Mayor Beagley said Good evening. I'd like to welcome everybody here to our April 8 town council meeting, 2026. I would like to welcome town council member Mike Morgan, LuAnn Johnson, and Brandon Garbanati. I got it right. Okay. Tammie Morgan will give us a pledge, and Stacey Hill will give us a prayer.

Tammie said I pledge allegiance to the flag of the United States of America and to the republic for which it stands, one nation under God, indivisible with liberty and justice for all.

Stacey said, " Our Dear Heavenly Father, we're so very grateful to be here tonight as the town council of Snowville and citizens of The Town. Heavenly Father, watch over and protect our families wherever they are today, so that no harm or accident will come upon them. And thank you for the rains that we have received for our thirsty land. And please bless us so that we will continue to have more. We're so very grateful for the rains that have greened up the valley. And please bless those who are sick and afflicted at this time that they will be comforted by your hand, and in our hands also, we're so very grateful for everything you give us, and we say these things in His name, Jesus Christ.

Mayor Beagley said okay, If we could have a motion and accept the agenda and the minutes for the previous month.

LuAnn said I make a motion to accept the agenda and the minutes from the previous month.

Mayor Beagley asked for a Second.

Brandon said Second.

Mayor Beagley said it all in favor.

Mike, Brandon, and LuAnn said Aye.

Mayor Beagley said Any opposed. Thank you. Okay, first thing on our list here is the planning and zoning. Cody Carter and Carson Morgan.

Carson said so you've met twice now. Cody, the board is named. Cody is the chairman, so he's your boss over everything. So our main objective in this is we got to create a plan for the town and what that time looks like. We don't know yet. We still got to develop something in our next meetings, we have a few people coming, so we're gonna start meeting. It's the first Thursday of every week, every month, before the town council. So we can bring it to you guys. We have a few people coming next month to talk and try to help us develop a plan, and then we'll give it to you guys, for you guys to go through or deny. The thing we've read is that the plan has to be put together legally. So it's not like it needs to be. The attorney has to put it together so the town's protected, so we don't have people come in here and, you know, tear us apart. What else, dude? So we're gonna have to work. Eric's not here. I was hoping Eric was here. We'll have to work with Eric.

Tammie said Yeah, he's not gonna be here. He texted me about 30 minutes ago.

Carson said so, I have to work with Eric, because he'll have to be involved in everything, and, you know, making this plan and see if he has any references. One of the big things is impact fees. And I don't know if you guys know what an impact fee is, but it's what the town charges the new development to be like for water, sewer, and power. So when you do a new analysis.

Cody said I got a hold of a Dieter kid. His name is Cody Dieter, who does like West Corrine and a bunch of theirs. That's what he does. It'd be like \$7,500 per utility is what they charge. Plus you got to, we have to have the engineer, the town engineer, involved with him, whatever he will charge on top of that.

Carson said, and he's worked with Forsgren.

Cody said he's worked with Forsgren before, but Forsgren said he could do it, but, like this is what he specializes in.

Carson said, and Eric might have someone else, but then, by doing a new analysis of the impact fees, like, for instance, Cody's done some research, and he says that, I mean, it's already done, but like, for someone like a Flying J came in, did it would be? What was it?

Cody said that for a two-inch meter, like Corrine, it would be \$46,100 bucks for a two- inch meter.

Carson said, and I don't know what he thought it was.

LuAnn said just for the impact.

Cody said just for the meter and the impact fee.

LuAnn said Wow!

Cody said Yes, like their regular house hook-up is \$23,000, I think in Corrine, West Corrine water is \$34,000 to hook-up. Plymouth is \$22,000 hook-up. We just cut similar numbers. So I think we're way behind.

Carson said it doesn't need to be that high, but.

Cody said no, we need a new analysis to see what they will do.

Tammie said Yeah, I was just gonna say to the Rural water office,

Cody said yes.

Tammie said like help with that too, so.

Carson said, and he's one of the ones coming to our next meeting. Yeah, he's gonna come.

Tammie said that they'll be a good asset to help you.

Carson said Yeah, his name's Dennis, I think, and he was, he was on the planning and zoning for his city for 14 years.

Cody said So what we're saying is we're gonna have to have some money to do some of this stuff.

Carson said to try to get what it's gonna cost, but it's not yet, so it's slow.

Tammie said So I'm guessing that would probably all run through like the admin budget.

LuAnn said I would think so. I would think the administration, because it would be for attorney fees and engineering fees.

Carson said, and then Dennis is for water, which can also help with grants for a sewer system, if you guys are still interested in that. I think he was the one who was working with the last mayor.

LuAnn said the problem with that, which I heard before, was the issue with the amount of water that it would take, which we can't

Carson said I don't know about that.

LuAnn said we didn't have.

Carson said I think they're pretty efficient anymore.

Cody said You're gonna have to start somewhere. I mean, it's got to come eventually. The engineer could help us with the water, with the usage, but because it ain't gonna have to take that much water right now, I don't need to run it, because there ain't that much. But like people, another.

Carson said the thing we talked about is like, maybe that's where the other well could come in handy. You know, where you can't drink it. You know, we can use that for the water.

Cody said You can use that done that to the sewer treatment.

Carson said the infrastructure is already there. So,
LuAnn asked, but then well it will make your bathroom smell like rotten eggs.
Carson said Well, you're not gonna use it.
Cody said It will just go to the just go.
LuAnn said just to the treatment plan, oh, got you.
Cody said just to help everything.
Carson said, and the plant would be somewhere else.
LuAnn said yeah.
Mayor Beagley asked now that'd be on that will be on Snowville property, right?
Cody said yeah, unless you have a landowner that.
Carson said wants to long term leashing ground, leaching ground, or selling
ground, it would benefit a landowner to have all the waste like it would like all
they could pump it out of their pivots and stuff.
Mayor Beagley said that's something we're going to have to check into to see if
anybody wants to sell or lease.
Cody said, and I don't know. I mean, I know Carolyn, she had it all figured out
before it was going to go on Joe's ground and just dump in the Creek. But I don't
know if that's still optional. I don't know
if Tom would sell anymore now or not but.
LuAnn said that it would be a good idea to put it in the Creek.
Cody said Well, that's where they dump most of the after-treatment plants. It
goes right in the rivers.
Carson said, " Like, " after they treat it.
Mike said I think, goes right to the Malad River as soon as they're done.
Cody said Tremonton puts it back into the Malad River, that's why those
treatment plants are all by the rivers.
LuAnn said Yeah, I did. I have noticed that.
Cody said they just dump them right back in.
Carson said so we'll work on the plan and stuff, and it'll take a little while to get
them together. I mean, so and I don't know how that's gonna look, as far as how
we're gonna present it to you guys.
Cody said then we just got to get a general plan.
Carson said Is what we're going to grandpa. We have to have a plan.
Stacey said yes.
Mike asked for
Carson said the plan, like, I have to have a general plan, right?
Mike said Yes.

Cody said that, because technically, it has been illegal for 20 years.

Carson said Carolyn actually called, and we have Corrine's general plan. So it's actually pretty cool. There's a lot that goes into it.

Cody said We can take pieces of everybody's plan, what we like, and build our own, really.

Mike said I've got another one here that's old. This is big water, which is in southeastern Utah somewhere. It's another plan that we can look at.

Carson said but once we get the plan in place and the impact fees and stuff done, I mean, then that just generates revenue for the town. LuAnn said right.

Carson said, and I don't know where, Flying J is been pushed off if we can get something in place, because everybody can have to redo permits, we could potentially charge them \$30,000 for a hookup, and they're not going to squawk at \$30,000. They know everywhere else, like, you know, that \$30,000 is getting paid to somewhere, probably the contractor, and he's just gonna pocket that.

LuAnn said Yeah.

Carson said you know someone's getting paid that impact fee because they're planning on it somewhere.

Yeah,

Mayor Beagley asked do you have any idea what it's gonna cost per resident to hook up.

Carson asked about the sewer.

Mayor Beagley said Yeah.

Cody said we don't know yet.

Carson said, but Dennis at Rural Water could tell us. I think that Carolyn said she had it all planned out one time, and it was \$20 a month.

Cody said, but that was.

Carson said that was just a month

Cody said for a long time.

Mike said about 25 years ago.

Carson said I mean, there's no doubt when a sewer system comes in, it's gonna cost every resident, and I don't know if you're not the if you'll have to make them hook up to it, or if it can just be just new growth, you know, and they can hook up to it when they want.

Cody said, but I think you'll have to, you'll have to have everybody hook up to it, and afford to pay for it.

Carson said I don't know.

Mike said One thing we looked at before is just looking at

Cody said the businesses.

