdivision Plots, 1,704 new accounts, and 257 of those were state-assessed patented mining claims, and total revenue was \$595,105. Carri noted that during the Legislative Session, there was an increase in Recording Fees by \$5.00, effective May 6th.

Karsten Reed, Iron County Assessor, reported that the State of Utah required the Commissioners to complete the new BOE training, which was passed in the State Legislative

Session. The training would be offered online after July 1st. Karsten noted that the Tax-Roll deadline was in May, and he expressed his appreciation to Trevor Mattson, Exilda Serrano, Bradden Beaumont, John Williams, and LaTonya Heaton for working hard to make sure the tax roll was on time. He reported that the Assessor's Budget was at 23% used.

Nicole Rosenberg, Iron County Treasurer, reported that Product Sales collected in 2025 were \$79M. The Tax Distribution to Iron County was \$16M. Nicole reported that the Public Treasurers Investment Fund (PTIF) interest rate was lower at 3.85%, and earned \$2,633,044.92 in interest in 2025. Moreton Asset's long-term rate was at 4.67%, and earned \$987,229.42 in interest. She reported that Outstanding Taxes were at \$4,645,883.43 in 2025. Nicole noted that the May Tax Sale would be held on May 2. The list began with 134 properties, and was presently at 76. Buildings: 1 home and 1 Condo, three valued over \$25K, and 0 Commercial. Nicole reported that the budget was on track and expressed her appreciation to her employees who worked hard to get their work completed. Mike Bleak congratulated Nicole for 25 years of service to Iron County and presented her with a Certificate, a 25 Year Pin, and a tote.

Michael Bleak, Iron County Commissioner, reported that he met with the Southern Utah Economic Alliance Committee that included the 5-County area. After the meeting, he was able to meet James Leavitt, the new District Director for Congresswoman Maloy. Mike attended the Iron County Republican Convention held on April 24th. He and Sheriff Carpenter were the high-vote candidates for their respective positions and would be on the ballot. Sheriff Carpenter earned above the 60% votes and would not need a Primary Election, but Mike would be having a Primary Election with an opponent. Jail construction continued to move forward, and they were staying on the timeline of the budget. Mike reported that he visited the Green River Energy Center in Emery County. This was a battery storage facility, similar to a facility that would be built in Iron County as part of the Appaloosa 2 Solar Project. He noted that Terry Palmer, Nate Dennett, Sheriff Carpenter, and Rand Bettridge all attended the visit. He reported that NovaCast was a local company that was using new technology for building homes with pre-cast foam-core concrete panels, with a construction time from start to finish of 30 days. The homes were fire and hurricane-resistant.

Kenneth Robinson, Iron County Commissioner, reported that he attended the Diamond Arena addition ribbon-cutting. There were several drought meetings over the last two weeks by the Department of Agriculture and the Department of Natural Resources regarding the water issues in Southern Utah. He attended the Iron County and State Republican Conventions and was grateful to participate in the convention process. Unfortunately, Southern Utah has a disadvantage in voting power at the conventions. He noted that 84% of the voting population lived in four counties in the State of Utah, and the rest of the counties constituted only 16%.

UTAH SUMMER GAMES PREVIEW

Jon Oglesby, Larry H. Miller Utah Summer Games Director (USG), expressed his appreciation for all the support from Iron County. He praised Maria Twitchell, Iron County Tourism Director, for being so supportive with the Visit Cedar City/Brian Head campaign, and the work that Maria does for Iron County was the best in the state. Jon presented a recap of the 2025 USG. There were 10,740 athletes from 17 different states, 1 foreign country, and 27 out of 29 counties in Utah were represented. The USG brought between \$17 and \$20M to the economic impact, coming from information that Maria Twitchell provided. Jon reported that the USG received two awards last year, 1. Best Digital Media from the National Congress of State Games Award, and 2. The Organization of the Year from the Cedar City Chamber of Commerce. He noted that there were 500 athletes for the Inaugural Special Olympics USG partnership with Evergreen, Las Vegas Raiders Partnership- added 7 by 7 Football and Girls Flag Football to the USG lineup. The first Girls Flag Football Skills Camp in the State of Utah was held in Iron County, hosted by the Las Vegas Readers, with over 50 athletes from all over Utah at the camp. Jon reported that this was the 40th Year Celebration of the USG. He noted that Dallas Smith Media put together a 10-second USG highlight video, which ran during the Olympics, on KSL, through the NBA Playoffs, and on NBC. The USG created a Weekly Signature Community Engagement Event this year, celebrating the 40th Anniversary of the USG. Jon explained the

