RE: Salt Lake County Health Department Fee Schedule Change Proposal and 2027 Budget Fee Revenues Projection

SUMMARY

Salt Lake County Health Department (SLCoHD) has completed its fee schedule review process to address the rising costs of services and to update the fee schedule due to changes in regulations and rules, and program services. The proposed schedule will be used to adjust the overall fee revenues projection and inform the 2027 Fall budget process.

The fees subject to this review are categorized into two main areas relating to the environmental health services and clinical health services. SLCoHD needs approval from the Board of Health and the County Council. This proposal has been reviewed by RRC on August 14, 2026.

ANALYSIS METHODOLOGY

Generally speaking, the rate structure for fees is based on the following definition with a few exceptions, such as the landfills' tonnage fees and others.

- **Rate Structure:** The cost of each service is calculated by multiplying the time required to perform the service by a full-cost hourly rate, which includes indirect costs. Projected revenue is then determined by applying this rate to the expected number of service units, based on the prior year's actual volume and adjusted to reflect anticipated trends in future years.
- **Benchmarking:** A fee comparison with applicable national or/and neighboring counties was conducted. The necessary adjustments are made to the full cost rate to stay marketable, competitive, and affordable to the public.
- **Industries outreach:** The proposed fees are shared with industry representatives, including key contacts in professional organizations, licensing boards and certified operators. Programs with a very large volume of permit holders make it unfeasible to contact every operator. In these cases, we select a representative number of both large and small businesses to contact. We also inform customers about the proposed fee changes when interacting with them during inspections, and when in the office or on the phone.

2027 FALL BUDGET FEE REVENUES PROJECTION

The table below summarizes fee revenue trends from 2019 onward. The 2027 Fall Budget projection, based on the proposed new fee schedule, reflects a net increase of \$391K compared to the 2026 budgeted fee revenues. This projection includes an anticipated \$1.65M increase in EHS fee revenues and a projected \$1.26M reduction in Immunization revenues.

FINAL NOTES

The Health Department's current practice is to review its fee schedule at least every three years. Maintaining an accurate fee structure has become increasingly challenging due to the many variables that influence fee revenue projections, including rising service delivery costs and shifting service demands. Environmental Health services continue to grow, while Immunization services appear to be returning to pre-COVID levels.

As the local public health authority, the Health Department remains committed to providing essential public health services while exercising strong fiscal responsibility. At the same time, we strive to ensure that fees do not create barriers for the public to accessing needed services.

To uphold these commitments, the Department will continue conducting regular fee schedule reviews and closely monitor fees charged by partner agencies. Through ongoing communication and collaboration, we work as a system to identify gaps, maintain service continuity, and ensure community access to public health protections.

Air Quality – Vehicle Emissions Control Program Fees

- I/M Station Plan Review Fee
 - \$50 to \$60, 20% Increase.
 - I/M Stations are required to submit properly prepared plans and specifications for review and approval prior to the start of construction, change of business type, or remodeling. These facilities have design and operational requirements that must be approved before operation including review of physical facilities, emissions analyzer equipment and instruments, operators and personnel, and inspection and maintenance procedures. This proposed fee will recover costs associated with plan reviews and includes time spent processing applications, reviewing facility and operational plans, and conducting pre-operational inspections.
- Annual I/M Station Permit Fee
 - \$190 to \$220, 16% Increase.
 - An I/M station is a business that provides vehicle emissions testing services.
 - Fees are based on time to conduct services including renewing permits, conducting vehicle emissions audits, educating operators, and responding to complaints.
- Inspector Certification Exam and Certification Course Fee
 - \$155 to \$175, 13% Increase.
 - This fee covers costs to administer an I/M inspector online training and certification course that includes a proficiency exam and in-person practicum.
 - The Health Department certifies individuals as I/M Inspectors to conduct vehicle emissions testing, inspection and maintenance procedures. An inspector exam and coursework must be

passed as part of a Department approved Inspector Training Course and to receive an Inspector Certificate of Qualification.

- Fees are based on time to conduct services including processing payments for the course and exam, scheduling courses, providing course materials, maintaining records, teaching the course and proctoring the exam.
- Currently this service is contracted through Salt Lake Community College (SLCC). If the contract ends, we will conduct this service internally. See I/M Inspector Certification Fee, Teir 1 and Teir 2 for SLCC contracted rates.

➤ Annual Fee for an Inspector's Certificate of Qualification Fee

- \$20 to \$25, 25% Increase.
- This fee is assessed to I/M Inspectors annually and who qualify to renew an Inspector Certificate of Qualification.
- Fees are based on the time to process certificate renewal applications and fees, review qualifications, and issue an annual certificate.

Chemically Contaminated Properties (Meth) Program Fees

➤ Chemically Contaminated Management Fee

- \$400 to \$860, 115% Increase.
- This fee was set by the Local Health Officers as a uniform fee across all local health agencies in Utah. It was recently agreed by the Local Health Officers (Utah Association of Local Health Departments) that the fee no longer needs to be uniform, and the respective jurisdictions should charge a fee that recovers their program expenses. Current program costs for our agency to provide this service are \$860.
- This fee is assessed to individuals and businesses involved in the decontamination of chemically contaminated properties, primarily methamphetamine contamination, but also includes other chemical contamination.
- Fees are based on the time to review properly prepared plans and specifications submitted by Certified Decontamination Specialists and includes costs for plan review and approval prior decontamination activities, review of decontamination and sampling design and operational requirements, confirmation sampling and inspection, processing applications and payments and issuing permits.
- We are proposing this fee be implemented in 2 tiers to lessen the impact to industry. Tier 1 to be implemented January 1, 2027 amounts to $\$230 + \$400 = \$630$. Tier 2 to be implemented January 1, 2028 amounts to $\$630 + \$230 = \$860$.