Mike said businesses in the town.

Carson said yeah, and I know the Mine.

Mike said begin with and then we could branch out from there.

Carson said I know the mine would probably help out a lot of that. I know they came at one time and said they would buy the ambulance, so I'm sure they would be willing to help out.

Stacey said no.

Carson said no, I guess they will help a little bit. I know the donations they were kind of cheesy, but

Stacey said I was surprised, too, Carson.

Carson said I figured they'd be all over that space. Yeah,

Stacey said I'll talk about it.

Carson said I think that's all we have. But every Thursday, every the first week of every month, every Thursday, at seven o'clock at the public meeting. So everyone's welcome. So the town hall, whenever we have to do agendas, meetings, and minutes.

Stacey said I will have it posted for you guys.

Tammie said I'm sure, as it gets going, you'll have to have public hearings for the public's input and stuff. It's kind of a long process, but it's good that it's getting started.

Mayor Beagley said Well, thank you. Looks like you got your work cut out for you. That's a lot of information.

LuAnn said Thank you for doing it.

Mayor Beagley said Okay, next one's animal control. We had a situation here this last Friday, the bull and the four cows got out again, and the town's going to have to look into trying to settle this problem, because it could be a safety factor for us, and if someone gets hurt and we don't do something about it, we could be sued, even though the owners.

LuAnn said, " Plus, they ruin everything.

Mayor Beagley said Yes, they do. And these ordinances in here, you know, they're considered a nuisance. They consider you. It's illegal to let your cows roam and get on other people's properties, and we have a number of ordinances that they're not applying to right now. So this is something that the council is going to have to decide what they want to do.

LuAnn asked Is there anything in this ordinance that gives any kind of guidance on what we can do to take care of it, or is it just nothing, because most of our ordinances don't have any anything.

Mayor Beagley said No, you mean like penalties or anything like that. No, that's what the council is going to have to do. The council is going to have to review these ordinances and decide which ordinances they want to put penalties against. And once we set that up, we could start doing something.

LuAnn said So on this one, we went and talked to Keith Oman, is the one who told me that the brand inspector would have the power to come and corral the cows, get put him in his trailer, and then he hauls him to a point where they're held. So for the first time, Ty said that he didn't think that would work, so he called his boss to see what he could do to help us out. And he said, Yes, he can corral them, put them in his trailer, and take them down to the feedlot in Perry Anderson feedlot. Then they are separated and held in the pen, and then they then the people have to pay a fine, and the feed bill and their fence has to be repaired, and the brand inspector would have to come inspect it to make sure it was suitable to put the cows back in. So, yeah, right now they have two vehicles parked in the holes.

Brandon said But even if they repair this fence here, the lot isn't big enough.

Mayor Beagley said they're not legally allowed to have them on there, according to the ordinance, not enough property.

LuAnn said Yeah.

Mayor Beagley said so that's why.

Brandon said we need to give them this ordinance and let them know they need to.

Mayor Beagley said well, I'm gonna write a letter and send a copy to this person.

LuAnn said So the ordinance. The ordinance reads, under one acre on a lot, which is less than one acre, up to one-half Animal Unit shall be permitted for small and medium domestic animals only.

Mayor Beagley said That's goats and sheep.

LuAnn said Goats and sheep. But that doesn't say anything about it's okay for cows to be on less than an eight less than an acre, and there's only one.

Mayor Beagley said it does because a cow is considered one unit.

LuAnn said yeah.

Mayor Bealey said, and a horse two.

LuAnn said, and they have three-quarters of an acre, so the total number of cows allowed is 0.

Carson said good luck doing that.

Mayor Beagley said Yeah, so

Brandon said to do to set in, because you can serve them this. We have to give them a time limit. Do we vote in a

Mayor Beagley said, " Well, the first letter is just going to be aware of, them be aware of that we are looking at this and they have a problem.

LuAnn said Well, make sure that they know they're going to be picked up by the brand inspector, and they're going to be hauled to a feed lot, and then they have to pay the feed bill and the fine, and they have to build a new fence.

Mayor Beagley said Yes, we put that in there, too.

Brandon said, but not a new fence, because they can't have cows

LuAnn said they can't have cows anyway.

Mayor Beagley said Yeah,

Brandon said that's relocated.

Mayor Beagley said, and they have a lot of money on that three-quarters of an acre right now, bull and four cows. They're considering them pets.

Mike asked, they have been there for an extended period of time, and there has always been animals on that lot. Are they not going to be grandfathered in to some extent.

Mayor Beagley said That's a good question. That's something illegal. People are going to have to decide how far do you go back on a grandfather?

Mike said I doubt you can totally restrict them. I think you can cut them back some, but I don't think you can totally restrict them from having no animal.

Mayor Beagley said No, no. They're not restricted to having no animals. They could have goats, sheep, chickens, and stuff like that. It just large animals, horses, and cows. Is not allowed on the amount of property they have.

LuAnn said There's been horses on that property the Kimber's from the time before I was born, so you can't, you can't tell them, I can't have a horse. I don't think.

Mayor Beagley said then you're gonna have to rewrite your ordinance.

LuAnn said Probably the land just a like, right away for I don't really know.

Mike said I don't know. I think they need to be made aware that there is a problem there and they need to address it, and we're looking at it.

LuAnn said, " Well, I gotta tell you, I'm not so much on you can't have any animals. I just want the damn things to stay in there at their house. Stay there.

Don't come to the park. If you keep them in and you feed them, so they don't want to get out. I don't have a problem with it myself. I don't think we need to be too hard-ass about everything, either. But, but, yeah, they have to make sure that the animals are stay on their property.

Brandon said So they need to completely repair,

LuAnn said to completely repair the fence at all.

Mayor Beagley asked Are you aware of what type of fence you have to have for a bull?

Brandon said A big one.

Mayor Beagley said not barbed wire fence isn't adequate for a bull.

LuAnn said We have lots of bulls out on the ranch.

Mayor Beagley said Yeah, but it's not according to the rules.

Mike said But he did type fence.

LuAnn said Five wires will keep them then, unless they're jumpers,

Mayor Beagley said, and that's up to the ordinance, how they want to handle this or not ordinance, but the council. But if you're going to change things, you can have to change the ordinance thing,

LuAnn said yeah, because I hate to be too, you know, but they just have to make they just can't keep getting out. They have to be if they're going to keep getting out, then they're going to have to; we've got to do something to make it so that the fine is big enough that it's going to hurt them.

Mayor Beagley said I agree with that entirely.

LuAnn said It needs to be big enough.

Mayor Beagley said It's large enough they'll start thinking twice about things,

LuAnn said yeah, because they slid down that one hill right by the ball diamond, and they bent the back of the ball diamond like you can't believe the damage that they've done. And that's just not okay. And then they get mad at us when we go tell them to get their cows out of the park, and they're mad.

Mayor Beagley said she told me she wasn't allowed to talk to me. Okay?

Brandon said So if we're gonna go that route, which is fine, what do we need to do next.

LuAnn said change the wording.

Mayor Beagley said we will have to reword it.

LuAnn said Well, we have to read it again, yeah.

Brandon said Because you have to change the point five acres.

Mayor Beagley said You have to.

LuAnn said We must have something about that house because it needs to be rewritten. Yeah, we'll have to look at it.

Mayor Beagley said Okay.

Brandon asked that's something we probably ought to do before we send them a letter, isn't it? Or no, because we got to have something to stand behind.

Mayor Beagley said Okay.

Mike said Well, the way the ordinance is written now, I think we can send them a letter and tell them you've got a problem. You need to fix it. The ordinance is now saying you can't have any animal, any larger animals, there, so depending on how they.

Brandon said react.

Mike said, " React to it, I think, then we need to go and see what we need to do with the ordinances.

Mayor Beagley said Yeah, when I confronted them, the husband, he just said, My wife takes good care of these animals. You have to talk to her. And I tried talking to her. I asked her.

Brandon asked whether you have pictures of them in the park.

Mayor Beagley said Pardon.

Brandon asked whether anybody had taken any pictures of them in the park?

Mayor Beagley said no, and that's one problem.

Brandon said you do.

Kjerstin said we have some I sent them to somebody.

LuAnn said well, there are pictures on this right here.

Mayor Beagley said that's on their property.

LuAnn said Oh, yeah. But still, I never thought about taking all the pictures last summer. I was just stinking mad having to go over there and babysit them.

Mayor Beagley said, and that's another thing too. We're going to have to start recording things, every incident, with pictures and a statement, in order to have a track of what's going on. So if we have to do something, we have been on record. But think about what you guys want to do, and we'll bring it back on the board next month. How's that

LuAnn said Okay.

