SUBJECT: Consider Ordinance No. 2026-O-14 Amending the Midvale City Municipal Fee Schedule and Utility Rates for the 2026 Fiscal Year

SUBMITTED BY: Mariah Hill, Administrative Services Director

FEE SCHEDULE SUMMARY:

During the budget process and periodically throughout the fiscal year, staff reviews and updates the municipal fee schedule to ensure the City is collecting appropriate fees that reflect the actual cost of services provided.

This fee schedule amendment includes changes to the City's previously adopted drought rates. These changes can be found on page seven of the attached fee schedule. The drought fees will continue to be based on the Jordan Valley Water Conservation District's Water Supply Availability Level Designation; the City is currently at a Level 2 designation. The revised structure removes the charge for all Tier 1 water usage and adds additional clarification regarding effective dates. The City operates two utility billing cycles:

- Cycle 1: Billed on the 15th of each month
- Cycle 2: Billed on the last day of each month

To ensure equitable application across both cycles, the drought fees will be effective:

- Cycle 1: May 15 through October 15
- Cycle 2: May 1 through September 30

Residents will first see these charges on their June utility bill.

A public hearing on these proposed changes will be held on May 19, 2026. Upon approval, the amended FY2026 Fee Schedule will be posted on the Midvale City website.

PLAN COMPLIANCE: N/A

FISCAL IMPACT

The fee schedule is structured to reflect the actual cost of providing services to Midvale City residents, businesses, and other users. Fees are set at levels sufficient to generate the revenue necessary to support the City's Enterprise Funds and to recover certain costs incurred by the General Fund for Fiscal Year 2026. Selected fee adjustments, however, are specifically designed to encourage water conservation; if effective, reduced usage is anticipated to offset higher rates, resulting in no net change to overall City revenue.

**AN ORDINANCE AMENDING THE MIDVALE CITY MUNICIPAL FEE
SCHEDULE AND UTILITY RATES FOR THE 2026 FISCAL YEAR**

WHEREAS, the Midvale City Council desires to be proactive in providing information for the public that is easily accessible; and

WHEREAS, all fees charged for services have been clearly identified in one fee schedule to be adopted annually and placed on the City’s website; and

WHEREAS, the fees listed in the Midvale City Municipal Fee Schedule for FY 2026 reflect actual costs to the City for said services; and

WHEREAS, the City may establish utility rates and fees designed in part to promote water conservation and the efficient use of limited water resources; and

WHEREAS, the City Council desires to align said fees with current costs considerations and provide better service and access for the public,

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF MIDVALE CITY, UTAH:

Section 1. The City Council hereby amends the Midvale City Municipal Fee Schedule for FY 2026 as indicated by Exhibit “A.”

Section 2. This ordinance is effective as of May 1, 2026.

Mayor Dustin Gettel called the business meeting to order at 6:35 p.m.

I. GENERAL BUSINESS

A. **Welcome and Pledge of Allegiance**

B. **Roll Call** - Council Members Denece Mikolash, Bryant Brown, Bonnie Billings, and Paul Glover were present at roll call. Council Member Heidi Robinson was excused.

C. **Unified Police Department Report – [Chief April Morse]**

Chief Morse said the month of April was busy. They responded on 2122 calls for service resulting in 691 active cases with 519 citations issued. Also, UPD's part-time social worker started on April 15th and as of May 1st she is assigned to nine active cases.

The UPD awards banquet was held where 30 Midvale Officers were recognized. A few notable recognitions included Officer Mark Utley, Canyons School District Resource Officer. Mark is the only SRO in Canyons School District history to receive the Red Shoes Living award; the award recipient is chosen by the students. Janet Moore, Volunteer Victim Advocate, received Volunteer of the Year award for 2025 for her 25 years of volunteer service with UPD. The Directed Enforcement Unit was awarded the Distinctive Unit award for their impressive work by a five-man unit in 2025. And in April, the 38th annual Utah Victims Services Commission Conference was held and Carmen Contreras, full time UPD Victim Advocate, received the Melvin C. Wilson Lifetime Achievement award.

Chief Morse wanted to extend heartfelt sympathy and support to the Salt Lake City Police Department for the loss of one of their officers yesterday.

D. **Proclamation Declaring May 2026 as Front Line Worker Appreciation Month.**

Mayor Dustin Gettel explained what a Front Line Worker is and read the proclamation into the record.

II. PUBLIC COMMENTS

Luke Maynes, Vice Chair of the Midvale Community Council and Chair of the Active Transportation Committee of the Community Council, said the Active Transportation Committee is hosting a Midvale Wheels and Walks event this Saturday, May 9th, at 9:30 am at Jordan Bluffs Park. Everyone is welcome.

III. COUNCIL REPORTS

A. **Council Member Bonnie Billings** — had nothing to report.

B. **Council Member Paul Glover** — thanked the staff that helpkeep Midvale running.

C. **Council Member Heidi Robinson** — excused

D. Council Member Bryant Brown — said at the last meeting the Council talked a lot about water, and during the recent rainstorm Zions Bank was watering their big slope that's not being used. Businesses should be twice as responsible as residents for conserving water. He said he is surprised that a building that new does not have sensors on their sprinklers.

E. Council Member Denece Mikolash — said she took a tour of the police precinct and was able to meet a lot of the people that were recognized at the UPD banquet. The recognition and awards are well deserved. She went on a tour of Boulder City with the Wasatch Front Regional Council to learn how they are adding active transportation to their community, adding safety features to their intersections, and connecting open space to their development. She thanked Nate Rockwood for walking her through where Midvale can add some of these features. She said she will also be attending the Midvale Wheels and Walks event and hopes to see everyone else there.

IV. MAYOR REPORT

A. Mayor Dustin Gettel said he and Matt Dahl attended the Utah League of City and Towns conference in St. George last week. Networking with other city officials and law makers is important and valuable and he invites anyone that wants to attend the conference to do so. He attended the annual Fallen Officer Ceremony that day, which was a very somber ceremony recognizing the sacrifice of our fallen officers. He said based on resident feedback the Council has discussed the potential of removing the surcharge from tier 1 water usage. This means anyone using less than 12,000 gallons a month will not be charged the drought surcharge, which won't kick in until water usage bumps into the 2nd tier. He urges everyone to conserve water. He said the Council will reconsider this issue on May 19th.

VI. PUBLIC HEARING

A. RECEIVE PUBLIC COMMENT REGARDING A ZONING CODE TEXT AMENDMENT TO TABLE 17-7-12.10 OF THE REGIONAL COMMERCIAL ZONE TO INCREASE THE ALLOWED PERCENTAGE FOR CHANGEABLE COPY SIGNS

Jonathan Anderson said a text amendment application was submitted by Dean Cardinale of Worldwide Trekking which proposes to "modify monument sign regulations to allow up to 85% changeable copy", see Attachment 2. Exhibits B-G shown in Attachment 2 along Union Park Avenue and in the surrounding area, identify signs that are not within Midvale City's limits (Cottonwood Heights for the billboard-Exhibit B, and Sandy for the remaining signs- Exhibits C-G) and thus not applicable as they are regulated by different jurisdictions.

The current language in Table 17-7-12.10 permits 25% of a sign's area for wall or monument sign types as changeable copy, which is reasonable to keep signs from being a nuisance or distraction for vehicular traffic.

Public notice has been sent to affected entities as required in 17-3-9(B) of the Midvale Municipal Code. No comments have been received as of the writing of this report.

-ZONING CODE TEXT AMENDMENT CRITERIA-

Midvale City Code 17-3-1(F) outlines the criteria necessary for amendments to the zoning code.

F. Zoning Code Text Amendment Criteria. To establish and maintain a sound, stable, and desirable city, a zoning code amendment application may only be approved if the reviewing body determines, in written findings, that the proposed amendment demonstrates one or more of the following:

1. The proposed amendment promotes the objectives of the general plan and purposes of this title;
2. The proposed amendment promotes the purposes outlined in Utah State Code 10-9a-102;
3. The proposed amendment more clearly explains the intent of the original language or has been amended to make interpretation more straightforward; or
4. Existing zoning code was the result of a clerical error or a mistake of fact.

Staff finds that this proposal does not meet the required criteria, see the responses below for each related above-criteria.

Finding:

1. The amendment does not comply with Midvale City Code 17-3-1(F).

Council Member Bryant Brown asked how we got to 25% and what do other cities do?

Jonathan Anderson said he doesn't know the history of how the 25% was arrived at; however, it's been that way for a long time. Sandy City is at 50% of the signs permitted.

Council Member Bryant Brown said 25% to 85% seems like a huge jump; however, he would be comfortable matching what neighboring cities do.

Dean Cardinale, owner of Worldwide Trekking and founder of The Human Outreach Project, gave a brief history of his business and how it started. He said that people drive past his building, and they don't know what they offer so, he would like to communicate with the public through his sign. He shared an image of his sign with the Council. He said when he put up his sign, he was not aware that an LED sign had different requirements than other sign types. His LED sign has been up for four months and in those four months he had more people stop at his business than he had since 2019. He said he wants to run a good business and do things right, and he wants to be an ambassador in Midvale City and see how they can work together.

Council Member Paul Glover said he is concerned about the signs competing with each other and being a distraction.

Dean Cardinale said he would be able to redesign his sign to provide 50% coverage. His sign would be like the Midvale City LED style sign in front of City Hall. He said that he would be able to have controls on the sign to eliminate flashing elements and control brightness and scrolling images etc. He said he does not want to negatively impact the surrounding environment.

The Council discussed this issue. They also discussed when the current ordinance was put in place and what changes to the ordinance might look like compared to what surrounding cities are doing.