Community Noise Pollution Control Program Fees

➤ Temporary Noise Permit Fee

- \$230 to \$260, 13% Increase.
- This fee is assessed to individuals and businesses that apply for a temporary noise permit. The Health Department may issue a temporary noise permit based on undue hardship or a temporary event and may prescribe reasonable conditions or requirements upon a permit deemed necessary to minimize adverse health effects upon a community or the surrounding neighborhood. The Health Department has discretion to waive the fee for governmental agencies, departments or municipalities provided compliance with all other noise regulation provisions are met.

- This fee is based on time to process permit applications and payments, review plans and specifications, consultation with other involved government officials, contractors and involved parties and conduct site inspections.

➤ Temporary Noise Permit Late Application Fee

- \$115 to \$130, 13% Increase.
- This fee is assessed to noise permit applicants who fail to give at least ten (10) day notice to the Health Department of their intent to obtain a permit. The rate for calculating this late fee is 0.5 times the cost of the permit fee to serve as a deterrent for a significant increase in temporary noise permit applications. In 2025 we had 462 noise permit applications of which 186 were late submittals. Many permits are issued for construction activities. We have also seen a significant increase in late applications and believe this is warranted to recover costs and serve as a deterrent for untimely submittals.
- This fee is based on time to expedite and process late applications and payments, and to reprioritize other pending applications and permits.
- No other counties in Utah have a Temporary Noise Permit Fee.

Electric Vehicle Charger Fees (NEW)

➤ EV Charger Fee

- \$0.13/kWh for Type 2 Chargers
- \$0.41/kWh for Type 3 Chargers
- In 2018 the Environmental Health Division applied for and received the Volkswagen Settlement Grant through the Utah Department of Environmental Quality grant which allowed for the installation of electric vehicle servicing equipment (EV chargers) at our Environmental Health Building. The EV charges have been used by the Environmental Health fleet and also the community. The condition of the grant required all EV chargers to remain available 24/7 to the public for a period of 5 years. That condition expired in November, 2025. This fee is designed to recover the cost of operating expenses including power, network, warranty, and servicing vendor expenses. There is also a 12.5% State tax for EV charging on the total retail sale of electricity at public charging stations. There is also a proposed Idle Fee to be applied after 60 minutes for a Type 2 charger of a vehicle reaching full charge, and after 30 minutes for a Type 2 charger. This is designed to prevent charging abuse and incentivize responsible use of public EV chargers. In 2025 it cost the Department \$44,522.76 to provide EV charging to the public.
- Providing free EV charging power to the public is not sustainable. The proposed fees are in alignment with other municipalities and government agencies and are designed to recover costs. The proposed fee amounts are only for the Environmental Health Building located in Murray City and serviced by Murray City Power. We are proposing the fee structure be approved, rather than a set fee amount, so it may be updated in real time as power rates change, and as network, warranty and vendor fees change. In principle, this same fee structure may be applied to other facilities, EV charging vendors and power service providers utilized by the Health Department and other Salt Lake County agencies.

Food Protection Program Fees

➤ Agritourism Food Establishment Permit Fee

- \$350 to \$400, 14% Increase

- An agritourism food establishment is a non-commercial kitchen facility where food is handled, stored or prepared to be offered for sale on a farm in connection with an agriculture tourism activity.
- This is an annual fee based on time to process applications and payments, issue permits, review menus and food processes, conduct risk assessments, perform inspections, investigate complaints, and perform disease investigations and epidemiological surveillance.
- There are limited opportunities for agritourism in Salt Lake County. Currently, we do not have any applicants. Statute mandates local health departments regulate such industries where they exist.

➤ Food Establishment Permit Fees (by Risk Level)

- Risk Level 1: \$275 to \$310, 13% Increase.
- Risk Level 2: \$405 to \$455, 12% Increase.
- Risk Level 3: \$555 to \$625, 13% Increase.
- Risk Level 4: \$770 to \$875, 14 % increase.
- Fees are based on time to process applications and payments, issue permits, review menus and food processes, conduct risk assessments, perform inspections, investigate complaints, and perform disease investigations and epidemiological surveillance. The increase in fees reflects increased cost of providing services.
- This program has comparable fees within Utah and among other states.

➤ Food Establishment Permit Fee Risk Level 5 (Enforcement Level) NEW

- \$1180
- This fee is for a newly added risk level in the food program's risk-based system. Risk level 5 is a category for food establishments that have their permit suspended due to imminent health hazards and require additional annual inspections.

➤ Food Establishment Permit Reinstatement Fee (NEW)

- \$190
- This fee is to cover costs to develop risk control plans and conduct enforcement meetings with each establishment owner whose permit has been suspended due to imminent health hazards.

➤ Food Establishment Plan Review Fees (by Risk Level)

- Risk Level 1 \$580 to \$660, 14% Increase.
- Risk Level 2 \$870 to \$990, 14% Increase.
- Risk Level 3 \$1140 to \$1295, 14% Increase.
- Risk Level 4 \$1345 to \$1535, 14% Increase.
- Fees are based on time to process applications and payments, review plans and specifications, food processes and menus and to conduct construction and pre-operational inspections.

➤ Food Establishment Plan Review Late Submission Fees (by Risk Level) NEW

- Risk Level 1 \$330.
- Risk Level 2 \$495.
- Risk Level 3 \$650.
- Risk Level 4 \$770.