Brandon said can we get together and just have a discussion

Mayor Beagley said that's a possibility. Yes, we'll have to wait until Trish gets, you know, she's got to have time to mourn, and she's lost her mom, and, you know, that's hard, and so give her a little bit of time to, you know, and take care of her

problems. I don't know because I can't imagine what she's gonna say anyway, but still, so you want to wait until next month, or you want to have a meeting? Brandon said I think we ought to get together at least to discuss some of this stuff, and then figure out if we're gonna.

LuAnn said that on the agenda for next month, so we can vote on it.

Brandon said, and actually make a motion.

LuAnn said, but we'll have to vote.

Brandon said I mean, we don't necessarily have to change this one just yet, but we still need to discuss the other and assess some fines. Do it if we, you know, stuff like that. We've got to draw the line somewhere.

Mayor Beagley said exactly.

LuAnn asked what do the attorneys work on, ordinances

Tammie said with the new one, I'm not sure.

Mayor Beagley said I read his contract on the last attorney we had. You had so many, I can't remember what it is that you're allowed to go talk to him about something without having to pay this new lawyer, who doesn't have that in his contract. You've got to start paying it as soon as you start seeing him.

LuAnn said Yeah, that's why we did it, and nobody can just go down and do it. We need to have it approved by the whole council. Before anybody goes and talks to the attorney about anything, Tammie and Stacey have to say it's okay.

Tammie said to change the ordinances and stuff. You'll have to have a public hearing.

Mayor Beagley said Yes,

Tammie said you can't just pass.

Brandon said Yes, we've got to start somewhere.

Tammie said Yeah.

Mayor Beagley said I think within this next year, look into some different lawyers and get one closer to town, instead of going all the way to Salt Lake. So that's something I'll do in the next year, and I have it already by the time of the new contract for this one. See, you should become mayor. Any more comments on that? This okay? I. Okay, I've had a lot of people in town wondering about the yearly cleanup they used to have in town, and I want to know if it's possible that we could start doing that again. It would have to be run differently than it has in the past, because you just can't put everything in those dumpsters anymore.

LuAnn said the town clean up, as in, we would just go and pick up trash and stuff that was lying on the side of

the road.

Mayor Beagley said No, they used to have the landfill open, if I remember, and out there and put it.

LuAnn said yeah, you can't put a lot down there now.

Mayor Beagley said that metal, green waste, and household stuff, basically, is all you can put there

Greenway.

LuAnn said Green waste is all I thought you could do.

Mayor Beagley said We can't put any household stuff out there. Why don't we have a dumpster out there? Then, because the green waste goes into a pit.

LuAnn said wait can we put it in the dumpster?

Mike said Yeah, the green waste and the steel were just piled down there. The steel has taken some time. The green waste is burned.

LuAnn said What Trish put on the sign, if she included steel or no steel, because we had a hard time, I don't think she put steel on there. I don't think it's, I don't think that that's

Brandon said it costs us more to have them haul it off than we get for the steel.

So,

LuAnn said yeah, I don't think

Mayor Beagley said there's no steel on her sign.

LuAnn said Yeah, okay.

Mayor Beagley said so it's scrap metal, nothing like that,

LuAnn said just household and green waste.

Mayor Beagley said Now there are stipulations on that green waste we need to, and I've got a copy of it at home, what the county considers green waste, two by fours, plywood, and all. That's not green waste.

LuAnn said No, it's trees.

Mayor Beagley said I'll bring that next Monday, the copy I got from the county.

LuAnn said no construction materials.

Brandon asked Isn't the dump open on Saturdays now?

LuAnn said I don't know when she opens.

Brandon asked want to make a cleanup thing.

Mayor Beagley said A lot of people liked it, but back then, it was different. You're a lot more in the dumpster than you are now.

Mike said we can send it out with the water bill, saying, This is what you can put in and give them a date when they can do it.

Brandon said, and if Trish can't make it, I'll look at it, and if they can put it in the dumpster, I can send people away.

Mayor Beagley said I went around this last winter, actually, Colleen and I gathering up scrap metal in people's yards. I hauled three trailer loads out of here myself and took this scrap metal

Mike said Well, and that's the thing that may cost us a little bit to have to haul that stuff off, but at the same time, if they're just throwing it in the gully or sitting in their backyard, it's an eyesore.

Mayor Beagley said Yes.

Mike said we're better off letting them throw it down there and costing the town a little bit to do it. Or maybe we need to charge them a little bit. Put it there.

LuAnn said Charge them a lot.

Mayor Beagley said Wow.

LuAnn said they're gonna get charged a lot

Mayor Beagley said, " If you've got any scrap metal, I'll take my trailer around, you know, if people let me know they've got it, and I'll hold the scrap metal the Logan like I've been doing, and it won't be any cost to anybody. But then people can clean their front yards and back yards.

Debbie Garbanati said Some people are lazy enough.

Mayor Beagley said Pardon,

Debbie Garbanati said you need a gas charge or something. You can't do all that for free.

Mayor Beagley said well, isn't it my business how it's been my own money? And I understand. I appreciate what you're saying. I really do, but I figured something I could give back to the town, because the town has given me a lot.

Debbie Garbanti said I appreciate it a lot.

Mayor Beagley said Okay, we'll settle it. We'll take care of the problem. How's that?

Mike said so, on cleanup day, do we want to schedule one?

Mayor Beagley said If we don't have time

LuAnn said we need to talk to Trisha to make sure which day she can do it, because she is over the dump.

Mayor Beagley said yeah, and if we don't want to start it this summer, we can start it next summer.

LuAnn said Yeah, we have all summer. We have lots of time through the summer. We can schedule it for this year.

Brandon said Well, let's talk with Trisha and see what she thinks.

LuAnn said Stacey, can you put it out in one of the water bills or something.
Mayor Beagley asked Any more comments on that? Okay, this \$500 approval thing, I just want to remind the people that this pertains to that under \$500, you don't have to get approval; over \$500 has to be approved by the council.

LuAnn said for what.

Mayor Beagley said when you buy something.

LuAnn said oh,

Mike said for many of the agencies,

Mayor Beagley said yeah,

Mike said that is what has been set up. I know it's a \$500 limit,

So.

Mayor Beagley said Okay,

Brandon said I think we ought to check with the council anyway before

We.

Mayor Beagley said Pardon?

Brandon said I think we should check with the council before, anyway, before we buy anything.

LuAnn said Yeah, Scott always would, if he had, like, when he bought the lawn mower, or when he'd buy something for the town,

Mayor Beagley said oh, that's over \$500

LuAnn said he would check with all of us to make sure.

Mayor Beagley said yeah, but under \$500 has been the policy. You didn't have to check, and you don't need approval.

LuAnn said, but everybody should know.

Mayor Beagley said Oh, okay, that's good. There's nothing wrong with that.

Brandon said It's like when we did the aeroating, just courtesy,

LuAnn said yeah, yeah, because I didn't want to say yes, without everybody on the council saying yeah, let's say right, the cemetery. Mayor Beagley said Well, I think it was a good idea.

LuAnn said I did too.

Mayor Beagley said I had them do the park.

LuAnn said Yeah, that's what he said.

Mayor Beagley said Okay, keys for the council. I've already started handing them out, so you'll have keys to the building here. Okay, garbage cans, those garbage cans that I took over to my house. 20 of them are unusable. 10 of them are only good. Now, the garbage can be placed in Brigham City; they'll take old garbage cans. You have to take them, and they'll take them from you.

LuAnn said IDAWY will not. They don't take back the broken ones.

Mayor Beagley said Well, if they supply the garbage cans, they will, but these are the ones we own here.

LuAnn said Oh, I thought, IDAWY did.

Mayor Beagley said, and so all I need to do is hose them out, and I could take them in there, and they'll take them first, we don't have to worry about them.

Then they recycle them and stuff like that. And I checked in prices on new garbage cans. The place where we bought these garbage cans, right here, in Brigham City, the price just went up. It was \$139 \$133.39 each. And you had to have a minimum of 25 if you buy it from them, and it takes six to eight weeks to get it. They just raised the price to \$144 each.

LuAnn asked for one garbage can.

Mayor Beagley said Yes, I now IDAWY am the one we go through here. I haven't finished talking to him. I talked to one lady today, and she thinks their garbage cans are \$84 a piece. But I'm gonna call the other guy, who is supposed to give me a call, this general manager, I'm gonna see what the cost is. Did they supply the garbage cans? If it's going to be what additional costs, it'll be on our garbage bill or something, or if not, and see what they do there. They might supply the garbage cans, and it won't cost us anything extra.

LuAnn said I can't imagine.