Council Member Denece Mikolash suggested the ordinance be tabled and more research into the issue be done including seeing what other cities are doing.

Council Members Bonnie Billings and Bryant Brown agreed.

The recommendation from Council was to hold the public hearing when research and more information is available such as brightness of the sign, hours that brightness can be changed, transition types and timing of transitions, will videos or animations be allowed, and what neighboring cities are doing regarding LED signs.

Adam Olsen reminded the Council that any changes to the code will be effective citywide and not restrained to this one area or business.

VIII. DISCUSSION ITEMS

A. BUDGET OFFICER INTENT TO STATE THAT THE TENTATIVE BUDGET INCLUDES A PROPOSED PROPERTY TAX RATE INCREASE.

Matt Dahl said during the 2026 Utah Legislative Session, HB 236 – Truth-in-Taxation Amendments was enacted, making several changes to Utah Code §§ 59-2-919 and 59-2-924, which govern notice, disclosure, and public hearing requirements when a tentative budget includes a proposed property tax rate increase, including municipal property tax increases. These provisions are intended to promote transparency and ensure the public is provided clear information regarding the potential impacts of a proposed tax rate prior to final budget and tax rate adoption.

Among other changes, the amendments clarify requirements for fiscal-year taxing entities regarding the initial public presentation of the tentative budget. Specifically, the statute requires that, at the public meeting where the tentative budget is first presented, the budget officer must state whether the tentative budget includes a proposed property tax rate increase and present the associated property tax impact schedule. In addition, the meeting agenda must include a separate item notifying the public that the budget officer intends to make this statement.

This agenda item is included to comply with Utah Code § 59-2-919(4)(a)(ii) by providing notice of the budget officer’s intent to state that the tentative budget includes a proposed property tax rate increase, thereby ensuring transparency and public awareness consistent with Truth-in-Taxation requirements.

FISCAL IMPACT:

Fiscal impacts are outlined in the FY2027 Midvale City Tentative Budget and Property Tax Impact Schedule.

Matt Dahl said it is his intent to state that in the tentative budget staff has included an increase in the public safety property tax that is intended to cover an increase in the public safety costs for Midvale.

B. BUDGET OFFICER STATEMENT THAT THE TENTATIVE BUDGET INCLUDES A PROPOSED PROPERTY TAX RATE INCREASE

Matt Dahl said during the 2026 Utah Legislative Session, HB 236 – Truth-in-Taxation amendments was enacted, making several changes to Utah Code §§ 59-2-919 and 59-2-924, which govern notice, disclosure, and public hearing requirements when a tentative budget includes a proposed property tax rate increase, including municipal property tax increases. These provisions are intended to promote transparency and ensure the public is provided clear information regarding the potential impacts of a proposed tax rate prior to final budget and tax rate adoption.

Among other changes, the amendments clarify requirements for fiscal-year taxing entities regarding the initial public presentation of the tentative budget. Specifically, the statute requires that, at the public meeting where the tentative budget is first presented, the budget officer must state whether the tentative budget includes a proposed property tax rate increase and present the associated property tax impact schedule.

This agenda item is included to comply with Utah Code § 59-2-919(4)(a)(i) by providing notice and an official statement by the Budget Officer that the tentative budget includes a proposed property tax rate increase. Additional details regarding the proposed property tax rate increase will be presented during the formal presentation and adoption of the FY2027 Midvale City Tentative Budget and the Property Tax Impact Schedule.

FISCAL IMPACT:

Fiscal impacts are outlined in the FY2027 Midvale City Tentative Budget and Property Tax Impact Schedule.

Matt Dahl said he is making a statement that included in the tentative budget is a proposed property tax increase for the Public Safety Property Tax. This increase is intended to cover increased costs in public safety.

IX. ACTION ITEMS

A. Consider Resolution No. 2026-R-24 Adopting the FY2027 Midvale City Tentative Operating and Capital Budgets, Beginning July 1, 2026, and Ending June 30, 2026, and Establishing a Public Hearing

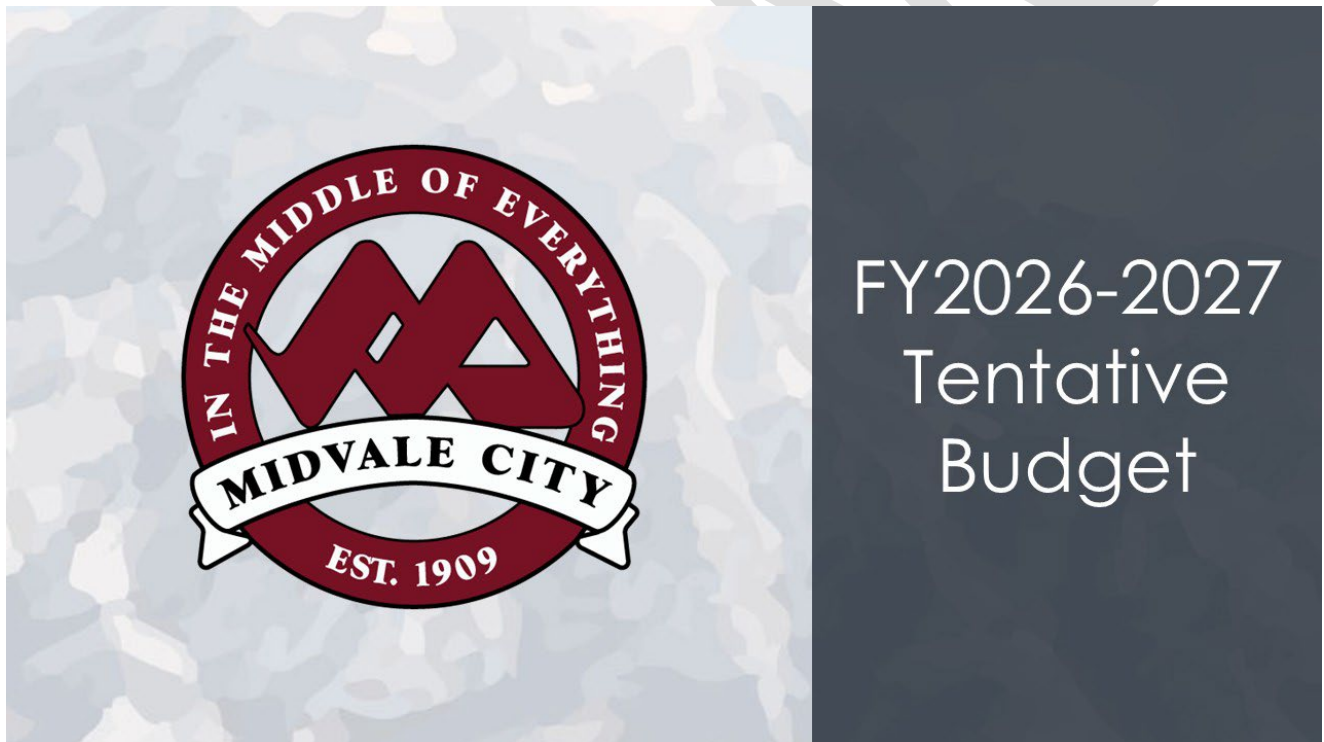
Mariah Hill said the process of adopting the Fiscal Year 2027 budget requires several actions to ensure compliance with state statute. Utah Code § 10-6-111(1) requires the Budget Officer to present a tentative budget for each City fund no later than the first regularly scheduled meeting in May. Accordingly, tentative budgets for each fund will be presented on Tuesday, May 5, on behalf of the Budget Officer (City Manager).

The presentation will include an overview of Fiscal Year 2027 revenue estimates, a summary of anticipated expenditures, budget highlights, and any proposed program changes. In addition, the presentation will include a review of the proposed Public Safety Property Tax increase and the related Property Tax Impact Schedule, as required under Utah Code § 59-2-924.

Utah Code § 10-6-111(3) further requires the City Council to adopt the tentative budget at this meeting. Following adoption, the Council may review and amend the tentative budget as needed prior to final adoption. The tentative budget serves as a working document from which the formal budget adoption process begins and may be modified before final approval. At final adoption, all budgets must be balanced, with total expenditures equal to total revenues.

FISCAL IMPACT:

The tentative budget provides a starting point to discuss the operating budget for Fiscal Year 2027 prior to final approval.



FY2027 Budget Overview

- This presentation provides a high-level budget overview – Detailed line-item information is available in the FY2027 Tentative Budget Book, included in the meeting packet and at Midvale.Utah.Gov.
- The Tentative Budget represents the City's initial estimates of revenues and expenditures for each fund for the period July 1, 2026 through June 30, 2027. All departments are organized within these funds.
- The Tentative Budget is a working document and will be refined throughout the budget process.