- This fee is assessed to food establishment plan review applicants who fail to submit plans prior to food establishment construction. This fee serves as a deterrent to owners, operators, and builders of food establishments who construct a food establishment without first completing a plan review with the Department. Food Establishments that are built without a plan review often have deficiencies that cause extra inspections and extra supervisory time.

➤ Food Establishment Failed Inspection/Follow-up Inspection Fee

- \$155 to \$175, 13% Increase.
- The increase in fees reflects cost of providing services.
- This fee is charged to the owner, permit holder or other person in charge of a food establishment when conditions found during an inspection are substandard and require a follow-up inspection to ensure compliance.

➤ HACCP (Hazard Analysis & Critical Control Point) Services Fee

- HACCP Food Process Plan Review \$640 to \$730, 14% Increase.
- HACCP Food Process Renewal NEW.
 - \$175
 - HACCP plans are required for very high-risk food items and technical preparation and storage practices to prevent foodborne illness and death. This fee covers the onsite HACCP inspection conducted by the inspector once per year during a routine visit and takes extra time to review and inspect.
- HACCP Plan Dog Patio Annual Renewal (Variance Certificate) \$145 to \$165, 14% Increase.
- The fees reflect time to review and approve HACCP plans. Most of our HACCP plans reviews are associated with the Health Departments “Paws on the Patio” initiative, which are variances from Health Regulation to allow dogs on a food establishment patio given specific requirements.
- HACCP Plan Review fees are not charged in many counties or peer jurisdictions.

➤ Ownership Change / New Permit Inspection Fee

- \$260 to \$295, 13% Increase.
- This fee recovers costs for conducting walk-through inspections for prospective businesses and individuals seeking to purchase a food establishment. When a restaurant owner sells their business to another party, the health department is required to conduct an inspection to ensure that the establishment meets the current health standards. The cost of performing this inspection is not included in the annual permit fee.
- The Department is required to conduct ownership change services when the permit holder changes, even if the establishment ownership does not change.

➤ Microenterprise Home Kitchen Fees

- Microenterprise Kitchen New Permit \$350 to \$400, 14% Increase
- Microenterprise Kitchen Permit Renewal \$95 to \$165, 74% Increase
- The significant increase in the fee amount is due to increased time required to inspect, consult and bring into compliance microenterprise kitchen practices that evolve beyond the statutory limitations of home kitchen food service operations.
- A microenterprise home kitchen means a non-commercial kitchen facility located in a private home and operated by a resident of the home where ready-to-eat food is handled, stored, prepared, or offered for sale.

- The Microenterprise Home Kitchen Act is the result of legislation in 2021. The law requires microenterprise home kitchen operations to be permitted by the local health department without having to meet all food safety requirements of commercial food service operations.

➤ Food - Residential Care Facility Inspection Fee

- \$115 to \$130, 13% Increase
- State Rule includes both childcare and adult care facilities require a basic food safety inspection. This is a one-time fee paid only upon application.
- The Rule requires local health departments to inspect the food service operations only as a condition of State licensure, certification or registration.

➤ Mobile Food (Includes Food Cart & Food Truck Permits and Plan Review Fees (by Risk Level)

- Food Establishment Plan Review Mobile Food Cart, Truck, Trailer: \$625 to \$860, 14% Increase
- Food Cart Risk Level 1: \$230 to \$285, 24% Increase.
- Food Cart Risk Level 2: \$275 to \$335, 22% Increase.
- Food Cart Risk Level 3: \$385 to \$460, 19% Increase.
- Primary Food Truck Tier 1: \$350 no change (set by State Rule)
- Primary Food Truck Tier 2: \$500 no change (set by State Rule)
- Fees are based on time to process applications and payments, issue permits, review menus and food processes, conduct risk assessments and perform field inspections, investigate complaints, and perform disease investigations and epidemiological surveillance. Food Cart Fees are decreasing. About 10 years ago, Food Protection began requiring food carts to upgrade plumbing systems to be more reliable. Gravity fed water systems were replaced with manufactured tanks with instant heaters and pumps. All food carts were required to come to Environmental Health each year for an inspection to verify that their systems had been upgraded and were working properly. Now nearly all food carts meet the requirements, and this inspection is no longer necessary. This is an improvement on service efficiency and requires less time for operators and staff. The number of inspections per year was reduced resulting in a decrease in fees.
- Food Truck fees are set in State Rule and in agreement with State and local health departments.
- The number of annual inspections for mobile food operations is greater than the number of inspections for fixed food operations due to an increased inherent risk of mobile food operations. Mobile food risk increases with complexity of menu, equipment and capacity limitations, and transportation requiring more frequent inspections and monitoring of safe food operations.

➤ Temporary Food Establishment Permit Fee (by Risk Level and Operating Days)

- Low Risk Seasonal Temp Food Permit \$330 to \$390, 18% Increase.
- Low Risk One Day Temp Food Permit \$70 to \$85, 21% Increase.
- Low Risk Three Day Temp Food Permit \$90 to \$110, 22% Increase.
- Low Risk Extended Fourteen Day Temp Food Permit \$330 to \$390, 18% Increase.
- High Risk Seasonal Temp Food Permit \$455 to \$535, 18% Increase.
- High Risk One Day Temp Food Permit \$115 to \$130, 13% increase.
- High-Risk Three-Day Temp Food Permit \$145 to \$165, 14% Increase.
- High Risk Extended Fourteen Day Temp Food Permit \$445 to \$520, 17% Increase.
- Temporary Food Late Application \$50 to \$60, 20% Increase.
- Temporary Food Late Notification (Extended Fourteen Day) \$50 to \$60, 20% Increase.