Mayor Beagley said I know it's worth a try. You think so? Okay, we'll go versus, and we'll figure out what it's going to be cheaper then. And okay, that's all there is on garbage cans. Easter egg. Update, it's probably you no update. Oh, that's right.

LuAnn said everything was great. Thanks to everybody's help. Thanks to Tricia for getting everything organized, and we just had to be there. So 47 kids, well, we have a little discrepancy. We have we had a count of 37,35, 42,45 and we settled on 47.

Mayor Beagley said 100.

Brandon said there were people counting.

LuAnn said yeah. We were all counting. We were, yeah. But anyway, it was good. It was really good. It turned out great. So I think the kids have fun. And Carson, he was in charge.

Mayor Beagley said Yes,

we were we were all of his. Yeah. Brandon was the announcer. Carson was the doer. I was the helper. Jim was a helper.

Mayor Beagley said I thought it was pretty good

LuAnn said cold, but Good.

Mayor Beagley asked Anything else on that? Okay? The sheriff's not here tonight.

LuAnn asked Stacey if he had emailed her anything.

Stacey said Tell you the truth, I didn't look.

Mayor Beagley said Eric, that's the engineer, right? He's not here with the fire department.

Jed said Just a couple of things on your agenda. The first one is the ribbon-cutting ceremony for the new truck that we've been awarded by the BLM. It's going to be on April 28 in Salt Lake at the BLM district office. If anybody would like to attend, let me know, and I can get you the invite. They'll have us down there and turn us over the keys and turn us loose, and then it will come mostly stocked. There are a few things we're gonna have to get put on it. I can get with Tammie and Stacey. If we need to order anything, we should have most everything in the department. And then the only other thing is that the residential burning window in the county is open now until May 31

LuAnn asked whether we can burn anything in a barrel?

Jed said not supposed to.

LuAnn asked We dig a hole in the burn and a hole,

Jed said no boxes, no garbage, no tires, no plastic, no rubber.

LuAnn asked about old bank statements.

Jed said If it's not from a tree, from a plant, grass, that sort of stuff. It's not.

LuAnn said oh, so that's from a tree. Old bank statements are from trees, right?

Jed said That's where we get in. We get a lot of calls from people burning stuff they're not supposed to. But it's like, pick your battles. LuAnn said, " Who's gonna know

Jed said I am? Because I will get a phone call from a neighbor.

LuAnn said Okay, I'm telling you right now I'm burning some old things in a barrel that is going to be paper made from trees.

Jed said I know that way if the fire gets away,

Mike asked whether we need a permit to do that.

LuAnn said Oh, yeah. Do we need a permit?

Jed said to burn green during the open burn window? Like, yeah, branches or whatever. There is a permit that you can get through the county. There's no burning on Sundays, and the fire has to be out by dark.

Mike asked, and that's open till the 31st of May.

Jed said, " Yep, unless we go under restrictions. So there is some counties in eastern Utah and southern Utah that are already under stage one and two restrictions, which means no open flame whatsoever. And so we're just kind of waiting to see what the State wants to do on burning restrictions. But as of right now, it's open through March 30 or through May 31, and it's different for agriculture burning. So, agriculture burning is allowed pretty much any day of the year that the clearing index is over 500, and that's just for properties five acres or larger, burning stubble, burning fence lines, burning ditches, that sort of stuff. Carson said don't burn the fence line.

LuAnn said Okay.

Jed asked any questions about the fire department?

Mayor Beagley said I'm glad you brought that up about tires and stuff. I know the landfill in Tremonton will take up the five tires for free. Anything over that starts charging. I was going to call them and ask if they would give us some type of break. Being a town, I doubt it, but if they would, along with the dump out here, our dump, there's about 60 tires along the fence line right now, people have dumped over there, and if they'll give us a break, load it up on a trailer and take it to the landfill there, try to clean it up some

Jed said I know we need to burn the green waste facility down there, too. So I will get with Trish and make a plan there.

Mayor Beagley said Okay.

Jed said we have the availability to get it all burned and torched out.

LuAnn asked where you were gonna take the tire again?

Mayor Beagley said Tremonton and they take up the five free.

LuAnn asked if we all put five in our pickup, that would work.

Mayor Beagley said I was just gonna, if they'll give us a break, you know, they'll take more. Since we're a town, I was just gonna get my dump trailer and load up as many as I can and take it in. I hope so. Jed asked any questions from the council,

LuAnn said, " No, nothing for me.

Jed said Thank you all.

Mayor Beagley said You're doing great.

Jed said We're surviving.

Mayor Beagley said Okay, Snowville EMS,

Dave said so I had the list for you that you asked for last month.

Mayor Beagley said Oh, great.

Dave said I didn't print it off. I'll email it to the Snowville town. email, Mayor Beagley said okay.

Dave said so you'll have that. I do have a question, and it was brought up to me. Ilesha is doing the ordering for our supplies. Jeanette used to do that, but we've got Ilesha doing that and the \$500 approval. How does that work with our supply ordering? Because I think sometimes we'll end up with an order that's over \$500 that she would put in times when we're needing to meet those supplies.

LuAnn asked Is it on the credit card for the city,

Dave said no, it comes as a bill, doesn't it? Stacey,

Stacey said sometimes it's like \$12,000 or \$1,200.

LuAnn asked, so that doesn't apply, right?

Stacey said We haven't. I mean, we haven't really.

Dave said the thing that's hard is to get approval before you're ordering supplies, because most of the time, you know, we're trying to keep the smallest amount on hand because a lot of the supplies expire. So we want to, you know, make a huge order that keeps a ton on hand that expire and but be able to order them as we need them. So that's what makes it hard, if we have to do that on approval with that.

Mayor Beagley asked, " Okay, is that \$500 a month? Is that how it goes? Or a year

Mike said per order?

Dave said You just do three small orders.

Mayor Beagley said There you go. I mean, that's something that the town needs, right?

LuAnn said It's whatever the ambulance needs. I don't think there's a problem with what you guys order.

Dave said Well, yeah, Ilesha asked me that I just wanted to bring it up, make sure we were all on the same page, because my understanding was always that the supplies were something that was approved, that we were maintaining the supplies.

LuAnn said We never had to have approval for that. Yeah, you're good, Dave, just do what you got to do.

Dave said And I've got Ilesha sourcing a few other places that we haven't bought supplies from before, just trying to see if we can get some different prices and different quantities that might help us try to keep less waste happening with their supplies.

LuAnn said And we're supplying two ambulances now too. So that's a little, probably a little bit more money, too.

Dave said yeah. I mean, the biggest thing that we challenge, that we face, is just expiration. You know, you try to keep the minimum amount, because once they expire, you just throw them away, and that's all. We can't recoup any cost on so Mayor Beagley said it makes sense.

Dave said, and then we've got our per capita grant. Stacey, it's \$22,720, and we would need receipts for anything after July 1, 2025, up until June 15 of this year. Stacey asked when it needs to be done.

Dave said June 15 the last day. I'm sure they want it by the end of June, but we can send it in anytime. So anytime now we can just send that in and get the reimbursement there.

Stacey said I will work on that.

Dave said and then, do you need anything from me? I know we had some checks that Stacey was working on. We got that, okay.

Stacey said yes, they are taken care of.

Dave said, and that was my call that had been forgotten about for some time, but just taking care of the EMTs that sat at the motorcycle race last year.

Stacey said They just got checks today.

LuAnn said just a year late.

Dave said yeah. So that's all that I have, unless you have any questions for me.

Mayor Beagley said, " Okay, Snowville clerk, the budget, town budget, so Tammie, just grab over for another meeting. So, can you put her down on the bottom again?

Mayor Beagley said Draw this line way down here, the treasure, and about the dog licensing.

Stacey said Thank you to Carson and Jed they had everything cleaned out for us. That was really nice for the fire shed and stuff we had, I'm not really sure.

Well, we have people come and get their dog licensed and stuff, and their shots.

LuAnn said so, and the ones that were on your list.

Stacey said yeah, so I don't know what you guys want to do with the ones that were on the list that were not taken care of these. Jim and I did look at a letter that was in the computer, which was from previous councils. I don't know if you want that sent out to them, and given the time when I tell them they have to have them done at such and such time, but

there you go. You don't have any ordinances to push it again. So you know what I'm saying?

LuAnn said Yeah, that's the worst thing is we don't have any consequences for why do we have ordinances if there are no consequences right for anybody.

Stacey said so, I don't know.

Mayor Beagley said we can send a letter out just to remind them, maybe they had something that day, or something like that.

LuAnn said Your dog licensing is due. We'll give you till this day. Please come in and pay for your dog license.