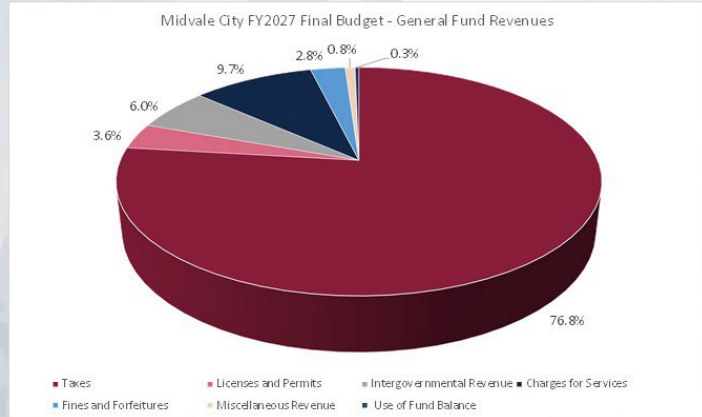

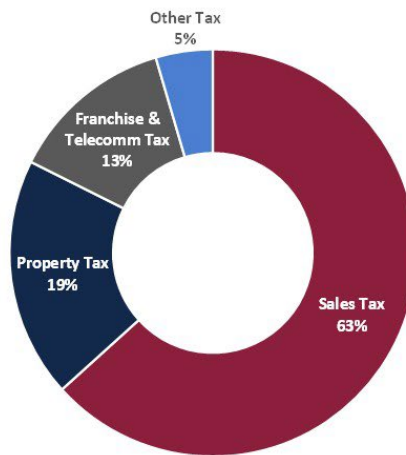

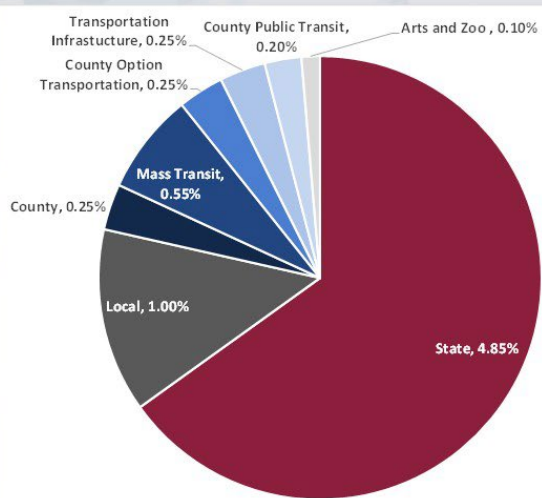
General Fund – Tax Revenues

Midvale City Fiscal Year 2027 Tentative Budget Taxes by Type



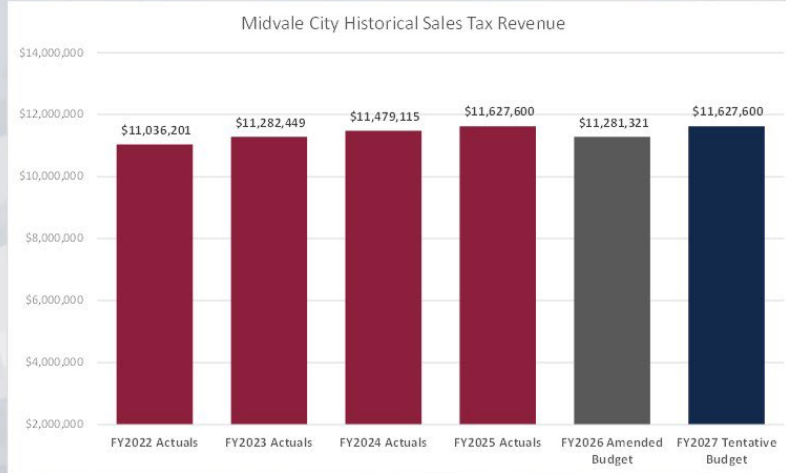

Property Tax 101

- Property tax rates in Utah are revenue-driven, not rate-driven.
- Increases in property values do not automatically result in higher taxes.
- Changes in property values typically result in a shift in the tax burden among property owners.
- Property taxes do not include an automatic inflation adjustment.
- Primary residential properties receive a 45% exemption on taxable value.
- New growth or a Truth-in-Taxation process is required for a taxing entity to generate additional property tax revenue.

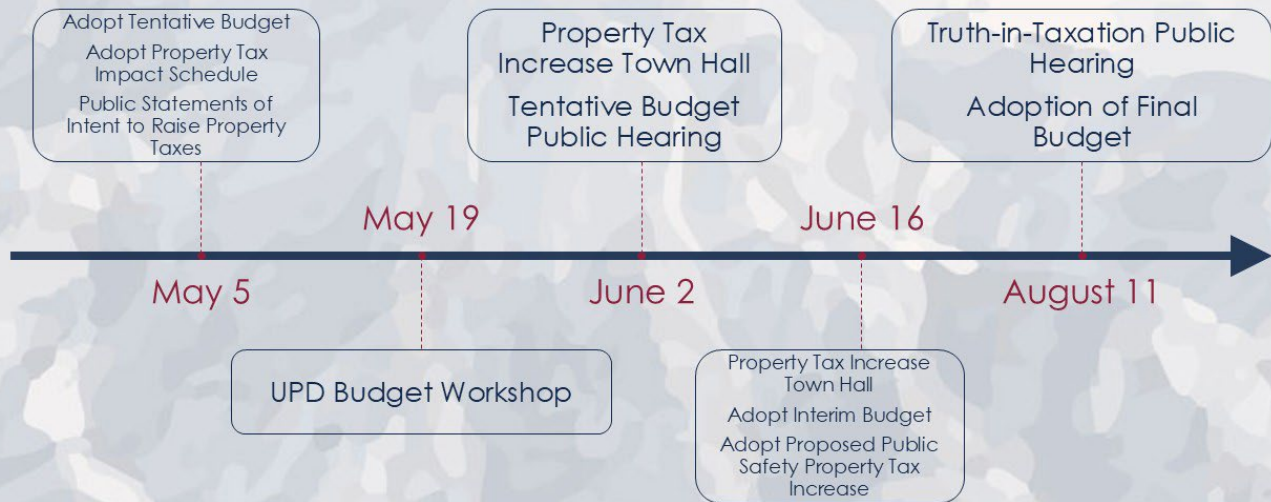

B. CONSIDER RESOLUTION NO. 2026-R-27 ADOPTING THE FY2027 MIDVALE CITY PROPERTY TAX IMPACT SCHEDULE

Mariah Hill said during the 2026 Utah Legislative Session, HB 236 – Truth-in-Taxation Amendments was enacted, making several changes to Utah Code §§ 59-2-919 and 59-2-924, which govern notice, disclosure, and public hearing requirements when a tentative budget includes a proposed property tax rate increase, including municipal property tax increases. These provisions are intended to promote transparency and ensure the public is provided clear information regarding the potential impacts of a proposed tax rate prior to final budget and tax rate adoption. Accordingly, the City is required to prepare and present a Property Tax Impact Schedule that illustrates the estimated effect of the proposed tax rate on typical residential and non-residential properties and present and make it available to the public separate from other budget documents.

The Property Tax Impact Schedule provides a standardized summary of the anticipated property tax impact associated with the proposed rate increase and is intended to promote transparency and public understanding prior to final budget and tax rate adoption. The schedule has been prepared in accordance with statutory requirements and will be presented at all meetings where the FY2027 budget is discussed.

Adoption of the Property Tax Impact Schedule does not finalize the property tax rate. Final consideration and adoption of the property tax rate will occur following the required public hearing and completion of all applicable notice and review periods.

FISCAL IMPACT:

Adoption of the Property Tax Impact Schedule itself does not have a direct fiscal impact. The schedule is a disclosure document that illustrates the estimated effect of a proposed property tax rate increase. Any actual fiscal impact will be determined by the final property tax rate adopted by the City Council as part of the final budget process.

C. CONSIDER RESOLUTION NO. 2026-R-25 ACKNOWLEDGING COMPLIANCE WITH TRUTH-IN TAXATION NOTICE AND DISCLOSURE REQUIREMENTS RELATED TO THE FISCAL YEAR 2026-2027 TENTATIVE BUDGET

Mariah Hill said during the 2026 Utah Legislative Session, HB 236 – Truth-in-Taxation Amendments was enacted, making several changes to Utah Code § 59-2-919 and 59-2-924, which govern notice, disclosure, and public hearing requirements when a tentative budget includes a proposed property tax rate increase, including municipal property tax increases. These provisions are intended to promote transparency and ensure the public is provided clear information regarding the potential impacts of a proposed tax rate prior to final budget and tax rate adoption.

Earlier in the agenda of the May 5, 2026, public meeting, the City Council will consider items related to the Fiscal Year 2026–2027 tentative budget. These items include three separate agenda entries: notice to the public of the Budget Officer’s intent to state that the tentative budget includes a proposed property tax rate increase; the Budget Officer’s formal statement to the City Council regarding the proposed property tax rate increase; and presentation of a Property Tax Impact Schedule prepared in accordance with state law. The City Council will consider and may adopt the Property Tax Impact Schedule at that time.

With the adoption of the Property Tax Impact Schedule, this resolution will serve to formally acknowledge that the City has complied with the applicable Truth-in-Taxation notice and disclosure requirements associated with the proposed property tax rate increase included in the Fiscal Year 2026–2027 tentative budget up to this point in the process. The resolution does not authorize or finalize a property tax rate increase but documents compliance with statutory requirements and clarifies ongoing public access and presentation expectations.

FISCAL IMPACT:

The resolution does not authorize or finalize a property tax rate increase and has no direct fiscal impact. It serves solely to acknowledge compliance with Truth-in-Taxation requirements and to direct continued public access to the Property Tax Impact Schedule. Any fiscal impacts related to property taxes will be determined through the separate public hearing process and final budget and tax rate adoption.

D. CONSIDER RESOLUTION NO. 2026-R-26 STATING THE CITY COUNCIL'S INTENT TO CONSIDER A TAX RATE THAT EXCEEDS THE CERTIFIED TAX RATE FOR THE PUBLIC SAFETY PROPERTY TAX AND ESTABLISHING A TRUTH-IN-TAXATION PUBLIC HEARING

Mariah Hill said during the 2026 Utah Legislative Session, HB 236 – Truth-in-Taxation Amendments was enacted, making several changes to Utah Code §§ 59-2-919 and 59-2-924, which govern notice, disclosure, and public hearing requirements when a tentative budget includes a proposed property tax rate increase, including municipal property tax increases. These provisions are intended to promote transparency and ensure the public is provided clear information regarding the potential impacts of a proposed tax rate prior to final budget and tax rate adoption.

