

2015-16 Promise South Salt Lake Proposed Budget Changes and Rationale

- 1) Additional \$1,000 is needed to cover additional oversight and SMC personnel support at 2 new centers (Utah International School and Meadowbrook STEM) opened since 2014. Also, additional work is needed to bring new focus within Promise SSL Councils regarding mental health and substance abuse/drugs goals.
- 2) Additional \$4,000 is needed to cover additional work for the South Salt Lake Neighborhood Leadership initiative. Over the course of the next year, I will seek partners/sponsorships to fund personnel and operations support of the project.



## Promise South Salt Lake

The South Salt Lake Mayor's Office, with the support of South Salt Lake Recreation Department, Police Department, Community Development Department, and Urban Livability Department works with United Way and a broad variety of partners to provide dynamic, highly specialized community and out-of-school-time programming with academic and prevention focus at 5 school-based and 4 neighborhood-based locations throughout the city, currently serving 2,458 youth and adults.

Promise South Salt Lake works to implement specialized common agendas and program maps based on data, to provide model/evidence-based curriculums, expanded learning & positive youth development opportunities that support academic, physical, civic, social, and emotional success. Activities in South Salt Lake include high intensity, literacy-focused afterschool programs; structured recreation and service opportunities; intentional reciprocal cultural opportunities; and a broad range of enriching experiences that utilize a cradle to career continuum that improves educational and developmental youth outcomes.

We articulate our work as promises that represent our highest hopes for our community. Based on very specific research and models of other successful communities, Mayor Wood and the Promise South Salt Lake Leadership Team formulated our goals—considering the work that is being done in other high achieving communities, but created with South Salt Lake children, families, residents, and seniors in mind.



# Promise South Salt Lake Goals

GOAL 1: Increase the number of youth, including English Language Learners, who attain a minimum of proficiency or better in reading/language arts and mathematics

Progress Indicators:

- 93% of parents indicate that their child's schoolwork has improved or greatly improved as a result of participation in the Promise South Salt Lake afterschool programs

- Teacher surveys indicate that 74% of youth that participate in the programs come to school "motivated to learn"

GOAL 2: Increase protective factors and decrease risk factors of youth program participants

Progress Indicators:

- Teacher surveys indicate that 69% of youth have improved or greatly improved behavior as a result of participation in the programs

- In 2013, there was a 49.83% increase over the percentage of youth surveyed in 2011 in 3rd -6th grade who participate in PSSL programs that indicated they know 5 or more strategies to help get out of peer pressure to smoke, drink, or use marijuana, through the statement, "I am confident I can use strategies to get out of peer pressure."

GOAL 3: Implement and/or expand parent and family involvement opportunities including the development and strengthening of partnerships between parents, the school, and the community

Progress Indicators:

- 90% of parents indicate that they are satisfied or very satisfied with the Promise South Salt Lake afterschool programs

Goal 4: Increase collaboration of agencies and organizations that provide services to assist educational, emotional, behavioral, and social competencies of children and their families

Progress Indicators:

- 94 individual organizations have contributed directly to program success since 2008 (volunteer hours, supplies, programming, expertise, transportation, program space, etc)

# Promise South Salt Lake Initiative Overview

The vision: Every South Salt Lake resident deserves a quality education, a safe, healthy home and community, and the opportunity to be healthy and to prosper

Our commitment: Education is the key to success. We work in collaboration with families, schools, and other partners and stakeholders to create a college-going culture that believes that every young person who lives in South Salt Lake will continue their education beyond high school.

Promise South Salt Lake initiative strategies:

- 1) Identify and use data to provide easy to understand information that is used for learning, continuous improvement, and accountability. These data inform both the short-term actions and long-range plans that address the issues that act as barriers to youth and community success
- 2) Implement a Neighborhood Centers model where relevant services are easily accessible to residents. We strive not only to offer services in place-based centers, but also “centering” around youth, families, and community members to make education and higher quality of life available to every citizen
- 3) Facilitate Promise South Salt Lake Councils and/or utilizing existing groups that guide the work in the seven key areas of focus, provide data, and provide input on what programs and services are used to achieve the results that we seek. Segment the work into specific areas of focus to make it easier to “get our arms around” each piece
- 4) Develop and implement partnerships and build other capacities to deliver a continuum of solutions from cradle to career, and strengthen effective partnerships to provide solutions along the continuum and to sustain and scale up what works
- 5) Keep our eyes on the prize—A safe, healthy community of individuals and families who know, appreciate, and trust each other, and who have a clear understanding of what needs to be done to help young people to achieve their highest potential and adults to support the youth in achieving their goals, while working to become our own best selves

## “The Survey says...”

School day teachers of youth in Promise South Salt Lake programs participate in an annual survey to assess their perceptions regarding the benefits (or potential lack of benefits) of participation in the afterschool program. Below are samples from the 2012-2013 teacher responses at three of the program sites.

### Hser Ner Moo Community & Welcome Center Teacher Survey Stats

- Teachers report slight, moderate or significant improvements in over 89% of participants in terms of coming to school motivated to learn
- Teachers report slight, moderate or significant improvements in terms of class participation among 90% of program participants
- Teachers report slight, moderate or significant improvements in over 78% of participants in terms of academic performance

### Granite Park Junior High Teacher Survey Stats

- Teachers report slight, moderate or significant improvements in over 60% of participants in terms of coming to school motivated to learn
- Teachers report slight, moderate or significant improvements in over 67% of participants in terms of turning in homework on time

### Woodrow Wilson Teacher Survey Stats

- Teachers report slight, moderate or significant improvements in terms of class participation among over 89% of program participants
- Teachers report slight, moderate or significant improvements in terms of behaving in class among in over 83% of program participants
- Teachers report slight, moderate or significant improvements in terms of coming to school motivated to learn among over 83% of program participants


# Promise South Salt Lake Afterschool Programs Deliver Model Programs

Promise South Salt Lake Afterschool Leaders deliver programs with additional emphasis on quality. Trainers of high-quality specific programs that are currently on the National Registry of Effective and Promising Programs (NREPP) have come to Certify Promise South Salt Lake to give our Promise South Salt Lake program staff and partners the skills and information they need to deliver programs that state that they get results.

“In addition to afterschool programs serving more South Salt Lake youth this school year, Promise South Salt Lake staffs and partners have been trained and certified to implement model curriculums and evidence-based practices that have been proven to be effective. We are targeting specific outcome indicators for our youth, such as academic improvement, pro-social development, and delinquency prevention—all offered in active, engaging formats.” says Kari Cutler, Promise South Salt Lake Director, “We want to make the most of every minute that we have our community’s children and youth in our programs.”

The newly adopted programs vary by site, but include the Peer Assistance and Leadership Program, Too Good for Violence, Strengthening Families Program, and Positive Action Character Education Program.

## South Salt Lake Framework for Youth Success



Considering youth as the nexus of the community, then their families supporting them, then we can imagine the “promise table”, seeing where organizations fit best– the city has a focus of basic needs and support services, schools with strong instructional core programs, and a blend of city, school, faith-based, and community programs and services with emphasis on providing expanded learning and experiential opportunities. Always, we must keep in mind the cultural relevance, health and safety needs of our residents, and systematically collect data to help us to know if what we are doing is making a difference, to inform our programs and services for improvement, and as rationale for needed changes in policy, such as program regulations and city ordinance creation or changes.