Stacey said, " Okay, so Elizabeth came to me at the store today, and she brought this flyer. It's to remember how last month, she talked about a flyer and how they were going to have a big meeting at Raft River High School. So it's Raft River High School on April 15, at six o'clock. So I posted one at the post office. There's one here, and I'm going to scan you in if you can put that on the website for me. Guys, thank you. So she said to tell everybody about it, may have hopefully you guys can come out and, you know, be there. She just said that they want everybody's impact. So

Mayor Beagley asked what is Raft River is on the mine?

Stacey said no, the meeting is in Raft River is out in Malta.

Mayor Beagley said in Malta.

Stacey said So it looks like next Wednesday is what I'm thinking about the 15th.

Brandon said Yeah.

Stacey said Anyway, so and they have a place you can scan.

Mayor Beagley said okay, thank you, AJ, he's not here.

Carson said he is from South Dakota

Mayor Beagley, Oh, that's right. He told me he was going, that's right,

Carson Morgan, 4th of July.

Carson said The one thing I wanted to touch on was I talked to, if I didn't talk to you guys about it, I'm trying to get the military to come to a flyover. That's my biggest task. I'm working with him and Laurie Munns. We're trying to request Bud, he flies an A-10, trying to

get Bud to come do it for him and a couple of his buddies. Whether it happens or not, I don't know. I got a with someone. I don't know who it was, but they said, with the war going on. They don't know if they can break anyone free. They said the budget is pretty tight.

Mayor Beagley said Yeah,

Carson said if that doesn't work, well, if it does, I'm gonna work on it. Let's sign a paper and approve it, and then we'll have to have an ambulance fully staffed in

the corner and a fire truck. That's this, what they say has to be here, which I don't think it'll be a problem. Will it? If we can't get something done with them, which I'm guessing probably won't happen, we're gonna call it Life light, or one of the helicopter services come and land over here.

Mayor Beagley said Cool.

LuAnn said That would be good.

Carson said We'll park the engine supplier truck out there, and everyone can walk around it and look out.

LuAnn said Yeah.

Carson said so then that, we don't really have any planned yet, but it's in the process, so I do know we're gonna do it a run this year. That's a big one that everyone's asking me, that's the day before the morning that

LuAnn asked is it the same trail we did last the last one we did? Oh yeah. I'll tell you. I'll tell you about that when I'm up.

Carson said Yeah.

Mayor Beagley asked I've been getting a number of emails on this 250-year thing celebration. Is that something we want to incorporate in our Fourth of July thing?

LuAnn said he already is,

Mayor Beagley said Oh, you already are

Carson said say, what?

LuAnn said the 250th because,

Carson said yeah,

LuAnn said that's the big deal this year.

Mayor Beagley said Oh, okay.

Maddi Morgan said the Curlew Primary. Well, it's gonna decorate for it, so I'm in charge of that. We'll point to 250 or something.

Mayor Beagley said Great.

Carson said Yeah, we haven't come up with a theme yet.

Mayor Beagley said Okay, do that.

Carson said We're gonna try to get a few extra donations, so a few more fireworks.

Cody said how about Red, White, and Blue, 4th of July.

Carson said, but yeah, we'll do the breakfast, whether that's kind of see normally the Fire and EMS be the breakfast.

LuAnn said Oh, okay,

Carson said that's up to them, whether they want to do a free breakfast, or if they want to charge, or if they're gonna get donations. That's Trudy's, Jed's, and Dave's deal.

LuAnn said I think if you don't get donations, I don't see anything wrong with charging, because years ago, for the Fourth of July dinner, we used to charge, and it wasn't a lot, but it paid for the food.

Carson said I just hate charging people. I feel like I don't know. Know, if you have to, I just don't like it.

Maddi Morgan said His heart is big.

Carson said It's just Snowville. Always had a reputation, anytime, you know.

LuAnn said I just have no problem with that. Give me five bucks.

Mayor Beagley asked LuAnn are you gonna be standing there.

LuAnn said yeah.

Carson said Trudy said that they may be able to put a boot pocket or a boot donations, yeah, I've had a lot of people come to me after and put money in my pocket that I give. You know, a lot of people go on to donate.

Brandon said support your local firefighters.

Jed said all four of us.

Brandon said, and EMS.

Carson said Hope you have good insurance. Stay paid up.

Mayor Begley said Well, thank you. And your committee, you're doing all this work, because it's a lot of work, I know.

Carson said, and we'll take any help we can get from the council.

Mayor Beagley said So okay, great.

Carson asked, and then I don't know, this wasn't on the agenda, but as part of the fourth, are we going to fix that power line?

LuAnn said Well, yeah, we don't. Then nothing gets heated. So it quit a million times the last two years, and we just keep saying we're gonna fix it.

Carson said and the hot water heater.

Mayor Beagley asked Is that hot water heater bad?

LuAnn said we just need a new one.

Mayor Beagley said okay, that element inside there probably needs to be replaced. We had to replace it before that, for that hard water deposit.

LuAnn said we just need a new water heater. It's like freaking what? 25 years old, 30 years old.

Jed said pretty ancient and rusted out.

LuAnn said it's a mess.

Mayor Beagley said is it?

LuAnn said Yes.

Mayor Beagley said okay.

LuAnn asked there not that expensive, right, for \$500 bucks. You can buy a really nice one,

Mayor Beagley said you only need a small one.

Carson asked, but as far as the power line goes,

LuAnn said Yeah, we had bids.

Carson asked Are they years ago?

LuAnn said Yeah, that was two years. Oh, is your husband an electrician too?

Oh, so are my boys?

Mayor Beagley said Have them come and talk to us? I'm sure we're gonna have to bid on that, right?

Carson said, and honestly.

LuAnn said we had some before, too. It was like six grand. Wasn't right? Am I wrong?

Carson said As long as the town buys the supplies, and I mean, pays exactly over this, I'll donate my time. You know, people in the valley will probably donate stuff. We can just Hurry get it put in a trencher. I don't know what Trencher would cost. The wire is gonna be the most expensive part. But as long as they have a certified electrician, he can wire it in on both sides.

LuAnn said Yeah, because we were out without power. I mean, we had a heck of a time.

Carson said I mean, it's gonna be quite deep.

Brandon said When I was talking to Zach, he had, I mean, he used to have an electric company, but he has an account that Will Supply, so probably cheaper than just going to Home Depot.

Mayor Beagley said yeah, that amount of waiting, it's going to be a big wire, yeah.

Mike said we will have to have a new panel.

LuAnn said we need to start on it sooner rather than later. We need to ask Tammie about the budget, too, and see if there's where we are

Carson said So we don't have to worry about the band. They are going to rent the sound system and, you know, do some stuff that way.

Mayor Beagley said Okay, wait. Any more comments?

Brandon said we're gonna continue to rent it out, safe.

Mayor Beagley said Pardon.

Brandon said if we're gonna keep renting it out, letting people use it and stuff like that, we should have

LuAnn said it works.

Brandon said, and safe, and so work so they're getting what they're renting.

Stacey said Last year, I didn't come down and show them how to turn it on and actually Brent meet me? Remember?

LuAnn said Yeah,

Shiyann said yeah. I think Zach went down there, too.

LuAnn said yeah. It's just ancient. Just needs to be replaced. We just need to spend the money to do it.

Mayor Begley said When they originally ran that cable in there, they should have fixed that thing, then put it done right?

Carson said, and I don't remember. I do think that the other problem is that there's not, maybe there's not a big enough wire coming from the power pole now.

Mayor Beagley said it was from that back that building down here, up the wires, not big enough, and that's quite a distance there. So it's going to be expensive power.

Carson said So when you put in the box there, the Rocky Mountain Power shouldn't; the electrician should be able to disc disconnect that.

Carson said Yeah. Connect.

Brandon said yeah, just the box

LuAnn said because that's what they had to do when Trevor came and replaced all of our wiring in our house. The power company had to come disconnect the power, and then he could do all the stuff. Then they have to come back, reconnect it.

Brandon said Okay, so let's make a plan. What do we want to get done first? Do we want to do we want to talk to Zach so have him come and look at him. Put us a little bit. Is that something? I know you're he's not here.

Shyiann said, but I hate volunteer him. Yeah, I'm sure he'd love to come and then having get a hold of me, and I'll come down, and I'll get a hold of Jim, will come down with what we need, and then he'll put a bit together.

Mayor Beagley said That's a starting point that it put us in the right direction by doing that. Okay? Brandon Garbanati, I just said my piece.