- Fees are based on time to process applications and permits, issue permits, review menus and event plans, conduct risk assessments and field inspections, investigate complaints, and perform disease investigations and epidemiological surveillance.
- Late Application fee is charged when an operator applies 7 or fewer calendar days before the event.
- Late Notification fee is charged to an Extended Fourteen Day Temporary Food Establishment permit holder who fails to give at least 7 days' notice of their intent to operate at an event.

➤ Food Event Coordinator Permit Fee, 5-10 Food Venders NEW

- \$155

➤ Food Event Coordinator Permit Fee, 11+ Food Venders NEW

- \$200
- These new fees are associated with a proposed permit type in Health Regulation #5 - *Food Service* to cover program costs to review regulations and permits with organizers of food events that occur in venues that do not require a Temporary Mass Gathering (TMG) permit. This fee and permit will hold food event coordinators responsible for compliance with health Department regulations and requirements.

➤ Temporary Mass Gathering Permit Fees (By # of People)

- # People 2-999, \$350 to \$400, 14% Increase
- # People 1,000-4,999, \$500 to \$565, 13% Increase
- # People 5,000-9,999, \$620 to \$705, 14% Increase
- # People 10,000+, \$705 to \$800, 13% Increase
- Application Late Fee \$240 to \$270, 13% Increase
- Temporary mass gathering events are an assembly of 500 or more people which continue for two or more hours per day in a venue that lacks facilities to manage large crowds safely. Fees are assessed to individuals, businesses and organizations that organize temporary mass gathering events. Examples include marathon races, holiday gatherings, parades, etc.
- Fees are based on time to conduct services including processing applications and payments, issuing permits, reviewing mass gathering event plans and specifications, consultation with event organizers and municipal officials and conducting field inspections.
- Application Late Fee is applied to an applicant that fails to apply for a mass gathering event at least 30 days prior to the event.
- Events are screened and prioritized by risk, size of the event, and volume of events.

Household Hazardous Waste (HHW) Program Fee

➤ Very Small Quantity Generator (VSQG) Fee

- \$0.50 per lb. to \$0.57 per lb., 14% Increase.
- The U.S. Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) has defined a hazardous waste generator as any person who produces a hazardous waste as listed or characterized in Title 40 CFR Part 261. Furthermore, the EPA has established three categories of generators based on volume of hazardous waste generated. The HHW program accepts qualifying hazardous waste generated by Very Small Quantity Generators (VSQG), which is any person that generates 100 kilograms (220 lbs.) or less per month of hazardous waste, or 1 kilogram (2.2 lbs.) or less per month of acutely hazardous waste.

- This fee covers the cost of expenses for HHW and administrative staff time spent processing HHW VSQG waste, managing accounts/receivable, payments, billing and collections. The following was used to determine the average employee hourly processing rate. The hourly Environmental Health Division rate is used in conjunction with the average hourly processing rate to determine the HHW, VSQG disposal rate per pound. This rate is added to the current State contract to determine the total cost for VSQG disposal by waste type.
- The rate increased significantly due to increased costs of disposal and inclusion of operating expenses for this specific type of business generated waste.

Personal Services Program Fees (includes Body Art, Cosmetology, Massage Therapy, Tanning and Public Lodging Facilities)

➤ Body Art Facility Plan Review & Initial Permit Fee

- \$275 to \$285 +\$25/station, 4% Increase.
- Body art facilities are required to submit properly prepared plans and specifications for review and approval prior to the start of construction, change of business type, or remodeling. These facilities have design and operational requirements that must be approved before operation including review of physical facilities, cleaning and maintenance, equipment and instruments, operators and personnel, patron forms and records, and body art procedures.
- This fee covers costs associated with plan reviews and includes time spent processing applications, reviewing facility and operational plans, and conducting construction and pre-operational inspections.

➤ Body Art Facility Permit Fee

- Annual Permit (includes 1 workstation) \$255 to \$260, 2% Increase.
- Each Additional Workstation is \$20 to \$25, 25% Increase.
- Fees are based on time to conduct services including renewing permits, conducting annual inspections, educating operators, and responding to complaints. A facility station is a designated patron/operator space equipped with instrumentation and facilities for conducting an individual personal service.

➤ Temporary Body Art Facility Permit Fee

- \$90 to \$130, 4% Increase.
- A Temporary Body Art Permit is valid for up to seven days.
- Operators with a valid Body Art Facility Permit are not required to obtain a Temporary Body Art Permit to participate in events outside of their permitted facility. This permit provides Health Department regulatory oversight, and a means, for body art operators to conduct business and participate in temporary events in Salt Lake County. An example is the annual Salt Lake International Tattoo Convention with 80-100 participating vendors performing body art during a three-day event.

➤ Body Art Facility Follow-Up Inspection Fee

- \$155 to \$155, No change
- This fee is charged to the owner of a body art facility when conditions found during an inspection require a follow-up inspection to ensure compliance.

➤ Body Art Coordinator/Event Permit Fee NEW

- \$495.

- This fee is proposed to cover program costs to review regulations and permits with organizers of temporary body art events. This fee and permit will hold body art event coordinators responsible for compliance with health Department regulations and requirements.

➤ Cosmetology Facility Plan Review & Initial Permit Fee

- \$275 to \$305, 11% Increase.
- Cosmetology facilities are required to submit properly prepared plans and specifications for review and approval prior to the start of construction, change of business type, or remodeling. These facilities have design and operational requirements that must be approved before operation including review of physical facilities, cleaning and maintenance, equipment and instruments, operators and personnel, patron forms and records, and body art procedures.
- This fee covers costs associated with plan reviews and includes time spent processing applications, reviewing facility and operational plans, and conducting construction and pre-operational inspections.

