MEETING MINUTES:

(0:00) The meeting was called to order with a quorum present both in person and online.

(0:40) New Commissioner Introduction: Greg Jensen was introduced as a new commissioner representing Sevier County (currently in his fourth year, running unopposed for a second term, and a local independent insurance agency owner.

(1:10) Kate Bradshaw made the motion to approve the minutes from the previous November 2025 meeting and they officially approved via a unanimous vote.

(1:40) Recreation Participation Trend Study Update

Presenters: Jeremy Sage and Jake Jorgensson (RRC)

- **About RRC:** A 40-year-old outdoor recreation and social science market research firm that works extensively across Utah and nationally.
- **Study Motivation:** To understand the vital role of outdoor recreation in Utah's economy and track shifting participation patterns (e.g., e-biking trends, post-pandemic behavior shifts, population growth) using a data-driven framework.
- **Key Goals:** Identify emerging trends, assess economic/social/health impacts, improve community quality of life, and deliver actionable recommendations for local counties.
- **Standardized Data Framework:** Integrating administrative data from various land management entities (National Park Service, Forest Service, BLM, State Parks) into a centralized, apples-to-apples Utah Recreation Data Repository.
- **(10:30) Case Studies / Pilot Sites:** Five diverse sites will be piloted starting late May/early June through fall 2026 to capture data via trail/parking counters, intercept-based on-site surveys (10-day windows), and anonymous mobile location data:
 1. *Valley of the Gods:* Remote, motorized use landscape (Late May/Early June).
 2. *Sand Hollow Reservoir:* High-demand, motorized/non-motorized water-use site (June).
 3. *Hole in the Rock Road:* Medium-demand, mixed-use access corridor (Early Fall).
 4. *Pahvant Trail System:* Destination non-motorized biking trail network (Late Summer/Early Fall).
 5. *Guardzman Pass:* High-demand, multi-use alpine recreation space (Fall/Leaf-peeping season).
- **Resident and Visitor Surveys:** Launching a panel-based online survey targeting Utah residents and visitors from the past two years to gauge behavioral perspectives and displacement patterns (e.g., how overcrowding impacts spillover behavior).

- **(21:04)** Commissioner Natalie Randall (Utah Office of Tourism) asked about forward-facing predictive forecasting. RRC noted that categorizing sites by supply/demand helps predict future infrastructure impacts. Commissioner Jerry Taylor (Garfield County) asked about tracking data on Hole in the Rock Road; RRC explained they use roaming physical surveyors with tablets, QR codes on trail signage, and seasonal cell phone data mapping.

(25:37) Legislative Session Update

Presenter: Director Jason Curry (Division of Outdoor Recreation)

- **HB 12 (Outdoor Recreation Accessibility Amendments):** Broadens the definition of "infrastructure" in grant eligibility to include adaptive equipment (e.g., specialized access chairs for the adaptive community).
- **HB 30 (Wildlife Management Area Recreation):** Establishes a cooperative process/mechanism for non-hunting/fishing recreators (mountain bikers, trail runners) to utilize and monetarily contribute to WMAs.
- **HB 54 (Boating Amendments):** Establishes a mandatory annual boating safety education course regarding right-of-way, speed, and buoy rules. Features a "test out" option to minimize time.
- **(30:16) HB 381 (Electric Bicycle Amendments):** Clarifies rules surrounding personal electric vehicles, safety structures, and younger riders.
 - Directs the Department of Public Safety (DPS) to build an online safety course for ages 8–15. Allows independent riding on public roads for ages 8–15 with a certificate (or supervised without one). Requires helmets for riders under 21 on public roads (fines capped at \$25).
 - Bill took effect May 6th, though the final course deadline is May 5th, 2027.
- **HB 567 (Outdoor Recreation Infrastructure Grant Program):** Broadened infrastructure definitions to allow grant funding for harmful algae bloom mitigation treatments (e.g., projects funded at Willard and Mantua).

(40:38) Outdoor Recreation Initiative (ORI) Program

Presenter: Patrick Morrison (Division of Outdoor Recreation)

- **2025 Recap:** Received 51 project submissions across 5 regions requesting \$55 million. Ultimately awarded \$21 million to 38 projects across the Wasatch Front, Southwest, Central, Eastern, and Northern regions.

- **Meeting Restructuring:** Based on past feedback, the program is pivoting away from 2-hour monthly virtual meetings. Instead, they will shift to long-form, 4-to-5-hour in-person regional visioning workshops in June to identify funding priorities, an optional mid-summer site visit, and an in-person ranking meeting in October.
- **Timeline Reminder:** Project approvals are slated for the Commission meeting on November 16th, 2026.

(49:20) Outdoor Recreation Planning Assistance (ORPA) & Regional Planning

Presenter: Emily Meadows (Division of Outdoor Recreation)

- **ORPA Success:** The program helps understaffed or rural communities boost recreation planning capacity. The last cycle awarded \$1.5 million across 21 applications. Funding has increased to \$2.5 million for the current cycle (which closes mid-May with 60 drafts in progress).
- Actively drafting a statewide *Trails Planning and Design Handbook* with SE Group.
- **Long-Range Planning:** Currently piloting a 10-to-15-year regional recreation master plan in the Central Region (garnered 1,500+ survey responses, 6 county stakeholder meetings, and detailed mapping assets). Northern and Southwest regional plans will kick off this year, with a goal to have the entire state mapped by 2028.

(59:51) Northwash Boat Ramp Funding Request

Presenter: Carly Lansche (Division of Outdoor Recreation)

- **Project Context:** Located at Cataract Canyon takeout. A critical regional asset being safely upgraded via partnerships with Glen Canyon, Jones & DeMille Engineering, and Brown Brothers Construction. It will allow the National Ability Center to bring back adaptive programming for veterans and mobility-limited groups.
- **The Request:** An additional funding request of \$140,200 to cover project cost overruns due to high freight costs for non-local materials (articulating concrete block mats) and extra site safety additions (jersey barriers). The funding will be drawn from prior fiscal year rollover funds.

(1:12:34) Kate Bradshaw made the motion to fund the additional request, it was seconded, and passed unanimously.

- *Note:* Ribbon cutting is scheduled for June 4th.

(1:13:49) Mud Springs Trail System Phase 2 Scope Change

Presenters: Commissioner Lori Maughan & Bill Winfield

- **Project Context:** A highly active mountain biking network spanning Grand and San Juan Counties that hosts NIAA high school racing events drawing 5,000 to 10,000 visitors.
- **The Request:** A request to adjust the scope of work to redirect already-approved Phase 2 trail expansion funds toward critical infrastructure: building a brand new, safer access road and preparing a 15-acre parking lot subbase. This moves the ingress point further down the highway to prevent a dangerous traffic backup criticized by UDOT.

(1:25:55) Motion: Motion made by Natalie Randall, seconded by Jerry Taylor, and passed unanimously.

(1:26:40) Closing Remarks

- **Next Meeting:** Scheduled for Monday, November 16th, 2026, from 2:00 to 5:00 PM for official ORI project approvals.