As part of the Fiscal Year 2026–2027 budget process, the City is proposing a public safety property tax rate increase. In the FY2026-2027 tentative budget, the proposed increase is estimated to generate approximately \$848,964 in additional ad valorem public safety property tax revenue, representing an approximate 90.23% increase in ad valorem public safety property tax revenue based on the proposed tax rate.

The public safety property tax was put into place in FY2026 and is currently generating \$940,561 in revenue. All revenue generated by the public safety property tax must be used for public safety. The sole purpose of the proposed public safety property tax rate increase is to maintain existing levels of service, in light of increased contractual costs, with the City's public safety service providers. These services include policing provided by the Unified Police Department, emergency management provided by the Unified Fire Authority, and animal control services provided by Salt Lake County.

This resolution does not adopt a final tax rate. Rather, it serves as a formal statement of intent under state law and establishes a public hearing at which members of the public may provide comment on the proposed increase.

The resolution establishes a public hearing to be held on August 11, 2026, at 6:00 p.m., at Midvale City Hall, consistent with statutory requirements.

FISCAL IMPACT:

The resolution does not authorize or finalize a property tax rate increase and has no direct fiscal impact. It serves solely to acknowledge compliance with Truth-in-Taxation requirements and to direct continued public access to the Property Tax Impact Schedule. Any fiscal impacts related

to property taxes will be determined through the separate public hearing process and final budget and tax rate adoption.

SUMMARY:

I have appointed Jerimie Thorne to the position of Public Works Director. As required under Midvale City Ordinance, I am submitting Jerimie's appointment to the City Council for advice and consent.

Jerimie brings over 18 years of public works experience, including nearly five years with Midvale City's Public Works Department. Prior to assuming his role with Midvale City, Jerimie was employed by South Jordan City for 13 years. During that time he held the positions of Engineering Inspector, UPDES Program Coordinator, Stormwater and Sanitation Divisions Manager, and Associate Director of Public Works. In these roles, he supported the operations and effectiveness of their Public Works Department. His work included oversight of various divisions, coordination of capital improvement projects, and budget planning. He also assisted in developing and implementing asset management plans and supported continuous improvement efforts by evaluating operations and implementing strategic enhancements.

In 2021, Jerimie was selected as Midvale's Public Works Deputy Director, where he has overseen the Public Utilities Superintendent, Streets and Stormwater Manager, Water and Sewer Manager, Fleet and Facilities Manager, Parks and Cemetery Manager, and Operations Support Staff. SUMMARY: Midvale City is currently planning for the future expansion of the existing Public Works facility located at 8196 S. Main Street. The current Public Works facility has reached operational capacity, and additional property is necessary to support the City's growing infrastructure and service demands.

Midvale City provides numerous essential public services including streets, sidewalks, parks, culinary water, sewer, storm drainage, street lighting, and related municipal operations. As the City continues to grow, maintaining current service levels for residents and businesses will require additional operational space and infrastructure capacity.

To support future expansion efforts, Midvale City has already acquired adjacent properties located at 8170 and 8172 S. Main Street. The property located at 705 W. Ivy property, currently owned by the Redevelopment Agency of Midvale City (RDA), is strategically important to the overall Public Works expansion project. The parcel will assist with site layout, circulation, parking, and long-term operational functionality for the expanded facility.

The RDA originally acquired the property to support development within the Jordan Bluffs Project Area and has determined that conveying the property to Midvale City will further support municipal infrastructure and public service needs benefiting current and future residents and businesses within the Jordan Bluffs and Midvale Main Street Project Areas.

The RDA seeks to convey the property to the city by special warranty deed. The city council is being asked to consider approving the transaction.

This Agreement is established between UWSL and the Partner to formalize a one-time grant amount of \$3,500 (“Block Party Funds”), purposed expressly for the Partner’s use of Block Party Funds: to prepare and run a Community Block Party for the Midvale community, as specified in the Block Party Scope of Work section.

This Agreement outlines the terms, conditions, and mutual responsibilities related to the one-time disbursement of Block Party Funds and use of these funds to support a community event aligned with the values of Promise Partnership Utah.

TERM

- This Agreement is effective as of 5/19/2026 and shall expire on 06/30/2026 (“Term”).
- Either party may terminate this Agreement with 60 days’ written notice.
- UWSL may terminate this Agreement if the Partner fails to meet requirements.

FUNDING AMOUNT & DISBURSEMENT

- UWSL shall provide a one-time grant payment of \$3,500 to the Partner.
- Funds will be disbursed electronically in a single payment to the Partner.

- Disbursement of funds is contingent upon the Partner submitting the following documentation:
 - o Appendix A item “Financial Information” once filled entirely,
 - o Most recent W9 documentation,
 - o Most recent EFT/ACH documentation, and
 - o Appendix B item “Anti-terrorism Form” once signed.
- Funds must be fully expended by the end of the Term and cannot be used for reserves or fund balances.
- Funds must be used solely for the purposes outlined in the Scope of Work and in compliance with applicable laws and regulations.
- Any misuse or failure to comply may result in termination of the Agreement and/or repayment of funds.
- This grant is non-renewable and does not imply future funding commitments from UWSL

SCOPE OF WORK

1. **Event Purpose:** The Block Party event is intended as a time for gathering communities to share and celebrate their Promise Partnership Utah work. This could be through a new event or tied to an existing upcoming community celebration.
2. **Inclusion of PPC Members:** the Partner is encouraged to engage relevant Promise Partnership Utah Community Council (“PPC”) members to ensure the event reflects community priorities.
3. **Plan Submission:** Before the event occurs, the Partner must create a concise plan (“Plan”) equal to or less than 1000 words on how and when Funds will be used.
 1. The Plan must include how the two objectives outlined in the Event Purpose statement will be achieved using the Block Party Funds.

2. The Plan should be shared with the Promise Partnership Utah backbone staff member the Partner has been communicating with on this proposal at least 2 weeks prior to the event.
3. The Plan should include a contingency sequence for protocol in case of event cancellation, postponement, or other unexpected interaction.
4. **Post-Event Reporting:** the Partner agrees to measure and collect data for sharing a post-event report that summarizes the impact of the event, general expenditures of funds, and overall experience from facilitating the event, including:
 - i. Approximate number of attendees, including attendance data sources if available,
 - ii. Impact made in the Partner community, including any qualitative or quantitative data measured,
 - iii. Any highlights, successes, or wins during or as a result of the event,
 - iv. Any challenges or opportunities for improvement for the event, use of support funds, partnership of involved Parties, application process, or ideas for innovation.
5. **Communication:** the Partner agrees to communicate this and any other relevant information, including any plans to invite Promise Partnership Utah backbone staff support and relevant PPC members to the event.
6. **Marketing, Branding, and Communications:** By signing this Agreement, the Partner agrees to all the following:
 1. Incorporate Promise Partnership Utah's prepared branding toolkit, including branding guidelines, digital assets, and social media toolkit, into the event.
 2. Commit to partnering with Promise Partnership Utah backbone staff to take event photos, write blog posts, and feature the event in other ways.

TERMS & CONDITIONS

1. The Partner must maintain a non-discrimination policy and comply with applicable federal regulations.
2. Funds must be used in compliance with the USA Patriot Act and other relevant laws.
3. Partner is a governmental entity that is subject to Utah's Government and Records Access and Management Act, Utah Code Ann. §§ 63G-2-101 to 901. Any documents provided by UWSL may be subject to public access. If UWSL believes that a document should be protected under Utah Code Ann. §§ 63G-2-305(1) or (2), UWSL must provide a written claim of business confidentiality to the Partner that complies with Utah Code Ann. § 63G-2-309(1).
4. The provision of Block Party Funds and consequential resources during the Term is contingent on:
 - a. The Partner's performance of its obligations under this Agreement, including but not limited to clauses in the Scope of Work,
 - b. UWSL's confirmation of available funds at the time of execution, and
 - c. The Partner's signing of this Agreement within 3 business days of receiving it.
5. This Agreement is binding, and any amendments must be made in writing and signed by both parties.
6. The Agreement shall be governed by the laws of the State of Utah.
7. Both parties waive the right to a jury trial and agree to cover attorneys' fees if legal action arises.
8. Electronic signatures are valid and enforceable.
9. Each party acts as an independent contractor and shall indemnify the other against claims arising from breach or misconduct.
10. Force majeure events may excuse performance obligations.