➤ Cosmetology Facility Permit Fee

- Annual Permit (includes 1 workstation) \$220 to \$250, 14% Increase.
- Each Additional Workstation \$20 to \$25, 25% Increase.
- This industry is continually evolving and using new techniques and products that increase the risk to public health, including permanent cosmetics, micro-blading, use of strong glues and adhesives for nails and eye lashes, use of volatile organic compounds for hair styling, manicures and pedicures, patron complaints of nail infections, improper use of sanitizers, increased need for sterilization and sanitization of instruments and equipment. Also, many cosmetology facilities hold multiple health permits in one establishment such as Body Art and Massage Therapy permits, both of which have annual permit inspections and reviews. It's more efficient for the program and more helpful to the operator to have all facility permits inspected at the same time, rather than split annual and biannual inspections.
- Fees are based on time to conduct services including processing payments and applications, issuing permits, conducting annual inspections, educating operators, and responding to complaints.
- A facility station is a designated patron/operator space equipped with instrumentation and facilities for conducting an individual personal service.

➤ Temporary Cosmetology Facility Permit Fee

- \$110 to \$120, 9% Increase (+\$25/station)
- A Temporary Cosmetology Facility Permit is valid for up to seven days.
- This permit provides Health Department regulatory oversight, and a means for cosmetologists to conduct business and participate in temporary events in Salt Lake County.

➤ Cosmetology Facility Follow-Up Inspection Fee

- \$135 to \$155, 15% Increase.
- This fee is charged to the owner of a body art facility when conditions found during an inspection require a follow-up inspection to ensure compliance.

➤ Massage Therapy Facility Plan Review & Initial Permit Fee

- \$180 to \$200, 11% Increase.

- Massage therapy facilities are required to submit properly prepared plans and specifications for review and approval prior to the start of operation, construction, change of business type, or remodeling. These facilities have construction and operation requirements that must be approved before operation including review of physical facilities, mobile massage therapy truck provisions, cleaning and maintenance procedures, equipment, and provisions for owners, operators and patrons. This fee covers costs associated with plan reviews and issuance of the initial annual permit. It includes time spent processing applications, reviewing facility and operational plans, conducting construction and pre-operational inspections and the first routine inspection.
- The massage facility plan review fee and initial permit fee covers time spent verifying properly designed facilities and safe operations in the initial stages of permitting.

➤ Massage Therapy Facility Permit Renewal Fee

- Annual Permit Renewal \$30 to \$35, 17% Increase.
- This fee is assessed annually and does not include the first year of operation which is covered by the Massage Facility Plan Review & Initial Permit Fee.
- This fee will cover costs for an annual permit review, educating operators, complaint responses and verification of licenses. The reduced fee is the result of a heavy investment of labor and time in the plan review stage and first year of operation, and a decreased need to conduct routine field inspections annually.

➤ ~~Massage Therapy Contracting Business Initial Permit Fee~~ -REMOVE AS OBSOLETE

- ~~○ \$155 to \$155, 15% Increase.~~
- ~~○ Massage therapy contracting businesses are required to submit a permit application and specifications for review and approval prior to the start of operation, construction, change of business type, or remodeling. These businesses are the responsible party in coordinating and contracting with independent massage therapists. In many cases these businesses lack a physical facility as a primary location for services. Rather, they send massage therapists to various locations as a mobile means of conducting business. Requirements that must be approved before operation include review of business plan, list of licensed massage therapists, cleaning and maintenance procedures, equipment, and provisions for owners, operators and patrons.~~
- ~~○ This fee covers costs associated with processing applications and payments, reviewing operational plans, verifying licensure and issuing permits.~~

➤ Temporary Massage Therapy Facility Permit Fee

- \$110 to \$120, 9% Increase.
- A Temporary Massage Therapy Facility Permit is valid for up to seven days.
- Operators with a valid Massage Therapy Facility Permit in Salt Lake County are not required to obtain a Temporary Massage Therapy Permit to participate in events outside of their permitted facility. This permit provides Health Department regulatory oversight, and a means for massage therapists to conduct business and participate in temporary events in Salt Lake County.

➤ Massage Follow-Up Inspection Fee

- \$135 to \$155, 15% Increase.
- This fee is charged to the owner of a massage therapy facility when conditions found during an inspection require a follow-up inspection to ensure compliance.

- Tanning Facility Plan Review & Initial Permit Fee
 - \$190 to \$200, 5% Increase. (+\$25/station)
 - A plan review service covers costs associated with plan reviews of new tanning facilities.
 - Tanning facilities are required to submit properly prepared plans and specifications for review and approval prior to the start of construction, change of business type, or remodeling. These facilities have construction and operation requirements that must be approved before operation including review of physical facilities, cleaning and maintenance procedures, equipment and instruments, and safety signage/notifications requirements. This proposed fee will recover costs associated with plan reviews and includes time spent processing applications, reviewing facility and operational plans, issuing permits and conducting construction and pre-operational inspections.
- Tanning Facility Permit Renewal Fee
 - Annual Permit Renewal (includes 1 workstation) \$150 to \$155, 3% Increase.
 - Each Additional Workstation is \$20 to \$25, 25% Increase.
 - Fees are based on time to conduct services including processing payments, renewing permits, conducting annual inspections, educating operators, and responding to complaints.
 - A facility station is a designated patron/operator space equipped with instrumentation and facilities for conducting an individual personal service. An example is a tanning booth or bed.
- Tanning Facility Follow-Up Inspection Fee
 - \$135 to \$155, 15% Increase.
 - This fee is charged to the owner of a tanning facility when conditions found during an inspection require a follow-up inspection to ensure compliance.
- Individual Tanning Certification Fee
 - \$40 to \$45, 13% Increase.
 - This fee is charged to employees of tanning facilities to become certified. The fees are based on time to process payments and applications, administer and proctor the certification exam, issue certifications and maintain records.
- Multiple Professional Services Permits Fee (per additional facility permit)
 - \$95 to \$130, 37% Increase +\$25/station of same type
 - This fee covers costs of additional permits beyond the initial base permit. The initial fee covers the modality's base fee for preopening inspections. Yearly renewals cover administrative and routine inspection costs for additional modalities. Note: Inspections for each modality are assumed to occur during the same visit. If rescheduled, a follow-up fee applies. Massage permit renewal remains at \$30 as no routine inspection is required.
 - This fee applies to Body Art, Cosmetology, Massage Therapy and Tanning Facilities
- Public Lodging Facility Plan Review and Initial Permit Fee
 - \$210 to \$365, 74% Increase.
 - The significant increase in fees is due to incorporation of a plan review completed at the time of initial permit application. Public lodging facilities are required to submit properly prepared plans and specifications for review and approval prior to the start of construction, change of business type, or remodeling. These facilities have design and operational requirements that must be approved before operation including review of water and wastewater systems,