events that would be available to Iron County and visitors, beginning May 28th through July 4th. The beginning event was the Special Olympics USG on May 28th, with a special Drone Show beginning at 8:00 p.m., which would be free to the community. The USG Opening Ceremony would be held on June 5th, and June 13th would be the America250 “Summer Street Fest,” from 5:00 p.m. to 10:00 p.m., from 100 West from Center Street to 100 North. On June 20th, USG Day would be at Brian Head Resort. Jon reported that other programs for the USG were the ‘40 by 40’ Campaign and the USG Experience Pass College. The USG had a partnership with SUU and Special Olympics Utah, where Special Olympics athletes were now receiving SUU College Certificates for Workforce Readiness. The first class of 15 athletes would obtain Graduation Certificates during the USG Special Olympics Opening Ceremony. He reported that the USG was now offering a 3 Credit SUU class to USG participants who were in High School for \$30.00. There would be a variety of surprises during the 40th Anniversary Opening Ceremony.

DISCUSSION AND POSSIBLE APPROVAL OF A MEMORANDUM OF UNDERSTANDING (MOU) BETWEEN IRON COUNTY TOURISM, RECREATION, CULTURE, AND CONVENTION (TRCC) BOARD AND LARRY H. MILLER SUMMER GAMES/SUU FOR FUNDING TO THE SUMMER GAMES FOR \$300K

Sam Woodall explained that the TRCCA Fund Advisory Board program was to leverage the funds generated by the Iron County TRCCA Tax for marketing programs and tourism promotions. He reported that the TRCCA Fund Advisory Board had selected the USG to receive \$300K to be paid in three installments over three years of \$100K each year, to be used to conduct and manage any existing sporting or competitive events and to explore potential new events un the Larry H. Miller UAG umbrella. Sam Woodall, Iron County Deputy Attorney, reported that the USG does qualify for funds. He had no concerns and recommended approval of the MOU.

Michael Bleak made a motion to approve the MOU between Iron County TRCC Board and Larry H. Miller Summer Games/SUU for funding to the Utah Summer Games in the amount of \$300K. Second by Kenneth Robinson. Voting: Michael Bleak, Aye; Paul Cozzens, Absent; Kenneth Robinson, Aye.

PUBLIC COMMENTS

Concerns regarding the proposed Data Center included water rights, water and air quality, livestock, wildlife, ecosystem, and rushing to make a decision by Nicole Phillips, Mary Stults, and Marion Lund (via letter).

Thomas Loveheart, a resident of Iron County, reported that he was running for House District 51. His points for running included school funds, opposition to the Data Center, air quality issues, improving affordable housing, and health care.

RESOLUTION 2026-2, EMERGENCY DROUGHT DECLARATION

Jon Whittaker, Iron County Clerk, explained that this Declaration requested the acceptance from the Department of the Interior, including the Bureau of Reclamation, to provide technical staff assistance for water development grants. That Spencer Cox, Utah Governor, accept this declaration and make state resources and programs available to Iron County as a result of the ongoing condition of severe drought throughout Iron County. The BLM and NFS assist in working with grazing permit holders to allow for maintenance of herds, and the FSA provides assistance and coordination to farmers and ranchers to provide financial assistance through disaster programs, and financial assistance for water wells and other water development projects. Jon read through the Declaration and highlighted those requests from the State and Iron County residents. He noted that financing was available through the Utah Department of Agriculture and Food. This is to make the state aware of the conditions in the situation Iron County is facing, and to make available certain funding streams for agricultural producers.

Michael Bleak made a motion to approve Resolution 2026-2, Emergency Drought Declaration as presented. Second by Kenneth Robinson. Voting: Michael Bleak, Aye; Paul Cozzens, Absent; Kenneth Robinson, Aye.

IRON COUNTY RESOLUTION 2026-2

EMERGENCY DROUGHT DECLARATION, IRON COUNTY, UTAH.

Whereas, current conditions due to ongoing drought have and will continue to cause adverse effects to agricultural producers, the tourism industry, and the municipal needs of the residents of Iron County; and

Whereas, the forecast for continuing drought in the County is not expected to change in the near future; and

Whereas, the agricultural community provides an important proportion of the economic value of this county, and the financial condition of most agricultural producers in this county has, and will continue to be poor, due to the drought conditions; and

Whereas, the tourism industry also constitutes a significant part of the Iron County economy and has also suffered for several years due to drought conditions in this and previous years; and

Whereas, current severe drought conditions have significantly increased the wildland fire hazard in this County; and

Whereas, fire restrictions will be put in place as drought conditions worsen; and

Whereas, the availability for firefighting resources are expected to be limited due to the prolonged and extraordinarily dry conditions throughout the Western United States; and