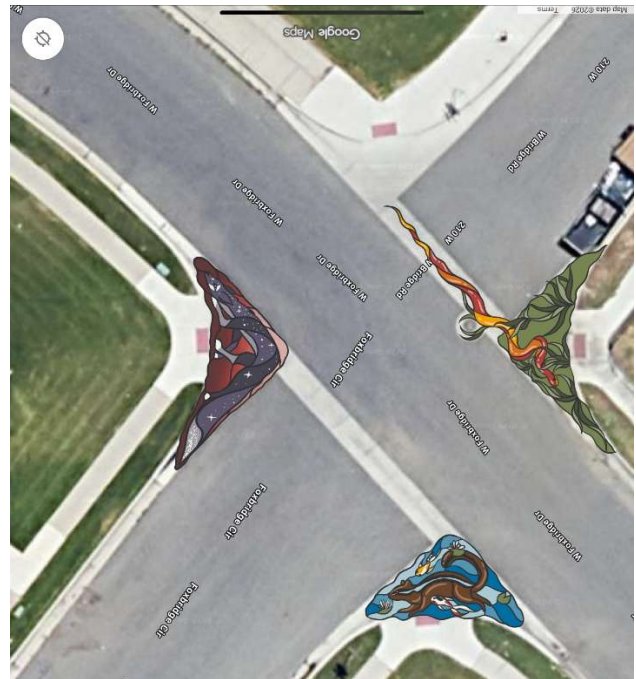
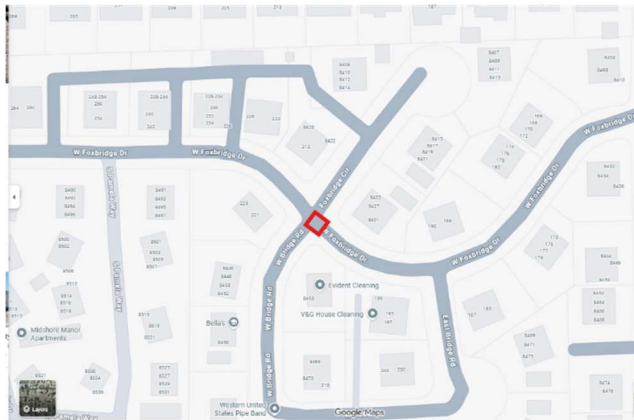

SUBJECT: APPROVING THE ARTIST AGREEMENT WITH JAYCIE BAIRD, AND AUTHORIZING THE USE OF PUBLIC PROPERTY AND ROADWAY AT IDENTIFIED INTERSECTION

PURPOSE

The purpose of this memorandum is to (1) request City Council approval to adopt an Artist Agreement for a community street mural project, and (2) formally request permission and provide notification of the temporary use of public property and streets for the installation of the mural.



PROJECT OVERVIEW

Midvale City proposes to partner with local artist Jaycie Baird to design and install a community street mural at the intersection of Foxbridge Circle, Foxbridge Drive, and Bridge Road. The mural will be painted directly onto the public roadway and will serve as a community engagement event in coordination with the United Way and Midvale City Block Party Agreement.

The total artist cost is estimated at \$5,000, inclusive of design and installation of the street mural.

COMMUNITY PURPOSE AND ALIGNMENT

This initiative is designed to promote community connection, beautification, and resident participation. It directly aligns with Uplift Midvale's Risk and Protective Factors framework, including:

- **Neighborhood Attachment:** Strengthening community identity and pride through placemaking
- **Opportunities for Prosocial Involvement:** Providing residents with a collaborative, positive community activity

This event will engage residents of all ages and contribute to Midvale's broader goals of fostering safe, vibrant, and connected neighborhoods.

KEY TERMS OF ARTIST AGREEMENT

The proposed agreement includes the following provisions:

- **Scope of Work:** Designer will complete one street mural, including design consultation, initial concepts, one round of revisions, and final installation
- **Location:** Public roadway at Foxbridge Circle / Foxbridge Drive / Bridge Road intersection
- **Compensation:** Total artist cost is \$5,000, with payment structured as a deposit and final payment upon completion
- **Ownership:** Upon completion, Midvale City will retain sole ownership of the mural and associated intellectual property rights
- **Durability & Risk Acknowledgement:** Both parties acknowledge increased wear due to the mural's placement within a public street and exposure to traffic and weather
- **Maintenance:** The City retains discretion and fiscal responsibility over maintenance, repair, removal, or replacement of the mural with Designer first opportunity to repair within 10 days
- **Insurance & Liability:** The Designer must maintain required liability insurance and indemnify the City against claims arising from the project

USE OF THE PUBLIC PROPERTY

The project will require temporary use of public streets and right-of-way. Appropriate safety measures that include traffic control, signage and coordination with Public Works of Midvale City and Utah Barricade, to will be implemented to ensure public safety during the event.

STAFF RECOMMENDATION AND ACTION:

I move that we suspend the rules, and approve Resolution No. 2026-R-29, approving the adoption of the Artist Agreement with Jaycie Baird, AND Authorizing the use of public property and roadway at the identified intersection

A RESOLUTION APPROVING THE ADOPTION OF THE ARTIST AGREEMENT WITH ARTIST JAYCIE BAIRD, AND AUTHORIZING THE USE OF PUBLIC PROPERTY AND ROADWAY AT IDENTIFIED INTERSECTION

WHEREAS, Midvale City (the “City”) is a body corporate and politic of the State of Utah and is the owner of certain public property, including the public roadway and intersection located at Foxbridge Circle, Foxbridge Drive, and Bridge Road; and

WHEREAS, the intersection of Foxbridge Circle, Foxbridge Drive, and Bridge Road is identified as public property under the jurisdiction and control of Midvale City; and

WHEREAS, Jaycie Baird is an independent artist engaged to design and implement a street mural to be applied directly onto the identified public roadway; and

WHEREAS, Midvale City established the Uplift Midvale community coalition to support efforts aimed at reducing youth violence and strengthening community outcomes through coordinated public health, public safety, and community engagement strategies; and

WHEREAS, the City and its partners desire to utilize available funding, including grant-supported resources, to implement a community engagement event involving the creation of a street mural in coordination with the United Way and Midvale City Block Party Agreement; and

WHEREAS, the proposed community street mural project is intended to beautify public space, foster civic pride, and promote resident participation, consistent with Uplift Midvale’s Risk and Protective Factors framework; and

WHEREAS, strengthening neighborhood attachment is a risk factor identified by Uplift Midvale; and

WHEREAS, increasing opportunities for prosocial involvement is a protective factor identified by Uplift Midvale; and

WHEREAS, the City desires to enter into an Artist Agreement with Jaycie Baird for the design and installation of the street mural for a total project cost not to exceed \$5,000; and

WHEREAS, the proposed agreement provides that the City will retain ownership of the completed mural and establishes terms related to scope of work, compensation, liability, maintenance, and use of public space; and ¹

WHEREAS, the implementation of the mural will require the temporary use of public property and roadway, including potential street closures or traffic control measures to ensure public safety during the community event; and

WHEREAS, the City Council has reviewed the proposed Artist Agreement and finds that the terms and conditions are acceptable and in the best interest of Midvale City and its residents.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF MIDVALE CITY, UTAH, AS FOLLOWS:

Section 1.

The City Council hereby approves the Artist Agreement between Midvale City and Jaycie Baird for the design and installation of a community street mural at the identified intersection.

Section 2.

The City Council hereby authorizes the temporary use of public property and roadway at the intersection of Foxbridge Circle, Foxbridge Drive, and Bridge Road for the purpose of designing, installing, and completing the community street mural, including any necessary street closures and safety measures.

Section 3.

The City Council authorizes project funding in an amount not to exceed \$5,000 for completion of the mural, including design, materials, and installation.

Section 4.

The City Council acknowledges that the mural project will be conducted as a community engagement event, aligned with the United Way and Midvale City Block Party partnership, and supporting Uplift Midvale goals.

Section 5.

The Resolution shall take effect immediately upon adoption

Project Description

Designer agrees to paint 1 exterior mural for CLIENT for \$5,000.00. Design process includes: 1. design meeting, 2. initial designs to start per wall, one round of revisions, and application of the final design. Additional revisions are an added fee at the Designers rate of \$50/hr. Mural installation will take approximately 24 days (project timeline below).

Payment Terms

- (i) Client will pay a deposit of \$2,500.00 to Designer by May 28, 2026.
- (ii) After completion and acceptance of the mural by the Client, Client will make a final payment of \$2,500.00 to the Designer by June 30, 2026 (10% added fee if payment isn't received by July 30, 2026).
- (iii) Designer shall be entitled to receive reimbursement for any overages or additional expenses with prior written approval of Client.
- (iii) Any deposit shall be refundable in the event of Designer non-performance, Client's cancellation of this Mural Agreement for cause, or any event outside of Client's control. In the event Client cancels for convenience, Designer may retain only documented, reasonable, and non-recoverable costs incurred.

Project Timeline

This Mural Agreement will be effective on May 19, 2026. Designer will install the agreed-upon mural at the project location on June 12, 2026. The Agreement will terminate upon acceptance of the mural by the Client and final payment from the Client to the Designer.

Project Location

The mural will be installed on the public roadway, as designated by Client, at approximately the intersection of Foxbridge Circle and Bridge Street in Midvale, Utah. Client will have sole discretion on the location of the mural.

Ownership

In consideration of this Mural Agreement and the location of the mural, Client will take sole ownership of the mural upon Designer's completion and installation of the mural. The Client will be entitled to exercise all rights previously held by the Designer including, but not limited to, any and all rights arising under all

applicable intellectual property laws. Designer agrees that, as of the date the Mural is completed and installed, the Designer automatically transfers and assigns to the Client all of their rights under all applicable intellectual property laws. The Designer also waives and relinquishes all other rights the Designer may have in and to the mural including, but not limited to, the Designer's rights under the Visual Artists Rights Act of 1990 (as defined and expressly waived below):

THE DESIGNER ACKNOWLEDGES THEIR RIGHTS OF ATTRIBUTION AND INTEGRITY GENERALLY CONFERRED BY SECTION 106(A) OF TITLE 17 OF THE UNITED STATES CODE (THE VISUAL ARTISTS RIGHTS ACT OF 1990), AND ANY OTHER RIGHTS OF THE SAME NATURE GRANTED BY OTHER FEDERAL, STATE, OR FOREIGN LAWS. THE DESIGNER WAIVES THEIR RIGHTS WITH RESPECT TO THE MURAL.

Perpetual License

Notwithstanding the above Usage section, the Client, upon taking ownership of the mural, conveys a perpetual license to the Designer to identify themselves as the creator of the mural and to share images of the mural in their portfolio (including on websites and social media platforms).