physical facilities, equipment maintenance, cleaning safety and structural design, operational plans, personnel, patron provisions.

- This fee covers costs associated with plan reviews and includes time spent processing applications, reviewing facility and operational plans, and conducting construction and pre-operational inspections.

➤ Public Lodging Facility Permit Fee

- \$210 to \$270, 29% Increase
- The number of inspections in public lodging facilities is consistent, no matter the size or number of units. Routine inspections include a minimum number of units and then determine if more rooms need to be inspected, or if a follow-up inspection is warranted. Fees are based on the time to process applications and payments, issue permits, conduct an annual inspection, and respond to complaints.

➤ Public Lodging Follow-Up Inspection Fee

- \$185 to \$200, 8% increase
- This fee is charged to the owner of a public lodging facility when conditions found during an inspection require a follow-up inspection to ensure compliance.

Pools Program Fees (Includes public swimming pools, spas and interactive water features)

➤ Summer and Winter Seasonal Operational Permit Fee

- Seasonal Permit \$515 to \$615, 19% Increase
- Regulatory distinction is made between seasonal and year-round pools primarily because year-round pools require seven additional pool water sampling events in the year than the seasonal pools.
- Fees are based on time to conduct services including processing payments and applications, issuing permits, performing monthly water sampling, conducting inspections, educating operators, and responding to complaints.

➤ Year-Round Pool Operational Permit Fee

- \$950 to \$1110, 17% Increase
- Year-round pools require seven more water samples collection events than seasonal pools which increases time and costs to perform services.
- Fees are based on time to conduct services including processing payments and applications, issuing permits, conducting inspections, educating operators, performing monthly water sampling and responding to complaints.

➤ Pool Facility Plan Review Fees (by sq. ft. of the pool)

- 1-2000 sq. ft. \$1315 to \$1495, 14% Increase
- 2001-5000 sq. ft. \$1830 to \$2085, 14% Increase
- 5001+ sq. ft. \$2350 to \$2675, 14% Increase
- Conducting plan reviews of new pools and monitoring installation and construction practices are required to prevent future problems with the design, safety and operation of public pools.
- Pool facilities are required to submit properly engineered plans and specifications for review and approval prior to the start of construction and installation of a new or remodeled pool. These facilities have design and operational requirements that must be approved before

operation including review of physical facilities, pump room equipment, sanitizing equipment, safety equipment and instruments, operators and personnel, and secure access to the pool.

- Pool Follow-up Inspection Fee
 - \$195 to \$225, 15% Increase
 - This fee is charged to the owner of a pool facility when conditions found during an inspection require a follow-up inspection to ensure compliance.
- Registered Pool Operator Permit Fee
 - \$30 to \$35, 17% Increase
 - This fee is charged to certified pool operators to register their certification. The fee is based on time to process payments and applications, verify approved certification, and maintain records.

School Program Fees

Food service school inspections are mandated by State statute, Administrative Rule and Health Regulation. Food service fees for public schools were eliminated over 2 decades ago by the Board of Health. We are proposing that this fee be reinstated as it costs the Department more than \$146,400 per year to conduct these food inspections. Federal school lunch policy requires cafeterias to be inspected twice per year. This is the same interval as a Risk Level 3 Food Establishment. Respectively, we propose the food establishment permit fee for public schools should be the same as a Risk Level 3 Food Establishment.

- School Food Service Inspection (Public Schools) NEW
 - \$610
 - Fees are based on time to process applications and payments, issue permits, review menus and food processes, conduct risk assessments, perform inspections, investigate complaints, and perform disease investigations and epidemiological surveillance. The fee reflects the cost of providing services.
 - This program has comparable fees within Utah and among other states.

Sanitation & Safety School inspections are mandated by State statute and Administrative Rule but do not allow for issuance of a permit, as with food service operations. These inspections cover the overall design, construction, operation, and maintenance of schools as it relates to public health, sanitation and safety. The Department has covered the costs of school regulation with tax funding. These services cost the Department \$24,000 per year. Other local Health Departments in Utah currently charge fees for these inspections. School inspections for elementary, junior high and middle schools occur once every 3 years. School inspections for high schools and technical schools occur once every 2 years. We are proposing inspection fees to cover the costs of providing these services.

- Elementary, Middle & Junior High School Inspection Fee NEW
 - \$120
- High School & Technical School Inspection Fee NEW
 - \$285

- Fees are assessed annually and based on time to process applications and payments, perform inspections, investigate complaints, and perform disease investigations and epidemiological surveillance. The fee reflects the cost of providing services.
- This program has comparable fees within Utah and among other states.