NOW THEREFORE, the Board of Commissioners of Iron County, Utah does hereby declare a Drought Emergency, **EFFECTIVE THIS 27TH DAY OF APRIL, 2026**, and hereby formally requests the following:

1. That the Utah Congressional Delegation accept this Drought Emergency Declaration and requests that the Department of the Interior, including the Bureau of Reclamation provide technical staff assistance for the application of water development grants, that the Bureau of Land Management and the Department of Agriculture, including the National Forest Service, the Farm Service Agency, and Rural Development provide cooperation and assistance in the areas of water development.
2. That the Governor of the State of Utah, Spencer J. Cox, accept this Drought Emergency Declaration for Iron County, and provides coordination with the members of the Utah Congressional Delegation, and that he takes immediate action to make State resources and programs available to Iron County as a result of the ongoing condition of severe drought throughout Iron County and in response to this Iron County Drought Emergency Declaration, including but not limited to the following:
 - a. Order the different departments and divisions of the State of Utah to marshal their services, powers, and programs to provide assistance to Iron County's residents and businesses; and
 - b. Request that the Division of Emergency Services and Homeland Security within the Department of Public Safety be named as the lead agency in the operations of the State of Utah Drought Response Plan, including coordination with the Federal Emergency Management Agency; and
 - c. Request that the Department of Economic Development deploy staff to meet with the business owners and operators in Iron County to assist with the effects of the drought and to assist with grants, low interest loans and other financial assistance; and

- d. Request that the Department of Agriculture also deploy staff to assist the agricultural producers of Iron County, and coordinate efforts with Federal agencies in provision of financial assistance and other programs; and
 - e. Request that the Department of Natural Resources assist with the drought response with assistance of additional fire resources, if needed, from the Division of Forestry, Fire and State Lands; and
 - f. Request that the Utah Division of Water Rights facilitate the processing of well applications and requests for financial assistance for agricultural and culinary wells; and
 - g. Request that the Division of Wildlife Resources make appropriate and fair reductions of wildlife numbers from private lands, especially crops and irrigated lands, as well as appropriate reductions along with grazing permit holders on State and Federal lands; and
 - h. Request coordination and assistance from the Administration of School and Institutional Trust Lands in working with grazing permit holders for both spring, fall and winter grazing; and
 - i. Request that the Department of Administrative Services, State and Federal Surplus property work with Iron County and give preference in obtaining surplus property that can be used by the County and other governmental agencies in their drought response; and
 - j. Request that financial resources of the State of Utah be made available to assist Iron County, other local governmental agencies and organizations, and those State Departments and Divisions that will be responding and assisting Iron County in its drought response efforts.
3. That the Bureau of Land Management and the National Forest Service assistance and coordinate in working with grazing permit holders to allow for maintenance of herds, and working with cities and communities in the provision of culinary water systems and projects, and providing additional coordination with local fire officials, including the provision of surplus fire apparatus or equipment to meet local needs; and
 4. That the Federal Farm Service Agency (FSA) provide assistance and coordination to farmers and ranchers to provide financial assistance through disaster programs and financial assistance for water wells and other water development projects; and
 5. That residents of and visitors to Iron County take extra precautions to prevent any type of fire, and specifically the following:
 - a. When conditions warrant, ban the issuance of any burning permits until conditions significantly moderate to the point the County Commission may reconsider the ban;
 - b. Ban any and all fireworks from private lands within the County;
 - c. Take extra precautions with open fires;
 6. That residents of and visitors to Iron County to conserve the use of water, especially outside watering;
 7. That the residents of Iron County exercise patience with road conditions, especially those gravel and dirt roads that will become rough and wash-boarded until such time that there is sufficient moisture to do proper maintenance;
 8. That the Iron County Emergency Manager, as the Iron County Local Emergency Planning Committee, (LEPC) Director assisted by the Deputy Director of LEPC, function as the Iron County Drought Response Team during the period of this Drought Emergency Declaration.

**NOW THEREFORE, THE COUNTY LEGISLATIVE BODY OF IRON COUNTY,
UTAH ORDAINS AS FOLLOWS:**

8.04.100 - Closed fire season.


- A. Burning Prohibited; Exemptions. Subject to exemptions in this chapter, burning is prohibited during the statutorily closed fire season from June 1 through October 31 and the regulatory closed fire season from September 15 through October 31 ~~November 16 through the last day of February~~. Where state statute permits, from June 1 to October 31, and the person obtains a state- issued closed-season burning permit prior to burning, persons may burn pursuant to the terms of the state-issued permit.
- B. Burning permits will be issued only when in compliance with the Utah Air Conservation Regulations. The following requirements must be met with each permit issued:
 - 1. The permit is not valid and operative unless the clearing index is 500 or above. The clearing index is determined daily by the U.S. Weather Bureau and available on the National Weather Service Salt Lake City Weather link.