Artist Alteration

Colors may appear differently in paint than on screen renderings. Designer is not responsible for such differences. Designs may be altered based on the following factors: road texture, safety markings, etc. Changes, if necessary, will be made by the Designers' expertise. All paint, fabric, wood, and other materials are subject to change based on market availability and Designer is not responsible for differences based on those factors. Differences in on screen render to final mural may be up to 25% different as an approximation.

Maintenance

If the mural is damaged, the Client will determine if the Client can clean or repair the damage itself. If the Client determines that it cannot clean or repair the mural itself and the Client determines, at its sole discretion, to repair the mural, the Client will give the Designer the first opportunity to repair the mural. The Designer must let the Client know whether the Designer will repair the mural within 10 days of the Client's notification. The Designer must provide the Client with a date by when the Designer will repair the mural. If the Designer does not respond to the Client within 10 days or the Client determines that the Designer's repair date is not timely, the Client may contract with another individual or entity to repair, replace, or remove the mural at its sole discretion. The Client will cover the Designer's costs to repair the mural including, but not limited to, supplies and travel if the Designer repairs the mural. If the Client chooses to remove or cover the mural from the wall, Designer is not responsible for removal, movement, and/or disposal of the mural. Designer is not liable for any injury or damage resulting from moving or tampering with the mural.

Damage

Both Parties recognize that the chosen location for the mural is an intersection within a public street. Designer will take all reasonable measures to choose materials and install the mural in a manner to withstand vehicles, pedestrians, weather, and other sources of wear and tear common to a public street. Both Parties recognize that the mural will likely deteriorate faster than a mural installed upon a wall or

other surface not exposed to traffic and natural forces. Both Parties recognize that the mural may be damaged or destroyed due to maintenance or emergency work on or under the mural location or vandalism.

Delay

If the execution of the work is delayed by an act or neglect of the Client, by labor disputes, fire, unusual transportation delays, or by other external forces or natural calamities outside of Designers' control, the Designer shall be entitled to extend the completion date via verbal, or written notification to the Client, by the time equivalent to the period of such delay. Project timeline may be changed with written consent between both Parties and a new timeline must be created before any additional work is continued on the project. If the Client fails to comply with the agreed upon timeline, the project will be pushed back based on the Designer's schedule and Designer has the option to terminate the project.

Additional Compensation

Any additional artwork done by the Designer shall be negotiated and compensated separately from this Agreement.

Default

In the event any Party defaults in its obligations under the terms of this Agreement, in addition to all other remedies available, the non-defaulting Party can declare, at its option, this Agreement to be null and void. The non-defaulting Party of this Agreement shall be entitled to all costs and fees, including attorney's fees and costs, incurred to enforce the terms of this Agreement.

Warranty

The Designer represents and warrants that the mural will be an original creation of the Designer and will not infringe on any copyright, trademark, or other intellectual property right of another. The representation and warranty will survive the termination of this Agreement.

Indemnification

The Designer agrees to protect, defend, release, indemnify and hold harmless the Client and its officials, officers, employees, and agents from and against any and all losses, damages, claims, demands, actions, causes of action, penalties, expenses, litigation costs, attorneys' fees, expert witness fees, court costs, amounts paid in settlement, judgments, interest or other costs resulting from: (a) any claim by a third party that the mural or anything made, used, sold, or otherwise disposed of, in or as a result of this Mural Agreement, allegedly infringes any trademark, copyright, patent, trade secret or other intellectual property right of a third party; (b) loss of or damage to the property of any Party or third person arising from the negligence or willful misconduct of the Designer or their representatives, agents, or employees in the performance of this Agreement; or (c) the death or personal injury of any person, arising from the negligence or willful misconduct of the Designer or their representatives, agents or employees in the performance of this Agreement. This paragraph and its obligations will survive the termination of this Agreement.

Nonexclusive

This Agreement is not exclusive and does not limit the Client from entering into other agreements regarding the Mural Project.

Relationship of Parties

This Agreement does not create any legal relationship between the Parties including, but not limited to, that of partner, employee, agent, or contractor. The Parties have no authorization, express or implied, to bind the other Party.

Third-Party Benefits

This Agreement is for the sole benefit of the named Parties. Nothing contained in this Agreement is for or may be relied upon for the benefit of any other third party.

Assignment and Delegation

Designer or Client may not assign or delegate any part of this Agreement without the other Party's prior written consent.

Amendments

Designer and Client may amend this Agreement by mutual written agreement. Any other modification is prohibited and invalid.

Severability

In the event that any part of this Agreement shall be determined unlawful or invalid by a court of competent jurisdiction then the remaining provisions shall continue in full force and effect.

Termination

Either Party may terminate this Agreement on three (3) days written notice via e-mail to the other Party in the event that the other Party is in breach with any provision of this Agreement and during the three-day period, the Party fails to cure such breach.

Waivers

No waiver of any term or provision of this Agreement will be valid unless such waiver is in writing signed by the Party against whom enforcement of the waiver is sought. The waiver of any term or provision of this Agreement will not apply to any subsequent breach of this Agreement.

Dispute Resolution

Any dispute arising under or relating to this Agreement will be resolved in the following order:

- a. Good faith negotiations between the Parties for a limit of 90 days unless otherwise extended by mutual written agreement;
- b. Good faith mediation with a mutually agreed upon mediator and with each Party paying one half of the mediation costs; and
- c. Litigation. If a Party incurs any legal costs or attorney's fees in litigation to resolve a dispute arising under or relating to this Agreement, the prevailing Party may recover such costs and fees.

Governing Law and Venue

This Agreement is governed, construed and interpreted under the laws of the State of Utah. Any suit arising from this Agreement must be brought within the appropriate court in Salt Lake County, Utah.

Governing Document

This Agreement constitutes the entire agreement and understanding of Designer and Client with respect to the terms and conditions of the project and supersedes all prior and contemporaneous written or verbal agreements and understandings between Designer and Client relating to such subject matter. This Agreement may only be amended by a written instrument signed by Designer and Client.

Government Records Access and Management Act

The Client is a governmental entity that is subject to Utah's Government Records Access and Management Act, Utah Code Ann. §§ 63G-2-101 to -901. Any documents produced or collected under this Agreement may be subject to public access. If the Designer believes that a document should be protected under Utah Code Ann. §§ 63G-2-305(1) or (2), the Designer must clearly mark such documents as "Proprietary" or "Confidential" and provide a written claim of business confidentiality to the Client that complies with Utah Code Ann. § 63G-2-309(1). The Designer agrees to cooperate with and to supply any requested records to the Client with any public records request. This obligation will survive any suspension or termination this Agreement.

Laws and Regulations

At all times during this Agreement, the Designer and Client shall comply with all applicable federal, state, and local laws, rules, codes, orders, constitutions and regulations, including, but not limited to, applicable licensure and certification requirements. This includes not discriminating against any individual in an employment decision, including but not limited to hiring, selection of training, promotion, transfer, recruitment, or rates of pay, because of the individual's race, color, sex, age, religion, national origin, disability, pregnancy, familial status, veteran status, genetic information, sexual orientation, or gender identity.

Status Verification

Under the Utah Immigration Accountability and Enforcement Act, Utah Code Ann. §§ 63G-12-101 to -402, any entity physically performing services within Utah for a public employer is required to participate in Utah's Status Verification System. The Designer will provide the Client a certification of its compliance with this requirement prior to performing work under this Agreement.

Time

For the completion of the mural, time is of the essence.

Publicity

The Designer must submit all advertising and publicity matters relating to this Agreement to the Client for its written approval in its sole discretion.

Document Retention

The Designer must retain all working papers, reports, and all necessary records to properly account for Designer’s performance and the payments made by the Client to the Designer under this Agreement. These records shall be retained by Designer for at least five years. The Client may extend the retention period by written notice. The Designer agrees to make all documents related to this Agreement available to the Client or third parties upon the Client’s request.

Insurance

The Designer, at his or her own cost and expense, must secure and maintain Comprehensive General Liability Insurance with the Client as a named insured in the minimum amount of \$1,000,000.00 in the aggregate and \$500,000.00 per occurrence. The policy must provide that coverage will not be canceled or reduced without at least 30 days’ prior written notice to the Client. Certificates evidencing such insurance coverage must be filed with the Client prior to or upon execution of this Agreement.

Successors and Assigns

The provisions of this Agreement will insure to the benefit of and will be binding upon the Client and its successors and assigns.

Counterparts

This Agreement may be executed in more than one counterpart, each of which will be deemed an original, but all of which together will constitute but one and the same instrument. An electronic signature, electronic copy thereof, or a photocopy of this Agreement shall have the same force and effect as the original.

SUBJECT: Discussion Regarding An Ordinance Establishing the Community Clean Energy Program in Midvale

SUBMITTED BY: Dustin Gettel, Mayor

SUMMARY:

Midvale City is a member of the Utah Renewable Communities (URC), a coalition of Utah municipalities and counties working in partnership with Rocky Mountain Power (RMP) to develop and implement the Community Clean Energy Program (CCEP). The goal of the program is to provide a net 100% renewable electricity option for participating communities within the next several years. Midvale joined the URC through an interlocal cooperation agreement in 2024, allowing the City to participate in program design and negotiations with RMP. The Program is authorized under Utah's Community Clean Energy Act, and Rocky Mountain Power filed the Program application on behalf of the URC. Following several years of development and regulatory review, the Utah Public Service Commission (PSC) approved the Program on March 4, 2026.