Mayor Beagleys said Your piece. You're quick. Okay? LuAnn Johnson,

LuAnn said the only thing I have is just a small update on the bridge. So they're gonna pour the asphalt on the road on April 20. Is what they're shooting for. That's the last thing they have to do. They're doing it on the back hill now. They're going to put the rip rap in, I think tomorrow, and then they're going to turn the water loose down the middle. They've almost got that pounded down enough with what they've held a lot of dirt and rocks and stuff in the bottom. It's, and he thinks that. He thinks that it's never going to back up again, because the width of that is so much bigger than it was in the Creek. He said, " You shouldn't have any more trouble with backup. It should just flow. So fingers crossed. Yeah, he came and talked to me yesterday and told me everything that was going on. So anyway, it's just about done by the end of the month, they're hopefully, so they wanted to pour the asphalt on the 15th, but the batch plants don't open till the 20th, so they've already got the reservations for the stuff to do it on the 20th. So by the end of this month, we'll have our bridge. And it's beautiful. It's really It's, I mean, if a bridge can be beautiful. It's beautiful because, really, it's so, so pretty, how they poured it down the sides and stuff. It's really neat. And now they're filling it all in, and they're gonna make it all nice, so it'll be good.

Mayor Beagley asked Since you're over this, are you gonna have ribbon cutting or something?

LuAnn said no.

Brandon said she's gonna be the first fun to drive over it.

LuAnn said it is going to be good to be able to open a window without all the dust. It's really nice.

Mayor Beagley said Great. Any more on that? Okay? Mike Morgan,

Mike said no, I think we said all we're gonna say we need to say, with the planning and zoning, that's pretty much set up.

Okay, public comment. Anybody want to say something mosquito abatement?

Tim Heyder said they say the mosquito problems everybody's having right now.

They should die off here anytime. Right now. The mosquito should die off for a little while, right now, as far as your sewer system, when I was mayor, Eric just did a study. He got a grant for the town and did a study, and he's got, I think, it's on blueprints of the sewer system, evaporation ponds, and stuff for the town. So there is a recent study just done, so he'll have one as far as the water system, charging the impact fee, and stuff. Just when I went in as Mayor, AJ used to be the president of the water system, the old water system. He came to the town board and asked the town board to buy the water system. If you remember, there used to be a water system board, and they asked us to buy the water system

from the town board, which we did. We got a low-interest loan, which was practically nothing, but the loan was for almost a million dollars, and we got the interest from the state of Utah for almost nothing. But to get that low-interest loan, we could only charge the citizens of Snowville enough monthly. That's why you get your \$37 a month bill, and your hookup was 45 just before I went out of mail, we raised that to \$6,000 but you can only charge it up to operate on keep enough money to operate next year, or you'll lose that low interest loan if you charge too much money a year, like your impact fee you're talking about. So talk with Tammie. You make you need to make sure you're not charging too much money every year, or you'll lose that low-interest loan on that million dollars that you lose that low interest loan, money on that their interest on that loan could go sky high. So be real careful what you do right there. Make sure you talk with Tammie about what you do there, because they was very plain when we borrowed the town borrowed that million dollars and made it very plain you can only charge enough money to make your payment each year, and keep enough money to run on each year, and enough money to make sure you have enough money in the bank to pay next year's payment. And I think that loans for something like 30 years, it pays off that million dollars.

LuAnn asked what to do with the million dollars?

Tim Heyder said Pardon,

LuAnn asked what happened to the million dollars?

Tim Heyder said Is what put the system in that we're running on now, the tanks up on the hill put the system in. That wasn't the town that put it in. That was the old water board. They called it that did that, but the town assumed the role that the old water board used to have, because the water board wanted to dissolve. So they talked to the town and took over that loan. But that's what put the water system that's in the ground now, the tanks up on the hill. So the town got that loan for almost nothing.

Mayor Beagley asked You're talking about impact fees. Is that what you're saying it's like to put a subdivision in?

Tim Heyder said to put a lot more money in the bank and the water money that you collect now.

Mayor Beagley said okay, I see.

Tim Heyder said the money stays in a separate account by itself. We can't use that money for anything else but to pay off that loan and run the water account.

Cody asked, so kind of you to put the impact fees in a different account so it doesn't show.

Tim Heyder said it has to stay anything to do with the water. We signed papers. It has to stay with the water.

Mayor Beagley said We should have a copy of those papers somewhere, right
Tim Heyder said be real careful what you do. Right there involves Rual water too, when we did that, so I would check on that before you do anything.

Cody said Yeah.

Tim Heyder said be real careful what you do. I'm just warning you to check into that.

Mayor Beagley said Oh, that's some good information, because if it's gonna hurt us, we've got to try to go a different direction,

Tim Heyder said to check into it.

Carson said I would assume there's gotta be a way around it somehow. That's that's like tripping the town for 30 years.

Mayor Beagley said I don't know. I'm not a lawyer. I'm not an accountant.

LuAnn asked Stacey, " Do you know?

Stacey said I don't know, I only know when the payment is due.

Maddi Morgan said it's so Shiyann and me, and a lot of the young moms around the Valley have been talking about wanting to do upgrades to the park, and we're thinking for now, we should just start little and just do a swing set and put some rubber mulch in the existing Shyiann said yeah, existing one.

Maddi Morgan said to help upgrade it. We looked into it, and it's gonna be about \$4,000, and we were, we're willing to go get donations and everything for it.

LuAnn said There might be grants as well.

Maddi Morgan said Yeah, we thought about that too.

LuAnn said the swing sets are missed. The swing set, the big swing set that we used to have, that's really been missed.

Maddi Morgan said Yeah, people for, yeah, \$4,000, I mean, the valley, you know.

Kjerstin said I looked into a grant for that last month after we discussed it, and I didn't bring it up, because where I figured you were telling me the budget was pretty tight. You have to match it 50/50, so they'd have to, I guess, if they were going to get donations. But I just figured, if it wasn't a priority, like the first. Step mark or something like that. Or the 30.

Mayor Beagley asked Now, does that \$4,000 include the perimeter part to bury around it and all that too? Or just the swing sets.

LuAnn said No, just the swing set.

Maddi Morgan said just the swing sets, the mulch, and the tarp.

Mayor Beagley said Okay, so any perimeter around it we want, it'll cost more than

Kjerstin said the perimeter around it could definitely be replaced.

Mayor Beagley said Yeah.

Kjerstin said it's all very, very rough.

Mayor Beagley said is it?

Maddi Morgan said that what you're saying, like, what the swing starts in the middle and, like, make it one

Kjerstin said thing just, yeah, they wanted to do that then, I mean, I haven't been able to work on the sprinkler system.

LuAnn said that we should put the swings that were the sprinklers.

Kjerstin said Yeah, that's what I was gonna say. If you expanded it in there.

Expanded it in the area where there are no sprinklers, combined it where there's no sprinkler, or on the north.

Matt said top end.

Kjerstin said yeah. So it's like, well, like, where the benches are, there's no grass, right? So that whole area. Mean, if you, if you wanted to, like, enclose it all into it, it would look much better. Yes. I mean, obviously, the moms are going to sit there regardless. So, like, if you included that in the part that was filled with the foam or the rubber

LuAnn asked who would you ask for donations.

Maddi said you know that is Eddie's ballpark.

Kjerstin said there is a grant, but it's due. So you'd have to, like, put together a plan, get proposals, prices, like, and then I think it's due by March 31, so like, you'd have to wait till next year, but it's going to take time to do the proposals. But there is a grant I was looking more for, like, the landscaping side of things, like money to help invest in fixing the sprinklers and, like, landscaping the flower beds and stuff.

Maddi Morgan said yeah.

Kjerstin said, but I think that there was playground equipment included in that, but the town has 50%.

Maddi Morgan said Yeah. So really ask anybody.

Shyannd said Like, I don't, most of my family are business owners, and they can donate.

Maddi Morgan said in Malad, they just went door to door for their new playground and asked for donations, too, that way. And it was thinking maybe we could just

do like, set up a Venmo or something for it, and everyone Venmos money or the big, big businesses for us.

Brandon said Will you put together? Can you put together a little plan of what you're thinking, what you want, what it looks like, and some cost so we can look at it, and then we can kind of figure,

LuAnn said to do a little drawing of how you want it set up.

Kjerstin said There's another spot on the sidewalks, but there's a big section. If you go, you'll see where it's not grass growing there. It's it grows weeds on that side, the other side grows nothing but all those areas, like we could put the swing set on that side, and then, you know, make the area where the benches are.

Then that would save on the sprinklers, and then some of the sprinklers.

LuAnn asked Did you ever price the dog waste bags?

Kjerstin said Oh, it was like 200 something dollars on Amazon. I sent it to Scott a couple of times, but he must not have followed through with it. I can resend it to whoever.