- C. ~~B.~~ Notification Requirement. When a person has obtained a closed-season burning permit, the person shall notify the local fire department of the approximate time the burn will occur before the burn takes place.
- D. ~~C.~~ Exemptions. Any local, state, or federal fire official or firefighting forces in the performance of official duty.
- E. ~~D.~~ Misdemeanor. Any violation of this section shall be punishable as a Class C misdemeanor and, upon conviction, subject to penalty as provided in Section 1.08.010 of this code.

8.04.101 – Open fire season.

- A. Burning Permit Required. Subject to exceptions in this chapter, persons shall obtain a written county burning permit, which shall be filled out completely and approved before starting a fire in the unincorporated areas of the county during the open fire season, which is November 1 through May 31 ~~March 1 through May 31 and November 1 through November 15~~.
- B. Burning permits will be issued only when in compliance with the Utah Air Conservation Regulations. The following requirements must be met with each permit issued:
 - 1. The permit is not valid and operative unless the clearing index is 250 ~~500~~ or above November 1 through March 31, and 500 or above, April 1 through May 31 in attainment areas. The clearing index is determined daily by the U.S. Weather Bureau and available on the National Weather Service Salt Lake City Weather link.

 - 2. A permit may be extended one day at a time, without inspection upon request to the issuing officer. The request must be made before the expiration of the permit.
- C. Burning permits shall not be issued when red flag conditions exist or are forecasted by the National Weather Service. Every permittee is required to contact the National Weather Service to ensure that a red flag condition does not exist or is not forecasted. Permits are not valid or operative during declared red flag conditions.
- D. During the open fire season, the state fire warden, chief fire officer, or official of each fire protection entity that is responsible for providing fire protection services in the unincorporated areas of the county may postpone, revoke, or deny burning permits due to environmental conditions, public nuisance, incompetence by the petitioner, or risk to public safety.
- E. Misdemeanor. Any violation of this section shall be punishable as a Class C misdemeanor and, upon conviction, subject to penalty as provided in Section 1.08.010 of this code.

IRON COUNTY ORDINANCE 2026-9

AN ORDINANCE OF IRON COUNTY, UTAH, SUPERSEDING AND AMENDING IRON COUNTY CODE §8.04.100 & §8.04.101, REGARDING CLOSE AND OPEN BURNING SEASONS.

Whereas, Iron County adopted Ordinance 2016-1 on March 28, 2016, to provide an official ordinance for outdoor burning; and


Whereas, Ordinance 2016-1 established closed and open burn periods that were consistent with State law; and

Whereas, in light of statutory changes, Iron County now desires to amend the current ordinance to conform with said changes; and


Whereas, unless amended, as herein, all other provisions of Iron County Ordinance §8.04.100 et. seq. shall remain the same.

DISCUSSION AND POSSIBLE APPROVAL OF A LOCAL CONSENT FOR SINGLE EVENT PERMITS HELD AT WOOD RANCH ON JUNE 20, 2026, AND AUGUST 8, 2026

Requested by Cedar City Elks Lodge 1566

Randy Clark, Cedar City Elks Lodge 1566, requested an Event Permit to allow alcohol at the two events, which included a June 20th-Fathers’ Day Family Picnic and Flag Ceremony, and August 8th-Elks Canyon Steak Fry.

Lucas Little, Iron County Auditor, explained that the external audit by Kimball & Roberts, CPA would begin on May 11th for 2 days. Luke reported that this Fraud Risk Assessment was required by the state Auditor’s Office. There was a Fraud Hotline on the Iron County website www.ironcountyut.gov available for any employee or member of the community. He noted that there was a required training that the governing body (Commissioners) had to complete within the first four years of office. Kimball & Roberts would put together a Statement, which would then be submitted to the State Auditor.

CONVENE AS THE IRON COUNTY BOARD OF EQUALIZATION

Kenneth Robinson, Iron County Commission Chair, declared the convening of the Iron County Board of Equalization (BOE).

Jennifer Bradbury, Iron County Human Resource (HR) Director, presented the hire of Ashten Roman as a Full-Time Deputy 1 for the Sheriff's Office, Patrol, effective May 11th. This was a backfill of a vacant position; the new hire of Leah Jones as a Part-Time Animal Shelter Technician for the Sheriff's Office, Patrol, effective April 27th. This was a backfill of a vacant position; the new hire of Molli Brown as a Part-Time Marketing/Administrative Assistant for the Fair Department, effective May 11th. 