We are proposing these fees be implemented on July 1, 2027 to align with the State's 2028 fiscal year period and so the affected school agencies may plan and budget accordingly.

Solid Waste Management Program Fees

The Health Department regulates the management of solid waste to protect public health, safety, welfare and the environment. Regulation applies to all people engaged in the handling, processing, collection, transporting or disposal of solid waste. These fees apply only to operations and locations where solid waste is accumulated, stored, disposed of or processed including waste tire facilities, processing facilities such as recycling, composting, reclamation or resource recovery facilities (this does not include automobile processing or scrap metal recycling facilities). The fees also apply to private landfill facilities including monofills and construction & demolition landfills.

- Municipal or Industrial Waste Permit Application & Plan Review
 - \$1625 to \$1850, 14% Increase.
 - This fee is charged to owner of a solid waste management facility at the time of application for a permit. The fee covers the cost of the plan review and assurance the facility meets all the planning and operational requirements outlined in Health Regulation #1, Solid Waste Management Facilities.
- Construction and Demolition Waste Permit Application & Plan Review Fee
 - \$1625 to \$1850, 14% Increase.
 - This fee is charged to owner of a solid waste management facility at the time of application for a permit. The fee covers the cost of the plan review and assurance the facility meets all the planning and operational requirements outlined in Health Regulation #1, Solid Waste Management Facilities.
- Monofill Permit Application & Plan Review
 - \$1315 to \$1495, 14% Increase.
 - This fee is charged to owner of a solid waste management facility at the time of application for a permit. The fee covers the cost of the plan review and assurance the facility meets all the planning and operational requirements outlined in Health Regulation #1, Solid Waste Management Facilities.
- Liquid Waste Processing Facility Permit Application & Plan Review Fee
 - \$1625 to \$1850, 14% Increase.
 - This fee is charged to owner of a solid waste management facility at the time of application for a permit. The fee covers the cost of the plan review and assurance the facility meets all the planning and operational requirements outlined in Health Regulation #1, Solid Waste Management Facilities.
- Infectious Medical Waste Facility Permit Application & Plan Review Fee
 - \$1565 to \$1780, 14% Increase.

- This fee is charged to owner of a solid waste management facility at the time of application for a permit. The fee covers the cost of the plan review and assurance the facility meets all the planning and operational requirements outlined in Health Regulation #1, Solid Waste Management Facilities.

➤ Solid Waste Management Facility Follow-Up Inspection Fee

- \$165 to \$175, 6% Increase
- This fee is charged to the owner of a solid waste management facility when conditions found during an inspection require a follow-up inspection to ensure compliance.

Subdivision Program Fees

➤ Subdivision Plan Review Fee

- \$60 to \$70, 17% Increase.
- This fee is assessed to individuals and businesses required to submit subdivision plat approvals to the Health Department for review.
- This fee covers costs to process an application and payment for subdivision review, process payment, maintain records and review prepared plans and specifications to verify service district approval of water and sewer availability.

Waste Hauler Program Fees

The Health Department regulates the management of solid waste to protect public health, safety, welfare and the environment. Regulation applies to all people engaged in the handling, processing, collection, transporting or disposal of solid waste. These fees apply only to waste hauler operations. Waste haulers are individuals and businesses that collect, haul, or transports garbage, trash, junk, asbestos, construction or demolition waste, tires, sewage, sludge, dead animals and infectious medical waste. Waste haulers do not include businesses or individuals that collect or transport solid waste as an incidental part of their business, i.e., landscaping and construction businesses.

➤ Solid Waste, Liquid Waste and Infectious Medical Waste Hauler Permit Fees

- 1-5 vehicles, \$320 to \$365, 14% Increase
- 6+ vehicles for each additional vehicle \$40 to \$45, 13% Increase
- Fees are based on the time to process applications and payments, issue permits, review operational plans, collection and dumping records, conduct an annual inspection, and respond to complaints.

➤ Waste Tire Hauler Permit Fees

- 1-5 vehicles \$50, no change
- 6+ vehicles for each additional vehicle \$10, no change
- These fees are capped under State Rule. We have attempted to work with UDEQ to amend Rule R315-320 section 4(7) to allow local health departments to recover costs with fees. It currently costs the agency \$365 for 1-5 trucks and \$45 for each additional vehicle to regulate Waste Tire Haulers.

➤ Waste Tire Hauler Follow-Up Inspection Fee

- \$175 to \$200, 14% Increase

- This fee is charged to the owner of a waste hauler operation when conditions found during an inspection require a follow-up inspection to ensure compliance.

Wastewater Program Fees

Onsite Wastewater System Design and Installation Permit Fees

- Alternative Onsite Wastewater System Design and Installation Permit Fee
 - \$3655 to \$4160, 14% Increase.
 - Alternative Onsite Wastewater Systems are approved in areas that are not accessible by municipal sewers and typically have site restrictions such as setbacks from water courses and topography which cannot support Conventional Onsite Wastewater Systems.
 - Review of Alternative Onsite Wastewater Systems requires extensive support and time by Health Department staff to ensure that ground and surface water is protected. They also require more intensive review of calculations because they have more complex components than conventional systems. This translates to more time spent ensuring systems meet State Rule R317-4 and Salt Lake County Health Department Regulations.
 - Fees are based on time to conduct services including processing applications and payments, issuing permits, supervision, correspondence, plan review, and construction inspections.
- Conventional Onsite Wastewater System Design and Installation Permit Fee
 - \$2640 to \$3005, 14% Increase.
 - Systems are typically in remote areas of the County, such as the canyons and Herriman City. They require a significant amount of travel time to conduct site visits. Many projects require more than one visit due to site restrictions during the installation of the system.
 - Fees are based on time to conduct services including processing applications and payments, issuing permits, correspondence, plan review, and construction inspections.
- Wastewater Holding Tank Design and Installation Permit Fee
 - \$1430 to \$1625, 14% Increase.
 - Holding Tank approval and installation costs less because they do not require inspection on the drain field or verification of percolation tests.
 - A Holding Tank is only allowed when a conventional system has failed and no other treatment option is available, or in remote work camp situations.
 - Fees are based on time to conduct services including processing applications and payments, issuing permits, correspondence, plan review, and construction inspections.