Mayor Beagley said send it to us.

Kjerstin said Yeah, it's just like a metal box we can put up that will have to bag.

LuAnn said We just have to get the bags.

Kjerstin said yeah, so when we're doing the park maintenance, we'll make sure the bags are there so that hopefully more people. I think I feel like there are two different options. And if we get the cheaper option, and we have to mount it on something, it doesn't come with anything. But if we could put one at both ends, you know, because a lot of people, I think, would use the bags if they were.

LuAnn asked Have you noticed any garbage on the ground? Since we don't have any garbage cans there.

Kjerstin said I haven't been there either.

LuAnn said I haven't looked at it. So it wasn't

bad, though, for the Easter egg hunt there, I didn't notice any garbage anywhere.

Maddi Morgan said We were there today. Yeah. It was good.

Kjerstin said Yeah,

Mayor Beagley said the right decision.

Kjerstin said I definitely think having eight there only attracted more garbage. And it was like, I don't know why those people put, like, a little bit in every single one.

And it's like, so

LuAnn said you had to take them all out.

Kjerstin said Yeah. So it looks like we had a massive party, but really it's just people emptying their cars or whatever, with their sometimes it's like, household-like, garbage bags,

LuAnn said for sure. There are a lot of people around town

Kjerstin said that there were lots of dirty diapers and dog poop.

Turdy Smith said And as far as your better ground, just from the past, stuff that we've tried to do, I think the part is to look into what you can legally have there and what you can't, because we have to pull the swing set. We can't legally have a big slide and the swing sets, and you can't have a cement barrier. There are certain barriers you can have around it.

LuAnn said Oh, you can't have a swingset.

Trudy Smith said with a certain depth.

Maddi Morgan said Oh, Tammy said, That is something about the insurance. It might cause more to have swings or something, but she said that was a while ago, so anyone could, well, yeah, really nice if you get a commercial swing set. She said something about how the swings have to be so far apart so the kids can't hit each other.

Yeah, there's a whole bunch of legal stuff. Yeah, well, I just put one in, so it's nice, doable, and they're farther apart, you can tell.

LuAnn said to check on the insurance to see how.

Trudy Smith said the mulch underneath.

Brandon said I think everything there needs some tender loving care. That's pretty shot.

Kjerstin said I know, but Stone was just looking at them. They were looking at commercial sets, and they were about \$30,000

LuAnn said \$30,000 for a swing set.

Matt said for a playground.

Kjerstin said for a whole playground, like a new playground thing, like to replace the one that's there.

Shyanne said Malad just spent a million on there.

Mayor Beagley said I am glad you brought the sprinklers up. I did talk to Mrs. Webb, and she was going to tell her husband to get with me about that box again. Yeah, and he hasn't contacted me. I'll have to get try to get a hold of him myself once

Kjerstin said we can work on the system again, if we have time, it's just hard because, like, if we rip it up in May, it'll be really hard to get it looking good before

the 4th of July. So it just depends on when we're gonna, we know where the line is. We just have to dig it all the way back.

Mayor Beagley said I'll try to get a hold of him this way.

Kjerstin said We're gonna do something.

LuAnn said that the new guys that we're gonna have do the winterizing are from Tremonton, and they're super dependable. In fact, the Brandon sprinkler guy that was doing it that kind of put us off and off and off this year, he called up and asked if we have anybody, because he wanted to come out and do all the maintenance on this Park and a Cemetery. And we said, No, we've already got that covered. But the new guys that we hired. They do, they do find sprinkler lines

Matt said it might be worth it, because the other three valves are gonna go bad at some point.

LuAnn said Yeah, I could get a hold of Keenan Hamonto

Brandon said yeah, it's Keenan and his brother.

LuAnn said I can't remember his brother's name, but they do sprinklers, and they're the ones that are going to come winterize everything this year.

Cody said the Roses'

LuAnn said who

Cody said Jared Rose, they do really good J and J Lawn.

Mayor Beagley said I'll get with him this week

LuAnn said so we could get a few bids.

Cody said they do OSI, they do quite a bit of people out there, fertilizer, lawns, and stuff.

LuAnn said Is that? Is that the President? White, JJ, white?

Cody said No, Rose.

LuAnn said oh, Rose.

Cody J and J Long are their names, Jared and Justin or something, and his brother, they're really good.

Stacey said So I did ask Elizabeth out about giving you guys some money for that playground she set up to \$1,000, so yeah, but then they want a plan.

Maddi Morgan said Yeah.

Stacey said They want to know where it's all spent, because then she sends it to her boss, who's in Canada, and then they cut you guys a check. But yeah, she says she has to have a plan. And then she told me that the lady out in Malta also did a playground, she gave me some contact, so I'm gonna ask her.

Maddi Morgan said Yeah.

Stacey said, and she said that the lady found that actually helped put that playground out there? So I don't know. I'm looking into it. We'll have some answers.

Maddi Morgan said Yeah, something was written up, and a lot of everybody's willing to help. Yeah, together and whatever

Carson said it seems like a lot, but you can get that tomorrow.

Maddi Morgan said Oh, I thought it was super cheap.

Stacey said That's mine.

Brandon asked What about the Flying J?

Carson said Good luck.

LuAnn said we keep telling No, they can't expand.

Brandon said I wasn't gonna have that on record.

LuAnn said we will not charge you the \$40,000 dollar impact fee if you give us that money for the playground.

Stacey said that's not gonna happen for another year. Now they've set it back because they have to get permits for the sewer system. They're having problems with the State, so they've sent it back.

LuAnn said Okay, has anybody heard when they're going to replace this bridge out here?

Carson said they're not doing the bridge, Keith Oman said.

LuAnn said They're not doing the bridge, now.

Carson said that the bridge is not even on the schedule.

LuAnn said Oh, they told me it was on the schedule in one of the meetings, " and said that the bridge was going to be replaced this summer.

Carson said As far as he knows, he says there's nothing happening.

Mayor Bealey asked Okay, anybody else have any more comments?

Stacey said I don't know what Tammie had for your budget. I'm not sure. Just look it over. I'm not sure, maybe she's pulling it out.

LuAnn said I see the Cemetery, but I don't see the Park. What would the park be under Stacey?

Brandon said Park.

LuAnn said Yeah,

Brandon said right there, culture and recreation, Back Page.

LuAnn said What is it? Oh?

Brandon asked I mean, are we voting on

Stacey said we have to have a public hearing for this.

Brandon asked So, what do we look at and see whatever adjustments we want.

Stacey said Yes, where do you want to move stuff,
Brandon said just one.

LuAnn asked what

Brandon said I want to give the park some more money. I want them to start in April, because it can be mowed right now.

Matt said Most people are already mowing.

Stacey said yeah, it looks bad.

Brandon said that's our focal point. What everybody I mean, it should look nice. It should look good.

LuAnn said, You know what I want, okay, so the other side is not owned by the church. So I'm going to go talk to Bishop Page and ask him, you know, you know that bush that just grew up from the trees, the three things right there? Have you seen it? That big mess that needs to be like, dug up and pulled out. Yes, it looks terrible.

Kjerstin said Really, another thing that at some point should be in the budget, or we can figure out the tree stumps. There were 20-something, 23, I think I counted last year tree stumps in the park. I think we really could use, like, true stump removal and then plant some new trees or something, have them ground into the ground or something. But I think it would really benefit. The park is not very shady, and the trees are just getting older and older, and if we have to cut them down before they're a certain age, I just worry that eventually there will be nothing. There are a couple of new trees, but they're not in great shape, or is it just one? No, there are two. There's one by the playground, and then I went over LuAnn asked whether they are just stumps from other trees?

Kjerstin said I know, I'm not sure. They have a little thing around them, different, like variety, than the others. They're not like big, nice shade trees. They're the ones like, gonna take a lot of to grow, I think, unless it was planted recently. But the one by the playground is not a big shade tree, like, I think it's from what I remember. I don't think it's gonna get much bigger. It looks like it's mature, but short.

Mayor Beagley said well, that one behind a Bowery that they've cut off the top.

Kjerstin said yeah,

Mayor Beagley said I think that should be cut down.

Kjerstin said Yeah. Well, there are just stumps all over, but I don't know.

LuAnn said that then all the bark fell off and is all over.

Kjerstin said So anyway,

Brandon asked if there. Can we? I'm just asking, can we make a motion to at least grant them a couple of hours to come and please get a cup right now? LuAnn said No, not without Tammie. Tammie has to tell us the money has to come from somewhere.

Kjerstin said I was on the agenda last time to ask for that, and they what Tammie said was that because it wasn't in the budget from like last June, you know, like you could plan for it, for the future.