The Program establishes a new clean energy option (from renewable energy resources) for residents and businesses served by Rocky Mountain Power. Participation is structured as an opt-out program, meaning eligible electric customers within participating communities would be automatically enrolled, with the ability to opt out. The Program includes an initial cancellation period, during which customers may exit the Program without incurring a termination fee. After the cancellation period ends, customers may still opt out at any time; however, a termination fee would apply, as approved by the PSC and outlined in Program rules.

The PSC approved an initial residential flat rate of \$4 per month, which is made up of \$3.88 per month plus a \$0.12 per month low-income program surcharge. For all other (non-residential) customer classes, the PSC approved a volumetric rate of \$0.00609 per kilowatt-hour (kWh) and a \$0.12 per month low-income program surcharge. The low-income surcharge collected from participating residential and non-residential customers helps fund bill credits for income-qualified customers enrolled in Rocky Mountain Power's Home Electric Lifeline Program (HELP). These customers will receive a bill credit equal to the \$3.88 clean energy charge, allowing them to participate in the Program at no cost. Program rates may be adjusted periodically, but no more than annually, consistent with standard utility ratemaking practices. The PSC indicated that rates are not expected to increase significantly over time and may decline as administrative and reserve funds are established.

State law requires that each participating community adopt a local ordinance within ninety (90) days of PSC approval in order to make the Program available within its boundaries. The deadline for ordinance adoption is June 2, 2026. If Midvale City adopts the participation

ordinance, the Program would be implemented locally, with customer notices anticipated in late 2026 and Program charges beginning in early 2027. If the ordinance is not adopted, the Program would not be available in Midvale and the City would no longer participate in the URC.

Staff has prepared a draft ordinance to establish the Community Clean Energy Program in Midvale City for the City Council's consideration. The Council is asked to provide direction to staff on whether to proceed by placing the draft ordinance on the next City Council agenda for formal consideration and possible approval.

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MIDVALE CITY, UTAH ORDINANCE NO. 2026-O-XX

AN ORDINANCE ENACTING MIDVALE MUNICIPAL CODE CHAPTER 13.24 *COMMUNITY CLEAN ENERGY PROGRAM*

WHEREAS, in 2019, the Utah State Legislature enacted House Bill 411, codified at Utah Code Ann. §§ 54-17-901 to 909 (“Act”), titled the “Community Renewable Energy Act”; and

WHEREAS, in 2024, the Utah State Legislature enacted House Bill 241 and Senate Bill 214 which, collectively, renamed the Act the “Community Clean Energy Act” and amended certain provisions of the Act; and

WHEREAS, the Act authorizes the Utah Public Service Commission (“Commission”) to establish a program whereby towns, municipalities, and counties may cooperate with qualified utilities to provide electric energy for participating customers from clean energy resources (“Program”); and

WHEREAS, the Act provides that a customer of a qualified utility may be served by the Program if the town, municipality, or county (“Community”) in which the customer resides satisfies certain requirements, including:

(a) the Community must enter into an agreement with a qualified utility (“Utility Agreement”):

(i) stipulating to the payment to the qualified utility of the costs of:

(A) third-party expertise contracted for by the Division of Public Utilities and the Office of Consumer Services, for assistance with activities associated with initial approval of the Program; and

(B) providing notice to the Community’s customers as provided in the Act;

(ii) determining the obligation for the payment of any termination charges under the Act that are not paid by a participating customer and not included in participating customer rates; and

(iii) identifying any initially proposed replaced asset;

(b) the Community must, within 90 days after the date of the Commission’s order approving the Program, adopt a local ordinance that:

(i) establishes participation in the Program; and

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(ii) is consistent with the terms of the Utility Agreement; and

(c) the Community must comply with any other terms or conditions required by the Commission; and

WHEREAS, the Act further authorizes the Commission to adopt administrative rules to implement the Act and the Commission has adopted such rules as set forth in Utah Administrative Code R746-314-101 through 402 (“Rules”); and

WHEREAS, the Rules require that a customer of a qualified utility may be served by the Program if, in addition to the requirements of the Act, the Community in which the customer resides also adopts an agreement (“Governance Agreement”) with other eligible Communities to establish a cooperative decision-making process for Program design, resource solicitation, resource acquisition, and other Program issues and provides a means of ensuring that eligible Communities and those that become participating Communities will be able to reach a single joint decision on any necessary Program issues; and

WHEREAS, consistent with the requirements of the Rules, Midvale City entered into an agreement with other eligible Communities entitled the Interlocal Cooperation Agreement Among Public Entities Regarding the Community Renewable Energy Program (“Governance Agreement”), thereby becoming a member of the Community Renewable Energy Agency (“Agency”), which endeavors to make certain joint decisions about the proposed Program on behalf of Communities as set forth in the Governance Agreement; and

WHEREAS, consistent with the requirements of the Act, Midvale City executed a Utility Agreement with Rocky Mountain Power, a qualified utility under the Act, on August 20, 2024, which addresses the issues required by the Act; and

WHEREAS, consistent with the requirements of the Act, on January 24, 2025, and June 4, 2025, Rocky Mountain Power filed an application with the Commission seeking approval of the Program and the Commission opened Docket No. 25-035-06 to consider the application; and

WHEREAS, consistent with the requirements of the Act, on March 4, 2026, the Commission issued an order in Docket No. 25-035-06 (“Commission Order”) approving the Program; and

WHEREAS, as contemplated in the Act, the Midvale City Council desires to adopt this ordinance that satisfies the requirements of the Act; and

WHEREAS, the Midvale City Council desires to take actions which it has determined promotes the health, safety and welfare of Midvale’s residents as authorized by Utah Code Ann. §10-8-84; and

WHEREAS, the Midvale City Council has determined that adoption of this ordinance will enhance the economic well-being of Midvale and its residents through prudent management of Midvale’s financial resources; and

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WHEREAS, the Midvale City Council has determined that adoption of this ordinance will help address concerns related to poor air quality and other environmental concerns due in part to the use of fossil fuels; and

WHEREAS, the Midvale City Council finds that energy sources utilized by and within Midvale therefore can impact public health, safety and welfare; and

WHEREAS, recent advances in energy technology have made certain clean energy resources more economically viable than in the past and, in some cases, more cost-effective than traditional energy sources; and

WHEREAS, proximity to outdoor recreation is a key economic contributor to Midvale and one which relies on preservation of the environment and protection of natural resources; and

WHEREAS, Midvale and its residents have shown an interest in environmental stewardship through various initiatives and activities surrounding growth and development; and

WHEREAS, the Midvale City Council believes that determining and undertaking further actions designed to reduce fossil fuel dependence while appropriately balancing financial stewardship and promoting economic growth is an important component of safeguarding public health, safety and welfare; and

WHEREAS, the Midvale City Council met in regular session on May 19, 2026, to, among other things, consider adopting the Program on behalf of Midvale’s electric customers; and

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF MIDVALE CITY, UTAH, AS FOLLOWS:

Section 1. Adoption. Midvale Municipal Code Chapter 13.24 *Community Clean Energy Program*, which is published as a code in book form, is adopted in accordance with Exhibit A herein, copies of which have been filed for use and examination in the Office of the Midvale City Recorder (the “Community Clean Energy Program Ordinance”).

Section 2. Savings Clause. In the event one or more of the provisions of this Community Clean Energy Program Ordinance shall, for any reason, be held to be unenforceable or invalid in any respect under applicable laws, such unenforceability or invalidity shall not affect any other provision; and in such an event, this Community Clean Energy Program Ordinance shall be construed as if such unenforceable or invalid provision had never been contained herein.

Section 3. Effective Date. This Community Clean Energy Program Ordinance shall take effect immediately upon the date of its first publication.

13.24.010 **Definitions.**

For the purpose of this chapter, the following terms, phrases, and words shall mean:

- A. “Act” means the Community Renewable Energy Act, codified at Utah Code Ann. §§54-17-901 to 909, as amended.
- B. “Commission” is the Public Service Commission of Utah or its successor, as provided in Utah Code Ann. § 54-17-902(4), as amended.
- C. “Eligible Customer” is defined in Subsection 13.24.020(C) of this Chapter.
- D. “Program” has the same meaning as the “community clean energy program” defined in Utah Code Ann. § 54-17-902(5), as amended.
- E. “Rules” means the administrative rules adopted by the Commission to implement the Act as set forth in Utah Administrative Code R746-314-101 to 402, as amended.

13.24.020 **Midvale City’s Participation in Community Clean Energy Program**

- A. *Establishment.* Midvale City hereby establishes its participation in the Community Clean Energy Program (“Program”) as approved by the Public Service Commission of Utah.
- B. *Commission Order.* On March 4, 2026, the Commission issued the Commission Order approving the Program. The Commission Order is on file with the Commission. The Program’s rates, Rules, and requirements are governed by the Commission Order, and may be modified from time to time by subsequent Rules and orders adopted by the Commission. To the extent that the Commission Order or any subsequent rule or order adopted by the Commission contradicts any portion of this Title, the Commission Order or rule or order adopted by the Commission shall

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govern.

C. *Eligible Customers.* Pursuant to Utah Code § 54-17-905(5), residential customers participating in the net metering program under Utah Code Title 54, Chapter 15, Net Metering of Electricity, Rocky Mountain Power Schedule 135, are not eligible to participate in the Program. All other retail electric customers of Rocky Mountain Power within the current and future boundaries of the City, including all residential, commercial, and industrial customers, are eligible to participate in the Program (“Eligible Customer”). Eligible Customers include rooftop solar customers on Rocky Mountain Power Schedules 136 and 137, which are compensated through an export credit rather than a net metering credit.