Onsite Wastewater System Operating Permit Fees

- Alternative Onsite Wastewater System Operating Permit Fee
 - \$135 to \$155, 15% Increase.
 - An annual operating permit is required for Alternative Wastewater Systems.
 - Fees are based on time to process applications and payment, review maintenance records, correspondence, issue a permit and respond to complaints.
- Wastewater Holding Tank Operating Permit Fee
 - \$135 to \$155, 15% Increase

- An annual operating permit is required for wastewater holding tank systems.
- Although this fee amount is the same as the Alternative Onsite Wastewater System Operation Permit Fee, Holding Tank systems have specific requirements and are permitted and regulated separately.
- Fees are based on time to process applications and payment, review maintenance records, correspondence, issue a permit and respond to complaints.

Other Wastewater System Service Fees – Unless otherwise stated, fee increases reflect the increasing cost of operation and are based on the Division’s hourly rate for services. Additional factors used to arrive at proposed fees are noted appropriately.

➤ Re-inspection Fee (Onsite Wastewater Systems)

- \$270 to \$305, 13% increase.
- This fee is charged to the owner of an onsite wastewater system when conditions found during an inspection require a re-inspection to ensure compliance.

➤ Septic Tank or Wastewater Holding Tank Replacement Fee

- \$640 to \$730, 14% Increase.
- Fees are based on time for processing applications and payments, plan review, correspondence, conducting inspections and water tightness testing.

➤ Drainfield Replacement Fee

- \$860 to \$980, 14% Increase.
- This service used to be covered under the Septic Tank or Wastewater Holding Tank Replacement Fee. However, onsite wastewater system drainfield replacements take more time and resources to review and approve applications and plans than a septic tank or wastewater holding tank replacement. The proposed fee reflects the increase in cost to provide this service.

The Health Department is proposing to restructure travel services as follows:

1. Reduce standard consultation fee for non-yellow fever services
2. Eliminate travel prescription services

The projected revenue reduction is \$27,960. Most of this decrease will be offset by eliminating the \$26,000 annual consultation contract with the University of Utah for prescription oversight.

1. Reduce Office Visit Fee

SLCoHD proposes reducing the standard office visit fee for travel vaccine appointments that do not include the Yellow Fever vaccine from \$70 to \$50.

The reduced fee reflects a redesigned service model that shortens non-Yellow Fever appointments from 45–60 minutes to approximately 20 minutes. These streamlined visits focus on vaccine administration and essential travel health education, allowing staff to serve more clients while aligning the fee with the reduced time and resources required.

The proposed 29% fee reduction is expected to:

- Improve affordability and access for travelers seeking recommended vaccinations and basic travel guidance.
- Better serve clients who have already obtained travel health information and only require vaccinations.
- Increase the competitiveness of SLCoHD travel services within Salt Lake County.
- Better align fees with those charged by the Davis and Utah County Health Departments.

The clinic currently averages two to three no-shows per day, likely because some clients seek lower-cost services elsewhere. Reducing the fee is expected to increase demand by an estimated 300-400 additional client visits annually (assuming the 29% decrease in fees will at a minimum increase

participants by that same percentage), more than offsetting the projected \$1,960 reduction in fee revenue.

The office visit fee for clients receiving the Yellow Fever vaccine will remain at \$70. These appointments require significantly more provider time for education and counseling regarding vaccine risks and benefits, country entry requirements, travel health considerations, and recommended safety precautions. Approximately 40 minutes of counseling is provided during these visits, supporting retention of the current fee

2. Eliminate Travel Prescription Services.

The Salt Lake County Health Department (SLCoHD) Travel Clinic will discontinue prescribing travel-related medications. Clients requiring travel prescriptions will be referred to their primary care provider or another appropriate healthcare provider.

Transitioning to a vaccine-only model will:

- Expand travel services to a second clinic location because the prescription model required training in conjunction with the University of Utah so reduced pool of qualified nurses.
- Allow all immunization nurses to provide travel vaccinations, increasing scheduling flexibility.
- Increase appointment availability and improve client access because more nurse availability.
- Reduce appointment times.
- Decrease medical liability associated with evaluating drug interactions, contraindications, and other patient-specific medical issues.

This change also eliminates the need for the annual \$26,000 consultation contract with the University of Utah, as provider oversight for medication prescriptions will no longer be required.

Conclusion

The proposed changes will improve operational efficiency, expand access to travel immunization services, and strengthen the long-term sustainability of the Travel Clinic. Eliminating travel prescription services will reduce administrative complexity and medical liability, eliminate the \$26,000 annual University of Utah consultation contract, and create capacity to expand services and increase appointment availability.

Reducing the non-Yellow Fever office visit fee from \$70 to \$50 aligns pricing with the redesigned 20-minute vaccine-focused appointment, improves affordability, and enhances competitiveness with other local health departments. The anticipated increase of 300–400 additional client visits annually is expected to substantially offset the modest reduction in fee revenue while improving access to travel immunization services.