LuAnn said she has to find out where the money comes from to put in more into the parks, which is really

Matt asks, does the Cemetery, need more time, right?

LuAnn said it would be better not to have only have three weeks to do the Cemetery before Memorial Day.

Matt said Yeah?

Kjerstin said Like every year, it's kind of Yeah.

LuAnn said, but all the way through the summer, they don't need any more time than they have.

Matt said yeah, just in the spring.

Mayor Beagley said Okay, now we're reviewing the budget. Now, when does his action take place? New budget take effect?

Stacey said First of June, I think right July 1.

LuAnn said So we have to have the meeting in May to approve the budget, and then so I think

Kjerstin said you're wanting something done now, though, you would have to, like, move it from somebody somewhere else.

Brandon said so we can ask her.

Stacey said she's right here.

LuAnn said Well, you barely made it, woman.

Tammie said I'm sorry, are you talking about the budget?

Stacey said Yes. So they want to know if they can go ahead, Brandon.

Brandon said I would like to see if there's enough money to at least let them start getting the lawn mowed at the park. And I think if we got a lawn mower once.

Tammie said yeah.

Brandon said I mean, because it.

Tammie said I think there should be, yeah, that should be fine. I think I was thinking of thinking about that on the way down. It's probably going to take less time to do it now than if you wait till May 1st.

Brandon said exactly.

Kjerstin said We don't have a as it does, we don't bag it, so it's going

Tammie said it should be fine. And if it's not, we can pull money from another budget to balance it before, yeah,

Brandon said, " Well, and it also helps with mosquitoes,

Tammie said yeah.

Mayor Beagley said I'm sure glad you came back. Brandon said Me too.

LuAnn asked We have the money that we can use to replace the wiring at the Bowery. We need to really get that done before the 4th of July, if we can afford it,

Tammie said I don't even know.

Brandon said We'll have to meet. I'll meet with Zach. I'll get with the mayor.

Carson asked, " How many bids do you need?

Tammie said Well, you need to say three bids.

Mayor Beagley said Yeah,

LuAnn said two.

Tammie said Trying to get three.

LuAnn said If you can get three people to do it, I haven't been able to come out here and work. I get two. But a lot of I can't find three.

Tammie said Yeah, I guess, look at the bids. And if you can only get to get three, as long as you put forth the effort.

LuAnn said I called on the roads last year, and one of the guys wouldn't come out.

Mayor Beagley said we'll shoot for three. If we can't get three, we'll settle for two.

Carson said Brody and Zach.

Brandon said Well, Shiyann said she's gonna ask Zach, and I told her to get a hold of me, and I'll get whoever wants to come, I'll let everybody know, and we can go down.

Carson said And Brody's already seen it, so he knows.

LuAnn said and another thing that the planning zoning committee wanted to know is about the water system loan and what, what we can charge as an impact fee, because we have to only charge, we can only charge people so much, or we lose that good loan.

Tammie said, " Yeah, that's something that I think the Rural water guy, Dennis, will be able to help us with and be able to look at that.

Carson said Yeah, the money too.

Mayor Beagley said Okay,

Tammie said there are certain criteria.

Mayor Beagley said let's talk to him then.

Tammie said Yeah.

Carson said if he can't make it, he's gonna send one of his coworkers.

Tammie said I'm not gonna ask.

LuAnn said Yeah, because we don't want to mess that up.

Mayor Beagley said Yeah.

Tammie said then have to pick and ask USDA, I can do that.

Cody asked it's been about what 20 years since we put that water line in. I would just have been married.

LuAnn asked Do you remember the years on the loan?

Tammie said Yeah, I know we, Tim, and I were the ones that went and signed for all we borrowed.

Tim said we borrowed it

Tammie said when the town could go over, right? So even though that was in 2013, the loan was already before that, right?

Tim Heyder said Yes.

Cody said okay was that 2006. 2007, or 2008, right?

Tammie said the town took it over in 2013

Cody asked, but does this term start over?

LuAnn said Yeah, that's what oh, it did start over.

Tammie said Yeah, because we, it was the private water company. LuAnn said yeah.

Tammie said with Snowville Town, I think, I mean, that's something we will have to look at.

Tim Heyder said we borrowed the money to pay off that. We borrowed it at no interest.

Tammie said I don't remember 100%, but that sounds right.

Tim Heyder said We can only charge so much money a month, remember.

Tammie said I don't

Tim Heyder said we had to have enough to run on for plus a year.

Tammie said Yeah, you can't make money on

Tim Heyder said you can't want money on it. You can't hold much.

Carson said I don't know about impact.

Tammie said that the money from the impact that'll be something we'll need to look into.

Tim Heyder said You'll have to ask

Tammie said I'll ask USDA, because.

LuAnn said I don't know why you could make money, as long as you weren't overly.

Tammie said is help maintain the system, right?

LuAnn said You've got to buy new later.

Brandon said you would think that it would grow, because it would go, up.

LuAnn said, " Yeah, because you've got to have enough money in there to fix and repair and clean them, you know, clean the tanks and that kind of stuff.

Cody said Because, like, that last meter you guys just did. You bored your road. You lost money. Like, that's stupid, to lose money.

LuAnn said Yeah, it was.

Tammie said Anyway. I will look into that for sure, on the impact fees on the loans, and just make sure what those rules are.

Mayor Begley said I would appreciate that.

Tammie said So there's \$1000 goes until what? Because we were hoping we wouldn't be here, but we still are here.

LuAnn asked, and it's through the government. That's pretty cool, though.

Tammie said it was cool.

Mayor Beagley said Anybody else have any more comments?

Tammie asked Did you guys look at this? I'm sorry.

LuAnn said yes.

Tammie said it's just the 2024-2025, like so, this is just what's proposed for 2026-2027. If you guys want to look at it and you want to make changes to any of those, one side is the revenue, the other side is the expenses.

Mayor Beagley said Okay.

Tammie said that we need to have a budget hearing next week or next month, and then we can pass it. So if you like, want more money in the park budget, we'll have to steal it from somewhere else. You have to, you know,

LuAnn asked just one question: Where do we get the money for the class C Road Fund allotment?

Tammie said where Box Elder County? It's not a county, the state of Utah. It's through the money off of the taxes from the gasoline when you pay.

LuAnn said okay, so the so the guys that came and did the work last year, he called me and said they that we still need to put that seal hold on it, or that spray that comes on it, and I, he said, I'll have to come out and, do you know, just give you another bid, and where they did the work. Can he just do it without me

getting another bid from somebody else? Because there's only two people that will come out and get on the roads, because the county doesn't do that anymore. And he said, but they couldn't spray it because it's too early, so they have to spray it now in the spring, and he wanted to do it by the church and up on 800, where they laid the new asphalt. And then do we have the money to finish the asphalt on 800, or should I just let it go for this year?

Tammie asked By May 30th or by June 30th?

LuAnn said No, no, we've been coming.

Tammie said Yes, you can use it the next six months. Yeah, you there's the money.

LuAnn said okay, so we can decide on one

Tammie said that in July, our budget starts over again there.

LuAnn said because we spent a lot last year, a lot, a lot. Actually, in the last two years, we've done a lot of repairs on the roads.

Tammie said yeah.

LuAnn said and then they'll relay the asphalt up here, and hopefully, because they're those tractors up and down the road. So I mentioned to him yesterday, when he came over to my house, I said, so you're up and down with your big tractors and with the crawlers, you know that just shake my house, and it's damaged a little bit of the road, so I'm gonna make them repair that. I'll go out and go over it.

Tammie said yeah.

LuAnn said and if it looks like it's damaged, I'm going to make them fix what it I'll be on the bridge, because it's on both sides that they run their big machines and stuff. So but it looks covered with dirt and stuff right now too. So I can't really tell, but he said he put everything back better than it was, is what he told me yesterday.

Mayor Beagley said So okay, we've covered a lot of stuff tonight, so that's why it's taking a little bit longer. So I'm sorry, but it's something that needs to be done. I see most people left that's okay, okay, we done that. Okay? We have a motion except the expenses.

Mike said I make an motion to accept the expense including Rocky Mountain Power.

Mayor Beagley said, " Okay, second it

LuAnn said second.

Mayor Beagley said All in favor.

Mike, LuAnn, and Brandon said Aye.

Mayor Beagley said Any opposed, okay, I guess move make a motion to adjourn.

LuAnn said I make a motion to adjourn.

Mayor Beagley said said Second, it

Brandon said second.

Mayor Beagley said all in favor.

Mike, LuAnn, and Brandon said Aye.

Mayor Beagley said any opposed. Thank you, everybody, even the patient,ones that stayed.