D. *Implementation Date.* The Program shall be implemented on the date that Rocky Mountain Power sends out the first Notices identified in Section 2, below (“Program Implementation Date”). Eligible Customers shall be enrolled in the Program if they receive the Notices and decline to opt out of participation in the Program by the date set forth in the Notices. Consistent with the Act and the Rules, the Notices shall be sent to each Eligible Customer before the commencement date that applies to each such customer (“Customer Commencement Date”), as set forth in the Rules.

13.24.030 Customer Participation in Community Clean Energy Program.

A. *Automatic Enrollment.* Each Eligible Customer shall be automatically enrolled in the Program unless the customer opts out of the Program prior to the Customer Commencement Date.

B. *Notices.* As set forth in the Act and the Rules before any Eligible Customer becomes a participant in the Program, Rocky Mountain Power first shall deliver to each Eligible Customer certain notices (collectively, the “Notices”) containing content and in the form, manner, and delivery method as required by the Act and Rules and other orders and rules.

C. *Opt-Out.* Each Eligible Customer may elect not to participate in the Program and instead to pay applicable existing electric rates by giving notice to Rocky Mountain Power in the manner and within the time period set forth in the Notices.

1. *First Opt-Out Notice.* Rocky Mountain Power shall provide a First Opt-Out Notice, separate from standard monthly bills, to each Eligible Customer within the City, no earlier than 60 days and no later than 30 days before the Customer Commencement Date applicable to each customer. The First Opt-Out Notice shall, in all material respects, use the form and content of the First Opt-Out Notice as approved by the Commission.

2. *Second Opt-Out Notice.* Rocky Mountain Power shall provide a Second Opt-Out Notice, separate from standard monthly bills, to each Eligible Customer within the City, at least 15 days after the First Opt-Out Notice was provided and at least seven days before the Customer Commencement Date applicable to such customer. The Second Opt-Out Notice shall, in all material respects, use the form and content of the Second Opt-Out Notice as approved by the Commission.

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3. *Large Users.* Rocky Mountain Power shall deliver the Notices in person to each customer with an electric load of one megawatt or greater measured at a single meter.

4. *Failure to Opt Out.* Each Eligible Customer that receives the First Opt-Out Notice and the Second Opt-Out Notice as described herein and declines to opt out of the Program by the customer's Customer Commencement Date will be enrolled in the Program.

D. *Option to Opt into Program.* An Eligible Customer located within the City that is not enrolled in the Program may at any time elect to participate in the Program by providing notice to Rocky Mountain Power in the form and content approved by the Commission. Following such notice to opt in to the Program, the customer will be enrolled in the Program starting with the billing period following the notice in which it is reasonably practicable for Rocky Mountain Power to enroll such customer. The reasonably practicable billing period shall be based on when the notice was received from the customer and the customer's billing cycle. Following enrollment in the Program, the customer shall be subject to all Program requirements.

E. *Option to Exit Program.* Customers enrolled in the Program may exit the Program by giving notice to Rocky Mountain Power.

13.24.040 Termination Fees.

A. *Termination Fee Upon Exit.* If a customer declines to opt out of the Program prior to the applicable Customer Commencement Date or voluntarily opts into the Program, but subsequently exits the Program, the exiting customer may be required to pay a termination fee, as set forth in this Section.

B. *Amount of Termination Fee.* When applicable, the amount of the termination fee shall be based on the rate schedule of the exiting customer as approved by the Commission and may be modified from time to time by subsequent orders of the Commission.

C. *Circumstances in which Termination Fee Shall Not Apply:* A termination fee shall not apply in the following circumstances:

1. Any customer that opts out of the Program within the "cancellation period" applicable to that customer, as defined in the Rules;
2. Any customer that ceases to be an electric customer of Rocky Mountain Power;
3. Any customer that moves to a new location that is not within the boundaries of a community that participates in the Program;
4. Any customer that seeks protection through bankruptcy proceedings; or
5. Any customer enrolled in Schedule 3 bill assistance ("Low-Income Lifeline Program").

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13.24.050 Acquisition of Clean Energy Resources.

- A. For purposes of this section, “clean energy resource” shall have the definition set forth in the Act.
- B. Rocky Mountain Power may adopt or procure one or more clean energy resources to serve the needs and goals of the Program. The acquisition of any such clean energy resource must follow solicitation application and evaluation criteria approved by the Commission.
- C. Any clean energy resource adopted or procured by Rocky Mountain Power to serve the needs and goals of the Program must be approved by the Commission based on a finding the same is reasonable and in the public interest.
- D. The Commission shall determine the method of cost recovery for any clean energy resource acquired to meet Program needs and goals, and the Commission’s determination regarding cost recovery may affect Program rates.

13.24.060 Program Rates and Rate Adjustment Filings.

- A. Program rates will be determined by the Commission.
- B. The initial Program rates were determined by the Commission in the Commission Order.
- C. Program rates may be adjusted by the Commission from time to time, consistent with the procedures approved by the Commission for adjusting Program rates.

13.24.070 Utility Billing for Participating Customers.

Rocky Mountain Power shall bill each Participating Customer on a monthly basis and shall:

- A. include information in its monthly bills to participating customers identifying the Program cost; and
- B. provide notice to participating customers of any change in rates for participation in the Program.

13.24.080 Midvale City Participation in Program.

- A. *Program Participation.* Through its membership in the Community Renewable Energy Agency, the City participated in the design and approval of the Program and shall participate in future decisions regarding clean energy resource solicitation, clean energy resource acquisition,

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and certain other Program issues.

B. *Utility Agreement.* Consistent with Utah Code § 54-17-903(2)(a), the City entered into an agreement with Rocky Mountain Power regarding the facilitation of the Program (“Utility Agreement”). Pursuant to the Utility Agreement:

1. The City shall pay for the costs of third-party expertise contracted for in connection with the Program’s development and initial approval by the Commission;
2. The City shall pay its proportional costs associated with Rocky Mountain Power providing the Notices to the City’s customers as discussed in Section 13.24.030;
3. Termination charges not paid by a participating customer shall be included in participating customer rates and shall not be paid by the City;
4. There shall be no initially proposed “Replaced Asset” as that term is defined by Utah Code § 54-17-902(15).

C. *Program Development Costs.* The City has already approved the appropriation of funds and has already paid those funds to the Community Renewable Energy Agency for the Community Renewable Energy Agency to make payments for the costs of third-party expertise contracted for in connection with the Program’s development and initial approval by the Commission pursuant to the Governance Agreement.

D. *Noticing Costs.* The City has appropriated funds in its tentative budget for the upcoming fiscal year to pay its proportional costs associated with Rocky Mountain Power providing the Notices to the City’s customers as discussed in Section 13.24.030 above.

E. *No Other Program Costs.* The City shall not be obligated to pay any costs of the Program other than those costs set forth herein and any costs that the City may bear as a utility customer that participates in the Program, if applicable.

SUMMARY:

During the 2026 Utah Legislative Session, HB 236 – Truth-in-Taxation Amendments was enacted, making several changes to Utah Code § 59-2-919 and 59-2-924, which govern notice, disclosure, and public hearing requirements when a tentative budget includes a proposed property tax rate increase, including municipal property tax increases. These provisions are intended to promote transparency and ensure the public is provided clear information regarding the potential impacts of a proposed tax rate prior to final budget and tax rate adoption. Accordingly, the City is required to prepare and present a Property Tax Impact Schedule that illustrates the estimated effect of the proposed tax rate on typical residential and non-residential properties and present and make it available to the public separate from other budget documents.

The Property Tax Impact Statement is included on this agenda as a discussion item to satisfy the statutory requirement that it be presented at any meeting where the budget is discussed. Its inclusion ensures compliance with state law and provides an opportunity for the City Council and the public to review and understand the projected impacts of the proposed tax rate.

The Property Tax Impact Schedule was adopted by the Midvale City Council on May 5, 2026. This action does not finalize the property tax rate. Final consideration and adoption of the property tax rate will occur following the required public hearing and completion of all applicable notice and review periods.

PLAN COMPLIANCE: N/A

FISCAL IMPACT:

Adoption of the Property Tax Impact Schedule itself does not have a direct fiscal impact. The schedule is a disclosure document that illustrates the estimated effect of a proposed property tax rate increase. Any actual fiscal impact will be determined by the final property tax rate adopted by the City Council as part of the final budget process.

Midvale City is considering an increase to the Public Safety Property Tax rate from 0.000249 to an estimated 0.000474, which is projected to generate approximately \$848,964 in additional annual revenue. The information provided below is intended to help decision makers and members of the public understand how City operations—particularly public safety services—would be affected if the proposed property tax increase is adopted.

The estimates are based on tax year 2025 taxable values, including Midvale City’s total taxable value of \$3,777,880,327 and an average residential property value of \$492,000. These figures are estimates and will be updated once tax year 2026 property valuation data becomes available from the Utah State Tax Commission and the Salt Lake County Auditor.

Impact of Tax Increase:

If the proposed tax increase is approved, the City will be able to maintain current levels of service with its contracted public safety providers, including policing services provided by

the Unified Police Department, emergency management services provided by the Unified Fire Authority, and animal control services provided by Salt Lake County. The proposed increase will also help offset an anticipated loss of approximately \$500,000 in state homeless shelter mitigation funding.

If the proposed tax increase is not approved, the City would be required to reduce contractual public safety services. These reductions would include the elimination of two shelter resource officers and one patrol officer previously funded through the homeless shelter mitigation program, as well as the loss of one investigations officer and one patrol officer within the Midvale precinct of the Unified Police Department that are not associated with homeless mitigation funding. In addition, the City would be required to discontinue emergency management services provided by the Unified Fire Authority.
